### Shrewsbury 0 Swindon 3 by ADAM DENT

Shrewsbury were handed a lesson in clinically efficient football in this Littlewoods Cup tie – and it is a lesson they will need to heed.

They were shown in the most definite way that it doesn't matter if you have the majority of the play if you can't score. Swindon were often pushed back into their own half but when they moved forward they created chances and almost certainly put the tie beyond lan McNeill's men.

It all went wrong in only the 12th minute when a ball from Tom Jones struck sweeper Tony Kelly and fell to Duncan Shearer who tucked it neatly under Steve Perks. For the next 20 minutes Shrewsbury dominated with some fluent attacking football but couldn't make it count.

Poor John McGinlay must have felt he was banging his head against a brick wall. He worked tirelessly, caused the defence problems and looked very sharp but was fighting a lone battle that he couldn't win without close support.

Mike Brown worked hard down the right but with him out wide and Willie Naughton out on the left, McGinlay was alone in the centre and his efforts came to precious little as a result. He created a great chance just two minutes after the goal when he flicked on a Brown cross but Naughton couldn't quite get a boot to it to sent it past Fraser Digby.

Brown set up several attacks by rounding Phil King and Shrewsbury at times looked good but again lost the momentum when they couldn't score. Then in the 32nd minute skipper Dick Pratley made a complete hash of a bouncing ball and when he sent a weak header intended for Steve Perks, the outstanding Alan McLoughlin said 'thank you very much' and nipped in to score.

Eight minutes later the tie, barring miracles, was put beyond reach when the midfielder notched his second. The pacey Fitzroy Simpson left Richard Green trailing in his wake, and sent over a cross which Perks didn't get, and in came McLoughlin.

The gaps in the Strewsbury defence opened again in the second half when McLoughlin hit the side netting instead of scoring, and old boy Ross Maclaren was denied by Perks

McNeill took off sweeper Tony Kelly with 15 minutes to go – getting a rough ride from the crowd for doing so – and introduced youngster Carl Griffiths, who could prove McGinlay's best striking partner, but the change made little different to the level of penetration.

It might be no comfort to those who witnessed last night's game, but Town did look better at Northampton. But the defence and, to a lesser degree, the midfield simply couldn't cope with Swindon who looked much more lively under Ossie Ardiles than Lou Macari. Town simply couldn't handle Swindon's method and it emphasised beyond doubt the gap between the two Divisions.

It is unlikely that any of the sides in the Third

Division will post the same sort of problems but the watching Bury Manager Sam Ellis did not look unduly worried. A win against his men on Saturday is now imperative and it will be an early test of Shrewsbury's long term chances



OUR HISTORIAN TAKES A LOOK BACK AT SOME PREVIOUS MEETINGS WITH TODAYS OPPONENTS

Tonight's meeting with Shrewsbury is the 48th time that the Clubs have met in League and Cup competition.

Between August and December 1960, they were in opposition eight times in all '- including twice in the Football Combination. Swindon had only one success out of those eight, when the reserves won their home fixture 3-0. Both Third Division encounters that season ended all square.

### FIRST OPPONENTS

The 'Shrews' were Swindon's firstever opponents in the Football League Cup, when it began nearly thirty years ago. That first game took place at the County Ground on October 12, 1960 and ended in a 1-1 draw. Cliff Jackson was the scorer for Swindon in the 38th minute, with Len Copp replying for Shrewsbury just after the interval. It was Copp, a stand-in striker with only one previous first-team appearance to his name, who again halted Swindon's progress in the replay at Gay Meadow a fortnight later. David 'Bronco' Layne, who had hit a hat-trick against Shrewsbury earlier in the year, fired Swindon ahead after only ten minutes but Copp equalised in the 20th. Then the 'Shrews' number eight was felled by 'keeper Sam Burton and Player-Manager Arthur Rowley slotted home a 74th minute penalty. Layne again came to the rescue, putting the Town level within a minute. That goal sent the tie into extra-time and, with no further score being added, the toss of a coin decided the venue for a third clash just two days later.

### TORRENTIAL DOWNPOUR

Luck favoured Swindon, but the weather didn't. A torrential downpour almost throughout the game, which again remained unresolved after 90 minutes, prompted the late Ron Endersby of the Evening Advertiser to write: 'the match lost any semblance of a test of skill long before the end of normal time, let alone extra-time'. The conditions proved to be far too severe for a Swindon side which included six teenagers in Terry Wollen, John Trollope, Bobby Woodruff, Mike Summerbee, 'Ernie' Hunt and Cliff Jackson. At one stage, it looked as though a fourth episode of the saga might be necessary. Merthyr referee Leo Callaghan appeared to call a halt to the almost farcical proceedings as th elines rapidly disappeared beneath a sea of mud. But shortly before the halfway point of extra-time, Jimmy McLaughlin broke the deadlock for Shrewsbury.

Young Hunt had the chance to cancel out the deficit almost immediately, from a penalty, but saw his effort turned away brilliantly by the 'keeper. Norman Hobson sealed the issue for the visitors ten minutes from the end.

### 'SHREWS' ON TOP AGAIN

A month later to the day, Shrewsbury returned to the County Ground for a Second Round F.A. Cup-tie and went away with a single-goal victory. Until this season, the Clubs had never met again in either Cup competition.

### LAST WIN HERE

Shrewsbury's win at the County Ground in November 1961 was to be their last. Since then, Swindon have notched seven victories in eleven starts. The first was on a celebratory night for the Town in May 1963, when Roger Smart's 88th minute winner clinched promotion for the first time in the Club's history. Most of the 20,273 present went away very happy.

The 3-0 success in September 1968 began a sequence of five successive home victories over the Shropshire Club and seven successive League victories that season. Peter Noble got the Town off to a good start in the third minute and added a second on the half-hour. Don Rogers made sure of the points eleven minutes from time when he hit home the rebound after his penalty had been saved.

### HONOURS EVEN

Honours were exactly even in 1975/ 76, when both Clubs recorded 3-0 home wins. The September meeting at Gay Meadow was not one to be remembered by Swindon. With more than a little assistance from referee Alan Turvey, the visitors fell behind to penalties six minutes into each half. Apprentice full back David Collier probably couldn't believe his luck as he put them away. For good measure, Turvey also sent off Kenny Stroud. But the Town defender was amongst the goals in the return game at the County Ground, Dave Syrett and Trevor Anderson getting the others. And Kenny would have had good cause to smile two seasons later when Swindon grabbed all four points from the Shrews. At the County Ground in September, Chris Kamara, Steve Aizlewood, David Moss, Chris Guthrie and John Trollope all found the mark in a 5-0 win. At Gay Meadow, Stroud gave Swindon a half-time lead. Kamara added a second and home defender Jack Keay supplied the third in a 3-2 victory.



### VINNY COMPETITIVE, BUT RULES OK AT ELLAND ROAD



One thing he has going at Leeds United is a rapport with the Elland Road crowd. It is a difficult place to play. An intimidating atmosphere and United have a physical approach. It was an approach we must learn to match. The boss has asked us to be more competitive and to survive in away matches we must approach the game in a determined mood.

HAVE YOU SEEN IT BEFORE? How often do you see nine players win a match. Think of the last time you watched it happen. Let me know if you have. It is very rare and I will be able to say I was one of nine who have done so, not by one goal or two, but by three! Mind, we have had plenty of practice to get it right this season. 
### NEVER ON A SATURDAY?

Having been able to count the number of players who have appeared for both Shrewsbury and Swindon on the fingers of one hand, 1 had to look no further than the present 'No. 2' here at the County Ground for my subject this

### PHIL - ONLY THE FAMILY

The reference books tell us that the holder of that post is Philip Bates, but to almost everyone he is, of course, known as 'Chic'. Only his family refer to him as Phil. "They've called me Chic since I was about five or six, when we used to kick a ball round the streets of our council estate", he explained

### DIDN'T DO ENOUGH

Chic signed associate schoolboy forms for West Bromwich Albion but, in his words, "didn't do enough for them to keep me on". So, instead of an apprenticeship at Albion, he began one as a toolmaker and signed for Stourbridge Town From the age of 17, he spent two years in the reserve side, playing in the Birmingham League. before breaking into the first team.

### THIRTY-FIVE GOALS!

A steady scoring rate soon brought the scouts to Stourbridge, especially after Manger Alan Crundy signed another striker, Ray Haywood. Almost immediately the two formed a lethal scoring partnership that was eventually to take them to Shrewsbury. In the last season in the Southern League, the pair netted 66 out of 103 League goals as Stourbridge won the First Division North championship. Chic grabbed 35 of them By defeating both Swansea (where Chic scored twice) and Wrexham on their own patch on the way to the Welsh Cup Final, they did their reputations no harm at all. Chic remembers precisely the number of goals he



scored for Stourbridge - 194. "I'm a bit of a was moving up to the Second Division for the statistician myself", he smiled

### SHREWSBURY HAD GOOD VALUE

It was May 1974 when Haywood and Bates, the teacher and the toolmaker, arrived at Gay Meadow. Shrewsbury got Chic for a bargain £5,000. "I cost a bit more than Ray!" he grinned. They easily got value, as the two played in every League game in 1974/75 and hit 38 goals between them and Shrewsbury went up from the Fourth Division. Two seasons later. Chic lost his partner through injury but it did not affect his goal ratio. He still ended 1976/77 as top scorer with fifteen

### A TREMENDOUS SQUAD

In January 1978, Danny Williams signed Chic

first time

In fact. Chic has been there ever since, for by the time he returned to Shrewsbury, in December 1980, the Club had won promotion from the Third. Graham Turner, then 33, was Player-Manager It was when he left for Villa Park, in the summer of 1984, that Chic took over the hot seat at Cay Meadow.

### IN CHARGE

In his first season in charge, Chic took unfashionable Shrewsbury to eighth place in Division Two. He then lost a key defender -Ross Maclaren - to Derby and by November 1985 it looked gloomy for the Shropshire Club as they hovered around the danger zone. They finished in 17th place. Reflecting on his days as boss at Gay Meadow. Chic found that holding

for Swindon for about £35,000. He took a while to find his scoring boots, but in the following season led the way with 16 League and Cup goals. There was to be no repetition in 1979/80. but with Andy Rowland and Alan Mayes in such scoring form, it was hard to justify calling upon another striker. "It was a tremendous squad", said Chic, "as good as any I've played with". He had but one chance in the Cup campaigns that season, coming on as substitute at Wimbledon in the Fourth Round of the League Cup. He obliged by scoring the winner!

### IN THE SECOND DIVISION SINCE!

After the Cup furore had died down, Chic signed for Bristol Rovers. At the age of thirty, he on to his best players was a major problem and, more so, replacing them. The transfer market is clearly a headache for the smaller Clubs. "Getting players better than the ones you've got for the money is not easy" he said.

### FROM ONE 'WEE MAN' TO ANOTHER

Shrewsbury struggled again in 1986/87, but by the following November Chic was less concerned with the comings and goings at Gay Meadow as he and the Club parted company.

Two months later. Chic was back at the County Ground, helping the 'wee man' Lou Macari to hoist Swindon Town up the Second Division ladder Currently, the aim is the same. although the governor's accent may have changed a little!


Lou Macari's West Ham United swept into a fifth minute lead when
