# Players are starting to bubble again

IT WAS disappointing for everybody not to record our first away win of the season in the Second Division at Newcastle last weekend.

But the manner of our performance was very important, and I was pleased with the way in which the players knuckled down to their task and worked hard for each other.

It was especially pleasing the way we did not lose our composure after conceding an early goal. It was not a very good goal to concede because we panicked a little bit when it was possible to clear the ball from the danger area.

Afterwards we worked hard to get back into the game. You've got to be competitive in the derby atmosphere and we earned the right to pull back that early goal. Mark Proctor took his goal very well and then Mark Brennan did well to get himself into a scoring position and put us into the lead early in the second half.


At that stage I felt that we were capable of going on to win the match. The second half brought an awful lot of pressure for us and just as it looked as though we were going to weather the storm, Newcastle broke through for the equaliser.

Naturally we want to win games and nobody likes giving away late goals. But Newcastle is not an easy place to go and get results. You've only got to look at the Second Division table to see that.

Our players came out of the game with a lot of credit and it was a performance we must look to build on. We were especially strong through the midfield and that's something we want to see repeated in the future.

People tell me that we are in a false position near the foot of the table, but we are not in a false position. We are

there simply because we haven't picked up as many points as most of the other teams in the Second Division.

Our job is to keep working as hard as we did at Newcastle so that we can pick up the points to start rising up the table.

The recent results in the League have given the players a boost and you can sense that they are starting to bubble again. What we need now is a couple of wins to keep the ball rolling.

We are hoping to start against our visitors Swindon Town this afternoon. Our home form has been quite good and we want to make Ayresome Park a difficult ground for all our visitors.

Second Division sides are no easier to beat than those in the First Division.

So we must continue to display the same commitment which we showed at St James's Park. We must treat Swindon with the same respect that we did Newcastle and go out there to try to play the kind of football of which we know we are capable.

We all have the same objective. That's three points. So the desire must be matched by the determination.



# WELCOME TO AYRESOME

PAUL BODIN (defender): Joined Town from the now defunct Newport County in March 1988, but he made his league debut with Cardiff. After three seasons with the South Wales club he drifted into non-League football with Bath City and Newport eventually paid the Southern League club £15,000 for his return in January 1988.

JOHN CORNWELL (midfield): Adept at performing equally as well in midfield or defence. The former Leyton Orient and Newcastle United player moved to the County ground in December 1988 for a £60,000 transfer fee.

FRASER DIGBY (goalkeeper): The former England U21 International was the only ever-present in the League last season. Began his career with Manchester United as an apprentice. Following an initial period on loan he moved to Swindon for £12,500 in December 1986.

STEVE FOLEY (midfield): Joined Town from Sheffield United for a Football League tribunal fee of £35,000 in July 1987. The former Liverpool apprentice failed to make a senior appearance with the Anfield club and eventually given a




free transfer, he joined Grimsby in 1984, moving on to the Blades a year later.

DAVID GEDDIS (striker): The muchtravelled player rejected a close season move to Grimsby Town after the two clubs had agreed to a £40,000 transfer deal, the same figure that Swindon made when they secured his signature from Shrewsbury in October 1988. Began his career with Ipswich as an apprentice, sold to Aston Villa in 1979 for £300,000 and has played for eight clubs in all. JON GITTENS (defender): Joined the Robins in July 1987 with a Football League tribunal committee setting the fee at £40,000, following his move from Southampton. Was signed by the Saints from Paget Rovers, the Midland Combination club, in October 1985 for £22,000. Appearances last season were limited due to disciplinary suspensions and he missed the first two matches this term.

NICKY HAMMOND (goalkeeper): The former Arsenal player spent the summer months recovering full fitness after breaking a leg in a training accident. Given a free transfer by the Highbury club at the end of the 1986-87 season, he has proved an able understudy to Digby.

DAVE HOCKADAY (defender): Has given the club sterling service since he arrived from Blackpool on a free transfer in August 1983. Was originally a winger and during Swindon's rise from the Fourth Division he proved to be one of the most consistent performers.

PAUL HUNT (striker): A product of the club's youth scheme. A consistent goalscorer at youth level who earned the



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plaudits of David Pleat, the Leicester City manager last term, following an outstanding display in a Midland Youth Cuptie at Filbert Street.

MARK JONES (midfield): The unfortunate former Oxford United player has been out of action during most of the last two seasons, with a serious knee injury. It is to his credit that he has fought his way back to fitness. Helped the Manor Ground club to the Second Division Championship in the 1984-85 season.

TOM JONES (midfield): After being discarded by Chelsea as a youngster, the skilful midfield player drifted into non-League circles with Farnborough Town and Weymouth. Surprisingly it was Scottish League club, Aberdeen, who eventually signed him in 1987 for a fee of £35,000 joining Swindon a year later.

ROSS MACLAREN (defender): Ross joined the Robins in July, 1988 from Derby County, after a Football League Tribunal had set the fee at £150,000. The Scottish-born defender settled into a sweeper role last season. Entered Football League with Shrewsbury Town in August 1980 after being released on a free transfer by Glasgow Rangers.

ALAN McLOUGHLIN (midfield): The former Manchester United apprentice moved to Swindon on a free transfer in August 1986. Originally a full back, Alan was converted to a midfield role and he relished the transition.

TIM PARKIN (defender): Joined Town in July 1986 after a Football Appeals Committee had set the compensation fee of £27,500 to be made payable to his former club, Bristol Rovers. Previously played for Blackburn and Malmo (Sweden).

DUNCAN SHEARER (striker): Brother of former Boro player Dave, he joined the County ground staff from Huddersfield in June 1988 for £250,000. The leading goalscorer in League matches last season, with 14. Started his career with Chelsea from Inverness Clachnacuddin.

HTZROY SIMPSON (midfield): Came up through the club's apprentice ranks and made his League debut last season. A predominally left-sided player he was a regular goalscorer at youth and reserve team level, but still awaits his first goal for the seniors.

STEVE WHITE (striker): Has proved to be one of the best free transfer signings in the history of the club. His first club was Bristol Rovers, and after nearly three seasons with the Pirates, he moved to Luton Town in a £200,000 transfer in December 1979, then, three seasons later, to Charlton for £150,000. During his only season with the London club, he spent brief loan periods with Lincoln City and amazingly, Luton Town! Returned to Rovers and on to Swindon in 1986.



COLIN CALDERWOOD (defender): The club captain, who returned to top form last season, is widely regarded as one of the Second Division's strongest central defenders. Signed from Mansfield Town with a Football League Appeals Committee setting the transfer fee at £27,500 in June 1985.


# OSSIE ARDILES (Manager)

OSSIE was appointed to the post on Thursday, July 20, 1989, in succession to Lou Macari who had taken over at West Ham following a highly successful five years in charge of the Robins.

In his prime, Ossie was an outstanding two-footed player who liked to come forward and support other players from his midfield role. A fighter who battled hard and was particularly adept at playing balls wide.

He joined Tottenham together with fellow countryman Ricky Villa, from Huracan, the Argentinian club in 1978, and, during ten years with the White Hart Lane club, he collected an F.A. Cup winners' medal in 1987 against Manchester City, and a U.E.F.A. Cup winners' medal in 1984 when the North London club defeated Anderlecht in the final.

Ossie spent last season with Queens Park Rangers, and had the misfortune to break a leg in mid season. After a period of recuperation he spent the summer playing for Fort Lauderdale in America prior to joining Swindon.

### REMEMBER WHEN ...

### 10 YEARS AGO

NOVEMBER 1979 was to prove to be a good month for John Neal and First Division Boro. The month started off with a goalless draw against Spurs at Ayresome Park, lifting the team into tenth place. A rare victory was recorded at Everton the following week, as Craig Johnston scored a goal in each half to claim a 2-0 victory.

### 20 YEARS AGO

JOHN HICKTON scored within two minutes of the start of the home game against Charlton Athletic on November 8, 1969 and Derrick Downing ensured two points with Boro's second goal two minutes from time. Three days later, a rain-soaked Ayresome Park crowd of 7,650 watched a Middlesbrough XI lose 3-4 to an All-Star XI in club captain Gordon Jones' testimonial game. The All-Stars goals were scored by Bryan "Pop" Robson, Bobby Moncur, Arthur Horsfield and John O'Rourke. Middlesbrough's three goals were scored by David Mills, Hughie McIlmoyle and John Hickton.

### 30 YEARS AGO

A GOAL from winger Eddie Holliday proved to be the winner for Middlesbrough at Leeds Road against Huddersfield Town on Saturday, November 7, 1959. At Portman Road a week later Ipswich Town centre-forward Ray Crawford scored a 59th minute winner for the Suffolk side against an unchanged Middlesbrough line-up. Sandwiched in between the two games was an Ayresome Park friendly against Hull City which saw Boro run out easy 4-0 winners with goals from Ray Yeoman, Brian Clough, Billy Day and a Bill Harris penalty.

### **40 YEARS AGO**

ALEX McCRAE returned to the Boro side after an absence of six games, replacing Johnny Spuhler, for the visit of unbeaten West Bromwich Albion on Saturday, November 12, 1949. A drenched crowd of 28,408 saw Boro make it three wins out of the last four games, winning 3-0 with Middlesbrough's "M formation" (Mannion, McCrae and McKennan) dominating the game, despite West Brom's attempts to make a fight of it. The goals came from Peter McKennan, Wilf Mannion (at his brilliant best) and Tom Woodward, despite an early injury when he strained his knee tendons, scored his third goal in four games.







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# 77 YEARS A FAN

A FEW weeks ago, when we featured a letter about a 14-week-old baby girl whose proud father had just registered her in our membership scheme, we asked who might be the oldest regular supporter.

Well, we think we've found him in Mr Ron Bingham (left), a retired steel industry sales manager, who was 82 last month. He travels to many away fixtures as well as being a season ticket holder and has been watching since he was a five-year old in 1912.

In fact, his family have been Boro supporters for five generations. His grandfather Frank was one of the original shareholders in 1899; his son David and grandsons Andrew and Roger are continuing the family tradition and provide the transport for away trips.

All four were at Chelsea for the playoff final which clinched promotion 17 months ago. "It was a frightening experience," he says as he recalls the attacks on Boro fans by the home supporters.

However, it has not deterred him from going to matches or dimmed his enthusiasm for the game. "I still enjoy it," he asserts. "It must be in my blood."

# A to Z OF BORO PLAYERS

CONTINUING our alphabetical list of players who have appeared in a Boro shirt since the war.

DAVE CUMMING: David Scott Cumming, Boro's pre-war Scottish international goalkeeper was born in Aberdeen on May 6, 1910. He played for local club Hall Russell, eventually signing for Aberdeen in 1929. Four seasons later Dave was transferred to Arbroath, and his first taste of English football came with a move to Middlesbrough in October 1936 for a £3,000 fee. The pinnacle of his career was a full Scotland cap (clubmate Jacky Milne also played for the Scots), against England (Micky Fenton also played) at Wembley in April 1938. His Ayresome Park career spanned the Second World War, but a serious knee injury forced his retirement from the game at the end of 1947/48 season.

STAN CUMMINS: Diminutive Stan Cummins was born in Sedgefield on December 6, 1958 and signed professional forms for Middlesbrough in December 1976. Manager Jack Charlton rated him as "probably the country's first million pound footballer" (He wasn't!). Despite this onerous label he forced his way into the first team scoring nine goals in 39 League appearances. John Neal, Jack Charlton's successor as manager, transferred Stan to Sunderland in November 1979 in a £300,000 deal. He later moved to Crystal Palace before trying his luck across the Atlantic in the North American League.

DAVID CURRIE: David Norman Currie was born in Stockton on November 27, 1962, played for Mandale Juniors, then trials with Southampton followed, but it was Boro who signed him as a professional on February 1982. Made his debut at the end of that season as substitute, and scored over 30 goals in his four

years at the club. Bruce Rioch deemed that he was surplus to requirements, and Darlington quickly stepped in, taking him to Feethams on June 17, 1986. He scored a further 33 League goals in two seasons at Darlington and in February 1988 he cost Barnsley a club record £150,000. He was Oakwell's top scorer last season.

PETER DAVENPORT: Born in Birkenhead on March 24, 1961, he is Boro's current club record signing at £750,000. Signed for Everton as amateur, but did not make the first team. He then played in non-League football with Cammell Laird, before being snapped up by Nottingham Forest. Won his only England cap to date as substitute against Eire in 1985. Moved to Manchester United where he scored 22 goals in 92 League games before joining Boro a year ago.

IAN DAVIDSON: Talented wing half born in East Lothian, Scotland, on September 8, 1937 and joined Preston North End from Kilmarnock in December 1962. Boro manager Raich Carter paid £16,000 for Ian's services on February 17, 1965, and he made his debut at Gigg Lane six days later. Transferred to Darlington on September 5, 1967, and became club captain for a while. Now lives in South Africa.

BILLY DAY: A mercurial winger, born in South Bank on December 27, 1936. Initially registered as an amateur with Sheffield Wednesday, but signed for Middlesbrough from South Bank Juniors in May, 1955, making his League debut five months later against Leicester City. Transferred to Newcastle United in March 1962, making a scoring debut at home to Scunthorpe United. Joined League newcomers Peterborough United in April, 1963, but, after only 17 League games went to non-League Cambridge United. A bad attack of pneumonia ended his career and he returned to Teesside where he is now a successful bookmaker.

LINDY DELAPENHA: Lloyd "Lindy" Lindberg Delapenha, one of the first black players to successfully play in the First Division, was born in Kingston, Jamaica on May 20, 1927. On his demobilisation from the RAF he joined Portsmouth. David Jack, Boro's manager signed Lindy at the end of the 1948/49 season. On his transfer to Mansfield Town in late June 1958, the likeable Jamaican had clocked up 270 League games. He dropped out of the League to join Burton Albion, the Heanor Town. He now holds a senior position with the Jamaican Broadcasting Corporation.

It is doubly pleasing when their efforts are rewarded with such a novel acknowledgement as the one on the left. Best of luck on the outings, children!



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
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

# WE'VE DONE IT BEFORE

IT IS DIFFICULT to realise that Gary Parkinson, veteran of two promotion campaigns and last season's unhappy relegation fight, is still only 21.

He made his debut for Boro on that historic occasion in August 1986 when the club narrowly escaped oblivion and had to play their opening home match against Port Vale at Hartlepool, courtesy of their Fourth Division neighbours.

Since then he has made the right back berth his own, having played well over 150 games there and he cherishes the hope that such consistency can still win him an Under-21 cap for England.

That's a personal ambition, but on a broader front his main aim is to get Boro back in the First Division, "where we belong", he asserts. Any suggestion that such hopes may have to wait awhile before they are fulfilled is immediately knocked on the head.


"The players here have done it before. It's not as if we're breaking new ground. There's obviously a chance. If we get a few results together the confidence flows and as soon as that comes back it generates goals. Everyone else starts cashing in.

"The season we got promotion Mogga, Pally and Ripper got goals. In fact there were goals all round the team.

"Even though we are not doing so well at the moment the dressing room atmosphere is good. The lads are happy. We get on great together and it's never been as bad as you read in the papers.

"There's some new faces, but they've been great buys and once Simon Coleman settles in he'll do well too. He's a good player, very composed on the ball in the same mould as Pally.

"People forget you can get in the play-offs even if you finish sixth. There's a possibility if we get a run



going we could finish top. But if we reach the playoffs we've got a great chance. We've done it before."

Talking to Gary it is obvious football (and the Boro) is his whole life and he admits he never thought of doing anything else. "I've always been a Boro fan — Mark Proctor was my schoolboy hero! — and I always had my heart set on being a player

An Everton scout did lure him away at 16, but, after three months at Goodison he was homesick and returned to his native Teesside, joining his beloved Ayresome Park on the YTS scheme.

Greatly encouraged by his father, he had been captain of Cleveland County's under 15 team and played sweeper for the under 19 team at the same time.

He enjoys all aspects of life as a professional footballer — the training (particularly after a good result), travelling to away games, and there is little in the game which upsets him, although Wimbledon's tactics tried his patience recently.

A total enthusiast, he is now the team's penalty taker. "When Dean Glover, who had the job, left I thought it would be a good chance to get on the scoresheet occasionally and I've scored three times now."

His best pal is former Boro forward Lee Turnbull, now with Doncaster, and Gary will be best man at his wedding next June.

Away from soccer it is still sport which captures








Strenuous efforts are being made to provide modern facilities for the safety and comfort of all football spectators.







Leaving Teesside by the usual route south, turn west off the A1 on to the M62, then the M6. Leave the M6 at Junction 12 on to A5.


Take the A449 towards Wolverhampton, take the second exit from the roundabout into Waterloo Road and finally left into Molineux Street for the ground.

Programmes are 80p and refreshments are available at hamburger stands.

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

BORO had no trouble beating today's visitors, Swindon, at Ayresome Park almost exactly 25 years ago with an international line-up.

The side contained five Scots, four Englishmen and two Welshmen and they collected 31 caps between them in the days when four representative honours a season was good going.

Boro's skipper was Welshman Mel Nurse, a cultured centre-half signed from Swansea for £25,000 by manager Bob Dennison in 1961.

Mel went on to win 12 caps, three of them while with Middlesbrough, and he was up against the legendary John Charles for the Welsh No 5 shirt.

The Boro defender scored in the 4-1 victory over Swindon on November 21, 1964, with Don Masson knocking in two and Ian Gibson adding the other.

Raich Carter was manager at the time and he named Nev Chapman at right back, his first game of the season.

Town had two debutants in their lineup — Dennis Brown a £17,000 signing from Chelsea the day before, and ex-Portsmouth player Keith East at centre-forward.

On 22 minutes a Swindon defender handled the ball just outside of the penalty area and Nurse lined up to take the free kick. His powerful shot at goal was deflected by a defender out of the reach of Norman Oakley to put Boro one goal up.

Swindon were a little unfortunate to be a goal behind at this stage of the game, for they had been as

much in the game as Middlesbrough.

Town's deserved equaliser came ten minutes from the half-time whistle when Don Rogers sent over a high ball into Boro's defence. Debutant East found the extra height to rise above the Boro rearguard to head the ball past Bob Appleby.

The second half was only six minutes old when Boro regained the lead. Arthur Kaye cut in from the wing and his shot was blocked by Oakley. Gibson, finding the ball at his feet, quickly swivelled and smashed it into the net.

Five minutes later, Masson scored a spectacular goal from all of 35 yards, his right foot shot beating Stockton born Oakley (ex-Hartlepool United) all the way.

Boro's fourth and final goal came on 75 minutes and Jim Townsend, Kaye and Gibson were all involved in the build-up on the right. Masson finishing off the move, first-timing the ball past Oakley from approximately 20 yards out.

The two points won further

contributed to Boro's climb up the table, making it nine points out of a possible ten. Swindon ended the season in 21st place and were relegated to Division 3 with Swansea Town.

Middlesbrough's Reserves also played that day (evening games did not come until the club joined the North Midlands League in 1967) in a North Regional League away fixture at Halifax Town.

Town could not muster up a full team and youth coach and part-time trainer Clive Baker had to play for them.

Slick Middlesbrough stormed to a 12-1 win (the Reserves' best victory of the season) with Stan Marshall and Terry Garbett both scoring four goals each. Bill Harris, Frank Spraggon, Arthur Horsfield (2) completed the scoring. We did not have it all our own way that day for the Juniors crashed 6-1 at Hutton Road against Sunderland Juniors in a Northern Intermediate League game. An interesting note was that Colin Todd, now Boro's coach, scored one of Sunderland's six goals that day 25 years ago.

Masson went on to win 17 Scottish caps after leaving Boro, while goalkeeper Eddie Conachan also gained Scottish selection twice.

Boro also had Under-23 internationals in the side, including Gordon Jones for England and Gibson for Scotland.

Says Mel: "Boro weren't afraid to buy players from the four corners of Great Britain. There was always lots of talent in the teams in my happy years at Ayresome Park and plenty of competition for places.

"Unfortunately, we never quite made it out of the Second Division, but we played some good entertaining football."

Raich Carter was manager when Boro beat Swindon after they had also defeated Swansea 4-0 at Ayresome Park and drawn 3-3 at Derby in November. Unfortunately, Boro finished a disappointing 17th in the table.

Mel reflects: "Raich was such a gifted player that he thought soccer was easy. Not all of us matched up to his expectations and we had no systems or game plans. But the club was fantastic and the fans were something special."

Now 52 and living back in home town Swansea, Mel maintained his interest in soccer until a short time ago as director of the Vetch Field club he joined at the age of 17.

# YOUTH SCENE

OF ALL the mail I receive here at Ayresome Park, the most popular in terms of its content are requests from young players for either a place or a trial for a place on the Youth Training Scheme for professional football.

I thought therefore that I would take the opportunity to acquaint supporters and parents with some of the principles and aims that lie behind a two year apprenticeship...

The successful candidate will start his employment in July and during the period of his apprenticeship he will be monitored both on and off the pitch by an organisation called "The Footballers Further Education and Vocational Training Society Limited".

This organistion is jointly run by the Professional Footballers Association and the Football League whose aims include not only to provide the young players of exceptional talent the opportunity to become full-time professional footballers, but also to provide a level of education best suited to the individual's own academic ability.

# Alongside their regular coaching and games as they pursue their main aim, comes the opportunity to learn and gain qualifications in all sorts of areas, allowing the young player to leave the scheme, if he is unfortunate enough not to secure a contract, with insurance and the possibility to be qualified to enter another career.

The offer of a place as a youth trainee footballer can often result from an association developed over a number of years between the youngster and the club.

We have many ways of discovering and nurturing young talent either through schools, local soccer, our own school of excellence and from training weeks held by the club to invited players.

We, like many of today's top clubs, have a national network of scouts covering England, Northern and Southern Ireland and Scotland whose jobs are to feed the club with future YTS trainees.

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
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# PAYLOR'S REVIEW

# A good place to win again

I LOST count of the number of times I overheard Newcastle United fans singing the praises of Boro following last weekend's derby day draw at St James's Park.

The Magpies fans were clearly impressed, not just by Boro's battling performance, but also by their footballing ability. In fact, if Boro had held on for the three points then I don't think anybody at the ground would have been unduly surprised.

Victory wasn't to be, but Boro have given every indication in their last two League trips that they are about to turn

the corner away from home.

The first half performance at Port Vale set them on the right road and Boro will go to West Ham United next weekend seeking their third unbeaten away Second Division match in a row.

They are also looking for their first win of the season on opposition grounds and it would be an occasion for a double celebration if it was to come at Upton Park. For Boro haven't won a League game away from home since two late goals from Bernie Slaven brought a 2-1 success at West Ham in the First Division last April!

Certainly Boro will have good reason to run out with plenty of confidence at Upton Park. They know they are capable of winning at West Ham, and they will want to extend their current sequence.

The recent improvement is the result of an overall team performance, but the difference is most noticeable in midfield.

In fact, Port Vale midfield man Ray Walker admitted that his side had been

absolutely over-run in that department in the first half. It was the same for a long period at Newcastle, where Kevin Dillon and Kevin Brock were not given the opportunity to stamp any authority on the proceedings.

Newcastle did manage to come back in the final 20 minutes because Boro started to pull more men back and allowed the Magpies to attack them. No doubt there's

a lesson to be learned there.

Probably the main difference to the Boro midfield is the return to form by Mark Brennan. He's had a difficult time battling to recover from his shoulder operation, but the patience and hard work is finally starting to pay dividends.

Now that he is again resembling the Mark Brennan of old, the ball is beginning to flow and there's hardly a better sight to behold at a Boro match than the former lpswich player spraying the passes around the field.

Nobody would be more delighted than him to see the ball go into the back of the net for his first goal of the season at St James' Park, and that's the result of his persistence in getting into goalscoring positions more often.

Not that Brennan is just an attacking midfield man. His defensive qualities were also pretty obvious at Newcastle when he booted the ball off the line to prevent Mick Quinn grabbing his 16th goal of the season just before the interval.

Manager Bruce Rioch reckons that strikers go in pairs. And perhaps that also applies to midfield men. Mark Proctor needed the final ten games of last season to find his feet in the team following his £300,000 transfer from Sheffield Wednesday.

But this season he has been Boro's most consistent player. He's tenacious, determined and hard working, and the fact that he is always looking for opportunities to have a pot at goal is fully justified by his equaliser at Newcastle, which was his fourth Second Division goal of the season. That's just three fewer than Bernie has managed in the League!

Of course Proc has always maintained a good goalscoring record and his overall work and experience is invaluable to the

With Colin Cooper settling in nicely at full-back the Boro defence is starting to do the business again and it's only really up front that the sparks need to start flying.

Bernie will always get goals, but the chance is there for Boro's other front runners to make their mark in the scoring charts. With two 20 goals a season men, Boro really would be ready to start that long awaited rapid rise up the table.

The seeds of success may already have been sown, let's not miss this chance to

extend the unbeaten run.

### Referee's answer

THE only person who can send a player "off" is the referee, so under the circumstances described, a substitute would be allowed. If one of the match officials had seen the player's gesture to the crowd, then the referee could have sent the player off because it states in the Law: "The offence of spitting at officials or other persons, or similar unseemly behaviour, shall be considered as violent conduct." 


