



I was able to bring Steve Foley back into first team action last week at Port Vale. Steve was a regular member of the first team squad before my appointment.





This afternoon is the 35th Football League meeting between Swindon Town and Portsmouth. The Clubs have also met on sixteen occasions in Cup competition.

After being regular visitors to Swindon from the turn of the century until 1924, it was 37 years before Portsmouth were again seen at the County Ground. In fact, the Club's first game back in the Third Division was at Swindon on August 19 1961. Portsmouth won 3-1 and scored all the goals, Alan Brown providing the Town's 67th minute consolation when they were already three goals down. Ralph Hunt, the former Pompey player, was making his League debut for the Town. In his first outing for Swindon, in a preseason friendly, Ralph scored within 30 seconds!

FIRST TOUCH

In a friendly against Exeter City at the County Ground in the November, Swindon included a triallist from Swansea, David Dodson. Three weeks later, he joined Portsmouth and scored

with his first touch of the ball, in the first minute of his first game – against Swindon! Two goals in five minutes, from 'Ernie' Hunt and Bill Atkins put the Town 2-1 ahead with twenty minutes left, but Derek Harris levelled matters.

Portsmouth made an immediate return to Division Two, but Swindon were not long in joining them. Nearly 22,000 were at Fratton Park for the Town's visit on August 31 1963. Goals from Atkins, Mike Summerbee and Roger Smart and an own goal from Brian Snowdon had put the visitors in a commanding 4-0 lead by the 67th minute. Ron Saunders made a lone reply for Portsmouth.

OUICK-FIRE POMPEY

A year later it was a different story. Swindon had suffered a four-goal defeat at Swansea in mid-week and with only five minutes gone at Fratton Park they were two goals down, through Jack McClelland and Albert McCann. After 33 minutes it was 0-5! Cliff Portwood grabbed two in four minutes. It was a League debut that the Town's Dennis Peapell would not want to remember.

FIVE ON THE TROT

After a 3-1 reverse at Fratton in October 1969, Swindon recorded five successive League victories over Portsmouth. In two away wins Steve Peplow and Peter Noble each grabbed a brace of goals. Noble also helped himself to a pair at the County Ground in March 1970, as did Don Rogers at Christmas 1971. Both gave the Town a 3-1 verdict.

It could be said that 1974 was not a good year for the Town. Portsmouth, however, could rejoice in the fact that three visits to the County Ground that year Ground and F.A. Cup to first goal in came in the the game.

yielded three wins. Having done the hard part in gaining a 3-3 draw at Fratton in a Third Round F.A. Cup tie in January, Swindon went down 0-1 in the replay. Then Pompey took the points from their League visit in March with a 2-1 victory, Swindon's goal coming from full-back John McLaughlin, later to join Portsmouth. In August, the hat-trick was completed when Norman Piper scored the only goal in a First Round League Cup success

DAVE GUNS 'EM DOWN

The most remarkable scoring feat against today's visitors came back in April 1914, from a young soldier of the 30th Battery of the Royal Artillery on his Swindon debut. His name was David Rogers and how appropriate that it should have been against Portsmouth. He hit a hat-trick in fourteen minutes, including a thirty-yard rocket, and added a fourth in the second half. Billy Tout completed the visitor's misery with a penalty to take the scoreline to 5-0.

RECORD BOOV

That was Swindon's fifth successive home victory over Pompey and atoned somewhat for an earlier sequence of eleven defeats in twelve Southern League visits to Fratton Park.

NEVER TOO LATE FOR STEVE

Steve Foley, who made a welcome return to the Town side at Vale Park last weekend, will be hoping to maintain his scoring sequence today. Twice last season he netted late equalisers against Portsmouth – in the League encounter at the County Ground and in the Third Round F.A. Cup tie at Fratton – and his first goal in the Cup replay also came in the final ten minutes of the game.



WELCOME BACK TO 'STIGGER'



DEPRESSING

There have been many comments lately about the application of safety measures in the aftermath of the Hillsborough disaster, with the rigid letter of the law seemingly being applied with too little thought on occasion. The trip to Port Vale last Saturday was a depressing example of this, with the away terrace closed for 'safety reasons' and invisible 'building work', a large 'Town' contingent were forced to pay £6 for the dubious privilege of being crammed into a small wooden seating area. In a fairer world, Vale would have charged the standing admission price to Swindon fans, the majority of whom would rather have been on the terraces but were given no choice in the matter.

RACIST

An additional problem was the close proximity of Vale's own fans whose terrace had been rendered equally redundant by the all encompassing 'building work' and 'safety reasons'. Their stone age banter managed to stir up the few remaining brain cells of some 'Town' supporters who responded to their bait in the only style they know. Quite what impact 'we hate Oxford' chants had on the inhabitants of a town 40 miles from Manchester, only the most seasoned yob could testify! Port Vale's inclusion of two black playes also drew the usual racists out from their slime as they bizarrely abused Robbie Earle as our own Jon Gittens challenged him, unfortunately those idiots will still not go away and equally sad is the age group of some of them. Grown men with children seem to find it as funny and rewarding as the brainless teenagers who are the new generation of racist scum, believing that abuse of a player on the basis of his skin colour is part and parcel of football. An awful lot is said about racism in football, but empty words will not win the war against these people. Vigilant and decisive action by Clubs and police is the only long term answer. How many

POSERS?


On Thursday we played host to the television company filming 'The Manageress'. An interesting day for all of those involved.



PAUL PLOWMAN LOOKS BACK AT THE CAREER OF A PLAYER WHO SERVED **BOTH SWINDON TOWN** AND TODAYS OPPONENTS

Not too many young footballers come into the game now while studying for 'A' levels, but former Newport, Swindon and Portsmouth defender Steve Aizlewood never neglected his education and eventually gained a BSc degree in Urban Estate Management. Now 37, he is back in South Wales, working in local government and living just a stone's throw from a derelict Somerton Park.

SAD LOSS

"It was a sad loss for the Town", Steve said of the demise of his first Club, Newport County. "People don't realise what a football club does for a place", he added. "I did a study up in Lancashire where the same has happened at Accrington".

As a youngster, Steve made an early impression, representing his country at schoolboy level. He made his League debut for Newport, at Chesterfield in April 1969, while still at school and signed professional forms for them in January 1970.

Steve made nearly 200 League appearances for County - and nodded in a few goals too. His seven from centre-half in 1973/74 was only two less than Club top scorer Billy Brown

DANNY'S CAPTURE

On March 10 1976, Danny Williams signed Steve for Swindon Town for £13,500. He made his debut three days later at Halifax, replacing the man who would later sign him for Portsmouth, Frank Burrows. He played only five games before an injury intervened, but 1976/77 saw him settle into the number five shirt. In a seven-goal thriller against Portsmouth on the final day, Swindon saw a three-goal half-time lead vanish - teenager Chris Kamara popped in a couple of penalties - but a goal from Steve In 1982/83, they went up again as gave the Town the points.

Under Bob Smith, Steve found himself filling in as an emergency striker in two League Cup ties in October 1978. Chris Guthrie had been sold to Fulham and Andy came when he took over penalty Rowland was cup-tied when taking mid-season. Swindon had to face Peterborough in the Third Round.

SO CLOSE

Steve partnered 'Chic' Bates in attack and scored in a 1-1 draw at London Road, but was unable to add to his tally in the replay at the County Ground. Swindon went out 2-0.

The Town went close to gaining promotion that season, but finally blew their chances by losing the last two games to mid-table sides Sheffield Wednesday and Blackpool. At Bloomfield Road, a winger by the name of Dave Hockaday scored as the Tangerines sunk Swindon 5-0. It was to be Steve's final appearance for Swindon and he marked his farewell with a goal.

time to study at Portsmouth Polytechnic. He played for Waterlooville in the Southern League in 1984/85. but a neck injury persuaded him to 'call it a day'.

He went back home to Newport, gaining a 'transfer' to the Polytechnic of Wales. Steve used to go to Cardiff a few times to see his old boss Frank Burrows and witnessed Newport's struggle in the Vauxhall Conference before they finally 'went under'.

Now he enjoys some freedom at weekends. "When you're playing you've got to go every week", said Steve. "But it's nice to have a choice on Saturdays".







NIGHT HAWK

It's 3 a.m., Wednesday 22nd November, another late night has dissolved into an early morning as GWR FM offers comprehensive coverage of Swindon Town's epic Littlewoods Cup game against Bolton Wanderers. It was the saga of the Third Round tie which went on and on and on ...

Why, you may ask, is there work to be done at our Wootton Bassett studios in the wee small hours. Well, some would say I was inefficient, I hope I'm conscientious, but more of the overnight activity later.

NOT AVERAGE

Swindon Town v Bolton Wanderers looked as average as they come when the two teams were pulled out of the bag. We covered this first game as we would normally broadcast about any mid-week match, regular reports every 15 minutes on events at the County Ground. It ended three-all, it was a pulsating cup tie, the winners would play host to First Division Southampton, suddenly the replay seemed an obvious 'second-half commentary game'. It's not quite as simple as that!

NO PROBLEM

We checked with both Clubs that they would have no objection, then queried with British Telecom about the availability of a high-quality landline by which to send back our signal as clear as a bell, with no interference. I think that an engineer in Swindon makes two wires match up with a pair in Manchester for this purpose – but then I'm not an engineer.

FACILITY FEE

The Clubs receive a 'facility fee' in accordance with the Football League Radio Contractors (AIRC). Some teams believe commentary on the radio could harm the attendance figure by encouraging supporters to stay at home, the majority are in favour of the idea because the pre-publicity to a big match usually increases the gate!

Our first journey to Bolton was uneventful, our seats were well placed for a good view and the

Wanderers made us very welcome. We got lost on the way out in an industrial estate, and have a week to contemplate a return journey after the one-all draw.

FOGGY DAYS

Seven days later we were held up by an accident involving several lorries in fog by the Birmingham interchange of the M5 and M6. We arrived at Burnden Park only an hour before the programme began. On the way home, I felt sorry for the supporters we met at Hilton Park services. They too had been

delayed northbound and missed the first half, including both of the goals.

Aftewards, on all occasions, we loiter with intent in the corridors of power for the verdict of Ossie Ardiles, 'Chic' Bates et al. These interviews are recorded and so is the whole broadcast. In the early hours we mix and match comment and commentary in a montage of highlights, hence the overnight activity.

BREAKFAST SHOW

The breakfast show (6-9 a.m.) involves me getting up at home in Devizes at 3.45 a.m. anyway, so I've spent three sleepless nights in the Lime Kiln to save on driving time. One advantage of working on the radio is that you don't have to look your best.

PAUL RIDEOUT

I'm sure Paul Rideout could well be as confused about the whole affair as me. Twice we primed him for a telephone interview about Southampton's involvement with the successful side, but twice there weren't any winners!

LONG PLAYER NO C.D.

The game goes into the history books as a long-player. Maybe we could one day release an L.P. of the radio highlights. I hope it was as exciting to hear as it was to present! There's something about live radio when you have a microphone, headphones and 3 hours to fill.

Playing controlled flowing football from the kick-off we continually took the game to the home team. We sustained long periods of pressure but were unable to turn our possession into goal attempts.




