### MATCH MAGAZINE REPORT

The Match magazine spent a day with the Town boss Ossie Ardiles, when we met Stoke City at the County Ground on November 4th, 1989 We reproduce their report.

As the two teams returned to the field, Swindon boss Ossie Ardiles was bringing up the rear to the noisy applause of the County Ground faithful.

In stark contrast, his opposite number Mick Mills was getting nothing but yeers and boos from Stoke's despondent travelling fans - their team trailing 2-0 with little sign they would reduce the deficit

Almost inevitably, the second half produced only a further divide in the mood of the rival supporters – the Robins' flock celebrating a cracking 6-0 win over a fragile Potteries side.

And Ossie Ardiles emerged sporting a grin as large as the one that adorned his face when Argentina won the World Cup in 1978.



# WELCOME TO THE PLAYERS. SUPPORTERS AND OFFICIALS OF SOUTHAMPTON

Today, the post match press interviews would come easy

"They are part of the job," admits Ossie, "but after a 6-0 win it is not a problem!

Tam a very happy football manager but because we have won I can be more critical of the team

'I don't criticise as much when we have lost because that can have the opposite effect on disappointed players

Obviously you mention mistakes but not as much

It was a match day that had started ordinarily enough with Ossie, as usual rising at 9am for breakfast and a read of the morning papers.

Following a look at the Swindon youth team it's down to the real business of the day and the build-up for the big game which starts at 1.45 with the player's team

But come kick-off time. Ossie believes it's all down to the team he had nicked

'My influence stops completely at three o'clock because there is nothing I can do

Of course I can shot from the bench but the players may only react to my mood rather than what I am saying

Ossie approaches each match in a positive frame of mind

"I analyse the opposition before a game so I have a pretty good idea of how they play. However, I don't talk much about the opposition to my team.

I pick the best available team and ask them to play their best." Having said all that, Ossie was still an animated figure on the bench against Stoke - despite the ease of the win

"It was important that we didn't let Stoke score a goal or else they could get a lift.

"At half-time, I warned the lads about getting complacent and told them to continue playing as they had been '

Although in an apparently unbeatable position. Ossie was just as animated as he had been in the first-half and even engaged in visual banter with Swindon's supporters.

'Ossie, Ossie what's the score?' was replied by the appropriate fingers raised anto the air by the former Spurs player

Reflecting on the differences in his new role as manager. Ossie told MATCH "It is a completely different kind of pressure from when I was a player.

"As a player you play for 90 minutes but you forget the pressure. As a manager the pressure is always with you and the tension does not go away until after the game."

Ossie took over from the successful Lou Macari at the County Ground during the close season to take up his first managerial

"My philosophy is simple: control the ball, pass, move and exploit space."

It's a philosophy that certainly proved very successful on a cold November afternoon but for Mick Mills it was the game which cost him his job



**OUR HISTORIAN** LOOKS BACK AT SOME **PREVIOUS MEETINGS** BETWEEN SWINDON TOWN AND TONIGHT'S OPPONENTS

Swindon Town and Southampton have been drawn to face each other in this competition on just one previous occasion - and few of the 9,453 present at the County Ground for the Second Leg of that meeting. three years ago, will ever forget it!

Southampton were fortunate in having England goalkeeper Peter Shilton in outstanding form on the night. The woodwork also came to the Saints' rescue as, quite incredibly, the game ended 0-0.

# NIGHT OF FRUSTRATION

Town Manager at the time, Lou Macari. later said "rarely can a team have dominated any match to the extent that we did and have nothing to show for their effort." A penalty miss by Chris Kamara put the seal on a night of frustration for Swindon.

weeks earlier had begun disastrously for the Town, when keeper Kenny Allen damaged an ankle in the very first minute. George Lawrence wasted little time in taking advantage of this, firing Southampton into an eightminute lead. He scored a second three minutes before the break. but the real killer blow came when the Saints scored again within two minutes. This time it was a Lawrence cross that Joe Jordan netted, for his first goal for seventeen months.

From 0-3, it would need a monumental effort to recover. But, to their credit, Swindon set about the task wth great determination. Perhaps Shilton's save from Jimmy Gilligan twenty minutes from the end was an ominous sign for the Town.

# VISITING THE CROFT

Southampton's visit to the County Ground for that Second Lea was the first for 22 years. Prior to that, there had been eleven encounters in the Football League and twice that number in the Southern League - where both Clubs had continuous membership from its formation in 1894 through to 1920. Southampton St Mary's - hence the 'Saints' - was one of the few Clubs to visit Swindon's Croft Ground in Devizes Road for a League fixture. The visitors won on that occasion, 3-2, and went on to record ten successive victories against the Town, two of which came in the F.A.

Swindon were the 'poor relations' of the Southern League in those days and were frequently swept aside by the greater power of Clubs like Southampton. Defeats of 7-1 and 8-2 - with two of the three goals coming from opponents—endorsed this.

### 6-0 AWAY WIN

Ironically, the Town's biggest The First Leg at The Dell two victory was recorded at The

Dell. It came on January 23 1909. Swindon led 2-0 at half time, through Harold Fleming and Frank Heppinstall, and then a hat-trick from Archie Brown and a goal by George Rushton gave the Town a remarkable 6-0 win.

Swindon's Football League record at Southampton has been somewhat less impressive, with eight losses out of eleven and just a single victory. In October 1957, Andy Micklewright and Bob Edwards (twice) gave the Town a 3-0 lead within 24 minutes. The Saints only reply was through a Jim McGowan penalty eight minutes from the end. The result was good enough to put Swindon top of the table, albeit for just one week. A League 'double' was completed on April 7 with a 44th minute goal by winger Arnold Darcy.

# LAST RITES AT THE DELL

Two of the Town's last three League visits to The Dell have resulted in 5-1 reverses. Derek Reeves hit four in October 1959 and Martin Chivers three in April 1964, on the final day of the season. Exactly twelve months later. Swindon found themselves having to travel to the south coast again on the final day, this time requiring a point to save them from relegation.

Disaster struck as early as the second minute, when Cliff Huxford - brother of former Town player Colin - put Southampton ahead. Dennis Brown equalised on the half-hour, but Terry Paine got the deciding goal twenty minutes from time. Portsmouth, level on points with Swindon at the start of the day, were away at Northampton but somehow managed to get the League to agree to an evening kick-off. Knowing that they only needed a draw to save themselves, it was no surprise when they got it.



# SECOND DIVISION CLUB AT WEMBLEY





# PAUL PLOWMAN LOOKS BACK AT THE CAREER OF A PLAYER WHO SERVED BOTH SWINDON TOWN AND TONIGHT'S OPPONENTS

Eight years ago, when injury forced Paul Gilchrist out of football, a friend from Burmah Oil came up with the idea of making the facilities of a gym easily accessible to anyone. It was an idea that appealed to Paul and the Town Fitness Centre eventually acquired a good reputation and came to be used by a number of companies. Having been in professional football for thirteen years he had the right credentials to succeed too.

# FROM THE VALLEY TO THE DELL

Born at Dartford, Paul began his career at Charlton, where he was an apprentice. He spent four years at The Valley, but only made five full Second Division appearances. Maurice Setters took him to Doncaster in 1971 and eight goals in 22 games suddenly aroused interest from Southampton. Paul moved to The Dell for £30,000 in March 1972. From being unable to get into Charlton's Division Two side, within months he was in the First!

Unfortunately, the Saints were relegated in 1974, but the best had yet to come for Paul. After a sixgame run in the F.A. Cup in 1976, Southampton met Crystal Palace in the semi-final at Stamford Bridge and Paul hit a superb 25-yard goal to give his side the lead fifteen minutes from the end. David Peach also to come to the County Ground later - struck home a penalty to take them to Wembley. And it all ended well, as Bobby Stokes' goal took the trophy back to The Dell. Paul made the most of the day that few get to enjoy. "I loved every minute of it", he said, "it was everything you would imagine it to be".

# DOWN TO EARTH

But Paul was soon brought down to earth as Lawrie McMenemy rapidly searched for the right blend to gain promotion. A home defeat by Carlisle on the opening day of 1976/77 didn't help the cause and Paul's only other appearance was at his old Club Charlton a month later. Southampton went down 6-2.

In March 1977 Paul moved along the south coast to Porstmouth, but he struggled to become accepted by the fans at Fratton Park. "They don't take kindly to Southampton players!" he said. He didn't waste too much time in deciding to come to Swindon in the following year.

Although Bob Smith was at the helm at the County Ground by then, it was former Manager Danny Williams who influenced the move. But Bob had his own ideas and, within a month of Paul's arrival, he signed Andy Rowland from Bury.

### IMPRESSIVE

Paul's scoring record at Swindon was impressive. He found the net in each of his first three full appearances and had scored six in ten games when a home defeat by Plymouth, in January 1979, gave the boss the opportunity to change the side. But, during a run of six wins in seven games – the odd one being a

the assistance of Kevin Morris. But he accepted thefact that he was unlikely to make a return to League football and decided to 'hang up his

After more than seven years at his Fitness Centre, Paul sold up a few weeks ago and is enjoying a break. "It's not something that you want to do forever", he said. "It was very time consuming spending six days a week there". Now, at 38, Paul is keeping his options open for the future and in the new year plans to move from his Aldbourne home back to familiary territory in North Kent.

In March 1980, Paul got the chance of a fresh start at Hereford. But in a pre-season friendly with Wolves in August, he suffered a serious injury when a knee collapsed sideways. He came back to Swindon for a long period of rehabilitation, with

Goalkeepers - Former England Under-21 International Tim Flowers, (22), is no stranger to the County Ground. Tim has spent two loan spells with the Town. Tim joined the Saints' from Wolverhampton Wanderers in the summer of 1986 for £70,000. Ever-present this season in the Southampton line-up.

Terry Paine made 805 full appearances in League and Cup matches for South-ampton and 4 as a substitute between 1956 and 1974!

Defenders - Early in the season a full back pairing of Jason Dodd, (18), and Francis Benali, (20), seemed highly unlikely Jason made his debut in a 4-1 win at Queens Park Rangers on October 14th and Francis took over the number three shirt in the previous match against York City in the Littlewoods Cup. Second Round, Second Leg match at the Dell. Both players have come up through the Youth ranks at the Dell Jason displaced Ray Wallace, (19), who is the third of the Wallace brothers to have played for the Saints' Ray is an England Under-21 cap. Francis took over from former Gillingham and Coventry City utility player Micky Adams, (27), who was signed from Leeds United in March 1989 for £250,000 Micky appeared in the first eight matches of this season. Veteran Gerry Forrest, (32), joined the 'Saints' from Rotherham United in December 1985 for £90,000. Gerry has made one appearance this season. Andy Cook, (19), has found his appearances limited to five League matches mainly due to injury problems. Neil Ruddock, (21), who was signed from Millwall for a £250,000 fee last February, and former England International Russell Osman, (30), have formed the central defensive roles for most of this season. Russell joined the 'Saints' from Leicester City for £325,000 in the summer of 1988, the fee being decided by a Football League tribunal. Kevin Moore, (31), joined Southampton from Oldham Athletic two years ago for £125,000 Previously with Grimsby Town, Kevin has made four first team appearances this campaign Mark Blake, (21), is a product of the Club's youth policy. With eighteen League appearances to his credit he has yet to appear in a 'Saints' line-up at senior level this season.

Last season the 'Saints' reached the quarter finals of this competition after victories against Lincoln City (4-2 on aggregate), Scarborough (1-0, at the Dell in a replay after a 2-2 draw) and Tottenham Botspur (2-1 at the Dell). The 'Saints' were then defeated by the then holders Luton Town 2-1 after extra time in a replay following a 1-1 draw at the Dell.

Midfield - Jimmy Case, (35), won many of the games honours with his home town Club Liverpool. The tough tackling midfield player joined the 'Saints' from Brighton and Hove Albion in March 1985 for a bargain £35,000! Jim has played in the 'Saints' line-up all of this season Glenn Cockerill, (29), was Manager Chris Nicholls' first ever signing when he moved to the South Coast in a £225,000 transfer deal from Sheffield United in October 1985 Glenn. who played for the Town, had two spells with Lincoln City. Scorer of spectacular goals Former England Under-21 International Graham Baker, (31), re-joined the Saints' on a free transfer from Manchester City. He originally ioined the Maine Road Club in a £225,000 deal Approaching two hundred appearances for the Club. Former Portsmouth midfield player Barry Horne, (26), became the 'Saints' Club record signing last April when he moved along the South Coast from Portsmouth in a £700,000 transfer deal. Barry, a Welsh International, has yet to make an impact at the Dell. Previously with Wrexham Neil Maddison, (19), a Youth team product, scored on his debut at Wimbledon last season. He repeated the act in his next match versus Nottingham Forest at the Dell'

The biggest victories in this competition for the 'Saints' have been 5-0 versus Derby County in Round Three of the 1974-75 season. They repeated this scoreline against Wrexham in Round Two in the 1979-80 season.

Strikers - Rodney Wallace, (21), is the twin of Raymond Last season's leading goalscorer with 15 League and Cup goals and the 'Saints' only ever-present player. Younger brother of Manchester United winger Danny Rodney has twice hit a 'brace' of goals this season, in away matches at Aston Villa and Norwich City. Alan Shearer, (19), made a spectacular first team debut when he scored a hat-trick against Arsenal at the Dell the season before last. A Youth team prospect who scored twice against York City in the Second Round of this competition on October 3rd. Paul Rideout, (25), is no stranger to Swindon Town fans. Paul a former England Under-21 International joined the Saints' from Italian Club Ban in the summer of 1988 for £430,000. The former Town apprentice joined Aston Villa in 1983 for a then Town record sale fee of £250,000. Paul scored twice for the 'Saints' in that amazing 4-4 draw at Norwich City on September 9th Mathew Le Tissier, (21), hails from Guernsey Regarded as an enigma, he can be devastating when in form. Skilful and exciting, he netted twice against Chelsea in the 2-2 draw at Stamford Bridge on November 18th. Previously scored twice before this season when he netted both of the 'Saints' goals in the 2-2 draw with Wimbledon on September 30th

Southampton reached the Final of this competition in 1978-79 when they lost 3-2 to Nottingham Forest. The Saints' biggest defeat in this comptition was in Round Two in the 1980-81 season when they lost 7-1 to Watford at Vicarage Road.

That single defeat occurred in the North East Club's first home match of the season, following their opening day win here at the County Ground. They lost 4-2 to Ipswich Town on August 27th.




After gaining the upper hand in the early stages by being first to the ball and giving a lot of thought when we were in possession, we were in the ascendency.


