

OUR HISTORIAN LOOKS BACK AT SOME PREVIOUS MEETINGS BETWEEN SWINDON TOWN AND TODAY'S OPPONENTS

Today will be the 43rd meeting between Swindon Town and Port Vale, of which all except one have been in the search for League points.

Vale made their first League trip to the County Ground a few months before the outbreak of War in 1939. Having, with the exception of three seasons, spent all their career prior to this in the Second Division, they now had to switch from the Third North to the Third South. The game ended in a 1-1 draw, with the Town goal coming from Stan Wilcockson.

BEFORE VALE PARK

In those days, Port Vale entertained at the Recreation Ground in Hanley. Swindon played there on five occasions and could only manage to score twice in those 450 minutes. The second, scored by Bobby Peart on the Town's last visit in April 1950, was a winner.

Vale Park proved to be a less favourable venue for Swindon as, during the next 35 years, they collected just four draws from 14 visits. The only Town player ever to score more than once at Vale Park is Maurice Owen. His two goals in nine minutes brought Swindon back from 0-2 down in November 1951.

The best individual scoring feat went to Vale's Harry Oscroft, who hit four goals in his side's 6-1 victory at the end of 1959/60. After a three goal blast in the space of five minutes, Swindon were 0-4 behind after only half an hour. Oscroft had already claimed a hat-trick and to make matters worse, Town defender Peter Chamberlain also had the misfortune to put the ball past keeper Sam Burton.

Some twenty-five years after that match had taken place, it was named by soccer writer Simon Inglis as 'Soccer in the Dock' as one in which certain players had contrived to 'fix' the result. Jimmy Gauld, the Swindon player who was later imprisoned after being found guilty of partaking in such events, had scored the Town's only goal three minutes from time.

BOBBY'S SWITCH

In October 1960 it was Swindon's turn to deliver a six-goal salvo. Teenage wing-half Bobby Woodruff was switched to the centre-forward berth and responded quite magnificently. He opened the scoring after only seven minutes, added another in 24 and completed his hat-trick with twenty minutes to spare.

Two seventeen year-olds,

Ernie Hunt and Mike Summerbee, also got in on the goalscoring act – as did Dave Corbett, the 'old man' at just twenty!

But the Vale Park hoodoo struck again in the following February when the Town suffered a 4-1 defeat. Former England youth Bert Llewellyn gave Port Vale the lead in the first minute of the game and although Swindon equalised just after half-time through Cliff Jackson they quickly conceded two more goals to Llewellyn and never again looked likely to recover.

Even in the Town's promotion season of 1962/63, our visitors from the Potteries recorded two League wins, both by the odd goal. RECORD

BOOV

The Town's Port Vale 'famine' finally came to an end in October 1986. Chris Kamara and Steve White put them into a commanding 2-0 lead with barely ten minutes gone. Robbie Earle replied in the 21st, but Mark Jones – whose loan move from Oxford had just been made permanent – scored a crucial third five minutes before half-time.

KEEPING UP WITH THE JONES'S

The home side's Jones, Andy, put Vale back in the game on the hour – his 12th goal of the season – and then a header from Dave Bamber flew into the top of Fraser Digby's net to put the scores level at 3-3.

But within two minutes Jimmy Gilligan came to the rescue, to edge the Town back in front and see them safely home to take all three points. Swindon went on to record their only League 'double' over Port Vale when full-back Chris Ramsey hit a 25th-minute decider at the County Ground in the following March.



We all came off the pitch at Fratton Park last Saturday disappointed in that we had not taken all three points.

After Alan McLoughlin had put us level, with about 25 minutes to go, we had two or three good chances to wrap it all up.

If we had, it would have really put pressure on the two Clubs above us, Leeds United and Sheffield United.

Despite an early goal from Chris Kamara, Leeds only drew 2-2 with West Bromwich Albion and Sheffield United managed only one point from their home game with Newcastle United.

So a win at Pompey would have pulled us back another two points.

Even so, our point at Portsmouth meant we did not lose any ground – and that's almost as important.

As the gaffer said afterwards, there were other pluses.

One was that we played some of the best football we've produced over the past few games.

Another was that we were all disappointed after picking up an away point.

As Ossie pointed out, it showed that we were not happy with second best, which has to be a good sign for a side with their sights set on promotion.

Of course, we have to accept that there will be times when we play well, but don't get what we deserve.

Our performance at Portsmouth was a lot better, I felt, that the one against West Ham United the previous weekend.

The main thing about that game was that my worst fears about our old mate Jim Quinn proved well founded.

In the programme notes I said we would have to keep a special eye on him, because he was dangerous from anything up to 30 yards.

So when he banged in his first goal from about 25 yards, I almost wished I hadn't said anything.

Actually, he didn't seem to get a clean strike on the ball. But the shot was so well placed, just inside the post.

Even so, Fraser felt he should have got it. He seemed to get down behind the ball, but it bobbled up over his arm.

Quinny's second goal was one I felt we should have prevented.

He took the final header brilliantly, but I don't think he could have directed it that well if he had been under any kind of challenge.

The trouble was that he hadn't been picked up after taking a throw-in to Julian Dicks, who crossed it to the far side of the area.

Quinny had meanwhile run on to the pitch and was in the space between David Kerslake and Jon Cittens when Dicks's cross was headed back across our penalty area.

So he was virtually un-marked as he headed it in from the far post.

It's goals like that which we've got to prevent before we can class ourselves as a good side.

Mind you, there may not be many who will actually remember too much about the game against West Ham United.

Most of the talk afterwards centred around the resignation of our former boss Lou Macari as Manager of the Hammers.

To be quite honest, I was not surprised by his decision. The battering he has been taking from the media has been incredible.

I can't remember anybody taking such a bashing before. Even the train robbers never hit the headlines as much.

So, his decision to quite West Ham certainly did not surprise me.

I will be surprised, however, if e doesn't bounce back.

Once he has sorted out a few things, I'm sure we shall see him return to where he belongs ... to a job in football.

Today we welcome back another of our former players... one of my old defensive mates Tim Parkin.

Tim has been on the bench mainly for Port Vale since joining them at the start of December, but I'm sure it won't be long before he gets into their side and stakes his claim.

I hope, by the way, he doesn't come on and score two goals!



about Ossie and coaching badges and Ron Atkinson was very well informed. Has Big Ron bought a season ticket at the County Ground? It sounded as if he had.





There have not been too many goalscorers in post-War League football who have averaged a goal every other game. To maintain that average over some thirteen seasons is a magnificent achievement. Ralph Hunt was one such goalscorer. The 1961/62 season was spent by Ralph at two homes – Swindon and Port

SLOW START IN THE SOUTH

Portsmouth born, Ralph Arthur Robert Hunt signed for his home-town Club on his 17th birthday, in August 1950. But it was not until December 1952 that he made his League debut, at Middlesbrough, in the First Division. Ralph made just four more League appearances for the Fratton Club before moving along the south coast to Dean Court in February 1954. With no goals for Pompey and only seven in 33 League games for Bournemouth, there was as yet little sign of the scoring prowess that would soon become evident.

In July 1955, Ralph joined Norwich City and was an 'overnight' success, blasting 33 League and Cup goals. Only Torquay's Sam Collins finished with more goals in the Third South and had it not been for a leady defence, the Canaries would have challenged the leaders instead of ending in seventh place, one point behind the Devonshire Club.

Ralph netted another 21 goals in 1956/ 57 but again the goals against proved to be the downfall of the East Anglian side. They were forced to make an application for re-election having taken the 'wooden spoon'. Only City's partners in distress at the bottom had conceded more than their 94 goals – Swindon Town!

RE-ELECTION RIVALS

But even a struggling Town had exposed the Cararies' defensive frailties, at Carrow Road in November, when they had raced into a 3-0 lead inside the first half hour. Ralph Hunt pulled back two goals but Swindon still recorded a 4-2 victory.

Ralph spent one more season with Norwich before signing for Second Division Derby County for £4,200 shortly could hardly have started better. In the annual Reds v Blues public practice game he found the net inside 30 seconds!

His first eight competitive outings yielded only three goals, the first coming at Coventry in the opening away fixture. It came in the 43rd minute, not in itself a remarkable statistic.

Ralph then scored in six successive Town games, including a League Cup victory over First Division Birmingham City. But of the seven goals netted in that period no less than five had come in the five minutes before or after the break!

Ne netted another quick goal – after 55 seconds – in a pleasing 4-1 derby win over Reading but was soon on the move again, on December 8, to Port Vale for \$3.500

before 1958/59 got under way. But a year later he was back in the Third, with Grimsby Town. With the Mariners, Ralph knocked in 33 goals in only 39 League games in 1969/60 and, with strike partner Ron Rafferty, accounted for 57 of the Club's 87 goals, Grimsby finished fifth.

Ralph's next move was to Wiltshire, on June 23 1961. The Cleethorpes Club took Welsh Under-23 winger Freddy Jones in a player-exchange deal.

His arrival at the County Ground brought confusion in some quarters as the Town side now fielded 'R. Hunt' at both inside forward positions Fortunately for the fans, the other Mr. Hunt, Roger by name, preferred to be known as Emie.

NET PRACTICE

However, prior to his departure, Ralph popped in his last two goals for the Town against Bradford Park Avenue. And, yes, they both came within five minutes of the interval – in the 43rd and 49th minutes!

On his home debut at Vale Park, against Shrewsbury, Ralph struck a whirlwind hat trick – in just 16 minutes. But he found the net only three times more before joining Newport County in the summer of 1962. He was top scorer for the Fourth Division side with 27 League goals.

A further move took him to Chesterfield in 1964. Just before Christmas, he went with three other players to watch Third Round Cup opponents Peterborough. On the return journey, the car in which they travelled was involved in a collision at Grantham. Ralph Hunt died from injuries he received. He was 33

JOEN RUDGE (Manager). Originally joined the Club as Coach in February 1980 and took over the Managers role in December 1983. Took the Club to promotion from Division Four in 1986 and into Division Two, via the play-offs in 1989. As a player he appeared for Huddersflow, Carlisle, Bristol Rovers, Torquay and Bournemouth.

MARK GREW (Goalkeeper). Bom Bilston Joined Vale on free transfer from Inswich Town in June 1986 and, despite missing virtually the whole of his first season through injury, has given excellent service ever since, topping 100 appearances. Began his career at West Bromwich Albison where he made an F.A. Cup semifinal appearance in 1982 and has also played for Leicester City, Notts County, Wican, Oldham and Fulham, the last four on loan.

NEIL ASPIN (Defender). Born Gateshead. Close season capture from Leeds United for the sum of £200,000, equalling the Club record. Can play either at full-back or in the centre of the defence. Had completed over 250 senior appearances for the Yorkshiremen, his only previous Club, after making his debut in 1982 two months short of his 17th birthday.

TIM PARKIN (Defender). Born Pennith Joined Vale last December from Swindon Town for a fee of £60,000. A formidable force in helping Swindon into last season's Division Two playoffs. The previous year was voted Swindon Town's Player of the Year. Began as an apprentice at Blackburn Rovers, but has also seen service with Malmo and Bristol Rovers.

DEAN GLOVER (Defender). Born Birmingham Became the Club's record signing for £200,000 from Middlesbrough in February 1988, beating the previous record five-fold. He sparked off a ten game unbeaten run upon his arrival and steadied the ship for the final run-in to promotion, Aston Villa was his first Club and he has been successful in the play-offs in each of the last two seasons.

DARREN HUGHES (Defender). Born Prescott. Speedy left-back who won an F.A. Youth Cup winners medal with his first Club. Everton, in 1984 before moving to Shrewsbury. A further move to Brighton followed and it was from there that he joined the Vale for £10,000 in September 1967 after a spell on loan. Has been a regular choice ever since and scored his first Vale goal against Brighton on the day of his permanent transfer.

RAY WALKER (Midfield). Born North Shields. Classy midfielder who cost £12,000 from Aston Villa in July 1986 after an earlier loan spell at Vale Park during the 1984/86 season. Chosen in the F.A. Cup Third Division team for the past two seasons is also the Club Captain.

ANDY PORTER (Midfield). Born Holmes Chapel. Turned profession in July 1987 after two years on the Y.T.S. scheme and began to hold down a regular place towards the end of last season.

ROBBIE EARLE (Midfield). Born Newcastleunder-Lyme. The Club's longest serving player, having made his debut in 1982 as a 17 year old. An enthusiastic midfield player who was the country's leading goalscorer in that position last season with 19 goals, including the one that clinched promotion in the play-offs against Bristol Rovers. Has now made over 250 senior appearances in a variety of roles including centre-forward and full-back.

SIMON MILLS (Defender/Midfield). Born Sheffield. Former England Youth International who began his career at Sheffield Wednesday, then moved to York where he topped 120 appearances Joined Vale for £35,000 in December 1987 originally as a midfield player and scored 5 goals in 19 appearances that season. Last season he spent the majority of the time at right-back.

GARY FORD (Midfield). Born York Made over 400 appearances for York City before joining Leicester City from where he moved to Vale Park for \$40,000 in December 1987

IAN MILLER (Midfield). Born Perth. Experienced winger with over 500 senior appearances
behind him. Signed on a free transfer during
the last close season from Blackburn Rovers
where he had spent 8 seasons, winning a Pull
Members Cup medal in 1987. Began his career
with Bury and has also played for Nortingham
Forest, Doncaster Rovers and of course, Swindon
Trawn.

KEVIN FINNEY (Midfield). Born Newcastleunder-Lyme Highly rated youngster who turned professional in July 1987, making his League debut soon afterwards Normally occupies a central midfield role but broke into the first team toward the end of last season as an emergency striker

JOHN JEFFERS (Midfield). Born Liverpool Had a loan spell at the Vale midway during last season and then made the move permanent from Liverpool for £30,000 just before the transfer deadline. A tricky left winger on his day. He joined the Vale for first team football and played his part during last season's triumph in the playoffs.

DAVID RILEY (Forward). Born Nottingham Began his career at Nottingham Forest and after loan spells at both Dartington and Peterborough, joined the Vale for £20,000 in October 1987. Finished that season as joint leading goalscorer with 10 goals, but played the majority of the season on the left.

DARREN BECKFORD (Forward). Born Manchester. Last season's leading goalscorer with 23 goals including three hat-tricks in only his second full season of regular League football loined Vale in July 1987 from Manchester City for £15,000 as a result of a Buy-A-Player fund after a spell on loan at the end of the previous season. Has also had a loan spell at Bury.

NICKY CROSS (Forward). Born Birmingham. Signed July 1989 from Leicester City for £125,000 for whom he scored ten goals last season. Began his career with West Bromwich Albion and then joined Walsall but has considerable Second Division experience.

PAUL MILLAR (Forward). Born Belfast Won the Northern Ireland Young Player of the Year award in 1986 whilst with Glentoran, the same year that he scored a last minute winner in the Irish Cup Final. After playing in Europe he moved to Portadown and joined the Vale in December 1986 for £20.000, Injury restricted him to one reserve appearances last season.


PLAN OF HOME PARK

After three excellent victories we suffered a heavy defeat against near rivals Oxford.






As in previous games these basic mistakes are spoiling good performances when in possession and hitting players confidence. Could look to improve our ideas when in the attacking area.


