BRADFORD CITY NEXT

We complete a hectic schedule of home fixtures this coming Saturday when we entertain Bradford City at Portman Road (kick-off 3pm).

The Yorkshire club are currently facing a battle against relegation, but they did beat us 1-0 at Valley Parade with a goal from Tony Adcock.

The defeat at Bradford was the last we suffered until New Year's Day as we

set off on an unbeaten 13-match run.

Recently Bradford dispensed of the services of manager Terry Yorath who is also the manager of the Welsh national team. Poor results cost Yorath his job, and at the time of writing a successor has not been named.

One of the last moves Yorath made in charge of Bradford was to sign our striker Neil Woods for a fee which will have to be decided by an FA Tribunal.

Woods made a good start with his new club, scoring the goal which beat bottom-of-the-table Stoke City a fortnight ago.

Obviously Neil, making a quick return to Portman Road, will be keen to try and make a big impression.

SECOND DIVISION ATTENDANCE BOOM

The success of both Oldham Athletic and Middlesbrough in reaching Wembley finals - the Littlewoods Cup and Zenith Data Systems Cup respectively - has again focussed attention on the Second Division.

Currently showing a 17 per cent increase on last season, projections based on this figure indicate that around 6.8 million people will have watched Second Division matches by the end of the season - a total not bettered since the turn of the 1970s.

A survey up to and including the first Saturday of this month shows that half the Second Division clubs have

averaged 10,000.

Leeds United lead the way with an average league gate of almost 27,000 followed by Newcastle United, West Ham, Sunderland, Sheffield United, Middlesbrough and Wolves.

Ipswich are in eighth place with an average 14,018 - an increase of 10.8 per cent. The best gate at Portman Road was for the Boxing Day clash with West Ham which attracted 25,326.






AND FINALLY...



THE MANAGER . . . OSSIE ARDILES



Ossie Ardiles has so far proved an instant hit as far as management is concerned. Just before the start of this season the former Argentine World Cup winner took over as boss at the County Ground in succession to Lou Macari.

Now, in his first season in management, Ossie is poised to lead Swindon into the First Division for the first time in the club's history.

Under Macari, the Robins played the long ball game, but Ardiles changed that by playing the ball through midfield and it is a stlye which is called 'Samba soccer' by the Swindon supporters.

Ossie first came up to this country's attention when playing a prominent part in the 1978 World Cup finals before being signed by Tottenham. He stayed at White Hart Lane for ten years before moving across London to QPR.

He also had a short spell on loan at Blackburn Rovers in his final season and therefore met the demands of the Second Division in a practical sense.

Ardiles' number two at Swindon is Chic Bates, the former Shrewsbury Town manager who also served under Macari.

SITORS Sumon

SWINDON TOWN have certainly set the Second Division on fire this season, and if they keep up their current run there should be First Division football at the County Ground next season.

Former manager Lou Macari sowed the seeds by taking Swindon from the Fourth Division to the Second, and now Ossie Ardiles has carried on where he left off, but with a different style.

Too often in recent months Swindon have been in the headlines for the wrong reasons. A betting scandal rocked the club which led to chairman Brian Hillier being suspended by the FA (although an appeal is pending) and now the Inland Revenue has moved in to investigate illegal payments to players.

Despite all this controversy Swindon have continued to shine on the pitch, and they are certainly an exciting team to watch under Ardiles.

The little Argentinian has been fortunate that he has been able to field an unchanged team for such a long time. He was forced to make his first change in 22 matches ten days ago, but it made no difference with Swindon scoring a comprehensive 3-0 victory at Plymouth.

It was back on November 29 for the Littlewoods Cup tie against Southampton that Ardiles put out his strongest side and they stayed together for 15 league and six cup matches until a knee injury forced midfielder Steve Foley to drop out of the side.

Since Ardiles took over as manager, he has made just three signings, but only one of them David Kerslake – has been a permanent fixture in the side.

Swindon owe much of their current success to the number of goals they have scored and they are the highest scorers in the whole of the Football League.

Leading the way are Duncan Shearer and Steve White, who had netted 23 and 21 goals respectively before last Saturday. While Shearer has proved his worth as the club's record signing. White has proved to be one of the best free transfer signings in the history of the club.

He started his career with Bristol Rovers before joining Luton for £200,000 in December, 1979. After three seasons at Kenilworth Road in which he helped Luton win the Second Division Championship, he moved to Charlton for £150,000.

He then had a couple of loan spells at Lincoln and Luton before rejoining Bristol Rovers. Back in July, 1986 Swindon snapped him up on a free transfer and since his move he has never failed to reach double figures in the goal-scoring charts.

Pushing the two strikers hard in terms of goals is midfielder Alan McLoughlin, a former Manchester United apprentice, who already has 16 to his name. Originally a full-back, he has been converted to midfield with a great deal of success.

It is in midfield where Swindon were forced to make their first change with Steve Foley dropping out through injury to be replaced by Fitzroy Simpson. The irony of that change is that it was Foley, who missed the start of the season through an ankle injury, took over from the injured Simpson who has now regained

his place.

Foley, a former Liverpool apprentice, was signed from Sheffield United for £35,000 two-and-a-half years ago, and played a big part last season in helping Swindon to a promotion play-off place.

Simpson, who has emerged through the ranks, made his debut last season and appears to

have a bright future.

Disenchanted with the long ball game under Macari, Tom Jones went on the transfer list which he withdrew on Ardiles' appointment. Discarded as a youngster by Chelsea, he had spells with non-league Farnborough, Weymouth and Terras before attracting the attention of Aberdeen who signed him for £35,000 in 1987.

After just over a year in Scotland, Tom returned south and joined Swindon. Missed the start of the season following a cartilage operation in the summer.

Ross MacLaren joined Swindon from Derby County in July, 1988 for a £150,000 fee, set by an FA Tribunal. Started his English career with Shrewsbury Town after being given a free transfer by Glasgow Rangers.

He had five years at Gay Meadow before moving to Derby for £67,500 and made a number of appearances in their Second Division Championship triumph.

Right-back David Kerslake cost Swindon £110,000 from QPR just after the start of this season and has established himself in the side, while on the other side of the defence is Paul Bodin who has been with the club for two years.

Welsh-born, he started his career with Newport County before moving to Cardiff. But after three seasons he drifted into non-league football with Bath City after being given a free transfer by Cardiff.

He returned to Newport, but this time for £15,000, but after a short stay joined Swindon where he has been a consistent performer.

The Robins club captain is central defender Colin Calderwood, regarded as one of the strongest in the Second Division. Signed from Mansfield Town in June, 1985 for £27,500 with the added stipulation that in the event of the player being transferred to another club for a fee in excess of the one paid for him, Mansfield will recieve 50 per cent of any excess.

Alongside Calderwood is **Jon Gittens**, who cost a £40,000 fee when he was signed from Southampton in 1987. Hails from Birmingham and was signed by the Saints from Paget Rovers in the Midland Combination. His appearances were limited last season due to suspension.

Swindon certainly have a hot property in goal in the shape of former England Under-21 international Fraser Digby. Has already attracted the attentions of many leading First Division clubs and was Swindon's only ever-present player last season.

Began his career at Manchester United, where he served his apprenticeship, and joined Swindon after an initial loan period in December, 1986. The patient understudy to Digby is Nicky Hammond, a former Arsenal trainee, who was given a free transfer by the London club at the end of the 1986-87 season.

Ardiles' other two signings have been Tony Galvin, the former Tottenham and Republic of Ireland international winger, who came from Sheffield Wednesday on a free transfer, and Shaun Close who cost a £70,000 fee from Bournemouth.

Close is another former Tottenham striker who was originally sold to Bournemouth for £90,000 but never really established himself.

A name which will be familiar to Ipswich supporters is **David Geddis** who was signed from Shrewsbury in October, 1988, but rejected a close season move to Fourth Division Grimsby Town after the clubs had agreed a £40,000 fee.

Geddis will be remembered for the goal he set up for Roger Osborne when Ipswich won the FA Cup in 1978.

Defender Dave Hockaday has given the club sterling service since joining from Blackpool on a free transfer in 1983 and Tim Parkin, who made over 200 league appearances with former club Bristol Rovers, has topped the century mark for Swindon.

THE club record fee that former manager Lou Macari paid out for striker Duncan Shearer in June, 1988 has certainly paid handsome dividends.

Signed from Huddersfield Town, Duncan was the club's leading scorer last season with 14 goals and has already passed that mark this term. Before last Saturday he had scored 23 goals which have gone a long way to putting the club into a promotion-challenging position.

Scottish-born, he entered Football League soccer with Chelsea who had signed him from Inverness Clachnacuddin. After three seasons at Stamford Bridge where he found his first team appearances were limited, he moved to Huddersfield for a nominal fee.

Duncan's goalscoring talents with Huddersfield where he netted 47 goals in 91 games attracted the attentions of Swin-

don who decided that he was worth the club record fee they paid out for him.

He has formed a prolific partnership with Steve White, and between them they have already scored over 40 goals so far this season. Shearer has certainly proved one of the top strikers in the country this season.



STEVE PALMER left Cambridge University in the summer with an electronics degree in his back pocket and a desire to make the grade as a professional footballer.

The 21-year-old midfield man has been a regular reserve team member for most of the season, but has also made six senior outings, one as a substitute.

The former Cambridge University football skipper was spotted by Town's assistant to the manager Charlie Woods when playing against Town Reserves at Fenners.



STARS OF THE DAST

In October 1972 Ipswich Town manager Bobby Robson caused concern amongst the supporters when he traded leading scorer Rod Belfitt for a 21-year-old unknown named David Johnson.

Such a big issue was this striker for striker transfer at the time that the Evening Star sent reporters out onto the streets to question passers-by as to their views.

The majority, who felt that it was a mistake, were soon to change their minds as Belfitt failed to make an impact at Everton and Johnson shot to prominence at Portman Road.

During a four year Town career of 182 appearances and 46 goals the speedy Johnson became a leading light in the early Robson era ventures into Europe.

Nicknamed 'Jonty' and setting up an Ipswich men's boutique of that name, the Liverpool-born attacker was soon

knocking on the door for international honours.

Nine England Under-23 caps came his way before he broke into the senior England international side and he gained three full caps while in the colours of Town before moving back to Merseyside in a £200,000 deal.

Liverpool were the buyers for £200,000 late in the pre-season of 1974 and not long after David was replaced by another striker who went on to gain England honours with Town in the shape of Paul Mariner.

These days a businessman up on Merseyside, Johnson formed a dangerous front-running partnership with Trevor Whymark and once played in an England team along with Ipswich team-mates Kevin Beattie and Colin Viljoen.

Always a popular figure with the Town fans Johnson recalls: "When I first came to Ipswich I thought that it was the other end of the world, but after a while the place really grew on me and there were some wonderfully exciting times at the club."


He continued: "Bobby Robson had got together such a good squad of young players and we all seemed to blend in together so well. The team spirit was high and the atmosphere at the club so friendly. I will always have fond memories of Ipswich."

Making his debut against Leeds United on November 4 1972, Johnson said farewell to the club after the clash with Derby on April 24 1976.

During those early days with Everton first team chances were limited, but on leaving Liverpool he went back to Goodison Park for a second crack where he was a regular up front for close on a season.

Then came a spell at Preston North End and his last professional matches were in Malta.

RITA first met Glenn on a blind date arranged by friends.

"My best friend had started working in a bank. She met someone there and his best friend was Glenn" explains Rita. "She invited me out to meet her new boyfriend."

Glenn was there too and though Rita reckons it wasn't love at first sight, the story had a happy ending! But not just for Rita and Glenn — their friends got married, too!

When they met, nine years ago, Glenn was becoming a professional with Southend and getting into the first team at Roots Hall.

Rita wasn't at all interested in football when they met. "Once we started going out together, I went to watch him play once or twice but not on a regular basis," she says.

By her own admission, Rita's not a sporting person. And, with two young children to look after, she doesn't have much time for hobbies though she does enjoy flower arranging with dried flowers.

The couple have been married for seven years and have two boys — Adam, who is four, and Joseph, seven months. Adam is getting quite interested in football. He likes kicking a ball around with Glenn — and already recognises his dad's picture when he sees it in football reports in the papers.

Before she had the children, Rita worked as a foreign exchange assistant for a commodity firm, handling their dollar account, working her way up from starting as a junior in the accounts department

Does she miss her work now she's a full-time mum? "Yes a bit, I did enjoy it. I'd like to go back to work when the children are older, but not necessarily to the same job. I don't think you could run a family and do a demanding job like that.

"I'd like to run my own business, but I'm not sure what sort".

"What are the problems of being married to a footballer? "You never see 'them! They're never there when you want them — like when you're having babies! Glenn was away when Joseph was born, but he was there in time for Adam's birth.

"I have got used to it. It's just

at times like Christmas and when you're having a baby — you can never rely on them. It's a burden, then, but it's something you have to live with.

"You have to go on holiday in the summer — you can't have a winter holiday. Other people go skiing, but we just wouldn't be able to"

As Glenn has played for Southend, Crystal Palace and now Town, Rita who comes from Benfleet, near Southend, has never had to move away from her home area.

And, with Glenn able to commute every day, they have no plans to move to Ipswich.

"I would be upset if I had to move away — I'm very happy where I am," says Rita. "We have had three houses — but this one I'm settled in.

"Ipswich is further than Crystal Palace, but it's an easier journey."



WOMENS FOOTBALL

Julie Lay, a sportswriter on the Evening Gazette at Colchester, takes a look at the Women's game.

NOT so long ago, football just wasn't considered a woman's sport. Few women went to matches - watching, and certainly playing, was left to the men.

But that's certainly not the case now. More and more women are going to matches - and an increasing number

are playing the game, too.

I went along to one of the Ipswich Town Women's Football Club's weekly training sessions and found that not only are the women turning up in numbers but the skill level is pretty high, too.

The club has a membership of between 45-50, including two England internationals, Lynda Curl and Jackie Slack.

Ages range from 11 to 30-plus, with players travelling from as far afield as Harlow, Bury St Edmunds and Norwich.

Training sessions, which are held from 8-9pm on Tuesday's evenings on the Alderman Road all-weather surface, begin with a run and fitness work. Then the women work on soccer skills and put them into practice in short matches.

The club runs three teams, with the first team playing in the Home Counties League - meeting Reigate, Chelsea, Oxford, Hemel Hempstead and Reading — and the Reserves and third teams playing in the East Anglian League.

The club was formed in 1985 out of the ashes of the Lowestoft Ladies club which had included three or four players from Ipswich, who decided the time was right to form a club in the town.

In their first season, the club reached the East Anglian League Cup Final and the following season, won the League

and Cup double without losing a game.

1987-88 saw the first team move up into the Chiltern League in search of a higher standard of opposition and they reached that league's cup final where they gave the league champions Town and Country their first defeat of the season, winning 6-3 after trailing 2-0.

And last season, with Town and Country having moved on, Ipswich raced to the league title without losing a game. They suffered a shock Cup Final defeat at the hands of Stevenage, but gained their revenge in the First Division final winning 9-2, while the Reserves won the East Anglian League Cup.

This season, the first team reached the quarter-finals of the Women's FA Cup beating Manchester United along the way - before going down 2-1 to Preston.

Other European countries have national leagues, and in some places, the sport is professional. Women's football in this country is lagging behind.

But it is taking steps to catch up. Next season all leagues currently in existence will be disbanded and replaced by nine regional leagues.

And at the beginning of the following season, the top teams in those leagues will form northern and southern 'super' leagues.

The sport is now getting TV coverage. Last season's Women's FA Cup final was shown on Channel 4, who will also be screening four specials next month on this season's competition - including highlights of lpswich's game against Preston and an England International.

But for the sport to be a really big success in this country, Ipswich secretary Angela Locke believes it must become part of the sports curriculum in schools on a par with netball

or hockey.

"We've got barriers to break down if we are to get further ahead. In other countries, such as Italy and Scandanavia, it's played in schools and not considered anything out of the ordinary," she said.

"It would follow that if girls in this country were introduced to football while at school, more would seek to

play football outside of school.

I believe that, given the opportunity, football would be just as popular as netball and hockey - it is, after all our

national game.

Many of the Ipswich women players take a great interest in Town's Second Division fortunes and would like to be affiliated to the club in the same way that Football League teams such as Arsenal, Aston Villa, Manchester City, Millwall and Sunderland have women's teams attached to them.

There are now some 250 clubs in the country. Ipswich aim to be one of the top sides - to one day be part of a National

League and to win the Women's FA Cup.

The club are keen to get youngsters involved and as part of their development would like to run an under 16 team. They run a development programme which includes organised coaching and tournaments for schoolgirls.


This Saturday they are running a free coaching session for girls aged 11-plus at Copleston High School from 10am to

12 noon.

Last season, the club ran a successful tournament for 14-16 year old girls. This year's event will be staged at Copleston on May 9 from 4-6pm, while the club will be running their first tournament for 11-13 year olds on May 16.

The club always welcomes new players of any age and ability. Anyone interested should contact Angela Locke on lpswich 463073.





GEDDIS WILL GO DOWN IN IPSWICH HISTORY

DAVID GEDDIS, now 31 and in the Swindon Town squad will go down in history as the man who made the Ipswich Town FA Cup Final winning goal against Arsenal at Wembley in 1978.

Playing wide on the right up front the blond-haired Geddis made for the by-line and crossed a ball that Willie Young could only stab forward into the path of Roger Osborne who smashed home the 77th minute winner.

Despite his Wembley final leading role, the career of Geddis at Ipswich was not a long one and after making 56 appearences, 26 as substitute, he was transferred to Aston Villa in the summer of 1979 for £300,000.

A native of Carlisle, Geddis won double FA medals while at Portman Road as three years before the Wembley truimph over Arsenal he was in the Town youth side that defeated West Ham over two legs to win the FA Youth Cup.

Other members of that side which played the second leg in front of a 16,000 crowd at Portman Road were Russell Osman, John Wark and Keith Bertschin.

An England youth international cap came his way that season and not long after the 1978 FA Cup Final success Geddis gained an England B honour.

Geddis was signed by former Swindon boss Lou Macari last season from Shrewsbury.

He is one of three players from Carlisle to make the grade at Portman Road, Robin Turner and Steve McCall being the others spotted by Northern scout John Carruthers who is based in the Cumbrian capital.


Strenuous efforts are being made to provide modern facilities for the safety and comfort of all football spectators.

STRIKER SERGEI LOVES IPSWICH

THE move which made Sergei Baltacha the first Russian to play in the Football League has proved a big success, apart from on the field.

The 31-year-old from Ukraine has been a wonderful Ambassador for his country and Ipswich fans have taken to him. The chanting of his name when he played in the second half of the home game with Oxford greatly pleased the mild mannered defender.

Injuries and difficulties in adjusting to the British way of playing have seen Sergei's first team appearances limited since he arrived in a blaze of publicity in January last year.

Sergei would love to stay with Ipswich after his contract runs out this summer. He likes the club, the football and the area. If he is released he fancies playing in Sweden or Norway.

With 10-year-old Sergei junior banging in goals for Whitton Youths it is hardly surprising that Sergei senior began life as a striker.

Speaking English now with increased confidence and command, he says, "When I was 14 I was the highest scoring forward for my age group in the Ukraine. But the next year I was called up to a special training camp, where I spent four years, and was switched to a sweeper.

"The coach thought I could read the game so well and with good vision I would be better employed at the back."

Much hard work and dedication enabled him to become a national hero and he gained 48 Russian caps. "I have scored many goals coming from the back unmarked in my career," adds the man who entertained an international colleague earlier this

Sergei Gotsmanov was staying in Ipswich overnight with Brighton and visited Sergei's house for a re-union.

"I have played with him many times for Russia and we were both in the team for the last European Championships in West Germany," says Ipswich's Sergei. "He has an interpreter with him in Brighton and is hoping his wife and two young boys will come over soon."

Sergei is well settled in Ipswich with his charming wife Olga, son Sergei and daughter Elena, who at six years old is making a name for herself in

Suffolk short tennis circles.

"There are many differences in the way the game is played in England," adds Sergei. "The English are the best headers in the game and I have had to improve that side of my game. The game is not so dirty here, although there is more contact and the referees let much more go. There is no kicking from behind or spitting.

"There is a bigger gap in skill from the English First Division to the Third. In Russia the standard is very similar. The sweeper system is not often played in England but I would naturally like to play for Ipswich

there.
"It is lovely to have had the chance to play in England, and for myself and family to sample the English way of life. And it is very pleasing that the fans are calling my name.





Duncan recalls his days at Spurs with Ardiles

In fact, former Spurs striker Duncan was the scorer of the first goal made together by Ardiles and his fellow Argentinian Ricky Villa soon after their historic move from South America back in 1978.



Duncan was to leave Spurs and join Derby County and not long after Ardiles and Villa both

went on to achieve FA Cup Final glory with the Londoners.

After leaving Spurs Ardiles played for St. Etienne, Queens Park Rangers and Blackburn before taking over at Swindon from Lou Macari in the summer.

At the County Ground he linked up with former Shrewsbury manager and Swindon striker Chic Bates, and the pair have had considerable success this season.

On route to taking over at Portman Road and while Ardiles was continuing his playing career in England, Duncan embarked on a

career in the lower divisions as manager at Scunthorpe, Hartlepool and Chesterfield before taking over at Portman Road.

Recalling his Tottenham days in the same side as Duncan, former midfield man Ardiles says: "John was a very good striker who had a great goalscoring knack."

This will be Ardiles second visit to Portman Road this season when he sets foot in the ground tonight.

For earlier he played for the Swindon Reserves team in a 3-0 defeat.

His Swindon seniors had beaten Town 3-0 at the County Ground back in October.
