

Swindon, who qualified for the promotion play-offs last season, have been making an exciting bid to make absolutely sure of First Division football this year. They are aiming for one of the two guaranteed promotion places.

A recent run of three successive victories took them into second place but Sheffield United, who had games in hand, later ousted them.

Swindon have a magnificent away record with wins at Hull (3-2), Brighton (2-1), Middlesbrough (2-0), West Bronwich Albion (2-1), Watford (2-0), Barnsley (1-0) and Plymouth (3-0) and draws at Oldham (2-2), West Ham (1-1), Bradford City (1-1), Sunderland (2-2) and Portsmouth (1-1).

They were beaten at Sheffield United (0-2), Leeds (0-4), Leicester (1-2), Port Vale (0-2) and Wolves (1-2).

Swindon also won at Shrewsbury (3-0) in the Littlewoods Cup, later winning the second leg 3-1 at the County Ground. They were then involved in a marathon fourmatch tie with Bolton in round three. They drew 3-3 at home then twice drew 1-1 at Burnden Park before finally coming out on top with a 2-1 win on their own ground.

First Division Southampton were their next opponents. After drawing 0-0 at home, Swindon went out 2-4 in the replay at Southampton.

They took a swift exit from the F.A. Cup, losing 1-2 at Bristol City in round three.

In the Zenith Data Systems Cup, Swindon scored home wins over First Division sides Millwall (2-1) and Norwich (4-1) before losing 0-1 at Crystal Palace in the Southern semi-final.

Ossie Ardiles was originally appointed player-manager last summer but, after playing as substitute in their opening two games, he felt he would have a better chance concentrating solely upon the managerial side of the job.

Mr Ardiles, the Argentinian international who spent ten outstanding seasons with Spurs, succeeded Lou Macari, who had lifted the Club from the Fourth Division to the brink of Division One.

Last season Swindon qualified for the promotion playoffs. Sadly, their bid for First Division glory ended in the semi-final of the play-offs when they were beaten 1-2 on aggregate by Crystal Palace.

Swindon are currently enjoying the most successful era of their history. Until 1986 they were a Fourth Division side but now they are within reach of Division One.

During their earlier years, Swindon enjoyed most of their success in Cup football. They appeared in two F.A. Cup semi-finals whilst they were still in the Southern League prior to the First World War.

In 1920 they were among the Southern League clubs taken over by the Football League to form the Third Division (South) and they remained permanently in that section for the entirety of its lifetime.

In 1958, when the old Southern and Northern sections were abandoned in favour of national Third and Fourth Divisions, Swindon became a founder member of Division Three.

They won promotion for the first time in 1963 but that spell of Second Division football lasted only two years.

It was while Swindon were back in Division Three that they created a sensation by defeating Arsenal at Wembley in the 1969 League Cup Final.

That fine Swindon team also won promotion that year and they remained a Second Division club until 1974. After that they seemed to stagnate in Third Division football until, in 1982, they dropped into Division Four for the first time.

Swindon's revival began under Mr Macari. He led the Club to the Championship of Division Four in 1986 with an all-time record of 102 points.

Twelve months later they qualified to the Third Division play-offs and won the series to secure a return to Division Two.

Last season they were in the Second Division play-offs.

Today's Visitors . . .

THE SWINDON SQUAD

FRASER DIGBY (Goalkeeper).

Fraser played for the England youth side during his apprenticeship days with Manchester United. He did not play in United's First Team but made his debut soon after moving to Swindon in 1986. Fraser won his fifth England Under-21 cap against Poland in October.

DAVID KERSLAKE (Defender).

David was signed from Queens Park Rangers for £110,000 in November. He joined Rangers as a schoolboy and developed through the junior teams to make his League debut in 1985. With only some half-a-dozen League matches behind him, David played for the England Under-21s against Turkey in October of that same year.



COLIN CALDERWOOD (Midfield/Defender).

Versatile Colin has played in several positions. He started as a defender in his Mansfield days but, since his transfer to Swindon in 1985, he has often filled a midfield role.

JON GITTENS (Defender).

Jon was given his break in top-class football by Southampton who spotted him playing for Paget Rangers. He made his First Division debut for The Saints in 1986. Swindon signed him for £40,000 in 1987.

PAUL BODIN (Midfielder/Defender).

Paul didn't initially make the League teams with his first two clubs, Chelsea and Newport, but got his chance in 1982 after linking with Cardiff. He spent three seasons at Ninian Park, then went non-League with Bath City. He returned to Newport in 1987 but, after a few weeks, he was transferred to Swindon.

DAVID HOCKADAY (Defender/Midfield).

David emerged as a League footballer with Blackpool in 1977. He played more than 150 senior games for The Tangerines before transferring to Swindon in 1983. He celebrated his 200th League game for Swindon last season.

ALAN McLOUGHLIN (Midfield).

Alan was an apprentice with Manchester United but it was after he had moved on to Swindon in 1986 that he made his debut in League football. He also spent a loan period with Torquay before earning himself a regular place in the Swindon side. Alan has scored 16 goals this season.

ROSS MacLAREN (Midfield).

Ross was a reserve player with Glasgow Rangers but he established himself in League soccer after joining Shrewsbury in 1980. Derby signed him for £67,500 in 1985 and Swindon paid £150,000 for him three years later.



TOM IONES (Midfield).

Tom joined Swindon from Aberdeen last season. He was previously in non-League soccer with Weymouth, moving to Aberdeen in 1987.

FITZROY SIMPSON (Midfield).

Fitzroy joined Swindon as a trainee and he got his chance in their League team last season.

JOHN CORNWELL (Midfield).

John developed in the junior sides at Leyton Orient, graduating to First Team duty in 1982. He made well over 200 senior appearances for The O's before joining Newcastle for £50,000 in 1987. Swindon signed him last season.

STEVE FOLEY (Midfield).

Steve completed his apprenticeship with Liverpool but did not play in their First Team. He made his League debut whilst on loan to Fulham during 1983/84 and was transferred to Grimsby at the end of that campaign. Sheffield United signed him in 1985 and he moved on to Swindon in the summer of 1987.



DUNCAN SHEARER

(Forward).

Duncan is Swindon's leading scorer with 23 goals. He was signed from Huddersfield for £250,000 in 1988 and last season he was Swindon's leading scorer with 16 goals. He began his career with Chelsea, where First Team

opportunities were rare, but after transferring to Huddersfield in 1986 he quickly established himself as a goalscorer, leading the club's list in his two seasons with 25 and 16.

STEVE WHITE (Forward).

Steve, who has scored 21 times this season, made his name as a goalscorer with Bristol Rovers and Luton paid £175,000 for him in 1979. He moved on to Charlton three years later but returned to Bristol Rovers in 1983. Since joining Swindon in 1986, Steve's annual goals tally has been 21, 14 and 14.

SHAUN CLOSE (Forward).

Shaun was signed from Bournemouth in September. He opened his professional career with Tottenham but found First Team opportunities rare at White Hart Lane. Bournemouth signed him two seasons ago and it was at Dean Court that he established himself in League soccer.

Meet the Manager: OSSIE ARDILES

Ossie Ardiles is currently experiencing his first taste of soccer management, following an apprenticeship period as coach at Queens Park Rangers last season. In the summer he succeeded Lou Macari as Manager of Swindon Town.

English fans will always remember him as the player who brought a new dimension to English football following

his transfer to Tottenham in 1978. Ossie had just helped Argentina to win the World Cup final and Spurs' manager Keith Burkinshaw pulled off a real coup when he persuaded him, and his colleague Ricky Villa, to sign for Spurs.

Ossie's ten-year spell with Spurs was broken only by a brief loan spell with Paris St Germain in 1982.

He was instrumental in helping Spurs to win the F.A. Cup in 1981 and the UEFA Cup three years later. His magical ball skills, and precision passing, became hallmarks of his game.

20 FACTS YOU MAY NOT KNOW ABOUT SWINDON

1 Swindon's most-capped footballer was Rod Thomas who collected 30 of his 50 Wales' caps as a Swindon player.

2 The last Swindon player to score a hat-trick was Jimmy Quinn who hit threes against both Bristol City and Portsmouth in the Littlewoods Cup two seasons ago.

3 The last Swindon man to get three in a League game was Steve White who scored all the goals in a 3-0 win over Mansfield in April 1987.

4 Harry Morris scored five goals in a League game on two occasions for Swindon, against Q.P.R. in 1927 and Norwich in 1930.

5 Keith East equalled that club record when he scored five times against Mansfield in 1965.

6 Harry Morris also holds the club record for most goals in a season. He netted 47 in the League and one in the F.A. Cup in 1926/27.

7 A third club scoring record belonging to Morris is the aggregate of 230 in League and Cup between 1926 and 1933.

Solution Cup between 1920 and 1933.

Solution Trollope created a League record by appearing in 756 League games for Swindon. No other player has made as many appearances for one club.

9 Trollope was also the oldest player to appear in the Swindon First Team, being 37 years and 119 days old when he made his final appearance in 1980.
10 Paul Rideout was Swindon's youngest player. He was 16 years and 107 days of age when he made his debut 1980.

11 Swindon were one of only two Third Division clubs to win the League Cup (now the Littlewoods Cup). They defeated Arsenal 3-1 in the 1969 final. 12 Swindon's biggest League win was by 9-1 against Luton in the Third Division (South) in 1921.

13 Their Club record win was by 10-1 against Farnham United in the F.A. Cup in 1925

14 Swindon have only on one occasion conceded 10 goals in a game, when losing 1-10 to Manchester City in the F.A. Cup in 1930.

15 That club record was equalled when they went down 0-9 to Torquay in a Third Division (South) game in 1952.

16 Swindon were elected to the League in 1920 when they became a founder member of the Third Division (South).

17 Their best achievement in League soccer was in finishing fifth in Division Two in 1970.

18 Swindon achieved an all-time League record when they collected 102 points in the Fourth Division in 1985/86.

19 The record attendance at The County Ground was 32,000 for an F.A. Cup tie against Arsenal in 1972.

20 Their best crowd last season was 18,677 for the visit of West Ham in the fourth round of the F.A. Cup. And who will ever forget those delightful radio interviews with Ossie bubbling away in his fractured English at such speed that ensured no one could ever understand a word he was saying!

Towards the end of his decade at White Hart Lane, Ossie spent a loan period with Blackburn Rovers.

In 1988 he was transferred to Q.P.R. where he played occasionally but where he was considered of greater value passing on his extensive knowledge to the young players. That experience prepared him for the time when he would become a Manager in his own right.

That happened in the summer when Swindon invited him to join them.

He was officially appointed Player-Manager but, has decided to concentrate purely upon the managerial side of his job. He quickly realised that he needed to change Swindon's style and he could best do this by taking a long look at this team from the sidelines.

In recent years, Swindon had been renowned for their long-ball game but Mr Ardiles, a purist in his playing days, has quitely changed their style of play.

FOOTBALL IN THE COMMUNITY



Football is more than a game of 90 minutes. Every day clubs throughout Britain are extending their activities far beyond the pitch and into the lives of their local communities.

Social clubs and transport for the elderly, the provision of creches, projects to counter racism and sexism, artificial pitches for local use, the coaching of junior sides and the encouragement of women's football are only a few of the community based initiatives undertaken by clubs.

Much of this work has received help from The Football Trust. Each year the organisation receives over £9.5 million from the Spotting-the-Ball competition run by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zetters and spends it on projects that benefit all levels of the game throughout the United Kingdom.

BROTHERS COMPETE FOR INTERNATIONAL PLACE!

It's probably a sign of the levelling up process that has been going on in the English game, that international squads are no longer selected almost exclusively from the First Division.

Many international squads these days are packed with Second Division players. Indeed, several of the players on international duty next week have been selected from Third and Fourth Division clubs.

Swindon's Alan McLoughlin, whom we hope to see in action at The Manor this afternoon, has been picked for the Republic of Ireland "B" team to meet England in Cork next Tuesday.

Oldham's great Cup exploits have made them very much the flavour of the month and two of their players, Denis Irwin and Mick Milligan, are in the same Irish "B" squad.

Bournemouth's Gerry Peyton is in the full Irish squad to play Wales a day later. Gerry, who has kept goal for his country on 26 occasions, seems certain to be included in the Republic squad for the World Cup Finals in Italy this summer.

In what is probably a unique international selection, Ireland Manager Jack Charlton has chosen two brothers to compete for the goalkeeping position in the Irish "B" team!

Gary and Alan Kelly are the sons of that great Irish goalkeeper Allan Kelly who played for Ireland on 47 occasions. Both sons followed in his footsteps, Gary commencing his League career with Newcastle in 1987. He was transferred to Bury for £60,000 last season.

Alan was blooded in Preston's senior side in 1986. Earlier this season the brothers played against each other in League football for the first time. Now they find themselves competing for an international place.

Steve Bull, from Second Division Wolves, is in the England squad preparing for next week's friendly against Brazil at Wembley whilst Leeds's David Batty is in the England "B" party.

Fourth Division Scarborough are providing Martin Russell to the Republic of Ireland "B" squad. A one-time Manchester United junior, Russell commanded a Scarborough record fee of £105,000 when he joined them from Leicester last season.

Cambridge's Liam Daish is another Fourth Division player in the same squad.

Second Division Blackburn provide two players for the full Ireland side though both Kevin Moran and Frank Stapleton have, of course, had many years of First Division experience behind them.

Bernie Slaven's greatest ambition was to play for his native Scotland. But, having been Middlesbrough's leading scorer for the past three seasons – without even a hint of interest from Andy Roxburgh – he has abandoned that dream. He has now opted to play for Ireland. He is in the Republic's senior side for the Wales game and he is expected to win his first cap at the expense of John Aldridge.

Other Second Division players involved in international action next week are Ken de Mange (Hull City) and David Kelly (West Ham) who are both in the Irish "B" party.

Mr. Charlton has also selected two First Division reserve players for that side. Though Pat Scully has yet to play in Arsenal's First Division side, he has already achieved one full international cap and he has played twice for the Under 21s. Now he is destined to add "B" international honours to his qualifications.

Though it is quite rare for a Second Division player to be considered for the full England team, players from this Division regularly appear in the two Irish teams and for Wales.

It is a tribute to the standard of play achieved in this section that so many players are considered worthy of the game's highest honours.

A look around at what's happening in the Second Division

DOUBLE BLOW TO SWINDON HOPES

Swindon's promotion hopes have received a double blow during the past week with defeats by Hull City and Ipswich. The Robins had risen to second place in the table with an exciting run of seven games without defeat, of which the last three had been won

Last Saturday Swindon were at the receiving end of one of the shock results of the day as they lost 1-3 at home to lowly Hull City. On Tuesday they went down 0-1 at Ipswich, Jason Dozzell scoring the vital goal 20 minutes from time.

With Leeds and Sheffield United both returning to winning form, Swindon's chances of landing one of the two guaranteed promotion places have dimmed considerably though, of course, they look reasonably assured of a place in the play-offs.

Leeds had been showing signs of jitters but the turning point for them came here at The Manor Ground earlier this month. The Peacocks came here without a win in four League games and that sequence looked likely to be extended when they trailed 0-2 at the interval. But two second-half goals from Lee Chapman, added to singles from Imre Varadi and Chris Fairclough, gave them a 4-2 win.

Chapman, signed from Nottingham Forest in December, grabbed two more goals in last Saturday's 3-2 home win over West Ham but it was defender Mel Sterland who scored the vital goal in Leeds' 1-0 victory at Sunderland on Tuesday.

With three wins in a row, Leeds re-established themselves at the top of the table with a seven point lead over Sheffield United.

But Sheffield United, who were due to play at West Ham on Wednesday, had three games in hand. The Blades have been looking very confident of late and went into that game at Upton Park with an unbeaten run of eight League games behind them.

Watford's decision to sack Manager Steve Harrison came as a complete surprise. Mr Harrison and coach Tom Walley left just a few hours before The Hornets ran up a 4-2 win over Brighton on Tuesday, Coach Colin Lee, the former Tottenham and Chelsea player, has been appointed Caretaker-Manager until the end of the season.

Gary Penrice, who had not scored this year, netted two early goals to put The Hornets on the road to victory. Glyn Hodges and Rod Thomas got the other Watford goals.

Paul Moulden made the journey up to Oldham as a member of the Bournemouth squad on Tuesday but, before the day was out, he found himself an Oldham player! The move enables him to return to his Lancashire home area.

Last season Moulden was Manchester City's top scorer with 17 goals as they won promotion from the Second Division. He moved to Bournemouth last summer for £300,000 and had scored 13 times for The Cherries.

Bournemouth were no match for Oldham on their plastic pitch. Roger Palmer scored twice with Mick Milligan and Neil Redfearn getting their other goals.

Oldham Manager Joe Royle and his chairman have chartered a special aeroplane to fly them to Cork for next Tuesday's "B" international between the Republic of Ireland and England.

Full-back Denis Irwin and midfielder Mick Milligan have both been picked for the Irish team and Mr Royle has arranged to fly them home immediately after the game as Oldham have a top-of-thetable clash with Sheffield United the following day.

"We never even considered withdrawing the players from the game," said Mr Royle, "It would be quite wrong to deny players the chance to enhance their careers by playing in an international match."

Middlesbrough's new Manager Colin Todd, a former Oxford player, enjoyed his first win on Tuesday as the Borough ran up a 2-1 success at Plymouth. Ian Baird set up the victory with his first goal since joining the club from Leeds for £500,000 in January. Mark Brennan got another before David Byrne replied for Argyle.

Victory ended a run of seven games without a win for Middlesbrough.

Stoke City's chances of Second Division survival seem to be fading away. Four of their last five games have ended in goalless draws – including their Tuesday match at Hull – but they really need to win a few games if they are to lift themselves out of bottom place. The Potters have won only once in their last 12 League attempts.







CLUB HISTORY




Continuing his look at Oxford United's records, co-author of Oxford United - A Complete Record, Andy Howland, takes a look at the career of our popular former Manager Jim Smith.

JIM SMITH

Jim's achievements at The Manor broke national records which were achieved as a result of Oxford playing football which was of a remarkably attacking style.

Born in Sheffield, Jim played for Aldershot, Halifax Town and Lincoln City before becoming Boston's Player/Manager in November, 1969. After three successful season's in one of the top two non-League competitions, Smith joined Colchester (October 1972) leading them to promotion in his first full season. The following season Colchester looked for a long time to be reaching Division Two for the first time in their history but fell away. Their Cup form was outstanding as they reached the League Cup Quarter Finals without conceding a goal before losing 2-1 to eventual winners Aston Villa.

In June 1975, Smith took over Blackburn Rovers, remaining at Ewood Park until March 1978, when Rovers stood fifth in Division Two. His success got him a First Division job, taking over from Sir Alf Ramsey at Birmingham City. The Blues were eighteenth but Jim transformed them and they lost just one of their remaining twelve matches to end in the top half. The following season, with Trevor Francis only playing nine games, Birmingham were relegated, only to return immediately in 1980. Playing attractive football and fielding Frank Worthington, Colin Todd, Archie Gemmill and former United favourite Dave Langan, The Blues



reached the League Cup Quarter Finals and despite taking just one point from their last five matches, ended thirteenth.

The following February with City in nineteenth place, Smith was sacked to be replaced by Ron Saunders who had just shocked the football world by resigning from League Champions Aston Villa.

On March 1st, 1982, Smith took over at The Manor (fifth in Division Three) and in his first three weeks, with Keith Cassells and Mark Wright leaving and Peter Foley injured, United dropped ten points. However, the inspired signing of Trevor Hebberd as well as those of Ray Train and George Lawrence saw United gain 22 points from ten matches and on the edge of Division Two.

In the event, Oxford's last five matches yielded just one point and they missed promotion by seven points. The following season Oxford were again fifth but Smith's later signings of McDonald and Hinshelwood led to the fabulous championship and Cup runs of 1983-4. Jim became the first Third Division Manager for five years to be named Bell's Manager of the Month and Oxford became only the second Third Division club ever to reach the Fifth Rounds of both FA and League Cups. Oxford's 91 goals were the second highest in Division Three since 1967.

Jim further strengthened the side for the following season by signing John Trewick and two of United's greatest, Billy Hamilton and David Langan (as were John Aldridge and Les Phillips who joined at the end of 1983-4). The spell from August 1984 until Hamilton's injury in January 1985, was unbelievable. United's away form was very good but at home they won 13 successive matches scoring a staggering 49 goals and conceding just 14. The championship was won in attacking style, United's goal difference of 48 being the best of the Leagues' 92 clubs. Remarkably the 62 home League goals is the highest by any Division One or Two club since the mid 1960's. Only two Division Two Champions scored more goals in the 1962-1988 period. Only two other clubs had even achieved promotion (not the Championship) from Division Three to One in successive seasons since a Third Division was formed in 1920. Jim and the players had worked near miracles.

The very popular Smith left The Manor in June 1985, and led his new club, QPR, to the 1986 Milk Cup Final. This, of course, was one of Oxford United's famous days with us winning 3-0. Naturally he must have been disappointed to lose but at least he knew that he had managed all but one of Oxford's twelve players the season before. Following two seasons in the lower half of Division One, Rangers (fifth in 1987-8) were London's top club after they had been in the top three right into mid December.

During the following season, Smith took over at one of England's biggest clubs, Newcastle United, but could not save The Magpies from relegation. However, the lively Smith's team is now challenging strongly for an immediate return to Division One.

Jim obviously goes down as a legend at The Manor.

We hope that our "Oxford United – A Complete Record" will bring back many memories. The 400 page hardback includes a 128 page club history, pen pictures of every Manager and of each player who has made a League appearance, 30 match reports, every score, scorer and line-up (1949-89), a history of the ground, most scores and scorers (1893-1949), plus a large records section. It is available from the Club Shop.

PROGRAMME PROFILE

For today's game against Swindon Town I thought I would give both sets of supporters the opportunity to indulge in a little nostalgia by looking back at the programmes issued for the Football League Cup Finals of 1969 and 1986 when Swindon and Oxford each caused something of a sensation by winning a major trophy at Wembley.

> Arsenal v Swindon Town -Saturday, 15th March, 1969

Having previously been staged on a two-legged home and away basis, 1968/69 was only the third season in which the League Cup Final was played at Wembley Stadium. As with the two previous finals the programme was issued by the Football League and incorporated a special edition of their official weekly journal, the "Football League Review", which was regularly inserted into club programmes in those days. Whilst this sometimes provided good reading it also inspired an air of complacency amongst programme editors who often relied upon the League Review rather than their own efforts for the bulk of their material. Indeed, the 1969 League Cup Final programme falls into this trap, containing only sixteen pages itself and relying heavily on the twenty-four page Review inserted in the centre.

Costing two shillings (10p), twice that charged for the previous year's final, at a time when most League issues were about one shilling, it was printed on a small 5¼"×8¼" page size and sports a simple but attractive red and green cover, incorporating an aerial view of Wembley Stadium, a photo of

the League Cup trophy, and the match details.

The programme itself is fairly unexceptional with adverts taking up four of the sixteen pages and the remainder comprising basic features such as an introduction to the competing clubs; colour team photos of Arsenal and Swindon; pen pictures of the players and referee. There is also a page of League Cup facts and figures, including a list of previous finals; "how the finalists reached Wembley; the usual Wembley "Timetable of Events"; and a welcome to the royal guest for the match HRH Princess Margaret. The team line-ups appear on page nine.

As might be expected the Football League Review is largely devoted to previewing the Final and, therefore, becomes a natural extension to the official programme. In a variety of articles it looks behind the scenes at both Arsenal and Swindon, and also discusses the increasing popularity of the League Cup competition itself which, during its early years had been frequently ignored by some of the bigger clubs. With the Final now being played at Wembley, and the prize of European Football in the following season's Inter Cities Fairs Cup awaiting the winners (providing they were members of the First Division), the League Cup was developing into a thriving tournament with every club except Manchester United entering in 1968/69.

Turning to wider footballing issues the League Review examines the perennial problems of postponed matches and the misbehaviour of both players and supporters. Leading on from the former there are no fewer than three articles about football pitches. In the first there is an excellent inquiry into both artificial pitches (a full twelve years before the first one was installed at a League ground) and undersoil heating. The second examines the increasing cost of hiring park pitches and the effect this is having on the game at its lowest levels; whilst the famous Wembley turf was at that time in its worst ever condition. Interestingly, although many people blamed this on the fact that the Stadium had recently staged the "Horse of the Year Show" the groundsman was convinced that the drainage system was at fault and needed replacing. Eventually, this was indeed done and nowadays, of course, the grass is again back to its best. Swindon played the game of their lives that day as goals by Roger Smart and Don Rogers (2), against one by Bobby Gould gave them a fully deserved 3-1 extra time victory over an Arsenal team containing names like Wilson, Storey, McNab, McLintock, Radford, Armstrong and Graham, who two years later were to form the nucleus of the side which won the League Championship and FA Cup double. 1969, however, was the year

of Swindon's own 'double' since, besides their Wembley triumph they also won promotion from Division Three. Town fans will recall with pride the heroic efforts that day of their team which read:- Downsborough, Thomas, Trollope, Butler, Burrows, Harland, Heath, Smart, Smith, Noble, man of the match Rogers and substitute Penman, as they produced one of the greatest upsets Wembley has ever seen.

The programme from the remarkable match is not that difficult to obtain today and can normally be found on dealers'

lists for only about £1.50.

During the 1970s and early 1980s the size of League Cup Final programmes gradually increased, the Football League was discontinued, and in 1986 when Oxford United made their Wembley debut, the first brochure style programme (measuring an unwieldy 81/8"×111/4") was produced by the Stadium authorities.

Priced at £1 it represented a rise of 20p on the 1985 Final at a time when most League issues cost about 50p or 60p - a similar ratio to 1969 prices.

The cover, however, is fairly uninspiring being predominantly white with some hazy artist's drawings of unrelated football action and the match details displayed in large blue and black letters.

Once inside, although the presentation is very attractive with full glossy colour throughout, it is disappointing to note that adverts account for about half of its twenty four pages.

The reading material, whilst well constructed, comprises the usual range and layout of articles found in most 1980's Wembley programmes, mainly by professional writers such as Colin Benson, Albert Sewell and Jack Rollin. The usual "Timetable of Events" is on page three and is followed by a piece about the Lord's Taverners who played a six-a-side charity game before the main match. Colin Benson then previews the Final itself before the emphasis switches to the two competing clubs with the histories of both Oxford and QPR; an article on the two Managers – United's Maurice Evans and former boss Jim Smith, then in charge of Rangers; pen pictures of the players plus additional one page spotlights on Oxford's John Aldridge and QPR's Michael Robinson; team photographs; lists of various club records and statistics taken from the Rothman's Yearbook; a further page of facts and figures for each club; and details of how United and Rangers reached the Final.

Further statistics are provided by a list of the previous League Cup Final results and a chart showing all the 1985/86 matches in the competition from the Second Round onwards.

As 1986 was the last year in which the competition would be sponsored by the National Dairy Council there is an article featuring some of the tournament highlights since 1982 when it first became known as the "Milk Cup". This is followed by a piece on the Dairy Council's support for other sports.

Finally, the team line-ups appear in the centre pages and, of course, the QPR side, containing players such as Alan McDonald, Wayne Fereday, Terry Fenwick, Robbie James, Gary Bannister and John Byrne, started as clear favourites. However, goals by Hebberd, Houghton and Charles without reply gave those United supporters who over the years had seen their Cup hopes end prematurely against the likes of Bedford Town, Chelmsford City, Kettering Town, Nuneaton Borough and Barking, the kind of afternoon they would never have expected in their wildest dreams. 3-0 is still the largest winning margin in a League Cup Final and Oxford fans will need no reminding that the players who that day put the club's name in the record books was:- Judge, Langan, Trewick, Phillips, Briggs, Shotton, Houghton, Aldridge, Charles, Hebberd and Brock with Thomas as substitute.

The programme, whilst an important souvenir of an unforgettable occasion for Oxford supporters, is still a fairly common item obtainable from most dealers for little more than the original £1 cover price.

Was it really that long ago . . . ?

5 YEARS AGO:

Two minutes from time Peter Rhoades-Brown scored a valuable winning goal in our Second Division fixture at home to Grimsby. We won 1-0 and extended our unbeaten run to five games. On the same day, Manchester City, the Second Division leaders, drew 2-2 at home to bottom club Cardiff, so we were now just two points behind them with three games in hand.

Swindon, then in the Fourth Division, lost 2-6 at Scunthorpe. Leigh Barnard and Peter Coyne (pen) scored their goals.

10 YEARS AGO:

Two second half goals condemned us to a 0-2 defeat in our Third Division game at Reading. Richie Bowman (pen) and Jerry Williams were the scorers. It was our second defeat on the trot.

Swindon, also in the Second Division, lost 1-2 at Chesterfield.

15 YEARS AGO:

John Shuker, our penalty taker, converted one that gave us a 2-1 victory over Bolton at The Manor Ground. More importantly, it ended a sequence of six Second Division games without a win. Derek Clarke had opened the scoring.

Swindon drew 0-0 in a Third Division game at Peterborough.

20 YEARS AGO:

Leicester inflicted only our third home defeat of the season. We lost 0-1. The other losses were both in August – 17 games ago.

Swindon improved their chances of winning promotion to the First Division with a 1-0 home win over Watford. John Trollope scored.

25 YEARS AGO:

John Fahy scored a hat-trick as we beat Fourth Division promotion rivals Bradford Park Avenue 3-0 at The Manor Ground. The victory lifted us to fifth in the table, only one place and two points behind Blackpool. Four would go up.

Swindon drew 1-1 in a Second Division match at Bolton. Dennis Brown scored for Swindon, a young Francis Lee – from the penalty spot – for Bolton.


