WRITE

IF ever a man had cause to claim that "You just cannot win" it was Derek Pavis after he announced at the Annual Meeting that Notts County will almost certainly remain at Meadow Lane.

The following day, a spokesman for "The Pie" chose to criticise the decision on local radio and it was hardly surprising that the chairman was upset by his comments.

I can only say that it is fortunate that the gentlemen concerned represents the minority view - otherwise the future would look bleak for us because we would not have a financial backer!

If you cast your minds back 12 months or so to the time when the recommendations of the Taylor Report were revealed, the chairman suggested that it might be in everyone's best interests to consider a move away from Meadow Lane.

It was clear that many people wanted the club to stay and although the directors have always kept their options open, our thinking since then has leaned in the direction of trying to re-build Meadow Lane.

With that in mind, the chairman revealed at the Annual Meeting that we are looking at the possibility of trying to erect cantilever roofs over the stands on either side of the ground - and most people were delighted when they heard that news.

As I've learned many times over the years, you cannot please everyone all of the time. In this instance, however, I do feel it's very unfair for the chairman to be subjected to criticism.

The irony is that we have established beyond doubt that the cheapest - and easiest - way to create an all-seater stadium would be to move away from Meadow Lane and make a fresh start.

The chairman understands that better than anyone but because that goes against the wishes of the majority of supporters, he has chosen the option of doing things the difficult way.

Have no doubts about it - wrestling with the problem is going to be a nightmare for us during the next couple of years and the last thing the chairman needs in the current situation is hassle.

On the contrary, he needs all the help and support he can get and as if I didn't already know that, it was certainly underlined when the Chairman and I visited the Stadia '90 Exhibition in Birmingham last week.

The main thing that it told us is that we have an enormous task ahead of us and I must admit that I came away feeling utterly depressed.

Once we started talking to the experts about everything that will be involved in order to follow the recommendations in the Taylor Report . . . it's a frightening prospect.

But we have to start getting to grips with it and as the chairman said this week when he met with the Supporters Club Committee: "We have 100 miles to travel and have covered six feet."

The next stage is to appoint a firm of consultants to carry out a feasibility study and tell us whether we can build on what we already have or whether we must start again because the current stands are not structurally sound enough to last.

It's expected to take them six months to come up with that and other information and once we get to that stage, it will be down to the directors to select the path this club will tread.

I know that the chairman does intend to consult with supporters before any major decisions are made. He wants it to be a joint exercise and views will be canvassed at a meeting of Supporters Club members when the time is right.

At the end of the day, however, the final decision must rest with the directors - and that's only right and proper when you consider whose money keeps the club in business.

Incidentally, those who you who travelled to Ipswich last week might just have got a glimpse of how Meadow Lane will look at some time in the future because they have already achieved what we are planning to do on the Main Stand side.

They have created an impressive "new" stand at Portman Road which actually includes part of the previous structure - and we just wish we could wave a magic wand and do the same!

The players deserve high praise for the way they responded to the challenge and although it's normally against my principles to do so, I would like to single out Don O'Riordan for a special mention.


We needed someone to have a steadying influence - especially with David Regis and Paul Harding feeling their way in League football - and I asked Don to take responsibility for providing it.

He's done a fine job in helping us to turn the corner and although I cannot promise we won't have another long spell without a win at some stage this season, let's enjoy the good times while we can.



Despite our impressive record in recent years, a long run in the FA Youth Cup has consistently eluded us and it would give me a lot of pleasure to put that right.

Maybe this will be the year and all I ask of the players as they look towards the game against Arsenal is that they stick to the principles which have served them so well this season.

Nine wins and a draw from our first 10 Purity League matches of the season is a record of which to be proud and it's especially pleasing to see us performing so consistently.

Under normal circumstances, youngsters tend to blow hot and cold and that's something which the likes of myself and Russell Slade have to learn to live with.

But our current team don't suffer as much from the "disease" as most and having worked our way to the top of the League with something to spare, I just hope the high standards can be maintained.

Our latest success was by a margin of 2-0 against Peterborough at our new training ground at Lady Bay last Saturday and although first half goals from Phil Hill and John Brough clinched the points, it was a more convincing win that the scoreline suggests.

FROM THE

DRESSING ROOM

IT WAS something of a step back in time, as well as a step back in position, when I recently switched from my more accustomed midfield berth to a defensive role.

You see, it was as a left back that I first made my entry into League football with Wimbledon, after Dave Bassett paid Nuneaton Borough £8,000 for me in 1981.

And as well as filling that position at Nuneaton and in my spell at Plough Lane, I also played there during my time in Germany with Bundesliga club Dusseldorf.

My ambitions in football had always revolved around operating as a midfield player until Graham Carr came up with the idea of converting me to a left back. Graham was manager of Nuneaton at the time and wanted to make a change because the regular player in that position kept skipping our training sessions.

So I took his place and stayed there for the rest of my time with Nuneaton and for my first two years with Wimbledon until Nigel Winterburn arrived on a free transfer from Birmingham City - yes a free transfer!

That was when I reverted back to midfield, although in the sweeper system employed by Dusseldorf I was used as a left back with the licence to push forward.

So it wasn't as much of a change in circumstances as some people might have thought when the manager asked me to take over Nicky Platnauer's position.

It took a bit of time adjusting in the initial stages at Plymouth, but that was largely a test of my concentration and defensive awareness more than anything.

As a midfield player, you can try one or two things out, knowing that there is a line of defence behind you as back up if they go wrong. But as a full back, you are the last line of defence and so there is no room for error.

But although I do prefer to play in the middle of the park because you are more involved in the action, I am enjoying the challenge of this switch and I am still being encouraged to get forward whenever possible by the manager.

On a lighter note, don't be at all surprised if you see my defensive colleague Craig Short on the TV programme One Man and his Dog at some stage in the future.

Shorty's just bought himself a sheepdog, which he has called Nel. Mind you, I haven't seen too many sheep in West Bridgford where he lives, so he may have a problem.

I'll probably think twice about stopping at his house in the future though, even if I don't fancy the journey home to Hinckley late at night after a match. The thought of being woken up by a wet nose or tongue isn't very appealing.

"I call them the Likely Lads, some call them Hinge and Bracket. But whatever their names, Paul Harding and David Regis have been a breath of fresh air to us.

They're a couple of real characters who I'm sure will turn out to be big assets to the club. Not only have they caused a stir in the dressing room with their cheerful approach, they have also impressed on the field with their 100% commitment and they have negotiated the step up from non-league football to the Second Division remarkably well.

PLEASE note that although we were hoping to turn our pre-Christmas game against Bristol City into a Sunday fixture, it has not worked out as planned.







Jimmy Sirrel had succeeded in steadying the ship the previous year after two relegations in successive seasons but the question being asked as they set out on another campaign was: Will County be good enough to challenge for promotion.

To some extent, the answer was provided when they travelled to Wiltshire for a Sunday fixture and became the first visiting team to win at the County Ground for 12 months.

Lou Macari's team had stormed out of the Fourth Division, winning the Championship by finishing no less than 18 points clear of Chester City'

Under the circumstances, it was inevitable that many people expected them to march straight through to the Second Division and a victory at Bolton on the opening day of the season merely strengthened that view.

County, it seemed, faced an unenviable task when they turned out on a pleasant Bank Holiday afternoon but Sirrel was to collect more evidence that things were on the mend.

Although David Thompson had been signed from Rochdale during the summer, Notts were relying heavily on the youngsters to revive their fortunes and it must have been a matter of concern to Sirrel and his chief coach Dick Bate that the defence contained three teenagers.

But Paul Smalley, Darren Davis and Dean Yates responded to the challenge and the locals were stunned after 11 minutes when lan McParland burst clear to score.

It meant that the speedy Scot had scored in each of the first three matches and as happened so often during the course of that season, he pointed the Magpies towards victory.

County grew in confidence and played some delightful football and the longer it continued that way, the more frustrated Macari's men became.

That showed itself after 58 minutes when big striker Dave Bamber was sent off but if County thought that incident would guarantee them the points, they got a nasty shock.

Mark Goodwin gave them some breathing space when he increased the lead from a corner with four minutes remaining but Steve White pulled a goal back in the last minute . . . and County were relieved to hear the final whistle.

For what it was worth at that early stage, it was a victory which took the Magpies to the top of the table but come the end of the season, it was Swindon - and Bamber - who had the last laugh.

Both clubs were well in the running for promotion when the return meeting took place at Meadow Lane in April and David Hunt's first-half goal promised to be enough to give us victory.

But Bamber went on as substitute after 57 minutes and transformed the game as the Magpies cracked under the strain of an aerial bombardment.

Swindon eventually emerged as 3-2 winners and went on to clinch promotion via the play-offs while County disappointingly faded from the picture.

THE TRAVELLING

In developing their new stand, Ipswich Town didn't commit the same strange oversight as 'Spurs a few seasons ago and forget to install press facilities.

'Spurs apparently realised late in their planning that space would have to be found - somehow, somewhere - for a press box, which explains why it's in a very unsatisfactory position for viewing, and for working conditions.

It's low down in the multi-deck stand, immediately behind the trainers' and managers' dug outs, so that you have only a partial view of some of the action. And, when it rains, you and your notes (rapidly turning into a soggy, unreadable mess) get a drenching.

I know, because I remember County's last visit to White Hart Lane, a couple of years ago, when the rain came down "like stair rods", as they say.

Ipswich have put their media facilities where you mostly expect to find them, high in the new stand, approached by a private entrance and up what seems a never-ending staircase. The lofty view is a good one, save for the iron supports which (as at Plymouth) obliterate part of the field from you.

Both 'Spurs and Ipswich have also helped us in the reporting trade by providing a press room, where colleagues can be met, team news checked and the latest gossip exchanged before the

match. Afterwards it's the venue to which managers are expected to come for a sort of inquest, in which they explain their feelings about the result and the match in general. Ipswich's John Lyall did his best last Saturday to explain the "loss" of two points

Note that I use the word "expected", rather than "required". We are, in this country, in all sports, still a long way from the American pattern under which bona fide reporters have to be allowed into the sanctuary of the changing room about half an hour after the end of a game.

You've probably read the recent fuss following the visit of a woman journalist into a changing room. But it's not that new a situation.

It startled Dave Watson, the former Notts centre half (incidentally, now nicely recovering from a leg operation) when he went to play in the States several years ago

It was one topic of conversation when I was chatting recently to Nottingham rugby star Gary Reece. He didn't think the rugby lads here would create too many objections.

I suspect that players and administrators over here are a long way from being satisfied that those of us who carry microphones and notebooks would act discreetly enough if given such access. And such fears may be magnified by Pete Davis' recently-published book giving an unexpurgated account of the 1990's World Cup. For now, we shall have to take some stick with the managers conferences at the safe distance of the press room.

IT'S hardly surprising that the traumatic events of the past six months have taken their toll on Swindon Town as they strive to recapture the First Division place which was snatched from their grasp during the summer.

The Wiltshire club have struggled to make the same sort of impact this season to that which led to them winning promotion in a blaze of glory after their play-off triumph at Wembley in May.

Before the champagne had time to go flat, however, that long-awaited opportunity to play in the top flight for the first time in their 109- year history had disappeared.

Swindon's punishment for being found guilty of financial irregularities was that they were made to remain in Division Two although they were initially sentenced to compete in Division Three.

And although the decision was changed after an appeal, Swindon players could be forgiven for thinking they might have been going into action at Anfield or Old Trafford this afternoon, rather than Meadow Lane

VISITING MANAGER



WORLD CUP winner Osvaldo Ardiles has provided glowing evidence that his career in football management could be just as successful as it was as a player after steering Swindon Town to the promotion play-offs last season.

The little Argentinian, who won a World Cup winners medal in 1978, guickly made a big impression with the football purists as his stylish Swindon side climbed into a challenging position in the Second Division, which led to him being linked with vacant posts at First Division clubs.

A driving midfield force, he appeared over 200 times in two spells with Toffenham with a short period at French club Paris St Germain sandwiched in between. As well as a loan spell at Blackburn Rovers, he also played eight times for Spurs' London neighbours Queen's Park Rangers.

In fact Ardiles will be hoping that this afternoon's trip to Nottingham is not as painful as his last one - for he sustained a hairline fracture in his leg at Forest which effectively brought his brief stay at QPR to an abrupt end. The shock waves of the affair are still being felt at the County Ground, where Ossie Ardiles' stylish team have struggled to do themselves justice. Five of their first nine home matches ended in defeat and with their away form only marginally better, it has left them hovering just above the relegation zone.

What's more, injuries have added to the tale of woe - notably the damaged knee ligaments sustained by former Mansfield defender Colin Calderwood, their influential captain.

That has left a big hole to fill at the back and the problems it has caused surfaced in a six-match spell when they conceded 16 goals, culminating in a 5-1 defeat at Barnsley.

With Calderwood out of action it has placed extra responsibility on former Shrewsbury and Derby defender Ross MacLaren and Jon Gittens, who has established himself as a regular since arriving from Southampton.

However, Ardiles has turned to fellowcountryman Nestor Lorenzo, who played in the 1990 World Gup Final for Argentina, to strengthen his defence.

And Lorenzo, who had a brief trial with Forest earlier in the season, wasted no time in making his presence felt with Swindon when he marked his debut with a goal against Portsmouth.

England Under-21 international Fraser Digby, who joined Swindon from Manchester United, continues to illustrate why he is considered one of

the best goalkeepers outside the First Division with consistently good displays.

If Swindon are to overcome their problems, however, they will be looking to strike-pair Steve White and Duncan Shearer to spearhead the revival.

White, whose distinguished goal-scoring career includes two spells with Bristol Rovers and two with Luton, hit 25 goals last season while Shearer, a former Chelsea and Huddersfield striker, went one better.

Alan McLoughlin provides a considerable amount of their service from midfield - his career having taken off in his second spell at Swindon.

Like Digby, he joined the Robins from Manchester United but it was after returning from a short period with Fourth Division Torquay that he began to play a major part in the club's surge to success.

And the 23-year-old's progress was recognised last summer when he figured in

Jack Charlton's Republic of Ireland squad during the World Cup Final in Italy, making a number of appearances as substitute.

Perhaps inevitably, Ardiles has gathered together a contingent of former Tottenham players since being installed as Swindon's manager.

He paid £60,000 to recruit Shaun Close from Bournemouth after he had spent two years on the south coast and Republic of Ireland winger Tony Galvin and midfielder Micky Hazard have also linked up with their former team-mate at the County Ground.

The L'ondon connection doesn't end there because Swindon paid £110 ,000 to Queen's Park Rangers for David Kerslake, who was thrust into the role of right back by injuries last season and has remained there ever since.

Not only did Kerslake prove to be a solid defender, his overlapping runs and pinpoint crosses have also been the source of many

On the left-hand side, Paul Bodin has also grown in confidence as the season has progressed and the 26-year-old former Cardiff full back was rewarded when he gained a full international cap for Wales

Although Ardiles has assembled a considerable amount of experience in his bid to lift Swindon into the First Division, he has also taken every opportunity to give promising voungsters their chance.

For example, Trowbridge-born midfielder Fitroy Simpson figured regularly last season while Adrian Viveash and Paul Hunt have shown plenty of promise when stepping up to first-team level this term.

Shearer has followed up his consistent

goalscoring record with Huddersfield, where he was on target 38 times in 83 appearances, by averaging a goal every two games at the County Ground. The 28-year-old was introduced to English football by Chelsea as a youngster but failed to make an impact at Stamford Bridge.



things because we normally find in the Pontins League that teams are mainly made up of lads like me who are trying to bridge the gap between the youth team and the senior side.

"I'm sure that being involved with Shepshed has helped my game and I just hope that shows through when I get back to Meadow Lane on a permanent basis."

Richard, who was voted "Young Player of the Year" last season, is expanding his knowledge of life off the field as well because he recently moved into a flat in Nottingham with Craig Finch

And it's the first time he has been away from the family home at Breaston in Derbyshire because, after joining us from school he opted not to stay in the club hostel.

He added: "I had the option to stay in the hostel but John Barnwell advised me to stay at home if it was at all possible. "I chose to do that and although I used to have a longer 'working day' than most of the lads when I had to catch a bus at 7.45am, my dad often used to give me a lift to the ground.

"Fortunately, I managed to pass my driving test and buy an 'old banger' in December and that made a big difference to my life. At least it did until the clutch went and I discovered it would cost more to mend it than the car was worth!"

Now that he has a more modern replacement, however, and is settled in his new home in Nottingham, Richard wants to devote his full attention to carving out a career in football.

He also collected valuable experience by playing regularly in the Reserves and when injuries created a vacancy at senior level in preseason, he was given a brief taste of the big-time.



THE FIXTURE computer has presented us with a golden opportunity to make amends for two recent disappointments in the Pontin's League - all of which can be achieved within the space of 48 hours.

We are given a second bite of the cherry when, by a twist of fate, we meet York City and West Brom on Wednesday and Friday evenings next

week, having of course only just played both of them - drawing 0-0 at Bootham Crescent and going down 1-0 at home to Albion.

TACTICAL TIP

The basic concern for keepers in one-againstone situations is to narrow the angle - coming off
your line or out of your six-yard box to reduce the
area of the goal your opponents has to aim at.
But allied to this is the need to spread yourself
wide to form a barrier across the angle between
the ball and the goal, shrinking the target still
further. The temptation to go down 'feet first'
should be resisted; it means you'll be along the
angle between the ball and the goal instead of
across it, and it will reduce the chances of getting
your hands to the ball. Opponents are more likely
to shoot earlier on straighter runs than they are
from a wider position, you may be forced to make
a save as you close your man down. Luck may
play its part here, but good positions, a sensible
approach and fast reflexes will county for far
more as you 'collapse' your legs and get your
hands to the ball to prevent it slipping 'through
the hole' between your body and the ground - a
more common way of scoring against the
advancing keeper than the dribble round him or
the chip.

already used 34 players in just 11 matches, it is not surprising that such a high degree of upheaval has had an adverse effect on form and left us 10th in the table.

In both the 1-0 victory over Middlesbrough in our first match and the recent 3-3 draw at Oldham, the youngsters have illustrated why they are currently enjoying so much success at Purity Youth League level by adjusting to the step-up in standard remarkably well.

That is not saying though that the senior players haven't pulled their weight when they have been in the reserves. They have always responded in a very professional manner to the task of trying to win back their first team places giving 100% commitment.

But the fact that we haven't had a settled side does make it difficult for us to build up any sort of consistency. And now that we have quite a big first team squad, it takes some careful planning to provide them all with a regular game and at the same time continue to give some of the younger professionals enough opportunities so that their development is not impaired.

That is why it has been a good thing in many ways that Stephen Aldridge, Anthony Thompson, Richard Walker and Craig Finch have gone on loan to non-league clubs. not only has it provided them with valuable experience, but it also assures them of regular outings.

The problem was highlighted the other week when we had to leave Gary Chapman on the sidelines and employ Gary Lund as a central defender for the Albion game because we had too many strikers.

But having so many experienced front players at our disposal at times makes it something of a mystery why turning our dominance into goals in several matches has been a big stumbling block.

When I reflect on the games that we have played against sides currently above us in the table, we have matched them in every department, only for our finishing to let us down.

That, together with our disappointing home record, are two things which we will be endeavouring to put right against York, because we have saved our best performances for away games and so we have not really shown how good we are in front of our own supporters.

OXFORD PLAN FOR THE FUTURE

The Football Trust 1990 has been created to help the game at all levels and to assist clubs meet the requirements of Lord Justice Taylor's Final Report.

Safety and comfort for all spectators is the primary objective and substantial funds have been made available for the provision of seating at Football League grounds. At the same time the Trust's commitment to family and community initiatives will continue with the provision of more family enclosures, better toilet facilities, covered accommodation, artificial pitches for local use and the development of women's and junior football particularly through community programmes, plus a wide range of policing and crowd control measures.

Each year The Trust expects to receive £20 million from the reduction in Pool Betting Duty plus the £10 million continuing contribution from the Spotting-the-Ball competition organised by Littlewoods, Vernons and Zetters. This money will be invested in projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom.

Following last weeks disclosure that Notts County are planning to embark on a major development of the Meadow Lane in order to satisfy the requirements of the Taylor Report I took the opportunity of inviting Chairman Derek Pavis to attend a Supporters Club Supporters Committee Meeting to explain his plans. He readily accepted the offer and gave up part of last Monday

evening to address the Committee. Although the Committee regularly discuss the subject and has been kept well informed of progress over recent months the presence of the Chairman provided an opportunity

for the Committee to obtain the very latest 'state of play'.

Despite the impression created in the local press that plans were at an advanced stage Mr. Pavis was able to ensure the Supporters Representatives that the process had only just begun. The reality of the situation is that so far there are no firm plans merely a few ideas and a declaration of intent. At this stage there haven't even been any proper feasibiliy studies undertaken. Mr. Pavis explained that it would be many months before all the options could be examined and costed and several months more before any decisions were likely to be made. The Chairman assured the Committee that supporters views and ideas will be considered and there would be an opportuity for supporters to view the plans once any viable options have been identified.

At the end of the discussion, after the Chairman had answered all questions to the full, Mr. Pavis took the opportunity to ask the Committee for their continued efforts both in terms of regular cash donations to Notts County but also the services that they provide to supporters.


