

ALBION'S WOE

West Brom's shattering FA Cup humiliation by non-league Woking could have been even worse.

For their top midfield player Andy Tarris serving a five month prison sentence for fraud

He is due for release just before the fourth round tie against Everton which little Woking have switched to Goodison hoping for a £60,000 windfall.

But like the rest of the team he'll be back inside the nick the Thursday before the tie. Woking always train inside nearby Send Prison and a game against mighty Everton won't change that.

After all, West Brom couldn't get out of jail in their nightmare clash once Gibraltar's World Cricket Cup star Tim Buzaglo went to work on his hat-trick

The biggest cup upset for years had the bookies scrambling for cover. Hills slashed the odds against Woking winning the FA Cup from 5,000-1 to 2,000-1 and offer 200-1 against Buzza repeating his hat-trick at Goodison.

One former Yeovil player helped Crystal Palace to the Final last season - Alan Pardew - and another helped Portsmouth through a potential minefield at Barnet with the day's other hat-trick

Guy Whittingham took the pressure off his boss Frank Burrows in the 5-0 victory.

Fourth Division Aldershot switched their tie to West Ham, locked out the Second Division leaders in a spirited goalless draw and then fumed as their wives and girlfriends were locked out in the cold themselves.

A mix-up over hospitality tickets meant there weren't enough passes to go round.

Woking's day of glory completely overshadowed several other major upsets that would have grabbed the headlines on any other Sunday.

Improving Oxford did what Bristol City achieved last season - knocked Chelsea out. Ex-Liverpool reserve John Durnin hit his fifth goal in six games and another Antield reject Jim Magilton finished the Blues off after Kerry Dixon made it 2-1.

Newcastle put their poor cup form behind them to dump their old boss Arthur Cox and his Derby County side out 2-0.

And Cambridge, who ended City's run in a replay last winter, are on the cup trail again, their only goal at Wolves coming from Chris Leadbitter 14 minutes from time.

Ex-Ashton Gate striker Robbie Turner was sent off in the dying seconds of Plymouth's battling goalless draw at Middlesbrough for hitting John Hendrie.

Manager David Kemp immediately fined Turner - but that was nothing compared to David Pleat's tury as he saw Paul Ramsey and Steve Walsh sent off while defending a thirdminute lead from Tony James at Millwall.

The handicap of playing with nine men finally proved too much and the Lions snatched a sensational late win with goals from Teddy Sheringham and Paul Stephenson in the final two minutes.


Sweden's World Cup captain Glenn Hysen and Kevin Moran were both sent off for professional fouls in Liverpool's lucky 1-1 draw at Blackburn.

Kenny Daiglish's men needed a Mark Atkins own goal to scramble a replay - and TV pundit Jimmy Hill angered Blackburn with a flippant remark, that ball girl Gillian Maynard cost Rovers a glorious victory by returning the ball quickly to Steve Nicol after it went out of play.

The move that followed led to Atkins putting through his own goal and giving Liverpool another chance.

Sixteen year old Gillian was near to tears when she heard Hill's remarks and her dad Bill said. "I have always thought Hill opens his mouth before engaging his brain".

Another late hero was Wigan defender Darren Patterson who earned his side a home

replay with a last minute goal against 1987 winners Coventry.

Matt Le Tissier had to run a mocking gauntlet of abuse from Ipswich fans -but had the last laugh.

He scored two of the goals that carried the Saints through 3-2.

Former Villa golden boy Gary Shaw was another two-goal star, helping Shrewsbury halt Watford's revival with a 4-1 win which promised a crack at his old Aston Villa mates if they get past their replay with Wimbledon.

Second Division dark horses Barnsley also earned a replay with a 1-1 draw against inform Leeds, but John Deehan's equaliser caused a storm as Leeds protested that Andy Saville had handled before putting Deehan through.

Hull's defensive nightmare continued with a 5-2 thrashing at home by Nolts County who had the tie wrapped up by half time when they were three up.

And Bristol Bovers suffered badly when goalkeeper Brian Parkin was stretchered off against Crewe and their former defender Darren Carr and Craig Hignett took advantage to score either side of half time.

FROM THE PRESS BOX

"ABOVE THE PARAPETS" -KEN BATES

Some football chairmen appear to be allpowerful. They are never out of the headlines. They choose to be the spokesmen for their clubs. They thrive on controversy.

All of which brings me to Mr Ken Bates, who sounds off regularly at meetings of the League's management committee, to those journalists with whom he has a reasonable rapport, and in his Stamford Bridge programme.

Chelsea's outspoken chairman makes a career out of ruffling feathers. He doesn't care who he offends - if he feels he has something positive to say and it's to the benefit of the under priviledged average fan. For the great virtue of this maverick chairman is that he represents those who stand on the terraces.

He upsets people. Often, it would seem, he lacks sensitivity. But noone should ignore him or his valid views.

Whenever I go to watch Chelsea, the first thing I turn to in the programme is his notes. Not the team news for the afternoon's game. Not the gossipy asides about the players. But the Bark of Bates.

Listen to this: "There are lies, damned lies and statistics - and Government statistics are the worst.

"In the old days, PC Plod arrested you on Saturday, you were in the magistrates' court on the Monday and you usually gct your comeuppance on the same day. Swift, simple and effective. The coppers knew their job and did it.

"Today we have something called

the Crown Prosecution Service. Only trouble is, they can't prosecute - and they give a lousy ser ice'

That was Ken Bates, steaming ahead on some of the wider aspects of hooliganism in a recent programme. He doesn't pussyfoot about. His 750 words, personally written and reasoned, is full of pertinent questions and contentious claims. Guaranteed to keep many a pub discussion going for the whole of Saturday night.

He sees himself as man of the people. He talks of the afternoons when he watched Burnley in his clothcap. He reckons he is accessible at any time to the supporters. 'If only he was a bit more, to us, "I've heard various members of the media complain.

High-profile chairmanship in football can misfire. Think of some of the things that have gone on at Old Trafford. Think of a dozen chairmen who have been publicly vilified. It is often cruel, though occasionally justified in the minds of those who arque that boardroom status has been abused.

City's two most extrovert chairmen were George Jenkins and Harry Dolman, George, a little man seldom without a big rose in his buttonhole, ran both a pub and a fish shop. He also ran the club with dogged resolve for 26 years until voted off in 1949.

Harry had an inventive mind. He

was happiest in his workshop, puzzling over his latest personalised gadget. As an engineer and businessman he had an ourstanding record. As the chairman at Ashton Gate he was both autocratic and immensely likeable. At times he would speak out on a public issue - but never with the eloquent venom of a Bates.

All the time I have worked in Bristol. the directors at Bristol Rovers have been quiet men. In the Fifties they were known as the 'faceless board'. That wasn't meant as a slur. They simply looked after the business and left Bert Tann to create and cope with the headlines.

Currently, the chairmen of the two professional clubs in Bristol are inclined to shy away from public utterances. It isn't their style. Others are around to do the talking.

Incorrigible battlers (some would say egotists) like Bates the Bold. "Some people are frightened to put their heads above the parapets," he said only the other day.

SWINDON TOWN

The Club.....

When Swindon came here twelve months ago for an F.A. Cup Third Round tie, the programme notes commented "...off the field the club has been rocked by abortive take overs, allegations of betting scandals, illegal payments with writs and injunctions flying all over the place. On the playing side the quality is there which should draw attention away from these troubles and a repeat of reaching the play-offs should be regarded as a probability rather than a possibility...."

What happened in the following five months is history now, Swindon did reach the play-offs and subsequently secured promotion to Division One only to suffer the heartache of relegation to Division Three due to a breach of League regulations.

Indeed Swindon could become the subject of a 'Trivial Pursuit question: which club spent the shortest time in the First Division of the Football League?

The club's promotion at Wembley on May 28th, 1990 and demotion to

Division Three on June 7th, 1990 will forever rankle with those who felt that any financial misdemeanours should have incurred financial penalties. The subsequent re-instatement to the Second Division did little to appease those amongst the Wembley crowd who had paid to see Sunderland defeated, but still gain a First Division place.

It remains to be seen whether Swindon can turn the decision to deprive the club of its First Division status merely into a brief postponement, but inevitably in this first half of the season the team's form has suffered.

The New Year however has started on a high note with the appointment of a new Chairman and the announcement of plans to build a new superstadium in conjunction with the local authority.

The Management.....

Ossie Ardiles took control at the County Ground in the summer of 1989, thus becoming the club's thirteenth manager since the war, following Lou Macari's move to West Ham.

It was a bold decision to give Ossie his first taste of management but the diminuative Argentinian has coped admirably through all the off-the-field traumas.

He first caught the eye as a skilful midfielder who played a key role in winning the World Cup for Argentina. Spurs 'imported' him to England in the summer of 1978 and he went on to make almost 250 appearances for the North London side. In addition, he had a loan period at Blackburn as well as what turned out to be a final season in the First Division with Q.P.R.

He has earned a reputation as a shrewd tactician and has also transformed the Swindon style of play in his short time in charge. His achievements have not gone unnoticed and there have been overtures that he might move on. Ossie has pledged to stay, but Swindon will do well to hold him in the long term.

His assistant is the experienced Chic Bates. A player with Swindon, Shrewsbury and Bristol Rovers, he also managed Shrewsbury for five years.

Transfers.....

After such a successful time last season, it was evident that there would be no major changes to the playing staff at the start of this campaign.

Manager Ossie Ardiles has however, made two astute purchases since, signing midfielder Micky Hazard from Portsmouth and Argentinian Nestor Lorenzo from Italian League side Bari

Hazard whose subtle skills have never been tapped cost £130,000 at the end of September while Lorenzo originally joined the Wiltshire club in November on loan. He played for his country in last summer's World Cup and has appeared 25 times for his country.

The major departure from the County Ground came just a few weeks ago with the Republic of Ireland international midfielder Alan McLoughlin's £1 million move to First Division Southampton.

The club's financial status is such that not all this income can be used to strengthen the team, and indeed, it was rumoured it may be that circumstances could dictate other departures but manager Ossie Ardiles will surely want no further disruption to his squad as he tries to emulate last season's achievements.

Current Form

With only two wins from their last eighteen League games, one would expect to see Swindon lurking in the relegation zone rather than their current mid-table position.

They are, however, a very difficult side to beat and arrive at Ashton Gate to-day currently enjoying an eight match unbeaten sequence in the League. In fact, seven of those games have been drawn, the odd one out being a 2-1 victory over W.B.A. at the County Ground.

Away from home, they have registered just two victories at Charlton (2-1) on the opening day of the season and Oxford (4-2) in September. There have been seven draws on opponents' graounds at Hull (1-1), Brighton (3-3), Leicester (2-2), Notts County (0-0), Ipswich (1-1), Newcas-

tle (1-1) and Watford (2-2) whilst defeats have been tasted on three occasions at Oldham (2-3), Barnsley (1-5) and Sheffield Wednesday (1-2).

A goal from Junior Bent gave City a 1-0 win at the County Ground in September, one of five home defeats, and gives City the opportunity of completing their first double over the Wiltshire club since 1973-74.

We've met before.....

...on sixty four occasions in the League. The last time was the final game of the 1986/87 season when Swindon, already assured a place in the play-offs held City to a 1-1 draw to deprive them of their play-off place.

More recently, in January last year, goals from Bob Taylor and Rob Newman enabled City to defeat Swindon 2-1 in the F.A. Cup Third Round, Duncan Shearer replying for the Wiltshire club in a tense encounter.

World Cup Bid Moves Into Gear

The first steps have been taken to bring the 1998 World Cup Finals to England. A Joint Working Party comprising representatives of the Football Association and The Football League have asked clubs in the First and Second Divisions of the Barclays League to indicate if they would be interested in tendering for the privilege of being a World Cup venue in eight years time. The Working Party sees this as an opportunity for clubs to enter into partnerships with their local communities in order to upgrade their stadia to the required standard.

As a major global event, the World Cup finals offer significant advantages for selected venues, attracting new revenue to the area and providing tremendous stimulus to local commerce. Several local authorities have already shown an interest in this kind of joint approach and with clubs in the First and Second already committed to converting their grounds into all seater stadia by season 1994-95 it is essential that the conversion plans now being drawn up take account of the nation's ambitions to bring football's premier competition back to the roots.

F.I.F.A., the World governing body, will issue formal invitations for bids to stage the 1998 World Cup Finals early in the New Year and national associations will then have until the beginning of next season to prepare their applications.

FLASHBACK.....

....A look down the years.

5 YEARS AGO

We achieved our third win in four games - the other was drawn - at home to Rotherham. Brian Williams, Alan Walsh and Steve Neville put us three up before Tommy Tynan added his name to the scoresheet. We won 3-1 and were now 12th in the Third Division.

Swindon remained top of the Fourth Division after winning 2-1 at home to Southend Colin Gordon, from the penalty spot, and Chris Ramsey, scored the goals.

Norman Whiteside put First Division leaders Manchester United ahead at Oxford. Late goals from Mark Hughes and Colin Gibson extended the margin of victory to 3-0.

Second-placed Everton found themselves two down after 25 minutes at home to Queens Park Rangers. Graeme Sharp pulled one back, from the penalty spot, just before half-time. Then, early in the second-half, Gary Lineker and Paul Wilkinson scored within a minute of each other. Later, Sharp scored again. There were only three minutes left when Gary Bannister got his second of the game, to make the final score 4-3.


The Reserves were due back in action last Tuesday for a South West Counties League game with Yeovil here at Ashton Gate. We'll bring you a report on that game in the next programme.



"Already, CCTV has had a major impact on the hooligan problem inside football grounds as well as proving extremely useful to monitor safety measures. If any trouble appears on the screen or is reported from any quarter of the ground, the CCTV can zoom in on the incident. The police can then record what occurs on colour video and on hard copy prints. Individuals can be picked out by facial appearance and the colour of their clothing. The evidential effect of such a video recording has proved formidable. It has persuaded hooligans, who would previously have sought to challenge oral evidence of identification, to plead guilty. Hooligans know cameras are keeping a roving watch and their activities in the ground are inhibited by that knowledge."


