# STOP BLEATING

Recent controversy over the number of players being sent off this season has been closely linked with the new interpretation of the so called 'professional foul' offence.

With each incident being entirely different the most important factor is that the law reads 'in the opinion of the referee . . .'. The man in black can only judge the offence by what he sees without the benefit of action replays. This new interpretation of the law was introduced to improve the entertainment level of the game and to punish those who seek to gain advantage by serious foul play. Everyone in football must accept the referee's decision as final and concentrate their efforts on achieving success within the laws of the game.

# ONE OUT ALL OUT

The French players football union have recently called for a strike from all their members. The dispute concerns something which has also affected the British game.

Freedom of Contract has dramatically changed the transfer system and movement of players in this country, allowing individuals the right to move on at the end of their contracts. The French players are trying to insert release clauses into their contracts which will virtually give them the right to leave clubs when it suits them. Surely the players must allow the clubs some sort of stability so that they can plan for the future knowing which players will be available to them. The balance has already shifted hugely in favour of the players but this would be one step too far.

# FICKLE FOLK

Yesterday's hero, Howard Kendall received a less than friendly reception from Manchester City supporters during the recent televised game against Everton at Goodison Park.

In the second half of last season Kendall lifted Manchester City clear of the relegation zone to a final position of 14th in Division One. He was hailed as a 'messiah' and his success continued in the early part of this season as he took City to a lofty position in the league. The choice he made to return to his old club, Everton, was a controversial but understandable one. City fans may not find his choice acceptable but the desire to return to his old stamping ground proved too strong and the personal abuse he received was not justified.

# REPLAYS PERMITTING

Providing neither ourselves nor Southampton draw in today's FA Cup matches we will play hosts to The Saints on Wednesday in the rearranged Zenith Data Systems Cup.

The chance to reach the Southern area semi-final is at stake, with the exciting prospect of a home tie with near neighbours Ipswich Town the reward, which is in turn only two matches from a Wembley appearance. With the result having to be reached at the first attempt it should prove to be a cracking cup tie. Don't miss it . . . Norwich City v Southampton Wednesday January 30th – kick-off 7.45 pm.

The Leeds United result was one we sorely needed, particularly after those setbacks over Christmas and the performance against Nottingham Forest. Yet when you looked at the two fixtures - Leeds United and then a visit to Crystal Palace - they seemed more difficult than any other pair of consecutive fixtures on our list this season.

# DESERVED

Leeds United's record thus far has been excellent and, of course, they had already beaten us at Elland Road but we played very well on the day. We combated the physical side of their game and started to create chances of our own.

Equally, Crystal Palace don't give anyone an easy ride and we were able to break their run of home success stretching back almost a year. We worked hard, gave them very little space and, I believe, deserved our victory.

In both games we had to weather a few storms but, when you are playing against top of the league sides who are going well, you have to expect, at some stage, to be under some extreme pressure.

# SIGNIFICANCE

But the real significance of the six league points is to stabilise a decline and to create for ourselves a platform on which to build a challenge for a high finish in the First Division table. Those points have now put us in a reasonably comfortable position and, looking at the next few fixtures, we should have a good opportunity to advance.

We really have had so many hiccups this season in terms of having achieved that platform only to be set back by a result or series of results

that should not have been. It was nice to see Jeremy

Goss playing such an important part in the two games but, as everyone knows by now, he will miss the next three matches because he was sent off in a Reserve game. This is a great personal disappointment to him because he knows that he has shown enough form to keep himself in the side. It was the opportunity he was waiting for and it is made worse because, perhaps of all our players, he is the very last person I would have expected to react as he did.

# **OLD CUP FOES**

We had to wait a long while to find out who we would be playing this afternoon but Monday's much delayed replay was finally decided in the dving seconds of normal time - in favour of Swindon Town, You won't need me to tell you that we have been making a bit of a habit of getting involved with the Wiltshire side in cup matches in recent seasons -


nor that we have NOT exactly been making a habit of winning these meetings!


We would rather like to reverse the trend today but I would caution that they are a very good side. In footballing terms, they earned the right last season to have joined us in Division One this year and their success in winning 'promotion' on the field stands to their credit whatever may have happened elsewhere in the club. # IAN Man of the Match

Ian Butterworth was presented with the Manns & Norwich Brewery Company's 'Man of the Match' award for his excellent performance in the match against Leeds United.

Playing a very solid all round game, Butterworth was particularly impressive against Lee Chapman, notably one of Leeds' most dangerous players. lan mastered the defence superbly and gave support on numerous occasions.

This was lan's third 'Man of the Match' award for the season. He previously collected the awards for the Aston Villa and Everton games. This highlights the consistently high level of his performances in what is usually an unsung position in the centre of defence.

Today marks lan's 182nd senior appearance for The

Canaries since his transfer from Nottingham Forest in November 1986. Having taken over as captain when Michael Phelan left for Old Trafford in 1989 lan's cool displays have impressed all City fans.

Paul Reed, lessee of The Bush Public House in Costessey, near Norwich, presented Ian Butterworth with the 'Man of the Match' award.

Ipswich born Paul has been a football supporter for the last 15 years and since moving to Norwich last September has been a fan of The Canaries.

Although Paul enjoys the game, his wife Andrea and children Mark and Emma do not share his passion for football, in fact, Andrea prefers fishing!

We have had two very satisfying games and two important results, not just by the way that we played but that we now know that we can still produce top class performances, even against two of the most outstanding teams in the First Division.

Our one-touch football, particularly against Crystal Palace, was excellent. Leeds and Palace are similar in many respects; they are very direct, they pressurise you and try to force you into errors but we stood up to that and matched them in their physical determination. We have beaten teams in consecutive weeks who could well be there amongst the honours in league and cup competitions at the end of the season.

# **ANOTHER SYSTEM**

Again, we have adopted a slightly different system of play which strengthens our presence in midfield. This has been a significant area of strength of both Leeds and Crystal Palace this season but we made it very hard for them to play there. The bonus for us is that we have been able to break opposition defences from very deep positions using players attacking on long forward runs to avoid the offside traps.

By playing just the one man right up front we have managed to cause some confusion for the second central defender who finds himself without anyone to mark in his normal role. It isn't quite so easy to pick up the man running from deep because he is coming from a different area of the pitch each time. The element of indecision that created has served us well especially against Leeds United.

# **MAKE IT WORK**

However, I would stress that systems, as such, don't win games. It is important to remember that it is the players within the system that make it work. Aston Villa tried to use our method against Leeds United in a cup tie the following Wednesday and they lost four-one because their players didn't make it work to their advantage.

I think I should just comment briefly on the role of Jeremy Goss in these two victories and record what a disappointment it is to him and to us all that, after grabbing his first team opportunity so well, he will miss the next three games because of suspension. He really isn't the sort of player to get involved in disciplinary difficulties.


If we can continue this sort of form now to the end of the season, I still don't think it is being too ambitious to look towards a possible place in Europe – either through our final position in the league or by

success in the Cup. Our problem always seems to have been turning it on every week. So often this season we have been on the verge of taking off on a long run of success and so often we have been brought down by a silly result. In any sport, top rate performances week after week are hard to produce but they are also the key to ultimate success. Our performances against Leeds and Palace would win a championship or a cup if we could do it regularly!

# IMPORTANT MONTH

Swindon Town need little introduction to us in cup matches. They are a very good side whose football not only deserves a place in the First Division, but did earn that place last season. We have to recognise that and work hard to win this afternoon to progress further.

On reflection, January could turn out to have been a very important and significant month for us. It has certainly been a busy one but we have the chance to end it in better league shape and still in two cup competitions — and the prospect of a bumper crowd for a game at Carrow Road against Ipswich Town in the Zenith Data Systems Cup, if we manage to overcome Southampton next week.

"Already, CCTV has had a major impact on the hooligan problem inside football grounds as well as proving extremely useful to monitor safety measures. If any trouble appears on the screen or is reported from any quarter of the ground, the CCTV can zoom in on the incident. The police can then record what occurs on colour video and on hard copy prints. Individuals can be picked out by facial appearance and the colour of their clothing. The evidential effect of such a video recording has proved formidable. It has persuaded hooligans, who would previously have sought to challenge oral evidence of identification, to plead guilty. Hooligans know cameras are keeping a roving watch and their activities in the ground are inhibited by that knowledge."

The second came from Paul Dickinson of Batley. His letter praised several aspects of his day in Norwich. Here are just some of the points he mentioned:

'I was impressed with the general friendliness of the police throughout the day as well as not feeling threatened as I went for a lunchtime drink in a nearby pub. The lounge area in the South Stand helped keep us warm and enjoy the television prior to taking our seats. My next excursion is to Highbury, the comparisons will be interesting.'

It is always nice to receive such positive comments and I make no apologies for reproducing such letters.

# LOCOMOTIVE NAMEPLATE

Proudly displayed above the players tunnel is a locomotive nameplate bearing the name Norwich City. The club has received a detailed history of the nameplate from Michael Joyce of The Gresley Society. Here are some of the most interesting points:

'The name 'Norwich City' was

originally allocated to locomotive No: 2860 but this was changed before the locomotive left Darlington Works – 'Hull City' being substituted. In fact, 'Norwich City' was fitted to locomotive No: 2859 that had originally been allocated to 'Sheffield United', and it came into service in June 1936.



The name 'Norwich City' was then transferred to one of the original 'Sandringham' Class locomotives – No: 2839 which was built in 1933, and named 'Rendlesham Hall'. In retrospect, it was perhaps a wise change of name because that stately home had become a high-class nursing home for alcoholics and drug addicts!!

In January 1946 the locomotive was rebuilt with only 2-cylinders and placed in Class B2. It was renumbered by the LNER as 1639 in May 1936 and, following Nationalisation, renumbered 61639.

During LNER days it was painted in the standard Apple Green and the Club colours painted on either side of the brass football. During the war years all engines were painted black, as an economy measure, and the colours painted out. After Nationalisation, the locomotive appeared in a darker Brunswick Green and the Club colours re-instated.

The locomotive finished its working days at Cambridge Shed (31A) and was withdrawn in May 1959. It was finally broken up at Stratford (London) in July 1959.

The nameplate then appeared outside the players entrance to the old Main Stand where it remained until the fire in October 1984. It subsequently reappeared over the players tunnel when the City Stand was built.

Thanks Mr Joyce for such a detailed history.

At half time today I will be making a presentation to 80 year old Peter Hindley from Wymondham who has supported The Canaries for 70 years.





This is the fifth time we have been drawn against Swindon Town in cup competitions since 1987/88. The Robins have progressed at our expense on three of those four occasions, our sole victory coming in the Simod Cup during 1988-89.

It was Lou Macari's Swindon side which caused us great problems with their very direct style. Since the arrival of former Argentinian international Osvaldo Ardiles, Swindon have transformed their game and are now playing a much more attractive type of game based on good passing.



**OSSIE ARDILES** 

Last season, on the pitch, Swindon proved themselves worthy of a First Division place by defeating Sunderland at Wembley in the play-off final. Subsequent events led to Swindon being demoted first to Division Three and then back into Division Two. This seemed to knock Swindon back as they struggled for consistency at the start of this season.

Recently, however, they have found something like their true form and are beginning to make their way up the table to challenge for a play off spot.

The arrival of Micky Hazard from Portsmouth and Nestor Lorenzo from Bari in Italy have added great experience to the squad in defence and midfield. The departure of Republic of Ireland midfielder Alan McLoughlin to Southampton for £1 million has been the only major sale this season.

In recent weeks The Robins have been lucky enough to be able to field a virtually unchanged side. Lorenzo has partnered Jon Gittens in the centre of defence with Ross MacLaren playing just in front of them.

The experienced strike force of Steve White and Duncan Shearer are supported by Hazard who plays in a very advanced midfield role.

With both sides committed to attacking play, mainly on the ground, we should see an enthralling cup-tie today.

## THE MAN IN CHARGE

Osvaldo Ardiles earned 42 caps for Argentina which included the 1978 World Cup Final victory over Holland. Together with Ricky Villa he joined Tottenham Hotspur in 1978 and proceeded to delight football fans all over the country with his busy, short passing game. A brief spell in France was followed by a move to QPR and Blackburn on loan.

Ossie was appointed Swindon's player-manager in 1989 and led his side to a play off place last season.

# **FRASER DIGBY**

Born Sheffield. Highly rated England Under-21 goalkeeper. Missed just one game in 1989/90, the first time he had been absent in over two years. The former Manchester United apprentice, who also spent a loan period with Oldham Athletic, made his League debut for Swindon in September 1986.

# **DAVID KERSLAKE**

Signed for £110,000 from Queens Park Rangers a year ago. David stepped in at right-back and became a firm favourite with the fans with his forceful runs upfield. Represented England at Schoolboy, Youth and Under-21 levels. He joined the Loftus Road club as an apprentice and made his first team debut in a UEFA Cup tie in 1984. Can also play in midfield.

# **PAUL BODIN**

Born Cardiff. Attacking left-sided fullback who is now a regular in the Welsh international side, having gained his first cap against Costa Rica in May. Signed for a bargain £25,000 from Newport County in March 1988 and previously with Bath City, where he was top scorer with 15 goals in 1986-87.

# **ADRIAN VIVEASH**

21 year old defender who acquitted himself well in Swindon's pre-season friendly with Everton in Dublin, but had to wait until mid-October for his League debut, in the local 'derby' with Bristol Rovers. Injuries and suspensions have since given Adrian the opportunity to claim a regular place and he has acclimatised to Second Division football well.

# JON GITTENS

Competitive central defender who was recently suspended after enjoying his most consistent spell since arriving from Southampton three years ago – having



not been absent from the Town line-up for a year. Scored his first goal of the season at Newcastle on Boxing Day. The Saints spotted him playing for Midland Combination club Paget Rangers in 1985.

# **COLIN CALDERWOOD**

Accomplished central defender who is the club captain and one of only two Town players with an 'ever-present' record in 1989/90, but currently an injury casualty. Colin suffered badly torn knee ligaments in only the sixth game of the season. He recommenced training on December 28 and hopefully will be back to full fitness in the near future. Signed from Mansfield Town in 1985, he is the sole survivor from the club's record-breaking Fourth Division championship side.

# **NESTOR LORENZO**

The Argentinian, who played in the World Cup Final, is Swindon's most recent signing, from Italian club Bari, for a club record fee believed to be around £400,000. Nestor has appeared 25 times for his country and was previously with Argentinos Juniors. He made four appearances while on loan, scoring against Portsmouth on his League debut on November 10. Settled well into English league football.

# **ROSS MacLAREN**

Edinburgh born midfielder who has also played in defence. The other 'ever present' in the Swindon side last season, along with Colin Calderwood, Ross has assumed the role of skipper in the absence of his fellow Scot. Signed two years ago from Derby, where he won a Second Division championship medal,

and previously with Shrewsbury Town and Glasgow Rangers.

# TOM JONES

Born Aldershot. Made a speedy recovery from a cartilage operation in the 1989 close season and clearly enjoyed the short ball game favoured by Ossie Ardiles. A former Chelsea apprentice, Tom arrived at Swindon in September 1988 via the circuitous route of Farnborough Town, Weymouth and Aberdeen. Recently switched to the leftback berth in place of the suspended David Kerslake, usually operates in a midfield role.

# **MICKY HAZARD**

Midfielder with great individual skills and shooting ability. Ossie Ardiles' most recent addition to his ex-Tottenham stable at the County Ground. Signed from Portsmouth on September 28 for £130,000. Spent eight years at White Hart Lane, during which time he collected both FA Cup and UEFA Cup winners' medals, before moving across London to Chelsea for a £300,000 fee in 1985.

# STEVE FOLEY

28 year old midfielder with a good goalscoring record. Missed the first three months of last season through injury but was soon buzzing again as the Town fielded an unchanged line-up in 22 successive League and Cup games. A knee injury forced him out again in the spring. Spent four years at Anfield, without making a senior appearance. Signed from Sheffield United for £35,000 in 1987.

# FITZROY SIMPSON

Attacking midfield player who is highly

rated at the County Ground. A former trainee, he made a 30-second debut as a substitute at Shrewsbury in December 1988. Sent off twice last season, but now seems to have overcome his disciplinary problems. During Swindon's recent injury set-backs he has played up front.

# **DUNCAN SHEARER**

Bustling striker who was joint top scorer with 27 goals last season, Duncan has topped his club's scoring list for a fourth successive season (twice with Huddersfield Town) and leads the way again this term with eleven to the end of December. Signed from the Yorkshire club for £230,000, he was previously released by Chelsea on a 'free' transfer. Scored two FA Cup goals against Norwich for Huddersfield in 1987.

### STEVE WHITE

32 year old striker whose goal against Leyton Orient took Swindon through to the 4th Round. Probably the best 'free' transfer signing ever made by Swindon Town, Steve was the other half of the club's 54-goal partnership last season. Previously with Bristol Rovers (twice), Luton Town and Charlton Athletic. He missed the first five weeks of the season with a back injury, sustained during a pre-season tour of Ireland.

## **NICKY SUMMERBEE**

19 year old striker from Altrincham who has yet to start a game for Swindon. He played just 22 minutes of League football in 1989/90 and had been called upon just three times as substitute by the turn of the year this season. Son of the former Town, Manchester City and England forward Mike Summerbee.

# Mark calls time out



MARK WALTON

Frustrated ambition is a common occupational hazard amongst reserve team footballers.

And all must exercise extreme patience, while they wait in the wings for a chance to shine alongside their first-team colleagues.

By necessity, second string goalkeepers are particularly adept at this waiting game – unlike outfield players, goalkeepers are rarely injured, so opportunities to climb the career ladder are naturally limited.

No-one knows this better, at the moment, than Reserve goalie Mark Walton, who has recently asked to go out on loan in order to gain valuable first-team experience.

Since the return of Jonathan Sheffield from Aldershot, the goalkeeping duo have shared the number one slot in Mike Walker's side – a situation which Mark believes is far from ideal.

"For the last six weeks or so, me and

Sheff have been played alternately, which has been a bit frustrating. But I've discussed everything with the manager and we have agreed that it might be best for me to go out on a loan period to gain more experience.

"I would go absolutely anywhere – Third or Fourth Division, it really doesn't matter. I'm just waiting to see what offers come in."

## STILL HAPPY AT CITY

This new development does not mean the 21 year old Welshman is unhappy at Norwich City – far from it. But he's realistic enough to realise that it could be some time before another opportunity arises for him to step into Bryan Gunn's boots.

Mark joined The Canaries from Colchester United in the summer of 1989 and quickly set about proving his worth in the Reserves. But he has Bryan Gunn's wife, Sue, to thank for his first and only outing in the First Team.

While the Norwich number one was settling into a Birmingham hotel, prior to last season's important clash with Aston Villa, Sue went into unexpected labour.

Bryan was released from his duties by Dave Stringer and bequeathed his 'keeping responsibilities to Mark. The news of his impending debut was broken to him on the doorstep of his Colchester home by the local constabulary.

"Everything happened so quickly, I didn't really have the chance to get nervous. It was a great atmosphere and I ended up really enjoying myself."

And what a match it turned out to be – a 3-3 draw in front of an anxious Villa crowd ended the team's Championship hopes and made league honours inevitable for Liverpool. But that was nearly a year ago now, so it's not surprising Mark would like to trade in his Canary colours for a coveted first team shirt elsewhere – for a while at least . . .

"Really the situation was brought to a head when Sheff came back, but there's no bad feeling between us. We get on well and we have both found it difficult. Sharing a spot means you may only play a match every three weeks, which makes maintaining your fitness and sharpness that much harder."

## **KEEPING FIT**

"But obviously having an exgoalkeeper as the Reserve coach helps a lot. We train with all the other lads and do the same things, but afterwards we may do about 30/40 minutes extra of pure goalkeeping training, mainly agility work."

These specialist sessions help the City 'keepers perfect their goalmouth techniques and Mark says he is quite pleased with his performances to date.

"But I would like to lose a little bit of weight," he confessed. "I'm not saying exactly how much or I'll get gip from all the lads."

Commuting from Colchester every day for training at Trowse may seem a long haul, but Mark has lived in the town for the last four years and sees no reason to up sticks. Fellow Reserve player, Steve Ball lives just around the corner and the lads share transport to and from Norwich – picking up Ruel Fox, who lives in Ipswich, along the

"It only takes us just over an hour so it's not too bad and it means I can keep in touch with my mates in Colchester."

A single fellow, Mark invariably spends a fortune eating out. He insists he can cook, but prefers not to!

"I have a varied diet. Anything and everything usually, but I suppose that will have to stop soon," said Mark, probably thinking of the weight he'd like to lose.



# RUEL FOX

Mexico, June 1970 – a crowd of 110,000 spectators pack the country's Aztec Stadium for the eagerly-awaited World Cup Final between Brazil and Italy.

Ninety minutes and five goals later – four scored by the indomitable South Americans – soccer experts were hailing the Brazilian team as the finest footballing side of all time.

It was Brazil's third World Cup victory and their most satisfying. For their outstanding contribution to international football, FIFA allowed them to keep the magnificent Jules Rimet trophy. When it was presented to captain, Carlos Alberto, the huge crowd erupted.

On another continent, in the East Anglian town of Ipswich, Ruel Fox could be forgiven for missing the magic moment – he was just two years old after all.

But over the years to come, the football-mad youngster had numerous opportunities to view the highlights from that classic final and he grew up mesmerised by the style and skills of the mighty Brazilians. It wasn't long before he was naming the entire 1970 team as his heroes . . .

"I suppose people remember Pelé best but the whole team were just brilliant in 1970," said Ruel. "Their individual skills just couldn't be matched. I've got three videos about the Brazilians and I watch them quite often."

## MAGIC ON THE WING

"When I saw the 1970 Final, I was initially impressed by the whole team effort and I think that

was the first time I saw a team using wingers so effectively. I know England had Nobby Stiles to try to counteract Rivelino or Jairzinho but he could not contain players with such great individual skills."

Indeed the speedy Jairzinho had a lot to do with Brazil's World Cup triumph, scoring in every round of the competition, including the final. To get there, the South Americans defeated Czechoslovakia, England, Romania, Peru and Uruguay. European soccer giants, Italy, were the only team left standing between Brazil and the trophy... but they too were to be swiftly despatched.

Ruel Fox can probably recall every move of the game. "Brazil had almost total possession, Italy couldn't get anywhere near them. Before one of the goals, there were about 15 or 16 passes. But it wasn't just aimless passing, they were moving the ball forward all the time."

Soccer supremo, Pelé scored the first goal after just 15 minutes play but Italy swiftly claimed one back with a successful shot from Boninsegna.

Twenty minutes into the second half, Gerson unleashed an unstoppable shot with his left foot to make it 2-1, then set up Brazil's third with a cross to Jairzinho, who scrambled the ball home.

The Italian's misery was made complete when, three minutes from time, Alberto powered home a thundering drive to give the South Americans their fourth goal.

# WRONG BRAZILIAN BLEND

"Before the final, Italy were strongly fancied to win," said Ruel. 'They had just beaten West Germany in the semi's and looked as if they could give Brazil a run for their money.

"But since 1970, Brazil have been a bit disappointing in the World Cup. They are nearly always tipped to win or do well, but for some reason, it hasn't really happened for them. I think they've been a bit unlucky.

"The combination of players has never worked as well as it did in that World Cup, but now I believe they've got some new blood coming through, so who knows? Careca is probably the only Brazilian at the moment with skills to match any of the members of the 1970 team."

Ruel may be fond of his home town, Ipswich, but there is no doubt that, given the choice, he would have preferred to have been brought up in one of the soccer-orientated South American countries.

"I've got one video which shows the team as youngsters – playing football barefoot on the beach and just passing the ball around. Even then, you can see they had talent. South Americans seem to have natural ability on the ball and sometimes I think it would have been nice to have been brought up in one of those countries and have your life totally dominated by football."

And Ruel isn't exaggerating their passion for the game . . .

Where else, but Brazil, would they declare their finest player – Pelé – a national treasure to prevent him being transferred abroad?

# Whatever Happened To ....?



DON HEATH

Don Heath was lucky enough to be involved in great cup exploits for both Norwich City and Swindon Town in the late 1960's.

Stockton born, Don came to the attention of Football League scouts with the success of the Stockton boys team.

'It is only a small town but in 1959-60 we reached the semi-final of the English Schools Trophy at under 15 level. I think six or seven of us were taken on by league clubs. There was John Pickering, Dennis Thwaites, and David Butler who is now the Tottenham physiotherapist.


Don was taken on by his local club Middlesbrough and turned professional in December 1962. He established himself at Reserve level and then saw manager Bob Dennison replaced by Raich Carter.

'Other youngsters were given a chance as the team struggled but I was left out in the cold. At the end of 1963-64 I was given a free transfer. I had plenty of offers, Newcastle amongst them, but my father knew the Norwich scout and I travelled down to Norfolk. I immediately took to the place, Ron Ashman impressed me and fellow Stockton lad Barry Butler convinced me to sign'.

# **DON HEATH**

Don moved to Sprowston and married his girlfriend the following year settling very quickly into Norfolk life. On the pitch Norwich were not taking the football world by storm.

'We had some good players, Ron (Kipper) Davies, Mal Lucas, Gordon Bolland and one of the best midfield players I ever saw, Tommy Bryceland. We were always just one or two players short'.



In February 1967 Norwich were drawn away to mighty Manchester United in the F.A. Cup. United were running away with the Championship and noone gave Norwich a chance.

'I will never forget the day, I scored in our 2-1 win and when we arrived back in Norwich I learned of the birth of my son, it was a real double celebration'.

The arrival of Lol Morgan at Carrow Road hastened Don's departure. Swindon came in for him and when Don said he didn't want to move Morgan told him he would never play in the Norwich first team again.

'I couldn't believe it, we were settled but I was not wanted so I joined Danny Williams at Swindon. The highlight of my career was our fabulous 3-1 League Cup Final victory over Arsenal at Wembley. This led to our participation in Europe and

also the Anglo-Italian tournament which we won, defeating such sides as Napoli, Juventus and Sampdoria'.

Manager Danny Williams left for Sheffield Wednesday and gradually the side broke up. Don moved on to Oldham for two seasons, again linking up with Tommy Bryceland before moving to Peterborough.

'I hoped a return to East Anglia would suit me, but I didn't like Peterborough so I moved back to my native North-East with Hartlepool. About half way through my second season there I was offered a job on the docks which I took. This still allowed me to play part-time with Gateshead and Crook Town'.

Don's involvement with football continued as he scouted for former Swindon team mate Frank Burrows, something he still does when Burrows has managed Sunderland, Cardiff and Portsmouth. Don still worked on the docks and also was a partner in a sports shop in Stockton for three years before selling out his interest.

'I worked on the docks for fifteen years before the closure of the National Dock Labour Board when I took a severance payment and moved to my current job. I now work as stock controller and buyer for a major car and commercial vehicle group which has sixteen companies throughout the country.'

Although Don has returned to Norwich on several occasions he has little contact with any of his former team-mates although he has had occasion to speak to Dave Stringer about various things.

Don's vivid memories of his playing career, especially at Carrow Road, cannot hide the deep affection he still holds for the club and the city of Norwich.

# **NORWICH CITY FA CUP FACTS & FEATS**



The Football Association Cup
This is the fourth time we have been
paired with Swindon Town in the FA Cup
since we first entered the competition in
1902-03.

The first occasion was in 1930-31 when we met at The Nest in the first round. A crowd of 11,800 saw two Frank Peed goals take us through to the second round where we lost by 1-0 at Brentford. Our team that day was: Purdy, Graham, Hardy, Brown, Greenwell, Lochhead, Porter, Jordan, Peed, Tennant, Slack.

In the early stages of our momentous FA Cup run of 1958-59 The Canaries were nearly eliminated at Swindon in the second round. A Jimmy Hill goal earned

a replay at Carrow Road where a single Errol Crossan strike decided the tie in front of 11,724 spectators, a far cry from the 38,000 crowds which flocked to Carrow Road for the later rounds. The team at Swindon was: Nethercott, Thurlow, Ashman, McCrohan, Butler, Crowe, Crossan, Allcock, Bly, Hill, Brennan. For the replay Peter Cleland replaced Terry Bly.

In 1987-88 we travelled to the Country Ground, Swindon for a third round tie which ended goalless on a bone hard surface. In the replay Swindon scored two headed goals which sent The Canaries crashing out of the Cup. Our side at Swindon was: Gunn, Culverhouse, Bowen, Putney, Phelan, Butterworth, Fox, Drinkell, Rosario, Goss, Gordon. Subs: Fleck and Elliott. The same players turned out in the replay with Fleck coming on for Rosario in the second half.

Like ourselves Swindon have yet to reach a FA Cup Final although again, like ourselves, they have reached two semifinals. In 1910 Swindon lost 2-0 to Newcastle United and just two seasons later they lost to Barnsley 1-0, in a replay, after drawing 0-0 at the first attempt.


In The Canaries 78 attempts at lifting the FA Cup this is only the 22nd time we have reached the fourth round. This poor ratio is explained by the fact that in our early years there were often preliminary and qualifying rounds to overcome before even reaching the first round.

In those previous 21 fourth round ties The Canaries have emerged victorious on 14 occasions with Terry Allcock specialising in this particular round scoring eight goals including a four goal blast against Newcastle United in 1962-63

Other Canaries who enjoy the fourth round are Malcolm Allen and Robert Fleck, who scored four and three respectively against non-league Sutton United in 1988-89. Robert Fleck also scored at Anfield last season in a fourth round replay.

decide the venue if a second replay were needed and that would have been back in Middlesbrough.


# **WE'LL MEET AGAIN**


Two others who have a little something to prove will be Lee Chapman and Chris Whyte. Chapman had a short

# Action Replay



FEBRUARY 12th 1966 FA Cup 4th Round

Norwich City 3, Walsall 2

A 3-1 away victory at Leyton Orient in the Third Round gave us a home draw against Walsall in the Fourth Round of the FA Cup. A crowd of 28,754, including approximately 8,000 from the West Midlands, enjoyed an exciting if not a cultured game.

Bryceland almost gave City an unbelievable start but his delicate lob cleared the Walsall bar by inches. Not long after the visitors nearly conceded an own goal; Anderson's left wing cross caused confusion in the goal area and Sissons, under pressure, sliced his clearance straight into his goalkeeper's arms.

A controversial incident seemed to have given Walsall the lead, from a free-kick, Freddie Sharpe partially cleared the ball to Taylor who rammed the ball past Keelan. The referee gave a goal before consulting his

linesman and restarting the game with a free kick to City, presumably for offside.

In retaliation the Canaries twice went close. First Anderson had a header well saved by Carling before he again went close, this time shooting just too high. Both Stringer and Davies had goal attempts as City tried to make their pressure count before half-time.

Walsall were giving it everything, Kirkby seeing his shot hacked off the line by Mullett. Walsall's tactics were not endearing them to the Carrow Road crowd as first Bryceland and then Mullett needed attention following robust challenges.

With a steady drizzle now falling the second half began with Ron Davies being caught offside just as it appeared he was about to score. The game was becoming scrappier as both sides continued to give the ball away.

In the 59th minute Walsall took a shock lead. Atthey's cross was only half cleared to Kirkby who gleefully shot past the out of position Keelan.

Within two minutes City were back on level terms. Stringer's long ball into the box decieved Bennett and fell to Don Heath who steered the ball past Carling from six yards.

The tempo of the game increased with Bryceland becoming the first booking following a foul on Clarke. From the free kick a bad miss by Clarke gave Keelan a let off after he had mishandled a cross.

Despite great territorial advantage City could not make the breakthrough.
Davies headed wide under
pressure from Carling and
Stringer's long shot flew high
into the River End terrace.

In the 75th minute Taylor again gave Walsall the lead. A loose ball bobbled to Taylor who gave Keelan no chance from eight yards.

Frantic Norwich pressure seemed to be having no effect when suddenly in the 84th minute Joe Mullett equalised. He strode forward from the halfway line before thumping the ball high towards the goal, keeper Carling misjudged the flight and the ball nestled into the net.

At last Walsall seemed to buckle and they conceded a needless corner. Heath took the kick and there was Allcock to send his powerful header into the net to make it 3-2 to City with just seconds left. When the final whistle blew it was a relieved City crowd that invaded the pitch in jubilation.

# PHILIP BUGG

Most young Canaries' fans dream of one day running out onto the hallowed Carrow Road turf proudly wearing the famous yellow and green strip to play for their favourite club.

For the vast majority, that dream is destined to be nothing more than a figment of their vivid, juvenile imaginations. But here's one 16 year old who is but a few steps away from achieving his 'dream come true' – City's youngest trainee professional, Philip Bugg.

"I've always been a Norwich fan," says Philip, who has lived all his life a mere six miles away in the village of Alpington, just off the Lowestoft road. "I started coming to the matches with my elder brother, Tom, from the age of ten—I even used to spend my school holidays at Trowse watching the players training."

And "Bugsy" – as he's known to his colleagues – has a drawer full of certificates to testify to the numerous occasions he and his mates were able to persuade Dick Cann to allow them to act as ball boys at Carrow Road matches.

Philip's own footballing career began with the local Poringland under-10 team:

# In The Wings

"We did quite well, winning more than our fair share of cups and medals, as virtually the same group of lads stuck together right through to the under-16's.

"Our coach at Poringland, Colin Watts, was a great help. He taught me most things I know about the game and almost became a second father to me," adds Philip.

Not that he's in any way critical of his own parents, Pauline and Brian:
"They've always been my best supporters, and have literally taken me everywhere for games," says Philip, whose potential came to the attention of the Carrow Road staff when he was

He spent the next two years with Keith Webb and John Waters at City's Centre of Excellence – and took part in the trials for the F.A.'s National School at Lilleshall. He additionally gained schools' representative honours with the South Norfolk district under-14 and under-15 sides and even captained Norfolk county under-14's.

Then Philip seemed to slip out of the mainstream: "The Norwich Centre of Excellence ended at 14 and I didn't hear anything else from the club, and I was away when the Norfolk schools' under-16 trials took place, so I just carried on playing for Poringland," he recalls.

## **NEARLY CHELSEA**

In fact, the talented defender nearly ended up at Chelsea: "I was invited down to Chelsea for trials just before Christmas 1989, but I wasn't feeling too well that day and didn't do as well as I might have, so nothing developed.

"Later that Christmas I played for Poringland in a friendly against Norwich City's schoolboys and I must have impressed because shortly afterwards I had a phone call inviting me to join their squad."

He improved sufficiently during the next six months playing for them under Sammy Morgan – "That was a great experience," says Philip – to be invited when he left Framingham Earl school last summer to take part in pre-season training after which he was chosen to become the club's eleventh trainee.

Not surprisingly as the youngest fulltime member of youth coach Keith Webb's squad, he's had a battle to gain a regular place in the Canaries' under-18 team.

"The competition for places is tough. Centre back is probably my best position, and there's Tim Wooding, Darren Cleveland, Peter Burrows and myself chasing those two spots, while I'm up against Adam Prior for the right back slot. Fortunately, time is on my side. I'm young enough to play youth team football for another two seasons after this one," adds Philip.

# **APPRECIATION**

Colin Watts, who recently joined City's part-time coaching staff, comments: "From a very young age Philip seemed to have a natural appreciation of the game. I played him as the spare man at the back because he possessed an awareness well beyond his years.

"His strengths are his good control and touch on the ball. He's a good passer too. Also he has a very good attitude, he listens carefully, is keen to learn and an ideal young player to handle.

"He fully understands as the youngest trainee he has to sometimes stand on the side as a substitute. From what Keith Webb tells me he is working very hard in training."

Certainly, having reached the stage he has, it's clear Philip Bugg is going to spare no effort to try to complete the often rocky road to success and turn his childhood fantasies into reality.

At this stage I was pleased that we didn't become embroiled in the goings on although we did nearly concede a goal through a lapse in concentration.

The win was nice but it was more important to note the BIG improvement in the team's display. It just goes to show that if EVERYBODY pulls their weight the team can be difficult to beat.






