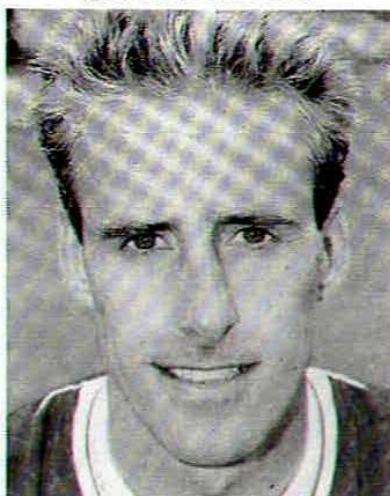

LIONHEARTED defender Mick McCarthy was close to tears as he limped out of last weekend's promotion play-off battle against Brighton with knee ligament trouble.

It wasn't the pain from his injured right knee — although that was bad enough — but the frustration of knowing that it will almost certainly mean another long, lonely fitness battle.

The Republic of Ireland World Cup star spent nearly three months struggling to shake off the leg injury he picked up against Bristol Rovers at the beginning of December.

So you can understand his dejection at the prospect of another spell on the sidelines after just two matches back in the first team.

"It's bitterly disappointing," he admitted after the Brighton game. "I was looking forward

to playing a big part in the run-in — and now this!"

A clumsy late challenge by Brighton's Derek McGrath did the damage, and Millwall are still waiting to find out just how bad it is.

"Mick has damaged some ligaments, but it's too early to say how long he will be out for," explained Millwall manager Bruce Rioch.

"It's a bad blow for him and us! Mick has got an awful lot of good qualities and his experience could have been very important to us.

Certainly everyone at the Den will be hoping that Mick — who now looks certain to miss the Republic of Ireland's European Championship clash with England — makes a speedy recovery.

MANAGER'S MESSAGE

Overall I am very pleased with the way things have gone this season, both on and off the pitch.

We started from a very low ebb after the bitter disappointment of relegation from the First Division, and it was always going to take the players a while to come to terms with that.

They'd worked so hard to get the club into the top flight for the first time ever, and seeing it slip away after only two seasons must have been a very demoralising experience.

When they reported back for pre-season training they also had to get used to a new management team and a completely different style of play.

There have been quite a few comings and goings as well. I glanced at our team photograph in the Portsmouth programme on Tuesday night and worked out that since it was taken in early August, eleven players have left the club.

That's quite a turn-around and it's a tribute to the rest of the players that despite all those changes they have managed to keep us involved in the Second Division promotion race.

Of course I would have liked us to be a bit more consistent and there are quite a few games which we've drawn and lost which on the balance of play we should have won.

But overall the results, and just as importantly the manner of our performances, have been encouraging.

I'm pleased with the way things have gone, but don't think for one moment that I'm content with what we've achieved so far this season.

I'm very ambitious and during the next few weeks I want us to put our foot down hard on the pedal and see if we can grab one of the Second Division's four promotion places.

That's always been our objective. As a manager as well as thinking short term I have also to plan medium/long-term and we are continuing to build the foundations for the future.

We started the season with a 12 match unbeaten run and if we can go one better for the rest of the season we'd be assured of one of the play-off places, at the very least.

The players set a very high standard for themselves against Brighton last weekend, with what must rank as one of our best all-round team performances this season.

There was a lot of passion and commitment. The players knew it was a very important game for us and they responded with great flair and endeavour.

Some of those qualities were in evidence again at Fratton Park on Tuesday night, but unfortunately we couldn't quite turn all our possession into a goal.

The players were disappointed afterwards because they knew that they had created enough chances to have won the match and given our promotion hopes a significant boost.

That disappointment shows how hungry they are for success. I can assure you that no one wants to get this club back into the First Division more than the players themselves.

They have worked tremendously hard so far this



season and if they can show the same single-minded determination over the next few weeks who's to say that they won't achieve that goal, sooner rather than later.

Thanks for your support, and a special vote of thanks to all the supporters who travelled down to Portsmouth on Tuesday night.

INTO THE LIONS DEN

A Day-by-Day Diary

Swindon's joy rapidly turned to despair after they thought they had won promotion to the First Division for the first time in their history last May. They defeated Sunderland in the Wembley final of the promotion play-offs but were then denied promotion after the Football League had found the club guilty of breaches of regulations.

Manager Ossie Ardiles accepted the situation philosophically. "We shall just have to do it all again," he shrugged.

After some poor runs, Swindon are now challenging once again for a place in the play-offs. Our diary takes us through to the most traumatic year of Swindon's existence, commencing last March.

MARCH: 3. Swindon's 3-0 win at Port Vale kept them in third place in the Second Division. Being just five points behind Sheffield United, the Robins still had a chance of winning one of the two guaranteed promotion places.

6. Swindon moved to within two points of Sheffield United following their 3-1 home win over Bradford City. They were then unbeaten in six games.

10. The Robins' third successive victory - by 3-0 at Plymouth - took them into second place, four points behind leaders Leeds.

17. Their run ended with a shock 1-3 home defeat by lowly Hull City.

20. Goalkeeper Kevin Dearden was signed on loan from Tottenham. Defeat at Ipswich (0-1) sent Swindon back into third place.

24. A late equaliser from Paul Bodin earned Swindon a 2-2 draw at Oxford.

31. Swindon were held to 1-1 at home by Leicester, making it four games since they last won.

APRIL: 7. Swindon's poor run ended at Bournemouth where a late goal from Jon Gittens gave them a 2-1 victory.

10. After being beaten 1-2 at home by Brighton, Swindon dropped into fourth place.

14. Accepting that the two guaranteed promotion places were now beyond their reach, Swindon were determined to qualify for the play-offs. A 2-0 home win over Watford kept them well in line for this.

16. A 1-2 defeat at Blackburn on Easter Monday was a blow to Swindon's promotion hopes.

21. A 2-1 home win over W.B.A. left Swindon requiring six points from their three remaining games to be sure of a place in the play-offs.

25. A clash between two sides battling for a play-off place ended 0-0 at Newcastle.

28. Swindon were held to 1-1 at home by relegation-haunted Middlesbrough.

MAY: 5. Duncan Shearer's equaliser earned Swindon a 1-1 draw at Stoke - and that was sufficient to ensure their place in the play-offs.

13. Steve White and Steve Foley got the goals in a 2-1 win at Blackburn in the first-leg of the play-off semi-final.

16. First-half goals from Shearer and White virtually ensured victory over Blackburn. Swindon ultimately won their home-leg 2-1 to go through by 4-2 on aggregate.

28. A crowd of almost 73,000 at Wembley saw Swindon totally outplay Sunderland in the play-off final, though they won by only 1-0. Alan McLoughlin scored the goal. Manager Ossie Ardiles described the occasion as "the greatest day of my football life".

JUNE: 7. The Football League dropped its bombshell - after finding Swindon guilty of 35 breaches of regulations, they relegated the club to Division Three.

13. Swindon decided to apply to the High Court for an injunction seeking to set aside the Football League's decision.

THE SUMMER MONTHS AT THE COUNTY GROUND

After much argument over the League's decision, Swindon ultimately took their case to the FA which decided that, while the club should not be relegated to Division Three, it should not either be promoted to Division One. It was decreed that they would continue to play in the Second Division.

Midfielder John Cornwell was transferred to Southend for £50,000. Mark Jones, another midfield player, joined Cardiff on a free transfer.

AUGUST: 25. Swindon set out upon a new season determined to repeat their previous season's achievement. They got off to a fine start with a 2-1 win away to relegated Charlton.

SEPTEMBER: 13. Right-back John Buttigieg was signed on loan from Brentford.

15. Buttigieg made his debut in Swindon's 1-3 home defeat by Middlesbrough. Defender Adrian Viveash made his League debut in the same game when coming on as substitute in the 70th minute.

18. Swindon defeated Wolves at the County Ground but skipper and centre-back Colin Calderwood suffered a knee injury that was to keep him out of action until February.

21. Defender Dave Bennett was signed from Sheffield Wednesday for £60,000 as replacement for Calderwood.

22. Bennett made his Swindon debut in their 4-2 win at Oxford.

25. Swindon suffered a shock 0-3 defeat away to Fourth Division Darlington in the first-leg of round two in the Rumbelows League Cup. Newcomer Bennett was injured so manager Ossie Ardiles had to go in search of yet another centre-back.

28. Centre-back Nick Tanner was signed on loan from Liverpool. Midfielder Mike Hazard was signed from Portsmouth for £130,000.

30. Tanner and Hazard (as substitute) made their Swindon debuts against the Lions at the County Ground. The game ended goalless.

OCTOBER: 4. Defender Nestor Lorenzo, who played for Argentina in the 1990 World Cup final, was signed on loan from Italian club Bari.

9. Swindon made a remarkable recovery in their Rumbelows Cup tie against Darlington, winning 4-0 to take the tie 4-3 on aggregate.

NOVEMBER: 3. A 1-2 home defeat

DANGER MEN

DUNCAN SHEARER

has been a top scorer in each of his four full seasons in League soccer. He topped Huddersfield's list with 25 and 16 before joining Swindon in 1988. Leading marksman with 16 in his first campaign at the County Ground, Duncan was joint-top scorer with 27 last term. He leads again at the moment with 15.

STEVE WHITE, level top scorer with 27 goals last season, has now hit more than 170 goals in competitive football for Bristol Rovers (in two spells), Luton, Charlton and Swindon. He has netted 10 times this term.

6. After drawing 0-0 at Sheffield Wednesday in the third round of the Rumbelows Cup, Swindon's hope came to an end with a 0-1 home defeat in the replay.

10. Lorenzo marked his debut with the opening goal in Swindon's 3-0 home win over Portsmouth.

DECEMBER: 12. Swindon took an early exit from the Zenith Data Systems Cup at Chelsea.

13. Republic of Ireland international midfielder Alan McLoughlin was sold to Southampton for £1-million.

22. Swindon came from behind with goals from Ross MacLaren and Duncan Shearer to defeat W.B.A. 2-1 at the County Ground and end a run of five League games without a win.

JANUARY: 1. A last-minute equaliser from Steve Foley enabled Swindon to start the New Year with a 1-1 home draw with Plymouth. Unbeaten in eight League games, they were now on the fringe of the promotion race.

5. Though Shearer scored after only five minutes in their third round FA Cup tie at Leyton Orient, Swindon were held to a 1-1 draw.

12. Two goals in the last minute gave Swindon a 4-0 win at Bristol City. It was their best win of the season.

19. Swindon extended their unbeaten League run to 10 games with a 3-1 home win over Hull. They were by then only three points short of seventh place - the lowest position required to qualify for the play-offs.

21. Steve White's goal, two minutes from time was enough to give Swindon victory in their third round FA Cup replay at home to Leyton Orient.

26. But their FA Cup run came to an end in round four with a 1-3 defeat at Norwich.

FEBRUARY: 2. Swindon's unbeaten League run came to an end with defeat at Middlesbrough.

19. A 2-1 home win over Sheffield Wednesday left Swindon five points

below the play-off requirement.

MARCH: 5. A goalless draw at home to Oxford followed two successive defeats. Swindon were then eight points behind the Lions who held seventh place.

6. Wales international left-back Paul Bodin was sold to Crystal Palace for £350,000.

GOALS POWER

Swindon's defence is most vulnerable in the last quarter of an hour. Of the 12 goals it has conceded in the past 10 games, six have come in the closing 15 minutes. But Swindon's forwards are often on target during that period as well.

WATCH OUT — HERE COMES TEDDY!

Lions striker Teddy Sheringham will be looking forward to renewing hostilities with West Bromwich Albion at the Hawthorns next weekend. Sheringham has helped himself to a hat-trick during his last two games against the Midlands club — and now he's out to complete a remarkable hat-trick of hat-tricks!

"I always seem to do well against them," admitted the Millwall marksman. "I shouldn't think they are looking forward to seeing me." When Bobby Gould took over as manager of West Brom three weeks ago, he knew that neither the players or the supporters would be rolling out the red carpet.

The players had made it clear that they wanted caretaker boss Stuart Pearson to succeed Brian Talbot, while the fans feared that Gould's arrival would mean a switch to Wimbledon style long ball tactics. Never one to shirk a challenge, Gould ignored the controversy and set about the task of hauling West Brom clear of the Second Division relegation zone.

It's been a tough start with his first two games in charge pitting West Brom up against Second Division leaders West Ham and third placed Sheffield Wednesday.

They got a point against the Hammers but were beaten 1-0 by Wednesday, a result which leaves them just six points clear of the danger zone.

There's no doubt as to the big game in Division Two this afternoon . . . just across the water at Upton Park. West Ham are playing hosts to their promotion rivals, Sheffield Wednesday.

If that match produces a result, either West Ham will open up a huge gap or Wednesday will halt the Hammers' rampant drive towards the top-flight and open the race a little. On paper, a draw looks the most likely result with Ron Atkinson's team having lost a paltry three times away from Hillsborough this season and Billy Bonds' side unbeaten at home.

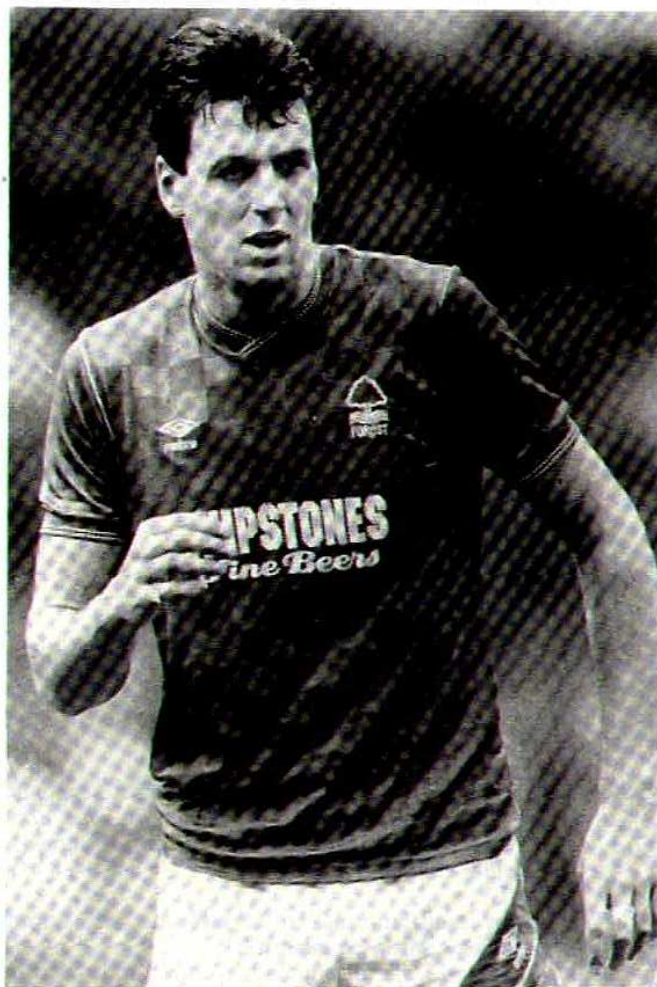
While West Ham will no doubt be most anxious to get back to the First Division they left nearly two years ago, they still have a trifling matter called the FA Cup to contend with. They'll play Nottingham Forest at Villa Park on April 14th in the semi-final of that competition after their 2-1 victory over Everton on Monday night. The England under-21 international, Stuart Slater, scored the winner after Colin Foster had put the home side 1-0 ahead in the first-half. Dave Watson pulled one back later on, but the Hammers held out for their first FA Cup semi-final since 1980 when they won the trophy. Mr Bonds will have to be sure that his team have come down from that win five days ago if they're not to be caught out by Wednesday today.

The other club currently occupying an automatic promotion spot, Oldham Athletic, are on home soil (or should that be 'home plastic') against lowly West Bromwich Albion. You have to feel some sympathy for Albion's new boss, Bobby Gould, who only took over at the Hawthorns seventeen days ago. In that time, he's had to face West Ham (who West Brom drew 0-0 with), last Saturday it was away to Sheffield Wednesday (where they lost 1-0 to a second-half penalty from John Sheridan), and now it's Oldham on their own carpet who've won thirteen of their sixteen home games.

Middlesbrough are away to struggling Leicester, who haven't exactly staged a

recovery since Gordon Lee became the caretaker manager after David Pleat's sacking. Last weekend, City lost a vital relegation match 1-0 at home to Hull. What price for improving on that against Middlesbrough?

Bristol City are away to Newcastle, who are creeping up the table without anyone really noticing after a wretched start to the season. Wolves are at home to Oxford, and Graham Turner's team will be looking to perform a little better than their last game at Molineux. They were beaten 5-0 by Barnsley there last Saturday! And Notts County return to the reality of the Second Division after their FA Cup detour at Tottenham last Sunday. Today, they're away to Bristol Rovers.

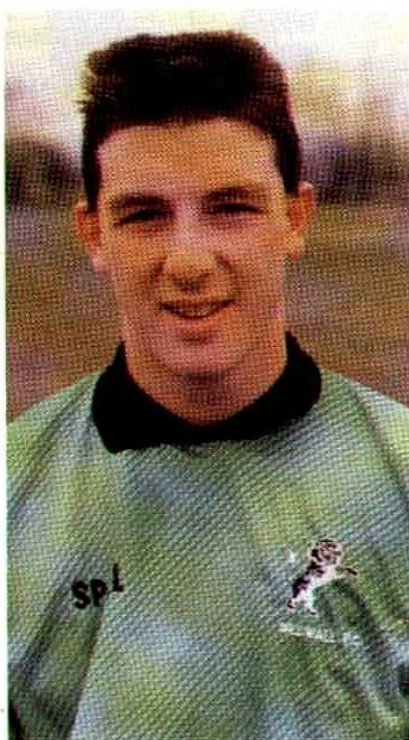

Ireland. There isn't too much time to think, and the players here are obviously better. It's a challenge that I'm looking forward to meeting, and then I'll take it from there.

I haven't come here thinking I'm the greatest. I've never modelled myself on anyone, and I know there are parts of my game that need to be worked on. But I believe that I can only improve from training and playing with the Lions. Hopefully, that'll lead to international honours eventually. But my main concern at the moment is to improve my game and challenge for a first-team place.

I know that's going to be difficult because both Brian Horne and Keith Branagan are excellent 'keepers. The competition for that number one shirt is pretty tough, to say the least! But I'm looking forward to that battle. If anything, it'll raise my game and that can only be good for myself and for Millwall Football Club.

In the meantime, I'm happy watching the first-team in action. The football's been good to watch and, who knows, by the time next season comes around I could be fighting for the goal-keeper's jersey of a First Division club.

Hooligans know cameras are keeping a roving watch and their activities in the ground are inhibited by that knowledge."

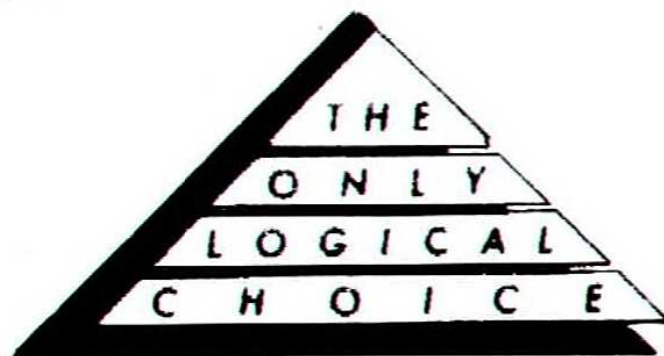

RIOCH FACES OLD CLUB

MILLWALL v
MIDDLESBROUGH

Wednesday, March 20, 7.30 p.m.

Middlesbrough are next up at the Den on Wednesday night in a promotion battle which will have added significance for Millwall manager Bruce Rioch.

During a remarkable four year spell in charge at Ayresome Park, Rioch hauled the club back from the brink of bankruptcy and took them from the Third Division to the First in successive seasons.

Unfortunately Middlesbrough were relegated again 12 months later and a disappointing first season back in the Second Division eventually cost Rioch his job.

He's still held in high regard by Middlesbrough's fans though, and that was demonstrated when he went back there with Millwall in October and got a standing ovation.

Rioch's former assistant Colin Todd inherited the task of guiding Middlesbrough back into the First Division, and despite some disappointing results during the last few weeks, they still fancy their chances of claiming one of this season's four promotion places.

Bernie Slaven's prolific goal scoring exploits have helped keep them in the top 10 all season, and they haven't given up hope of grabbing one of the three automatic places.

A run of six wins in seven games from the end of October to the beginning of December really pushed them into the promotion reckoning.

During that all too brief stay in the First Division they earned a reputation for playing slick, entertaining attacking football — and nothing has changed this season.

Slaven may grab most of the goals, and the

headlines, but his partner Ian Baird has weighed in with 11 and Millwall will also have to watch out for attacking midfielder Paul Kerr.

Rioch knows all about their strengths and weaknesses of course, and he'll be out to avenge the Lions 2-1 defeat at Ayresome Park, a setback which ended Millwall's 12 match unbeaten start.

It wasn't the Lions best performance of the season by any stretch of the imagination, but it still took a freak own goal by Alex Rae to put Middlesbrough ahead 10 minutes after the break.

As if that wasn't bad enough Millwall then let John Hendrie waltz his way past several half-hearted challenges before wrapping up the points with a fierce shot past Brian Horne.

Rae partially atoned for his earlier clanger when he tucked home Millwall's goal five minutes from the end but it was a case of too little, far too late.

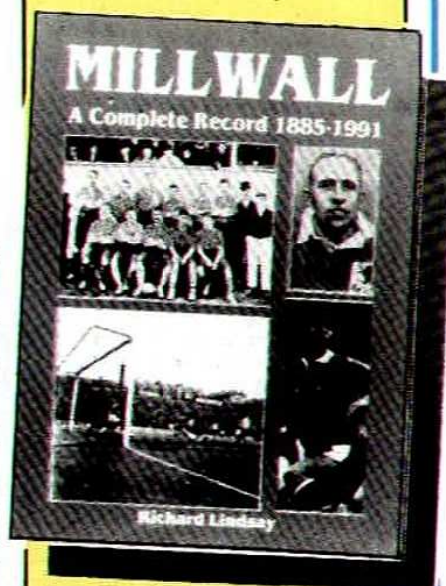

MILLWALL v SWINDON TOWN

All Lions' fans will be hoping that we can improve still further our marvellous recent record against

Swindon. We have been beaten just once in our last 18 home and away League games against the Wiltshire club.

We are unbeaten in our last 11 League games at The Den. George Lawrence opened the scoring in the 21st minute of our last meeting here in October 1987. Steve Foley equalised in the 71st minute, only for Teddy Sheringham to restore our advantage two minutes later. Swindon salvaged a point when Jimmy Quinn converted a penalty eight minutes from the end.

Our last win at The Den was achieved in October 1980 when Nick Chatterton, Tony Kinsella and Chris Dibble all found the target in a 3-1 success. Alan Mayes got the Swindon goal.

One of the most critical games between the sides took place in April 1976. We travelled to the County Ground for our last match of the season, needing to win to maintain a serious chance of winning promotion to the Second Division.

Second-half goals from John Seaman and Phil Summerill gave us the 2-0 win we needed and that put us into second place. But Cardiff, with one game left, and Crystal Palace, with two to play, could both have overtaken us had they collected maximum points. We had to wait eight days, until Palace dropped a point in a goalless home game with Chesterfield, before we could start our promotion celebrations.

One of the most memorable of our recent games here was in March 1980 when Bobby Shinton and John Lyons both scored twice, with Tony Tagg and Tony Towner also contributing to a 6-2 victory. We even scored one of Swindon's goals, John Sitton conceding an own-goal. Andy Rowland claimed Swindon's other goal.

GOAL-DEN MEMORIES

We have to go back to November 1962 to trace Swindon's last League victory at The Den — and that was certainly an exciting match. 15 YEARS AGO: Barry Kitchener's eighth minute goal was enough to give the Lions a 1-0 home win over Sheffield Wednesday. Swindon — like us, playing in the Third Division — won 2-0 at Halifax. Dave Syrett scored twice.

20 YEARS AGO: Top scorer Derek Possee gave the Lions a 10th minute lead in a Second Division match at Bolton. But the Lancastrians, who were struggling against relegation, equalised three minutes later. The match ended 1-1. Swindon lost to an 89th minute Bobby Kellard goal at Leicester, who were top of the Second Division.

25 YEARS AGO: Unbeaten in 10 games, the Lions fought hard to improve that record at Scunthorpe. We took the lead in the 11th minute through Eamon Dunphy, but we were hauled back on the half-hour. After that, we fell behind three times. But each time we equalised — twice through Billy Neil and once through Ken Jones, who scored in the 89th minute to secure a 4-4 draw. Dropping a point allowed Hull to move above us to the top of the Third Division. Swindon, who were fourth, lost 0-1 at Bournemouth.

Once again manager BENNY FENTON relied on the squad, his only new signing was that of much travelled striker BRIAN CLARK from CARDIFF CITY for £35,000.

The Lions made a miserable start to the season, gaining just one point from their first four matches.

MILLWALL'S first win was at The Den against HULL CITY 3-0. CLARK scored his first goal for the club, whilst WOOD and BOLAND added the others. The game was watched by 7,148, the lowest League attendance since 1971.

WOOD was on the mark again in the 1-0 home victory over SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY.

A fine 3-1 away win at SWINDON was followed by four successive defeats. After these losses the Lions found themselves fourth from bottom in the League with seven points from eleven matches.

CLARK scored the only goal of the game at BOLTON, and then WOOD hit a hat-trick against PRESTON NORTH END in their 5-1 win at The Den.

During October MILLWALL sold wing-half DENNIS BURNETT to HULL CITY for £60,000. BURNETT had joined them in August 1967 from WEST HAM UNITED and made over 250 League appearances for the Lions.

FENTON had made many

changes to try and stop the rot.

DONALDSON, a full-back from ARSENAL took over from BRIAN BROWN at right-back, while on the other flank EDDIE JONES ousted Den "Favourite" CRIPPS for a while. Young winger GORDON HILL had taken the number eleven spot from ALLDER and was turning in some sparkling performances, much to the delight of the fans.

By December DUNPHY had departed, and joined neighbours CHARLTON ATHLETIC for a £20,000 fee.

The Lions were still struggling by the end of the year, and were eighth from bottom with 20 points from 23 matches.

On New Year's day MILLWALL gained a point at ASTON VILLA (0-0). Next was a 1-1 draw at HULL CITY, MILLWALL's fifth consecutive League draw.

History was to be made in the following match. On January 20th 1974 MILLWALL met and defeated FULHAM 1-0 at The Den in the first ever League match to be played on a Sunday. CLARK scored for The Lions. Attendance: 15,143.

Young HILL scored twice in the 3-0 win at OXFORD to lift the Lions to twelfth in the League.

However, the Lions were unable to maintain a winning run, but were able to keep away from the relegation zone, and finish half way in the table with these uncanny statistics.

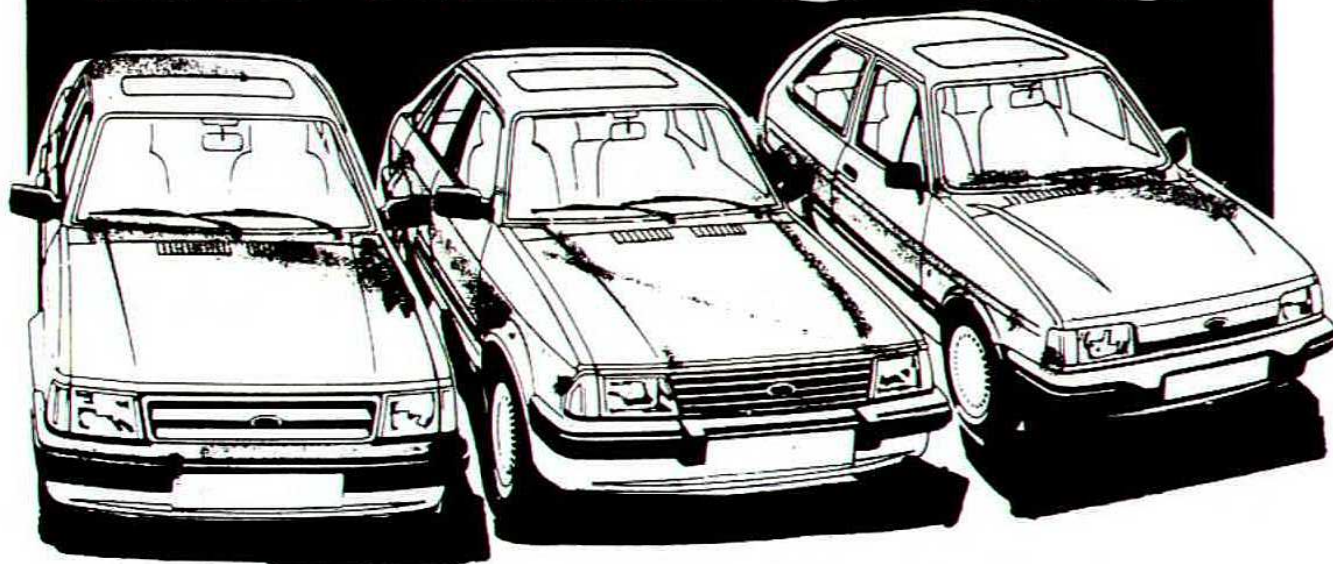

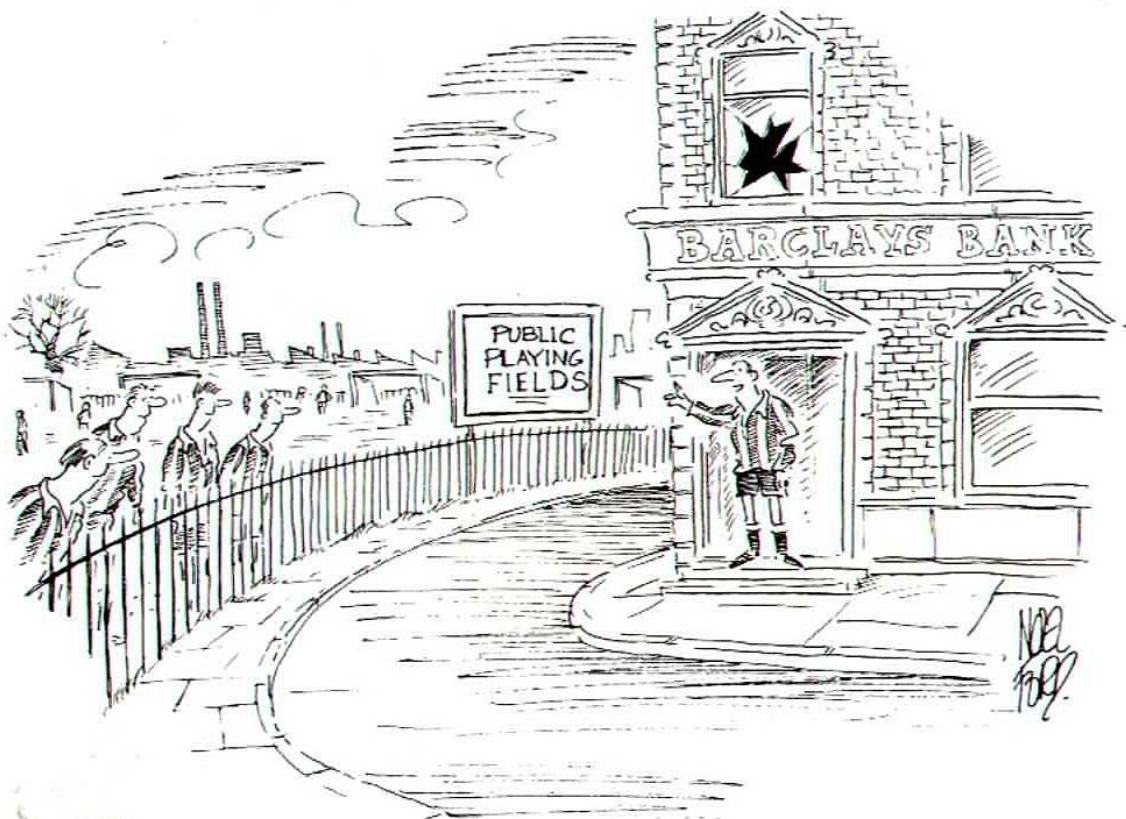
