

GLENN HODDLE

Following Ossie Ardiles departure last weekend for Newcastle United the Board of Directors are delighted to announce the appointment of Glenn Hoddle as the new manager of Swindon Town Football Club.

Former Celtic and Tottenham Hotspur player John Gorman comes to the County Ground as Glenn's number 2.

Glenn made his Tottenham debut as a 17 year old and collected two F.A. Cup winners medals in his time at White Hart Lane as well as helping Spurs win the UEFA Cup in 1984. Glenn was capped 53 times for England before his departure for Monaco in 1987. He was released by the top French side last December when his playing career was threatened by his failure to recover from a serious knee injury.

Glenn says "I'm hoping to resurrect my playing career and maybe it could be next season – who knows?"

He continued "I am pleased to have been able to come to Swindon, I know of the problems and disappointment the Club has had in the past but we now have to look to the future".

Chairman Ken Chapman says that he is delighted to have a person of Glenn's experience and calibre at the County Ground. "I would also like to put on record our thanks to Ossie Ardiles and Tony Galvin for everything they have done for the club in the past".

HMS MARLBOROUGH

Swindon Town Football Club recently became the second Football League Club to set up a link with one of the new Royal Navy Frigates being built. Norwich City have been linked with the Squadron Leader HMS Norfolk and we are pleased to have joined up with the second 'Duke' Class Frigate HMS Marlborough.

This afternoon we welcome as our guests to the County Ground members of the crew of HMS Marlborough who will receive a presentation from Chairman Ken Chapman on behalf of Swindon Town F.C.

In return we will be guests of the Royal Navy at the commissioning ceremony of HMS Marlborough at Plymouth on June 14.

Marlborough has a standard displacement of 3,500 tonnes, her length is 133 metres and her beam 14.4 metres. Her complement is 170 officers and men.

Designed primarily for the antisubmarine role, the ship is fitted with the latest sonar, radar and communications systems, and will carry Stingray torpedoes and a Lynx anti-submarine helicopter, which will ultimately be replaced by the new EH101 helicopter. Air defence is provided by a vertical launch Sea Wolf missile system, while Harpoon missiles and a 4.5" gun provide a very effective allround surface warfare capability.

The ship's propulsion system is new and unique, and combines a diesel-electric drive for quiet running with boost drive for high speeds from two Spey gas-turbine engines. Machinery spaces are completely unmanned, with all surveillance being carried out by an up-to-the-minute microprocessor control system.

The Duke class frigates will eventually form the backbone of

the Royal Navy's frigate force, and these highly capable, cost effective ships will serve well into the next century.

The ships of the class are all named after Dukes, with Norfolk already at sea, and Argyll, Lancaster, Iron Duke, Monmouth, Montrose, Westminster and Northumberland soon to follow Marlborough. The ships will form the Ninth Frigate Squadron, with Norfolk as the Squadron Leader.

WELCOME HORNETS

BARCLAYS LEAGUE

After today's game we now have three consecutive away games in the Barclays League, Next Saturday we travel to meet Plymouth Argyle at Home Park kicking-off at 3.00pm. Then on Tuesday 16April we play our rescheduled game with Wolverampton Wanderers at Molineux with a 7.30pm kickoff. This game fell foul of the snow back in February. In two weeks time, on Saturday 20 April, we clash with West Ham United at Upton Park in a game which is all ticket. The Hammers are due to play their F.A. Cup semi final with Nottingham Forest at Villa Park next Saturday so we could well be meeting the F.A. Cup finalists. For our game at Upton Park seats went on sale to season ticket holders only last Saturday. Cup voucher F has to be produced with the correct remittance of £9 per seat. Tickets are being sold on a one to one basis due to the very limited allocation. Terrace tickets are on general sale at £6 each. We regret that there are no juvenile/senior citizen reductions available for this game. Our next home League game is on Tuesday 23 April when we entertain Notts County kicking off at 7.45pm. Again this is the start of another run of three consecutive home fixtures. Leicester City and Barnsley complete the hat-trick of visitors.

On Wednesday 17 April they travel to play Brighton & Hove Albion at the Goldstone Ground where the kick-off is at 7.15pm. The week is completed with a return to the South Coast and Portsmouth at Fratton Park with a 2.00pm. start.

This coming Monday the Youth Team have a South East Counties meeting with Colchester United at the University of Essex with a 12.00 noon kick-off. The lads finish the month off with home games against Brentford on 13 April, Bristol City on 20 April and Brighton & Hove Albion on 27 April. All three games have 11.00am kick-offs at Southbrook

Next season Watford are to share their Vicarage Road Stadium with Beazer Homes side Wealdstone, who have sold their ground at Harrow to a supermarket chain.

NO COINCIDENCE

Figures released last week state that in the first thirty one weeks of this season average gates in Division Two have dropped by 9.7% while First Division average attendances have risen by 9.5%. We don't have to look any further than Elland Road to see why.

UPS AND DOWNS

With just one month left of this season we list here the following places in the Football League which will be involved in promotion and relegation. Division 1 - bottom two relegated. Division 2 - top three promoted and next four play off for fourth promotion place; bottom two relegated. Division 3-top three promoted with next four playing in play offs for fourth promotion slot; bottom three relegated. Division 4 - top four promoted and next four play off for promotion; no relegation this season into the Vauxhall Conference but one team will come up into the Football League.

WARNING

Recently a supporter foolishly entered the field of play during a match here at the County Ground. This is a very serious offence and could have resulted in dire consequences for the Club had the matter been reported. The Board of Directors have, as a result of the supporter's actions, banned him from attending any future games at the County Ground and have warned that they will not hesitate in taking such actions again.



SEASON BY SEASON

We continue our look back at Swindon Town through the years . . .

1980/81

COMINGS AND GOINGS

The close season saw a good deal of transfer market activity. Andy Rollings, an expensive centre half, was signed from Portsmouth, while Colin Barrett was obtained from Nottingham Forest on a free transfer. Andy Ford went to Gillingham for £25,000 and Wilf Trantor, who resigned as Chief Coach for personal reasons, was replaced by Dennis Butler.

LEAGUE CUP TRAIL

Swindon needed extra time in a two leg First Round tie against Bournemouth before emerging 3-1 winners on aggregate. The Second Round saw them overcome Lincoln City by a similar margin. David Hughes made his debut in the first leg but all the goals came in the second with Alan Mayes bagging two for the Town. Round Three saw Swindon drawn at Anfield where Liverpool were comfortable 5-0 winners.

DANGEROUS START

Swindon had a terrible start in the League, losing their first five matches and being left at the foot of the table. David Peach and Andy Rollings were transfer listed and attempts were made to sign players from the American League as key players like Kenny Stroud and Billy Tucker were sidelined by injuries and Brian Williams left out over a contract dispute.

BYE BYE BOBBY

Lack of form and injuries led to the recall of veteran John Trollope and his return saw Swindon gain their first points of the season in a 2-1 win at home to Rotherham. Six points from nine games was not impressive but with the slight

upturn in fortunes it came as a shock when Swindon gave Bobby Smith the sack on the day of their clash with local rivals Oxford at the Manor and less than a year after he had taken them within one step of a Wembley final. The Boardroom decision does not seem to have been unanimous, but money spent on expensive players who flopped and the signing of players from America who had to be payed even though they could not play, cannot have helped Smith's case.

NEW RECORD, NEW ROLE

A 1-1 home draw with Carlisle saw Trollope break the record for most League appearances for one club. John increased his total League appearances to 770 before being appointed Swindon's new manager. Later in the season he was to win the PFA Merit Award and join such illustrious names as Matt Busby, Bobby Charlton, Bill Shankly and Tom Finney. His first Cup tie in charge proved an exciting tussle at the County Ground and Swindon had Chris Kamara to thank for an 85th minute goal which gave them a 3-2 win over Weymouth. It was Swindon's only win in the competition that season. Round two saw the Town go down 2-0 at Wimbledon so that for the first time in nineteen years the club did not feature in the Third Round.

YOUNGEST EVER

Paul Rideout made his League debut against Hull City. At 16 years, 107 days he became Swindon's youngest ever player, breaking the previous record of Ernie Hunt who had been 16 years, 182 days. Paul suffered the disappointment of seeing a tremendous shot rocket into the net only to be disallowed for

someone else being offside, but he still managed to cap his day by scoring in the last minute of the Town's 3-1 win.

END OF A PARTNERSHIP

The Mayes-Rowland partnership was broken when Alan Mayes was sold to Chelsea for £200,000 for financial reasons. Fortunately Andy Rowland declined a move to Hull City. Andy emerged as an unlikely hero when he donned the keeper's jersey after Jimmy Allen was injured at Newport's Somerton Park and held the County attack at bay for an hour in a 2-0 victory. Later in the season Andy again proved his value in a more likely role, scoring three in a 5-2 home win over Sheffield United.

LAST DAY ESCAPE

John Trollope had taken over with Swindon deep in relegation trouble. He had been forced to sell and given no money to strengthen his squad so the escape from relegation was one for which he must take great credit. A 0-0 home draw hardly sounds a dream result but it gave Swindon a vital point which kept them in Division Three while Sheffield United sank into Division Four as the result of a last minute Walsall penalty at Bramall Lane. Swindon's escape saw champagne celebrations and even the Evening Advertiser was provoked to quote Benjamin Disraeli's remark that constancy of purpose is the basis of success. However, the fact that no fewer than five first team players -Allan, Carter, Kamara, Miller and Williams - declined new contracts indicated that troubled water still lay ahead.

Last weekend Ossie Ardiles was in charge here. In his usual after-match interview he said the Newcastle link-up was all speculation on which he wouldn't comment!! Within hours he had agreed to the move to Tyneside and was saying goodbye to the players here. Right from the off, from the media's viewpoint, he was readily available, or putting forward Chic Bates and latterly Tony Galvin to make public comment.

I gather the interest in his every move at St. James' Park will be even more intense. We all know

The Football Trust 1990 has been created to help the game at all levels and to assist clubs meet the requirements of Lord Justice Taylor's Final Report.

Safety and comfort for all spectators is the primary objective and substantial funds have been made available for the provision of seating at Football League grounds. At the same time the Trust's commitment to family and community initiatives will continue with the provision of more family enclosures, better toilet facilities, covered accommodation, artificial pitches for local use and the development of women's and junior football particularly through community programmes, plus a wide range of policing and crowd control measures.

Each year The Trust expects to receive £20 million from the reduction in Pool Betting Duty plus the £10 million continuing contribution from the Spotting-the-Ball competition organised by Little-woods, Vernons and Zetters. This money will be invested in projects which benefit football throughout the United Kingdom.







Manager Steve Perryman has been involved in a desperate struggle since his arrival at Vicarage Road to avoid the Club's relegation into Division Three where Watford last saw action in 1979. However, recent results have seen the Hornets gain valuable points to prove that they do not intend to give up their membership of the Second Division without a fight.

Following an impressive playing career with Tottenham Hotspur, where he made 665 League appearances, Perryman moved to Oxford United, making just 17 appearances for our neighbours before a move to Brentford where he was to become player/ manager. With Colin Lee's departure earlier this season Steve Perryman took the helm with full intention of keeping the Hertfordshire club in Division Two.

It was during the 80's that Watford saw their most successful period of football when they were promoted in 1982 from Division Two and were First Division runners-up the following season. This saw the Hornets into the UEFA Cup competition for the first time and progressed through to the Third Round where they were defeated 7-2 on aggregate by Sparta Prague. In the same season Watford were runners-up in the F.A. Cup, losing out to Everton at Wembley 2-0. Watford had previously risen from Division Four to Division Two in consecutive seasons from 1978-1980.

An ever-present in the League this season in goal is 20 year old David James who signed for Watford as a Youth Trainee in July 1986. He signed professional forms two years later and, following the departures of Tony Coton and Mel Rees, David was thrust into first team action - a challenge he has responded to magnificently. He is one of a rare breed of goalkeepers to have scored direct from drop-kicks, a feat he has performed twice for Watford's Reserve and Youth sides. Am imposing 6'4", he was a member of Watford's F.A. Youth Cup winning side in 1988.

Another former Watford apprentice is full back Nigel Gibbs, who was sidelined at the start of the season following a foot operation. This was the former England Youth and U-21 International's only break from first team action in three years. Now in his ninth season at Vicarage Road, he is still only just 25 and has made over 200 senior appearances.

Yet another product of Watford's highly successful Youth Scheme is 20 year old Bristol-born Jason Drysdale, who was one of the first graduates from the F.A. School of Excellence at Lilleshall. A former England Youth Cap, he is another member of the team who hoisted the coveted F.A. Youth Cup for Watford in 1988.


When Willie Falconer was signed from Aberdeen in June 1988 for £30,000 he was Watford's sole Scottish player. An ex-Scottish Youth International, Willie has usually been selected to play on the left side of midfield but has also played at left back.

35 year old Glenn Roeder fulfil's a dual role at Vicarage Road as player, when required, and also as Reserve Team coach, his first managerial appointment. As a player he has had a long and distinguished career, beginning at Leyton Orient and, en route to Watford, took in Queens Park Rangers, Notts County on loan and Newcastle United. He also has six England 'B' caps to his name and

has played as an orthodox central defender as well as a sweeper.

Keith Dublin was signed last summer for a tribunal-set fee of £275,000 from Brighton & Hove Albion. Prior to Brighton he had been at Chelsea, where he was in the company of former Watford manager Colin Lee. Dublin made 66 appearances for Chelsea and 149 for Brighton while at the Goldstone Ground.

Key man in Watford's midfield is twenty five year old Gary Portér, another from Watford's junior ranks. He missed the run-in last season after breaking an ankle at Middlesbrough in March. As well as almost 200 senior appearances for Watford, Gary can add the twelve caps obtained at U-21 level, having formerly represented the country's Youth Team.

Hammersmith born David Byrne signed in at Watford for a £50,000 fee from Plymouth Argyle in November last year. A member of Millwall's Division Two championship winning side of 1987/88, David has previously been with Gillingham and on loan with Cambridge United, Blackburn Rovers and Bristol Rovers.

Paul Wilkinson has been Watford's top scorer in the two seasons he's been at Vicarage Road since signing for £300,000 from Nottingham Forest in August 1988. He actually played against Watford for Grimsby Town, where he started his career in an F.A. Cup Fourth Round tie in January 1985. His 16 goals last season came in singles save for a brace against Bradford City. He is a former England U-21 International. This season he has been on the score sheet on thirteen occasions to date.

After a long and productive association with West Ham United,

Alan Devonshire moved to Vicarage Road on a free transfer last summer. At Upton Park Devonshire made 442 appearances, scoring 32 goals. He is normally fielded on the left side of midfield, in which position he holds eight full England caps. He would have won more but for a knee injury which sidelined him for 18 months.

Peter Nicholas was signed last month from Chelsea for £175,000 and made his debut for The Hornets in the 2-1 home defeat by Newcastle United. A Welsh full and U-21 International, Peter has also had two spells with Crystal Palace, making 221 appearances in total. His playing career has also taken in Arsenal with 73 appearances, Luton Town (69) and Aberdeen (39 appearances). While at Stamford Bridge Peter was a member of Chelsea's Division Two championship winning side.

Currently nearing the end of a month's loan at his former Club, Nigel Callaghan made 278 appearances for Watford before a £130,000 transfer in February 1987 took him to Derby County. Two years later Aston Villa paid £525,000 to take him to Villa Park. Callaghan is a former England full and U-21 International.

Just prior to last week's transfer deadline Watford signed 29 year old striker Steve Butler from Maidstone United for £150,000. Butler started his career with Vauxhall Opel League side Windsor & Eton before joining Wokingham Town. He then spent a non-contract period at Brentford, three months before Steve Perryman took over at Griffin Park and then signed for Maidstone United in July 1989. In his and Maidstone's, first season in League soccer he netted 26 goals in 55 outings and, to date this season, has bagged 26 in 41 appearances.



FROM THE TREATMENT ROOM

There has been publicity recently highlighting the fate of ex-professional footballers who have been crippled by too many injections in their playing days. Many ex-players are suffering from disabilities today, caused by the injudicious use of these injections.

Basically there are two types in common usage.

1. The Pain Killing Injection

This simply delivers an anaesthetic which numbs a local area – rather like the injection your kind dentist gives you prior to drilling your teeth!

The presence of pain in the body alerts us to the fact that there is something wrong. If this pain is numbed by an injection and the player participates in his match, he risks making that injury worse. Repeated injections into the same area will inevitably create long-term ill-effects, particularly in later life.

The only justification for such an injection prior to a match is when there is no chance of any adverse reaction. A painful toe due to an ingrowing nail, for example, comes into this category.


2. The Steroid Type Injection

These can be of great value and, if used correctly, can assist getting player fit more quickly.

Soft tissue injured heal by the body producing scar tissue which forms a bridge around the damaged area. At times the body produces an excess of this scar tissue which can cause pain and loss of mobility. If these problems persist, injecting the area with a steroid based substance should cause the excess scar tissue to be released, thus relieving pain and restoring normal mobility.

Criteria for the use of these injections are fairly stringent to safeguard the individual, and are as follows:-

- Injection never given less than 10 days following injury. This allows time for the normal tissue healing process.
- 2. Must never be given directly into a tendon as this can result in the tension weakening.
- 3. The injected area must not be subjected to exercise for 48 hours.
- No more than 3 injections into the same area spread over a period of 6/9 weeks.
 If the above principles are followed there should be no risk of any adverse effects.




