SWINDON TOWN

Bobbin' Robins

Today we welcome a
Swindon team near the
foot of Division Two in
what is something of an
anti-climactic season for
them after last season's
'promotion' to Division One
that was taken from them
by a Football League ruling.

This was easily the most dramatic chapter in the history of a club that dates back to 1881. They were known at first as Swindon Spartans, becoming Swindon Town in 1883 and joining the Southern League in 1884. They

finished bottom of nine clubs in their first season there but after being runners-up in 1909 and 1910 they topped the table in 1911. Meanwhile they reached the FA Cup semi-final in both 1910 and 1912 and took Barnsley to a replay in the latter.

They were Southern League champions again in 1914 and together with other members of that league they became founder-members of the new Division Three in 1920. This became Division Three (South) a year later and they stayed there throughout its existence until 1958. They then qualified for the new Division Three and stayed there until winning promotion for the first time ever in 1963. Then, although relegated two seasons later they got together one of the best Third Division sides ever with Mike Summerbee, Ernie Hunt, Bobby Woodruff and Don Rogers amongst the players who ultimately passed on to First Division clubs. Though Don Rogers was the only one of these stars remaining by then, they reached the semi-final of the FA Cup in 1966/7 and won promotion and the Football League Cup in 1968/9.

They stayed up this time until 1974, but then came a sudden slide that landed them in Division Four in 1982. Then after four seasons there they roared back to Division Three in 1985 and the momentum carried them up to Division Two a year later after battling through the playoffs. They finished twelfth. sixth and fifth in the next three seasons as they bid for a place in Division One for the first time ever. They lost to Crystal Palace in the 1988/9 playoffs but then beat Blackburn and Sunderland at that stage last season. At first the Football League demoted them to Division Three, but on appeal they were allowed to remain in Division Two.



Had this game been played on 12th February, as scheduled, then we would have been talking to Ossie Ardiles in this column. However, his departure to Newcastle at Easter was swiftly followed by the arrival of another glamorous footballing name, Glenn Hoddle, into the managerial hot seat at the County Ground.

"Obviously management is a lot different to playing," Glenn told Molinews last week, "But after my first week in the job I'm begining to settle in."

Glenn's task at Swindon is not just to settle into the job of boss but to get himself fit. He told Molinews "I'm looking to resurrect my career, if my knee holds up". Good news for his many admirers and hopefully we will see him at Molineux next season, if both teams are still in the second division.

"We've got to get some points before we're sure of that," Glenn comments.

Ardiles's team was known for playing attractive football, and Glenn Hoddle is committed to a similar style.

"Our best chance of success is to play good football. There are some good points here at Swindon, but I think there's a lot I can bring to the side and add to our play."


Not surprisingly, Glenn's favourite memory of encounters with Wolves was the F.A. Cup semi-final of 1981, which ended with Spurs winning the replay at Highbury 3-0. He also recalls, when he was a Spurs schoolboy, the UEFA Cup final of 1972, which Spurs won 3-2 on aggregate over the two legs. Glenn hasn't been to Molineux

STAR VISITOR — DUNCAN SHEARER

Swindon's leading scorer both last season and this, Duncan Shearer has proved good value for the £250,000 paid to Huddersfield Town in August 1988.

Born in Fort William in 1962. he played for Clacknacuddin before linking up with Chelsea in 1983. After scoring regularly in their Football Combination side he made his first team debut in the 2-2 draw with Leicester in February 1986 and found the net in a 2-2 draw. After only two first team games, however, he moved to Huddersfield in March 1986 for a £10,000 fee and in his first full game got a hat-trick at Barnsley, following up with two goals against Stoke in the next



Last season was his most prolific to date with a goal against us at the County Ground in September and a full tally of 26. This season he kicked off with matchwinners in the opening games against Charlton and Ipswich and his career tally has now passed the hundred mark in under 250 games, a remarkably high scoring rate in football today. THIS SEASON

Swindon Town kicked off their unexpected season in division two with a victory at Charlton Athletic 2-1 and 1-0 at home to Ipswich.

But the downfall of Swindon this season has been their penchant for drawing games. To date they've managed to end up level in 17 matches in all competitions so far this season.

They went out of the Rumbelows League Cup to Sheffield Wednesday after a third round replay. In the F.A. Cup Norwich were their vanquishers in the fourth round when Swindon had two players sent off at Carrow Road.

They have slipped badly in recent weeks and have only managed one victory in their last ten games.

Victory over Sheffield Wednesday 2-1 at the County Ground, just prior to that poor run, had raised hopes. But their solitary win since February 19th was 3-2 over Newcastle at home on Easter Saturday.

Last week they suffered a worrying 2-1 defeat at home to struggling Watford.



Roger 'Ernie' Hunt had an excellent career in football. He served as a professional with six different clubs between 1960 and 1975 and in all amassed well over 460 appearances and scored some 165 goals in League competition alone. He also won three England Under 23 caps.

Born in Swindon on 17th March 1943, 'Ernie' (so-called after the Liverpool and England striker) signed for his home town club as an amateur in 1958 and then turned 'pro' at The County Ground in March 1960. He made his League debut during that season and went on to accumulate close on 250 appearances for Swindon (scoring almost 100 goals) before transferring to Wolves in September 1965.

At Molineux he quickly became the fans' idol and teamed up splendidly in midfield with Peter Knowles, Davey Burnside and Mike Bailey (plus a few others) and helped Wolves regain their First Division place.

In all he had 82 games in the gold and black, netting 35 times, up to September 1967 when he moved to Everton, quickly switching back to the midlands with Coventry City in March 1968.

At Highfield Road he paired up with Willie Carr (later to play for Wolves) and together they introduced the infamous 'donkey-kick'.

After a good spell with the Sky Blues, and nine goals on loan to Doncaster Rovers, 'Ernie' went off to play for Bristol Rovers, whom he served from December 1973 until the end of the 1974-75 season when he pulled out of big time football to play in local non-League circles.

Recently he was working as a window-cleaner down in Wiltshire.

PAST ENCOUNTERS

Prior to this evening's game Wolves and Swindon have only met each other three times in the Football League — and of those three previous encounters, Swindon have won two and Wolves one.

The first clash took place at The County Ground on 3rd September 1989 when a crowd of 10,312 saw Town win 3-1, their goals coming from Tom Jones, Alan McLoughlin and Duncan Shearer, while Andy Thompson replied for the Wanderers.


In the return fixture, played at Molineux on 20th January 1990, two second-half efforts by Paul McLoughlin gave Wolves a 2-1 revenge victory. Steve White netted for Swindon and the gate was a creditable 17,210.

The third - and latest tussle - went in favour of Swindon, who won 1-0 at The County Ground earlier this season when a crowd of 12,228 saw Town's Fitzroy Simpson net the only goal of the match in the 61st minute.

Back in 1979-80 Wolves, as you all well know, won the League Cup — and in the semi-final they knocked

out Swindon, beating them 4-3 over two legs. The result at Swindon ended in a win for the home side by 2-1, but in the return, when the crowd topped 41,000, Wolves turned on the style to win 3-1, John Richards (2) and Mel Eves scoring the vital goals.

The second division's chance of having a representative in each of the two major domestic cup finals went west at Villa Park when Hammers defender Tony Gale was controversially sent off in the first half of the F.A. Cup semi-final against Nottingham Forest.

West Ham will no doubt earn the consolation of gaining promotion this season, but that's little comfort for fans and players alike, who were denied a real contest by referee Keith Hackett's decision.

The division's Rumbelows League Cup finalists, Sheffield Wednesday, left it late but got the right result agaisnt Middlesbrough at Hillsborough on Saturday. With 'Boro hot on their heels in the league, victory was essential for Ron Atkinson's side. And, in front of more than 30,000 fans, Paul Williams scored twice in three minutes to keep them in the frame.

Dutchman Eric Van der Laan is finding the back of the net regularly since coming into the Port Vale side, and it was he who gave them a surprise lead at Millwall on Saturday.

The Lions roared back five minutes later to go in level at half time, but Darren Beckford, who will be leaving Vale Park at the end of the season, earned John Rudge's side maximum points with a winner in the 89th minute and started the play-off jitters at Millwall.

West Brom's uncanny ability to throw things away in the last minute seems to have deserted them. In fact it was quite the opposite at the Hawthorns on Saturday as Don Goodman popped up in the 89th minute to head home the winner against fellow strugglers Leicester City. City had taken the lead in the second minute, but Albion were level by half time through Winston White. Their second half performance was worth a victory and moved them ahead of Leicester at the foot of the table.

While Watford were continuing their scramble for safety with a win over us at Vicarage Road, Hull were begining to look doomed at Boothferry Park. Two second half goals from Portsmouth left the Tigers four points adrift at the bottom.



Brighton failed to take advantage of Millwall's slip when they were held 0-0 at home by Notts County who still harbour play-off aspirations themselves.

In midweek Notts County had been overtaken into the play-off places by Barnsley when they lost 1-0 at Oakwell. On Saturday it was the Tykes turn to be leapfrogged by their opponents. Bristol City beat them 1-0 at Ashton Gate to jump back into the play-off box of frogs' themselves.



It is, of course, still possible that with five straight wins between now and the end of the season, we could make it into the playoffs. But being realistic it's now looking a very tall order.





WOLVES

In September 1975 we travelled to the County Ground to play Swindon in a football league cup second round tie. It was the first time in 67 years that we had faced the Town. In goal for Swindon was Jim Barron our former reserve keeper and later to be coach and caretaker manager at Molineux. It was Barron who kept Swindon in the game with some tremendous saves in a match Wolves should have won easily but ended up snatching a replay at the death. In the tenth minute another ex Wolf Peter Eastoe climbed high to head home Andersons cross. In the 36th minute veteran full back John Trollope put town two up. Keeper Gary Pierce could only parry a Moss free kick and when the ball rolled to Trollope he scored with ease. So at the break Wolves, who had done everything but score, were on the verge of going out of the competition. There were just over 20 minutes left when Ken Hibbitt drove the ball into Swindon's area for Alan Sunderland to latch onto the ball and score. Frank Munro moved up front to help his forwards in a desperate attempt to save the game and it was his flick from Mike Bailey's free kick just three minutes from time that found John Richards who equalised and gave us a replay at Molineux. In midfield that day we had our previous seasons signing from Coventry - Willie Carr. I met Willie in his local recently for a chat about his career.

J.H. What was your footballing background and when did you move down to England Willie?

W.C. My parents had split up and I was living with my father and three other brothers and sisters. My eldest brother and sister had moved down to Cambridge. Soccer-wise I had been playing for Glasgow Roman Catholics Under 12's in the Scottish National competition and we beat Edinburgh in the final. The Edinburgh side had Peter Marinello and John Young later to play for Hibs, whilst we included Gerry O'Brian and Jimmy Murdoch the brother of Bobby. My dad had a letter from my brother and sister in Cambridge saying how much better the life was down in England. I was only thirteen but I remember dad telling me that we owed five weeks rent and we ended up doing a runner! So down to Cambridge we went and I started to play for Cambridge schoolboys. I was invited to an England trial because at schoolboy level nationality was irrelevant. I only played the last twenty minutes and was in the company of players like Peter Shilton, Alan Evans, Paul West and Ray Evans. They were all big blokes and with me being such a short so and so I felt a bit overawed. But several clubs showed an interest in me including Spurs, Arsenal, for who Billy Wright was manager at the time, Chelsea, West Ham and Coventry. I preferred the latter two because they were family type clubs and finally opted to sign for Coventry because they were Second Division against West Ham being in the top flight and I felt I had more of a chance of an early breakthrough into the first team in a lower league. As it turned out I made my debut in the football league as a seventeen year old after two and a half years at Highfield Road.

I.H. And you're move to Wolves.

W.C. I didn't really want to leave Coventry. I'd been out of the first team for nine months after having both cartilages out of one knee and it took me another nine months to reach the standard of my pre injury form. Then City's manager at the time, Gordon Milne, told me Wolves were interested in signing me. Although Mike had told me he didn't want me to go I got the feeling that my time at Sky Blues was coming to an end so I came to Molineux for a medical only to find myself spending two hours in the press room while Bill McGarry was in the board room talking to the directors. When he finally emerged he told me he was sorry but some arthritis had been found in my knee and they couldn't take a chance in signing me because of the size of the fee (£240,000). So I went back to City. The following year Queens Park Rangers showed an interest in me but back came McGarry and this time he did sign me for a knockdown price of £80,000.

W.C. Yes we played Chelsea at Molineux and beat them 7-1 and I scored one of the goals. Despite that I still got a rollocking from the manager for my second half display. McGarry said I'd allowed John Hollis to dictate me. Bill was very straight and eventually he earned my respect. I'll always remember one match the following season against the Villa. I knew Dave Wagstaffe was behind me and I tried to dummy John Gidman to allow the ball to run to Waggy. But it didn't come off and of course gave them possession. McGarry went mad at me saying I was letting myself, the team and supporters down. He dropped me for 7 or 8 games. I told him I couldn't play to please, I had to play my natural game. Later that season just before we were relegated and he got the sack, he told me I was his best player.

J.H. Relegation must have been a bitter pill to swallow.

W.C. I think that final game against Liverpool, when they beat us to win the championship and send us down, was my worst moment in football. It was an awful feeling. But we came back and in the next four years I won a second division champions medal and a league cup winners medal. I always had a lot of affection for Coventry as they were my first club but I didn't win anything there, in fact most of my time there was spent fighting against relegation. So the move proved to be a good one for me and like many other players from that team I still live locally. I've learned to say 'arr' and 'youm' and enjoy life with the locals. I get to watch todays Wolves 3 or 4 times a year. I play golf on most Saturdays but apart from that after playing for so long I get frustrated sitting and watching. I'm also very critical which I shouldn't be. Its always easier from the stands and I try to keep my comments to myself because I know what it's like to have criticism poured on you.

I.H. Going back to your Coventry days you have one very special claim to fame.

W.C. You mean the donkey-drop free kick. It was devised by our trainer at the time Bill Aspey and ex Wolf Ernie Hunt and I tried it out in practice with very little success. In the match against Everton we gave it a go and in fact I flicked the ball too high. But Ernie still caught it well and the ball flew into the net. Everton were completely taken by surprise by the move but other teams soon got wise to it especially as it had been televised. The Scottish FA then got the move banned altogether.

J.H. Like Steve Daley and Kenny Hibbitt you scored some cracking goals. Which was your favourite?

W.C. Two come to mind. One against Stoke when Hibby squared the ball to me 25 yards out and it flew into the far corner of Peter Shilton's net. He asked me after the game if the ball had swerved! The other was away at West Ham when I ran half the length of the park and then chipped Bobby Ferguson.

J.H. When we were awarded a last minute penalty against Spurs in the 1981 FA Cup semi final you were given the job of converting it. I recall I couldn't watch. What went through your mind as you stepped up to take it?

W.C. I remember after Hibby had been fouled he threw me the ball and said: "Here, I'm not bloody taking it". So I just placed it on the spot and scored. It wasn't until I ran back to the centre circle that the realisation of the importance of the kick hit me. Then my legs went weak. Later the Spurs keeper Millja Aleksic told me that in training Spurs had talked about if Wolves had a penalty and the five players they thought might take one. I wasn't one of them. I felt we missed our chance in extra time that

day. Spurs were dead and buried. Their heads were down and they just wanted the final whistle. We should have pressed home our advantage.

J.H. Finally Willie your favourite Wolves match.

W.C. The League Cup semi final against Swindon at Molineux. It was just knowing that I was finally going to Wembley to play in a cup final. Later we of course won it, I was named player of the year and my wife Tess gave me a daughter after three boys. 1980 was a great year.




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


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A chance conversation with Graham Turner brought Mark Burke to Molineux and gave him the opportunity to get his career back on course.

The former England Schoolboy reveals that he was on loan at Ipswich from Middlesbrough when Wolves visited Portman Road in March and Graham Turner arrived at the ground to inspect the pitch.

"I just bumped into him," says Mark. "We got chatting and I reminded him of something that he'd said to me when I was a youngster at Villa and he was the manager. He told me that I would either be a great player or not make it - I wouldn't settle for anything in between.

"I hadn't been trying to subtly ask for a move to Wolves, but I think that maybe it jogged his memory and he came in for me."

Mark had a difficult twelve months at the end of his time at Middlesbrough, he'd been playing well, but a disagreement with then manager Bruce Rioch found him out in the cold and things didn't get any better when Colin Todd took over the managers job.

"It didn't seem to matter how well I did in the reserves, scoring threes and fours, it seems Colin Todd's mind was closed to the idea of playing me.

"When I first went on the list they were asking big money for me, and although I heard whispers that clubs were interested there was nothing concrete, and you learn to take everything with a pinch of salt."

So it was something of a relief when Wolves eventually made a bid for him, and brought him back to his native West Midlands. However, that's not to say that Mark was unhappy in the North East.

"I loved it up there. I had some great friends and enjoyed myself. The only bad thing was that I wasn't getting first team football," says Mark.

Despite being on the transfer list for some time, and finding himself out of favour at Ayresome Park, Mark never lost faith in his own ability.

"I'm a naturally confident person," he says, "and I know that, given the opportunity I can show what I can do."

Mark started his career, as we've said, at Aston Villa, where Tony Barton signed him as a 14 year old schoolboy.


"It was a great time to be involved with the club, as they'd just won the European Cup, but things didn't go well for Villa after that. When Graham Taylor arrived he sorted a lot of things out. I played a few games and didn't do well, so he let me go, which is fair enough.

"I do feel though, that if someone had taken a little more time with me at certain points in my career I may have done better," he suggests. Although he says he's had some good coaches. "Brian Little has always been very helpful and Bruce Rioch was a fantastic coach. He taught me so much about different techniques. I learnt a lot from him."

Mark has settled in well at Wolves and is enjoying the training and being involved in the first team squad. But, having earned promotion from second to first with 'Boro, how does he rate the current Wolves squad?

"We've certainly got the players to do the job. It still isn't out of the question this season, but what I think is important is that



whenever you get promotion, you are able to deal with life in the first division. You've got to have the game to do it.

"I remember when we went up there were a lot of 18 and 19 year olds in the side, and there we were playing against some of the best in the World. Suddenly you realise that that's how good you've got to be."

Life hasn't been easy for Mark during the last twelve months, as he waited to get away from Ayresome Park, and his domestic life suffered too.

"I was in limbo for twelve months," he says. "I couldn't get into anything because I could be


moving at any time. I had been studying Italian at polytechnic and I'd also wanted to start to learn the piano. Now I can get back to doing those things."


Mark also reveals that away from football he rather fancies a career in advertising.


"Some friends of mine ran an advertising agency up in Teeside and I used to spend time there. It's fascinating and I could see myself doing that job when I've




