

t may not mean a great deal at this stage of the season, but it's nice to look at the first official league table of the season and see Albion in pole position.

Tonight however, it's cup action as we welcome Glenn Hoddle and his Swindon team for the second leg of the Rumbelow's League Cup. A 2-0 reverse at The County Ground last week means we have our work cut out if we want to make progress in this competition.

Our victory at Feethams on Saturday in our first ever league game against Darlington gave us a 100% start in the league. On Saturday Wigan will be the visitors here at The Hawthorns as we eneavour to keep that good start going.

Our opening day victory over Exeter City here at The Hawthorns was a day of firsts, as Albion statistician Tony Matthews points out on the news pages. But one memorable first was substitute Paul Williams' goal - his first for The Baggies. The photograph of him in today's centre spread captures his delight perfectly. Let's hope the photographers get plenty of chances Don Goodman - first at Feethams for similar shots in the future.



That centre spread is hopefully typical of the type of photographs we would like to bring you in this season's programme, rather than boring head and shoulder pictures. We hope you approve. If you have any comments or suggestions about your new look Albion News we'd be delighted to hear from you.

It's a busy week at The Hawthorns. Tommorrow night our newly promoted Pontins League side take on Rotherham in their first First Division match.

Then, as we've said, it's third division action again on Saturday, when we take on Wigan. Our next away game is at Fulham next Wednesday, followed by a trip to Bolton on Saturday 7th September.

We hope you enjoy tonight's game and that Albion get the right result of course.



e welcome to The Hawthorns a Swindon team which apart from taking a 2-goal lead in the first leg of tonight's tie have drawn 0-0 with Leicester and lost 3-2 at Cambridge in their first two Second Division games this season after finishing in 21st spot last season and avoiding relegation by just two points.

Founded in 1881, they were known at first as Swindon Spartans, then becoming Swindon Town in 1883 and joining the Southern League in 1894. They finished bottom of nine clubs in their first season there but then, after being runners-up in both 1909 and 1910, they topped the League in 1911. Meanwhile they also wrote their name clearly in FA Cup Final history by reaching the semi-final of 1910 and 1912 and taking Barnsley to a replay in the latter.

They were Southern League champions again in 1914 and together with other members of that league they became founder members of the new Division Three in 1920. This became Division Three (South) a year later. They stayed in that division throughout its existence until the reorganisation in 1958, highlights including runs to the FA Cup fifth round in 1948, when beaten by Southampton, and Luton in 1952.

They qualified for the new Division Three in 1958 and stayed there until winning promotion for the first time ever in 1963. Then, although relegated two years later, they got together one of the finest Third Division sides ever, with Peter Downsborough in goal, John Trollope in defence, and Mike Summerbee, Don Rogers and Ernie Hunt up front. Though these players moved on one by one, Swindon still managed to reach the last eight of the FA Cup in 1966/67 and won promotion and the Football League Cup in the same season 1968/69.

They stayed up this time until 1974, but then came a sudden slide that landed them in Division Four in 1982. Then after four seasons they roared back to Division Three in 1986 and the momentum carried them straight up again in 1987 when after ending the season with an 11 game unbeaten run they battled through the playoffs to land in Division Two.

1987/9 saw them in mid-table and then after being defeated by Crystal Palace in the playoffs of 1988/9 they won through in 1989/90 only to lose their First Division place on account of financial irregularities. At first they were demoted to Division Three but on appeal they were granted a Second Division place.

Last season was inevitably a rather unsettled one and after a promising opening with wins at Charlton and against Ipswich in their first two games they won just three more away games - at Oxford, Bristol City and Wolves - and struggled to stay up.

A 5-2 win over Leicester at the end of April proved vital in them finishing above us in the final second division table of last season.



### **OPPOSITION MANAGER - GLENN HODDLE**

Swindon Town manager Glenn Hoddle leads his team into tonight's game aiming to complete the job which was started with last Tuesday's 2-0 win in the first leg of this Rumbelows Cup first round tie.

At the end of the match on his own ground, however, Hoddle was a little disappointed that the victory had not been more emphatic. He said: "I was pleased with our performance in the footballing sense, but there was a tinge of disappoint-



ment because the tie could have been dead and buried if we'd taken more of our chances.

"Now in effect we're two goals up at half time and we know we're in for a tough time at West Brom. We're under no illusions about our task but I'm confident that with our style of playing we'll be able to go on creating chances.

"From the time we started our programme of pre-season matches I've been happy with the way we've been making chances and if we can start putting more of them into the net we should be in for a good season - especially if we can keep the ball out of our own net more consistently than we did last season.

"We were tending to give quite a lot of goals away, but that's something else we've worked on in pre-season. We only conceded three goals in our ten pre-season games, then we kept clean sheets in our first League match against Leicester as well as the Cup game against Albion. "With the talent we've got in the side and the football we're capable of playing, I'm confident we can have a good League season - and I'll be very disappointed if we don't progress in the League Cup."

The former Tottenham Hotspur and England midfielder has made a welcome return to action after a serious injury had threatened to end his playing career while at French club Monaco.

Following an operation and a long battle to regain full match fitness, however, he has taken on the sweeper's role at Swindon and is once again enjoying playing and delighting spectators with his passing and shooting skills.


He said: "With the sort of injury I've had I can't look too far ahead, but I'm taking it game by game and so far I'm pleased with the way things have gone since I started playing again.

"The role of sweeper is important to the system we play at Swindon, both defensively and offensively, and I'm glad to be able to get out there and influence things from inside the team rather than from the dugout.

"Obviously I would like to play for as long as possible, but we've got enough good players here to keep the team ticking whether or not I'm on the pitch."


### **SWINDON TOWN BY NUMBERS**



### **TOWN FACTS**

- Twins Alf and John Stevens both scored for Swindon against Exeter in September 1946.
- In the Swindon v Southend game in November 1949 no fewer than six goals were disallowed, all for offside. The game ended 2-2.
- John Trollope made his debut for Swindon in August 1960. He went on to play in 368 successive games. He was ever-present in ten successive seasons. All in all he played in 770 Football League games for his one and only club.
- Fullbacks John Trollope and Owen Dawson scored within two minutes of each other for Swindon against Mansfield in April 1966.
- Swindon set up a new Fourth Division record when picking up 102 points from 46 games in 1985/6, including an unbeaten run of 21 games from January to the end of the season.
- Swindon were the last club from outside the Football League to reach an FA Cup semifinal when they did so in 1911/12.
- Swindon took part in the longest-ever League Cup-tie when in the third round of 1989/90 they beat Bolton 2-1 after three replays and 450 minutes in all.





SWINDON TOWN TEN YEAR RECORD

The clubs at the foot of the first published league tables will no doubt be dismissing them as irrelevant. However, with Albion sitting proudly atop the first division three table we will certainly make the most of it.

While we were ensuring a 100% start with a 1-0 win on our first ever trip to Darlington, courtesy of Don Goodman's late goal, Brentford, Birmingham and Peterborough were also making it six points out of six.

Brentford travelled to Exeter City, our opening day victims and added to new manager Alan Ball's problems with a 2-1 victory that left The Grecians without a point.

 Exeter are to take Birmingham City to the High Court in a bid to obtain £90,000 compensation for their former manager Terry Cooper who was under contract at St. James's Park when he moved to St. Andrews.

**Birmingham** meanwhile were keeping Fulham pointless at Craven Cottage in a poor match that was decided by a solitary first half goal from Ian Rodgerson.

Peterborough made themselves the best starters of the promoted sides in Division Three with a 2-1 win at Boothferry Park against Hull City. Their win was courtesy of a goal from 18 year old Ian McInerney who was making only his second substitute appearance in the league.

As we learned last season Andy Payton is the man to watch for Hull and, just like last season he scored only to see his team defeated.

Another newly promoted side, Hartlepool, earned their first third division points with a 2-0 win at home to Reading. A paltry 2,858 (the second lowest in the division) were in attendance.

The fourth of the new boys from division four, Stockport County, were involved in a six goal thriller at Leyton Orient. They opened the scoring, but had to come from behind on two occasions, the last of which was with an 88th minute strike from Tony Barras. The third division prize fund has been increased this season by sponsors Barclays. The champions will receive £25,000, an increase of 25% on last year's figure. The runners-up will receive £10,000.

Bookmakers Ladbrokes have quoted Albion as favourites to win that prize. At 11-2 we are well ahead of Bolton who have the second shortest odds at 9-1. Bournemouth and Stoke are third on 10-1.

With a former Monaco player here tonight in the form of opposition manager Glenn Hoddle, there is another connection between the third division and the French club. Swansea City have been drawn against the former French Champions in the first round of the European Cup Winners Cup. The first leg takes place at The Vetch Field on September 17th.

It looks likely that Gary Gill will be joining his former boss Brian Little at Leicester City in a £40,000 move from Darlington.

Ashley Grimes could be set for a comeback at Stoke City. The former Manchester United and Luton Town player has been training at The Victoria Ground where his former United teammate Lou Macari is in charge.


A recent survey by the Football League has shown that the third and fourth divisions are highly significant in providing talent for the teams in the top flight.

The survey reveals that 36% of regular first teamers in last season's first division graduated from the third and fourth.







# FIRST DAY FIRSTS

Several interesting facts came to light when Albion took on Exeter on the opening Saturday of the 1991-92 season:



- It was, of course, Albion's first-ever game in Division Three
- Tony Ford became the first player to skipper Albion in Division Three.
- Adrian Foster was the first Albion player to touch the ball in a 3rd Division game.
- Craig Shakespeare (above) became the first Albion player to score a goal in Division Three, doing so from the penalty spot after 30 minutes.
- Bernard McNally was the first Albion 'sub'; used in Div.3, replacing Kwame Ampadu.
- Goalkeeper Allan Millar was the first player to make his debut for Albion in a 3rd Division game.
- Unfortunately Don Goodman was the first Albion player 'booked' in a 3rd Division match
- That 6-3 victory was Albion's best-ever in terms of goals scored for on the first day of a season, beating their previous best: 4-0 v. Everton of 100 years ago, in September 1891.
- The win over Exeter was the first time Albion had opened the season with a victory since beating Ipswich Town (home) 2-1 on 19th August 1978.
- Craig Shakespeare was the first Albion player to score two penalties in a League game since Peter Barnes did the trick v. Bolton (h) in March 1980 (4-4 draw).
- And the last time nine goals were scored in a League game at The Hawthorns was when Albion beat Burnley 8-1 in November 1967.

## Past Encounters

Albion have played Swindon Town three times before in Cup compe-

Back in season 1966-67 in a 4th Round League Cup tie at The County Ground, Albion beat the Robins 2-0 with late goals by Jeff Astle and Clive Clark. The crowd was 16,254.

The second clash came in the 4th round of the F.A. Cup at The Hawthorns in 1972-73 when again the Baggies won 2-0, with Tony Brown and Len Cantello hitting the target in front of 20,795 spectators.

And last week, at Swindon, the teams met for the third time, the resuit being a 2-0 win for the Robins, their first over Albion in knockout Cup football.

Midfielder Tony 'Zico' Kelly has been transferred from Shrewsbury Town to Bolton Wanderers; striker Stewart Phillips has left Hereford United for Cheltenham Town, full-back Phil Hawker is with Solihull Borough and goalkeeper former Baggies' reserve and youth 'keeper Mark Ashton is now with Moor Green.

Welsh international Mickey Thomas, released by Stoke City in May, has rejoined his first 'love' Wrexham and goalkeeper Ron Green, who was on loan to Albion from Walsall a few years ago, has linked up with Kidderminster Harriers.

Peter Eastoe has now left Bridgnorth Town and is thinking of teaming up with Atherstone, while Garry Thompson (right) has joined Q.P.R. and winger Scott Colcombe is now with Torquay United. Former Albion defender, Dave Rushbury, has been appointed coach-physiotherapist at Fourth Division Chesterfield, who are managed by Chris McMenemy, the son of the current assistant England boss, Lawrie.



### **HOWE QUITS**

Former Albion and England right-back, Don Howe, who was manager here at The Hawthorns in the early 70s, dropped a bombshell just prior to the start of the season by quitting his post as coach at First Division Wimbledon.

## Looking Back

25 Years ago: 27th August 1966 - Albion suffered a 2-1 home defeat in the hands of Burnley in a First Division match which attracted a crowd of 21,732 to The Hawthorns. Graham 'Shuv' Lovatt netted for the out-of-touch Baggies.

15 Years ago: 28th August 1976 - Goals by the two Browns - Ally and Tony - gave Albion a 2-0 home win over Norwich City in a First Division match at The Hawthorns. A crowd of 16,434 witnessed this triumph - Albion's first in the top flight since April 11th 1973 (v. Everton).

5 Years ago: 25th August 1986 - A headed goal in torrential rain by new signing Stewart Evans gave Albion a 1-0 home win over Sheffield United in front of just 9,102 spectators.

## AFLAN

Just prior to the opening game of the League season, Albion manager Bobby Gould recruited the services of the Arsenal reserve team goalkeeper, Allan Millar, on a month's loan, following the long-term injury to Stuart Naylor.

Allan was born at Epping on 29th March 1970. He is 6'2" tall and weighs 13st. 9lbs.


Allan played for the English School F.A. side before joining Arsenal on a Y.T.S. and turned professional at Highbury when attaining the age of 18. He has yet to play in the Gunners' first team but made 13 League appearances on loan with Plymouth Argyle in season 1988-89. He officially joined Albion on 12th August - for one month. Ithough I have consistently said that the aim of every member of the playing and coaching staff at The Hawthorns is to win promotion back to Division Two, every successful side enters competitions with the intention of winning them.

League victories are obviously important, and our win at Darlington on Saturday was pleasing, but victory tonight would help us to build on our good start in the league. Cup wins breed confidence.

The two leg rounds of the Rumbelows League Cup can be looked at in the same way as European cup matches. We're 2-0 down from the first leg, but essentially it's only half time. An early goal from us and the pressure will be on Swindon Town. Even if we don't get an early goal it's vital that we maintain the discipline that we showed on Saturday at Feethams and keep our shape as a team because, if we do that, the goals will come.

Whatever the final outcome supporters tonight can count themselves privileged to see Glenn Hoddle play. He is certainly one of the most gifted players I have ever seen. However, I can tell him now that we don't intend to give as easy a ride as he had in the first leg!

Managers often say that they want to concentrate on



success in the league and that cup runs are a distraction. Mind you, they usually say that after they've been knocked out of the cup. In my mind the more games you have to play the more successful you are – it's a nice problem to have.

If we are in the position, towards the end of next season, where we have a fixture backlog caused by our success in the cup competitions and the league, then I shan't mind.







For the second time running Albion attracted a record crowd at a football match when they took on Blackburn Rovers in the replay of the 1886 F.A. Cup Final at the Cricket Ground, Derby, a week after having fought out a goalless draw at another cricket ground, The Oval, on the previous Saturday.

Albion were unchanged from the first clash, while Blackburn, still regarded as favourites by the local press and indeed by the national press, introduced Walton for Heyes although they did switch their side round to accommodate the enthusiastic right-winger.

Rovers took the field first to cheers from about 3,000 of their travelling fans, but when Albion came out there were around 6,000 of their supporters roaring them on, many displaying the club colours.

The sun was beating down from a clear sky when the game commenced at 3.35pm, five minutes after the scheduled start, with the temperature well into the seventies.

Albion were first on the attack and after some excellent work by Green and Horton, George 'Spry' Woodhall went close with a cunning shot from fully 20 yards, the ball passing only inches wide of the post.

The 'dash' of the Albion forwards

caused Rovers quite a few problems early on and Woodhall again went close with a shot from the edge of the 'goal' circle, and then Tommy Green, evading a strong challenge from Douglas, fired over the top from 12 yards.

Albion, though, failed to keep up the pressure and gradually the favourites, Blackburn, came more and more into the game. Big Bob Roberts, in the Baggies' goal, saved well from Strachan and Fecitt, and was lucky to kick away an intended clearance from his own colleague, Horton, whose miscued right-footed 'hack' spun agonisingly close to the framework.

Roberts then fisted out a piledriver from Sowerbutts as Rovers powered forward, giving the Albion defenders plenty to think about.

At the other end of the field, with the sun in his eyes, Rovers' 'keeper Arthur did exceedingly well to thwart Green, and he then fly-kicked the ball to safety as 'Jem' Bayliss moved in to try and collect Loach's intelligent probing pass.

On 26 minutes the first goal was registered, and it went to Blackburn, although the luck of the bounce certainly favoured the Lancastrians.

After Fecitt had sent the ball over the bar, the goal-kick found its way to Walton who quickly laid a perfect pass in front of Sowerbutts who, moving inside Perry, maintained possession after the ball bounced invitingly in front of him after striking a divot. He scored with a fierce right-foot shot, the ball flying well wide of 'keeper Roberts, who had no chance of saving.

Albion bounced back and Arthur saved with some difficulty from Green, but Rovers almost made it 2-0 when Jimmy Brown's shot flew just inches wide.

Sowerbutts then had a goal disallowed just before the half-time whistle.

Early in the second period Albion almost equalised when George Bell's shot skimmed fractionally wide, and it was only due to some splendid defensive work by Arthur, Turner, Suter and Forrest that Rovers held on to their slender lead as Albion peppered their goal with a flurry of shots.

Albion continued to press forward, and the impressive Loach put in one excellent dribble only to be dumped to the ground by a clattering challenge from Suter. Perry then surged forward and his blistering drive was taken full in the face by Suter, while goalkeeper Arthur saved a strong drive from Green.

Albion's luck was out when Green struck the woodwork, because from the rebound, Brown, the Blackburn forward, went off on a mazy 70 yard

run, and a midst great applause and cheering scored a second goal to wrap up the game for Rovers. Admittedly it was a marvellous individual effort and a question mark must be set against Albion's defence, but all credit to the Blackburn forward who finished in style!

Albion tried desperately to reduce the arrears with a series of five-man attacks but Rovers' back division held firm and the scoreline remained 2-0 in favour of Rovers, who thus made it a hat-trick of Final wins, having beaten the Scottish amateur side, Queen's Park, in each of the previous contests.

Albion had battled hard and deserved at least a draw. But in the end they had nothing to show for their noble efforts and went back to West Bromwich with runners-up medals instead of that glittering first prize.

In looking back over the last season I would like to record my appreciation for the support of all of the West Bromwich Albion staff.




