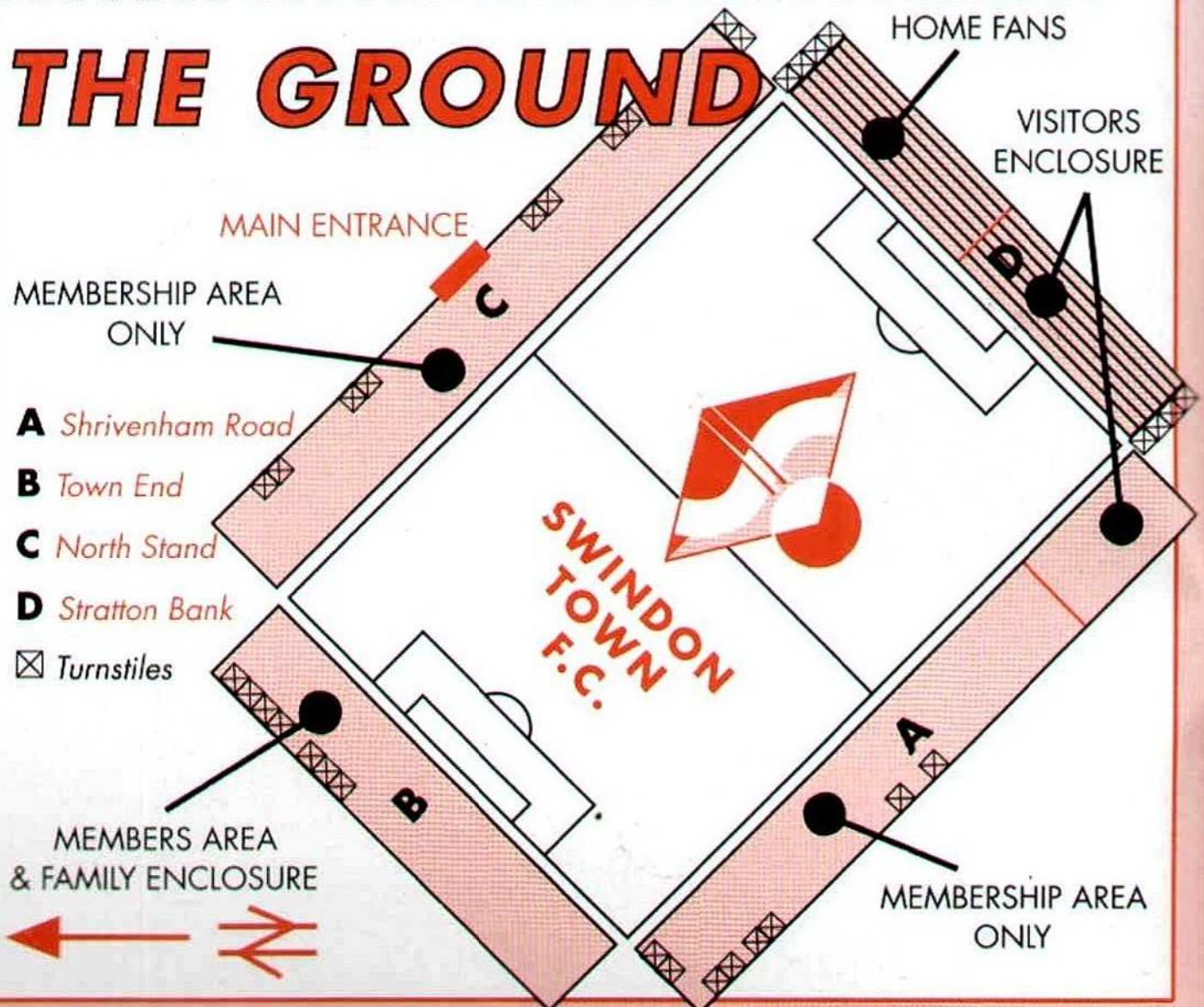

SOUTH EAST COUNTIES

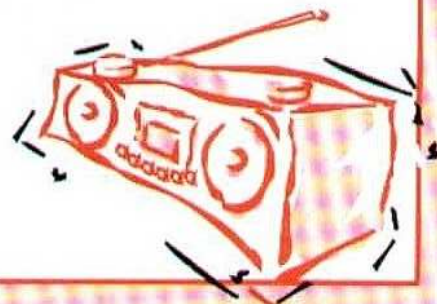

Those fantastic fans who braved the rain on Tuesday night must have been disappointed with our first half showing against Millwall. We were dreadful. It was a little bit like after the Lord Mayor's Show, following the performance at Plymouth Argyle.

A few stern words were spoken at half-time and a few tactical points made. We got more movement from the fullbacks and so made better use of the ball and the overall display from everybody was tremendous.

I was very pleased because it proved it to everyone that this team can do it without me in the side. I never had doubt myself but many needed convincing.

Duncan monopolised the headlines with his four goals at Plymouth but I thought his all-round play against Millwall was even better. It was his best performance for the club since I arrived and his partnership with Steve White seems to be getting stronger every week.

Both strikers are playing with a lot of confidence, a confidence currently shared by the whole team. Winning, like losing, becomes a habit and you can see the confidence has snowballed throughout the team in recent weeks.

Perhaps the most pleasing aspect about the Millwall cup tie for me was to see us turn the tables as we did. When you start as badly as that it is very difficult to turn it around. Players become anxious and frustrated. The normal response is to panic and launch long balls towards the opposing penalty area. But we didn't resort to that. The lads kept their shape and their heads.

Let us hope that forty-five minutes is a lesson learned for the rest of their careers. They must realise that you can't pull a shirt on and

win matches. Hard work and determination is required at all times.

I think I shall be reflecting back on this game in many pre-match briefings to come. Hopefully it is a good lesson learned.

So let's make sure there is some venom in our play right from the off this afternoon. It promises to be a real humdinger as Derby County have run into a bit of form. We have nothing to fear providing we play to our strengths, and concentrate on our own game.

It is a pity I shall not be fit for I would have loved another pop at Peter Shilton. I scored against him on my debut for Spurs at Stoke City with a 25-yarder and have put quite a few goals past him over the years.

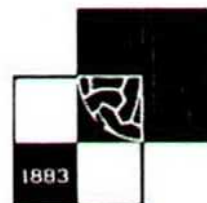
But what an example Peter is to young players. He is living proof that if you work hard at your trade, love the game deeply, and look after yourself, you can go on forever. Well almost. He has been a fantastic goalkeeper and if we beat him today it will be because we have worked for it. Peter very rarely gives anything away.

Before I sign off I would like to mention the youth team who earned a fine 1-1 draw at Port Vale in the Midland Youth Cup. The lads have had an indifferent season in the League so this was a very good performance. Let us hope they can finish the job in the replay.

Finally, just a mention that we have adopted the local Charity Koala, which provides homes for children. Duncan won a colour TV from Rumbelows as his Man of the Match award on Tuesday and donated it to the home. It is a way of keeping us involved with people not so fortunate as ourselves.

NEWS

At the end of a difficult week for Bristol Rovers in which they parted company with manager Martin Dobson, the West Country side lifted themselves off the bottom of the table with a 2-1 victory over top club Middlesbrough. The game appeared to be going to form with Boro' leading until experienced forward Stuart Ripley was ordered off for violent conduct.

The departure of Dobson came as a surprise as he had only been appointed during the summer as replacement for Gerry Francis who left for Q.P.R. Rovers however have not made a confident start to the season having won only one of nine League games under Dobson and were knocked out of the Zenith Data Systems Cup last week 3-1 by Ipswich at Twerton Park. They also face a difficult away second leg of the Rumbelows Cup at neighbours Bristol City following a 3-1 defeat in the first leg. Rover's Director Geoff Dunford commented "We felt we were incompatible during the three months Martin was in charge. Our style and his were different." To add to Rovers problems temporary manager Dennis Rofe, who was coach to Dobson, faces the coming months without key defender Vaughan Jones who has broken his leg in the recent game with Oxford and may be out for the rest of the season.

Another club with a temporary manager, Blackburn Rovers, have continued to progress under stand-in Tony Parkes with a 3-1 win at Millwall last Saturday. David Speedie netted his fifth goal of the season but despite this recent victory Parkes is not hopeful of landing the post on a more permanent basis saying "I think if the Board were going to give me the job they would have done so by now."

Despite continuing good results on the pitch, Charlton Athletic are facing growing problems over their planned return to the Valley. Athletic are currently tenants at Upton Park but are finding the rent of £10,000 per game difficult to meet. Club Chairman Roger Alwen explained the position "It would be silly to pretend that we do not have problems. There are at least six to eight weeks work left to be done at the Valley but the problem is now money, not time. Safety costs have soared by £750,000 with the safety plans unrecognisable from the original ones we submitted. Derby County are beginning to find their form following a shaky start with new signings Bobby Davidson and Ian Ormondroyd settling in at the Baseball Ground. Davidson scored twice last Saturday as County beat Bristol City 4-1 and it was just like old times for the striker who enjoyed a spell with Derby before his move to Leeds. Ormondroyd is hoping that his loan period from Aston Villa is extended to a more permanent deal as he feels Derby suit his style "It is great to play with wingers again. At Villa under Joe Venglos we played a continental style with the ball to feet and we rarely used wingers. It is really good to come to Derby and get on the end of some crosses. It does not look very

good for my future at Villa as Ron Atkinson has allowed me to play in the Rumbelows Cup but to be honest I'm not too worried as I would like to play for Derby permanently."

Ipswich Town continue to strive for a place in the Premier League with a 2-1 victory over improving Oxford United at Portman Road last week. Despite injury problems to several key players Ipswich are now only two points behind leaders Middlesbrough with a game in hand. John Wark returned to the Ipswich side for his third spell at the club having previously played over 400 games. New Town chairman John Kerr is concerned at the drop in attendances this season and has written to stay away supporters in an attempt to lure them back "I am sending out a letter to all former season ticket holders who have not renewed and am asking them to reconsider their decision and to come and support the team. I feel that our manager John Lyall and his staff and players have worked so very hard to give the club such a good start to the season. A great deal of credit is due to them and I hope that people will come back. We need them if the club is to progress as we want. The football played this season so far has been of a very high standard and I am sure there is much more to come."

Manchester City striker Wayne Clarke who was on loan at Wolves is devastated by an injury which will probably keep him out of action for the period of the loan. The 30 year old striker who made only three appearances for the Maine Road side last season punctured a lung and broke a rib on his debut for Wolves at Southend and spent a time in Birmingham General Hospital. A disappointed Clarke said "I'm shattered by it all. I was desperate to impress in the month I should have spent at Wolves. Now I just hope that I get a second chance."

Watford boss Steve Perryman will be looking for a new goalkeeper as former Hornet's trainee David James has been placed on the transfer list following his refusal to accept a new contract at the club. 21 year old James is considered a good prospect and has gained seven U21 international caps in the last year. Trevor Aylott will be staying at Oxford however following his loan spell from Birmingham City and has signed a contract that will keep him at the Manor Ground until the end of the season.

ROVERS BANK ON EXPERIENCE

New brooms have been sweeping through the historical corridors of Ewood Park in a desperate attempt to attain Premier League status. Beaten in the play-offs three times over the past four years, Rovers now have the financial clout of a new millionaire backer to help achieve their ambitions.

When things didn't go smoothly in the opening weeks, which saw Rovers take just one point from their opening three fixtures and dumped out of the Rumbelows Cup by Third Division Hull City, manager Don Mackay was axed.

Tony Parkes took over as acting manager and immediately gained a 2-0 win over Derby County, the goals from Jason Wilcox and David Speedie, giving all a welcome shot in the arm.

The arrival of former Chelsea star Speedie, from Liverpool for £400,000, was a clear indication of the Lancashire club's commitment to a serious challenge for the Premier League. The livewire Scot has proved an inspiration as well as a points winner - his goal against Port Vale being his fourth in successive games.

But he is not the only newcomer to the Ewood Park ranks. During the close-season Mr Mackay had invested a club record £750,000 for Barnsley's midfielder Steve Agnew and a further £350,000 for Glasgow Rangers' left-back Stuart Munro. Steve Livingstone, Simon Garner and Lennie Johnrose have all taken turns to partner Speedie in attack, Johnrose being

the current choice and striking up a good understanding with his Scottish international partner.

Both were on the scoresheet in the impressive recent 3-1 victory at Millwall yet it was goalkeeper Bobby Mimms who was the real match winner.

Mimms is just one of a bevy of experienced players in the Rovers side. At fullback there is former England and Manchester United favourite Mike Duxbury while former Old Trafford colleague, Kevin Moran, provides the muscle at the centre of the defence.

That victory over Millwall was another major boost to Tony Parkes' hopes of landing the Ewood Park job on a permanent basis though big spending Rovers seem desperate to land a big name appointment. The latest being associated with the job is that of Kenny Dalglish.

We do have one thing in common with Blackburn of course. A determination to make it to the Premier League next year. It promises to be quite a tough assignment and just which side looks better equipped can be seen here next Saturday.

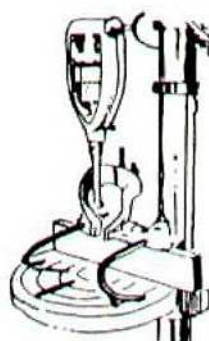
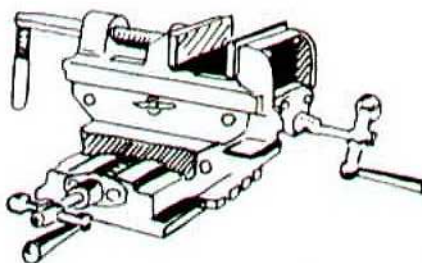

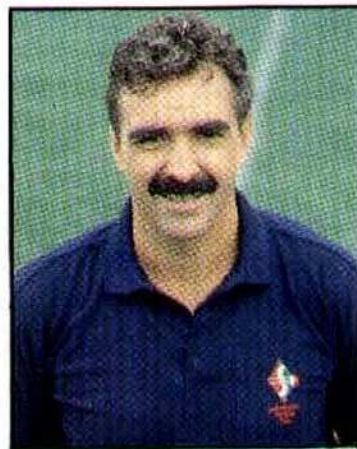
Having had a lot of experience on the Youth side it is so important for the future of the Club that we utilize our resources in that department. It was also very heartening that players like Nicky Hammond and Colin Calderwood were helping the youngsters through their training. This can only benefit the Club in the long run as it is vital we bring some young players through.

Lots of help in various ways have been available and necessary to the success of the team. One of these is the

portable wall the backroom groundstaff have made us which is very helpful for practising free kicks, hopefully it will pay dividends in the near future.

Many people have commented on the boys during the warm up before a game. We feel it is very important as it makes sense to do so.

On training days we warm up for twenty minutes yet on matchdays some lads would just go out and kick the ball around for a few minutes then start the most important aspect of the week without being fully ready. The lads are happy now and take it as normal for matchday routine. I also like to give the keeper a good 10 minutes with everything he wants, as he needs to feel ready for the match. This is another aspect that's very important because goalkeepers are one offs and need special treatment at times.

THINKING GOALS

Steve White is counting the years as well as the goals yet at 32 he is still going strong and is once more the scourge of goalkeepers from Sunderland to Millwall.

"Duncan (Shearer) and I are rattling a few in," grins Steve, "but I'm not taking anything for granted. Glenn brought in Dave Mitchell this summer so with Shaun Close and Duncan there are four strikers on call. At the moment I'm the man in possession but I'm not getting carried away. I have been in this game too long. Things can change so quickly."

Yet at the moment Steve seems to be at his prolific best and with Duncan Shearer also finding his range the lethal duo are once more making opponents sit up and take notice.

"Duncan and I have scored a lot of goals over the past four years," agrees Steve. "In fact you will have to look a long way I should think to find a better partnership."

"Yet people say we don't play together . . . Perhaps we don't. Our strength is not so much our combination play as our singlemindedness. We both have one single thought in mind when we get on the field. To hit the back of the net."

"You don't often see us close together knocking the ball off to each other. But you do see us often chasing in on the goalkeeper together hungry for any opportunities that the 'keeper' might offer us."

"That's not to say that we are similar in technique, far from it, though Duncan does the same sort of thing on one side of the field as I do on the other. But we are not a blend like Peter Beardsley and Ian Rush."

"We do compliment each other in some respects however. Duncan is a much better striker of the ball than I am. He is better and stronger in the air too. But then

I probably cover more ground than him."

The rivalry to become the top shot is keen and to some extent selfish. Says Steve: "We are always checking our averages. The pressure is on all the time. You can't relax in this game and for a striker there is only one statistic that matters."

"I would much prefer to score and have a bad game than play well and not find the net. We are constantly thinking goals."

"It is a friendly rivalry - there is never any animosity between us . . . I was delighted when Duncan scored four at Plymouth last week. I did that once at Luton in a 6-0 win over Grimsby. You don't get many days like that." Since making his League debut for Bristol Rovers at Southampton in March 1978, Steve has had many striking partnerships in a career that has taken him to Luton and Charlton. Yet none have proved as profitable as this one with Duncan Shearer.

"People ask me what makes us gel?" laughs Steve. "You can never put your finger on it I'm afraid. We are the cutting edge of the team and it is important we get our act together. But so much depends on the quality of service we receive from the rest of the team and they have been great."

After Duncan's spree last week Steve is determined to respond this afternoon. He says: "I have never scored against Peter Shilton and it would be nice to put that right today."

He recalls a goal scored against Newcastle United in 1978 struck with the left-foot from "the apex of the eighteen-yard box," that stuck in the stanchion, as his most memorable to date. But there is much more to come from this natural goal-getter and it could take something special to beat 'Shilts' today.

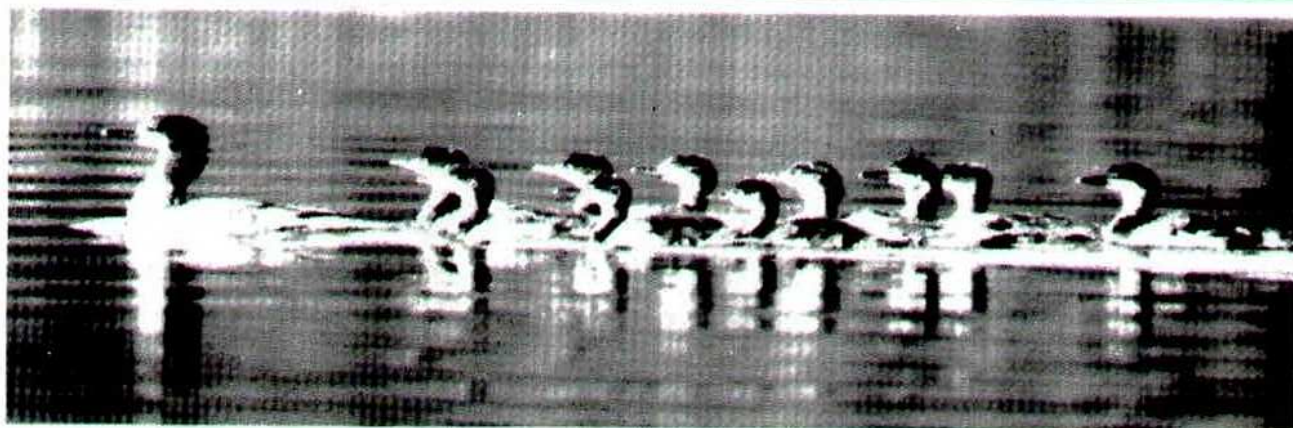

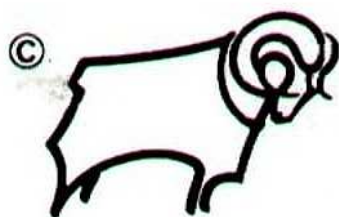

A VERY WARM *Welcome* TO DERBY COUNTY

After relegation from Division One last May and the subsequent sale of international stars Dean Saunders and Mark Wright to Liverpool Derby County found themselves somewhat in the doldrums.

Even so a 1-1 draw at Sunderland on the opening day of the season seemed a creditable start, substantiated by a convincing 2-0 victory over the current league leaders Middlesbrough. But consecutive home defeats inflicted by Southend United and Blackburn Rovers and a 1-1 draw with bottom club Barnsley suggested that the Rams had not yet overcome their problems. Indeed, their goalless draw at Cambridge United was seen as an unexpected point in some quarters. But then a 2-0 defeat at struggling Oxford United only further emphasised Derby County's demise.

The arrival, on loan, of two strikers completely altered the complexion. Bobby Davison of Leeds has returned to his old haunt to add a dynamic perspective to the Rams front line and with four goals in the last three Second Division games has underlined his effectiveness.

Ian Ormondroyd is the other loanee from Aston Villa and he too has contributed much including the goal that earned a point at Newcastle United in a run which has seen the Rams unbeaten in four League and Cup games up till last weekend.

Two goal Davidson and Gary Micklewhite were named joint man of the match winners last Saturday as Derby romped to a 4-1 demolition of Bristol City at the Baseball Ground. Leeds United would not allow him to play against Ipswich in the Rumbelows Cup but Ormondroyd turned out at Portman Road on Tuesday.

Coleman and Comyn have settled in as the regular central pairing with Sage and Forsyth in the fullback positions. Geraint Williams, as ever, is the man who orchestrates from midfield and watch out too for the powerful running of Ted McMinn.

SIMON COLEMAN - Central Defender. Born in Worksop. Mansfield Town was his first club. Moved to Middlesbrough for £500,000 as Pallister's replacement and joined Derby this summer for £300,000. Age: 23.

ANDY COMYN - Central Defender. Was on schoolboy forms with Manchester United. Studied physics at Birmingham University while playing for Alvechurch and arrived at Villa two years ago. Signed this summer for £200,000 and seems to have got the chemistry right with Coleman. Age: 23.

BOBBY DAVISON - Striker. Currently on loan from Leeds United and scoring regularly. Began his career at Huddersfield Town then Halifax. The Rams paid £90,000 for him in December 1982 and was top shot for five seasons. Joined Leeds in November '87 for £350,000 having scored 83 goals in 206 League games for the Rams.

MICHAEL FORSYTH - Defender. Former England Youth cap signed from W.B.A. in March 1986 (£20,000). Gained England Under-21 and 'B' honours at left-back but last season played as a central defender. Born Liverpool, March 1966.

PHIL GEE - Forward. When Phil left Gresley Rovers for the Baseball Ground in 1985 he was a 21 year-old painter and decorator. Forged a good partnership with Davison as Derby won promotion to Division One. Born Pelsall, December 1964.

TED McMINN - Forward. Started his career with Queen of the South then joined Glasgow Rangers. Moved to Spain to play for Seville but within a year was back to sign for Derby in a £300,000 move. Was out 15 months with knee ligament trouble but is back to his forceful best. Age 29.

GARY MICKLEWHITE - Midfield. An £80,000 signing from Q.P.R. in 1985 the former Manchester United youngster is now Derby's longest serving player. Played in

the FA Cup Final with Rangers. Born Southwark, March 1961.

IAN ORMONDROYD - Striker. Currently on loan from Aston Villa. A beanpole of a man, he is not a prolific scorer but his height creates havoc in most defences. Started his League career with Bradford City at Shrewsbury in November 1985 and had a spell on loan with Oldham in 1986-87. Villa paid £650,000 for his transfer in February 1988. Age 27.

MARK PATTERSON - Defender. Had played a handful of games for Carlisle when Derby snapped up the 19-year old for £60,000. That was five seasons ago and he was given his Derby debut in 1990. Born Leeds, September 1968.

MEL SAGE - Defender. Signed from Gillingham in the summer of 1986. Was only 16 when he made his debut with the Gills, at Bristol City, in May 1982. Is now established at right-back. Born Gillingham, March 1964.

PETER SHILTON - Goalkeeper. A legend in his own time and one of England's greatest exponents of the art of goalkeeping. Capped 125 times by England he also holds the record for playing more League games than any player in history - now well over 900. Leicester, Stoke, Nottingham Forest and Southampton are his previous clubs. Joined Derby in 1987 (£90,000). Age 42.

GERAINT WILLIAMS - Midfield. Signed from Bristol Rovers hours before the 1985 transfer deadline, for just £40,000. Is now the principal architect in midfield and has played more games for the Rams than any current member of staff. A Welsh international. Born Treorchy, January 1962.

PAUL WILLIAMS - Midfield. A goalscoring midfielder converted from full-back. Made his senior debut two seasons ago and played in 29 first Division games. Capped by England at under-21 level in the summer. Born Burton-on-Trent, March 1971.

BENNO'S BRIEF



It was way back in the season of 1965-66 that a 16-year old goalkeeper made his debut in the Football League for Leicester City in the First Division. Today that very same player will step out at the County Ground to make his 941st appearance in this competition.

Peter Shilton has become a legend in his own time. A goalkeeper whose standards have always been high. A goalkeeper who has been the envy of world football. His position as the number one stopper in the world game was not just down to raw talent but hard work and unflinching dedication to his job.

'Shilts' has been an example to us all and even now at 42, when many professionals would take the easy road, his commitment to preparation is just as punishing as it has always been.

I caught up with the softly spoken Shilton after he had made yet another penalty save to help guide Derby to a 2-0 victory over Ipswich in midweek, and he told me he was looking forward to the trip to Wiltshire this weekend.

Says Peter: "I have played at Swindon quite a few times. There is nothing special that comes to mind but I played here against Don Rogers once . . . many years ago.

"We shall be coming looking for a win. We have had a few good results and are starting to score a few goals now which makes it easier for the players at the back. There is something to hang onto and fight for."

Though now labelled a veteran there is nothing laboured about the great man's reflexes which are as sharp as ever. He says: "I don't feel any different to what I did five or six years ago really.

"I think sometimes other people tend to think that because you are 42 you are about to finish but I have no thoughts on those lines. "I train even harder these days with the boss.

The training we do is terrific for goalkeepers - the boss is very good in that respect. I enjoy working with him a lot. But I train as hard now and just as much as I ever did. As I said I just don't feel any different.

"I'm sorry Glenn is injured. It would have been nice to have been in opposition to him again. But it could help us because as I say we are obviously coming to try and get a result."

Peter bowed out of the international arena after his 125th England game, against West Germany, in the semi-final of the 1990 World Cup. But as you realise from what he has said above he has no intentions of quitting professional football yet. It was three years ago that Peter overhauled Terry Paine's 824 match record in the League and he now seems comfortably on course to become the first to clock up 1,000 appearances.

Peter the Great has certainly lived up to the billings. A fine athlete, whose mental resolve has been as important as his natural instincts, he became such an institution in the England goal that it seemed hard to think of the national side without him in.

He has a philosophical attitude to his longevity too, once claiming: "As you get older, you realise the importance of being able to keep playing. Every year is a bonus - that's the real secret. To be able to take one game at a time and let the games pile into seasons."

It was 27 years ago this month that our visitors today were last seen in League action at the County Ground. After two heavy defeats without scoring, Swindon had hit four a week prior to this game. Following the sale of Frank Large, Mike Summerbee had been switched to centre-forward and his place on the right-wing went to the speedy Peter Leggett. The Town also brought in Ken Skeen and keeper Norman Oakley who had recovered from an injury in the first few minutes of the season. Skeen put the ball in the net in the 11th minute, but his effort was disallowed for offside. Boosted by their good fortune, Derby took the lead through Eddie Thomas within five minutes. Swindon were level after a further five when an acrobatic attempt by Ernie Hunt was blocked by a defender's hand. Ernie slotted the penalty home (unlike most of his efforts at Molineux recently!)

The Town were well on the way to the points when they grabbed two more goals just before the interval. Hunt was on hand again in the 40th minute when he applied the finishing touch following a Leggett corner. In the 43rd, the winger was involved once more as Owen Dawson exchanged passes with him and rifled the ball past former England keeper Reg Matthews. Skeen was also denied a second time by a linesman's flag.

Four minutes into the second half, Summerbee was the next to suffer the disappointment of a disallowed goal when he netted but referee Powell called him back and awarded Swindon a free kick! The elusive fourth goal was not long in coming. A long throw from Keith

Morgan was flicked on by Summerbee and Hunt headed in to complete his hat-trick in the 54th minute. County's Geoff Barrowcliffe was injured soon afterwards and with no substitutes then (they were not introduced until the following season) he spent the remainder of the game hobbling on the right-wing. However it did not prevent him from hitting Derby's second goal from the penalty spot ten minutes from time, after an alleged push by keeper Oakley in a crowded goalmouth.

Another piece of football news that weekend involved two ex-Swindon players, Jimmy Gauld and Jack Fountain. They were remanded on bail in Nottingham accused of 'fixing' matches. Both were jailed three months later.

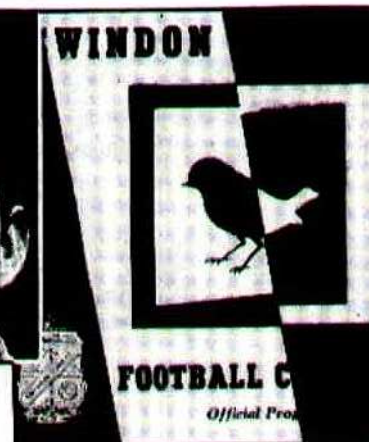

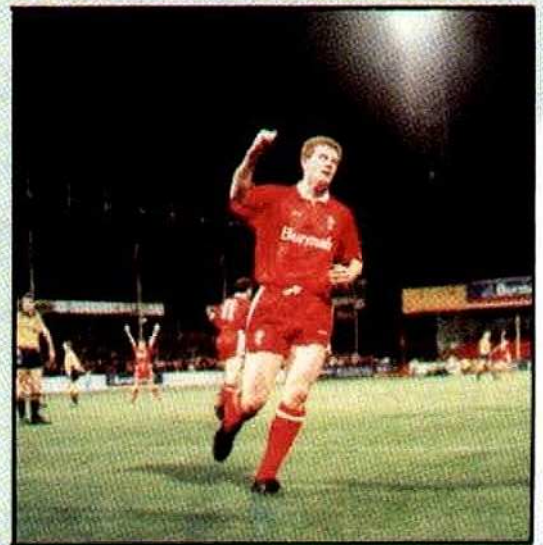

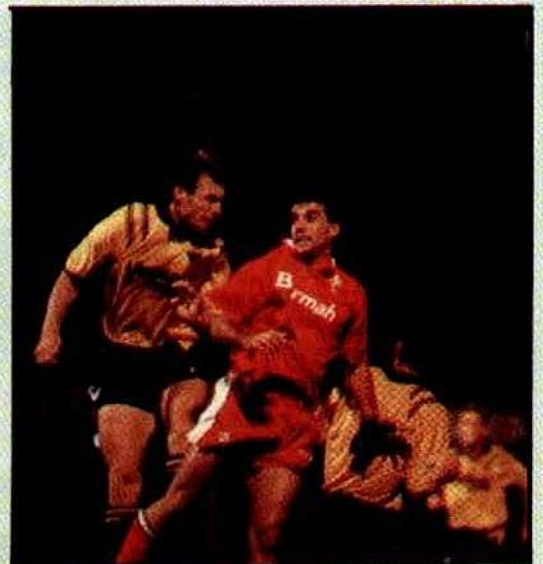

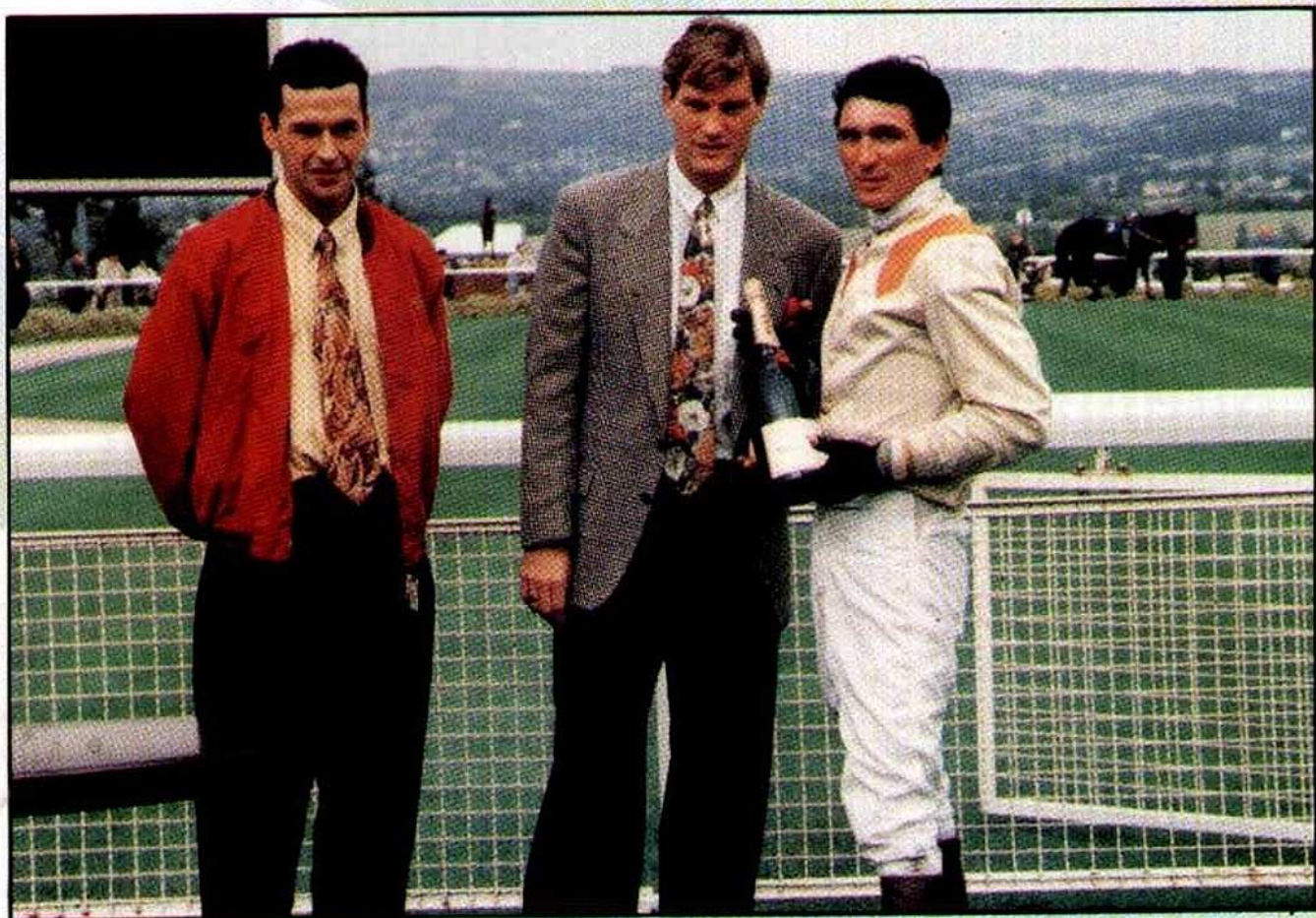


Shearer leads the attack.

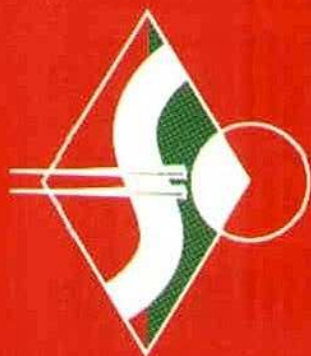

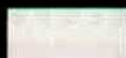

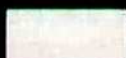
