

Lennie Lawrence used to have a phrase about conduct after winning or losing a game — 'humility in victory, dignity in defeat'. Happily, that could certainly be applied to the England rugby team after their World Cup final reverse last Saturday at Twickenham.

Over the course of the competition, the English tactics have been heavily criticised, yet the team still held their nerve in tough away games in France and Scotland, to reach a final many thought was beyond them.

By all accounts, there might have been a penalty try in the closing minutes of the final, but the English team accepted their luck, and there were no scenes like those witnessed after the quarter final in Paris.

Those people who claim to know a bit about rugby suggest that the Australians were worthy winners, and in terms of their all round play, the best team in the world, so we must applaud England for their magnificent effort in going so close.

It would have been a great boost for sport in this country had England triumphed, but at least the rugby team can rank alongside our footballers who went within a whisker of capturing the sport's ultimate prize in Italy last summer.

Certainly it's been good in these last few weeks to see sports news on the front pages as well as the back, and let's hope it encourages more people of all ages to go and play sport, or watch their local teams instead. The only black spot to emerge from the last month of rugby, was the lack of co-operation between the governing bodies of rugby and football. It was a shame that the two parties couldn't have got together for the betterment of both sports, and ensured that matches did not clash.

We went to Grimsby, who suffered a drop of almost 3,000 on their average home gate, as people stayed at home watch the rugby television, and it was the same story the country over. Why could the rugby final not have been played on a Sunday, in common with most of the other major sporting events in the world. The grand prix are all held on Sundays, as are the Wimbledon mens final, and the final day of all the major golf championships. All happened last week was that rugby missed out on the chance to screen their showpiece to all the football fans, as well as people who, work, play sport, or have other things to do. And in the meantime, the game of football just lost a lot of money that it could ill afford to do.

we went out for the ZDS Cup on penalties at Cambridge and out of the Rumbelows League Cup at Norwich. Our first Saturday fixture in October resulted in a 2-0 success at Leicester, which we followed with two successive home victories, over Bristol Rovers and Brighton. The 2-1 victory at Oxford was our fifth in succession, and had we won by two clear goals, we would have gone to the top of the League. The goal we conceded at Oxford was our first in five games. 

SPRINT CHALLENGE

The race is on to find the fastest footballer in the four divisions. The Rumbelows Sprint Challenge will determine who is the quickest player over 100 metres in the League. Every team has nominated their fastest player and all the competitors will go into six regionalised heats. Each heat will be split into two rounds of eight teams and the fastest four from each heat will go through to the final on the same day. The first two finalists from each regional final will then qualify for the grand final at Wembley, which will be held prior to the Rumbelows Cup Final in April, and there will also be places at Wembley for the four fastest losers from any of the heats. The French Connection

Hoddle brings the continental style to Swindon


In playing terms, when it comes to pedigree, they don't come much better than Glenn Hoddle. Capped by England on 53 occasions in a marvellous 12-year spell with Spurs that includes numerous Wembley appearances in FA and League Cup finals as well as the Charity Shield. and perhaps more importantly. thousands of admirers throughout the land. Hoddle's exceptional ability was capable of packing football grounds with expectant fans, all of whom were aware that one pass might change the course of the game. And he left us with some memorable goals too, with volleys against Manchester United and Nottingham Forest springing immediately to mind, and his last goal for Spurs against Oxford shouldn't be forgotten either.

Indeed, as a player, there were few who could compare with Glenn Hoddle, but in managerial terms, he's very much the novice. It came as something of a surprise when

Swindon appointed him as their new manager following the shock departure of Ossie Ardiles last March, but Hoddle and John Gorman took over with eight games of the season remaining and survived the drop into Division Three by virtue of just two points. This season. however. Hoddle's Swindon side established themselves as credible promotion contenders, with a string of impressive performances, so what has made the difference?

"To be fair last year was always going to be hard after what had happened when the club won the play off final", said the Swindon boss. "Psychologically the players, spectators and everyone else at the club were feeling down. We've transformed the club, both on and off the pitch. The mood has changed a lot now, both myself and John Gorman are new, as are the board and the chairman. Everything has changed completely and the players are enjoying the system that we're playing."



That would certainly appear to be the case if Swindon's results are anything to go by. So far this season they have rarely been out of the top six, and have some impressive scalps to show for their good early season form. Sunderland were beaten 5-3 at the County Ground in a repeat of that controversial play off, and Swindon also won 4-0 at Plymouth. However, perhaps their performance of the season came in the game at Portman Road, as Ipswich were defeated 4-1.

"We've produced some great performances and we've managed to put the ball in the back of the net as well", said Hoddle. "The results have gone with the performances and at this moment in time we're quite happy. We're aware that we've got to keep churning out the performances, but there's a long way to go".

Swindon's cause is clearly aided by the deadly duo of Duncan Shearer and Steve White up front. Between them. Town's main strikers have already hit the target on 23 occasions this season. According to their manager that is a direct result of the all round Swindon play.

"With the ability that we've got in the side - we're a good passing team with a lot of creative players - they are going to get their fair share of chances", said the former Spurs and Monaco midfielder. "At the moment, they're not taking them all, but they are certainly converting a large quota. Of the chances they have had, threequarters have ended up in the net, and no matter how much good play goes on, it's goals that count."

And those goals have propelled the Wiltshire club into the thick of a promotion race that they thought they had won two seasons ago. When they beat Sunderland 1-0 at Wembley, it looked as if Swindon would rise into the First Division for the first time in their history. But it was not to be, as the club were found guilty of financial irregularities, and were demoted to Division Three. The town turned out in force to protest, with over 30,000 taking part in a rally, and as a result Swindon were reinstated into Division Two, while Sunderland went up in their place. Having been denied their opportunity to compete at the highest level, Swindon set about repeating the

trick last season, beginning with a 2-1 success over us at Selhurst, and although in fourth place in mid September they were unable to maintain their challenge, and finished the season clinging on to their Second Division place.

But this season, it's all change at the County Ground. The cloud of despondency has been replaced with a mood of optimism as their new boss sets about his task with vigour.

And neither should it be forgotten that Hoddle is still playing, in a new sweeper's role, and producing the sort of form that has led to a call for him to return to the international scene. But has it been difficult to adjust from the type of football he played in France to the hustle and bustle of the Second Division? "It's been fine", he said. "I've had two years off and I wasn't sure whether I could get fit and play to a standard which would warrant a position in the team."

It would take an exceptional team to keep a player of Hoddle's calibre out of the starting line-up, but tonight he will be missing because of a hamstring injury. His absence doesn't seem to have affected his players, who come into tonight's game firmly entrenched in the scrap for promotion.

"There's a good feeling about the place at the moment, but we must keep working hard", said the Swindon chief. "You can't just put the team out very week and expect a result. We must be professional and continue to apply ourselves, and if we do that, we'll be very close."

Glenn Hoddle was a star of the First Division for many years in the Spurs team, and now as player-manager of Swindon Town, there must be every chance that he'll do so again.

The Premier League will undoubtedly be richer for his presence.


STAR MAN MICKY HAZARD

Paddy's Field Day

Swindon visited The Valley just over seventeen years ago, for a Third Division fixture on 21st September 1974. Under new manager Andy Nelson, Charlton had made a solid start, collecting seven points from their opening six games, while Swindon had eight points from seven games.

The skies had opened an hour before the kick-off and rain continued to lash down throughout the ninety minutes. An injury to Keith Peacock necessitated a Charlton reshuffle with Ray Tumbridge coming in at left-back for his first game of the season and Phil Warman taking Keith's number eleven shirt. Swindon were unchanged from the side which had won 3-2 at home to Aldershot in midweek.

The game was only four minutes old when Peter Eastoe, now manager of Alvechurch of the Beazer Homes League, put the visitors ahead. Charlton goalkeeper John Dunn failed to hold Terry Hubbard's shot and Eastoe fired in the rebound which Dunn again beat out only for Eastoe to net at his second attempt. Charlton hit back and Horsfield saw his shot cleared for a corner. Derek Hales netted from a Dunphy cross, only for this effort to be ruled out for offside. and Richie Bowman almost punished Frank Burrows' slack back pass but Jim Barron came off his line to make a fine save.

Swindon had to bring on their

substitute, Hugh McLean, in place of the injured John McLeaghlin after twenty-four minutes but they went further ahead eight minutes before half-time when a long clearance out of defence eluded David Young and Bobby Goldthorpe, and Dave Syrett ran on to coolly slot the ball past Dunn. Charlton appeals for offside fell on deaf ears and half-time arrived with Swindon sitting comfortably on a 2-0 lead.

After the interval, Charlton showed a greater sense of urgency and within three minutes of the restart, they reduced the arrears. Derek Hales latched onto a long clearance cut into the box and beat two men before delivering a perfect pass which Paddy Powell sidefooted past Barron. Barely two minutes later, Charlton were level. Barron threw the ball out to Joe Butler but Arthur Horsfield nipped in to dispossess him. Butler then upended his former Swindon team-mate and referee Les Shapter awarded a penalty. Bobby Curtis duly stepped up to net his fourth penalty kick of the season.

Charlton continued to attack freely and they took the lead with their third goal in a ten minute spell when Hales and Powell combined once more. Again the usual roles were reversed with Hales setting up the chance and Paddy shooting home from eight yards. Impressive as this recovery had been, it was probably too early for Charlton's own good. In the final thirty minutes, Swindon battled hard to get back into the match. Dunn made fine saves from Syrett and Trollope and nine minutes from time. Dunphy hobbled off with a pulled muscle. Charlton were still reorganising their defence when substitute Mark Penfold conceded a free-kick just outside the area, but Joe Butler provided a great ball which enabled Eastoe to steal in and score his second, levelling the score at 3-3.

A fair result, certainly, if a little harsh on the two-goal Powell, who had produced some dazzling dribbling skills on a surface more suited to ducks than footballers!



However, the flight is now full, so anyone wishing to go would have to go on the waiting list.

Details of more conventional travel to Ayresome Park will be announced in the programme for the Blackburn game on Saturday.

MAKING WAVES

At half past seven on Sunday 18th August this year Mark Mansfield and I had our third shock of the weekend. The first two had taken place earlier when we had found ourselves at Upton Park as home supporters, and then had seen Charlton see off much-fancied Newcastle. Now found We ourselves producing and presenting a live radio programme.

The programme was the first "Beautiful Game" on RTM. We had not expected to be on air so quickly, and certainly not in person. But we had a belief about the kind of service Charlton supporters should expect from the media; and we were simply carrying on the recent tradition of Charlton supporters which spawned the Valley Party, namely that if other people won't do what they should for Charlton, we'll do it ourselves.

Like most Charlton supporters we'd spend a lot of time crying into our beer about the media's apathy towards Charlton. We'd observed the arrival of Capital Gold Sport and the galvanising effect it had on the other radio stations, and we'd shared that feeling of humiliation as we grovelled in front of the radio hoping that our beloved team would get a mention alongside Arsenal, Spurs, Chelsea and the rest.


Last season we ran questionnaire in "Voice of the Valley" and amongst other things we asked about interest in a radio station dedicated to Charlton. This received strong support, but the idea of becoming Capital Gold Sport into the Valley did not. We'd asked the question because the club had realised how relatively inexpensive it is to put a lowpower radio station on air. But we argued that it was crazy for the club to involve itself in running a station when an ideal station

already existed — Radio Thamesmead.

What we wanted to offer was this, a Friday night preview, which whets the appetite and updates you on team news: a Sunday night "looking back" programme with considered reports, special guests of local interest - as pioneered so well by "Charlton Chat" - and a phone-in giving vou opportunity to air your views. But the jewel in the crown was Saturday afternoon. established that it would be perfectly feasible to have a studio at The Valley. So we'd offer live coverage of Charlton away games, and when Charlton played at home, we'd offer built-up coverage and post-match interviews with the men of the moment - but live commentary would be of Millwall, so as not to hit the Charlton gate.

Like the rest of our Valley dreams the studio is "on ice" and with it the chances of a sponsorship deal to pay for the studio. But we've managed to bring live coverage from Leicester and Southend which was widely praised; and it was the "Beautiful Game" who persuaded Southend police to delay the kick-off, since we were on the spot at Rayleigh Weir. When the Sunday show started we had no guests and we think some people may have found our abrasive newsy approach a bit uncomfortable, but we hope the introduction of guests corrected that. So far we've had Kevin Nolan, Alan Mullery and



Andy Peake, and more recently Scott Minto and Carl Leaburn together which was great fun, and a most interesting discussion with John Cartwright. Future guests will continue the mix of club personalities and football experts.

Audience research is taking place now, and we know that many Charlton supporters can't get good reception. RTM are working on it, so bear with us. The other big problem is lack of sponsorship because of the "Valley" situation. This immediately threatens the live away coverage because we have to pay for the telephones. So in order to continue the live coverage we're looking for sponsors for any of the upcoming away games. For as little as £100 your company will be in regularly mentioned broadcast, which will be listened to by an audience which is young, upmarket and high earning.

Like those at The Valley we hope these problems will be ironed out soon, and we'll be looking to improve constantly programmes so that it will grow into a service which gives you all the information you get from the bigger stations, plus much more news about Charlton and the opportunity to talk about the issues which affect Charlton supporters, and we aim to give it a style which is uniquely South-East London. If you're 'in range' give it a try. After all why listen to an Arsenal report when it's Charlton you want to

hear about?

The support at Southend was tremendous with well over 2,000 fans at the game and the players certainly appreciated the encouragement they received.


Tonight's game against Swindon Town will test us to the full as they are one of the

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

STEVE GATTING

The best is yet to come

When Steve Gatting signed for Charlton five days before the start of the season there were raised eyebrows amongst certain sections of the Charlton faithful, who questioned the wisdom of a 32-year-old free transfer player, particularly as we didn't appear to need a left back, and that is where Steve played for Brighton for most of last season.

However, all became clear on the opening Sunday of the season, as Steve slotted into the sweepers role against Newcastle, playing alongside Darren Pitcher, who had expected to be at right back, and Steve Gritt, who hadn't expected to play at all.

You certainly wouldn't have guessed that there was any uncertainty in the ranks judging by the performance, and in Steve Gattings's case, that game against much-fancied Newcastle has simply set the standards for what we have seen since — efficient, assured and consistent displays at the heart of

the Charlton defence, week in, week out.

Steve began his career at Highbury, but soon moved to the south coast to join Brighton where he made over 300 League appearances, and had a testimonial last year. He also played in both Wembley games in 1983 when Albion lost the FA Cup final to Manchester United after a replay, and was in the team that was beaten 3-1 at Wembley last year by Notts County in the play off final.


So after such a successful spell with the Seagulls, how did he come to sign for Charlton?

"They gave me a free transfer, so I was looking for a club", explained Steve. "Alan actually called me during the close season and said that he might get the job, and if he did, would I be interested? Time went on and nothing happened but Alan and Steve came in for me a week before the season started."

Of course, Steve wasn't the only player to leave the Goldstone Ground for Sparrows Lane that week. Within two days of him putting pen to paper, he was joined at the club by Albion colleague Garry Nelson, who had found himself out of favour with Albion boss Barry Lloyd. So it wasn't going to be difficult for Steve to settle in.

"Obviously it's helped as I know Alan and Garry well, and I know Steve from watching cricket down at Hove", said the former Arsenal player. "Although football clubs are quite easy in general to settle down in. Perhaps looking back I should have moved from Brighton earlier as ten years at one club is a long time, and it would have been nice to have played for a couple of different clubs."

Charlton are Steve's third club, and after just 20 games for his new side, he finds himself in a team among the front-runners in the division. Steve played against us

three times last season, and each time finished on the winning team. So is he surprised that things have gone so well initially?

"Obviously when you first come to a club you don't know anything about them", said Steve. "I played against Charlton last year and I know that they struggled for the early part of last season before putting a good run together, but I just came here hoping for good things, there are some good players here, and it was just a question of whether we'd have enough confidence." There can be no doubts that confidence has been high this season, but, according to Steve, that's all down to getting a good

"No matter who you are, you need a good start. We've done that and confidence is high", he said. "Everyone believes in the team and it's going well. The hard things to do now is stay there."

And if we are to stay in the top six, there can be no tougher period than the next four games. We take on Swindon tonight and Blackburn on Saturday before making the long journey to Middlesbrough. And the next game after that is here against Cambridge.

But Steve doesn't necessarily feel that this period means make or break for Charlton's season.

"It wouldn't be a tragedy if we didn't win all the games", he said. "As long as we keep winning the games against the sides lower down the table we'll be ok. It's easy enough to raise your game for the top teams, but it's a long season and we just need to carry on as we've done already."

If the lads can keep up their present form, there's no telling what the club can achieve this season, but no-one is yet making any rash predictions.

"I'm sure that people are thinking of what we could do, simply because of the quality of the teams we've played against. We're obviously as good or better than most of the teams in the Second Division on our present form", Steve said.


"Perhaps if we're still in the top six by the new year then people will start to talk."

No doubt everybody else at the club, as well as the fans and the press will be talking long before them, and the chances must be that there will be some fairly tense games up ahead. Therefore it's just as well that we can count on the cool head of Steve Gatting, when it starts to get frantic.

He is undoubtedly reluctant to tempt fate by foretelling what might happen, but behind the unruffled personality there is a quiet determination to make sure that this is our year.

"I think it's unwise to talk about targets in football, because you always get let down" he said. "I think we just have to keep going the way we have done so are. There will be disappointments along the way—every team has them, but it's how quickly we get over them that counts. I'm sure if we keep our heads we'll be there or thereabouts at the end of the season."





Glasgow born Jim was a Scottish schoolboy international who joined Partick Thistle from Eastercraigs F.C. in 1975. He made his debut for Partick in September 1975, ten days before his seventeenth birthday, and soon gained a reputation as a dangerous striker. Eight Scottish U21 caps came his way along with selection for the Scottish League team to play the Irish League in March 1980.

Leicester City eventually brought him south of the border in July 1980, equalling their record fee of £250,000. Andy Peake was in that Leicester team and although they achieved some notable victories over the top sides in Division One, they were still relegated in 1981. In September 1982, Jim found himself back in Division One with Coventry in exchange for Tom English. Again his stay was short, for Celtic paid £100,000 in August 1983 to Celtic paid £100,000 in August 1983 to take him back to Glasgow where he won runners-up medals in both the Scottish League Cup and F.A. Cup.

English football had not seen the last of this talented forward however, and a brief loan spell at Wolves in September 1984 was followed by a permanent (a misnomer in Jim's case) move to Manchester City for £40,000 two months later. City were pushing for promotion to Division One and Jim scored some vital goals to help them achieve their target during his first season there.

The following season found him unable to command a regular place at Maine Road, and he was on the move again in March 1986 to bolster another promotion bid. This time it was here at Charlton, and Lennie's £45.000 signing proved to be one of his most inspired. Not only did Jim score five vital goals to clinch a return to the First Division after an absence of 29 years, he also netted 17 goals the following season to keep us there. Fourteen goals were in the League, including a hat-trick against Everton, and



the other three came in the play-offs against Ipswich and Leeds. Jim recalled, "At the end of that season I'd caught a virus through all the driving and so forth and I'd missed a few games. The doctor had told me that my season was over. I came back against QPR and lasted 60 minutes, then in the games against Ipswich I scored the two goals and then got the winner against Leeds in the first leg, but after that I was gone."

"It was a good time for Charlton and for me" he continued. "It was a good club and everybody got on, we all pulled together so I was obviously happy. It's the same about my time at Leicester, which I remember, but I tend to put my spell at Celtic to the back of my mind because I had such a horrendous time there."

In September 1987, Jim moved to Leeds for £50,000 but he never settled there and a further move to Shrewsbury in March 1988 for a similar fee proved to be his League swansong, he finally retired in 1990. Macclesfield and Curzon Athletic have both benefited from his experience at non-League level since, but Jim is now back in Scotland working for himself as an insurance broker.

Looking back, he has fond memories of his time with us. "I enjoyed my time at Charlton," he said "I had a great gaffer in Lennie. We had a rapport. It was only due to me being unable to sell my house in Macclesfield that led to me leaving. I had a fabulous time, you only need to look at the number of goals that I scored in the time that I was there, but I think Lennie summed it up when he said 'Jim's his own man'. If the Charlton fans enjoyed watching me half as much as I enjoyed playing for them, then I'd be dead chuffed."

Consider yourself 'chuffed' Jim.

Flash Back



The splendid October run of six straight wins (four League, two Cup) had been ended by Charlton's 2-0 home defeat by

Arsenal on 1st November, and prior to that match Lennie Lawrence had received his 'Manager of the Month' award. On 4th November, Charlton played Birmingham at Selhurst Park in the second round of the Full Members Cup. Charlton won 3-2 with goals from Beggs (on his only senior appearance), Gritt and Lee but it was the gate of just 821, rather than the match itself, which proved the talking point. On the following day, Messrs. Collins and Norris met a delegation from Greenwich Council and a statement expressing a desire for the club to return to the borough, if not necessarily The Valley, is released.

In Division Three, Swindon lost 2-1 at home to Bristal Rovers, Jimmy Gilligan scoring their goal after Trevor Morgan had struck twice for Rovers.



Charlton slumped to their second home League defeat of the season, losing 4-1 at home to Leicester. Jim Melrose

put the visitors ahead after thirty-one minutes with a low shot from the edge of the box but three minutes before half-time, Derek Hales shrugged off Geoff Scott's challenge and crossed low for Paul Walsh to flick home. The turning point of the game came after seventyseven minutes. Charlton substitute Phil Ferns gave the ball away in the area and Paul Elliott tripped Gary Lineker for an obvious penalty which Steve Lynex converted. In the final ten minutes Charlton threw caution to the wind and Gary Lineker took advantage, scoring in the eighty-second and eight-third minutes. "The score flattered them a bit. The last two goals were down to me because I told Paul Elliott to push up, leaving us exposed at the back", commented Charlton boss Alan Mullery.

Swindon also lost at home, 2-1 to Millwall in a Third Division clash, Andy Rowland scoring their goal with Nicky Chatterton and Austin Hayes replaying for the Lions.




Charlton enjoyed their second away win of the season, a 2-1 victory at Luton. Mike Keen had given The Hatters an

interval lead but the complexion of the match changed completely, when Keith Peacock switch from the left to the right flank in the second half. First Peacock equalised from close range after Bobby Hunt had pulled the ball square across the face of goal and then he scored the winner, unusually, with a header from Ray Treacy's cross. "Charlton's magnificent fightback was sparked off by a brilliant display by Keith Peacock", commented Sam Bartram in The People.

That day Swindon drew 1-1 at Oxford. Colin Clarke, our former youth coach, scored a rare goal for the home side but Joe Butler scored Swindon's equaliser after the interval.


