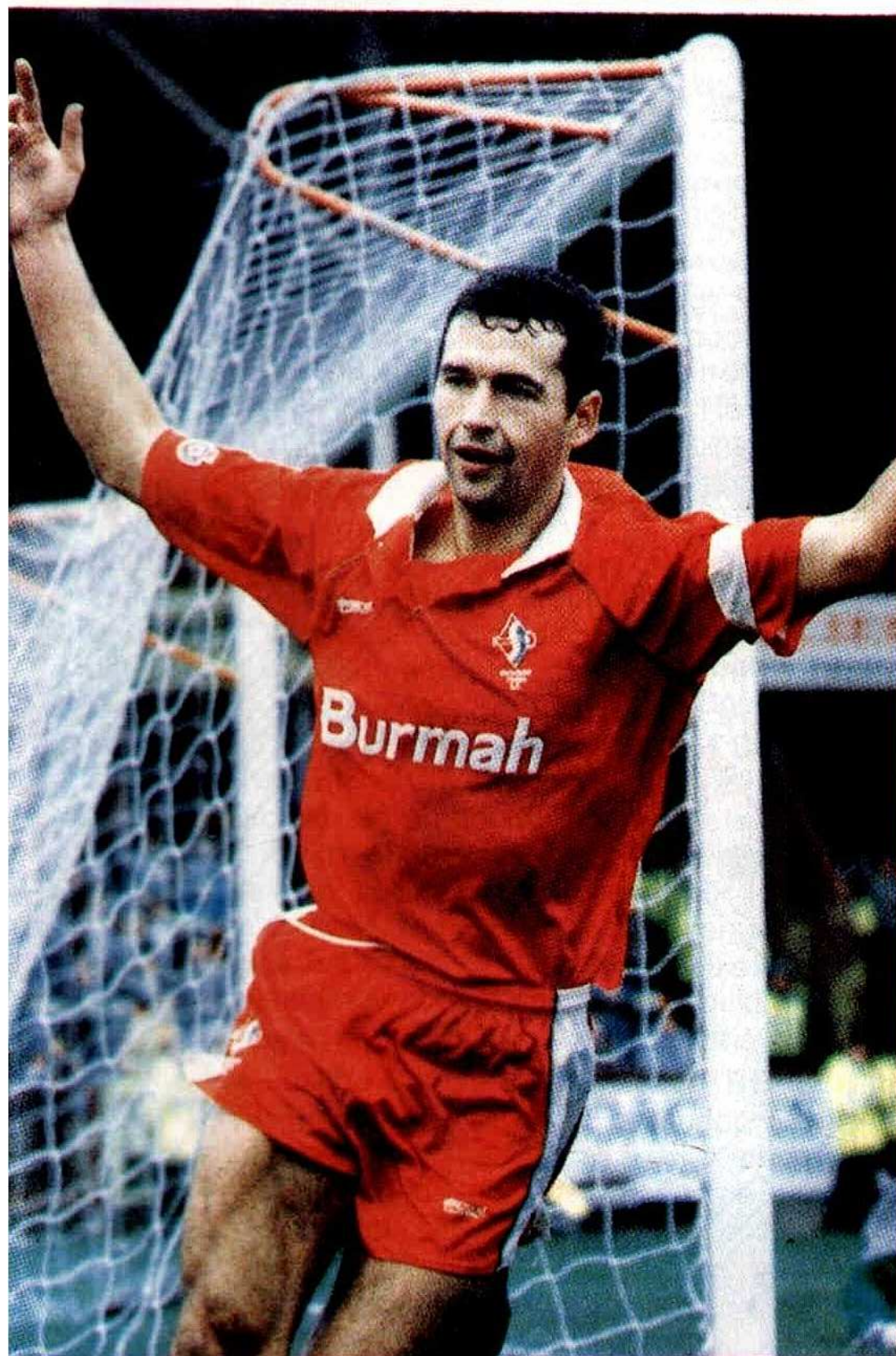

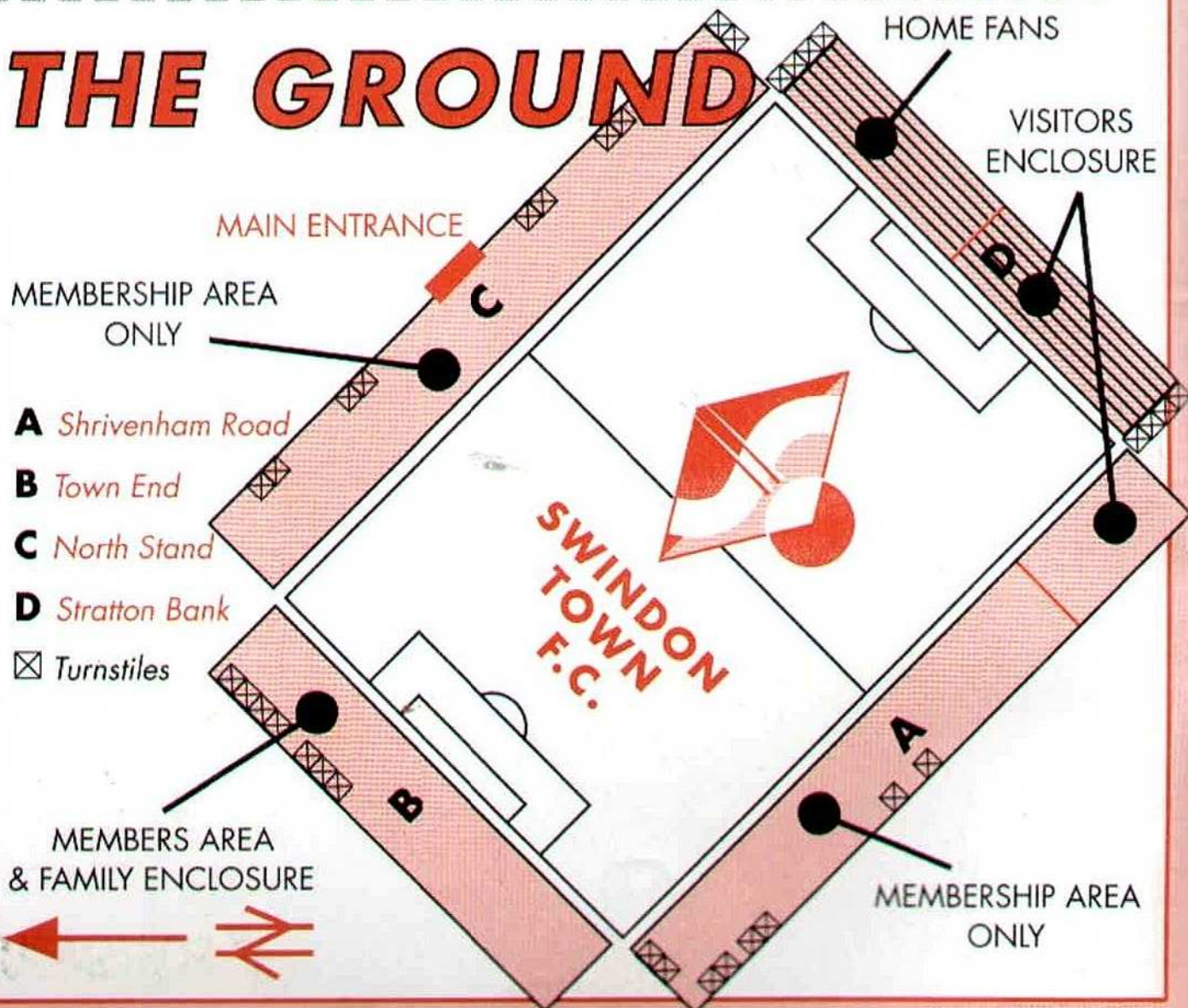

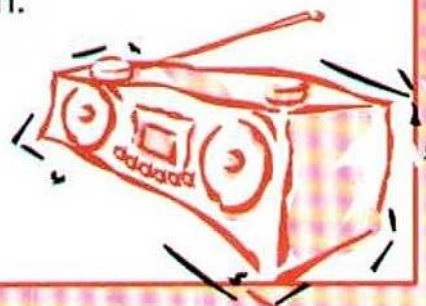

It has been a mixed bag of emotions and results since my last notes: with one win, one draw and one loss in that order.

The win, here against Newcastle United, was very gratifying and I think we were worthy victors on the day. But at Charlton we did not perform particularly well and were perhaps a little fortunate to get a point at the end.

In fairness to Charlton they did a good job on us and stopped us playing - all credit to them for that - but I feel they were so intent on stopping us that they strangled their own attacking aspirations and consequently surrendered the points.

That point was good enough to put us on top of the Second Division none the less and though we were only there for a few days it gives us great hope for the future.

The game at Southend was a mixture for us. I was quite impressed by the quality of their game but disappointed that we didn't start to play until we were a goal down. Once we stepped up gear we were the better side and could have won it. In the end we were very unfortunate not to at least get a point.

It was another good lesson for us. At half-time John and I questioned whether the lads believed enough in themselves. They went out and showed us in the second half that they did. It took character to turn the match around. It isn't easy away from home, particularly against a hard-working side like Southend. But there was lots of steel and character in that second-half performance.

So our stay on the top was brief but we have games in hand and we know we have the ability to be there which is something to work at. We are not too surprised by events. It is impossible to keep churning out top performances week after week the way we play. But if you can pick up points when you are not on song - as we did against Charlton - it is very encouraging.

Today's match with Portsmouth is very important for us. The fortunate thing so far this season is that we have bounced back from all our defeats

with a good win. In the context of this scenario today's performance, and result, will be significant to our potential.

Our plans have needed to be reshaped because of the unfortunate injury to Shaun Taylor. His Achilles Tendon has been very sore and as a precaution he has had the injury put in plaster. We hope this will avert a long-term injury but in the meantime Shaun will not be available for this afternoon's game so we have had to make changes.

Another worry this week concerned goalkeeper Nicky Hammond who had X-rays on a rib injury and Tom Jones went down with swollen glands. On a brighter note Martin Ling made a reserve team comeback this week and David Mitchell is kicking a ball again and hopes to have a run-out in the reserves this coming week.

As for myself I put the boots on again at White Hart Lane last Sunday for a very special cause, the Cyril Knowles Benefit match. It was fantastic to see all the lads again but it brought very mixed emotions being such a sad occasion. But everybody turned out which was a great tribute to Cyril.

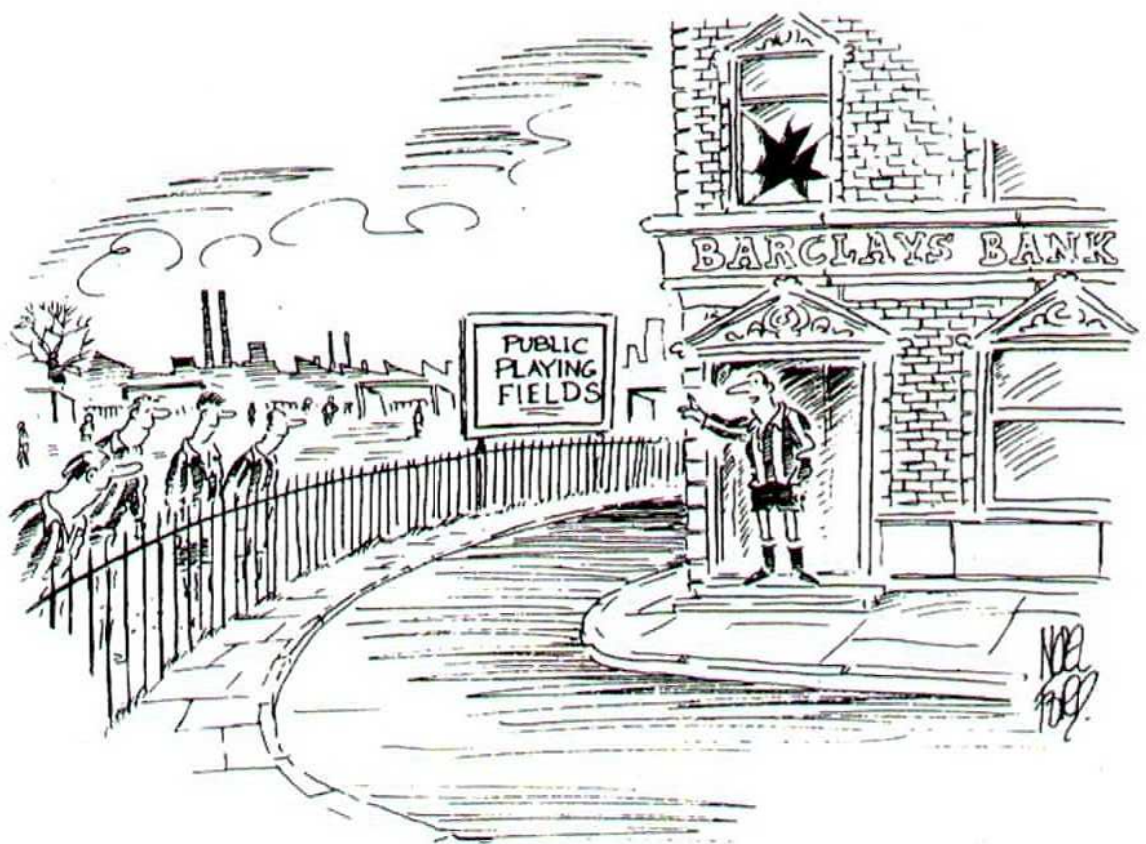
Unfortunately, the game proved that my injury is not sufficiently healed for me to return to competitive football just yet. So it is back to the treatment table.

Hopefully our injury problems will soon be cleared. In the meantime the lads, I'm sure will show what they are made of as we try to maintain our challenge in Division Two and look forward to more cup action in the Rumbelows League Cup.

# NEWS

Cambridge United top the Second Division after earning a 2-1 victory at neighbours Ipswich Town last Saturday in front of 20,586 fans - Town's best gate since the visit of West Ham in 1989.

Cambridge boss, John Beck, was not pleased however with his side's performance. "In general play, I thought Ipswich were by far the better side. I know if we play like that for a season, we definitely will not be going up." The game was a landmark for former Scottish International John Wark, who was playing his 500th game for Ipswich. John Lyall, who signed Wark from Middlesbrough in the summer, has nothing but praise for his 34 year-old defender. "John has been an excellent servant to the Club over three spells at Portman Road and his average of one goal every three games is quite unique for a man who has spent the vast majority of his career in midfield or at the back."

Portsmouth Manager, Jim Smith, believes he has a star in the making in 19 year-old sweeper Andy Awford, who has been called up to the England U21 squad. Smith says of his player, "To be honest, I look at Andy and see shades of Bobby Moore and Colin Todd. He really does have the potential to be that good and to go all the way. I've played him as a sweeper this season and I believe that's the boy's best role." Awford is keeping his feet firmly on the ground, "I needed a smaller club because I felt I would have a better chance of breaking through. I mean it when I say I'm happy to stay at Portsmouth and let my game develop. If I can help them into the Premier League, that will be marvellous, as I'm not hankering after the big city life just yet."

Other Second Division players to receive call-ups to the England U21 squad were David James (Watford), Alan Wright (Blackburn), Paul Williams (Derby), Paul Kitson (Leicester) and Brian Atkinson (Sunderland).

Wolves Manager, Graham Turner, is under increasing pressure following his side's 3-2 defeat by Derby at Molineux last Saturday, which stretches his side's run without a win to ten games. Stuck for cash, Turner has signed Aston Villa defender, Derek Mountfield, on a month's loan. Mountfield joined Villa for £400,000 from Everton in 1988, but has been unable to command a First Team place since the arrival of Ron Atkinson during the summer. To add to Turner's problems, centre back Lawrie Madden was sent off against Derby and faces an automatic suspension.

Plymouth Manager, David Kemp, has signed Notts County striker Dave Regis for a fee in the region of £200,000. Regis, who signed for Notts from Barnet in September 1990, scored 15 goals in 26 appearances last season for County as they won promotion to the First Division. Kemp has also signed Crystal Palace defender Jeff Hopkins on a month's loan and believes his team can meet the challenge ahead of them. "We lost only three home games all last season but this season we have lost three already. The fear factor has gone a little bit and the only way to get it back is to start performing as we can again. Our home performances have been poor but a football club is such a fragile thing and there has been too much politics and not enough football recently. This Club is suffering but we are capable of getting it back, especially when some new players arrive to boost everybody."

Brighton Manager, Barry Lloyd, has invested £45,000 in Maidstone's 28 year-old striker Mark Gall as replacement for John Byrne, who recently signed for Sunderland. Gall, who netted in the Seagull's 1-1 draw with Middlesboro' last weekend, scored 31 goals in 90 appearances for the Stones and should form a fine front line with Robert Codner and Raphael Meade. Manager Lloyd, however, wants points not goals. "If goals mean entertainment, then few who have seen our recent games can be disappointed. However, we wouldn't mind being a little less entertaining if it meant having a few more points in the bag."

Watford are hoping to complete the signing of West Ham striker Leroy Rosenior. The Clubs have agreed a fee of £100,000 for the 27 year-old forward, although a medical is no formality. Rosenior began his career at Fulham and joined QPR after only 54 games. He rejoined Fulham after a brief spell at Loftus Road but has only played 44 games for the Hammers due to injury problems.

## FISHING FOR POINTS

Grimsby Town, the third of the promoted sides from Division Three last season, have made ripples rather than waves after successive promotions from Division Four to Division Two.

Founded as Grimsby Pelham in 1878, the Mariners have participated in all four divisions of the Football League but the thirties produced their greatest moments.

Grimsby finished fifth in Division One in 1935 and reached the semi-final of the FA Cup in 1939 but they have not participated in the top league since 1948; and 20 years on found themselves battling in Division Four. Even worse they had to apply for re-election at the end of their first campaign at that level.

After successive promotions in 1979 and 1980 Grimsby looked set to make a third dramatic jump into Division One in 1981. Alas the challenge fell away in the closing weeks and the Mariners finished seventh.

So far there has been no suggestion that they will mount a similar challenge this season but then at this stage of the game two years ago there was no hint of the success to come. Grimsby were as low as 17th that November then lost only four of their last 31 games in Division Four!

Midfielder David Gilbert and Neil Woods were the Mariners joint leading scorers last season with

13 goals each and both are on the goal trail once again. But look out too for former Nottingham Forest and England hit-man Garry Birtles who now operates in midfield.

Another midfielder, Murray Jones, was a team mate of Shaun Taylor at Exeter last season, and both played in a 2-1 defeat at Grimsby in the final fixture of the season.

There have been no half measures about the Mariners away performances this season, they either win or lose. Their three victories were recorded at Sunderland (2-1); Oxford United (2-1) and Bristol Rovers (3-2).

Last Saturday's 2-0 defeat at Newcastle United was the club's 3,600th League game. But how will they get on against Swindon Town?

Make a date with us on Saturday 30th November to find out. Can the Robins get the better of former Watford custodian Steve Sherwood?

Can the Mariners set course for victory or will Glenn Hoddle mastermind another stylish victory?

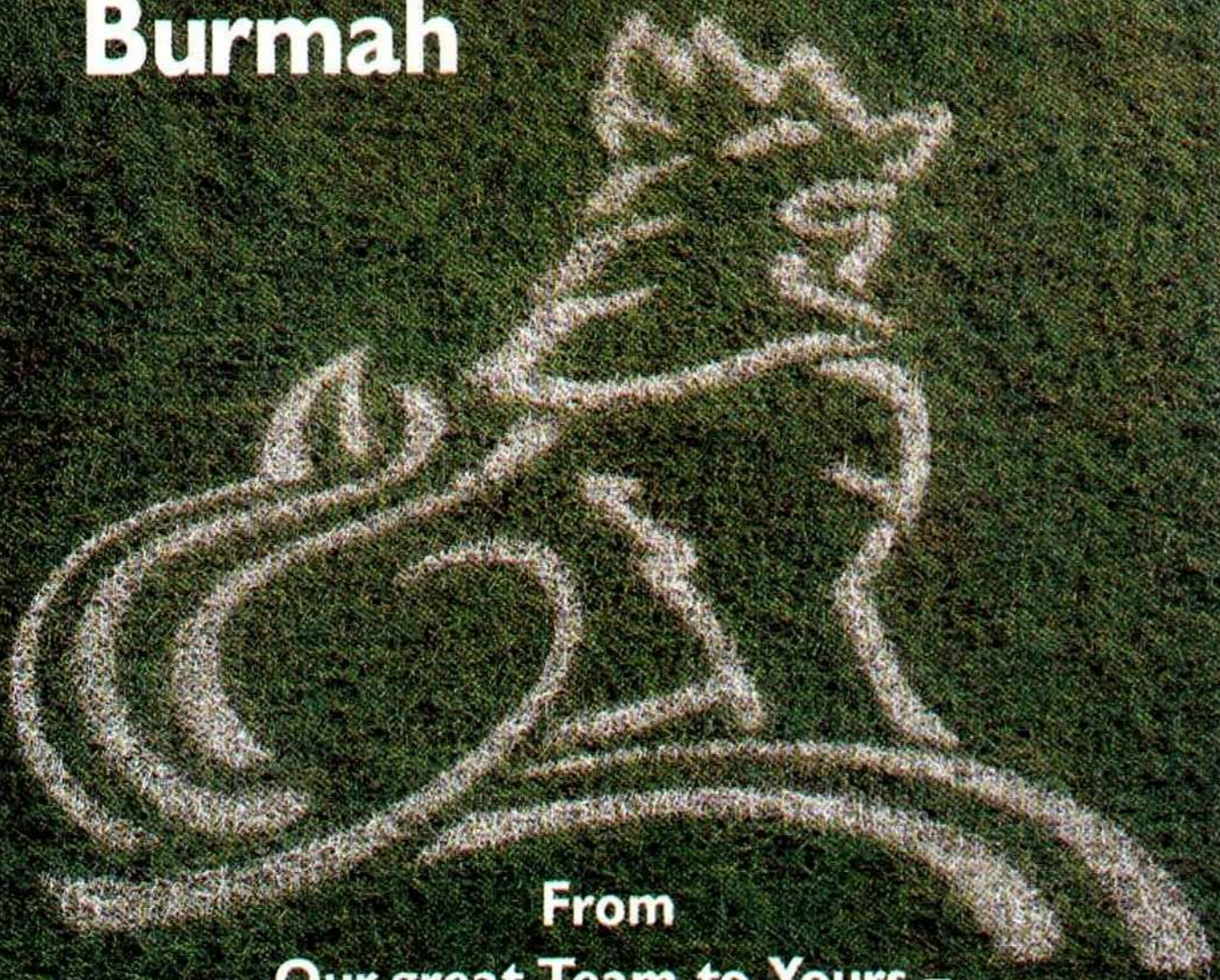

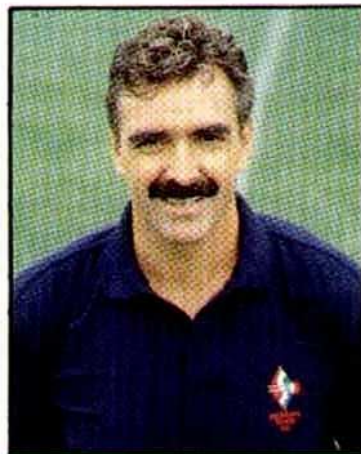

Watching Sky Sports the other day was interesting - all the comments about improving football by possibly changing the rules. Glenn and I feel very strongly about our style, and feel that some

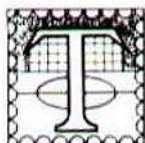
suggestions made about stopping the back pass would be bad for the game because it would encourage teams just to kick it long to safety. We only pass it back to try and change the play - and play from the back through midfield.

I played in the States when the 35 yard line was used and loved it. Offside was seldom used and the game was very open. It is a pity FIFA made us change the rule. They also played every game until a winner was established. Sudden death - extra time followed by a shoot-out, one-on-one from the 35 yard line with the keeper, with five seconds to score. It all added up to an exciting game as there had to be a winner on the night in every game. No-one came for a draw. These would be the only real changes we would like. It is frustrating when teams play a rigid offside game but, hopefully, skill will win in these circumstances, as it is a dodgy game to try near the half way line.

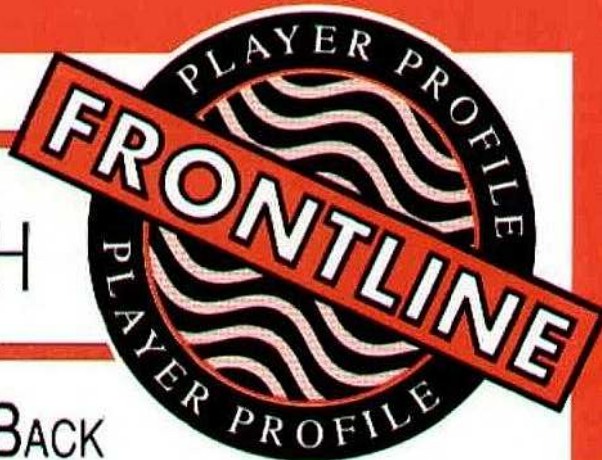

## ADRIAN HAS OVERCOME THE SET-BACK

There is nothing that pleases the provincial press more than a local boy makes good story. So when Adrian stripped off to make his debut as a substitute in Town's home game with Middlesbrough, in September 1990, the script seemed perfect.

But what should have been Adrian's dream fulfilled turned into a haunting nightmare when 20-minutes later Ossie Ardiles called him off and sent Nicky Summerbee on instead.

"I was gutted," confesses the former Swindon Boys star. "It was not only the humiliation with all my family and friends sat in the stand but it dragged on for days. The local paper made a big thing out of it.

"Days later I still couldn't believe it had happened to me. People were saying it was the end of my career as a professional footballer but I did not believe it to be so. Ossie had thrown me on as a left sided midfielder and I felt out of place.

"It was a shock to the ego though . . . It wasn't until later in the season when he did the same thing to Micky Hazard that I realised it had not been such a big deal. That was Ossie, always a split decision maker, who would do anything to try and change the state of a game."

Adrian is pleased he has been able to prove a few folks wrong as he is very much part of Town's current success. He might not be able to command a regular berth in the opening line-up but as he says: "I have no complaints.

"My best position is in the centre of the defence and it is no disgrace to be playing second-fiddle to Colin Calderwood and Shaun Taylor. It is just unfortunate for me that they are the two most consistent performers in the side and I have a lot of respect for them.

"Colin seems to get better and better every time he takes the field and Shaun has been a revelation. They are superb and I get on well with both of them."

Even though the competition for those central defensive shirts couldn't be tougher Adrian has no reservations or misgivings about his role, even though he arrived here as a centre-forward. Says Adrian: "As a kid with Brinkworth and

Wroughton I played up front and that was my position when I joined Swindon on Schoolboy forms. I scored 13 goals in my first season here as a centre-forward and 12 the following year as a left-winger. Then I was played in midfield.

"It was Ossie who suggested I try centre-half. I was not too sure I could make the adjustment but I did and now recognise this as my best position. It changed the game round for me. Facing the play I find it easier and as I got taller, and taller, it came naturally."

Born in Wootton Bassett, the son of an engineer, Adrian's first recollections of the County Ground come from the North Stand where he watched Town struggle in Division Four. He says: "The players who caught my attention were Jim Reynolds and Mark Gardiner but all I can really remember is the ground being really empty. It is the other side of the coin now thankfully.

"It was Lou Macari who signed me as a professional. A strange man but he was all right to me. He has his own views on football and a lot of people didn't like him but few will deny that he didn't influence their careers."

Though there is no direct family connection with pro - football, his dad was more of a runner than a ball-game man - Adrian's uncle Terry Wollen, and cousin, Andy Wollen, are former Town professionals; and his brother, Mark, plays in the local game.

"I just consider myself lucky to be in the squad," he smiles warmly. "None of the lads I started with are still in the game at this level so I am fortunate. The fans gave me a good reception when I made my first full appearance against Darlington last season in the League Cup. I think they felt for me.

"I think Swindon will achieve success and it is nice to be part of it. But I shall just have to wait and see if I figure in future plans or not. I hope I do."

At 22, 'Adie' has his career before him. That, 'local boy makes good' headline will surely be retold.

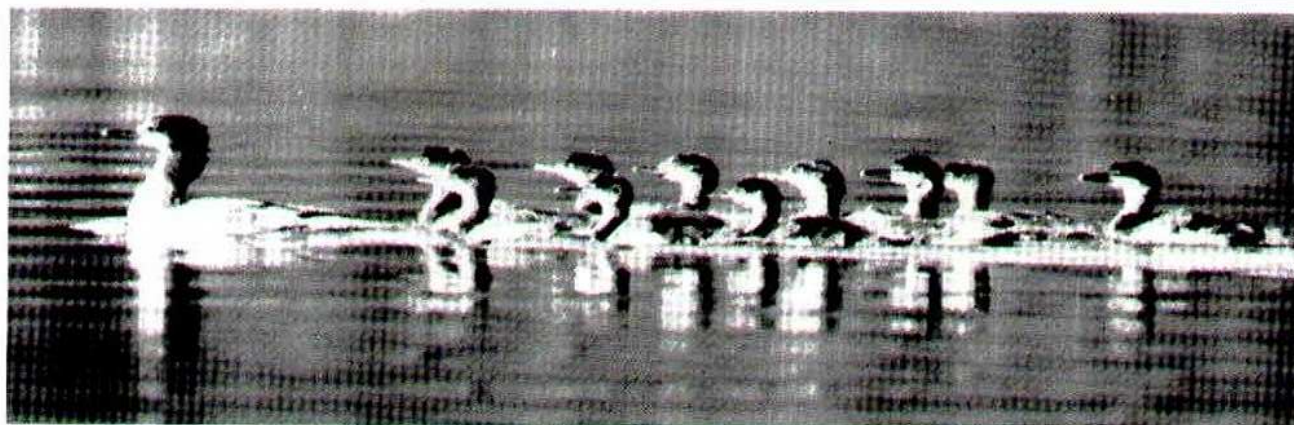

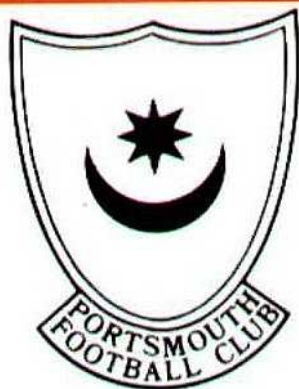

# A VERY WARM *Welcome* TO PORTSMOUTH

## POMPEY CHIMES LOUD

It took former England captain Bryan Robson and aspiring young striker Mark Robins to kill off the spirited Rumbelows League Cup challenge of Portsmouth at Old Trafford.

Manchester United were second best to Jim Smith's potential giant-killers until Robson and Robins were hauled off the subs bench to inspire a United victory. It was Robson who set up Robins for the opening goal but even then Pompey replied within two minutes through **John Beresford**.

Robson was on hand to restore United's lead and a third goal, in the dying seconds, from Robins, was cruel luck for Portsmouth who would not have been flattered by a draw.

Such is the quality of **Jim Smith's** refashioned side which could emerge as the surprise element in the final promotion stakes.

Mr Smith has forged a nice blend of youth and experience and, on their day, this Portsmouth side can match the very best.

In goal, 28-year old **Andy Gosney** makes a rare appearance, following injury to **Alan Knight**, in front of a settled back four of; **Kit Symons** and **Guy Butters** flanked by the impressive **Andy Awford** and **John Beresford**. **Chris Burns**, **Martin Kuhl** and **Steve Wigley** provide the industry in midfield with teenage wingers **Darren Anderton** and **Darryl Powell** supplying an imaginative alternative on the flanks.

**Anderton**, 19, has been particularly effective away from home, scoring in the 1-1 draw at Blackburn on the opening day of the season; at Gillingham in the Rumbelows League Cup, and at Millwall a fortnight ago where again his goal proved a point winner in a 1-1 draw.

When it comes to creativity, Portsmouth also have the magical genius of former England winger **Mark Chamberlain** to call upon. Mark, who was 30 five days ago, is assuming the tag of 'super-sub', having come off the bench four or five times to turn games to Pompey's advantage.

If there is a flaw in this Portsmouth side it is their scoring ability. Last season **Colin Clarke** and **Guy Whittingham** netted 37 goals between them. This season, Clarke has three to his name while Whittingham scored his first against Leicester last week.

## THE ABC OF PORTSMOUTH

**DARREN ANDERTON** - Winger. Has been connected with the club since he was 13. Made his debut (9.10.90) in a Rumbelows League Cup tie with Cardiff City and made his League the following month v Wolves. Born: Southampton 3.3.72.

**WARREN ASPINALL** - Forward. Was Pompey's most expensive signing when he arrived from Aston Villa for £315,000 in August 1988. Began his career at Wigan and played for them on loan after transferring to Everton in 1985. An England Youth cap, Warren completed his first season at Fratton Park as second top scorer with 12 goals but has now been given a midfield role. Born: Wigan 13.9.67.

**ANDY AWFORD** - Defender. Became the youngest ever to represent the club in the League when he made his debut at Crystal Palace (15.4.89), at just 16 years, 275 days. An outstanding defender, he was one of England's few successes in the Under-20 World Youth Championships Finals in Portugal last summer, scoring twice against Syria. Born: Worcester 14.7.72.

**JOHN BERESFORD** - Fullback. Began his apprenticeship with Manchester City as a midfielder. In 1986 he moved to Barnsley, making his League debut v Crystal Palace 23.8.86. At Oakwell he was drafted into defence and was the Barclays Young Northern Eagle of the month when he signed for Portsmouth in March 1989 for £300,000. Born: Sheffield 4.9.66.

**CHRISTOPHER BURNS** - Midfield. Signed from non-League Cheltenham in the summer, Chris was introduced to League football in the 1-1 draw at Blackburn on the opening day of the season. Registered his first goal in the 1-0 win over Sunderland (3.9.91). Born: Manchester 9.11.67.

**GUY BUTTERS** - Central Defender. Former England Youth international, he was a Trainee with Spurs. Made his bow at Blackburn in the League Cup (9.11.88) and had a spell on loan with Southend before moving to Portsmouth for £325,000 in September 1990. Born: Hillingdon 30.10.69.

**MARK CHAMBERLAIN** - Winger. Was 16 when he made his debut for Port Vale v Scunthorpe (19.8.78). Stoke City paid £100,000 for him in 1982. He was hailed as the 'black Stanley Matthews' when called into the England squad after half-a-dozen 1st Division games, but won only 8 caps. Joined Sheffield Wednesday

for £300,000 in September 1985 but didn't settle and moved to Portsmouth for £200,000 in July 1988. Born: Stoke 11.11.61.

**COLIN CLARKE** - Striker. Currently on the verge of breaking the scoring record for Northern Ireland (he has 12 goals), he became Pompey's most expensive recruit when signed from QPR for £450,000 in May 1990. An apprentice at Ipswich, he made his League bow with Peterborough in October 1981 and later played for Gillingham (loan), Tranmere, AFC Bournemouth and Southampton. Born: Newry 30.10.62.

**ANDY GOSNEY** - Goalkeeper. Recalled last week from a loan period with York City following an injury to Alan Knight. Gosney, an England Youth International, has been at Fratton Park for ten years but in that time he has made no more than two dozen appearances, being kept in the wings by Portsmouth's longest serving player. Born: Southampton 8.1.63.

**MARTIN KÜHL** - Midfield. Served his apprenticeship with Birmingham - making his debut v WBA (19.3.83). Moved to Sheffield United in 1987 and a year later signed for Watford. Cost Portsmouth £125,000 in September 1988 and scored 23 goals in the first two seasons. Born: Frimley 1.1.65.

**DARRYL POWELL** - Forward. Was an apprentice when he made a scoring debut against Middlesbrough in the Simod Cup (21.12.88). Made his League bow, as a sub, against Swindon (2.1.89), and has since moved forward from a midfield role. Born: Balham 15.11.71.

**KIT SYMONS** - Defender. Made his debut at Leicester (14.1.89) at 17 and has overcome a stress fracture of the lower back to emerge as a dominant stopper. Capped by Wales at Youth and Under-21. Born: Basingstoke 5.3.71.

**GUY WHITTINGHAM** - Striker. Top shot for the past two seasons, he has been unable to find his shooting boots this campaign. Bought himself out of the Army in 1989 for £450, having scored 90 goals in 100 games for Yeovil, Waterlooville, Pompey Reserves, the Combined Services and Army. Also played for Oxford City. Born: Cheltenham 10.11.64.

**STEVE WIGLEY** - Midfield. Former Nottingham Forest wing wizard, he arrived at Fratton Park in March 1989 for £300,000 via Sheffield United and Birmingham City. Scored 5 goals last season. Born: Ashton-under-Lyne 15.10.61.

# BENNO'S BRIEF



I first met Jim Smith in 1970 in the car park of Peterborough United. Jim was the enthusiastic, and extremely professional, player manager of Boston United. I was with the Posh.

Jim is a typical Tyke, straightforward and blunt. He is not one to become hidden behind a mask of meaningless cliches. He calls a spade a spade and gets on with the job.

He is the first to admit that as a player he turned no stones. A former wing-half with Sheffield United, his major influence on his clubs, Aldershot, Halifax and Lincoln City, was as captain. He had a natural flair for leadership.

This was emphasised at Boston where current Leeds United manager, Howard Wilkinson, reaped the rewards of Jim's work when he succeeded him as their manager following Smith's appointment as player-manager of Colchester United.

At Layer Road, where he had no money and few resources, Jim Smith led Colchester United to promotion to Division Three in 1974. It was an achievement that, in my opinion, should have earned him the Manager of the Year title, but of course those who run such awards seldom look further than Anfield or Highbury.

In the summer of 1975, Jim moved to Blackburn and laid the foundations at Ewood Park that were eventually to set Howard Kendall on his way to a successful managerial career. Birmingham City, struggling at the foot of the First Division, had sent out an SOS for Smith's services and, though he was unable to prevent the drop, he was able to lead the Blues back to Division One a year later.

Given the circumstances at St Andrews, Jim had done a great job, but when Ron Saunders became available after walking out on Villa, the Birmingham Board cruelly axed Mr Smith to make way for the man with the iron reputation.

The irony is Smith succeeded, miraculously taking unfashionable Oxford United to the First Division via the Third and Second Division Championships in successive years, while Birmingham headed for Division Three.

Sweet justice indeed, but despite the glory and the publicity, Jim didn't get on well with the late Robert Maxwell and sought to further his career at Loftus Road.

Here he worked well with Chairman Jim Gregory. Rangers reached the Milk Cup Final in 1986 - losing to the Oxford side Jim had built. Then, in December 1988, he accepted the challenge of Newcastle United. Again he was unable to avert relegation from the First Division but, a year later, they were contesting the play-offs, only to fall to neighbours Sunderland. Last season a catastrophic injury list prevented any headway being made and in sheer frustration Jim resigned in March 1990.

He was taken on as coach by Middlesbrough until Jim Gregory, now installed as Portsmouth's Chairman, called him to the Fratton Park yard-arm. And now Pompey have set sail again - on course for promotion no doubt, either this season or next.

**DID YOU KNOW?** That Portsmouth goalkeeper Reilly was responsible for the change in the law, limiting the handling of the ball to the penalty area.

December 27th: Swindon Town 3 Portsmouth 1

Portsmouth have been regular visitors to the County Ground since the turn of the century, but today we go back just 20 years to a Christmas encounter in 1971. Over 20,000 turned up despite the mid-table positions of both sides.

The Pompey Manager was former player Ron Tindall, while the Town were led by Dave Mackay, who also wore the number six shirt. Swindon were unchanged from the side that had gone down 3-0 to Queens Park Rangers at Loftus Road a week earlier, and so 18 year-old keeper Jimmy Allan kept his place while Peter Downsborough recovered from a dislocated finger.

In heavy drizzle, the Town gained an early advantage when they took an eighth-minute lead through Eoin Hand's misfortune. After good work by young David Dangerfield, Ray Bunkell hit a shot from just inside the area. Pompey 'keeper John Milkins had the ball covered but it clipped the leg of Hand (!) and was deflected into the net. The Eire international had been a member of Swindon's Combination side seven years earlier. Ray Hiron forced two fine saves from Allan but **Mike Trebilcock** - a Cup Final hero for Everton in 1966 - went closest for the visitors in the first half when he hit the side-netting.

Within a minute of the restart, however, Portsmouth were two goals in arrears. Don Rogers was just inside the visitors' half when he latched on to a John Trollope pass. The winger made haste for goal, drew Milkins and calmly slotted the ball home in vintage Rogers fashion. And it could have been 3-0 a minute later in an almost carbon copy move, but this time the keeper was equal to the task and gathered the ball.

The third goal eventually came for Swindon in the 64th minute. Colin Blant almost put through his own goal when miskicking a Trollope pass intended for Arthur Horsfield. From the resultant corner, the ball was only partially cleared. Peter Noble found Rogers who, despite having three defenders bearing down on him, planted the ball into the net from twelve yards! Pompey got a consolation, with six minutes left, when a Norman Piper header crept into the net after centre-half Frank Burrows and Allan went up together in an attempt to clear. Nicky Jennings almost grabbed another a minute later when his shot beat Allan but rattled the crossbar.

The South East Counties League game on 26th October against AFC Bournemouth ended goalless. The fact that we kept a clean sheet was very pleasing after the amount of goals we conceded in the previous two or three games. Having worked with the defenders on their positional play and marking, this performance gave us a platform to build on. We must now work to improve our passing, retaining possession long enough to put more telling attacks together, giving us more openings in and around the opponents penalty area, resulting in more shots at goal. Two days later, on Monday 28th October, we entertained Port Vale in a Midland Youth Cup replay, which ended in a disappointing defeat. 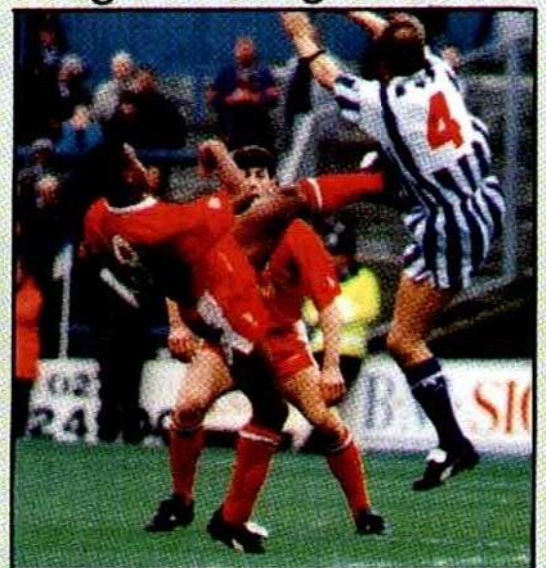

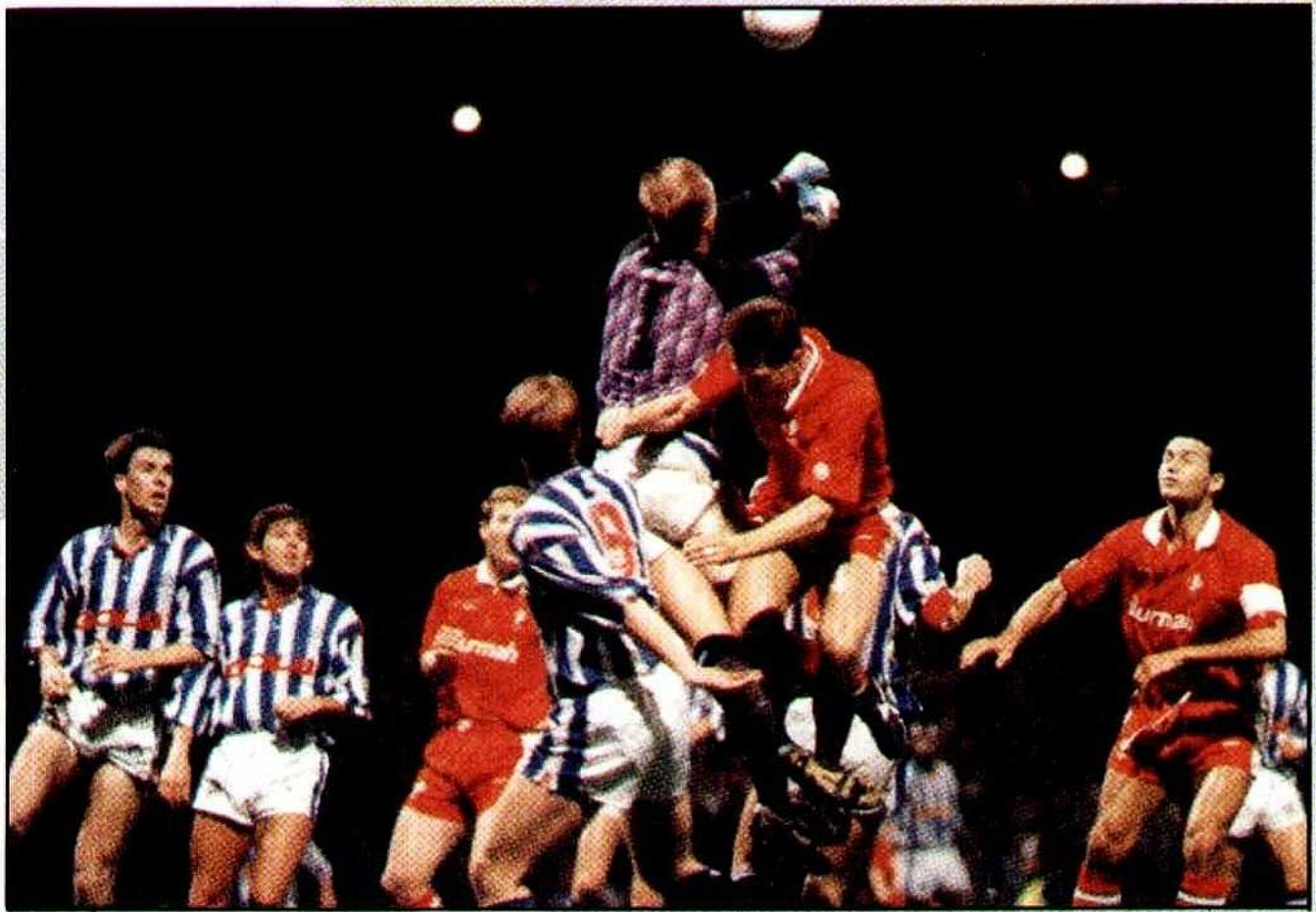

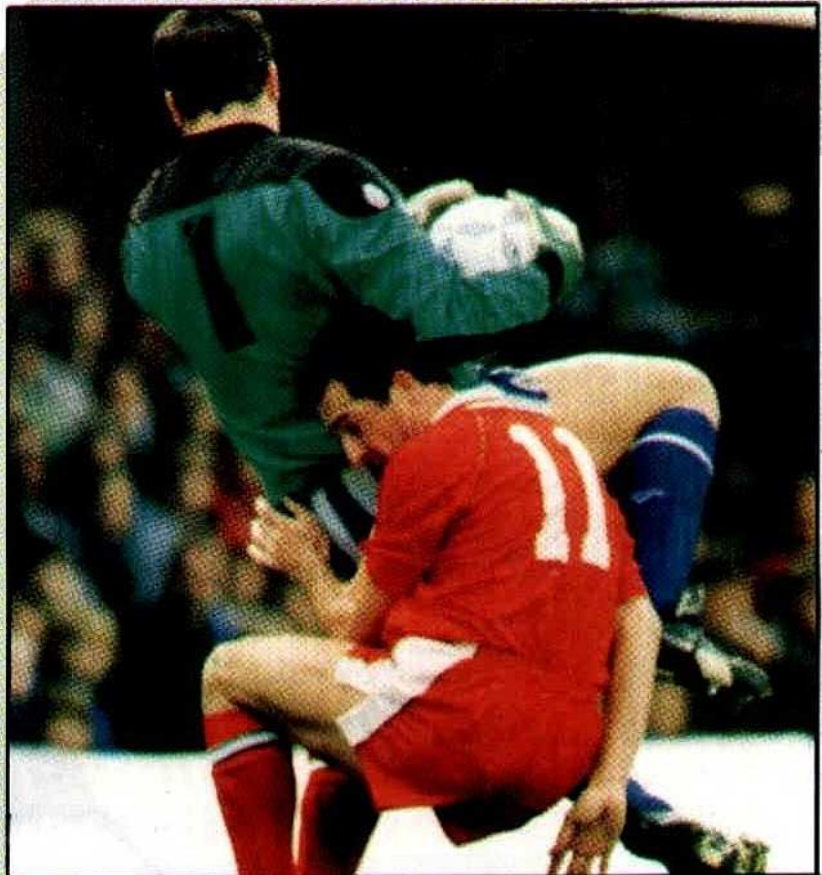

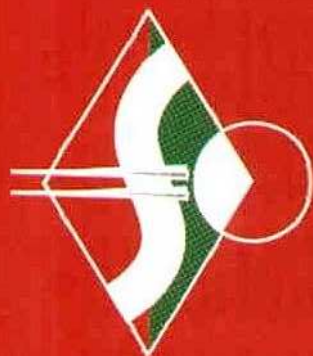
