
Mark Hughes takes the high road to Wales.

After our F.A. Cup encounter with Runcorn last Saturday, I'm fully expecting another 'Cup' tie today against our high flying visitors, Swindon.

We know Glenn Hoddle's side have already set standards of play for others to follow this season. Judging by their performances so far Swindon are one of the best footballing sides in the division and look a good bet to go up this season, so we know we will have to be at our best to get a result tonight.

Glenn Hoddle is a world class player and has got his team playing a brand of football that has his personality stamped all over it. We've had so many demanding games in the past couple of months – what with all the Cup ties – you just hope and pray the lads can rise to another occasion because make no mistake Swindon can play a bit.

But so can we, so it promises to be a "football" match of the highest quality.

We knew Runcorn would be a difficult nut to crack and no matter how many times you warn players about the dangers of complacency in the face of Non-League opposition, it's something that always worries you as a Manager.

True, with a number of our players having played at that level in the past, we should be better prepared for the task than some. That was why I was pleased with the way we applied ourselves against Runcorn, though I would have to say the timing of the first two goals within minutes of the start of each half was crucial. It's nice to see Kenny Irons come out of a bit of a lean spell with two super goals in recent weeks. Of our midfield duo, Kenny is the one whom you would expect to contribute a quota of goals so it's good to see him back amongst them.

Our second goal was the real killer, for as long as it remained at 1-0 Runcorn would think they were in with a chance.

John Aldridge took that goal in the way that only he and maybe the likes of Lineker and Rush can. One touch on the chest and bang. If that was good his second was special. I told him to go home and enjoy that one on the TV!

Tve been asked if John's goal output has exceeded my expectations. Well, I never set targets for players but if you bring in quality you know you're guaranteed goals. Perhaps, it's exceeded John's expectations though.

I got on my bike and went after John while others were still thinking about



it. He's back home and happy, but whose to say he would have done it elsewhere for another club?

He's a young 33 and the way he's banging them in you get the idea he will go on scoring for years yet.

Looking back to the Plymouth match it's hard to put your finger on the reason for a below par display. The conditions were bad but it was the same for both sides.

Every now and then all sides blow hot and cold and we're no different. What's important is to get three points on nights like that – and that we did, which helps along that nice little run of victories we've put together over the last month.

We've battled for results in that spell rather than played particularly well, but I suspect we'll have to do both tonight to achieve victory. It promises to be quite a game – let's hope it lives up to it's billing.



Just 18 months ago the fortunes of Swindon and Tranmere became locked together in the wake of a League enquiry into Swindon's "financial irregularities".

Glenn Hoddle

Swindon, newly promoted to Division One after beating Sunderland in the play-off finals, were relegated to Division Three. In the shuffle that followed, Tranmere were promoted as play-off finalists, but within three weeks Swindon's appeal to the F.A. proved partially successful – they were only relegated one division – and we had to come to terms again with a further season in the third division.

The situation which both clubs found themselves in was not of their choosing – the only real winners were Sunderland who went up. At the time, you wouldn't have found much sympathy in Birkenhead for Swindon's

plight, however time is a great healer. The fans of both clubs have shared tears of joy and misery during those 18 months, and judging by Swindon's early form this season, the club, complete with new Board, have put those troubles well and truly behind them.

Initially though, there was a reaction in both camps. Swindon just about avoided relegation last season then Ossie Ardiles walked out on the club, while Rovers struggled to recapture the form of the previous campaign. But in the end, Rovers got their act together to gain promotion to the Second by rights and without help from the Football Authorities. Hence today's meeting.

THE MANAGEMENT

Glenn Hoddle was, in his heyday, perhaps the best English midfield schemer of his generation – a view not always appreciated by the Management of England over the years, who restricted his appearances for his country to just 33 caps.

Blessed with tremendous skill and vision, the current Swindon boss could win games single-handedly, making and scoring goals each stamped with the word 'Class'.

After 370 League appearances and 88 often magical goals for Spurs, he moved to French side Monaco in 1987. Dogged by injury, Glenn returned to England in 1990 to take up his old pal Ardiles' offer to train with Swindon to get fit again.

When Ossie left for Newcastle, the new Swindon Board wisely installed Glenn as their player/boss and in the eight months he has re-moulded the team, which he largely inherited, in his own image as a player.

His number two is John Gorman a one time team mate at Tottenham while the reserves and Youth teams are in the safe hands of Swindon stalwarts Andy Rowland and John Trollope.

TEAM TALK

Swindon's style mirrors their manager's football philosophy – players are encouraged to play the ball to feet and search for space behind defenders, often prompted by the boss himself from his new continental role of 'sweeper' in front of the back four. Hoddle has not featured in the Swindon side for the past few weeks, however successive defeats against Sunderland and Portsmouth might just encourage him to take a leading role again in a bid to re-establish their grip at the top of Division Two.

If Hoddle does play, it would mean a switch back to midfield for the present sweeper **Ross MacLaren** – a £140,000 buy from Derby in 1988 – who likes to break forward with the ball.

MacLaren has been playing behind a regular back four of David Kerslake on the right, Nick Summerbee on the left and a central pair of Colin Calderwood and Shaun Taylor.


Kerslake is Swindon's answer to Tony Thomas or Ian Nolan, a powerpacked attacking full back, while young Summerbee is hoping to make as big a name for himself as his father Mike, the former England and Manchester City winger.

While **Calderwood** has been an ever-present, **Adrian Viveash** will be hoping to keep his place after filling in for the injured **Shaun Taylor** last week. Taylor was a summer signing from Exeter.

Behind the defence, Swindon have keeper **Nicky Hammond** who has recently displaced England U21

keeper Frazer Digby, after a long spell in his shadow. Hammond throws the ball more times than he kicks it. At the heart of the midfield operations. Glenn Hoddle is able to call upon the prodigious talents of Micky Hazard who was once one of his team mates at Spurs. Hazard may be approaching 32 but he is still a top quality player. He is ably supported by Tom Jones and Fitzroy Simpson who is now attracting rave reviews from the big clubs after earlier disciplinary problems with the men in black. Up front, Swindon play a twin spearhead of Duncan Shearer and Steve White.

White has scored 15 goals in all competitions to maintain his career average at Bristol Rovers, Luton and Charlton, while Shearer, who was a club record buy at £230,000 in June 1988, has amassed 17 including four in one game at Plymouth in October. Skilfull and mobile, Shearer and White will certainly prove a handful tonight.

The two likely substitutes are Scouser **Steve Foley** and ex-Spurs reserve **Shaun Close**, a striker bought from Bournemouth.

Swindon's current record buy Nestor Lorenzo, an Argentinian international defender, cannot even get onto the bench these days. That more than anything says everything about this Swindon side. Playing with confidence, verve and determination, they will provide a severe test of our Second Division Credentials tonight. It should be some game – a real advert for good football and the passing game.

IT'S ALL HISTORY

Swindon were formed in 1831 by the Reverend William Pitt as an outlet for the energies of his parishioners. In 1894 they turned professional and joined the Southern League, and two years later they moved from The Croft to the County Cround, which became their permanent

After some difficult seasons they were transformed after 1907 by the signing of Harold Fleming, a masterly inside-forward who had been advised to take an outdoor job because of his health. With Fleming (winner of eleven England caps) to guide them, Swindon won the Southern League title twice and were never out of the first five from 1907 to 1914, and they also reached the semi-final of the FA Cup in 1910 and 1912. In the latter year they took part in the Charity Shield game, losing 8-4 to Manchester United.

The club had less success, however, after becoming one of the Third Division founders in 1920. The highest position they could manage between then and 1963 was fourth (on five occasions), but they also had to apply for re-election three times.

The Robins achieved one of the biggest upsets of soccer history in March 1969, when they beat Arsenal in the League Cup Final at Wembley. First Division Arsenal, who had conceded only 23 goals in 40 matches that season, were overwhelming favourites, but the Third Division club outplayed them and fully deserved their 3-1 victory. From goalkeeper Peter Downsborough to outside-left Don Rogers, who scored twice, every Swindon player performed heroically.

The Wembley victory, meritorious though it was, proved to be the less important of Swindon's double success that season. They also finished second in the League with a club record of 64 points.

When Swindon won the League Cup, they were not allowed to enter for the European Fairs Cup, as they were not a First Division side. They did, however, take part in the first Anglo-Italian tournament, at the end of the 1969-70 season.

In a tournament plagued by bad-feeling and explosive situations, such clubs as Wolves, West Brom, Juventus and Fiorentina fell by the wayside but Swindon battled through to play Naples in the Final. Despite having to play on their opponents ground, Swindon were leading 3-0 when, after 79 minutes, the crowd rioted and Swindon were awarded the match, and with it the Trophy.

Although Don Rogers immediately springs to mind Swindon have had several other excellent players over the years. Harry Morris scored 216 goals in only eight seasons, including 47 out of 100 in 1926-27, and Maurice Owen claimed over 150 before ending a 17-year career (with 554 League appearances) as a full-back in 1963.

Pride of place in the Swindon Hall of Fame though must surely go to full back John Trollope who between 1960-80 notched up a remarkable 770 League appearances.





PAST MASTERS

TOMMY STUART

If appearance was the criteria by which people were judged in the old days Tommy Stuart could easily have passed as the vicar of a country Parish!

Tall, thin and almost bald, Tommy was Tranmere's much respected Captain and left back when we entered the Football League in 1921.

Signed from Bootle Albion in 1918 after being brought along to Prenton Park by Johnny Campbell, the initial impression of 'Mr Nice Guy' belied a level of skill and a football brain which marked him out as a class player.

Despite a lack of pace and physical strength, Tommy more than made up for those deficiencies in other ways and was perhaps 40 years ahead of his time tactically.



In an era when a fullback's job was solely to mark the opposing winger, Tommy's readiness to set off up the wing on the "overlap", beating man after man with apparently effortless ease, must have been considered 'revolutionary'.

His timing in the tackle was nigh perfect and having robbed his opponent he would quickly convert defence to attack in the role that is now accepted as part of the modern fullback's duties.

When Tommy joined Rovers in 1918-19 season, Rovers were still in the Lancashire Combination, but thanks to two successful seasons in the Central League (as replacement for Leeds City) Rovers application to join the Football League in 1921 was successful and they were placed in Division Three (North). To Tommy therefore fell the distinction of scoring Tranmere's firstly penalty in the Football League on August 27th 1921. As captain he became the regular penalty taker and the one against Crewe on opening day was converted in his usual laid back manner, placed well out of the keepers reach.

Though his 13 goals in 193 League appearances was hardly earth shattering, Tommy's measured passes and deep crosses made countless goals for others including the young 'Dixie' Dean who forced his way into the first team during 1924-25 season.

Apart from his League record, Tommy made 80 appearances in the Lancashire Combination and Central League to take his overall



record for Rovers to 273 games.

After a decade of first team football, Tommy's career ended with just a single game in each of seasons 1926-27 and 1927-28. The final decision to retire at the age of 34 was hastened by a broken collar bone sustained in a Reserve match.

The Prenton Park crowd had a special raport with their team captain, though on occasions many were said to be "uneasy about his desire to desert his defensive duties in preference to prompting and linking with his winger."

Little did those fans realise that in future, such an adventurous attitude would be expected, even demanded from a fullback!

But that was Tommy Stuart - a man 40 years ahead of his time. Maybe he did benefit from divine advice from the heavens after all!

JOHN MORRISSEY

Memo to Santa. All John Morrissey wants for Christmas is a goal... or two... or three!

While John has made a large proportion of the teams' 49 goals to date with his supply of pinpoint crosses he has yet to find the target himself and our skillful winger admits the situation is beginning to get on his nerves.

Said John, "I've had loads of chances, but I just don't seem to be getting the luck at the moment. Obviously, I've been getting a bit of pressure from the Gaffer and Ronnie Moore, but as long as we are winning and I'm making goals for others I don't think it matters who scores.

"The time to worry is when I stop making them and I'm not scoring either. Anyway, I reckon Aldo's got my share so far!

"Tve always been a maker of chances rather than a taker – I get a lot of satisfaction if one of my crosses leads to a goal – so when I see someone like Aldo in a better position and yelling for the ball I'll give it them.

"I know I should get my quota, but perhaps I've become too anxious when I get in a scoring position. Once I get one – whether it be a soft one or a spectacular one, I'll be OK.

"At the moment it's getting on my nerves a bit so when I do get one I think I'll shake hands with everybody in the ground"

In the last six months John has been encouraged to start patrolling both flanks in a "floating" role and it's one that he clearly enjoys.

"I'd never have been able to do that two years ago, but it gives you an extra string to your bow. You're not just regarded as a 'right winger'.

"Nowadays, I'm quite confident to go on the left side and do a little cameo role there. If I'm not getting much joy with

one fullback I'll switch and have a go at the other one. It also gives the opposition something to think about".

John first switched flanks against Rotherham last season and in the playoff final against Bolton his presence on the left kept Boltons' Phil Brown fully occupied to the extent that he was unable to exploit the space in front of him.

"I knew we'd beat Bolton," said John.
"In fact I thought the scoreline would be
2-0 to us. You could feel it amongst the
lads beforehand and when we got out
on the pitch you could see the tension in
their eyes.

"Playing in that game - and the Leyland DAF against Birmingham - more than compensated for missing out the previous season.

"Looking back it's all a blur now but I remember the feeling of sheer elation on the final whistle."

John though firmly believes he was denied a blatant penalty in the Cup Final with Birmingham.

"Either the referee bottled it or he thought I was faking, but I've no doubts their lad lifted his knee as I went to go past him and caught me right in the 'privates' - and that is a penalty offence if ever there was one!"

Over the years John has faced a few nailbending full backs, but reckons he is getting more space in the second division.

"You always get one who tells you he's going to kick you into the stand, but generally I've found that better quality players will sit off you and give you space to turn because they've probably got more ability than those in the third and fourth".

In recent matches John has had a new full back partner himself with the arrival of Ian Nolan in the team.

"Obviously there are times when he doesn't know what I'm going to do and I don't know what he's going to do, but once he gets more experience he'll be a good player.

"The strength in that position is frightening though with Tony, Ged, Mungy and now Ian Nolan all capable of playing there, which is obviously good from the clubs' point of view.

"And when you consider that it looks as though we are in for a another 60 game season, it's good to have strength in depth".

In the past John has had his terrace critics, but feels he has now turned the corner.

"The fans have been great to me. I get a real buzz when I get the ball and know they want me to do well. It's great to hear them shouting 'give it to Morrissey!"

With three awards, and the Echo 'Man of the Match' award for 1990-91 under his belt John is justifiably pleased with life at present. All he needs now is a goal or two to put the icing on the cake. Over to you John!

This game was played at Vauxhall's ground in difficult, windy conditions, but Rovers went ahead in the first minute when, following a fine through ball, Branch crossed for Smith to slide the ball home at the far post. Then, after some fine work by Harvey on the bye-line, a fine cross by the same player gave the opportunity for that man Ian Muir to score his first goal of the season! Hartlepool reduced the deficit before half-time through Gabbiadini (yes, his brother).

Tranmere dominated the early part of the second half with Muir setting up Branch, who rounded the keeper to score. Then McNab created the chance for Branch to add his second of the day. Not to be outdone, Rovers' fifth goal was a fine right foot shot by Ian Muir for his second, following a really great build-up involving seven or eight players. Neil McNab put the icing on the cake for the sixth, a great drive from all of 25 yards.





In addition to the 32-page programme there was a mail order catalogue for the club shop which is cleverly named the Ramtique. The Rams Magazine, to give it its official title, is colourful, attractively set out and full of a good balance of reading matter. The colour photo collages would be more effective with the addition of frames or borders to separate them more clearly. I particularly liked the format of the opposition coverage with no less than five pages being dedicated to Rovers. This includes an article on John Aldridge, in which tony Pullein compares him to that other goalscoring legend ... Roy of the Rovers! Here's a short extract:

"Roy Race eat your heart out . . . Aldo of the Rovers is the new goal king in football with a strike rate that would make even the ageless comic book hero green with envy!

Shilts and company can't say they weren't warned, can they? Perhaps Derby manager, Arthur Cox, should make this section of the programme compulsory reading for his players in the dressing room before the match!

I could find very few mistakes, but the editor does seem to have been slightly dazed by our ZDS goal rush, as he believes that we lost 5-1 to Grimsby. I'm sure we'd all settle for a few more defeats like that one!




