

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
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It was good to get that derby win over Middlesbrough. Those three points really boosted confidence and obviously, we are hopeful the good work continues at Brighton on Saturday. If that was the case some of the pressure may be off.

It was good to see Gary Owers get 90 minutes under his belt, while the performances of Ian Sampson and Warren Hawke show there are some quality squad players at Roker Park, who can all do

Tonight's visitors, are still in with a chance of getting in to the play off places, and will provide a stern test. Swindon this season have impressed all impartial observers with the quality of their football, and I am sure the game will be an open attacking affair.

After the exertions of the Easter week, the players had a few clear days to rest and get prepared for the trip to Brighton. It is as well the break came when it did, for, of course, we face Blackburn on Wednesday and then finish the Second Division programme with the visit of Cambridge on Saturday.


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Goodman and Rush celebrate the first goal against Ipswich



































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
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
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
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PROFILE

BRIAN MOONEY

With Sunderland due to meet Liverpool in the Cup Final, a week on Saturday Brian Mooney is doing his best to put himself in line for a Wembley appearance against the club where he started his English career. Mooney has figured in seven consecutive league games up to and including last Saturday's defeat at Grimsby.

It has been a late start to the season for the Republic of Ireland 'B' international. Signed from Preston North End for a reported fee of £225,000 in February of last year he produced an encouraging performance on his Sunderland debut in a 1-0 home win over Nottingham Forest.

However, within a few weeks he broke his foot on the artificial surface at Luton in his sixth appearance for the club. "It wouldn't have happened on a grass surface," says Brian "It kept me out for the rest of the season and then I went over on it again in pre-season training."

Brian has had a long, lonely battle to regain his place at the Club. He began his comeback in the reserves against Aston Villa back in December and got fourteen Pontins League games under his belt as he played himself back to fitness before he came into first team reckoning.

Ironically Mooney's return to first team action came against Bristol City managed of course by Denis Smith who had signed him last year. Brian has shown that he can produce some good touches on the right side of midfield. Only a fingertip save by Bob Bolder prevented him scoring what would have been one of the goals of the season against Charlton while Peter Shilton denied him getting on the scoresheet on Plymouth's recent visit.

Originally with Home Farm in Ireland, Brian moved to Anfield as a seventeen year old where he won a Central League medal in Liverpool's successful reserve team. There's a belief in football that it's nice to give a young player his debut when you are in a winning position and the pressure is off. Kenny Dalglish certainly did that by giving Mooney his debut as a substitute for Jim Beglin at Fulham in a League Cup tie which Liverpool won 3-2. Mind you Liverpool did have the small matter of a ten nil cushion from the first lea!

A year earlier Brian had had ten games on loan to Wrexham including an appearance in the Welsh Cup. When it became clear that Liverpool would release him, John McGrath moved in to take him to Preston on loan and he impressed sufficiently for The Lillywhites to invest £40,000 in him in 1987.

Brian quickly established himself at Deepdale (Scoring against us in February 1988) and only defeat by Port Vale in the semi finals of the play offs stopped Brian playing in the same Wembley play off week end as our Wembley meeting with Swindon.

At the beginning of last season Ron Atkinson took him on loan to Sheffield Wednesday for whom he played in a friendly against Genoa but a cartilage injury denied Brian the chance to establish himself at Hillsborough and seven months later Denis Smith moved in to bring Mooney to Roker for a third of the fee he'd previously been quoted by PNE.

Now hopefully with his injury problems behind him Brian has another two years of his contract to run. While working his way back into first team contention Brian was rumoured to be unhappy at Roker but as he says, "I'm happier now I've got back into the team."

A great admirer of Graeme Souness who he describes as, "The greatest player I've seen," Brian is looking forward to the Cup Final with optimism, "They lost a Final to Wimbledon when they were strong favourites and were fortunate to get past Portsmouth. If we can play to our potential we have a good chance." he says.

For today of course we have to concentrate on defeating the last team we played at Wembley and in Brian Mooney we have an experienced player providing the sort of competition for places that all successful teams need.

Should Sunderland win the cup the players will be able to walk on water as far as Wearside is concerned. They held the rehearsal against Ipswich! Playing on a rain soaked pitch Sunderland adapted to the conditions better than the runaway league leaders and powered to a thrilling victory.

"Sunderland were very strong particularly at the back where the big man Bennett was outstanding" said Ipswich left back Neil Thompson after the game. The win emphatically ended a depressing run of five consecutive league defeats but it was the superb performance as well as the three points that had everyone clutching on to their Cup Final vouchers with ever increasing optimism.

Right from the kick off Malcolm Crosby's team totally dominated proceedings. As early as the seventh minute John Byrne beat the 'keeper only to see Mick Stockwell clear his header off the line. David Rush was in the thick of the action all night, thoroughly impressing BBC Radio 5 summariser Billy Bremner who couldn't praise him enough. Rush forced Forrest into a spectacular full length save mid way through the first half and while Tony Norman was almost a spectator for much of the match he too showed his class when denying Kiwomya's close range effort after he'd been unable to hold onto Thompson's skidding long range shot.

It was record signing Don Goodman who eventually made the breakthrough shortly after half time. The brilliant Brian Atkinson (who according to my records has had a significant part in the creation of more goals at Roker Park this season than anyone else) began the move by intercepting a ball played out of the Ipswich defence and playing in a penetrating cross behind the visitors rearguard which enabled Goodman to steal in unmarked and tuck the ball away.

Roared on by an excited crowd the lads made a mockery of their league position restricting lpswich to occasional breaks with Steve Palmer missing their only chance of note in the sixty ninth minute. That opportunity though was enough to make Malcolm Crosby take action and Gary Owers was immediately brought on

for his first game since Millwall lost 6-2 here in January. Coincidentally Goodman hadn't scored at home since that game but within ten minutes of his arrival Owers gave him a glimmer of another hat-trick by releasing him with a glorious ball inside the full back which Goodman oleefully converted.

Don didn't hang about to try for the match ball though, he went straight off to be replaced by Peter Davenport. Goodman had made for the tunnel at the time of Owers' introduction much to the amusement of Rush who made a similar mistake earlier in the season and the smile on Rushie's face became even wider when he rifled home the goal he deserved three minutes later.

By this time the leaders were all at sea in more ways than one as we sailed to our second double of the season and Malcolm Crosby was as delighted as anyone considering it to be, "...an excellent performance and possibly the best since I took over in terms of football."

David Rush had our only clear chance but Shilton made goalkeeping look easy despite the fact he was playing in an FA Cup Final before Rush was even born!

"For the first time I saw fear creeping in at Grimsby" said Malcolm Crosby while Sunderland lad Clive Mendonca who created Grimsby's opening goal and scored their second commented, "I'll never forgive myself if that goal sends Sunderland down...but I think Sunderland will stay up and I will be at Wembley cheering them on next month."

Unsurprisingly our fourth game in eight days resulted in a poor performance although we received a welcome boost with the return of Paul Bracewell who bravely turned out despite not being fully recovered from his latest nose operation.

Woods, Rodger and Mendonica went close in a first half largely dominated by The Mariners while David Rush had a goal disallowed shortly after the interval. Inevitably though Grimsby took the lead after good work from former Sunderland loan winger Tony Ford, Dave Gilbert and a defence splitting back heel from Mendonica created an opening for Dobbin to score. Dobbin had scored in Barnsley's win at Roker in 1987 which condemned us to the play offs and here he delivered another painful blow.

Tony Norman kept us in the game and it looked as if a point had been salvaged in the 82nd minute when Hardyman hit a wind assisted free kick from inside his own half straight into the net. At first the referee gave the goal but then disallowed it on the signal of his linesman who indicated that the incoming Bennett hadn't got a touch to the indirect kick.

Two minutes later Mendonca - who played at Roker Park for Sunderland Boys during the 1983-84 season - took on and beat four Sunderland players before firing home the second goal in a month to be scored against us by a player on loan to a club in the lower reaches of the second division.

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COMMENT

Observer

A couple of weeks the International Rugby Union body issued a statement covering rule changes, that will be adopted world wide from next season. Everything from the number of points awarded for a try to regulations governing line outs have been tackled.

Not to be outdone FIFA published a report listing various suggestions as to how soccer could be improved as we approach the millennium. commission was established to examine the state of soccer world wide, and in particular how the rules could be changed to make the game more free flowing and hence entertaining. The proposals make interesting reading, as does the composition of the commission which included French team manager Michel Platini. German World Cup star Rudi Voller, and Football Association Cheif Executive, Graham Kelly. Clearly Mr Kelly is widely respected in the international arena as a soccer administrator.

One of the first issues tacked by the Commission is the infamous penalty shootout. Particularly pertinent at the present time, following Pompey's exit in the FA method of settling knock out matches has incurred the derision of both soccer professionals and paying customer.

The alternative suggested by the commission is that clubs should play on until the first goal is scored. This solution does have a great deal of support from the footballing world, and is favoured by many professionals. There certainly has been a tendency for some sides to play for the shoot out, adopting defensive and spoiling tactics, reasoning their best opportunity of winning lay in sudden death from a series of spot kicks. Argentina in the 1990 World Cup, and Red Star Belgrade in a European Cup Final spring readily to mind.

In their favour penalty kicks do test, albeit in rudimentary fashion, a soccer skill, performed under pressure. It can be argued, playing until a goal is scored simply tests stamina. Immediately after World War Two the FA Cup settled its replays by a fight to the finish so that further games were not a drain on rationed petrol, energy, and labour. What often resulted was a pantomime, with punch drunk footballers out on their

feet resembling bare knuckle boxers who had just gone 72 rounds. An alternative solution could be that used in the US League of the early seventies, when attackers would take the ball from halfway and have a given amount of time to shoot in a 'one to one' with the keeper. Possibly a greater test of skill than a series of spot kicks from twelve yards.

Less controversial perhaps are some others conclusions of the commission.

Finally, backpasses to the goalkeeper should be banned, or at best the custodian not permitted to handle the ball in such circumstances. Certainly a change in the law is badly overdue, with time wasting bringing the game into disrepute.

Secondly, a penalty kick should be awarded for violent play irrespective of where the offence takes place. The sight of forwards being 'taken out' just outside the area is frustrating, and were such a law in place, the less than edifying spectacle in the recent Chelsea v Sheffield United match, when Vinny Jones 'did' a Blade within seconds of the kick off would become less frequent.

The commission also suggest cautions for players who try to influence referee's decisions, and the introduction of sin bins. Hardly original but a measure that might encourage mild misdemeanours and introduce a new tactical response from managers and coaches.

Very interesting is the suggestion that players who attempt to score with their hands should be sent off immediately. Would Maradona have netted his infamous 'hand of God' goal in 1986, had the law been in operation? Perhaps not, but then again it would depend on the match officials being able to witness the crime.

In the wake of the Rugby Union law changes, much respected referee Clive Norling suggested two officials in addition to the touch judges would be required to implement the new code. That would probably be the case for soccer, were some of the proposals put forward by FIFA adopted.

But more interestingly the Commission does not seem to have tackled two central issues. Firstly, off-side. A statement suggesting this is only given beyond the 18 yard line would be welcomed by spectators frustrated by the sight of 20 players compressed into a third of the field.

And secondly how about the length of a match? An independent timekeeper, say the referee's assessor would stop the watch when the ball was dead for throw ins, goal kicks, corner kicks, free kicks, as well as injuries. Then spectators would see 90 minutes action, the action, and not be looking at his wrist, and who knows there might then be no need for penalty shoot outs.

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WE WENT! - WE WON! and our young players (10 were under 16, 6 were under 15) were excellent ambassadors both on and off the field.


Marksmen for the Pirates in that match were Tony Pounder and new

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

LEARNING THROUGH FOOTBALL WITH TUDOR

Supporters will have noticed the excellent condition of the Roker Park pitch throughout the season, so much better than at many of the famous grounds around the country. The credit for this, of course, belongs to groundsman Steve Millard, and visiting schools see the amount of work he puts into it.

The first surprise to the children is to see the grass being cut with a small (almost garden-sized!) motor mower. We have estimated that every time the pitch is cut the groundsman walks four miles following the mower! It's a long job, taking nearly a full day to complete.

The next stage in preparing the pitch for play is to mark the white lines. String is stretched between pegs to make the position of the lines and keep them straight. The paint is applied by a small three-wheeled barrow, the front wheel leaving a neat band of paint wherever it goes. An uncomfortable job, for the groundsman's feet must be kept apart as he walks to avoid treading on the wet paint. The lines add up to nearly half a mile!

The nets are attached to hooks on the back of the goalposts and crossbar and pegged down to the ground all round the back. Children never know why we use nets: they usually think it's to stop the ball going into the crowd. The last job in preparing the pitch is to put in the corner flags (flags at the centre line are not compulsory).

After the match the flags and nets are put away and the tedious job of replacing all the divots begins. This is another long job which takes at least a day. The groundsman's nightmare came true recently with a spate of home matches in quick succession leaving so little time for preparation.

Our young visitors always hope to get onto the pitch but they have to be disappointed: even the players rarely train on the Roker pitch, and an extra 6000 feet over the season would leave the surface looking like a ploughed field. In fact the image of a farmer chasing raiders from his cabbage field is not too different from the groundsman's expression when he spots an unauthorised foot on his turfl

GOODMAN GOALS

AN IN DEPTH LOOK AT THE GOALSCORING HISTORY OF OUR RECORD SIGNING

Don Goodman will be looking for his second goal against Swindon this season in tonight's game. He scored one of West Brom's goals against them in a 2-2 draw in the Rumbelows Cup way back in August to give him a total of three goals against the Wiltshire club including a rare penalty.

The chart shows the number of goals Don has scored against each of the thirty nine clubs he has been on the mark against. As he has twice been transferred in mid season it should be noted that his overall total for 1986/87 was ten while this season he has eighteen goals equally split between West Brom and ourselves up to the time of writing which is prior to the Brighton game.

Of his nine goals for Sunderland, seven have been at home and these have all been scored at the Roker End. Don has scored three headers and six with his right foot since his transfer with all nine goals being converted from within the penalty area.

A'2' in a column indicates that he scored twice in the same game as with his recent brace against Ipswich whereas '1+1' in a column shows that Don scored twice against a club in the same season but in different games.

His that trick in our 6-2 victory over Millwall was the fourth of his career, the others being against Crystal Palace, Barnsley and Tow Law Town. Obviously his treble against the Northern League side was in the FA Cup as was his only other goal against non league opposition. That strike in West Brom's 6-0 First Round win over Marlow last November has proved to be a very costly goal as it was that game that is responsible for Don being cup tied as we go to Wembley. A similar situation kept Reuben Agboola in the stands when we met Norwich in the 1985 Milk Cup Final.

Any record of goals has to take into account the number of games played. Prior to the Brighton match Don had played a total of 255 games plus a further 29 as sub. In the league he has 83 goals in 221 games plus 25 as sub. In the last four seasons Don has scored 63 times in 131 games plus 14 as sub.

A detailed career record for Goodman can be found in the Roker Review for the match with Portsmouth last December.

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
League. They surprised the more experienced home team with some fine attacking football that was rewarded by goals from Kirsty Hudson and Allyson Beardmore.

SCENE LOCALLY

It is a classic 'foot-in-the-mouth" situation. Having virtually handed the Wearside League title to Hartlepool Town in the previous programme and what happens? They lost 8-1 at South Shields. This throws up the intriguing questions - Has anyone ever won the Wearside League after suffering such a heavy reversal? The result throws the title race wide open as Shields now trail Town by just one point and the pack are closing in. Marske United hammered in six at home to IFG Roker, who had lifted the League Cup the day before and Eppleton might still retain the League Trophy after the 4-0 win at Bohemians. Both these teams have several games in hand on the top two and it looks as if this might go to the very last match.

Down at the bottom, the relegation places look likely to be filled by Usworth (11 points), Bohemians (12) and Darlington RA (14). Herrington have 24 points and look all but sure of First Division football next season.

With Bohemians losing to Eppleton, Usworth and Darlington have to win but they shared the goals and the points, a result which was no use to either. Cleator Moor ended any fears of relegation by virtue of a 3-0 win over Newton Aycliffe and Vaux Ryhope had one of their good days - 5-1 winners at Annfield Plain.

Gretna got back on the winning trail in the Northern League, thanks to a 3-0 home win against Ferryhill. Whitby Town seem to have come a little unstuck lately and could only play out a goalless draw with Guisborough Town. Murton therefore stay on top with 75 points and Gretna are just a point away and with four games extra to play. down at the bottom, Langley Park slid further into trouble by losing 2-1 at Brandon and Whickham lost once again, this time 1-0 at Easington.

The big game in Division Two was at Chester Moor, where Chester-le-Street and Durham City drew 1-1. This result allowed Stockton to go back to the top as they hammered Horden CW 7-0. In


the chasing group, Dunston FB only drew 2-2 at Prudhoe, which virtually ends their promotion ambitions.

A good day for the Northern sides in the HFS Premier League as Bishop Auckland and Whitley Bay both won away from home. Bishops 1-0 win at second placed Marine was one of their best results of the season and The Bay won by a similar score at Morecambe. After looking relegation certs for most of the season, Whitley Bay now have a five point cushion from the relegation positions and should survive. North have 29 wins, 24 clean sheets and over 100 goals scored. 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

The transfer of leading marksman Duncan Shearer to Blackburn for £750,000 may have helped Swindon's bank balances but it has done little for their goal difference. In seven games since the Scot's departure, this evening's visitors to Roker have managed only six goals. Last Monday away to Watford it was the same old story. The Robins dominated matters, but could not find the net. With three games to go, Swindon still had a chance of making the play offs and the weekend game with Plymouth at the County Ground was vital. But how Glenn Hoddle must wish he still had the services of Shearer

However, the Swindon manager admitted that but for the Shearer deal, and the £500,000 move of Fitzroy Simpson to Man City, the Robins would have faced a major money problem. Those deals were a devastating blow to hardcore supporters but when the Lancashire cheque books arrived, cash strapped Swindon had no option.

"Without those transfers, there could have been no more football at the County Ground. In this recession, and on average gates of 9,000 - 10,000 the club cannot survive" said the Swindon boss.

While those comments are obviously true, they may not satisfy the loyal Swindon supporters, who in two season have seen top flight soccer taken away because of financial irregularities, witnessed the inevitable reaction with relegation only avoided by two points, and now see a possible play off place slip by with the sale of star players.

The last of Shearer's 78 league goals for Swindon, came against Southend and his total of 22 in the Second Division, will surely mean the 29 year old Scot remains leading scorer for the fourth successive season.

The Railwaymen topped the table for a few days in early November, but then a disastrous sequence that saw only one league victory in eleven games brought them down to mid table. FA Cup involvement brought further distraction, and though form picked up from mid March, realistically Swindon will have to settle for Second Division fare next season.

Micky Hazard, Colin Calderwood and David Kerslake are men to watch, and Shearer apart, have been the club's most consistent performers. For Hazard, trips to Wearside are always a bit special, and the lads rearguard will need to be sharp at corners when defender Calderwood joins the attack. David Kerslake, operating at full back, is a fine footballer with an excellent first touch, and County Ground followers are fearful, he may be the next to leave in order to appease the bank manager.

Roker may well enjoy the sight of Glenn Hoddle operating as sweeper, and switching defence for attack with those characteristic forty yard pin point passes. The long ball game with a difference. A recent newcomer to the Swindon midfield is Eire international Gary Waddock. He has been playing with tremendous composure, his style suiting the player manager's insistence on quality soccer.

Leading the line since Shearer's departure has been Australian international David Mitchell. significantly though he has failed to find the net since Duncan moved northwards, and the main provider of Swindon's goals in the last month, has been Tom Jones, a stalwart of the Robins for five years.

Swindon finish their programme, away to Derby. As of last Monday they were two points adrift of a promotion play off place. It is still all to play for, but how Swindon fans must wish they could have retained their playing assets.

THE SQUAD

PAUL BODIN

Back at the County Ground after barely twelve months with Crystal Palace. Was on loan to the Mags earlier in the season. A Welsh international full back, aged 27, Paul is deadly from the penalty spot. Earlier in his career had experience with Newport and Cardiff.

COLIN CALDERWOOD

Only survivor from Swindon's Fourth Division Championship side of 85/86. Has played over 250 league games for the club since being signed for just £27,500 from Mansfield. Suffered knee ligament injuries last season. Was 27 two months ago.

SHAUN CLOSE

Has generally been sub this season. Attacking midfielder signed from Bournemouth in 1990. Started his career at Spurs for whom he played a handful of First Division games.

FRASER DIGBY

Regained the goalkeeping position a few weeks ago. Former England Under 21 cap who was a junior at Man United but never made the first team. Joined Swindon in 86/87, and was number one until losing his place to Nicky Hammond this season.

NICKY HAMMOND

Enjoyed his longest run in the Swindon first team prior to Digby's return. In his fifth season at the County Ground having originally been on Arsenal's books. Whilst at Highbury, had loan spells with Bristol Rovers, Peterborough and Aberdeen.

MICKY HAZARD

A Wearsider. Explosive playmaker now 32 who joined Spurs from school. Won FA and UEFA Cup winners medals before moving to Chelsea for £300,000. Teamed up with Pompey in 1990, and then moved to Swindon for £130,000 last season.

MARTIN LING

Slightly built midfielder in his second spell at the County Ground. Aged 25 he came back from Southend during the close season. Began his career with Exeter before signing for Swindon first time around in July 1986. That spell lasted for 93 days and two games.

DAVID KERSLAKE

Was linked with Newcastle last month. A £110,000 signing from QPR three years ago. David struggled to gain a regular first team spot in six years at Loftus Road, despite being capped at Under 21 level. Has played at right back this term.

TOM JONES

Has missed only five games since being signed form Aberdeen in 1988. Cost £80,000. Formerly an apprentice at Chelsea, he was released in 1983 and joined Farnbourgh, moving on to Weymouth in 1986. Had a couple of years north of the border.

ROSS MACLAREN

Experienced midfielder in his fourth season with Swindon. Edinburgh born, he moved to Shrewsbury from Glasgow Rangers in 1980, and then Derby five years later. Has played over 400 league games for those three clubs.

NICKY SUMMERBEE

Beginning to establish himself in the first team. Aged 20, he is following in the footsteps of father Mike, who made his name with Swindon before joining Man City.

SHAUN TAYLOR

A £200,000 signing from Exeter in July. Powerful six foot defender, he was the Grecians Skipper. Came into league football late, being 23 when he joined the Devon club from Bideford in 1986.

ADRIAN VIVEASH

Former trainee. Local born he usually adopts an attacking midfield role. Stands 6' 1" and is aged 22.

DAVID MITCHELL

Glasgow born, but capped 17 times for Australia. Signed for a nominal fee from Chelsea in the close season. Made only one appearance for the Londoners after being signed from Feyencord for £200,000 in December 1988. Previously with Glasgow Rangers. Played twice on loan for the Mags last season.

GARY WADDOCK

On loan from Millwall. 30 year old Eire international, born appropriately enough on 17 March. Has 20 full caps. Most of his career spent at QPR but injuries threatened to end his career. Spent some time with Belgian outfit Charleroi, before joining Millwall in 1989.

STEVE WHITE

Aged 33 this prolific goalscorer was a free transfer signing from Bristol Rovers in 1986, where he had begun his career in 1977. Moved to Luton and Charlton for fees totally £350,000, between two spells with the Pirates. Troubled by injury in the last twelve months.



THE BOSS -GLENN HODDLE

Succeeded Ossie, and has continued the same skillful style. Frequently appears in the side as a sweeper. One of the most fluent footballers in recent years, Glenn's talents probably earned greater appreciation in Marseilles than at home. Though the hub of the Tottenham team for many years, pundits feel he should have won more than 53 caps. Indeed the major soccer debate of the 1980's was whether or not England's tactical approach should be built around the elegant midfielder.

When Swindon struggled to beat Torquay in a Round One League Cup tie in August 1968, few foresaw they were watching the eventual winners. But the side fashioned by Danny Williams picked up the trophy seven months later on a Wembley surface, ruined by Horse of the Year Mounts, who had churned up the hallowed turf. But Swindon showed themselves to be thoroughbreds, easily overcoming a plodding Arsenal team that contained some famous names -Bob Wilson, McLintock, George Graham and Geordie Armstrong to name but four.

Swindon became the second team from Division Three to lift the trophy, and like QPR, two years before, the cup winners also gained promotion!

Don Rogers, and his powerful left wing play, is the man usually linked with that famous triumph. Certainly the former apprentice, then 24, terrorised defences with explosive running. But arguably it was a trio of Newcastle United cast offs who provided the backbone for Swindon's success.

Most influential was slightly built Peter Noble. A journeyman midfielder, he turned out for the Mags on just 25 occasions, before joining Swindon in January 1968. Peter had once played for Consett, and at the County ground he combined commitment with flair. During the cup run he netted four goals, including one in the 3-1 Final victory. He moved to Burnley in 1973 after over 250 appearances for the Railwaymen, going on to give excellent service for almost seven years at Turf Moor. He finished his career at Blackpool.

Anchorman Joe Butler spent a decade with Swindon, after being discarded by Newcastle in 1965. The former Gallowgate junior played three first team games for the Mags, but went to top the 400 mark with Swindon. After leaving the County Ground, he spent just over eighteen months at Aldershot before hanging up his boots.

Fife born Willie Penman, a dapper inside forward, enjoyed the greatest success at St James'. He was a member of the 64/65 side that won the Second Division Championship, having moved to Gallowgate in 1963 from Glasgow Rangers. After 65 matches for the Mags, Willie moved to Swindon in 1966. Four years later the midfielder teamed up with Walsall where he finished his playing days.

After seeing off Torquay, Swindon required a replay to beat Bradford City in Round Two. At the next stage a Don Rogers goal beat Second Division Blackburn, to earn fourth round trip to Coventry. Four goals were shared at Highfield Road, but a 3-0 scoreline in the County Ground replay suggested Town

could go far. Derby were then beaten, to earn a tilt with First Division Burnley in the semis. Each side won the away leg 2-1, and with no penalties in those days, the tie went to a third match at West Brom. Swindon edged home by the odd goal in five, and the rest is history.

Richard Ord in for the injured John McPhail, impressed, as he combined with Gary Bennett to thwart attacking forays by leading marksman Duncan Shearer.

Either side could have won. At the end of 90 minutes, a draw was fair, with Sunderland showing commendable application by twice coming from behind.

Alan McLoughlin, later to join Southampton made the visitors tick, and on reflection it was obvious Swindon were destined to contest the play offs.

Of course the Wembley match four months later, was one to forget for Wearsiders. We were outplayed in virtually every department, and it was truly amazing Swindon won by just one goal, and that cruelly deflected by Gary Bennett.

But then fate took a hand...
