



Promising players are given advice and training, so why not referees - after all, the man in black (or green) is as much a part


of the game as the players.

DEFENCE STAYS FIRM IN GOAL-LESS DRAWS

This afternoon we welcome manager Glenn Hoddle, the directors, players and supporters, of Swindon Town Football Club to Upton Park, for what I am sure will be another entertaining game between the two sides as was the case last season.

Our last home match against Portsmouth in the preliminary round of the Anglo-Italian Cup was very disappointing, not just for the fact that we were knocked out of the competition, but also because of the injury to our new signing John Robinson. It was thought at first that he had cracked a bone on the outside of his ankle but X-rays showed only severe bruising. Unfortunately injuries like this take time to heal and it may be another week or so before we are able to see John in action again.

DEPARTURE

John will now hopefully fill the position left by the departure of Robert Lee, and if what he showed in the first- half against Portsmouth is anything to go by, Alan and myself are sure he will be an asset to the club, not only for this season, but hopefully for the future.

I would like to make it clear that people should not expect John to suddenly be another Robert Lee. We are of course all disappointed that Robert has left the club after eight years, but life goes on and the sooner everybody accepts the fact that he will no longer be playing with a Charlton shirt on again, the better it will be for all concerned. Robert became very frustrated with all the speculation about his future and it eventually drove him to the point where he decided it would be best if he moved on to pastures new.

Alan and myself would like to



take this opportunity of wishing Robert all the best in his new career at Newcastle, except of course when they play us, and I hope you will give as much encouragement (as they would wish) to whoever takes his place. It's at times like this that your support of the team becomes even more important to the future success of the club.

The result at Tranmere on week. whilst Friday last emphasising our excellent defensive start to the season, also proved a frustrating time for us in attack. Having come through an early spell of pressure from Tranmere, we managed to play some good football and took control of the match in the second-half. and unfortunate that just after halftime we were denied the most blatant penalty I have seen for a long time, which, had it been awarded, may well have taken us on to secure the three points rather than one.

OVERALL

We had a similar result during the week when we drew 0-0 with Bury at Gigg Lane in the first leg of the second round of the Coca Cola Cup. The result may not look on paper to be a very inspiring one but I can assure you that under very trying conditions on an uneven pitch, we were happy with the result, although the lads agreed that they were not satisfied with overall performance, which they hope we can rectify in the second leg in 11 days time.

We now face three successive home matches, starting today, and I am sure that if we can again start creating more chances for ourselves we will confirm our early season success and thus maintain our position near the top of the First Division table and go through to the next round of the cup, with hopefully an attractive tie to come.

ROBERT'S AWAY

After weeks of speculation, Charlton winger Robert Lee finally left the club and signed for Newcastle United on Monday in a £700,000 deal. Robert had been missing from the Charlton line-up for the last two games and had been talking to former Charlton boss. Lennie Lawrence at Middlesbrough, but turned down the chance to link up again with his old boss and former team mate Andy Peake to sign for Kevin Keegan's First Division pace-setters.

The Keegan factor clearly influenced Robert's decision. After signing for United, Robert said "I used to idolise Kevin Keegan and Terry McDermott, and I'm looking forward to playing for a big club like Newcastle."

Robert felt that from a career point of view a move was right for him, and although he had been happy at the club, he wanted to leave.

"When a player makes it clear that he wants to move, it is probably in the best interests of all parties to help", said Charlton chairman Roger Alwen, "because there is no point in having an unsettled player at the

Robert made his Charlton debut in March 1984 and scored in a 3-3 draw with Grimsby at The Valley. He also scored the most recent goal at the Valley against Stoke in September 1985, and a year later notched our first in Division One for 29 years against Sheffield Wednesday. Altogether, Robert made 343 senior appearances for the club, including 29 as substitute, scoring 65 goals. He made two appearances for the England under 21 side, against Italy in 1986, and Sweden in 1987, both as substitute, and he was named as the 1991 Player of the Year, after scoring 13 goals for the club, his best ever return.

Robert was set to make his debut for Newcastle on Wednesday in a Coca Cola Cup tie – against Middlesbrough! Everyone at the club wishes him the best of luck, except of course when we meet United!





TRADITION LOSES OUT TO TELEVISION

The First Division, like its big brother the Premier, is having its traditional Saturday afternoon football programme disrupted this season by Sky and ITV's live television coverage, with usually two matches taken off the pools coupons and moved to Sunday to be dissected by the cameras.

London Weekend Television showed its first live match last week when West Ham drew 1-1 with the multi-million pound Derby County side, still the only team without a




Bristol City manager Denis Smith

league win in the division.

There were only 11,493 spectators actually at the ground, the lowest Upton Park crowd for a Hammers league game for 35 years. At least those who turned up saw more than the armchair viewer as the picture was lost for a spell in the second-half.

Despite including new £2.5 million defender Craig Short from Notts County in their ranks, Derby could only salvage a point thanks to a "Ludo" own goal from the giant West Ham keeper, Ludek Miklosko.

Former Sunderland manager Denis Smith has seen his side concede 10 goals in two league games as they crashed 5-0 to rampant Newcastle,

top of the league with seven straight victories, and capacity 29,000 crowds, more than many Premier Division sides achieve.

ATMOSPHERE

Smith, who knows the North East well, was full of praise for Kevin Keegan's team. "They have got their tails up and are playing some great football" he said "You couldn't pick a better atmosphere to play in". Keegan himself said: "I don't see any reason why the run can't go on for a long time. We have a belief in ourselves which is certainly not false".

At this early stage in the season Bristol Rovers and Barnsley have already slipped into lowly positions following disappointing home defeats last week. Rovers, like their Bristol neighbours, are conceding too many goals – 20 now in eight matches after the 3-0 reverse against Grimsby Town whilst Barnsley have yet to win at Oakwell after going down 2-1 to Peterborough.

There was sweet revenge in this game for Posh striker Tony Adcock who scored one of the goals. Adcock was rejected and sold by Barnsley boss Mel Machin when he was in charge at Manchester City. Machin

was furious with his teams lack of commitment and stormed "We got what we deserved. A number of senior players let us down and there was a lack of character".

Sunderland, who drew at the Abbey Stadium against Cambridge United in the Anglo-Italian Cup, were beaten in the league, losing 2-1 to give the home side only their second win of the season.

SALVAGED


Notts County's defence obviously missed Craig Short's influence as they crashed 6-0 to Millwall at the Den, an irresistible performance from the Lions who are looking an exciting side in attack.

Inconsistent Watford, beaten twice by Wolves last season, should have gained their revenge at Molineux when they led 2-1 with three minutes to go, before Steve Bull – with his second headed goal of the game – salvaged his sides unbeaten league record.

Charlton, the other unbeaten side along with Newcastle, have the division's best defensive record conceding just two goals in eight games and their defence has been impregnable on opponents grounds. Success is built on having a strong defence and Charlton have certainly looked rock solid so far.

It could be tested to the full this afternoon with Swindon Town, the divisions second top goalscorers with 16 goals, visitors to Upton Park. They drew 2-2 in the televised game with neighbours Oxford United on Sunday – Martin Ling and Shaun Taylor were on target.

Today's games provide the usual mixture of the predictable and the unexpected, with an interesting local derby between Brentford and Millwall at Griffin Park, as Millwall hope to continue last weeks goal glut.

Two struggling sides, Bristol City and Barnsley meet at Ashton Gate, with City hoping to shore up their creaky defence.

Derby will be looking to open their winning account at home to Southend, whilst Grimsby should be too strong at home for Cambridge United, who are currently rebuilding.

Notts County will be trying to sort their defence out before the home clash with Luton Town, who managed their first away win for two years in their last outing at Brentford.

Tranmere Rovers, beaten only once in six games, will find it tough at Oxford United, where John Aldridge will be hoping to haunt his old side.

Peterborough have the opportunity of stopping the Newcastle bandwagon from rolling on when the sides meet at London Road.

Sunderland take on Bristol Rovers, desperate for a win, at Roker Park and Watford play Leicester at Vicarage Road.

windon inside-right Ernie Hunt Omissed a penalty last night.

And Swindon dropped their first home point - to Charlton and the nervetearing anxiety of their own youth.

With all Wiltshire urging them to forget their first defeat of the season, at Northampton three days Swindon, in fact, suffered again almost every moment of it.

They tried too much, too fast, and the desperation to prove that one defeat does not make disaster showed in their every mistake.

The tender-aged talents of Swindon almost plucked victory, despite their twanging nerves.

With less than half an hour to go, outside left Don Rogers, a slim 17-year-old, had calmed them enough to take the lead.

And in less than a minute Swindon should have shot from a narrow 2-1 to an overwhelming 4-1 lead.

Rogers loped easily past a lunge from John Hewie, and lobbed the ball over goalkeeper Mike Rose to Jack Smith.

Smith, with acres of goal in front of him, headed over. The groans had hardly died when Roger Smart was brought

This is it, thought Swindon, as Young England forward Hunt strolled up to take the penalty.

Ernie, said Swindon, has never missed. This time he did, with Rose clutching the ball to his chest as he dived to his

But how nearly this brilliant young Rogers

pulled Swindon round. Thirty seconds from half-time, with Hewie already being booed for two unnecessary tackles on him, Rogers moved inside and lashed the ball in from 25 yards.

Mike Kenning levelled that one, swinging a waist-high shot through Swindon's packed defence (52 mins) after Dennis Edwards had nodded on Brian Kinsey's long free-kick.

After an hour of torment for Charlton, Rogers loped along again. From Bobby Woodruff's short pass, Rogers took the ball outside Hewie and pulled it back from almost on the goal-line for Mike Summerbee softly to side-foot in.

So 2-1 it was - and, I repeat, 4-1 it should have been - until Mike Bailey showed Swindon how simple it all was with the power and accuracy of his 78thminute shot.



is for

Europe. Charlton's first trip into Europe came in May 1924 when a party of eleven players travelled to Belgium where they beat En. Liege (3-1) and Ent. Standard (2-Charlton's next Euro awayday would not be for another seven years. In March 1931 they travelled to Amsterdam where they drew 3-3 with a Dutch XI. The first European team to visit The Valley was Nice Olympique. On 14th September 1933 they met Charlton in a friendly, the Addicks enjoying a comfortable 3-0 win.

When Charlton entered the First Division, their services were much in demand for prestige friendlies in Europe. Perhaps the most remarkable of Charlton's many games against European opposition came during a trip to Sweden in May and June 1946. On 7th June, Charlton played AIK in Stockholm. This was how manager Jimmy Seed recorded the game in his match diary: 'The match provided the biggest upheaval of form I

have ever known. In the first-half we played real exhibition stuff and at half-time we were leading by 4-0. AIK scored just after the restart but we got another three to make it 7-1. That was the score with twenty-five minutes to go. The referee gave two wrong decisions, both of which cost goals and there after we were never in it. The defence was overwhelmed and were much too slow for the opposing forwards'. The result? Charlton drew 7-7! Their experience must have rattled Sam Bartram in the Charlton goal. In his autobiography, published in 1956, he was convinced that the game had taken place in 1938!

 $oldsymbol{\mathcal{E}}$ is also for Everton who hold the record for the most goals scored against Charlton in home and away League games in the same season. ~In 1930/31 they beat

Charlton 7-1 at Goodison Park and 7-0 at The Valley. The incomparable Bill 'Dixie' Dean scored five of these fourteen goals, Fred Whitlow scored Charlton's consolation effort.

is for elephant, one of the animals which formed part of a 'Zoo Parade' prior Charlton's League match with Portsmouth at The Valley on 4th October 1969. The parade was part of a campaign to present football at The Valley as a family entertainment' (whatever that is) and other events included film shows for children and, I quote, 'bingo sessions for wives and girlfriends'. By the way, the elephant was called Lulu and Charlton drew 2-2. I wonder if London Zoo have considered having a parade of footballers to drum up business?

Finally, **\mathcal{E}** is for East Terrace. According to Rick Everitts 'Battle for The Valley', it comprises 132 steps from top to bottom. This proves that whatever Eddie Cochran's other accomplishments may have been, arithmetic certainly wasn't one of them.

When Roger came to The Valley in May 1973 he had completed twelve seasons of outstanding service with The Robins, the Swindon variety that is.

Born in Swindon on the 25th March, 1943 and having represented Swindon Schools it was natural that he should sign as an apprentice at the County Ground. He joined the professional ranks in May 1960 and became part of Bert Head's brilliant young side of the early sixties.

Roger made his League debut during Swindon's Third Division Campaign of 1961/62. The following season, Town swept to promotion to the Second

Division for the first time in their history. Finishing as runners-up to Northampton, this young and exciting side featured the likes of Ernie Hunt, Bobby Woodruff, Mike Summerbee and Don Rogers, Roger made ten appearances in that promotion campaign and scored five vital goals. From then on he was a regular in the side.

Two years later, Swindon found themselves back in Division Three, and some of the young stars were lured away from the club. The likes of Smart and Rogers remained to form the nucleus of another promotion side in 1969. Roger hit nine goals in that season to finish as Swindon's third League marksman. probably his most memorable goal came in the League Cup Final at Wembley that same season. He scored the first goal in Swindon's 3-1 demolition of Arsenal, one of the most remarkable results in the competition's

Following his distinguished career at Swindon, Roger joined Charlton on a free transfer in May 1973 as we were about to embark on our second season back in Division Three. He played regularly for most of the season but eventually lost his place to Peter Hunt.

Roger was released at the end of the 1973/74 season and joined Bath City. He later served both Trowbridge and Melksham Town, and such is his love of the game that he was still playing for Sunday Wessex during the mid-eighties.

Following a fine 3-0 win over Fulham, Charlton could only draw 1-1 at home to Derby. Played in driving rain, the match had little to commend it. The Rams


took a fifty-third minute lead when the ball deflected off Les Berry and into the path of a grateful Frank Gamble. The introduction of substitute Kevin Smith on the hour revived Charlton and an equaliser finally came in the eighty-fifth minute. Carl Harris sent over an accurate cross which was headed home by Steve White. A Terry Bullivant shot almost gave Charlton three points but this was more than their efforts merited. Meanwhile, negotiations on the deal which would bring Allan Simonsen to The Valley continued. In Division Four, Swindon earned a point in their goalless draw with Hull at Boothferry Park.

A battling performance saw Charlton earn a replay following their 0-0 League Cup Third Round tie with First Division

Sheffield United at Bramall Lane. Dave Shipperley was outstanding in defence as the Addicks fought a brave rearguard action. As the game wore on, Charlton grew in confidence and Mike Flanagan, Bob Curtis and Arthur Horsfield all went close, However, it still needed some late heroics from John Dunn in the Charlton goal to ensure a replay. A home tie with Arsenal would be the Fourth Round reward for the victors.

Swindon had already gone out of the League Cup, losing 1-0 at home to Derby in Round Two. In the Second Division they lost 3-2 at Hull. Ron Howell and Peter Hoble scored their goals with Terry Neill, Ian Butler and Phil Holme netting for the Tigers.

With seven YTS training boys playing we were short on experience but abundant in desire and football ability.



DOUBLE CUP SUCCESS FOR YOUNG PLAYERS







It goes without saying that the question we've been asked most in the last few weeks is 'how can I get hold of a ticket for the first game back at The Valley?







GLENN'S GEM

Hoddle's opener sets the Swindon standard

In recent seasons, matches against Swindon Town have always been worth watching. First there was the Ossie Ardiles side, who knocked the ball about with some style and had the finish to go with it, and last season, the Glenn Hoddle version, which continued the footballing principle with a few slide rule fifty yard passes thrown in.

It was perhaps a brave step by Swindon to appoint an untried manager in Glenn Hoddle towards the end of the 90/91 season, but the man who graced the Spurs, Monaco and England midfield for so long, has proved himself as a

capable boss.

As well as that, his sheer class still adorns the Football League and that can only be a good thing, unless of course your team has come a cropper recently at the Robins' hands.

One such team was Sunderland, who succumbed to an outstanding 30 yard strike from the playermanager on the opening day of the season. Hoddle always scored spectacular goals throughout his career, and he's still setting the standards for his players even now.

The Town boss has dropped back to play a sweeper's role as his playing career comes to an end, and although their five man defence gives them plenty of attacking options, they can often get caught out at the back. David Penney's equaliser for Oxford in the televised game at the County Ground last week was the 12th goal the Robins have conceded in just seven League games this season.

In his programme notes for the Oxford game, the Swindon chief accepted that his approach to the game can occasionally lead to a sloppy goal.

"I suppose the way we play does leave us a little bit vulnerable", he said. "One bad ball turns into a horrific mistake which is likely to make you forget all the good play

that went before it."

Another area that concerns the County Ground chief is the number of late goals that his team have conceded this season. In the last ten minutes of matches this season, they have let in goals against Bristol Rovers (twice), Wolves, Cambridge, Millwall and Oxford.

"We were denied the win we deserved against Bristol Rovers when we conceded another late goal", Mr Hoddle said. "It seems to be happening to us a lot recently and it is very difficult to put your finger on the cause. You can't very well put on a training session and wait until the 85th minute to start analysing the situation. In the dressing room after the Rovers game we were all very disappointed, but having watched the tape of the match I realised just how good our overall play had

Our games against Swindon are usually tight, although our home record against them is not good - in fact you have to go back to the 71/72 season to find our last home success against the Robins - but whatever happens today's game should be one of our most entertaining of the season.

INTRODUCING TODAY'S OPPOSITION

THE ROBINS

When football talk turns to conversation about the teams that like to play the game the way it was intended – on grass, Swindon Town are always one of the teams that get a mention. Ever since Ossie Ardiles took over at the County Ground and transformed them from the Lou Macari up-and-under merchants to a side that plays the sort of football that current manager Glenn Hoddle was famed for at Tottenham.

Last season, it very nearly paid dividends, as Swindon finished just outside the play-off positions, two points behind us. Having said that, 'play-offs' is a phrase that is none too popular in Wiltshire. They reached the Second Division play-offs twice in recent years, losing in the semi-final to Crystal Palace in 1989 but reaching the Wembley final in 1990, beating Sunderland 1-0. Their subsequent demotion to Division Three and reinstatement to Division Two has been well documented, but it is sufficient to say that the team were affected by that traumatic period, and only just escaped relegation the following season.

Last season however, under Glenn Hoddle's management, Swindon looked like play-off contenders throughout the campaign, and even led the table briefly in November. They have started this season like they mean business, losing just one of their opening six games, down the road at Millwall. Other than that their first half a dozen matches have been notable for the goals flying in. They beat Sunderland with a Hoddle special on the opening day of the season, and followed it up with 2-2 draws against Wolves, Oxford and Bristol Rovers, and Rovers were on the receiving end of a four goal hammering, as were Cambridge.

But they are far from impregnable at the back. Their fluid, almost casual style of defending often leaves them vulnerable, and it means plenty of work for former Manchester United apprentice Fraser Digby in goal. The England under 21 keeper has chalked up over 270 games for the Robins, but last season he had to share the keeper's jersey with ex-Arsenal keeper Nicky Hammond, who has also been on loan with Peterborough, Bristol Rovers and Aberdeen.

In the back four they can boast four experienced campaigners, and they don't come any better than player-manager Glenn Hoddle. To describe such a distinguished career would take pages rather than paragraphs, but he is perhaps best known as one of the few players in the League that

increased attendances simply by turning up. After 53 games in the England midfield, Hoddle now operates as a sweeper, but can still score spectacular goals, as Sunderland found out last month.

Alongside his manager, is Swindon's longest serving player, club captain Colin Calderwood. His transfer from Mansfield Town seems a long time ago, and he is approaching his 300th game for the club.

Calderwood scored six goals last season – his best ever tally, and he also played for the Football League side against the Italian Scrie B in Italy last season.

The full back positions also have an international flavour about them, with England under 21 cap David Kerslake



operating at right back, and Welsh full international **Paul Bodin** the regular left back.

Kerslake cost £110,000 when he joined from QPR three years ago, and Bodin is currently in his second spell with the club having been sold to and bought back from Crystal Palace.

While Hoddle sweeps, Shaun Taylor partners Calderwood in the centre of the defence, and he also gets forward regularly to score some vital goals.

A £200,000 signing from Exeter just over a year ago, Taylor was voted Town's player of the Year last season, having won that award with Exeter two seasons previously.


Also available in defence is Nicky Summerbee, son of former Manchester City winger Mike. Summerbee junior began life as a striker but is now a regular in the side at left back, and Adrian Viveash is another left back who is currently awaiting his chance. Swindon born, he's only made 40 odd appearances, despite being with the club for a number of years, and he's now on a monthly contract. One man who probably won't play today is Ross MacLaren, the former Shrewsbury and Derby defender. He is presently recovering from a hernia operation.

In midfield, Dave Bennett has not had the best of luck, having broken his leg three times since joining Town from Sheffield Wednesday for £50,000 two years ago. The brother of Sunderland's Garry Bennett, he won a cup winners medal with Coventry in 1987.

Up front Craig Maskell is the man who has taken over the goalscoring mantle of the departed Duncan Shearer Maskell joined the Robins this summer from Reading in a £250,000 deal with Tom Jones going in the opposite direction, and he has repaid Glenn Hoddle's faith with six goals in his opening six games. He was top scorer for Reading last season, and led the scoring charts at Huddersfield prior to his move to Elm Park.

Hoddle also has another graduate of the Spurs youth policy up his sleeve— Shain Close, who joined Swindon from Bournemouth for £70,000. He has found goals in the first team hard to come by — just one so far, but he topped the reserve side scoring list last season with 25 goals.
