
Swindon Town tells not only our own people but our customers as well that teamwork and the spirit to win are attitudes that we value highly.

SWINDON KOALAS





their promotion credentials last Sunday with an impressive 4-0 win at neighbours Birmingham City to put them into the top three of the table. Debutant Darren Roberts, a £20,000 signing from Burton Albion at the end of last season made a remarkable start to his League career by hitting a first half hat-trick.

Replacing the injured Andy Mutch at the last minute, 22 year old Roberts was delighted with his performance "It wasn't until an hour before kick-off that Andy Mutch told me he was injured and I was playing so I never had time to feel nervous. It's an absolute dream. I suppose it is my natural instinct to make near post runs and today it came off."

Another side with Premier League ambitions are West Ham who won 1-0 at Portsmouth thanks to the prolific Clive Allen's fifth goal of the season. After their failure to sign Charlton's Robert Lee the Hammer's Managing Director Peter Storrie says cash is available to strengthen the squad at Upton Park "Billy Bonds and

Lee, meanwhile has joined Newcastle in a £700,000 deal after rejecting an offer from his previous boss Lennie Lawrence at Premier side Middlesbrough. Lee was expected to sign for 'Boro but pulled out at the last minute and hopes Lawrence is not too aggrieved "I can understand if Lennie is feeling a bit bemused and I hope there are no hard feelings but he put me on the spot and wanted me to sign straight away. A telling factor was that Kevin Keegan used to be my idol." Ironically Lee made his debut for the Magpies against Boro in the Coca-Cola Cup. The game ended without a goal and was the first time this season that Newcastle have not won.

Millwall player-manager Mick McCarthy is enjoying his first full season with managerial responsibilities. However, his lack of experience has not affected the Lion's performances. Millwall are currently seventh in the table and McCarthy explains his philosophy of how his team is required to perform "What I want is for the team to play with aggression. Not dirty, but genuine aggressive football. I want us to be entertaining

and score goals, but I also want us to be good and tight at the back. The players are good enough and the only pity as far as I am concerned is that I have had to let good ones leave. The problem is that many were signed when the Club were in the First Division and were being paid First Division wages that are difficult to afford, since relegation.

Bristol City manager Denis Smith will have been pleased that his side only let Barnsley score once last Saturday following two five goal drubbings in a week at the hands of West Ham and Newcastle. Rebuilding the team since his appointment in March, Smith has placed veteran striker Nicky Morgan on the list "He has been a good servant to the club but he can leave as soon as things are right for him. He is a good professional but doesn't figure in my long term plans."

Jorgany United

Relegated from Division Three last season Torquay United looked for a fresh start under new manager Paul Compton - who took control last May - in the re-shaped League which sees them participating in the newly formed Division Three.

Before the big kick-off there was some activity in the transfer market with two key defenders, Matthew Elliott and Paul Holmes, moving out and Adrian Foster, Paul Trollope and Dave Walters moving in.

Elliott, the six-foot former Charlton defender, was snapped up by Southampton for £50,000 while Birmingham City paid the Gulls £40,000 for Holmes who had been voted Player of the Year last season.

The loss of two such talented players was bound to be felt for United, restricted financially, were unable to go out and buy replacements and thus have had to rely on home-grown youngsters to fill the breach.

The three newcomers were all free transfers; Dave Walters, at 31, the only experienced recruit, having played in goal for Plymouth Argyle and Exeter City.

Paul Trollope of course needs no introduction to Town fans. He

is the son of our Youth Team manager John and has learned his trade with us at the County Ground. Adrian Foster, a 21-year-old forward, arrived from West Bromwich Albion.

All three were included in the starting line of the opening game of the season at Crewe Alexandra, the team taking the field being: Walters, Davies, Davis, Saunders, Moore, Joyce, Hall, Foster, Fashanu, Myers, Trollope. With Darby and Colcough on the substitutes' bench.

Torquay were four goals down before Justin Fashanu and Duane Darby, who had replaced Davies in the 82nd minute, replied with two goals in the final ten minutes. Alas, it was too little too late.

Darby's eight minute run was enough to secure him a place in the starting line at Hereford in the Coca-Cola Cup. But once again Torquay fell behind. It was in the second half that the youngsters displayed their fighting qualities and when Fashanu and Darby repeated their goal-scoring act they returned to Devon in a happy frame of mind.

Fashanu and Darby struck again in a fine 3-2 win at Doncaster, where Chris Myers notched his first goal of the season and indeed Justin Fashanu, a teenage super-star at Norwich



City,was proving unstoppable as he lead the 5-0 rout of Hereford United in the second-leg of the Coca-Cola Cup first round tie.


Foster too got in on the scoring act that night but it was Saunders, the captain, who made the headlines. The former Newcastle United defender (he played 50 First Division games for them and has served Carlisle and Dundee United as well) netted twice on the night.

Unfortunately Saunders, a club record signing at £60,000, was injured a couple of games later at Scarborough and has not played since.

Prior to that however, Torquay celebrated their first home game of the season, on September 6th, with a 2-1 win over Cardiff City. Fashanu scored his fifth goal of the season but was then sent off for use of the elbow - his third dismissal this year.

Foster took over the number nine shirt when Fash was suspended with Salman to strengthen midfield.

Against us in the first-leg of this cup-tie the Gulls youthful endeavour was just not good enough to stem the tide.

Scott Colcombe - Forward. Now in his second season at Plainmoor. he made 28 League appearances last season and scored his only goal in the FA Cup. Previously with West Bromwich Albion he is a tricky winger who loves to run at defenders with the ball. Born: Birmingham 15-12-71.

Chris Curran - Defender. In his third year as a professional after graduating through the YTS. Noted for his tough tackling he has established himself at rightback. Made 16 League appearances last term. Born: Birmingham17-9-71

Duane Darby - Striker. A teenager with great promise he

already tops the Gulls' scoring chart this season. A first-year professional he scored two goals in 6(8) League appearances last season. Born: 17-10-83.

Justin Fashanu - Striker. Combines the roles of player and assistant manager. Made the headlines back in 1981 when he became the youngest £1 million player when Brian Clough signed him from Norwich City. Didn't eye to eye with the Forest boss and accepted a drop in salary to join Notts County. Serious knee problems disrupted his career for four years and he did the rounds trying to re-establish himself with clubs such as West Ham before settling

at Torquay. Led the Gulls goal charge last season with 10 in 21 League outings. Capped by England at Under-21 level. He was a top class amateur boxer before turning to pro soccer. Born Kensington 18-9-62.

Adrian Foster - Forward, A summer signing from West Albion where Bromwich completed his apprenticeship professional football. Scored one in 4 (4) League appearances for Albion last season in Division Three and goal for the netted his first Gulls in the 5-0 defeat of Hereford United in previous round of the Coca-Cola Cup. Born: Birmingham 19-3-71.

TORQUAY UTD

Arron Davis - Lettback.
Came into football on the YTS and is one of a host of promising youngsters. Was given nine starts and three sub appearances in Division Three last season. A defender with an attacking instinct. Born: Essex 11-2-72.

Matthew Gardiner

Rightback. Still only 18 and on the fringe of selection he was introduced as a substitute at Bury last week. Born: Birmingham 28-3-74.

Paul Hall - Forward. With 38 appearances in the Third Division last season he was almost an ever-present. Managed only three goals however - one in the League and two in the Rumbelows Cup. Born: Manchester 3-7072.

Sean Joyce - Midfield.
Tough-tackling ball-winner now in his fifth season with Torquay.
Started his career with Doncaster Rovers and moved to Devon on a free transfer. Has been to Wembley twice since then. Born: Conisborough 15-2-67.

Matthew Lowe

Goalkeeper. Has established himself as first choice in this his first year as a professional. Served a two-year YTS course and made 10 appearances in the first team towards the end of last season. Still only 18. Born: Halesowen 25-2-74.

Darren Moore - Defender.
Another 18 year old, Darren is still on the YTS and will not become a professional until November. Even so he made five appearances in the Third Division last season. Born: Birmingham 22-4-74.

Chris Myers - Midfield. A local lad who left the club and drifted in non-League circles before being brought back to Plainmoor. Made more League appearances than anyone else for the Gulls last season and is influential in the middle of the park. Born: Yeovil 1-4-69.

Danis Salman

Defender/Midfield. signed from Plymouth Argyle just over three weeks ago on a free transfer. Very experienced competitor who came into League football with Brentford as a 15 year old, making his debut v Watford in November 1975. Millwall paid £20,000 for him in 1986. Last season moved to Plymouth making 28 Second Division appearances. Capped by England at youth level. Born: Cyprus 12-3-60.

Paul Trollope - Forward. The son of Town Youth team manager John, Paul served his apprenticeship with us moving to Torquay in the close-season. Made his League debut on the opening day of the campaign at Crewe and has been a regular in the Gulls team. Born: Swindon 3-6-72.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



Paul Compton pulled on his boots for the first time this season when he turned out at Darlington in a Third Division game last Friday.

The Torquay boss, who made 19 League appearances last season, is still only 31 but restricts his games as he suffers from back and knee problems.

However, a thigh strain picked up by Danis Salman meant his services were required at the heart of the United defence and should Salman still be unfit for tonight we could see Paul in action again.

Born in Stroud, Paul came into football as a centre-half with Trowbridge Town and in 1980 was signed by Bournemouth - making his League debut in a goalless draw with Crewe in October 1980.

Made 63 League appearances for the Cherries before transferring to Aldershot in the season of 1983-4 where he made a further 13 appearances before signing for Torquay United, where he stayed until four years ago.

His career then took him to Newport County and he had a spell as manager of Weymouth but had gone out of football and was considering buying a milk round when Torquay offered him the position of Youth Development Officer last year.

Then last May Ivan Golac vacated the managerial seat and Paul took charge.

His step-son Lee looks like following in his footsteps too. He is on Schoolboy forms with the Gulls.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

By now, almost everyone will have been reminded that the first time the Town met Torquay in the League Cup, they went on to lift the trophy at Wembley. But it may not be common knowledge that our visitors were responsible for both the first goal to be scored at the County Ground in that memorable season and the first League goal that Swindon conceded at home. The fact more than nine weeks elapsed between the two events is quite remarkable. Tonight, we reflect on those 67 days in '68 that led to glory in '69.

The Town's season should have opened with a visit to Northampton on Saturday August 10, but as cricket rules the day at the other County Ground, Swindon's first opponents were Torquay three days later, for that League Cup First Round encounter. The Town had their three new signings on parade, centre-half Frank Burrows, centre-forward Chris Jones and a £17,000 midfield capture from the Gulls, the late John Smith.

John Rowlands had the honour of netting that first goal of 1968/69. Swindon skipper Stan Harland conceded a free-kick on the edge of the area and the ball bobbled around on a wet surface before reaching Pat Morrissey. He sliced his shot, which flew across goal for Rowlands to tap the ball over the line and give his side an 18th-minute lead.

Two goals from the Town in ten minutes turned the game around.

On the hour, Don Rogers and Roger Smart combined for the latter to crash the ball past advancing keeper Andy Donnelly. Rogers laid on the second for Peter Noble and got the ball in the net himself two minutes from time, but the effort was ruled out for offside. Swindon thus went into the hat for the Second Round draw, which took them to Bradford City on September 4.

Meanwhile, the Town's Third Division programme finally got under way with the visit of Stockport County and a Noble goal ten minutes from the end was sufficient to secure the points. A goalless draw at Hartlepool on the following Saturday, August 24, was marred by the loss of full-back John Trollope with a broken arm, bringing an end to his 100% appearance record over the last seven years. Three days later 16,765 turned up at the County Ground for the local derby with Reading, but again they saw no

Plymouth Argyle came to Wiltshire on the last day of August. Two goals from Rogers and a third from Smart produced a comfortable 3-0 win. A third 0-0 draw, at Watford on September 7, was the Town's fifth successive League game without conceding a goal.

Swindon's trip to Bradford saw them take the lead with a Smart header just before the break. Tony Leighton equalised with twelve minutes to go, bringing City back to the County Ground on September 10. On that night, the Town survived going two goals down in 16 minutes to grab a 4-3 victory.

Walsall became the sixth side to fail to register a League goal against Swindon, a 9th-minute Noble effort being enough to clinch victory. But the run ended on Wednesday September 18, when Bournemouth's Ray Rumstead Peter heat Downsborough after 28 minutes to send the Town on their way to a 2-0 defeat. The shut-out had lasted 568 minutes. Swindon slipped again three days later, going down 2-1 to Bristol Rovers at Eastville.

But back at the County Ground, they were still keeping the goals out. Blackburn Rovers were dismissed 1-0 in the Third Round of the League Cup on September 24 and both Shrewsbury Town (3-0) and Orient (1-0) returned home pointless. Away victories over Reading and Brighton followed, before the Town journeyed to Coventry for their next League Cup battle. Only goals in the last four minutes (yes, it happened even then!) denied them a First Division scalp at the first attempt.

Torquay returned to the County Ground on October 19 in search of League points. But goals from Rogers, on the stroke of half-time, and Noble, gave the Town a fifth successive League victory. Swindon's opponents were once again denied until Alan Welsh's goal four minutes from the end, after 626 minutes play.



Coca-Cola put the fizz into the Cup

When the Football League Cup was first launched onto an unresponsive public in 1960, it was dismissed as just another incumberance on an already overcrowded season by many of the big establishments. It was an understandable reaction from the League's elite whose interests were turning towards the more lucrative markets of European competition.

The League Cup was the baby of the then League Secretary, Alan Hardacre, and was intended as a means to generate more liquid assets through dwindling turnstiles. The concept was right, for the possibility of Mansfield Town entertaining Manchester United in such a competition could only swell the Field Mill club's coffers. The problem was that for the project to succeed it needed the full backing of the major powers. Alas they had other forms of income which were more profitable and so naturally were not too concerned about the new competition.

Even so, despite the vocal opposition the clubs did agree by 31 votes to 15 to inaugurate the Football League Cup competition in 1960, and as the organisers prudently made entry optional, the venture proceeded.

Arsenal, Tottenham Hotspur, Sheffield Wednesday, West Bromwich Albion and Wolverhampton Wanderers declined to enter and this helped spread the illusion that this was very much a second class tournament. The format was quite simple with the first five rounds played on a knockout basis and the semi-final and final played over two legs, home and away.

There were goals galore in the opening round. Cardiff City won 4-3 at Middlesbrough, Derby County won at Watford 5-2, Bolton Wanderers at Hull City 5-1 and Chelsea v Millwall 7-1 while the Newport County vs Southampton tie ran to two replays producing 16 goals. But even so, the Football League Cup could not capture the magic of the F.A. Cup.

In 1966 the competition was made when it was decided to have a show-piece final at Wembley Stadium. This sparked off a show of enthusiasm and 90 of the 92 League clubs entered the competition for the 1966-67 season. A further carrot was the prospect of automatic entry into the UEFA Cup for the winners.

So the League Cup established itself as a major domestic tournament. The big clubs found they needed the cash boost as well as a further opportunity to qualify for Europe, and the League Cup was at last taken seriously.


In a way this altered the whole image of the competition. From the start the League Cup generated its own tradition, a tradition of success for the less glamorous members of the League. Little Rotherham United featured in that very first final against Aston Villa, then Rochdale, Norwich City, Stoke City, Queens Park Rangers, Southampton and of course Swindon Town all savoured the magic of playing in a major Cup Final.


Ten years ago a new name appeared on the Cup. Not that of a Football League club but that of the Dairy Council when the competition became the Milk Cup with the first sponsorship of the Cup. For the first three years the mighty Liverpool won the trophy, all games after extra time. After the 1984 final against Everton which also went to a replay, the Anfield trophy cabinet kept the Cup for good and a new one was cast for Norwich City when they took the honours a year later. Oxford United were the last winners of the Milk Cup before the sponsorship came to an end and the Littlewoods organisation took over for four years. This was succeeded by the Rumbelows sponsorship in 1991, the deal of which terminated early after just two years.

A two years £2.25m agreement, with a three year option was the result of amicable three way negotiations between the Football League, Rumbelows and Coca-Cola.

Coca-Cola boasts the longest international involvement in the game of any brand, an association which began prior to the 1978 World Cup when Coca-Cola was instrumental in establishing FIFA's commercial programme. Coca-Cola has been a major sponsor of every World Cup tournament since then and is already committed to support the 1994 Finals in the United States. It's European Championships including this summer's in Sweden. For over a decade Coca-Cola has been a sponsor of the European Cup and of the European Cup Winners Cup.

Now Coca-Cola have put the fizz into a top domestic competition and from the first round right through to the Wembley Final the Coca-Cola Cup will be the source of fun. excitement and special moments for the Countries football fans, qualities which are traditionally associated with the Coca-Cola brand. You can't beat the feeling!





PLAYER PROFILE

When Nicky Hammond was called into goal for his first game of the season last Tuesday he admits he felt a little nervous. The pouring rain and slippery surface certainly didn't provide ideal conditions for a goalkeeper charged with keeping everything out for the night.

The battle between Nicky and Fraser Digby for the number one shirt was one of the intriguing contests of last season. Nicky just shading it with 25 League appearances to Fraser's 21. This term though Fraser again started as the number one choice only to lose it after registering just two clean sheets in 11 League and Cup appearances.

Such are the demands of the modern game there is little room for error particularly there are two custodians of such high standing available for selection.

"We both know the situation," smiles Nicky. "It can be difficult when you know that if you make a couple of errors you will be out of the team.

"On the other hand we know where we stand and that if we do lose our place there is always the opportunity to win it back again. I have been on the sidelines biding my chance and now Fraser is in the same position.

"I was quite pleased with my game against Grimsby and very thankful that I did not have to deal with the situation confronting their goalkeeper in the opening minutes. He went down to save a shot from 20yards but couldn't hold it in the slippery conditions and Craig pounced to pop it into the net.

"Glenn had made a point of this in the dressing room before the game telling the lads to chase in every shot at both ends. Thankfully, though I was under quite a lot of pressure at times, we didn't have a similar incident at our end.

"This was my first senior game under the new back-pass rule and it seemed to go okay. The circumstances are much different to reserve football when you have six or seven thousand waiting for you to make a mis-

"Overall I was pleased with the way I read the game. It most definitely was not a night for taking chances."


It is just over a year now since Nicky was given his big chance at Port Vale. That run lasted six games before injury knocked him out of the side. He claims: "I'm much more experienced than I was then and know what to expect. That was the first chance I had of a run in the first team and it did me a power of good.

"But it is becoming even more difficult for Fraser and me. Not only have we this new backpass situation to deal with but a new ball as well. This season we have switched to an Adidas ball which the lads love. But I can tell you Fraser and I hate it. It is very light, moves a lot in the air, and really flys. If the striker catches it right it goes like a rocket. All designed to make a goalkeeper's lot not a happy one."

Even so Nicky is not going to let a little thing like that distract him as he strives for the sort of consistency that will keep him at the forefront of selection.

There is no animosity between the 'keepers who work hard together and are friends off the field. Says Nicky: "I don't think people can really understand our problems unless they have played in goal. It is nice that we can discuss situations with each other and work on them in practice."

It was against Watford here last season that Nicky collected the injury that kept him out of the side for the next four games. He's hoping there will be no repeat of that, as he looks for another clean slate this evening.

This evening Paul Trollope makes a return to The County


Ground to come up against his former team-mates and also we hope to be able to see Justin Fashanu back in action after his recent suspension.

We have lost our last two away fixtures in the League and will want to improve on last years away results so we'll be going to Fratton Park in a more than determined mood.





What a turn up last week when Leeds U n i t e d thought they had been knocked out

of the European Cup only to be reprieved by what a German newspaper called "amateurish" organisation on the part of the VfB Stuttgart.

It seems that nobody at Elland Road - and that includes the media - spotted Stuttgart's mistake in including four foreign players. It was the German television station screening the game that was alerted to the error when they were inundated with telephone calls from viewers.

Obviously when rumours of the breach of UEFA regulations reached Leeds the following day they got straight in touch with UEFA.

The Germans are not the only ones mystified by the rules for senior executives at Old Trafford misinterpreted them to their own cost it seems, though their claims that they omitted Ryan Giggs from the first leg of their UEFA Cup tie with Torpedo Moscow because they thought he was

classed as a foreigner do not stand up. Alex Ferguson moaned after the 0-0 draw at Old Trafford that Giggs would have been more use on the night than Kanchelskis. If that was the case why didn't he play Giggs and leave Kanchelskis out?

Manchester United made over £21 million out of their European Cup Winner's Cup run two years ago. The cost of failure is great.

But why all the confusion ... The rules seem clear enough. They state: "The 16 or fewer players chosen by a club to take part in any match under competition rules ... should not include more than three players who are not eligible to play for the national association with which the club is registered."

Now even Vinnie Jones surely can understand that ... UEFA also allow two additional "assimilated players" - those are players who have come through the youth ranks (i.e. Ryan Giggs) in the country in which they are playing, or who have played there continuously for five years.

Stuttgart officials pleaded for "a merciful ruling" and I suppose by that they meant a replay. However the rules are



rules and Rangers vs Leeds United should have been the only outcome.

Alas our own European aspirations have come to nothing. Brentford's 2-0 defeat of Oxford United in the Anglo Italian Cup means that they win the group and travel to Cesena and Ascoli for some winter sunshine.

If justice was done for Leeds it certainly wasn't for us in this competition - two blatant hand-ball incidents not spotted by the referee when we played Brentford and Micky Hazard so close when he crashed his shot against the woodwork...

Still. Who wants the worry of whether your players are eligible or not?

Ross MacLaren has almost become the forgotten man of the County Ground following injuries which have left him lying in bed ticking off the days.

It all started with a hernia operation in the summer which he felt confident would end the problems which had hampered him so in the second half of last season.

Ross is very much a doer and was anxious to take part in the pre-season activities and indeed he played in the first couple of friendly warm-up matches. But all was not well as he explains:

"I could feel the same pain as I had before. At first you tend to dismiss it from your mind, pretend it is not there, but it was. So it was back to see the doctor.

"He gave me another injection but I knew deep down that it wasn't right."

Ross's instincts were correct and just over

three weeks ago the Scot underwent further surgery.

Says Ross: "They have stretched the tendons around the groin. Kevin Morris says that the cut is very deep and therefore will take a long time to heal. The doc was talking about six weeks.

Not easy for a man who is used to being at the peak of fitness and running about. Kevin felt that six-weeks was too long - he could be back in four.

Inevitably he did too much and found himself back in bed for one-and-a-half weeks after contracting an infection. Having recovered from that Ross was at it again to try and start building up the wastage in his muscles.

The day we played Oxford United here he was in good heart. He said: "I have done some stretches and held the ball between my legs."

Such a simple exercise is a big step forward for Ross who, since the operation, has lost all the power in his left leg.

"I was quite happy," he claimed. "I knew this


would happen and that it would take a long while to build up the muscles again. The medical people told me it would be six weeks before I could do anything at all."


Unfortunately Ross's enthusiasm and determination to make a quicker return have floundered. Last Thursday he was supposed to travel to Harley Street for a check with the specialist. Ross was hoping to get the all-clear to go to Lilleshall for specialised remedial work. But he never got there.

He explains: "I went home on Wednesday and didn't feel too well. My leg was badly swollen and so it was off to the doc again. I've got another infection in the cut."

Poor Ross is laid up again, even unable to come to the match, resting and on antibiotics. It is so hard for a man who has hardly missed a game since his arrival from Derby County four years ago. Could it be because this is his 13th season as a professional?

Who knows. But one thing does seem clear. One of Ross's biggest battles will be kerbing his own enthusiasm to get back into training.


