

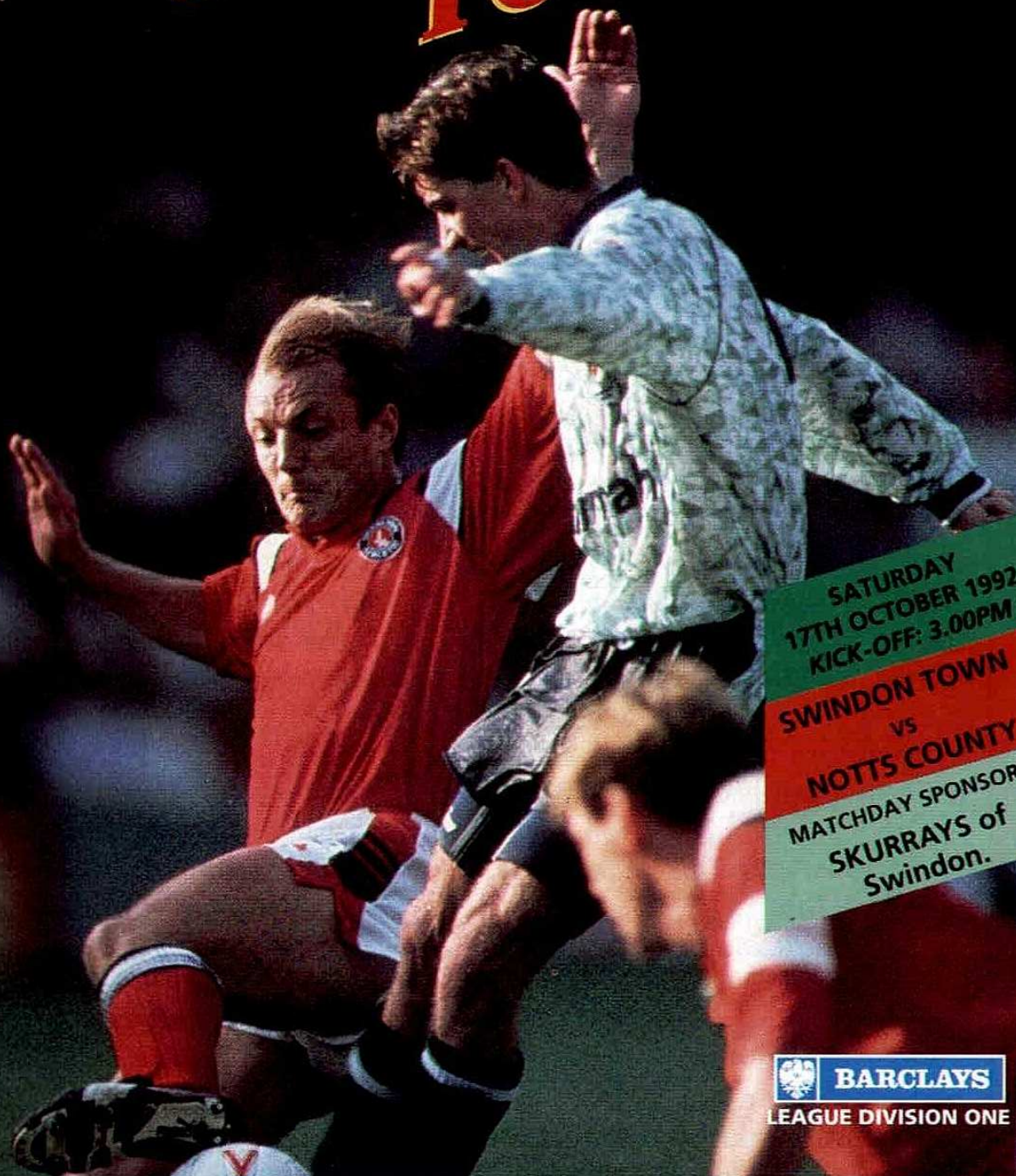

Exercise

HELP US TO HELP YOU

Swindon Town Football Club and the Swindon Police have a responsibility for your safety while you are in The County Ground.

As a requirement of the Taylor Report following the disasters at Bradford and Hillsborough, there are clearly defined instructions for action that must be taken in the event of an emergency, including the possible evacuation of the Stadium.

We are therefore going to test these procedures after today's game.

*Spectators in the **North Stand only** will be asked to co-operate by remaining in their seats after the final whistle. (All Club lounges and the Supporters Social Club will remain closed until after the exercise.)*

Once the exercise has started, the Fire Alarm will sound. This will be followed by a broadcast over the public address system. Shortly afterwards there will be an announcement to evacuate the Stand under the supervision of

the Stewards and Police Officers.

Supporters, will be directed down the front of the North Stand to pitch level and then to the exit gates at either end of the Stand.

The whole exercise will be filmed by television cameras which will be used to assist in training officers for such an emergency should it happen in the future.

Hopefully it will not be necessary but you will know what to expect in the unlikely event of an emergency evacuation.

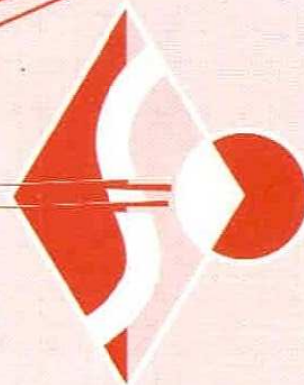

There was a lot of rubbish written in one tabloid newspaper after our game at Portsmouth last week. It inferred that I had suggested that I had got it wrong and was about to change my approach to the game.

Let me put them right. My philosophies on the game and the way it should be played will never change. I did say that we needed a little bit more steel in our play away from home and explained my thinking on this matter. Our local paper understood and reported it well. The other fellow obviously has no idea of football.

Today we face Notts County who will present us with a tough afternoon we know. They are a big physical side who work very hard but our form at home suggests that we shouldn't be afraid of any opposition here at all.

Our problem is away. We just simply have to pick up more points on our travels.

It is very frustrating for me because I know what is required but am unable at the moment to make the move. Since pre-season I have been looking to strengthen our

midfield with a defensive style player. However financial restraint prevents this at the present time.

It is such a shame because we have here the nucleus of a good team and we are not a million miles away from being a promotion side. But there are just one or two pieces to add before the puzzle is completed.

I feel sorry for our fans because they deserve the best. It was they who suffered most when Swindon won promotion to the old Division One and were stripped of their right to play there because things weren't right behind the scenes.

They had done nothing wrong - but they were the ones to suffer. Yet they still stuck by the Club and have helped us get where we are today.

Our fans deserve success. They deserve it more than I do, more than the Board does, more than the players.



When you look at what we have done so far - and we haven't been out of the top seven - it is a credit to the players. We have played some excellent football but, away from home, facts are facts and just four points from fifteen is not good enough.

It is not our football that has let us down but a little bit of resilience. We are asking players to do a job they are not suited for and that is not fair on them.

We have missed Ross MacLaren greatly. Ross is tailor-made for the role I want filled in midfield. But he has had problems with his operations and it looks now as if we will not see him this side of Christmas. There is a lot of football to be played between now and then. It could be too late.

Next Wednesday, three of the lads, Craig Maskell, Colin Calderwood and David Kerslake, will be with me at Bristol for the representative game against the Italian Serie B selection. I could have added a few more but might have been accused of bias.

The squad we have assembled looks very exciting with a good mix of youth and experience and a lot of talent. We only have a day together training but I will pick a side to entertain.

Ashton Gate is a good stadium to play in and, with the contingent from here, we hope to see many of you there to give us a cheer.

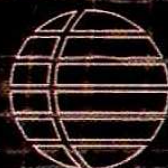
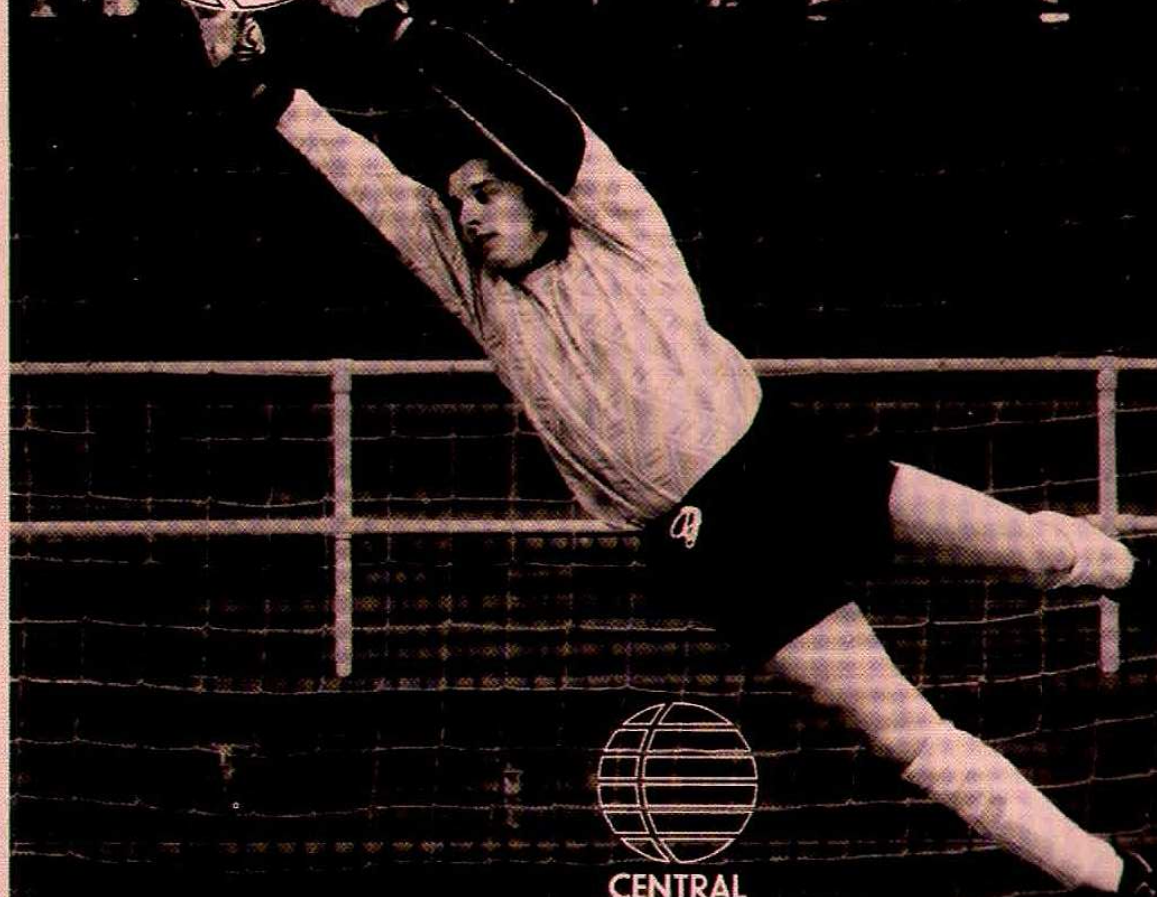
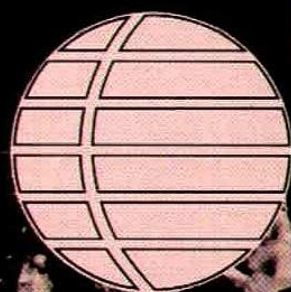

NEWS ON *one*

West Ham United overpowered Cup finalists Sunderland at Upton Park on Sunday by six goals to nil to add to the troubles of Rokerites Boss Malcolm Crosby. Crosby has been under continued pressure as the hopes of the Wearside fans have failed to live up to expectations whilst neighbours Newcastle bask in the national spotlight of ten consecutive wins. Crosby however remains confident that his position is safe at present "When a manager isn't getting results there's bound to be pressure and speculation but that doesn't bother me. I've never worried about who's going to take my place. The Board have never questioned what I have done, they're right behind me and I've never had one complaint from them or been put under pressure." Sunderland tomorrow play host to Newcastle.

The victory by the Hammers was all the more surprising as ace marksman Clive Allen failed to get on the score sheet despite six goals being scored. Allen has however hit five League goals so far this season and the much

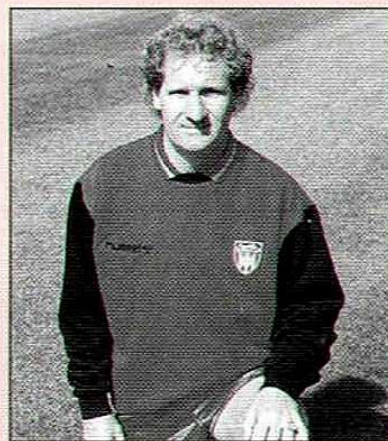
travelled striker is looking forward to the rest of the season "I love the kind of football they play at West Ham. We belong in the Premier League and I am convinced that we can get back there this season. I still feel like I've got a lot to offer as I'm enjoying my football here as much as ever. "Despite the fine result the West Ham officials will be disappointed that only just over ten thousand fans turned up to watch the game.

Portsmouth striker Guy Whittingham hit his tenth League goal of the season last Saturday in Pompey's 3-1 win over Swindon at Fratton Park. The striker, rated at £1.5 million is keen to talk down any transfer speculation "I'd be less than truthful if I said I didn't fancy a go in the Premier League but at the moment I'm quite happy at Pompey. I've heard the talk about Forest but I know nothing about it. It won't bother me until the manager calls me and says there is something in it."

Birmingham City suffered yet another home defeat this time at the hands of Brian Little's Leicester City by 2-0. City have had an inconsistent start following their promotion last season but

forward Simon Sturridge believes he knows the reason why "We've had four or five players out injured and the Gaffer has never picked a settled side. It is an achievement in itself to be near the top."

City's opponents today are Tranmere Rovers who find themselves in a play-off place following a fine run of results temporarily blotted by last Saturday's 1-0 defeat at Newcastle. Rovers success may be linked to the arrival at Prenton Park of Scottish International winger Pat Nevin who is keen to win back favour with Scottish boss Andy Roxburgh "I've always believed that if you play well enough you'll be noticed. Where ever you are. Some of the Scottish press look down in a snobbish way at Rovers but this club have some very good players.

Notts County

Notts County might have got off to a very indifferent start to this season following relegation from the top flight last May but the indications are that Manager Neil Warnock is beginning to pull things round.

Last week's brilliant 1-0 victory at Molineux, which saw County into a third round tie with Cambridge United in the Coca-Cola Cup, is clearly indicative of the new found confidence surging through the Magpies' veins as Warnock rebuilds for the future.

Ironically, it was a 6-0 thrashing at Millwall that proved the turning point for the oldest League club in the country. County, low on funds, and on First Division points, were in a trough of depression. Top defender **Craig Short** had packed his bags for the Baseball Ground in a deal worth £2 million; and nearing the end of September the team was still awaiting its first home win of the season.

The man brought in to replace the influential Short in the centre of defence was **David Robinson** - a £425,000 acquisition from Peterborough United - who stepped out for his County debut on that infamous afternoon at the Den.

The six-goal drubbing handed out by the Lions was enough to make the Club's staunchest supporter fear the worst. It certainly caused **Neil Warnock** to take stock of the situation, retiring to his home "to contemplate his future."

Come Monday morning the forthright manager had declared his

intent to stick to the task of steering County out of the doldrums. Thirty-six hours later the Magpies reeled off their first home victory of the season with a rousing 3-2 win over Wolves in the Coca-Cola Cup.

It seemed that the self-belief that had been missing all season had suddenly flooded back. After that mauling by the Lions it would have been so easy to submit to the Wolves after Steve Bull had flashed in a seventh minute opener. But County kept their composure to hit back with two goals from **Gary Lund** and one from new boy **David Robinson**.

Lund, the former England Under-21 International, who after a great first season at Meadow Lane, found himself out in the cold was so much out of the picture that he was loaned out to Hull City last month. But he returned to the fold with the opening goal in a fine 3-1 win at Watford and now is beginning to look the part again as the spearhead of the County attack.

Of Lund Mr Warnock says: "We've been looking for ages and every time we asked about strikers, we were quoted silly money. It made me realise that you have to go a long way to get better than Gary Lund."

Also in attack Northern Ireland striker **Kevin Wilson** has been prominent if not prolific, and 19-year-old **Steve Slawson** - who made a scoring debut in the League last season at Southampton - has also played a part with goals against Watford. Another youngster making a strong claim for selection is 20-year-old Paul Devlin, who



made his League debut against Coventry City last season and has been included in recent games. Signed from Stafford Rangers he hails from Birmingham.

In midfield **Mark Draper**, **Phil Turner**, **David Smith** and **Dean Thomas** have been the mainstay with **Paul Harding**, who earned himself a "hard-man" reputation following his £60,000 move from Barnet, and **Andy Williams** - the former Coventry, Rotherham and Leeds player also involved.

At the back **O'Riordan**, **Robinson** and new boy **Mark Smith** present a solid barrier. **Charlie Palmer**, who began his career in the First Division with Watford, was a firm favourite of the County fans until injury intervened. Other contenders are **Meindert Dijkstra**, the 25-year-old from Eindhoven signed in the summer from Willem 11, for a fee that could reach £150,000, to fill the leftback vacancy caused by the injury to Alan Paris. And **Shaun Murphy**, a 21-year-old Australian who is the son of an Irish father and Anglo-Indian mother. He played for Perth Italia and made his League debut against Barnsley last month.

In goal **Steve Cherry** is the number one choice though he did lose his place for three games to Aussie **Bob Catlin**, who made a spectacular League bow in the 3-1 win at Peterborough in August but was then sadly at fault in the 3-1 home defeat by Barnsley.

Steve Cherry - *Goalkeeper.* Makes his 200th appearance for County this afternoon. Previously with Derby County, Port Vale (loan), Walsall, Plymouth and Chesterfield (loan) he cost £70,000. An ever-present for the past three seasons he lost that record when he missed three games in the early weeks of this season. Steve made his League debut for Derby in a 2-2 draw with Southampton (16-2-80). Born: Nottingham 5-8-60.

Mark Draper - *Midfield.* Was only 17 when he made his debut at Mansfield in a Littlewoods Cup tie in September 1988. Developed into one of the most exciting young midfielders in the game - contributing 10 goals in the promotion success in 1990 and gaining England Under-21 honours. Has not yet really projected himself past this stage and this is a

very important season for Mark. Born: Derby 11-11-70.

Michael Johnson - *Central Defender.* Still only 19 he weighed in with some impressive performances towards the end of last season when the going was getting tough. Was introduced to senior football in November 1991 in a ZDS Cup tie with Sheffield United. Three days later he made his League debut at Arsenal. Reserves Player of the Year he is highly competitive. Born: Nottingham 7-7-73.

Gary Lund - *Striker.* Came to prominence at Grimsby Town where his partnership with Paul Wilkinson (now Middlesbrough) earned them many goals and England Under-21 recognition. Had made his League bow at Barnsley (27-9-83) and played one season, 1986-87, with Lincoln before a £40,000 move to Meadow Lane in

1987. Netted 21 goals in his first season and registered his 50th goal for County in the 3-3 Coca-Cola Cup tie with Wolves in September 1992. Born: Grimsby 13-9-64.

Don O'Riordan - *Central Defender.* Had seemed to be put out to pasture when he was appointed reserve team coach but had a new lease of life with a key role in County's Second Division promotion side. It was a major blow when he was injured at Old Trafford on the opening day of last season; a torn Achilles tendon ruling him out for the remainder of the season. Was back for the start of this season however - making his 125th appearance for County at Watford (12-9-92). Previously with Derby County, Doncaster (loan), Preston North End, Carlisle, Middlesbrough and Grimsby. Born: Dublin 14-5-57.

NOTTS COUNTY

David Robinson - *Central Defender*. Came into football with Hartlepool - making his League debut in a 1-1 draw at Northampton (10-4-84). Three years later signed by Halifax and then moved on to Peterborough United where he was a key figure until tempted by a cheque for £425,000 in September. Made his County bow at Millwall (19-9-92) on the wrong end of a 6-0 thrashing. Born: Cleveland 14-1-65.

Chris Short - *Fullback*. A £100,000 signing from Scarborough he made his County debut v Brighton on New Year's Day 1991. Had a trial period with Manchester United and seemed bound for Old Trafford when Neil Warnock stepped in to clinch his signature. Made his 60th appearance for County 29-8-92, at Peterborough. Born: Munster, Germany 5-5-70.

David Smith - *Forward*. A £110,000 signing from Plymouth in the summer David was 25 when he made his League entrance with Gillingham v Middlesbrough (13-9-86), after a successful period with Welling United. Clocked up over 100 games before moving to Bristol City who sold him to Plymouth for £195,000 last year. A natural flank player who can cross the ball on the run. Born: Sidcup 25-6-61.

Mark Smith - *Central Defender*. Made his County bow in the 3-3 draw at Bristol Rovers (4-10-92) following his transfer from Barnsley. An experienced defender who was destined for the top when a horrific broken-leg incident almost ended his career with Sheffield Wednesday. At the time he was an England Under-21 international (5 caps). Moved on to Plymouth in 1987 after 282 League appearances for the Owls and in December '89 moved back to Yorkshire in a £150,000 deal that took him to Barnsley. Born: Sheffield 21-3-60.

Dean Thomas - *Midfield*. The son of a former Coventry City pro, Dean has played in all four divisions of the League. Started as a leftback with Nuneaton Borough, and made his Football League debut in that position for Wimbledon (29-9-81), in a 2-2 draw at Bristol Rovers in Division Three. Scored 8 goals in 57

League games for the Don's before a spell with Dusseldorf. Returned to play for Northampton and moved to Meadow Lane in March 1990 for £175,000. Born: Bedworth 19-12-61.

Phil Turner - *Midfield*. Surgery to repair a double hernia kept Phil out of the side until September. The club captain, he started his career with Lincoln City, making his debut v Wigan in February 1980. Six years later he moved to Grimsby Town and in 1989 joined Leicester City. Was valued at £125,000 in the exchange deal that took Mills to Filbert Street. Played a major role in County's rise from the Third to First Division. Versatile performer can operate in defence and attack as well. Born: Sheffield 12-2-62.

Kevin Wilson - *Striker*. Current Northern Ireland international he arrived at Meadow Lane in March 1992 in a £225,000 transfer from Chelsea. Made a scoring debut for County v Crystal Palace. Began his career with Banbury United and joined Derby County in 1979, making his debut at Liverpool (8-4-80). In 1985 Kevin moved to Ipswich where he scored 34 goals in 98 appearances. In June 1987 Chelsea invested £335,000 for his services. Netted 42 goals in 152 League outings with the Blues and he commenced this season with 107 goals in 280 League appearances. Born: Banbury 18-4-61.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



Neil Warnock was appointed at Notts County in January 1989 and since then he has steered the Meadow Lane Club from Division Three to Division One where they spent last season before being relegated.

Entered management, in non-league circles, first with Gainsborough Trinity then with Burton Albion where he served five years before taking charge of Scarborough. Led the Seamer Road Club to the Vauxhall Conference Championship and into the Football League in 1988. Three weeks later he was installed as John Barnwell's successor at County.

Born in Sheffield he is a typical Tyke, outspoken at times, yet very approachable. An excellent coach and strict disciplinarian he commands total respect.

As a player he came into the game with Chesterfield in the late sixties and clocked up 36 goals in 296 (32) appearances in a League career that embraced Rotherham United, Hartlepool, Scunthorpe United, Aldershot, Barnsley - where he enjoyed his best return with 10 goals in 53 (4) appearances - York City and Crewe Alexandra. He scored just one goal for the Railwaymen, in a 1-0 win over Halifax Town (10-2-79), it was his last in League football. In July 1979 his contract was cancelled.

It seems that Neil Warnock is destined for much more successful promotions in management. His achievement in taking County to successive promotions made him a 'managerial hot property' and in the summer of 1991 he was offered the job at Chelsea but turned it down. Then last summer it was an open secret that Sunderland craved his services but he insists that he is at County to do a job and is determined to get on with it.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Either side of the last War, Swindon met Notts County regularly, both then being members of the Third Division South. Honours prior to the hostilities were shared, the Town dropping only one home point in eight, but gaining only one away.

During December 1946, the two clubs faced each other three times in twelve days. The first occasion was a Second Round FA Cup tie at Meadow Lane - the Town's first there in that competition since their Semi-Final appearance against Barnsley thirty-four years earlier.

It was not a happy return. Swindon went a goal down in little over a minute, when a Cumner cross was headed down by Fallon for Jackie Sewell to bang the ball home from a yard out. It was 2-0 twelve minutes into the second half when Dubliner Fallon was again involved, teeing up a header for Ulsterman Harry Lunn.

Lunn had been signed from his home-town club Lurgan that summer. Just a year later, the winger was sold to Portsmouth, County receiving £7,000 and inside forward Fred Evans in the deal. Lunn came to the County Ground in May 1948 and made over 200 League and Cup appearances before dropping out of League football in 1954.

Meanwhile, back at Meadow Lane, George Paterson made an immediate reply for Swindon,

racing through on his own before beating keeper Harry Brown on his near post. The score stayed at 2-1, but it did County little good as they crashed 6-0 at Luton in the next round, and for the Town, revenge was to be sweet and swift.

They gained three out of four Yuletide points with a goalless draw in Nottingham on Christmas Day and a 4-2 victory in the return on Boxing Day, when Bill Stephens grabbed a brace. Then, in the following season, the FA Cup draw again saw Swindon and Notts come out of the hat together, but this time at the County Ground.

The Town had progressed a little further this time, having just disposed of First Division championship contenders Burnley at Turf Moor in the Third Round. County had won away at Second Division champions - elect Birmingham City. In the Third Division both clubs had attracted record gates in recent weeks, Swindon with over 26,000 for the visit of Bristol City and County with 45,000 for their encounter with Swansea Town. So that was a clash that everyone wanted to see - Maurice Owen and Morris Jones against Sewell and Tommy Lawton.

But it was Billy Lucas who stole the show with the only goal fifteen minutes from time, sending the majority of the 27,130 crowd home happy. Lucas played only five more games for the Town

before joining Swansea for a club record £11,500 in March 1948.

Swindon recorded their first-ever League win at Meadow Lane six months later when Jones, from a penalty, and Johnny Baynham - on his debut - scored in a 2-1 victory. The Town completed the 'double' with a 3-0 scoreline at the County Ground in April 1949, the goals coming from Owen, Jones and 'Garth' Hudson.

Lawton made the Town pay for that Cup defeat with a hat-trick in front of over 37,000 at Meadow Lane in November 1949. The points were shared at Swindon in the following April, as County went on to win the Third Division South Championship by seven points - and so it was another ten years before they met once again.

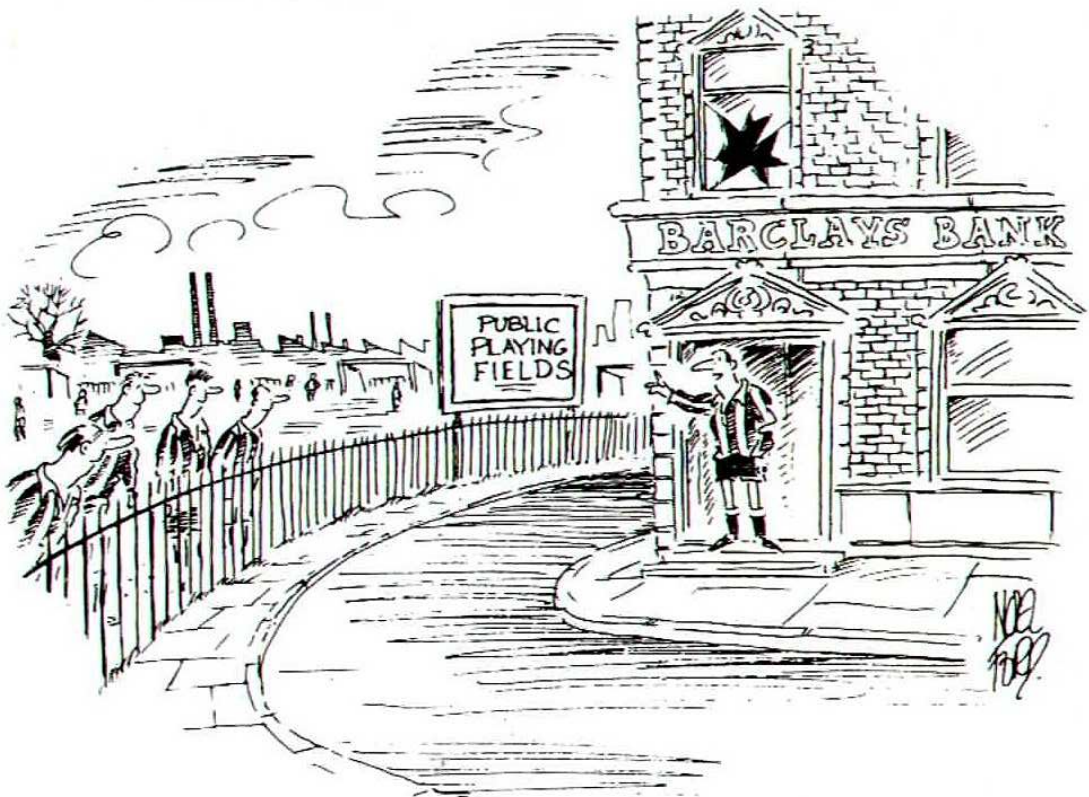

STEVE WHITE

PLAYER PROFILE

When Steve White netted our second goal against Torquay United, here last Tuesday week, he not only killed off any hope the Third Division side had of a night of glory but reached a significant milestone in his career. It was Steve's 200th goal in senior football.

"It's taken me fifteen years to achieve it but it is very nice," smiles Steve who adds, "I thought I was going to make it last season. I had scored 15 goals by Christmas and was well on target. Then I injured my back and was out for six months."

It is hard to believe that Steve was picked up from Bristol Rovers on a free-transfer just six-years ago. For since making his debut at Southampton for Rovers, on his first spell with the club, back in March 1978, the lad from Chipping Sodbury has proved himself a prolific marksman.

Last Saturday he netted again, in our 3-1 defeat at Portsmouth, to take his tally to 201 goals. The return to Fratton Park rekindled happy memories for it was there, on April Fools Day, 1977, that Steve recorded his first ever goal in the Football League.

It wasn't however the Pompey defence he made fools of that day but Millwall's. Says Steve: "I remember it well. The Den had been closed because of crowd misbehaviour and Millwall played this home game at Portsmouth. I was up front with Paul Randall and Bobby Gould in a 4-3-3 formation.

"We all scored and my goal came from a knock-down in the box. The ball was played back and wide and bounced up in front of me. I was just to the left side of the penalty box and hit it first-time across the 'keeper with my LEFT foot!"

Bristol Rovers triumphed 3-1 and

Rover's boss Bobby Cambell sure realised he was on a winner with Steve who went on to net 20 goals in 50 League appearances before moving to Luton Town in 1980.

His career was to take him to Charlton Athletic, Lincoln City on loan, and back to Eastville before his arrival at the County Ground in the summer of 1986. Steve had scored 12 goals for Rovers in the Third Division in that campaign of 1985-86. He rattled in 15 for Town the following year to help the promotion push into Division Two.

Incidentally his first goal for us was recorded on August 31st 1986, in a 1-2 defeat here by Notts County. "It was a scrappy little knock-down in the box," recalls Steve vividly and though it doesn't rank amongst his best he would settle for a repeat this afternoon providing the result goes our way this time.

Looking back over his 201 strikes Steve says the goal he treasures most "as the one I scored to get us up to the Second Division. It was a play-off final against Gillingham at Selhurst Park. I'd scored from a tap-in but we were under a lot of pressure when we broke away again. Dave Bamber played the ball into the box, someone headed it and I ran on to chest it down. It went on through two or three defenders who forced me wide then cut back in again and shot. It seemed an age before the ball went over the line but it did and that made it 2-0."

For his most spectacular goal Steve goes back to his days in a Rovers shirt when he stunned Newcastle United with a rasping left-foot shot from the corner of the box that lodged itself in the stanchion. Rovers were one down at the time. This was the point saver.

Those were the goals, but what about the partnerships? It will come as

no surprise that Steve picks Duncan Shearer as the best he has played with.

"Duncan," says Steve, "Is a great finisher and a nice man too. When he first came here he found it very difficult to cope with Lou Macari's methods of fitness training. He was left out of the side for a while but then Lou did that with all his new signings. It was a sort of character test to see how they reacted.

"But Duncan was the best striker of a ball I have ever seen. He was greedy but then so are all great scorers. He had a natural instinct for goal rebounds, balls parried by 'keepers - he'd be there. We didn't exactly compliment each other with our styles but we seemed to work well together. In four-and-a-half years we got 200 goals between us."

Steve is 33 now but by no means finished. He recalls David Pleat telling him: "Whatever you do don't finish playing too early." Good advice and Steve says: "As long as you are fit there is no problem. You go through a stage when you are younger when your legs go so fast your brain can't keep up with them. I'm now in a period when my legs and brain are in unison."

"It is not difficult at the moment and in David Mitchell, who is very fast and full of goals, and Craig Maskell, who is a good finisher on a one to one basis as you will find, we have the makings of as lively a front line as you will probably see."

It all seems a long long time since Steve was sharp-shooting for Mangotsfield United. He is now a member of the League's 200 Club and looking good as he sets off in search of 300!

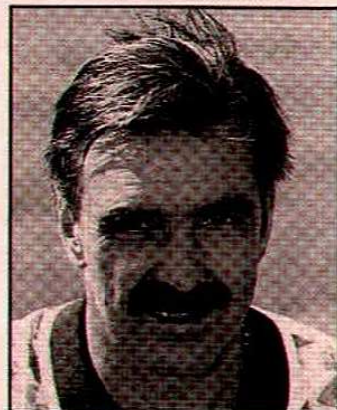

On the injury front we have been without John Moncur who has really done well this season and obviously the strength and experience of

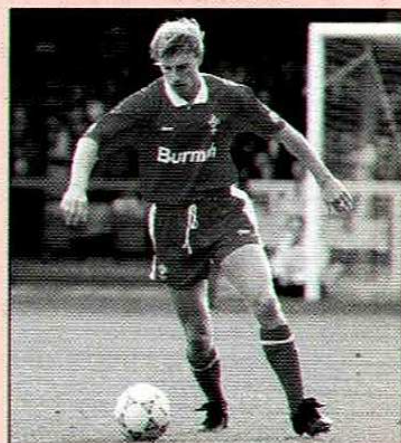


Ross MacLaren has been missed.

Club's all-time record scorer Roger Palmer.

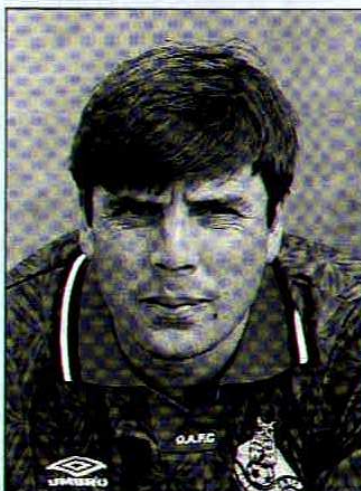

We were absolutely hopeless in the first half at Portsmouth last week. There are no two ways about it. Then we picked ourselves up and had a go and at one stage looked on for at least a draw.

We tried a different system at the back to try and cut down the number of goals we concede. The Gaffer played deep as a defensive sweeper behind a straight back-four with the fullbacks withdrawn to a defensive role instead of an attacking one as they usually adopt. But it didn't work. We lost the battle in midfield and despite having five at the back still let in two goals.

In the second half we played with just four at the back and the Gaffer pushed into midfield. We looked much better and had more of the ball. It was a little unfortunate that Steve White's goal came so late - with just ten minutes to go.

It will be nice to see Mick Jones - their assistant manager - again. It was he who signed me as an apprentice at Mansfield. I didn't get a chance to work with him alas. When we came back after the summer break he had been sacked ... Such are the fortunes of football!

So much of this charade was played out behind UEFA's locked doors and Welsh team manager Terry Yorath is not the only one to point the finger at German TV money.

Yorath asked if it would have been the same ruling if a team from Cyprus or Malta had transgressed the rules. Of course not. UEFA had bowed to the big money and by so doing have lost all credibility as administrators or moral rightness.

A sign of the times perhaps. Mr Mellor seemed indignant that he should be drummed out of the cabinet for his shannanigans. Then there was that incredible affair in cricket when Allan Lamb exposed scandal of how the Pakistanis tampered with the ball and was fined four times as much as a County accused and found guilty of such cheating.

Such feudal justice can only be

dispensed with ulterior motives - usually money. Politics has become a dirty word whether it refers to Westminster, the Long Room at Lords or UEFA's retreats in Berne. For it seems that rules and regulations will only apply when appropriate to those in administration. A dangerous and frightening precedent.

Football justice might have been achieved when Leeds beat the Germans yet Stuttgart, the team they say has more foreign reserves than the Bank of England, collected £500,000 as their share of the TV money from that third play-off game in Barcelona ... It surely pays to break the rules!

Towns fans are the best in the land says skipper Colin Calderwood who tells me he and the lads were so impressed by the way you got behind them as they came out for the second-half against Watford.

Says Colin: "We were 1-0 down and had just been geeing ourselves up in the dressing room. As we walked out we received a tremendous reception and encouragement. You would have thought we were six up."

"We just want to thank everyone. You can't imagine how one feels when the support is like that. These are the die-hards we want to do well for."

It was certainly a demonstration of true support. It is easy to support a winning team but it is when the lads are behind that they most need your backing and encouragement. Well done it did the trick with a rousing second-half show.

INSIGHT

Happy Birthday to Marcus Phillips who is 19 years old this very day. It is the culmination of what has been the most dramatic and exciting two weeks of his life.

Marcus is a very talented mid-field player who has worked his way through the ranks at the County Ground from schoolboy to teenage prodigy. A fortnight ago he received the boost of his young life when Glenn included him in the squad for our First Division game with Watford.

Now Marcus didn't come on, though he was very close to making his League debut, but he did experience one of the most amazing introductions to League football that have ever befallen a young pro to the threshold of his career.

As he made his way at the final whistle towards the dressing room the youngster was intercepted and in his own words, "hurtled off by Jon Pollard."

Marcus was one of four names drawn out of the hat for a random drug test and was consequently not allowed back into the dressing room. He says: "Jon grabbed me and escorted me to the manager's office with the other lads."

He wasn't there for long however. "I was the only one out

of four who could deliver the sample," says Marcus. "It was probably because I was still a bit nervous as I thought I was going to get on near the end of the game.

"John Gorman told me he would put me on if we scored another goal. That was straight after we had taken a 3-1 lead. The way things were going it looked very likely that we would score again. But it was not to be.

"The people who took the samples were from the Sports Council but such a thing had never even crossed my mind."

Three days later Marcus was to get his big break in the Coca-Cola Cup tie here with Torquay United.

"It was absolutely super," he recalls. "I came on for the last 40 minutes and thoroughly enjoyed it. We were winning 3-0 at the time and 9-0 on aggregate so I suppose they felt it was safe enough to throw me in.

"It had been really terrific sitting in the dug-out watching Micky Hazard who was absolutely superb on the night; he controlled everything. The only problem was that when I came on to take his place things started to go wrong.

"I just couldn't do the things he had been doing. He is a really great player. But I still enjoyed myself. I'd only played two reserve games this season and missed a lot of the pre-

season work too after tearing fibres in my thigh last season.

Marcus received the injury in practice when striking through the ball but he played on with the injury because he was anxious to win a professional contract. He achieved that, a two year agreement, but paid a price with his injury.

That is all behind him now after three weeks at Lilleshall and the lad from Semington, near Melksham, can look positively towards the future.

Says Marcus: "I know it sounds corny but all I ever wanted to do since I could walk is play football."

It seems to be in the blood of the Phillips family. His dad, who claims that Marcus would never have lived with him on the field, played in the Melksham Town midfield and brother James has just signed apprentice forms with Town.

It used to be Marcus' birthday treat to travel to Loftus Road to watch his schoolboy idols QPR in action. He says: "I think I was four when I took a liking to them. I thought they were the Queen's team. I remember Glenn scoring the winning penalty against us in the FA Cup Final replay at Wembley. They had some great players like Rodney Marsh and I was thrilled when Gary Waddock came here last year."

There will be no trip to Loftus Road for the Phillips family today however. Whether he is involved or not Marcus' greatest present would be to see Swindon take three points from Notts County.
