While the scheme was intended to be experimental for selected games oil giants CASTROL have agreed to sponsor the scheme for the remainder of the season.





We are all very excited about tonight's Cup tie with Oldham Athletic. They are a good footballing side and we were delighted with the draw. We can anticipate a fast lively open game of football.

We are beginning to establish a good home record this season and we have no reason to fear any opposition here. In fact, I think we have been playing better generally even if our away record does not suggest this.

Football is a strange game in many respects. It is not always the best team on the day that wins the match. It is something that we all have to come to terms with.

But we have played some great football at home and in our last appearance we really did turn it on against Notts County. The timing of the goals was so important.

It was an exceptional performance and proved that a man to man marking system can be destroyed if you have players of real ability.

We have that one hiccup against Brentford here in the Anglo Italian Cup but I would like to go unbeaten

Oldham's success is a catalyst for other Clubs like us. They have proved that with good management you can reach the top and compete well at that level.



When you talk about success in football just look at Joe Royle. It is sometimes hard to convince directors and fans that success is not all about putting silverware on the sideboard.

I listen to that 606 programme on the radio and have noted a lot of Oldham supporters ringing in to express their appreciation of the football served up by their team. It is an appreciation shared by our supporters in respect of our game.

Having said all that Cup games are all about winning. You only get one bite of the cherry. Lets hope it goes our way. Financially we need a cup run. If we can get through tonight it could be the start of something big.

Just a mention about the Football representative League against the Italians last week. It was a hell of a good game and proved of great satisfaction to us.

Not only did Craig Maskell, Colin Calderwood and David Kerslake perform with credit, indeed there was not one bad performance from any of our side, but we played the Swindon style.

We only had a day to work with the players but they picked it up well and what is more enjoyed the experience.

Finally just a line to say that I am sorry that Peter Day has left the club. He was very influential in bringing me here and we worked well together. I wish him well in his future



Rofe was hopeful of signing at least one player in time for last Saturday's trip to meet Birmingham City at St Andrew's.

Birmingham themselves have secured the services of Southampton striker David Speedie on loan. The controversial former Scottish International had been threatened with becoming a football outcast after being transfer-listed by the Saints and was turned down by Sunderland when he refused to uproot his family from the Midlands. Blues boss Terry Cooper said, "It should be a good move all round. We need someone like him to lift us and I think that he needs a lift himself. "Speedie added, "I had no hesitation in signing. I have not played for three weeks and I'm desperate to get going again."

Record breaking Newcastle United are facing a phenomenal demand for terrace season tickets after selling all 10,700 of their seating capacity. The Club say that they are selling over 400 tickets per day and have been forced to make all of their remaining home fixtures all ticket.

John Beck who last week was linked with the vacant manager's job at Preston North End, despite assurances from Deepdale that he had neither applied for nor was offered the job was axed himself by Cambridge United Thursday. Both Beck and assistant Gary Peters were dismissed after a Board meeting at The Abbey Stadium unanimously agreed that it was in the best interests of the Club following the uncertainty of Beck's future with Cambridge following the Preston story. Youth Team Coach Gary Johnson takes charge at The Abbey Stadium until a replacement is announced.

Swindon Town manager Glenn Hoddle managed a star studded Barclays League team last Wednesday evening at Bristol City Football Club, taking on a representative side from the Italian Serie B. Hoddle's team ran out 3-1 winners on the night gaining revenge for the Italians 2-1 victory in the first game in Caserta last March. Swindon hot-shot Craig Maskell continued his impressive form with two early goals in the first half and West Ham United's Martin Allen showed some brilliant skill in the 64th minute to give the Barclays League team a 3-0 lead reduced only by a consolation goal just over ten minutes later. Said Glenn. "Many of the things we admire about the Italians we actually showed them. Some of the football played was tremendous, especially considering that we had only been together for three days."

Dennis Rofe admitted that he will be under pressure to sell players at Bristol Rovers if his transfer targets are realised. The Rovers' manager is edging closer to sign up to three new faces and will have to

## Olalbant Atbletic

Oldham Athletic are enjoying their second season back in the top flight after an absence of 68 years during which they plummeted to Division Four on a couple of occasions.

It was not the most comfortable of seasons last year, although they eventually finished 17th - nine points clear of the relegation zone. But it was a start.

Joe Royle, a passionate advocate of attacking football, had produced a highly exciting side but they conceded 67 goals in the old First Division - a figure only surpassed by relegated Luton who leaked 71.

Not surprising then that Joe Royle's hectic pre-season transfer negotiations should be aimed at stiffening the back line. Manchester City defenders Steve Redmond and Neil Pointon were drafted in with forward Rick Holden going to Maine Road as part of the deal.

Redmond was in the starting line on the opening day of the campaign at Chelsea in a back line that included 26 year old **Andy Barlow** - the only Oldham born player in the squad - who has been capped by England at 'B' level, lan **Marshall** and **Richard Jobson**.

Pointon's chance came when Barlow was injured in mid-August - his debut being made in a pulsating 5-3 win over Nottingham Forest that emphasised that life at boundary Park is never dull.

Oldham stormed into a five-goal lead, with Gunnar Halle revelling

in his first spell for the Club in midfield alongside the industrious Nick Henry - the Norwegian netting his first goal for Oldham whom he joined three years earlier.

Paul Bernard made it 5-0 and still not an hour played. But then Oldham conceded three goals two of them in the last four minutes!

At Highbury Oldham were beaten by two first half goals from Winterburn and Wright yet, in the second half, had exposed Arsenal's defensive frailties enough to have earned at least a point.

An injury which forced Nick Henry to limp off on the hour, allowed former Aston Villa striker **Ian Olney** to make his debut following his £700,000 signing in the summer. He's been a regular alongside **Graeme Sharp** ever since.

No matter what the score, Oldham have maintained their desire to attack and at Maine Road they demonstrated great character to overcome a 2-0 deficit suffered inside eight minutes. Twice they overhauled City's two goal advantage to earn a point from a 3-3 draw.

The season has been like this with victories such as those over lpswich Town and Everton tempered by defeats at Blackburn and Hillsborough. Indeed, the Latics are still awaiting their first away win in the Premier League.

Even in the Coca-Cola Cup, Oldham were far from impressive at St James' Park where Exeter City, of the Second Division, held them for 85 minutes before Nick Henry popped up with the only goal of a close encounter.

It proved to be the winner for, in a



surprising second-leg at Boundary Park, neither side could muster a goal - Oldham winning through 1-0 on aggregate.

The team seems fairly settled, however, with **John Keeley**, a £240,000 buy from Brighton in August 1990, unable to oust Hallworth from the number one jersey he has worn but once - in the final game of last season.

Assistant manager, Willie Donachie, has been included on the bench this term and other contenders for midfield roles include Roger Palmer and Neil McDonald.

McDonald, recruited from Everton last season for £500,000, is equally comfortable at rightback or midfield. A former England Schoolboy, Youth and Under-21 cap, Neil started his career with Newcastle United.

Roger Palmer goes down in the history books as one of Oldham's all-time greats. He's long since smashed the Latics scoring record with 156 goals so far in all competitions. Previously with Manchester City with whom he scored 9 League goals, his opening strike in a 2-2 draw with Everton last December was his 150th in the Football League.

Then there's **Andy Ritchie**, who has scored 142 goals in 408 League appearances for Manchester United, Brighton, Leeds and Oldham. He was a bargain catch at £50,000 but has yet to play this season following protracted injury problems that limited him to just 16 appearances last season - although he still contributed seven goals.

NEIL ADAMS - Winger. Cost £100,000 to sign from Everton in August 1989. Played one full season for Stoke City - he made his League debut with them at Charlton (21-9-85) - before joining Everton in 1986 for £150,000. Gained England Under-21 honours while at Goodison Park. Scored 4 goals in 26 League appearances last season. Born: 23-11-65.

PAUL BERNARD - Midfield. Still only 19 and a really exciting Made his bow prospect. against Middlesbrough at the end of the 1990-1991 season and scored the vital equalising goal against Sheffield Wednesday in the game that clinched the championship. Drafted into Scotland's Under-21 side last season, he netted 5 goals in 20 League outings and this season establishing himself in the side. Born: Edinburgh 30-12-72.

CRAIG FLEMING - Defender. Was a regular in the fullback berth at the end of last season having made the transition from 4th Division football quite smoothly following a £150,000 transfer from Halifax Town. This season, however, he has occupied the substitutes bench. Formerly a midfielder, he made his League debut four seasons ago. Born: Halifax 6-10-71.

GUNNAR HALLE - Rightback. Signed from Norwegian club, Lillestroem, for £280,000, Gunnar had not scored in three years with Oldham until he hit the target against Nottingham Forest in August and a week later at Maine Road. Collected his 33rd cap for Norway in the 1-1 draw with England at Wembley a fortnight ago - having netted a hat-trick against San Marino the month before. Has played in midfield this season. Born: Oslo 11-8-65.

JON HALLWORTH - Goalkeeper. Was a junior with Ipswich Town but, before getting a

chance in their first team, he played League soccer on loan with Bristol Rovers, making two appearances - the first at Reading 26-1-85. Had spent a spell here at Swindon and at Fulham earlier that season but was not called upon to play first team football by either club. Moved to Boundary Park in February 1989 for £125,000 and was an everpresent in the Second Division Championship campaign. Born: Stockport 26-10-65.

NICK HENRY - Midfield. Joined the Club as a trainee and was introduced to Second Division football at Hull City (19-9-87). Had a spell on loan with Swedish side Halmstad in season 1987-88 but soon forced his way into the Latics side - his tigerish tackling and non-stop industry, making him a key figure in the successes of the past two seasons. Born: Liverpool 21-2-69.

## OLDHAM ATHLETIC

RICHARD JOBSON - Centre Back. Started his career as a midfield player with Burton Albion and made his League debut in that role for Watford v Ipswich in December 1982. Moved to Hull City in '85 and it was at Boothferry Park that he was switched to a defensive role. So outstanding was he that Joe Royle invested £460,000 for his services in 1990 and last season his form earned him two England 'B' caps. Born: Hull 9-5-63.

IAN MARSHALL - Central Defender/Striker. Big powerful and highly effective in defence or attack, he served his apprenticeship with Everton - making his debut v West Bromwich Albion (20-8-85) in defence. Made only 15 League appearances in five years at Goodison Park and joined the Latics, for £100,000, in March 1988. An injury crisis opened the door for lan to exploit his attacking instincts in 1990-1991 when he was pushed into attack and scored six goals in his opening five League games. Ended the season as top scorer with 18 and last season added another 10 goals. Born: Oxford 20-3-66.

MIKE MILLIGAN - Midfield. Returned to Oldham in 1991 for £600,000 after an unhappy year with Everton, whom he joined for £850,000. Mike had turned professional with the Latics in 1985 and, after being introduced to the senior side at Sheffield United in April 1986, he quickly settled. Captained Oldham in the 1990 League Cup Final and after gaining 'B' caps made his full international debut for Eire v USA last April. Born: Manchester 20-2-67.

IAN OLNEY - Striker. An England Under-21 forward (10 caps) signed, for £700,000, from Aston Villa in the summer. Ian scored 20 goals in his 70 games for Villa after making the breakthrough in October '88 against Birmingham City. Made his Oldham debut as a sub at Highbury (26-8-92). Born: Luton 17-12-69.


NEIL POINTON - Leftback. Started his career with Scunthorpe United against Torquay in February 1982 and made 159 League appearances before joining Everton for £50,000 in 1985. Five years later Manchester City forked out £600,000 for his registration and this summer it cost Oldham the same figure to take him to Boundary Park. Born: Church Warsop 28-11-61.

STEVE REDMOND - Defender. Also made the journey from Maine Road in August for another £600,000. Steve emerged as one of the many outstanding players to come out of the Manchester City Youth Team of the mid 80s. Made nearly 250 appearances for City - the first v QPR (8-2-86). Capped by England at Youth and Under-21 (14) levels. Born: Liverpool 2-11-67.

GRAEME SHARP - Striker. Top scorer with 15 goals last season following his £500,000 move from Everton. Equalled his personal best when scoring four times against Luton last April. Started his career with Dumbarton, leading their hit list with 16 strikes in 1979-80. Then a £125,000 move began a ten-year association with Everton - on four occasions he was leading scorer. Capped 12 times by Scotland. Born: Glasgow 16-10-60.

## THE MAN IN CHARGE



Joe Royle was one of the great centre-forwards. Strong, fearless and highly competitive, he rattled in 152 goals in 467 League games during a colourful career that embraced Everton, Manchester City, Bristol City and then Norwich City.

Big Joe was only 18 when he made his senior debut for Everton, and two years later after signing in 1968, he appeared in their FA Cup Final side that lost 1-0 to WBA. His proudest achievement with the Toffeemen though was winning the League title.

Capped six times by England, to add to his Youth and under-23 honours. Joe's tight control and footwork gave him that extra quality. His career was cut short at Norwich in 1981 by persistent knee problems and he returned to his native North-West.

In 1982 Joe was appointed Oldham's manager. He has since led the Latics to their most exciting era.

Success was not achieved overnight and Oldham have had to ward off tempting offers from Manchester City for their enthusiastic boss but in the late 80's Oldham Athletic established themselves in the national game.

The events of season 1989-90

The events of season 1989-90 were incredible. They nearly won three titles but ended with nothing. They just missed out on promotion from Division Two, lost at Wembley to Nottingham Forest in the Final of the Littlewoods Cup, then to Manchester United in the replayed FA Cup semi-final.

Joe eventually led his team into Division One in May 1991 - it was a testament to his ability to get the best out of his players and to his faith in attacking football.

# Those were the days.

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

For Torquay's visit in the last round, we looked back to the early days of the Town's League Cup winning season in 1968/69. Tonight we continue the story, as the next League opponents after Torquay were none other than Oldham!

But prior to their trip to Boundary Park, 24 years ago yesterday, Swindon climbed another rung on the long ladder to Wembley by disposing of Coventry City in a Fourth Round replay, and it all seemed so easy on the night. The Town had cruised to a 3-0 lead by the 23rd minute and the contest was as good as over. Don Rogers, Roger Smart and Willie Penman did the damage.

Swindon and Oldham sat at opposite ends of the Third Division at this time. The Town were going for their sixth successive League victory while the Latics had won only once in fourteen starts. Jim Bowie gave Oldham the lead, but it lasted just three minutes. Don Heath - later to sign for Athletic - equalised before Rogers gave the visitors the lead midway through the second half. Oldham hit back again, through Keith Bebbington, with ten minutes to go, but Smart clinched two more points with an 85th minute header.

Some 7,000 Swindon fans went on the next away trip, for the League Cup quarter-final at the Baseball Ground. Derby had not conceded a goal in their last five games, and they didn't on this occasion either. But neither did the Town, so back they came to the County Ground. Before that, Swindon dispatched Southport -

long since departed from the League scene - with ease, Rogers grabbing four goals in a 5-1 win, and the flying winger hit a November 5 cracker to extinguish Derby's Cup hopes in front of a near 27,000 crowd.

The Town suffered two successive 2-0 reverses in the League in November, at Luton and Mansfield, but recorded two Cup victories in between. Southern League Canterbury City switched their First Round F.A. Cup tie to the County Ground, but still kept Swindon out for 89 minutes. Only then were they denied by a penalty.

Their second conquest was at Turf Moor, home of First Division Burnley, in the first leg of the League Cup Semi-final. A magnificent performance brought the Town a 2-1 win, skipper Stan Harland and Peter Noble scoring. The month ended with a comprehensive 6-2 victory at Northampton. Swindon faltered in the second leg of the Burnley tie, leaving a third game to decide the issue. Meanwhile, the F.A. Cup gave them an awkward tie at Midland League Grantham, but they came through unscathed, 2-0.

Two more Third Division victories, at home to Brighton and away to Torquay, were separated by the Semi-Final replay at The Hawthorns on December 18. In a see-saw contest, the Town took an early lead through John Smith, conceded a late equaliser and then another in the first minute of extra-time, but still roared back to destroy Burnley with two goals in four minutes.

The year should have ended with a visit from Oldham, but a frozen pitch put paid to that and so 1968 closed with an instantly forget-table 1-0 defeat at Orient. 1969 opened with a similar showing, as Swindon went down 2-0 at home to Fourth Division Southend in the Third Round of the F.A. Cup. Two draws, at Southport and at home to Luton followed.


The Town returned to winning ways on January 24, with a 5-3 win at Tranmere and Oldham came to the County Ground four days later. Still at the bottom of the table, but now seven points adrift, the Latics were soon in trouble. Frank Burrows and Chris Jones gave Swindon a 2-0 lead in the first four minutes, to the delight of a 21,316 crowd. Jones, who had scored twice at Prenton Park, went on to notch a hat-trick in a 5-1 victory.





Town's 5-1 defeat of Notts County here at the County Ground was not only our best win of the season but a red letter day for teenager Kevin Horlock.

Horlock, called up as a replacement for the injured Paul Bodin, made a big impact in his first full League game - his contribution capturing the headlines on a day of great joy.

Mind you, suggestions in some papers that Kevin had been signed by us after Glenn had taken him on trial from Reading, illustrates just how unknown Town's latest success story is. For Kevin's only visits to Elm Park have been with West Ham United reserves.

The 19 year old from Plumstead in London was first introduced to professional football on the terraces of Charlton Athletic where his father was a regular supporter. But his heart was always across the Thames at Upton Park - the Club he passionately admired for their quality.

Success then seemed to be his when, in the summer of 1991, the Hammers offered him a contract after a prominent part in a successful youth team in which he had scored 11 goals from leftback. But progress since then has been very limited and when last season the Hammers offered him just a one-year contract Kevin felt he was being short changed.

Says Kevin: "I felt I deserved more. Having worked my way up through the youth teams, I got the impression I was being taken a little for granted. Playing reserve team football week in week out can become frustrating if you don't see opportunity at the end of the road."

Is he disappointed then that he did not make the grade at Upton Park?

He grinned; "Every young boy dreams of running out with the team they have supported. As it happens, I have made it in a Swindon shirt which is just as good."

"Coming here in the summer was a great move for me. A lot of people suggested it was a big decision I had to make but to be honest I didn't think twice when Glenn offered me the chance to come. I was here in a flash."

He sure was. For Kevin arrived on the doorstep just as the lads were boarding the bus for the preseason trip to Holland. There was one snag however. West Ham had tied a £75,000 label around Kevin's neck. Glenn did some astute bargaining and came up with a deal that will cost us £25,000 at the most.

On what we have seen so far this could be the buy of the season. For having played for 40 minutes as a sub at Portsmouth and made his full debut in the Coca-Cola Cup tie with Torquay United, Kevin would seem to possess all the attributes of a class player.

The goal he claimed against Notts County was absolutely masterful. Yet this was no shot out of the blue, for Kevin has proved a consistent

marksman at all the levels he has so far performed in.

At an impressive six-foot, I suggested to him that he must get a fair share of his goals with his head: "No," he smiled. "Most tend to be on the floor. I love to get forward into attacking positions. I actually enjoy that better than defending which of course is the main priority for a fullback.

With his scoring flair and love for the forward push, would he not be better off concentrating on a midfield role, I ventured.


"No need to do that," was the instant retort: "The formula we play here gives defenders ample opportunity to join in the attack.

"I was a left midfield player originally but I moved back when there were some injuries as a schoolboy and have stayed there ever since."


Kevin is revelling in his new found glory, though he stresses he was not so enamoured with his performance against Notts County as some of the critics. He says: "It is looking better and everyone said I played well but I wasn't brilliant.

"I was a little nervous and gave the ball away too much. I get nervous before every game, be it in the reserves or any team. It is good. Keeps me on my toes.

"Paul Bodin is a tough act to follow. He is a great favourite with the fans but he will be out a little while with knee ligament problems and I aim to make the most of my opportunity."



The following Tuesday there's a big night coming up and a chance of revenge Brentford in important Barclays League Division One game.


You may recall it was the Bees who stung us badly with a 2-1 KO in the Anglo Italian Cup.

Steve White-Has a habit of scoring against the Tykes.





This is our first ever pairing with the Latics in the League Cup, yet it is 68 years ago that we first clashed in the


F.A. Cup. But in terms of League football our association is very new.

The following season turned up a nine-goal thriller at The County Ground - Town winning 6-3 with Don Rogers leading the spree with a brilliant hat-trick.




"There was nobody around the ground at all but Lou got him out of trouble with a copy of "Shoot" magazine which was duly passed under the door."



## SSILA, APFSCIL AND OASIS!

Swindon Supporters In London Association have been members of APFSCIL (Association of Provincial Football Supporters Clubs in London), for almost five years. This organisation was founded in the mid '70's and, and is open to London based supporters organisations of clubs outside the capital.

There are currently 46 member clubs from all parts of Britain and Ireland from all divisions.

APFSCIL organises its own football, darts and pool leagues, and there are two regular annual social functions that clubs attend. Recent guest speakers have included Gordon Taylor of the PFA and Frank Worthington. Meetings between representatives of all clubs are held monthly.

The concessionary fares obtained from British Rail for group travel, are very important in enabling many clubs, such as SSILA, in travelling to games. You'll often find supporters groups travelling together to games.

Many clubs such as ourselves

have formed, and consequently joined APFSCIL, initially to enable supporters to travel together to games, but have since expanded sporting and social activities, and have developed an exchange of information and news for supporters via a newsletter.

SSILA may have one of the smallest memberships in APFSCIL (34 members at the end of 1991/92), but the majority of us do become involved in most of the activities and we play a full part within APFSCIL. Our membership of APFSCIL was particularly valuable just over two years ago, by way of the support we received from member clubs and individuals after demotion from the 1st Division.
