



Bearing this all in mind it makes our game against Barnsley today all the more significant...In fact I venture to say that this is the most important game we have had.


At West Ham last week we didn't play anywhere near as well as we can. But we defended well and proved very hard to break down.



JEWS C Millwall maintained their current good form on Sunday with an victory impressive 2-0 over high riding Wolves at The Den. The Lions are reportedly keen to bring Sunderland striker John Byrne down south and Manager Mick McCarthy is full of the players praises, "John may be a 31 year old but he is still a class striker. Players we have here could learn from him." Millwall are apparently keen on a player exchange deal but Roker boss Malcolm Crosby is holding out for hard cash.

> Another striker in great demand at the moment is Pompey's Guy Whittingham who can't stop scoring. Whittingham hit the first of two Portsmouth goals last Saturday that beat Sunderland at Fratton Park to take his season's tally to 12 in the League. Whittingham cost Pompey a mere £450 when they bought him out of the army but has now been given a £1 million price tag and midfielder Alan McLoughlin explains why: "Guy is on a high at the moment and anything that comes his way you expect him to put away."


> Cambridge United have parted company with Manager John Beck who was sacked last week. Beck had been

reported to be in the interested vacant post at Third Division Preston but says he was disappointed to get the boot following the success he brought to The Abbey "I'm tremendously shocked and deeply upset. I was asked to resign but said no. I didn't want to leave. I have been told that the decision was taken because I had stated I was ambitious to manage a big club but I would not have left The Abbey unless an offer came from the in biggest...which was unlikely." Cambridge have appointed his former assistant Gary Johnson as caretaker and he managed to earn a point at Southend on Sunday in a one all draw.

At Upton Park where West Ham United were beaten by Swindon, manager Billy Bonds has seen his side make a good start to the season and is pleased the way things are going "I'm now getting things the way I want them but it is not going to be an easy season. We don't have to contend with the quality we faced last season in teams like Arsenal, Leeds and Manchester United but in a way the situation is now reversed. Everyone wants to beat us., it's going to be like a Cup Final for us every Saturday."

Birmingham City have taken Aston Villa Reserve keeper Les Sealey on loan after a series of heavy defeats. The plan seems to be working with City beating Bristol Rovers 3-1 at St Andrews last week. Blues boss Terry Cooper says he has acquired Sealey with his aggressive side in mind "We've got a really quiet team and there are not many characters. But with Les here and John Gayle back after injury it's got the place going. It was crazy in the dressing room after our recent match with Oxford as Les was going potty."

Attendances in the First Division continue to stay below those reached last season with the current average of 10,009 being 500 down on the average for the whole of last year. Newcastle continue to hit the 30,000 gate barrier every game at St James's Park with their attendance against Tranmere of 30,137 being the best of the season, while at Oxford there were only 3,785 to see the visit of Cambridge United. The lowest gate has been at Barnsley.

## Barusley to West Ha

Barnsley have the true-grit and determination associated with most Yorkshire sides but in the past two years have failed to deliver the prizes their talented squad have promised.

Just over a year ago this Yorkshire mining community was positive its team had the makings of a promotion side after just missing out on the play-offs in the previous campaign. But they started badly and never really found their feet.

This season has followed much the same lines. True, their opening dates with West Ham United, Portsmouth, Grimsby, Millwall and Wolves were not the easiest of fixtures but it wasn't until their seventh game - away to Notts County - that the Tykes recorded a win. It was another seven, League and Cup games, before they registered a second victory.

On paper the problem seemed straight forward. Just two goals scored in the opening six games suggested a weakness up front particularly as Mel Machin's team had not conceded more than one goal in any one match.

In the opening game, at home

to West Ham United, the Tykes were denied a clear penalty, had a Robinson effort headed off the line and hit the bar through **David Currie**. If they had the feeling it wasn't their day they were right. The Hammers hit them on the break to steal the game through a Clive Allen finish.

Currie, a most gifted forward of infinite skill, has failed to produce the consistency expected of him. The former Middlesbrough and Darlington striker had first arrived at Oakwell in February 1988 for £150,000 and duly netted 20 goals in his first full season with the club. Nottingham Forest paid, a record fee of, £750,000 for him in January 1990 but by the following summer David was signed up with Oldham.

A year later he was back at Oakwell, at a cost of £250,000; manager **Mel Machin** hoping his impudent magic would spark a glorious revival. But last season he managed just seven goals in 37 League games and this season has yet to score.

The top shot last season was Andy Rammell, with eight goals in Division Two, but he too has been struggling to finish this term, his sole contribution coming in the 1-1 home draw with Derby County.

Hence Mr Machin's dabble in the transfer market this month -



to recruit the much travelled striker **Wayne Biggins** for a fee of £200,000 set by a League tribunal last week.

Biggins has responded well with four goals in four appearances but what is even more encouraging is that he seems to have brought the best out of **John Pearson** who has notched three times in the last three outings - including two last Saturday in a 3-2 win over Brentford when he returned after a 14-minute spell of treatment with five stitches above his left eye and scored the knock-out blows.

The new-found success of the Biggins-Pearson partnership has seen Barnsley undefeated in their last three games with wins over Luton and Brentford and a goaless draw at Oxford United.

Perhaps the luck has changed for the Tykes who were dumped out of the Coca-Cola Cup in the first round by Grimsby on penalties; and the Anglo Italian Cup by Derby County... You know, Barnsley have never ever competed in Division One before and there is a feeling in South Yorkshire that given the breaks Mel Machin could lead them to the promised land.

Owen Archdeacon - Midfield. Joined Celtic from school and went on to make 70 senior appearances for the Parkhead club, after making his debut in 1984. Picked up two Scottish Premier League championship medals as well as a Skol Cup runners-up prize. Capped by Scotland at Youth and Under-21 levels. Joined Barnsley in June 1989 for £80,000 and missed just the last game of the 1991-92 season. Born: Glasgow 4-3-66

Wayne Biggins - Striker. Much travelled striker. Barnsley becoming his seventh club earlier this month. started his career as an apprentice with Lincoln Citybut made only eight League appearances (1 goal). Then joined Kings Lynn before Burnley brought him back. Scored 29 goals in 78 League appearances and that was enough to tempt Norwich City. Wayne scored just 16 goals in 79 League outings for the Canaries; added another 9 in 32 games with Manchester City. Moved to Stoke four years ago. Born: Sheffield 20-11-61.

Wayne Bullimore - Midfield. A former trainee with Manchester United he arrived at Oakwell on a free transfer in March 1991. Made his debut, as a sub, in a Rumbelows League Cup third roound lie at Middlesbrough, in October 1991. A week later he made his League bow at Oxford and finished last season with 18 appearances. Born: Sutton-in-Ashfield 12-9-70.

Lee Butler - Goalkeeper. Started his League career with Lincoln City after being spotted with Harwort Colliery. Played 30 games for the Imps before Aston Villa snapped him up but he was unable to oust Nigel Spink - appearing just 8 times. Spent two months on loan with Hull City before transferring to Barnsley in July 1991 for £215,000. Born: Sheffield 30-5-66.

Gary Fleming - Defender. Linked up with Mel Machin for the second time when he signed from Manchester City in March 1990 for £65,000. Mr Machin had previously taken him to Maine Road from Notts County on loan. A regular member of the Northern Ireland team. Born: Londonderry 17-2-67.

Andrew Liddell - Forward. still only 19 but given his chance this season. Was with the club on Associated Schoolboy forms and signed pro in 1991. Born: Leeds 28-6-73.

### BARNSLEY

Brendan O'Connell - Midfield. A Londoner who started his career with Portsmouth. Made his League debut for Exeter after joining them in 1986. Scored 19 goals in 81 appearances before moving to Burnley in the season of 1988-89. A £45,000 fee took him to Oakwell in March 1990. Player of the Year in 1991. Born: London 12-11-66.

John Pearson - Forward. Signed for Sheffield Wednesday from school and went on to make 105 League apperances for the Owls (24 goals). Then had a spell with Charlton Athletic (15 goals in 61); Leeds United (12 goals in 99 League games) and Rotherham - on loan - before transferring to Barnsley in July 1991 for £135,000. A former England Youth international he had a spell on loan at Hull last season. Born: Sheffield 1-9-63.

Andy Rammell - Forward. Came into footballl with Nuncaton Borough Atherstone in the Beazer Homes League. In the summer of 1989 he was taken on by Manchester United - who paid £60,000 for his registration. Scored 16 goals in the reserves but did not make his League debut until joining Barnsley for £150,000 in September 1990. Joint top scorer last season he had scored 20 League goals by the close of last season.

Neil Redfearn - Midfield, Now with his eighth club Neil served apprenticeship with Nottingham Forest before moving on a free to Bolton Wanderers in 1982. Two years later he moved on to Lincoln City and in 1986 he joined Doncaster Rovers. Had further spells with Crystal Palace (£100,000 in July 1987); Watford (£150,000 Nov 1988) and Oldham Athletic (£150,000 in Jan 1990). Barnsley splashed out £180,000 for his services after a spell on Total

loan at Oakwell. Had made 360 League appearances (67 goals) by theclose of last season. Born: Dewsbury 20-6-65

Jamie Robinson - Fullback. Versatile defender who can play across the back line but considers his best role is leftback. signed on a free transfer from Liverpool in the summer, having failed to make the first team at Anfield. Born: Liverpool 26-2-72.


Mark Robinson - Midfield.

Gerry Taggart - Defender. Current Northern Ireland international - he has over 10 caps and is the most capped player while on Barnsley's books. A trainee with Manchester City he captained their youth team and made 12 League appearances during their promotion season of 1988-89. In January 1990 he moved to Oakwell in a £70,000 deal. Made his 100th career League appearance against Wolves at the end of April 1992. Born: Belfast 18-10-70.

### THE MAN IN CHARGE



Mel Machin, born in Newcastleunder-Lyme, on 16th April 1945, was, in his playing days a cultured fullback, though he had started out as a striker.

He first came to prominence with the Stoke-on-Trent Schoolboy team and was soon persuaded to join the apprentice ranks at Port Vale. Turned professional in 1962 and four years later joined Gillingham.

Adapted successfully to a midfield role and in December 1970 moved to Bournemouth before joining the exodus to Carrow Road, along with John Bond and Ken Brown in December 1973.

Played for the Canaries for five years and scored hat-tricks in both the first team and reserves before joining the Seattle Sounders in the NFL. While in America Mel sustained a knee injury which led to his retirement in 1977.

Took up coaching with Norwich City working his way through the youth and reserve sides to become chief coach and Ken Brown's assistant in a highly successful partnership.

It was no surprise when he was offered the manager's chair at Maine Road in May 1987.

After missing promotion at his first attempt Manchester City clinched a place in Division One next time round. Machin's reward was the sack in December 1989. Within a month he was back in business with Barnsley and plotting another push for Division One.

## Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Last weekend saw the completion of the qualifying rounds of the FA Cup for another season. Our look back today starts in the days when the name of Swindon Town appeared regularly at this stage of the competition. In fact, one hundred years ago this very weekend, on October 29 1892, the Town took on Bristol Club Warmley and were victorious by 8 goals to one.

Such results were commonplace then, when Swindon were strictly amateurs, playing their football in Old Town, at The Croft. Of course, there was no Wembley in those days, but Swindon's chances of reaching The Oval, or wherever they chose to play the Final, were as remote as Halifax winning the Cup this century.

Year after year, they battled against the likes of Maidenhead and Marlow, Warmley and Weymouth, but always failed to clear the final qualifying hurdle. The first time that the Town faced Cup opponents from 'north of Watford' was a meeting with Barnsley at Oakwell in December 1902. This was also their first clash with a Football League Club in the Cup.

By this time, Swindon were a professional outfit, albeit one annually tottering on the brink of bankruptcy. However, they had amassed 25 goals in brushing aside Chippenham Town (5-0),

Yeovil Casuals (4-0), Poole (7-1) and Whiteheads Torpedo Works (9-0), before being faced with a further obstacle - which the Football Association termed an Intermediate Round - barring the way to the First Round proper.

Barnsley had not been excused from the qualifying rounds either. Despite poor League form, they had disposed of fellow Second Division sides Chesterfield and Gainsborough Trinity to face the Town. Had Swindon not been without experienced goalkeeper Bob Menham, who went down with rheumatic fever a few days before the trip to Yorkshire, they might have fared better than a 4-0 defeat. Tom Lewis stepped up for what proved to be his only senior appearance for the Town. Menham never played again.

Swindon's Cup reputation had been somewhat enhanced by the time they next met Barnsley, in 1910. Barnsley were still in the Second Division and the Town still in the Southern League, but how times had changed for Swindon. Now inspired by Harold Fleming, of England, they had almost reached the Final. They claimed the scalps of Burnley and Manchester City of the Second Division and Tottenham of the First, the latter falling to a Fleming hat-trick. This took them to a semi-final meeting, on Tottenham's ground, where they went down 2-0 to Newcastle United. Barnsley had gone one better, getting to the Final and holding the Geordies to a 1-1 draw before going down in a replay at Goodison.

Their meeting with the Town, on Thursday May 5, was on foreign soil, the venue being the Velodrome du Parc des Princes in Paris. The prize was the Dubonnet Cup.

Swindon were not at full strength. Jack Burkinshaw, born not too many miles from Barnsley at Kilnhurst, came in at centreforward for Freddy Wheatcroft and Sammy Lamb for Jack Lavery on the left-wing. But once again Fleming's trickery won the day, his two goals securing a 2-1 win for the Town. The players were awarded medals and brought back to the County Ground a large bronze vase, valued at a princely £40! Today's teams will see the trophy, too, as it now stands in the corridor on the way to the dressing rooms.

### The Swindon Town Lucky Mascots



The Barclays League enhanced its reputation last week when a representative side, led by Glenn Hoddle, defeated the Italian Serie B team by 3-1 at Ashton Gale.

It was sweet revenge for the 2-1 defeat suffered in Caserta last season, in the first of this highly successful series which promises to become a regular fixture on the soccer calendar.

Not only was this a good advert for English soccer but a testament to the quality found here at Swindon Town. For with Glenn Hoddle in charge, John Gorman his assistant, and super displays from Craig Maskell, Colin Calderwood and David Kerslake the Town influence was there for all to enjoy.

It was Craig who hit the headlines once again with two well taken goals and the Swindon striker can feel well satisfied with his performance.

Says Craig: "It was nice to be involved. I have been to England Schoolboy trials as a kid and was in the last 20 for the England Youth team but never got picked so this was my first representative honour."

"When I realised I was playing I was very excited and determined to do well. The game started well for me because in the third minute I got in behind my marker with a spin and was dribbling the ball almost along their goal-line when I was confronted by another defender. I tried to play the ball between

his legs - it was the only place I could go - and the ball deflected off his knee into the net."

"That gave me a great boost and from then on I felt nice and sharp. The Italians marked very tightly with man to man marking and a sweeper so they give little away. But I was really wound up for this one after a terrible game here against Notts County the previous Saturday. County too had operated a man to man marking system and though we won comfortably in the end I have to admit Michael Johnson did a very good job on me. He hardly allowed me a kick."

"So I was determined to master that system against the Italians. I did manage two sort of simple goals - the second came when their goalkeeper made an error and gave the ball to Jon Goodman who chipped it in to give me a free header - but apart from that very rarely got away form my shadow."

The whole experience came as a refreshing boost to all our lads and Craig says: "Colin played exceptionally well as usual and in the second half David Kerslake really did put on a performance. Both of them came close to scoring...It was a nice performance and result for the Gaffer and John Gorman"

Those goals took Craig's tally this season to 13 and last Saturday he went one better with the winner, at Upton Park, against West Ham United. "There was a bit of luck

about this one as well," Craig is quick to acknowledge - his free-kick from 20-yards taking a deflection to wrongfoot Miklosko.

But he reflects: "Maybe it is about time Swindon enjoyed a bit of luck anyway. We have dominated so many games this season without getting a result. George Parris had brought down Martin Ling and my only concern was to keep my kick low.

"I must say we were all keyed up for that game. We have been getting some stick, and rightly so, from the manager and other sources over our lack of success away. We were determined to do something this time.

"It was the most spirited performance since I came here and I think we got our just reward. The Sunday papers claimed that West Ham were all over us second-half but they didn't once get behind us. They had a lot of the ball but most of their efforts were restricted by us to long shots."

When it comes to shooting of course Craig is the master but has he ever had a better start than this to a season?

"No...I scored 33 goals in my first season with Huddersfield but only had 14 by Christmas. This is by far my best start but though I have had the headlines don't forget the others. David Mitchell has eight and Shaun Taylor six...we are the top shots."








the win ner as we completed a double at Griffin Park.




