FOOTBALL LEAGUE CLUBS BACK THE POOLS HELP US TO PRESERVE A VITAL SOURCE OF INCOME FOR FOOTBALL

The Government has recently introduced to Parliament a Bill to establish a national lottery. Football Clubs are concerned at the impact a national lottery may have on the football pools, a major source of income for football.

The Football League presently receives £6.1 million each year from the Pools Promoters Association for the use of fixtures on the pools coupons. This money goes to the benefit of all Football League Clubs. The pools also generate income of £32 million each year for the Football Trust and the bulk of this goes to help Clubs carry out the major improvements required following the Taylor Report. It is vital for football that these monies continue to be ploughed back into the game.

To ensure that this happens we need to be certain that the pools companies are able to compete on equal terms with the national lottery. The Pool Promoters Association have put forward the following proposals which they hope will achieve this:-


- 1. If normal lottery tickets are to be available in shops, then pools coupons should also be allowed to be collected from shops.
- 2. Lotteries in other countries generally accumulate the jackpot from week to week if there is no outright winner. If the national lottery is to be permitted such freedom, then the pools should be allowed to carry forward from one week to another of their first dividend prize fund.
- 3. If the national lottery is to be advertised on television and radio, then the restrictions which presently prevent the pools from doing so should be lifted.
- 4. The Government should ensure that the tax treatment of the pools and the national lottery is fair and comparable the percentage taken out in tax and in payments to good causes should be the same for pools as for the lottery.

Swindon Town Football Club supports these proposals.

What you can do to help......

is to write to your MP at the House of Commons, London SW1A OAA and say that you believe the pools must be allowed to compete with the national lottery on fair and equal terms. If you wish, quote the four proposals given above.

OR you can visit your MP at one of the advice bureaux in your area and put football's case to him or her face-to-face.

Supporters using the Town End Family Enclosure are requested to respect the comfort of others by abiding by the No Smoking rule.



Collymore has hit eight goals since joining The Shrimpers last month and will be a great asset as the Club fight against relegation.

Of the reduced League programme played, Portsmouth moved into a strong position with a 1-0 home win over Brentford. Star man for Pompey was former Spurs player Guy Butters. Butters joined Pompey for £325,000 but has struggled to gain a regular first team slot. Saturdays game was in fact Butters first start of the season but despite reserve

Wolves manager Turner was not pleased with his forwards, including ex England player Steve Bull who squandered several chances "We had enough chances here to have won two matches. It is all very frustrating." Last seasons finalists Sunderland also went out losing to Premier side Sheffield Wednesday. The Wednesday winner was attributed to a mistake by keeper Tony Norman, Roker boss Malcolm Crosby says it was just one of those things "Tony is absolutely gutted. It was one of those crosses that he would have pulled out of the air no problem nine times out of ten. There is just nothing you can do about a mistake like that - and there was just no way back for us because it was so late on. Terry Butcher said the ball moved in the air, but Tony is big enough to concede that it was all down to him."

Wanders Wanders

Last week Molineux rang to the cheers of FA Cup excitement as Wolves did battle with giant-killers Bolton Wanderers in the Fourth Round. It was a big day which could have been even bigger had Bolton not tipped Liverpool out in that epic replay, but when the dust had settled the men from Molineux would most likely have willingly exchanged the Cup hype for a couple more wins in the League.

After gaining successive promotions in 1987 and 1988 Wolves are desperate to return to the big time in which the Club has such a glorious past.

Hopes were high last year but Wolves never really established themselves as serious contenders, eventually finishing 10th in the Second Division table.

This season optimism was fired by a solid start to the campaign when England striker Steve Bull emphasised his worth with goals in three of their first four victories over Brentford, Leicester City and Peterborough United. But Bull, and his much neglected partner Andy Mutch, have not been able to produce the consistency for which are renowned consequently the team's position has taken a dive.

Indeed, there was 'mutch' relief recently when Mark Burke and Andy Mutch scored in the last seven minutes of their derby clash with Birmingham City to retrieve what had seemed a lost cause with a 2-1 victory.

It ended a depressing run of six games without a win for Graham Turner's side and eased some of the criticism levelled in his direction.

Burke had ignited the fightback in the 83rd minute when he whacked a spectacular 20-yarder into the Birmingham net. The home fans were still celebrating as Andy Mutch snatched his eighth goal of the season when he headed in Robbie Dennison's cross.

Scoring had not been a problem in the Wolves camp until this season, but Andy's header was only their 37th goal in 26 First Division matches and of the top ten sides only Charlton Athletic had scored less.

Steve Bull still tops the score chart of course with a dozen and Darren Roberts, a £20,000 purchase from Burton Albion, has also contributed. Darren made a sensational League debut with a hat-trick in the first half at Birmingham City (27-9-92), but the goal-flow that swept Wolves through Divisions Four and Three has just not been repeated at the higher level.

So these are still troublesome times for Mr Turner who strengthened his suspect defence by recruiting experience in the form of Lawrie Madden and Derek Mountfield: and enthusiasm in the shape of 29-year-old leftback Paul Edwards. Even so they have still conceded 32 goals!

One problem has been in goal where Mike Stowell, who was spotted first by Preston playing for Levland Motors, had an outstanding start to the season. The former Everton custodian was injured and his place taken by Paul Jones, who joined Wolves from Kidderminster Harriers in July 1991. He made his League debut this season at 25; but has now been replaced by Dave Beasant.




Others to feature in the side this season include Kevin Ashley, a defender signed from Birmingham City for £500,000 in the summer of 1990; and Paul Blades - a former England Youth cap - who started his career with Derby County in 1982 (166 League app) and last season featured in the centre of Norwich City's defence.

Striker Colin Taylor, who has worked his way up through the ranks at Molineux, has also been given his chance. Yet another Liverpudlian, Colin, who has just turned 20, has made 18 League appearances for the club prior to the current campaign and 7 for Wigan on loan.

Dave Beasant - Goalkeeper. Former England international trying to re-establish himself after a disastrous period with Chelsea. Came to fame when he saved a penalty to help Wimbledon win the FA Cup Final over Liverpool in 1988. Spotted by Wimbledon playing for Edgware he went on to captain the Dons - making 340 League appearances. In June 1988 Newcastle United splashed out £800,000 for his services but he made but 20 League appearances before returning to London to join Chelsea. Lost his place in the Blues side following a disastrous game against Norwich City in September. Joined Grimsby on loan in October and arrived at Molineux on a similar agreement this month. Born: Willesden 20-3-59.

Paul Birch - Midfield.

Developed through the youth ranks with
Aston Villa - he was in their 1980 FA
Cup winning side, Made his League
debut against Sunderland in August

1983 and scored 16 goals in 173 appearances before moving to Wolves in January 1991. Born: West Bromich 6-11-62.

Stephen Bull - Striker. Although one of the England squad participating in the World Cup Finals in 1990 his international career seems to have come off the rails of late. "Bully", a £35,000 steal from West Brom in November 1986, continues to make scoring records however and this season became the Club's greatest-ever striker when he overhauled John Richards' long-standing haul of 192 goals. Born: Tipton 28-3-65.

Mark Burke - Forward. Another former Villa apprentice he made his League debut for them v Everton in April 1987. Played just six more times, in Division Two, the following season before joining Middlesbrough where he registered 6 goals in 57 League appearances.

Loan spells with Darlington and Ipswich preceded his move to Wolves in 1990-91. Born: Solihull 12-2-69.

Paul Cook - Midfield. Has been an almost permanent fixture in midfield since his £250,000 transfer from Norwich City in October 1989. Introduced to League football by Wigan in a Third Division game with Reading, in May 1985, he moved to Carrow Road four years later but only made six League appearances for the Canaries. Born: Liverpool 22-2-67.

Robbie Dennison - Forward. Plays wide on the left and is a good crosser. Capped 15 times by Northern Ireland he commenced this season with 28 goals in 206 League games for the Wolves having previously scored once in 16 League outings with West Brom. Joined Wolves in March 1987. Born: Banbridge, Co Down 30-4-63.

WOLVERHAMPTON WANDERERS

Keith Downing - Defender. A free transfer capture from Notts County in 1987 Keith has since clocked up over 160 League appearances for the Wolves. Spotted playing for Oak Rovers County gave him his chance v Leeds United in August 1984 but in three years at Meadow Lane he was to add but 22 more League games to his record. Born: Oldbury 23-7-65.

Paul Edwards - Fullback. Signed from Coventry City in October 1992 Paul has slotted in nicely on the left hand side. Started his career with Crewe Alexandra making the first of his 86 League appearances at Hartlepool, in February 1988. Joined Coventry in 1990-91 and played 36 games in the old First Division. Was with Altrincham upon leaving school. Born: Birkenhead 25-12-63.

Lawrie Madden - Defender. There are few more experienced than this 37-year-old. A former amateur with Arsenal and graduate of Manchester University. Made his League debut for Mansfield v Stockport (1-4-75) and has since performed for Charlton Athletic (113 League app); Millwall (47); Sheffield Wednesday (212) and Leicester (3) on loan. Signed on a free transfer in September 1991 he has been a steadying influence at the heart of the Wolves defence making 43 (1 goal) League appearances last season. Born: London 28-9-55.

Derek Mountfield - Central Defender. Another vastly experienced professional, Derek was the pivot upon which most of Everton's rivals crashed during their campaign days in the 80's. The former Tranmere apprentice, who made his League bow for Rovers at Peterborough in March 1981, proved a sound investment at £30,000 in 1983. At Goodison he won two championship medals; FA Cup and League Cup as well as gold in the ECWC before switching to Aston Villa in 1988, for £450,000. Capped by England at Under-21 and "B" levels. Born: Liverpool 2-11-62.

Andy Mutch Striker. Live-wire attacker who was picked up for a song from Multipart League Southport in February 1986. Has formed a great partnership with Bull and is now close to netting his 100th goal in the Football League having started this season with 88 goals in 250 League appearances. Made his debut in a 0-0 draw with Rotherham (8-3-86). Won an England "B" cap v Switzerland in May 1989. Born: Liverpool 28-12-63.

Mark Rankine - Midfield/Defence. Now completing a year at Molineux - he joined Wolves from Doncaster for £70,000 in January 1992 - Mark has proved a versatile performer. Preferred in midfield he scored once, v Cambridge in April '92, last season in 15 League excursions. Was only 16 when he made his debut for Doncaster. Born: Doncaster 30-9-69.

Mark Venus - Fullback. Has lost his regular berth in the number three shirt this season but still very much involved. Signed in March 1988 for a big fee from Leicester City he has made 150 odd League appearances. Hartlepool was his first club - he came into the side at Bury (1-4-85); but was allowed to join Leicester on a free-transfer a couple of months later. Born: Hartlepool 6-4-67.



THE MAN IN CHARGE



Graham Turner displayed outstanding qualities of leadership as a player though his career was restricted to the lower divisions.

He joined Wrexham as a junior in 1962 and three years later gained professional status. An England Youth International at 18 he made 77 League appearances for the Welsh club before moving to Chester City in January 1968.

Was to make over 200 appearances (218 in the League) before transferring to Shrewsbury Town in January 1973. His 13-year association with the Shrews was a colourful and happy one with dramatic giant-killing escapades in the FA Cup and promotion to Division Two providing the highlights.

Graham chalked up over 400 games for the club - 355 in the League - and in 1978 was installed as player-manager.

But his biggest break was yet to come. In July 1984 Graham was installed as manager of Aston Villa, but he failed to turn the club round and haunted by behind the scenes disharmony was sacked shortly after the start of his third season.

Another door opened in October 1986, however, when he was invited to take charge of Wolverhampton Wanderers - a big club wallowing in Division Four. In his first season he almost clinched promotion - defeat by Aldershot in the play-off final ending a gallant run.

Twelve months later Turner led Wolves to the Fourth Division Championship. A year on from that they were celebrating the Third Division title as well as the Sherpa Van Trophy.

A six-footer with clean sharp features Graham Turner, who was born at Ellesmere Port, Cheshire on 5th October 1947, is one of the game's great thinkers.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

One of the most popular characters to don the red of Swindon either side of the last War was Billy Lucas, who was born 75 years ago this month. He was one of many who learned their trade at Molineux prior to coming to the County Ground. When Billy arrived in Wiltshire in May 1937, there were already three former 'Wolves' in Ted Vizard's playing pool.

Full-back Jack Smith - also a Welshman - spent four years at Molineux after signing from Merthyr Town in 1930. He went to Eastville to assist Bristol Rovers during 1934/35, but was soon on his way to Swindon. His stay was one of 122 consecutive appearances before continued his journey eastwards, joining Chelsea for £3,000 in March 1938. Jack returned to Molineux as a guest during 1944/45, shortly before his playing career was ended when a bus ran over his foot. He remained with the club as a coach, but later took up management at Reading.

The two other former Molineux men came to Swindon during the summer of 1936. Both were Yorkshiremen. Winger Arthur Hetherington had spent seven years at Molineux, having been signed from Dalton United in 1928. Wolves sold him to Preston for around £3,000, but he cost the Town a fraction of that less than eighteen months later. Almost six feet tall, he was given the nickname 'Peg Leg'. He moved on to Watford shortly before the departure of Smith, in

February 1938. Goalkeeper Frank Wildman signed for Wolves in 1932, making an unhappy debut in a 5-1 defeat at Everton on Christmas Eve. He also made an intermediate stop before linking up with the Town, serving Reading for seventeen months. Frank stayed with Swindon until the club was forced to close down in 1940. He made guest appearances for Grimsby. Doncaster and Rotherham before rejoining the County Ground payroll in 1945. But he did not stay long, returning to Yorkshire to sign for Frickley Colliery in July 1946.

Billy Lucas joined Wolves at the age of seventeen, in 1935. He failed to make the League side at Molineux, but soon blossomed at the County Ground. On his home debut, he scored the opening goal in a 4-0 win over Crystal Palace and never looked back. Although he was soon without a club when the War intervened, he gained valuable experience guesting all over the country - for no less than seven clubs. In nineteen games for Blackburn Rovers, he scored 10 goals, an excellent return for an inside-forward. He netted 16 for the Town when League Football resumed in 1946/47. His brother Harry was also on the club's books at that time, but did not graduate beyond the reserve

In the 1947 close season, Swindon signed two ex-Wanderers. One was at Molineux during Billy's spell there. Winger Ted Maguire was in the Wolves side beaten in the 1939 Cup Final by Portsmouth. He stayed just one season at the County Ground before joining Halifax Town. The other was full-back Jack Preece. He made just two League appearances for Wolves, at the end of 1933/34 and served Bristol Rovers, Bradford City and Southport before the outbreak of War, during which he appeared over 150 times for Bristol City. He made only seven Third Division South appearances for the Town before joining Chippenham United as player-manager in 1948.

In March 1948, Lucas joined Swansea Town for £11,500 - a record fee for both clubs. He soon gained his first Welsh cap, but why he collected only seven altogether is something of a mystery. Billy made more than 200 appearances for the Swans before becoming player-manager at Newport in December 1953. It was the start of a long association with the club that his father, George Groves, played for back in their Southern League days. Billy did not hang up his boots until he was 40, in 1958. He then had three spells as team manager at Somerton Park and another as general manager.





PLAYER PROFILE

With finances somewhat limited, Town's future heavily rests on the development of home-grown talent. Players like Andrew John Thomson, a local lad who first joined us on schoolboy forms and developed encouragingly to earn professional status at the end of last season.

"It was such a great feeling when they said yes and gave me a professional contract," says Andy, who as a schoolboy gained representative honours with the Town side; for Wiltshire and the West of England.

The 18-year-old claims he was always tall for his age and though he found his niche as a central defender he played one season for Kingsdown school in the centre of midfield. "I could get away with it at schoolboy level," he grins. "I couldn't here."

Even so one would agree that his control, touch and passing skills, are of a high order for a defender. He says: "I like to think of myself as a footballer. You have to be that at this club anyway."

The transformation from schoolboy part-timer to full time trainee is not always easy to adjust to and many youngsters find the strain of working at the game for six days a week very tough. Andy on the other hand loved it.

He reflects: "It was a very strange feeling coming here to work every day. It only sinks in gradually that you are on the bottom rung of a possible career as a player. I had only sat in the stands before. To be behind the scenes and see everything that goes on is brilliant.

"To be in a position to play football every day was even better. I found fitness no problem. Having worked under John Trollope, who likes a run or two, the foundation was already laid."

His two years as an apprentice went well and Andy claims: "I was very lucky. In my second year I got quite a lot of games in the reserve side. It is a lot slower than the youth league as it happens so you do manage to develop your skills better at this level. In the youth team games are played at a hundred miles an hour. It is all very frantic."

Andy is perhaps unfortunate that he shadows the great Colin Calderwood, and the youngster sighs: "It's a tough act to follow. Both he and Shaun are not only brilliant players but so consistent."

When Colin was ruled out of the FA Cup third round tie at Queens Park Rangers the young hopefuls from the Stiffs must have felt a tingle of excitement in anticipation of a call-up. Was Andy disappointed then when the boss fielded striker David Mitchell as a stop-gap stopper?

"Not really," he admits candidly. "Edwin was on the bench that night and he could feel more upset than me. It would have been nice to have had the chance. Nerve-wracking but nice to pit your skills and wit against a striker like Ferdinand. But I think the manager went for experience.

"Hopefully I will get a first team opportunity before the end of the season. That is what every player in my position wants. The chance to see if you can cope with first-team football.

"The highlights for me so far was our pre-season trip to Holland. I played in two of the three games and scored a penalty in the final shoot-out. But I have a lot of work to do yet. I have to be patient and am always told that I

am too quiet on the field. So I'll have to start shouting a bit louder."

Is Andy happy with the way he is progressing this season?

"If you had asked me that a few weeks ago I'd have said yes. I was on a good run and happy with my game. But we played a friendly at Aldershot and I had an indifferent game to say the least. Then because the weather caused so may postponements I was unable to get that out of my system.


"We have not had the best of runs in the reserves either in terms of results. We are a very young side so this is to be expected. We did so well last season finishing sixth or seventh - the highest placed side from Division Two - which is the main thing."

Though only at the beginning of his career Andy has played with some great players, Nestor Lorenzo, the Argentinean World Cup Final defender being the one who left the biggest impression.

Says Andy: "He was a one-off. A brilliant player. For a centre-back his skill was phenominal, unbelievable. There was no point in trying to copy some of his skills. You would need to be world class to attempt them.

"Nestor was brilliant to watch but not very easy to play alongside. A little frightening at times because you never knew what he was going to try. But a great fellow always encouraging the young players and giving us support.

"As a local lad my dream is to play for the first team and represent my home town at the highest level. First priority though is to prove myself worth a new contract at the end of this season."





Before all this there is an extremely difficult trip Sunderland next Saturday. This a real test of character for both sides.



It is almost like a boxer who is out of range. Swinging and missing takes a lot out of them. We feel the same when a game is called off.





With the race for promotion gaining momentum it is perhaps an opportune time to look at our current position in the Barclays

League Division One chase.

The goal of course is the Championship but failing that promotion to the Premier League would more than satisfy. This year only the top two teams in Division One will gain automatic promotion the third place will be achieved through the play-offs next May.

For the majority of contenders then the play-off route would seem the more realistic avenue as Newcastle United have lunged a massive 15 points lead over second place Tranmere Rovers and the chasing pack led by West Ham United and Millwall.

Yet it would be silly to hand Kevin Keegan the key to the Premier League door just yet. I recall a conversation I had with Middlesbrough boss Lennie Lawrence just over a year ago when he conceded that all the Second Division contenders were fighting for just one place - Blackburn Rovers, who had established a dominance similar to that of Newcastle this season, being already there in his opinion.

Lennie had forgotten this is 'a funny old game'. By the beginning of May, Ipswich Town had been crowned champions and Middlesbrough were promoted as runners-up. Blackburn Rovers did make it but only by a

controversial penalty win over Leicester City in a Play-Off Final they almost didn't make.

The morale of this story is of course: Don't count your magpies before they hatch.

There are still at least a dozen clubs with resonable claims on one of those promotion places.

The introduction of three points for a win has proved one of the most progressive moves in modern football. It means that any side who can put a little winning run together can now make positive strides up the League ladder.

Town's cause has not been helped by postponements and failed floodlights. In last Sunday's First Division table we were seventh with 38 points from 24 games. But we had games in hand on all those above us apart from Tranmere Rovers.

To qualify for the play-offs we have to finish in a top six position. So at the moment we are well placed. Providing we can get the act together and turn the draws into victories Town should feature strongly in the final run in.

We could do with a few more goals however for this season, for the first time, goal difference in the Barclay's League has been replaced by goals scored to decide League positions where teams are level on points.

The change in the Regulations last summer was made to encourage attacking football. Goals conceded will only be taken into account if sides cannot be separated on points and goals scored.

As of last weekend Newcastle United had netted 51 goals with Tranmere on 48, but Rovers have earned most of theirs at home with



only 13 goals scored away and have not played as many away games as most of the contenders.

West Ham with 47 goals scored are well placed, as are Portsmouth with 45. Then comes Millwall and Town with 43 goals each. The Lions, like Tranmere, are not so prolific away from home having registered just 11 in 13 games. Their overall tally has certainly been bolstered by two rouge home wins over Notts County and Brentford which reaped them 12 goals.

So the stage is set for a rousing three months of League action. Let's hope Craig Maskell can rekindle the golden touch that made him one of the First Division's most prolific marksmen.

Finally, just a mention about last Tuesday, which not only featured our important First Division game at Grimsby bit was the anniversary of two major historical dates. January 26th 1889 saw the last games on the League's first ever season. With only 12 competing clubs, the inaugural campaign - which was one by Preston North End - only lasted 22 games!

And January 26th 1963 was the first time that the Pools Panel sat.

"Ossie was very difficult to understand at times. He was very quiet and his English was not that good. But he was such a nice man. Kept himself to himself.


"Glenn is also very quiet. He comes in and says good morning then we hardly see him again after he has collected his mail."


