ELL, a lot seems to have been written about me and the club since our last home game. In case it's gone unnoticed, we've won twice since then!

Not everyone who watches football or Watford is a letter writer, but since my comments on this page in our last programme, I have received numerous letters of support, for which I am very grateful. I thank you for that and promise that I have read every word.

I must admit I was more than a little surprised that nine lines out of 69 in the last programme produced so many column inches in our local newspaper. But if that means there's a passion about the end result and Watford's future good fortunes, that's all to the good.

Nevertheless, I stand by everything I said. It was not spur-of-the-moment stuff, it was considered opinion and I had put off making my comments for some time. And I'm not just referring to my thoughts about our coverage in the Watford Observer.

Ultimately, my theme is very simple. If you are to comment or report with credibility, you must understand or be prepared to write about the context. We can all pick on details, but the overall picture needs looking at.

I maintain, as I have said often in these notes this season, that we are in better shape now than at any time in the last three seasons. It's not all been pretty, nor has it been to everyone's taste. But it is the truth and we are undoubtedly moving in the right direction.


On that point, earlier this week I was looking at the Watford v. Ipswich Town programme from last season. As now, we had played 32 games, and had 37 points. Today we are five points better off. After the Ipswich games we only picked up one point in our next two games.

So with your help in urging us on to two wins in today's match and at Portsmouth on Tuesday, we'll be 10 points better off than at the same stage last season.

Also our top goalscorers this time last year had eight and seven goals respectively. We currently have three players above that total, albeit alongside a worse defensive record.

Nevertheless, I am convinced we are making progress. Best wishes.

I alking REFLECTING ON THE CAREER OF PAT MOLLOY

HEN Pat Molloy died 12 days ago, a piece of Watford Football Club died with him. For 83-year-old Pat had spent 41 years of his working life at Vicarage Road - the club's longest-serving employee ever. Today we reflect on his career.

"EVEN thinking about my association with Pat Molloy brings an affectionate smile to my face."

Those words, spoken by ex-Watford manager **Graham Taylor** when we spoke to him last week, echo the thoughts of everyone who ever came into contact with Pat.

His 41-year career with Watford FC was rightly recognised with the Barclays Service to Football Award in 1990, as the picture on this page shows. His was a career that touched virtually every aspect of the professional game - player, trainer, physio, coach, referee, player-manager, assistant manager, caretaker manager and manager. He was even a qualified masseur.

He joined the Watford staff in 1951 as club trainer under the managership of Ron Gray, but had earlier represented the club in a 4-1 Wartime win at Brighton.

From Ron Gray to Steve Perryman, Pat worked with 15 Watford managers, with Graham Taylor at the helm for almost a quarter of Pat's time at Vicarage Road.

"Pat was a fine, upright, kind man," says the erstwhile Hornets' boss. "There are so many stories about Pat, and although some may have been embellished with time, all still retained a strong element of truth.

"He was a very fit man, and had his values exactly right. Apart from anything, he lead a fascinating life."

There's no denying that, for as a teenager Pat ran away from his Lancashire home to join the King's Royal Rifles, before becoming a fairground boxer and then joining Bomber Command during the War and playing for the strong RAF team. A wing half, he played for Fulham, Cardiff City, Stockport County and Bradford City, augmenting his income by qualifying as a carpenter a skill that was to be used many times

at Vicarage Road during the summer months.

After the War, he became playermanager of Kettering, and then took the FA Coaching badge and went to manager and coach the Turkish national side - an appointed which immediately preceded his Vicarage Road days

Arguably, Pat's most influential days at Watford came in the late 1950's, when he played a key part in the development of the 1959/60 Division Four championship-winning side.

But he remained a man with whom Watford FC was automatically associated, even by players of other clubs, as current Hornets' boss Steve Perryman testifies: "When I was playing for Spurs' youth side, Pat was there. If I was asked for a face or mage to epitomise Watford over the years, that short-haired face of Pat Molloy standing on the touchline was Watford."

The man will be missed, but the memories won't dim. Our sincere condolences go to Pat's wife Marjorie, his two daughters, one son and nine grandchildren.

No problems with Steve Perryman though as he reflected on the Hornets' win at Derby.

SATURDAY—the biggest day of the week and a 'phone call at home just as I was leaving for the studio. The presenter had fallen asleep in a sauna and his face and various other parts of his body had swollen up, so he couldn't do the four-hour sports programme. (The best excuse I've ever heard!)

But despite that we probably had one of the most successful days the area has ever managed—WATFORD won at Bristol Rovers, LUTON didn't lose, HITCHIN rugby club wen their semi-final and earned a trip to Twickenham next month; the St. Albans boxer SEAN MURPHY won back his british Featherweight title and the MILTON KEYNES Kings ice hockey side beat Basingstoke 4—3 after three weeks ago losing 17—3 in their away match.



CLASS

CONTROLLING THE BALL

By John McDermott, Watford FC's community officer


In any ball game, controlling the ball itself is fundamental. And there's no doubt that although some players may have a natural flair for this aspect of the game, practising can improve technique.

Here's three simple practices, which can be developed, as I'll cover in next Saturday's programme.


 Juggling in pairs: This is just to get people warmed up and most importantly in ball control, concentrating. Each pair has a ball, and is allowed a maximum number of touches (says two or three) before knocking the ball to the other player. When the ball touches the ground, start again.

2. Serve and control:

Organisation: X stands within two yards of a line, while) serves the ball on the ground from approximately seven yards away. X must control the ball without crossing the line. Progress the practice by going to aerial service.



Key factors: As a coach, you should be ensuring the players: Keep their eyes on the ball; Get in line with the ball; Select the part of the body they're going to use to control the ball as early as possible Relax and withdraw that part of the body when they make contact with the ball to produce a 'cushion' effect.



3. Serve, control and challenge:

Organisation: Again in pairs, and the service is at first on the ground. This time though, X must control the ball towards the corner of the grid, i.e. out of the line of service. And this time, O is allowed to challenge for possession after serving.

Key factors: Early control to get ready for the server's challenge; In this practise, given that a challenge is on its way, the part of the body used to control the ball needs to come into the ball, rather than be withdrawn.

Important note: To lighten this session, encourage the controller to act like the receiver at tennis - on their toes ready to move in any direction.

Swindon Town produced a 12page programme priced at 3d for the visit of Watford in September 1957 during the final season of the old Division Three South.

Inside the 'Club Notes' showed that Swindon has played three League games so far, and this included a goalless draw at Vicarage Road a week earlier.

The notes also reflected on the home sides bad luck with injuries already losing four forwards just two-and-a-half weeks into the season.

Watford were introduced on page five of the programme with a brief history of the club and notes on the Manager, who for the 1957-58 season was ex-Scottish international Neil McBain. Watford's squad for the campaign broke down into 23 full-time professionals, four partimers and five in the services (National Service was still compulsory at the time).

Team line-ups appeared in the

favoured centre-spread surrounded by advertising including one for British Rail excursions from Swindon Junction to London. The more expensive trips cost 16/3d (less than one pound!) while cheaper Wednesday journeys were just 10/6 (521/2p).

Swindon Town Supporters Club Notes appeared in the secondhalf of the programme and in this issue the full list of the 57/58 season officials was published.

The final editorial piece consisted of a page of Watford pen pictures and included in this list was Maurice Cook who went on to play for Fulham in Division One and future Football League manager and coach Sammy Chung.

This particular evening game ended in the same goalless scoreline as the encounter at

Vicarage Road.

A look at the current Barclays **League First Division Scene...**

Who said Newcastle were cracking! After the Magpies had played six League matches without a win-failing to score in four of those games-some critics were wondering if their massive lead might, disappear.

But last Sunday Newcastle ended their dismal sequence with a fine 3-0 away victory over one of their promotion rivals, Tranmere. Two goals from Robert Lee and another from David Kelly enabled the Magpies to record their highest away score

in the League since winning 3-1 at Charlton in November.

With West Ham being held to a goalless draw at Sunderland, Newcastle extended their lead at the top to seven points.

Derby recorded their eighth away League victory thanks to Paul Williams' goal at Oxford. Newcastle are now the only club in the country with a better away record than the Rams who have been beaten only three times away from home in the First Division.

Yet Derby can do little right when playing on their own Baseball Ground pitch. Indeed, they have recently created an embarrassing new club record. With 10 home defeats in the League-and 12 in all games-the Rams have already suffered more home defeats than previously experienced in a complete season since they became founder members of the Football League back in 1888.

Grimsby's Paul Groves became only the third player to score more than one hat-trick in League football this season as he enabled Grimsby to come from 1-3 to draw 3-3 at home to Notts County in the First Division. Guy Whittingham (Portsmouth) has scored three hat-tricks whilst John Aldridge (Tranmere) has two to his credit.

Groves, who was signed from Blackpool for £125,000 last summer, previously scored three times at Luton in November.

Luton's Phil Gray, who recently made his international debut for N. Ireland, netted in his third successive game as he converted the late penalty that enabled the

Hatters to draw 2-2 at home to Barnsley. Gray seems to be revelling alongside his new attacking partner Kerry Dixon, the former England striker who is currently on loan from Southampton. Dixon scored Luton's opening goal,

It seems that Dixon, who still lives in the Luton area, would welcome the chance to make the move permanent. The problem would be the fee required by Southampton who paid Chelsea £575,000 for him last

Charlton, who have still to be beaten in a League match since returning to The Valley in December, almost lost their record last Saturday. Andy Cole put Bristol City into the lead after only three minutes and the visitors sat on that advantage until 11 minutes from the end.

Substitute Paul Gorman then equalised for Charlton, leaving Steve



terms have been theirs in 1990.


Player-manager Glenn Hoddle has been organising their campaign from his new position as a sweeper but he appreciates that they must win more away games if they are to make one of those top two places.


Watford's heaviest-ever home League defeat (7-1) came at the hands of today's visitors in September 1951.

"Nothing stands out," admits the 23-year-old from Wales. "Obviously I'm trying to get into goalscoring positions as often as possible and more importantly, hitting the target once I'm in

But overall, we do look a more powerful force going forward and are creating more chances - so more are coming my way. Hopefully, I'll overtake my personal record for goals in a season. That was last season, when I got 12 - five for Watford and seven for Oxford.

My role is currently on the right side of attack/midfield, a position I did play in at Oxford. At home, we tend to be on the attack more, while my role is more defensive when we go away.

"But having just won two away games on the trot, the key from now until the end of the season is to win our home games - starting




Then Darren Bazeley beat his full back and crossed hard and low for Rod Thomas to knock it in.











