

YOUTHS IN ACTION





I felt we deserved better at Derby on Sunday. In fact we played better football that we have done in the previous four games. But this time we lost. That's the way football goes.

The first goal we conceded was when we went to sleep at a free-kick. The second was from a penalty.

There is no argument it was a penalty but disappointing that we let in two goals for the first time since January when we lost at Grimsby.

For this game I brought Brian Marwood in from the start and his experience showed clearly. With a bit of luck Brian might have had a couple of goals himself. In fact the Derby goalkeeper brought off three world class saves while Fraser had a lot less to do.

So disappointed as I was with the result I was more than pleased with what I saw out there.

This has been a frustrating time for us. We went to Southend having just lost David and then I injured myself in the warm-up and could not play. Then we had that marvellous result against Newcastle United; went to Luton and didn't play well at all but got a point. We then gained nothing from our trip to the Baseball Ground.

It is like riding a roller coaster. One minute we are being hailed as leading contenders for direct promotion. The next we are looking over our shoulders.



That's how it is at the top. It can change every game.

There are still 10 games to play - 30 points available - so there is a lot of football between now and the final fixture at Barnsley in May.

I'm fortunate that as a player-manager I can still have an effect on some games by playing. I must admit I took a chance on Sunday by coming on for the last 20 minutes to try and influence the eventual outcome.

There was a good chance the calf could have gone again and if it had it would have ruled me out for at least five or six more games. Fortunately I got away with it despite having not trained for 11 days, though I was not able to alter the scoreline.

Still I suffered no reaction and after a couple of days training this week hope to be fit enough to play again this evening against Bristol City.

Local derby games are never easy or predictable. What I can say is that John and I went to Ashton Gate to watch City on Saturday and we were very



impressed. Bristol City played exceptionally well and could have beaten Watford by a bigger margin than 2-1.

When you are in the position City find themselves in at the moment it quite often happens that you don't follow a good performance up with another one. There is a lack of consistency. Hopefully, from our point of view, that will be the case tonight.

We have suffered likewise in recent weeks but this is more down to injuries than anything. After that exhilarating win over Newcastle we needed to back it up with a far better performance than we showed at Luton. I think that was the first game since I came here that we didn't create one single chance!

Yet I am down to my last 13 players - hence my inclusion on the bench last Sunday. I can't level criticism as everyone at the Club has done remarkably well to get us where we are today.

Hopefully the picture will change in the next week. Craig Maskell played in the reserves on Saturday and we are hopeful that Micky Hazard, John Moncur and Kevin Horlock will all be back soon. We really need them to bolster our challenge.

One pleasing development is that the Board have now agreed not to sell any more players. This is a nice positive step and I think it was influenced by that win over Newcastle...

That brought us a little glamour. A packed house, good gate receipts and a wonderful atmosphere it proved a little eye opener. It was a hint of what it could be like here every home game if we climb into the Premier League.

So everyone is going for it now. There's everything to play for tonight.

Tranmere Rovers have put a move for Newcastle United's Kevin Sheedy on ice after signing Middlesbrough midfielder Mark Proctor on loan. Rovers manager John King was looking at a possible move for the Eire International who was given a free transfer by Kevin Keegan had the Proctor deal not materialised.

With the transfer deadline now less than twenty four hours

away, Southend United have turned down offers for Stan Collymore who moved in at Roots Hall from Crystal Palace for just £120,000 earlier in the season. Blackburn last week bid £1 million but were turned down with Southend believing they could secure their ambitious valuation of £2 million.

Newcastle United and West Ham United both dropped valuable points to ensure they keep in the top two places come the end of season. Newcastle of course going down two-one here at The County Ground after taking an interval lead while The Hammers returned pointless from Meadow Land after losing to Notts County by the only goal of the game.

Last week a goal four minutes from time gave struggling Birmingham City three valuable points in the 1-0 win over Sunderland at St. Andrews, Paul Peschisolido netting the winner.


In the Fenland derby Cambridge United took a 2-0 half time lead at The Abbey Stadium through Steve Claridge and Mick Heathcote. Tony Adcock replied for Peterborough United straight after the break and a further goal with three minutes remaining gave Posh a share of the points.

Tranmere Rovers new £350,000 capture from Celtic, Tommy Coyne was unable to find the net in their game last week against Grimsby Town at Blundell Park. With both sides

aiming for a play-off place the gate of 5,686 was somewhat disappointing.

Derby County took to the field at Hillsborough last Wednesday seething at comments directed at them by Sheffield Wednesday boss Trevor Francis who said before the game that his side would not be lambs to the slaughter in the F.A. Cup replay and slammed the battering-ram tactics of their opponents.

This weekend Derby County again leave the action of the Barclays League behind when they take on Cremonese at Wembley Stadium in the final of the Anglo Italian Cup. The players had better be on their best behaviour as the match referee is F.I.F.A. official Joaquin Urio Velasquez from Spain and in a recent Barcelona vs Atletico Madrid encounter Mr Velasquez dismissed four players including three from the Barca side.

Boustol City

Bristol City fans will argue that their need of the points tonight is much greater than ours. Such has been City's fortunes this season they find themselves hovering just above the relegation zone - too close for comfort.

Mind you they did their cause a power of good last week when striker **Nicky Morgan** came in from the cold to head the winning goal at St Andrews in the bottom of the table clash with Birmingham City.

It was only Morgan's second senior game in 12 months, having been drafted into the attack to fill the boots of Andrew Cole; the £1.75 million striker who was making his debut for Newcastle United here at the County Ground.

Whether the 33 year old striker will remain part of City's future remains to be seen. The former West Ham youngster is certainly not happy with his lot at Ashton Gate and remains unsettled.

Morgan's inclusion was not the only change at Birmingham. New boss Russell Osman also brought back flying winger Julian Bent to great effect as City hit the winning trail for the first time in six games.

The departure of Cole, while boosting the bank balance, has also posed a serious problem. The former Arsenal striker had contributed 12 of City's 37 League goals and with this the sum total in 34 First Division games this season the dilemma is obvious.

Naturally Mr Osman wants to invest some of the cash acquired from the sale of Cole on a replacement striker to bolster the contributions of Wayne Allison and Leroy Rosenior.

Talk has linked the likes of Steve Livingstone - who was back in the Blackburn Rovers front-line for last week's two cup ties against Sheffield Wednesday and Sheffield United - Paul Mortimer of Crystal Palace and the headline hitting Efan Ekoku with the club; and with the transfer deadline looming this Thursday some activity might well have transpired before today.

When the season kicked off last August there was no sign of a scoring problem at all. Goals flowed freely as City shared the points with Portsmouth in a six-goal thriller. And on the back of away wins at Luton Town (3-0) and Derby County (4-3), the Ashton Gate club rose to seventh place in the First Division.

It was a 1-0 home defeat inflicted by Southend United that put the skids under City's season. Three days later they were swamped 5-1 by West Ham United at Ashton Gate then lost 5-0 at Newcastle.

Even a courageous 2-1 victory over Premier League Sheffield United in the first-leg of a Coca-Cola Cup tie could not check the slide and by the end of October Bristol City were down to 15th. Wins over Birmingham City and Notts County and a colourful 2-2 draw with us helped stabilise the position but a run of 16 games, which produced just one win, eventually cost manager Denis Smith his job.

The popular Russell Osman was entrusted with team affairs on a




temporary basis but he didn't take long to convince the Board that he was the right man for the job and he has subsequently been officially appointed as the manager.

The former England centre-half has impressed over the past three months and players have been heard to claim that he is a stricter disciplinarian than was Mr Smith. His first objective of course to ensure First Division football as Ashton Gate next season.

Wayne Allison - Striker. Started his career with Halifax Town and soon established himself as a regular scorer with 23 goals in 84 League appearances. Had a short spell with Watford (7 games) before moving to Ashton Gate at the start of the 1990-91 season. A strong running attacker he was top scorer last season with 10 goals in 43 League appearances. Born: Huddersfield 16-10-68.

Mark Aizlewood - Defender. Has been playing League football since making his debut for Newport County, at Darlington on 27th March 1976. Played six years with Luton Town then five with Charlton Athletic before joining Leeds United in 1987. Made 70 League appearances for Leeds before moving on to Bradford City. Cost City £100,000 in August 1990. Capped by Wales 33 times. Born: Newport 1-10-59.

Junior Bent - Winger.
Pacey well balanced attacker who can

go either way. Very popular with the fans but like many flank players lacks consistency. Came into the game with his home town club Huddersfield Town making his debut against Middlesbrough in October 1987 when he was 17. City paid £30,000 for his transfer in March 1990. Born: Huddersfield 1-2-70.

Matt Bryant - Central Defender. A product of the YTS, Matt broke into the first team in the clash at Plymouth in January 1991. Had previously made his League debut that season while on loan with Walsall where he made 13 appearances. Stands 6'1" and is set to make his 99th League appearance tonight. Born: Bristol 21-9-70.

Mark Gavin - Midfield.

Returned to Ashton Gate last season after previously moving to Watford from City as part of the Wayne Allison transfer.

Still only 29 the former Leeds United

apprentice made his debut for the Peacocks v Cambridge in October 1982 - the first of 30 Second Division games for the club. A loan with Hartlepool preceded his transfer to Carlisle in 1986. He spent two years with Bolton, a short time with Rochdale before joining Hearts then Bristol City. Born: Bailleston 10-12-63.

Dariusz 'Jacki' Dziekanowski

Forward. Possibly one of the most gifted forwards in the First Division yet his lack of consistency has meant he has not quite set the game alight as expected when signed from Celtic last season. A Polish International he started his career with Polonia and went on to represent Gwardia, Widzew Lodz and Legia Warsaw before arriving at Celtic. Made 49 Scottish League appearances (10 goals). Has great ball control and balance for a man of six-one. Born: Warsaw 30-9-62.

BRISTOL CITY

Gerald Harrison - Midfielder.

Strong tackling ball-winner who was picked up on a free transfer from Watford in the summer of 1991. Played 10 games for Cardiff City on loan but this season has enjoyed his best run in the City side. Born: Lambeth 15-4-72.

Andy Liewellyn - Fullback. Very popular with the fans and now the longest serving player on City's books he joined the apprentice ranks in 1983. Made his League debut in a 1-1 draw at Millwall (27-10-84); and made his 275th League appearance against West Ham United, in mid-September 1992. A former England Youth cap, he is also a more than useful cricketer having had trials for Gloucester. Born: 26-2-66.

Michael Mellon - Midfield. Formerly with Hearts, Micky joined City when the Scottish Premier Division club released the YTS signing. Became a full professional three years ago. Broke his leg while on loan to Bath City but bounced back last season with 16 League appearances. Born: Paisley 18-3-72.

Nicky Morgan - Striker. A product of the West Ham youth team he made the first of his 21 League appearances for the Hammers v Luton in April 1978. Was transferred to Portsmouth in 1982 scoring 32 goals in 95 League appearances. Arrived at Ashton Gate from Stoke City in March 1990, for £30,000 and has now scored 21 goals in 72 League games. Born: West Ham 30-10-59.

Glenn Pennyfather - Midfield. Joined City on loan from Ipswich in February and returned to Portman Road to play against Sheffield Wednesday in the Premier League a fortnight ago. But City then concluded an £80,000 deal to make the move permanent. Started his career with Southend United and cost Crystal Palace £150,000. After helping them back to Division One he moved to Ipswich for £80,000 in October 1989 but played only 19 first team games for Town. Born: Billericay 11-2-63.

Leroy Rosenior - Striker. Swindon fans will remember Leroy as the man who destroyed us in the FA Cup 4th Round replay with West Ham in 1988-89. A big strong front runner "Sidney" came into League football with Fulham at Leicester in December 1982. In 1985 he moved to QPR for £50,000 then returned to Craven Cottage before a £275,000 transfer to West Ham in

March 1988. Played for Fulham and Charlton on loan before arriving at Ashton Gate a year ago. Bom: Balham 24-8-64.

Martin Scott - Defender.

A £200,000 signing from Rotherham in December 1990, he made his City bow against Sheffield Wednesday that month. Has now clocked up 100 League games for City. Had a loan spell with Nottingham Forest but didn't get a game. Born: Sheffield 7-1-68.

Gary Shelton - Midfield. Former Walsall apprentice who now skippers the City side. Vastly experienced he totted up 222 League games at the highest level with Aston Villa and Sheffield Wednesday - with whom he spent 6-years. Has also turned out for Notts County (loan) and Oxford United, leaving the Manor for City in August 1989, in an exchange deal that took Steve McClaren the other way. Born: Nottingham 21-3-58.

Keith Welch - Goalkeeper. A trainee with Bolton he moved to Rochdale to find first team football in 1987. Kept a clean sheet on his debut v Orient in February 1987. Made 205 League appearances before arriving at Bristol in the summer of 1991. Made his 60th League appearance for City at Watford on Saturday. Born: Bolton 3-10-68.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



Russell Osman became an England international during seven successful years with Ipswich Town during which his central defensive partnership with Terry Butcher was one of the soundest in English football.

Born at Repton 14-2-59, he was an England schoolboy rugby player before signing apprentice forms with Ipswich in 1975. Graduated through the ranks to make his Football debut against Chelsea in September 1977.

Russell played 244 League games for the Suffolk Club (17 goals) and was a member of their 1981 UEFA Cup winning side. Capped by England at Under-21 and "B" levels he went on to win 11 full caps between 1981 and 1984.

In the summer of 1985 he moved to Leicester City for £210,000 and recorded another 108 League games. Southampton then recruited his services and he added another 96 League games to his formidable record before eventually arriving at Ashton Gate in October 1991.

Made 31 League appearances for the Robins last season and is still fully involved. Having started the season as player-coach he was handed the Ashton Gate team affairs for the rest of the season when manager Denis Smith left in mid-January: an appointment which has been amended to full status as City's manager this month.

Those were the days...

... looks back at previous connections with today's visitors

Twenty-three years ago this week, on March 21 1970, an incident-packed encounter took place between the Town and our visitors from Bristol in front of a near 25,000 crowd at Ashton Gate.

Swindon, then managed by former City boss Fred Ford, wasted no time, taking the lead in the eighth minute when Arthur Horsfield headed home and they held on to that lead until the interval. But straight from the whistle signalling the start of the second half, John Galley equalised.

Horsfield struck again in the 57th minute, thumping home a loose ball from close range, but Gerry Sharpe put City on level terms once again ten minutes later. Then the game swung in the home side's favour with fifteen minutes left, when referee John Hunting ruled that the Town's Welsh International full-back Rod Thomas had handled a Galley header that had actually struck the crossbar. Bobby Kellard struck home the penalty. Swindon were not to be denied as, just six minutes from time, a Don Rogers centre was turned past keeper Mike Gibson by his own defender, Ken Wimshurst.

An own goal had presented City a point when the teams met at The County Ground earlier that season. The Town were defending an unbeaten home sequence of fifteen matches when Frank Burrows hit the target - at the wrong end - after 25 minutes. But Horsfield saved his centre-half's blushes with a 72nd minute equaliser.

Horsfield and Galley were key characters when the clubs met again in the following season, 1970/71. In both fixtures, both netted. Galley fired City ahead mid-way through the second-half of the County Ground meeting on November 7, but Horsfield levelled the scores just six minutes later, before Peter Noble popped up with a last-gasp winner.

The Ashton Gate encounter was again in this corresponding week in March, with the 2-1 scoreline being reversed. After a goalless first period, Gerry Gow and Galley put City 2-0 ahead within seven minutes. Horsfield reduced the deficit with a header from a Rogers lofted pass in the 63rd minute.

Yet another March encounter, at Bristol in 1972, saw John Galley grab the only goal to complete a City 'double' over the Town, who also went down 1-0 at The County Ground. Galley left for Forest later that year, being replaced by a certain Bobby Gould - and he bagged his first goal for City in front of their home fans when Swindon visited

Ashton Gate on January 6 1973. Keith Fear and John Emanuel (who was to spend two months on loan at the County Ground in 1975) were the other marksmen as they cruised to a 3-0 win. The Town had managed a 2-1 victory in the opening weeks of that season, thanks to a Steve Peplow brace.

But it was to be Swindon's last success over City for almost ten years. Two former City men, Howard Pritchard and Gary Emmanuel, hit the goals that brought a 3-0 away win in April 1982. The result did neither side any good, however, as both were then on their way down to the Fourth Division.





PLAYER PROFILE

For a lad from Seaham Harbour a victory over Newcastle United is about as close to bliss as one can come; and when it is achieved on a debut the feeling is even more satisfying.

Brian Marwood's appearance against the Magpies was brief - less than 15 minutes - but it felt good and was good for a player who has not tasted first team football for a year.

"I think it was against Southampton a year ago that I played my last game for Sheffield United," reflects Brian who has just left the Bramall Lane club by mutual consent to try and rekindle what has been a highly rewarding career embracing Hull City, Sheffield Wednesday and Arsenal.

It must have been fate that sat Brian down on the same table as Glenn Hoddle at a recent Sportsmans' Dinner. He explains: "It really was a chance meeting. Glenn asked me what I was doing now and when he learned I was available he seemed very interested. He invited me down for a couple of weeks and I'm now here till the end of the season as a non-contract player.

"It was so good to be involved in the game with Newcastle. It was a very important game for both clubs.

"People have told me that the team can play more creatively than they did in this game but this was a game of commitment. Managers will tell you that although ideally they hope for a good performance, at this time of the season the result is of paramount importance.

"We got that against the top team in the Division and without Glenn in the side. I tell you for someone, who as a lad was a Sunderland supporter, it was a double edged sword of victory.

"Having trained with the lads and now played with them I am very impressed. It is a very flexible system the team adopts with all players given a relative amount of freedom to express their own creative and attacking instincts.

"I think Glenn sees me as a midfield player in a 5-3-2 formation and is obviously looking to my experience."

Brian, who made his League debut for Hull City against Mansfield Town 13 years ago, is now 33 so he obviously does not subscribe to the theory that this is now a young man's sport?

"Definitely not," he responds. "The game is not all about pace and power. It is very refreshing that Swindon play a constructive passing game. It is good to watch and certainly good to play in.

"Swindon are a great credit to the Football League and from what I have seen the quality of the play in the First Division overall is excellent. There has been a lot of criticism about the standard in the Premier League this season, and a lot of it is justified, but in the First Division they have managed to keep the flag flying for good football.

"I don't think I'm too old. When I see people like Ray Wilkins, Gordon Strachan and Peter Reid contributing so much I know that there are a lot of senior players around that can do a good job ... I see myself going on for at least another couple of years.

"It is not all about running all over the field. When you are young, green and nieve, you tend to do a lot of unnecessary scurrying about. Experience makes you more frugal with your energy but better in judgement.

"Glenn looks quite well on it.

"There is a greater emphasis now on diet and fitness and I suppose the accepted average life-span of a footballer is six to nine years. But I am sure a lot of players retire before they should and then regret it when there is no coming back

"There is a train of thought that when you get to a certain age that is it. I have spoken to a lot who have since regreted hanging their boots up when they did. Most were conditioned to believing it was the age for retirement.

"One thing that does worry me is the importance being put on pace and power at some clubs. The change in the rules has helped this doctrine which could damage the long-term prospects of the game.


"We certainly need more teams like Swindon to attract people to games and in this respect the First Division seems to be doing a good job.

"I have always considered myself as a player who provides a service to other players and think my style will be better suited to Swindon's game than it was to Sheffield United's. There was no animosity between Dave Bassett and I; in fact I have a lot of respect for him and learned a great deal from his style of management. But I wasn't really suited to his game.

"It is always disappointing when you don't fit in because you always want to do well. Hopefully this chance will help me resurrect my career."

It is some career too for the current Chairman of the PFA. Brian made 158 League appearances for his first club Hull City and added another 128 League games in four years with Sheffield Wednesday. He was Arsenal's third highest scorer as he helped them clinch the Championship in 1989; then came Sheffield United where he was limited to 22 League outings and three for Middlesbrough on loan.

He has arrived at the County Ground at a very exciting time and says: "Hopefully Swindon can remain successful. This is a time to enjoy not a time to fear. If we can remain positive I'm sure the team will get its reward."

The big showdown with Newcastle United certainly generated a lot of column inches in the papers with most

highlighting Kevin Keegan's criticism of our physical approach.

I must say that I found Kevin's reaction surprising. For though both teams were fully committed and the physical aspects tended to overshadow the aesthetic side of the game there was very little that could be construed as blatantly dirty.

Sure there were mis-timed tackles particularly early in the play before the players had settled - but in most cases they were committed by players whose qualities are not best suited to defending and were simply mis-judged as opposed to blatantly trying to maime.

Kevin of course was caught up in the emotion of the game he dearly wanted to win. The same can't be said of Bob Driscoll, whose report in The Daily Star seemed highly coloured.

Bob claimed that Glenn Hoddle has: "Created the dirtiest team of the 90's"

He went on: "Certainly, I've not seen a side so blatantly bully and cheat their way to victory as Hoddle's Swindon did against Kevin Keegan's Newcastle.

"So crude are Hoddle's mob, that when they arrive in the Premier League as expected next season, they'll make Wimbledon's much maligned Crazy Gang seem like smiling pacifists."

Rousing rhetoric - but really was that how Bob saw the game?

One of 'Hoddles Mob', that afternoon was Brian Marwood the Chairman of the Professional Footballer's Association. He certainly didn't see anything that would be 'detrimental' to the game. He claimed: "Because of the nature of the game it was always going to be a very quick passionate affair. That's how it turned out. I couldn't believe some of some of the criticisms levelled against us."

When after the game I mentioned to skipper Colin Calderwood about Newcastle's objection to the second goal because Steve White had handled the ball his immediate reaction was a sort of stunned silence.

A grin of disbelief then filled his face before he retorted "So what ... I just can't believe that. Chalkie was being pulled back anyway and the incident only led to a corner ... Clark did exactly the same thing at the other end and got a shot in on goal. If that had gone in I bet there wouldn't have been any complaints."

Talking of Brian Marwood this is a very busy time for him as Chairman of the PFA. Because of their annual dinner next week he will miss the little break the lads are having in Spain but though he is engrossed in his role as Chairman of the players union he insists it does not interfere with hls role here.



Says Brian: "No way does it interfere with my job. I am first and foremost a player and that comes first every time.

"It has been an interesting time for me though. We had the battle over the Premier League and we are now being recognised as a very successful organisation.

"The big plus for us is that we are not politically motivated so we are able to contribute a positive response to the decision making in the game."

Brian has followed in the footsteps of Jimmy Hill, Terry Neil and Garth Crooks, his quiet diplomacy earning the respect of all administrators in the game.

Mr Lamont's Budget was hardly noticed in the Hamon household last week. The big news of the day was that Swindon Town manager Glenn Hoddle had offered young Chris a professional contract.

"Brilliant ... absolutely brilliant," bearned Chris, a young striker who until recently didn't have enough confidence in his own ability.

Born and bred in Jersey, football was always in his blood but after seemingly failing the grade when he was 17 Chris was never sure he had what it takes to make a professional player.

He says: "Time seemed to be passing me by. I came to England for a trial with Coventry City when I was 17 but didn't even get a game. I spent a week with them under youth team manager Micky Coop but didn't seem to make any impression.

"It was a case of don't ring us we'll ring you kind of thing. He said to keep going that was all."

Chris returned to the Channel Islands convinced he had to forge another career. He had a spell as a conveyancing clerk; became a glazier, a drayman; drove a van delivering wine; was a cleaner then a builders labourer.

He says: "I had so many different jobs I can't remember them all ... What I do know is that Glenn has offered me a two-year contract which will make this the longest job I've ever had."

Whilst Chris was going through the

entire Jersey employment syndrome he continued to play football for fun at the weekends; smashing in goals at an astonishing rate.

"I played for St. Peter, Jersey," he says. It is all amateur football over there.

"Because of this there are not many opportunities to be spotted. There are so few teams we only played 16 League games a season so if you are reasonably good you can look a very good player out there."

As it happens Chris proved to be the best, picking up the Island's 'Footballer of the Year Award' in 1990-91. This is a much coveted trophy similar to the PFA awards here in as much as the votes are cast by the managers and players of all the teams involved in the major League.

There is nothing like recognition from your own peers.

Chris also helped St. Peter, who are managed by former Spurs player Chris Jones, to a Le Riche Cup Final victory and to runners-up spot in the League.

It was Jones, who recommended Chris to Glenn Hoddle.

"I was delighted to get the opportunity," claims Chris. "I was working, or rather hiding, on a building site at the time. Chris sorted it out with Glenn and I came over at the end of our season last year.

"At 21 I knew this was it. Either make or break. It was a nice place Swindon and the lads were friendly but the first impression was of the pace of the game here. It was a lot lot faster than I had anticipated.

"I had trouble adjusting and what with injuries and things didn't think I was going to make it. It was a good six months before I really came to terms with it all and started to make headway.

"The hardest part was getting myself to believe that I was really good enough and it was only just recently that things seem to have turned round and I seem to have come to grips with it all.

"I've sweated all year on this one wondering if I would be accepted."

In the meantime Chris had taken an examination for entry into the Jersey Fire Brigade and passed with flying colours. He heard news that there could be two vacancies for young fire recruits coming up in the summer and was mentally attuning himself to such a career.

"I was supposed to get Glenn's decision last week," points out Chris, "but things came up and he wasn't here ... Then it was to be on Friday. That fell through as well because Glenn was injured so it went to the next week."

It was probably the longest week-end of his life but when the summons came to go to the managers room the words were music to Chris's ears. He was offered, and grabbed, a two-year contract.

His mother dropped the phone, she was so excited, when Chris rang through the good news but maintaining a level head he cautions; "This is only the beginning. There is a long way to go now. A lot of hard work to do."

It beats putting our fires none the less and if Chris can fulfil his promise he could scorch a few top class defenders in the coming years.

What is wrong? The brutal truth is that the Club do not have the money to finance the Board's ambitions. Why not? For many years now the costs of running the Club have not been met by income. The gap (over £1 million per annum now) has to be met by bank borrowing, directors loans and guarantees, the patience of our creditors and the sale of players.

The Board have explored, and continue to explore, all possible methods to raise more funds. So far they have failed - hence the departure of David Kerslake. If there are any supporters who feel they could help, please come and see us. The Board, as well as the players, need your support.

We have the same feelings of frustration and disappointment as the rest of you.




