THE MANAGERIAL MERRY-GO-ROUND

With the new football season less than a fortnight old we have experienced the first managerial casualty. Manchester City sacked Player/Manager Peter Reid on Thursday morning after just four Premiership matches.

The Blues of Manchester have made an inauspicious start to their campaign, collecting just one point from four games, but if that is the length of time Managers have to get everything right then there will be a lot of Managerial changes in the weeks ahead.

A quick glance at the bottom three of the Premier League after four games last season showed Wimbledon, Tottenham and Southampton propping up the table. No panic measures there as Joe Kinnear, Doug Livermore and Ian Branfoot eventually led their respective Clubs to the relative safety of twelfth, eighth and eighteenth positions at the season's end.

Any number of factors can influence a team's form, especially in the early weeks of a season. Away defeats at Tottenham and Everton, both of whom have made impressive starts to the campaign cannot have been the catalyst for Reid's sacking, neither can a home draw with Leeds. Therefore if results were the reason for such a drastic course of action, this week's home defeat by Blackburn must be examined closely. The absence through injury of Niall Quinn and Mike Sheron at various times did not help Reid's cause.

It is probable that there were many other, as yet hidden, factors in Chairman Peter Swales' decision. It is no secret that during the summer months Reid was frustrated in his attempts to add to his squad at Maine Road. He lost out in bids for Geoff Thomas, Andy Townsend and Paul Stewart as he strove to bring quality players to the Club he was trying to re-establish amongst the giants of English football.

The writing was on the wall for Reid last week when the Club appointed former sports journalist John Maddock as General Manager, with a brief to liaise over team policy and transfer matters, thus blocking Reid's direct link with his Chairman.

Hopefully the full details of the sacking will emerge in due course and Manchester City will not hide behind the odd excuse of poor form after just four games.



Having achieved two excellent away victories at Blackburn and Leeds it was imperative that we followed them up with a home win over Ipswich. We knew it was going to be difficult as they had started the season so well and I was harder for the points, which despite more than satisfied with our 1-0 win in a tight match.

It was pleasing to see Jerry Goss continue his 'scoring streak' and with a bit of luck we could have scored two or three more. Their keeper made a couple of good saves from Ian Crook and Ruel Fox, whilst Mark Robins struck the underside of the bar. He seems to do everything but score at the moment. Jerry's goal was not quite as spectacular as the one at Leeds but he started and finished a sweet move which certainly gave me just as much pleasure.

I am sure that their results and the goals they have conceded do not tell the whole story behind their performances, and knowing John Gorman as I do, I am certain he is doing his utmost to put things right as quickly as possible.

It is important from Norwich City's point of view that Swindon's improvement does not start here at Carrow Road today. It would be

very easy for us to allow some complacency to creep in following our last three results. However, we are all well aware of the task in hand and we must approach this game with exactly the same attitude as we did for the four big matches we have already completed. If we aspire to repeat our achievements of last season we know that there is no room for error and that we must instill consistency into our performances.


Reluctant as I am to think too much about Europe at this early stage of the season when we are in the middle of some very important league matches, it cannot be forgotten. Representatives of Vitesse Arnhem were at the Ipswich game on Wednesday, when I trust they did not learn too much. 


One thing is for certain – it is only a matter of time before Robbo hits the goal trail again.

Turning the tables on Ipswich Town in midweek brought a lot of satisfaction to everyone at the Club. In contrast to last season, we made it very difficult for them to break us down and they probably only had a couple of clear-cut chances throughout the 90 minutes.

To be honest, while it's always nice to produce good football and win in style, I felt this was one match where victory was more important than the way we played.

Local derbies are never the best of games for the purists and, having been beaten by the "old enemy" twice last season, we felt we owed it to the fans to give them the result for which they have waited so long.

As usual against Town, it was a tight, tense

affair with tackles flying in but - considering the extremely wet and slippery conditions - it was hard but fair and I was pleased there were no bookings on either side.

Ipswich are still a good side; they knocked the ball around well and they will beat plenty of good teams this season, but we got men behind the ball, defended well and kept our second successive clean sheet - something we did not do too often last season.

Everyone deserves praise for that, because it is a team effort when you attack and it is a team effort when you defend. The system we are using probably allows us to get more men behind the ball and, although we may concede a little more possession to the opposition especially in the full back areas - teams are finding it very difficult to get through us.

We have scored eight goals in the last three games and now have nine points out of twelve following a start which I feel has been even tougher than last season's opening four-match sequence.

Most supporters would probably have settled for five or six points from those games, so the self-belief amongst the players at the moment is obvious.

What we need to be careful of this afternoon is not to step across the thin dividing line between confidence and complacency.

Today we are expected to win - and that could be a danger in itself because it is such a change from the other games. We probably were not expected to get results against Manchester United, Blackburn or Leeds - and

some people might not have expected us to against Ipswich either - but the match against Swindon is a very different matter.

They are struggling at the bottom of the table and have conceded ten goals in the last two games, while we are third in the table. If we go out with the attitude that we only have to turn up to beat Swindon we could be in trouble.

I do not think though there is any real danger of that happening, however. We will be approaching this game in the same way as we would be preparing for a game against the Champions, because on the day every side in the Premiership is capable of beating any


Swindon will, no doubt, attempt to tighten up and it could be that we will find them hard to break down.

Having said that, we are full of confidence at the moment and we will be looking for a positive attitude to give the Premiership newcomers a thoroughly testing time.

It was good to see Jeremy Goss doubling his league goals tally for last season within the first four matches of this campaign. We have to look for more goals from midfield and defence to take a little pressure off the strikers - and we will be looking for more of the same this afternoon.

"The Championship matches start

in September when we have to play in Romania, so it's good to get the call at this stage," said Jamie before he joined the squad last weekend.

"I've been on training sessions with the Youth squad before but never actually played a game. I went on a trials at Schoolboy level and got through to the last 40, so this is a big break for me," says the Bristol lad who joined Norwich after impressing in the Canaries' Youth Tournament as a 15-year-old.

The call-up was quickly followed by a three-goal blitz in the Reserves' remarkable 5-0 success at Arsenal.

"I wanted to make a good start to my first full season as a professional, but to score a hat-trick at Highbury was unbelievable.

PRICE WAR

The recent case of a Beazer Homes League Club asking a phenomenal £200,000 for a player with no experience of anything remotely approaching top level soccer, has highlighted the problems being faced by ambitious Premiership clubs.

While transfer fees have rocketed among the elite, the minnows have taken a leaf out of their richer cousins' book – and that, in part at least, explains why the Canaries have not made as many recent signings as they might have hoped.

Experienced top-flight players who could come straight into the First Team have been priced out of the market.

"It would cost us £2 million to get the sort of players I want," says Mike Walker. "People are starting to ask stupid prices for players at the top level. Players are going for £4 million and they are simply not worth it.

"If other people are prepared to pay that, then fine . . but we're not and I don't think it's the right thing to do.




NEW TELEPHONE NUMBERS

FOCUS ON EUROPE

EUROPE AWAITS THE ITALIAN DOMINANCE

With just over two weeks to go before the Canaries take on their first European opponents, today we will be taking a look at the team seeded 4th in this season's UEFA Cup competition and also at the success in Europe of the teams league in which they compete.

Inter Milan practically spent the whole of last season chasing arch rivals AC Milan for the honours at the top of the Italian Serie A. Despite a few lapses in league matches by AC Milan, nearing the end of the season, Inter could still not regain the title from their local rivals AC Milan, the more glamorous and successful of the two Milanese giants. However last season's second placing was a vast improvement on their sixth place finish of the previous year.

Over the past two seasons many changes have taken place at the club, after the loss of three of their most influential players at the end of their 1991-92 campaign, when their German trio of Lothar Matthaus, Andreas Brehme and Jurgen Klinsmann all went their separate ways. The club brought in many new less experienced players, to try to replace the missing links in the team that the three German internationals had left behind.

Because of their low league placing at the end of the 1991-92 season, they did not qualify for any of the European Cups. That gave the new members of the team an ideal opportunity to get to grips with domestic football, in arguably the most glamorous and successful league in the world. A second place finish in Serie A was nothing less than

outstanding for a squad that had only been reconstructed during the season.

The last time that Inter won a European trophy was during their last outing in Europe, back in 1991 when they lifted the UEFA Cup. Their previous success in both European and domestic competitions is remarkable, thirteen league titles along with two European Cup victories and their single UEFA Cup triumph, surely makes them one of the most experienced sides in this season's competition. They could prove to be another major threat to this season's favourites, fellow Italians, Iuventus.

Indeed this season would not be the first to produce an all Italian final in the UEFA Cup. Both Juventus and Inter have previously competed in such a match. Inter's last victory in the UEFA Cup was achieved in the final against Italian side Roma in 1991 while Juventus saw off the Fiorentina challenge the previous year. During recent years Italy has seen more

European cups return to their country than any other European league. They have also achieved the honour of being the only country to succeed in the unique treble of all three European trophies during the same season. This occurred back in 1990, when AC Milan beat Portugese champions Benfica to retain the European Cup, Sampdoria saw off Belgian Cup winners Anderlecht and Juventus completed the treble against fellow Italians Fiorentina. Last season they also looked to be heading towards another European treble, with three Italian sides making the finals. Although Juventus overcame German club Borussia Dortmund in outstanding style and Parma made the trip to Wembley and achieved their first European honour against Belgian Cup winners Antwerp, the favourites to once again hold up the European Cup and complete Italy's second unique treble, AC Milan, failed. French Champions Marseille denied the Milanese club the honours and certainly this season the one team that Milan will not want to meet during the early rounds of the European Cup will surely be Olympique Marseille.

The Italian club sides have taken six of the last twelve European trophies on offer; it would not be surprising if their entries in this season's competitions go on and increase their total to nine. Maybe it could come down to Norwich City to put an end to the Italian dominance within Europe and bring back the early 80's success of the English club's in Europe.

CONNECTIONS

This is the first league meeting between the Canaries and the Robins since April 1972, and it is the first ever in the top flight.

However the two clubs have followed similar paths throughout their respective histories. They were regular opponents in the Southern League in the 1900's before both clubs joined the Football League as founder members of Division Three. Apart from City's brief flirtation with Division Two between 1934 and 1939 the teams faced each other in every season until 1960-61. In more recent years Norwich have established themselves as a First Division/Premier League side whilst Swindon are now enjoying their first ever season in the top division.

Way back in 1908 Świndon inflicted the Canaries' heaviest ever defeat, beating them 10-2 in a Southern League clash at Swindon. Trailing 6-1 at half time, Norwich never stood a chance, and that remains the only occasion when the Club has ever conceded double

figures.

One of English football's greatest ever goalscorers represented Norwich and Swindon in the 1950's and 1960's. Ralph Hunt played 124 league games for Norwich scoring 67 goals before moving on to several other clubs including a brief stay at Swindon. His record of 31 league goals in the 1955/56 season for Norwich is unlikely to ever be beaten. Ralph unfortunately died in a car crash at the relatively young age of 31 whilst still playing for Chesterfield. His overall

How Swindon Town's 74 League





SPOTLIGHT ON . . .



IAN CULVERHOUSE

The ability to react well under pressure and overcome tension is just as important as the more obvious gifts of strength and skill to a truly accomplished top level defender.

Over the years, no-one has demonstrated those attributes more consistently than right-back turned sweeper, Ian Culverhouse.

On the field, he is the picture of relaxed concentration – making telling interceptions and clean, incisive tackles to defuse the most dangerous of situations – and his delight in turning desperate defence into

exciting attack is as refreshing now as it was when he first came to Carrow Road nine seasons ago.

Off the field, it is equally important to be able to "switch off" in order to recharge the batteries for the next challenge ahead.

And, as he approaches his 29th birthday, the Essex-born player reckons he has found the perfect key to putting match-day pressures to the back of the mind – by indulging in an altogether less exhausting sport.

"I've been playing quite a bit of golf during the summer break," he says. My wife (Sue) has taken it up now, so I like to keep her company – there are no free afternoons these days!

"Most of the players belong to the Barnham Broom Golf Club and we live near the Sprowston Park course, so we pop over there quite a bit too.

"The lads play quite a few competitions among themselves – and, without naming any names, there are a few 'bandits' floating about I can tell you.

"Whenever we have a day off we tend to get together and battle against our handicaps. It's so relaxing, it takes your mind off things and helps improve your concentration."

Over the years many soccer stars have grown to love the pastime. Indeed, Kevin Keegan became a regular on televised pro-celebrity events, despite at one stage being banned from playing the game by Liverpool supremo Bill Shankly.

Shankly felt that constantly trudging the links and parkland fairways would seriously weaken the legs of his all-conquering stars – not a theory to which Ian Culverhouse would subscribe.

"You couldn't argue with Bill Shankly, but we try to get the games in during the early part of the week, playing either on a Tuesday or Wednesday if possible, and I've never noticed it having an adverse effect," he says.


Premiership players certainly need an aid to relaxation with matches coming thick and fast in the early weeks of the new campaign. Some players find it too heavy a load, but the hectic schedule is welcomed by Ian.

"It's virtually Saturday, Wednesday every week early on, but I think the lads prefer it that way because it breaks up the training routine and there's nothing like actual match fitness to bring you to your peak."

Maintaining that level of performance will be more important than ever to Ian this season. His contract comes up for renewal at the end of the campaign and he is determined to show he has plenty to offer in the years ahead.

Judging by his past consistency, he should have few worries on that

score. He missed only one Premier League game last season and is among the first names pencilled on the team sheet every week, but he refuses to take anything for granted.

"It's up to the Manager, but I'll be looking to go in and see him some time during the season to see where I stand. It's up to me to prove that I'm worth a new contract."

The ability to act as sweeper in a formation which is gradually becoming more popular in the English game should help him fulfil that ambition.

"The Manager's tried different systems in pre-season, but whichever one he decides upon I'm just happy to be involved," he says.

"It basically involves the same skills as playing at full-back, although you do need to do a little more talking and organising people. But everyone in the back four helps each other out in any case, so that's not a problem.

"There's no great mystery to it I think any of us could go back there and do the job well."

Whatever his position, Ian is anticipating this season's challenge to be tougher than ever.

"We all realise it's going to be hard. We are under no illusions that we're in for an easy season, because the surprise element has gone and the opposition knows what to expect from us.

"But there is still an air of confidence at the club, and if we can get off to a reasonable start I'm sure we can do well.

"There's no-one we should be scared of and a lot of teams will be wary of us now; we know we can't afford to rest on our laurels and have a lot to prove this season."

European soccer is part of Norwich City's season for the first time – a challenge which holds its risks as well as its attractions.

"The warnings are there for us" says Ian. "We only have to look at Leeds' example last season when European competition seemed to take their minds off the Championship and they had a relatively poor season.

"We have to be careful not to fall into that trap and the management here are very keen to make sure we keep our minds focussed on the job in hand."



JOHNNY WRIGHT

Two weeks ago City trainee Johnny Wright took another significant step towards the possibility of establishing himself in professional football, making his debut in the Northern Ireland youth international team.

Not that playing for his country was a totally new experience for the 17 year old defender from Belfast. As a schoolboy, he earned no less than ten Under-16 caps for Northern Ireland!

Johnny had to miss the opening two City youth fixtures because of his Irish commitments, but he returned for last Saturday's 4-2 South East Counties League victory over Southend United at Trowse and Wednesday's 2-2 Southern Junior Floodlit Cup-tie against Portsmouth at Diss.

He had two games for Ireland, performing at right back on both. occasions - against Bellorussia at Ballyclare and Lithuania at Carrickfergus. "We went 1-0 up against Bellorussia, and should have killed them off, but we let them back into the game with an equaliser and finished drawing 1-1", comments Johnny.

And the game against Lithuania also ended in a draw, 0-0. We should have beaten them too. Now we hope Bellorussia and Lithuania draw when they play each other to stand any chance of progressing to the U.E.F.A. Youth Championship Finals in Spain next summer.", he adds ruefully. Reflecting on the two youth internationals, Johnny says: "It was a valuable experience. Both Bellorussia and Lithuania were more skilful and sharper on the ball than us. Most of our lads were trainees' with mainland Clubs like Glasgow Rangers and Southampton - and our main asset was our physical strength." A 'discovery' of City's Irish scout Peter Greer, Johnny became a trainee

Greer, Johnny became a trainee professional just over thirteen months ago, and is now focusing his attention on progressing through the ranks at Carrow Road.

Injuries forced him to miss about three months' action last season - including the epic two-legged F.A. Youth Cup Semi-Final against Leeds United.

"I want to make up lost time and try to earn a place in the Reserves as quickly as possible," he stresses.

"In the meantime, I'm obviously anxious to do well for the youth team, especially in the Cups.

"And ultimately, my aim is to convince Mike Walker I'm worth a full professional contract at the end of the season."







MY MOST MEMORABLE MATCH



Duncan Forbes has a special place in the hearts of all Norwich City supporters. After joining the Canaries in October 1968 as a utility player, he quickly impressed the fans with his enthusiasm and commitment to the game. Ron Saunders made him captain and his leadership qualities helped guide the Club through an historic era as First Division football was brought to Carrow Road for the first time, and Wembley was reached on two occasions.

After hanging his boots up, Duncan joined the Commercial Department as Shop Manager and Sales Manager before his old defensive partner, Dave Stringer, appointed him as Chief Scout in 1987, a role he still fulfils today.


Duncan looks back to April 22nd 1972 to recall the most memorable match of his long career.

'It was the last home match of the 1971-72 Second Division Championship winning season against Swindon. We had lost at Middlesbrough the previous week and there were plenty of nerves in the camp. I had scored the only goal in our previous home match against Sheffield Wednesday and was able to repeat that feat in this match. It had been a pretty uninspiring match until my 'classic' header just before halftime'.

Without any prompting Duncan recalls the build up.

'We had a corner which was only partially cleared out to our left flank; I stayed up in attack, Graham Paddon delivered a perfect cross and my header rocketed into the top left hand corner. No goalkeeper in the world would have saved it!'

Duncan cannot be modest about his goalscoring exploits but there can be no underestimating the importance of this particular strike which set City up for their final two games of the season at Orient and Watford. It is history now that first promotion and then the Championship were won in a period of eight days which Duncan recalls with great pride.

'The victory against Swindon was vital, it set up the thrilling finale to the season at Orient and Watford. Very few players within our squad had any First Division

experience and we all desperately wanted to play in it. When I arrived at Norwich there was no telling how my career would take off. I was lucky to be in the right place at the right time as Norwich made great steps forward as a Club'.

With so many historic moments to choose from, maybe it is slightly surprising that this match with Swindon was the one Duncan selected without hesitation as his most memorable.


'Obviously the Wembley finals stick in the mind, but defeats in both games takes the shine off those occasions. I will always remember the League Cup quarter final at Highbury in 1972-73 when Graham Paddon scored a hat-trick in our 3-0 win. It isn't really the win I remember, but the injury I sustained in the process. I cracked a rib which in turn punctured my lung; I was taken to hospital in an ambulance and spent a few days in Holloway Hospital'.


One of Duncan's jobs after retiring from the game was to set up Club Canary, Norwich's successful travel club, a role which led to him seeing almost every match for six seasons.

I enjoy watching football, but my most memorable day for Club Canary was our F.A. Cup quarter final at Brighton in 1983. We lost 1-0, an instantly forgettable match, but the organisation of about 2,000 fans kept me busy.

At Brighton railway station after the game, one of our three trains left for Norwich virtually empty which meant that we had to fit three trainloads of people into the two remaining trains. That was a real headache and it still haunts me!

Duncan, an adopted son of Norfolk, is still extremely popular and in demand for various functions around the county which proves just how much of a local institution he has become.


