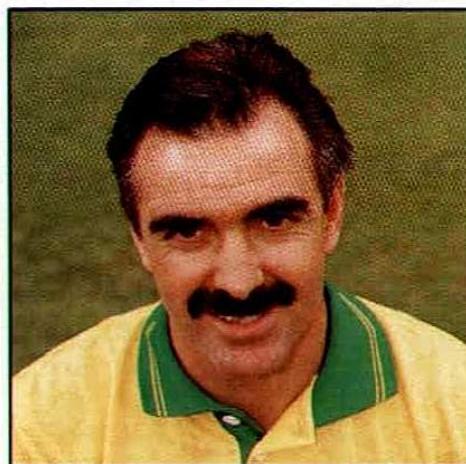

What can I say? We are rooted at the foot of the Premier League table yet we are far from being in a position to succumb to the blues! Indeed, the spirit in the camp is vibrant.

The quality is still here, we have shown that in our performances if not by our results. We are all confident we can pull things around.

We were given a big boost on Monday when for the first time since the season started we had all 18 senior players involved in training. Even just one senior pro out through injury makes a difference when you are working with a small squad like ours.

It is good to have people of the calibre of Paul Bodin back in harness. Paul was injured in Finland in pre-season and it has taken some time for him to get completely fit. It was unfortunate for him that he returned just a week or so too late to be included in the Welsh team for their important World Cup tie last week.

When we have the likes of Paul back, and he should be in the side this afternoon, we have the makings of a very good club.

Young Kevin Horlock has been outstanding as Paul's replacement and there is no doubt his time will come. In fact with Kevin, Nicky Summerbee and Adrian Whitbread, we have three tremendously gifted young players.

As you know we have also signed Terry Fenwick and welcome him to the County Ground for his first home match today. Terry is a very experienced player with an international pedigree and when he came on at West Ham last Saturday went out and did exactly the job he was asked to do. I'm sure he will be a great asset to the club.

After our early setbacks we seemed to get it right at Norwich where we possibly deserved more than a share of the points. Having kept a clean-sheet at Carrow Road we played the same formation here against Manchester City and looked for an hour as if we were going to secure our first win of the season.

I thought we controlled the game at 1-0 but for some reason we then tried to hold that advantage instead of going out to increase it. For an hour we were spot-on then we lost it.

The improvement at West Ham was there for all to see. There is no doubt we produced some of our best football this season at Upton Park. We were the better side and played some unbelievable football.

Even Billy Bonds was gracious enough afterwards to say that we "murdered them for thirty-minutes" yet we were again unable to turn our superiority into goals.

It will come. We are learning all the while and seem to be getting better each game. Hopefully that important first win will materialise today.

Newcastle have certainly taken the game by storm and we must congratulate Kevin and his assistants on their success. They won the First Division in style last season and did a magnificent job.

What is so pleasing is that Kevin's success has been a success for football. His philosophy on the game is much the same as ours which means we have the ingredients here for a great match this afternoon.

We hope you enjoy it. The lads have been knocked out by your tremendous support and are so eager to repay you with a home win.

Quick Departure

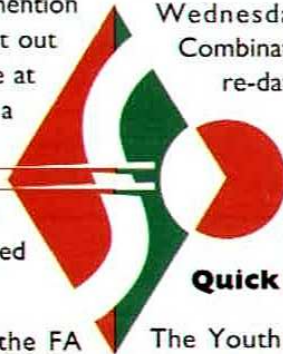

Dangerous Practice

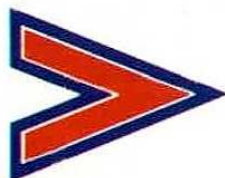

The Visitors

Resurgent Newcastle look the part - by John Nolan

Kevin Keegan's team cruised to promotion last season, leading the First Division from the first to the last week. It was an impressive comeback and their return to the big time has generated an enthusiasm on Tyneside that has to be experienced to be appreciated.

Season Ticket sales generated £8-million and some of that money has been invested in strengthening the side even further, the most notable acquisition being the signing of former Liverpool and England star Peter Beardsley.

Alas, Beardsley still awaits his comeback match after having had his jaw shattered in three places by Neil Ruddock in a pre-season "friendly" with his former Liverpool colleagues. Keegan wasted no time recruiting a replacement, £300,000 tempting Millwall to part with Malcolm Allen.

Keegan is determined to create a Liverpool style empire on Tyneside. It won't happen overnight, it will be a gradual progress, but the foundations are now being laid.

The passion is contagious. The build-up to the opening game of the season against Spurs, managed by former Town boss Ossie Ardiles, who was sacked by Newcastle in 1991-92, began the day the fixtures were released. Ossie went home smiling after Spurs had won 1-0 but Keegan could well have the last laugh.

They love their heroes at St James' Park and Andy Cole looks like joining the Newcastle hall of fame. His pace and finishing looks certain to make him one of the top strikers in the Premiership.

Malcolm Allen - Striker. Snapped up from Millwall for £300,000 on the eve of the season's start as a replacement for the injured Beardsley. Looks twice the player he did at the Den and has forged a good understanding with hit-man Andrew Cole. Started his career with Watford and had a spell on loan with Aston Villa before Norwich stepped in and signed him in 1988. Malcolm played just 35 League games (8 goals) for the Canaries before joining the Lions, in a £400,000 deal, in March 1990. Capped 13 times by Wales he could soon be back in international reckoning. Born: Deiniolen 21-3-67.

John Beresford - Fullback. Signed from Portsmouth in July 1992 for £650,000, after a proposed move to Liverpool fell through on medical grounds. Started his career with Manchester City who gave him a free move to Barnsley in 1986 with whom he made his League debut. Three years later Portsmouth paid £300,000 for his services. An

England Youth International, John was put on standby for the full England squad last season... Scored a debut League goal in the 6-0 win over Barnsley, in April 1993. Born: Sheffield 4-9-66.

Paul Bracewell - Midfield. The first of Keegan's signings in the summer of 1992, a tribunal set the fee of £250,000 for the out of contract Sunderland star. Had just made his fourth FA Cup Final appearance with the Rokerites. It was his second spell with Sunderland after service with Stoke City and Everton with whom he won Championship; FA Cup and European Cup Winner's Cup medals. A strong tackling midfield general who would have made more than his three appearances for England (1985-88) had not serious injury intervened. Born: Stoke 19-7-62.

Lee Clark - Midfield. Still only 20, but already being hailed on Tyneside as the "new Gazza". A former England Schoolboy captain he relishes responsibility and was the Magpies only ever present last season - when he picked up a string of Player of

the Year Awards. Was just 17 when he made his League debut, at Bristol City, in September 1990 and made the England Under-21 team in Toulon in the summer of 1992. A hard working play-maker who is destined for great things. Born: Wallsend 10-10-72.

Andrew Cole - Striker. A former pupil at the GM FA School of Excellence he spent six years at Highbury but made only two senior appearances for Arsenal in the last six-minutes of the League game with Sheffield United in 1990-91 and in the Charity Shield game with Spurs. Bristol City shelled out a club record £500,000 for him in the summer of 1992 and he had registered 17 goals for them by the time Keegan swooped in with a cheque for a £1.75-million in March 1993 - making him the club's most expensive buy ever. Made his Magpies debut at Swindon and scored 12 goals in 11 starts for the Geordies - including a hat-trick against Leicester on the final day of last season...his quick-feet and blistering pace has already made an impact on the Premiership and Kevin Keegan is tipping Andrew for full England honours. Has played for England of course at Schoolboy, Youth and Under-21 levels. Born: Nottingham 15-10-71.

Stephen Howey - Central Defender. A product of the YTS Steve was a prolific scorer in youth and

reserve team football but was not able to reproduce that form in the senior grade. Made his League debut, as a sub, at Old Trafford in May 1989, but started only four games in two years after that. It was after Keegan switched him to centre-back, just over a year ago, that he made an impression and he made 52 appearances in this role last season forcing his way into the England Under-21 squad. Born: Sunderland 26-11-71.

Robert Lee - Forward. A West Ham United fan as a youngster he was a turnstile operator at Charlton Athletic when the Valiants spotted him playing for ABTA. Made his League debut for them against Grimsby Town, in March 1984, and developed into an England Under-21 International. Played in excess of 250 games for Charlton before moving to Newcastle in a £700,000 deal in September 1992. Plays up front on the right. Scored 12 goals for the Magpies last season. Born: West Ham 1-2-66.

Alan Neilson - Defender. Became a YTS trainee after asking for a trial because his grandfather was a Newcastle United fan. A versatile performer he provides cover for every defensive position and last season made six appearances. Still yet to establish himself in the Newcastle side but is a regular in the Welsh Under-21 side. Born: Wegburg 26-9-72.

Newcastle United ABC

Liam O'Brien - Midfield. Stylish operator who loves to carry the ball to the opposition. Scored seven vital goals last season - most of them spectacular efforts from long range. Began his career with Dublin side Bohemians and was with Shamrock Rovers when Manchester United snapped him up in 1986. Made his League bow v Leicester City in December 1986 and made 31 League appearances for the Red Devils. Newcastle signed him in 1988 for £250,000. Republic of Ireland International. Born: Dublin 5-9-64.

Nicos Papavasiliou - Midfield. Exciting young recruit signed in the summer from Greek club OFI for £125,000. Niki, a Cypriot International, had paid his own fare to have a trial with Newcastle last season and did enough to impress. Is now impressing English football fans with his busy and skilful contribution on the left side of midfield - his style being not dissimilar to that of former Liverpool favourite Craig Johnston. Certainly has no inhibitions about the physical aspects of Premier League football. Born: 31-9-70

Kevin Scott - Central Defender. Commanding stopper who has been the fulcrum of the defence since making his debut, in a First Division defeat at Sheffield Wednesday, in September 1986. Was released as a teenager by Middlesbrough and was spotted playing for Easington Juniors by Newcastle who signed him in 1984. Was in the Magpies FA Youth Cup winning side a year later. Is 6' 2" and is now the longest serving player on the books. Born: Easington 17-12-66.

Scott Sellars -

Midfield. Beautifully balanced player who can go either way but favours his left side. Served his apprenticeship with Leeds United, making his League debut for them at Shrewsbury in May 1983. It was after his move to



Blackburn Rovers in 1986, that his career really took off and Leeds United resigned him for £1-million in the Summer of 1992. Injuries, alas, hampered his progress and Newcastle United's £700,000 bid was accepted by Howard Wilkinson in March 1993. Scored twice in 13 appearances for the Magpies last season. Born: Sheffield 27-11-65.

Pavel Srnicek - Goalkeeper. Comes from the same Czech club as Hammers' number one Ludek Miklosko - Banik Ostrava. Cost Newcastle £250,000 in January 1991 and made his debut the following April conceding 15 goals in his opening seven games. Has since come to terms with the English game and established himself in United's promotion side after Tommy Wright was injured - making 41 appearances. Capped by Czechoslovakia at Under-21 level he has still to make his full International debut though he was on the bench for the RCS in their 2-2 draw with Wales in Cardiff last week. Born: Ostrava 10-3-68.

Barry Venison -

Fullback. Right-sided defender who is rated by many as the best uncapped right-back in England. Came to the fore with Sunderland after making his debut, as a 17-year-old, in a 2-0 defeat at Notts County (10-10-81). Made 172



League appearances in five years at Roker and became the youngest captain in a Wembley Final when he skippered Sunderland in the 1985 Milk Cup Final. Picked up a runners-up medal then and again two years later when he wore the red of Liverpool against Arsenal. Had arrived at Anfield in a £250,000 transfer in July 1986 and won two Championships - 1988 and 1990 and an FA Cup runners-up medal (1989) while on Merseyside. In the summer of 1992 Liverpool let him sign for Newcastle in another £250,000 move. Played 55 times last season and was the only outfield player not to score! Born: Consett 16-8-64.

Stephen Watson - Fullback/Midfield. Outstanding young player who figured in England's Under-20 side in the World Youth Championship finals when he was still 17. Was first blooded in the Newcastle side when he was 16 and remains the youngest ever to represent the club at that level. Can play right-back or in midfield and was a regular in England's Under-19 side in the World Youth Championship Finals in Australia last March. Born: North Shields 1-4-74.

Tommy Wright - Goalkeeper. Was on International duty for Northern Ireland last week when he kept a clean-sheet in a 2-0 win over Latvia in the World Cup. Stands 6'1" and was outstanding for 19 games at the start of last season before injury cost him his place to Srnicek. Started as a part-timer with Linfield and was snapped up by Newcastle for £30,000 seven years ago. A former cross-country champion and part-time barman, he has also played for Hull City on loan. Born: Belfast 29-8-63.

The man in charge



Kevin Keegan
Manager

Keegan was born at Armthorpe, Yorkshire, on St Valentine's Day 1951. He joined Scunthorpe United as an apprentice in December 1968 and in May 1971 was signed by Liverpool for a bargain £35,000.

A relatively unknown player he was to emerge as a giant in one of the greatest club sides of all time. His tremendous verve and commitment and knack of finding the net, helped establish him not only as the darling of the Kop but of the national side as well.

First capped by England against Wales in 1972 Kevin played his 63rd and final game in a goalless draw with Spain, in Madrid, during the 1982 World Cup Finals. He scored 21 goals for his country.

The soccer world was stunned in the summer of 1977 when Keegan turned his back on Anfield and signed for SV Hamburg for £500,000! In the Bundesliga he was a great success but three years later he was back with Southampton who paid £420,000 for his registration.

After two years at the Dell he arrived at St James' Park for a bargain £100,000. Kevin became the inspiration of Arthur Cox's side finishing his playing career on a glorious note as he led Newcastle United back to Division One.

Keegan collected three League Championship medals as a player as well as winner's medals in the FA Cup; the European Cup and the UEFA Cup (twice). He was crowned Footballer of the Year in 1976; European Footballer of the Year in 1978 and 1979 as well as PFA Player of the Year in 1982.

The return of Kevin Keegan to St James' Park in February 1992 sparked a revival that even the most ardent disciples of this famous club could little have envisaged.

Newcastle was engulfed by a cloud of gloom and despondency at the time - with finances as well as playing results presenting a dismal picture.

Keegan turned it all around. He attracted the cast input and stimulated the town and the team to eventually reap the rewards last season as they romped away with the First Division title.

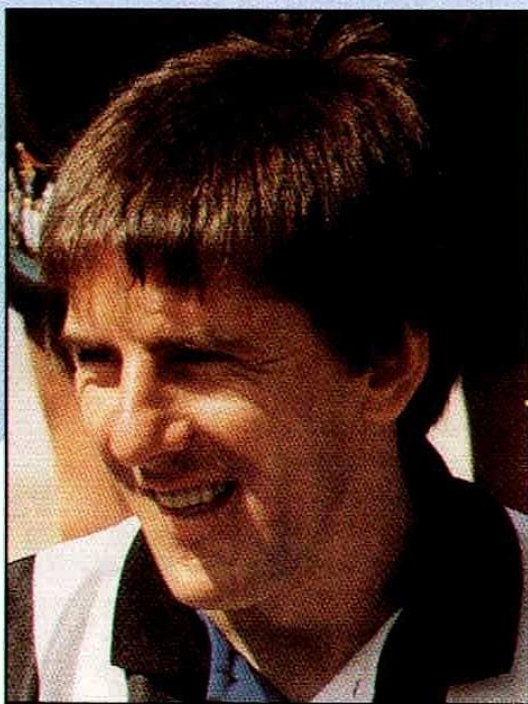
SPOTLIGHT on Peter Beardsley

Peter Beardsley - Forward, His return for his first club has been postponed following facial injuries received in a clash with Liverpool's Neil Ruddock in a pre-season friendly.

It was Carlisle United who gave Peter his big break, after spotting him playing for Walsend BC, and he made his league debut for them v Blackburn Rovers (21-8-79). Scored 22 goals in 102 league appearances then signed for Vancouver Whitecaps (£275,000) in 1982.

Came back on loan to Manchester United but Ron Atkinson rejected him after just 75 minutes in a Milk Cup tie against Bournemouth. Peter returned to Canada and in September 1983 Newcastle paid £300,000 for his signature. He responded with 20 goals in 35 league games to help the Magpies secure promotion in 1984 to Division One.

The chisel-chinned striker was to become the darling of Tyneside; and in 1986 made a scoring England bow - the first of his 49 caps - in Egypt.

In the summer of 1987 Peter became the costliest player in Britain when Liverpool invested £1.9 million in his transfer. He made 175 appearances for the reds before a surprise switch to Goodison Park in August 1991 but was unable to solve Everton's problems, and they let him return to St James' Park in the summer for £1.5 million.

We managed to double our points haul last week with a well deserved draw at West Ham but it seems the 'S' clubs are not in favour at the moment with Southampton, Sheffield Wednesday and Swindon occupying the bottom three rungs on the Premier League ladder after last Saturday's programme.

The Hammers were just above the Oldham Athletic and Newcastle United, along with Sheffield United and Manchester City, on the brink.

It is surprising what one win can do. Take Chelsea last Saturday. Former Newcastle star Gavin Peacock scored their winner against Manchester United to inflict the first defeat on the Champions for six-months...Yet it was Glenn Hoddle who hogged all the headlines with another vintage show that emphasised the mockery of the £75,000 fee set by a tribunal.

Where can you buy talent like that for heavens sake? Even if you have £14-million to spare! Were we done or were we done?

That win pushed the Blues into a middle of the table position but more importantly gave them all a big confidence booster. It will be interesting to see how they get on this afternoon at Coventry.

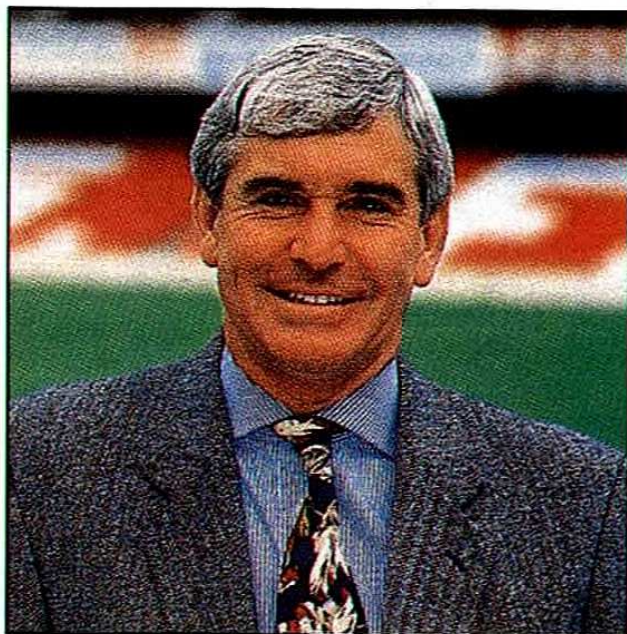
The Sky Blues have started well again and remain the only unbeaten side in the Premiership. Their success is an incentive for all the smaller clubs whose financial resources can not match those of Arsenal, Liverpool and Manchester United.

Mind you money doesn't always buy success - look at Sheffield Wednesday. The new Wednesday formation has cost £14-million and though everyone has shrugged their slow start off as just one of those things they have to beware they do not fall into the same demise as Leeds United experienced last season.

Wednesday entertain troubled Southampton today in a match of vital significance. The Saints beaten 2-0 at the Dell last week have lost all three of their away fixtures thus far and six of their seven games. It is putting manager Ian Branfoot under enormous pressure from the fans.

But what of Leeds United the former champions...That 2-0 success at the Dell ended a miserable 17-months without an away win (24 games), and prompted Gordon Strachan to claim: "This was one of the most satisfying games and results of my career. It was like a World Cup qualifier when you have just got the point you needed."

Former Sheffield United hit-man Brian Deane, and Gary Speed, scored the goals now Deane faces his former colleagues in the Yorkshire derby at Elland Road this afternoon. The pools pundits have this one down as a draw but "Harry" Bassett's men have lost

all three away games this season and the Blades boss was not too happy with this team's show against Spurs.

Adrian Littlejohn equalised twice in his first game of the season to rescue a point at Bramall Lane where temperatures were high after Jason Dozzell had netted a controversial goal for Spurs.

Ossie Ardiles praised the character of his team in a difficult game. But Ossie and former Town skipper Colin Calderwood will be expecting three points from today's meeting with Oldham Athletic.

The Latics are still looking for a first home win after Tony Cottee's goal gave Everton three points on Saturday but they have won one of their three away matches.

Everton stage the big Mersey derby today with Liverpool still favourites to win while Blackburn Rovers remain odds on to beat West Ham United.

The Ipswich vs Aston Villa game could go either way. Dalian Atkinson and Dean Saunders failed to find the net in the goalless draw with Coventry while Suffolk's pride was dented severely at Highbury where Kevin Campbell netted his first senior hat-trick for Arsenal.

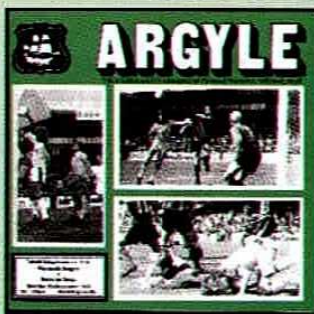

Neither made a mark on this rather dull day out in Devon, where Brian Bason and Fred Binney did the damage as Swindon were concerned.

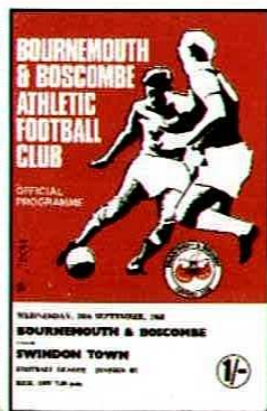
On the following Wednesday, manager Bob Smith made another trip back to his old club at Bury, this time to sign striker Andy Rowland for £85,000.

Adrian Whitbread

John Gorman knew full well what he was buying when he invested £500,000 in Adrian Whitbread. The Leyton Orient skipper had been under John's control during his days as Youth Team Manager at Brisbane Road and he had followed the young defender's progress with interest.

Now of course the whole of Swindon and beyond has realised the potential of the 22-year-old stopper whose attitude matches his competitive instincts on the field.

Bitterly disappointed after our last home defeat by Manchester City Adrian observed: "It was a game we could have won. But it has happened a few times now. When we let the first goal in we seem to collapse.

"Disappointing because I thought we had done enough to beat Man City... We will succeed this season; we know we will do well. It is just a matter of getting that first win. It is very hard but when we do it will lead to other things I am sure.

"The lads were upset at losing another game of course but we have to keep our heads up. We played well and all the people here watching know that. We were easily as good as Manchester City on the night and could well have walked off with three points. The sad reality was that we gained nothing."

Of course for Adrian it is a new experience trying to combat some of the biggest names in British football...but he loves every moment.

He says: "It has taken a lot to adapt to the pace of the game - it is a little bit different from Division Two - I have stepped up two leagues; but I feel that I have coped with it.

"I blame myself for City's second goal. The ball was played over the top towards Quinn and I obviously thought he was going to be in the air trying to knock the ball into the back of the net. I think he gave me a little nudge to indicate he was going to go up for the ball but he just brought it down and put it in the back of the net.

"As a defender in the Premier League you shouldn't be caught like that you know. So that was down to me.

"I thought we sat back after going one up expecting to run out as 1-0 winners. We should have kept it compact, maintained our rhythm and maybe look for the second goal.

"To be fair even at 1-1 we still created enough chances to retake the lead and to be fair that is what it is about at the moment. When we get the chances to put the ball in we are not doing it. The same at the other end we have got to close opponents down quicker and stop them scoring.

What is the difference then. It is not just the pace of the forward is it?

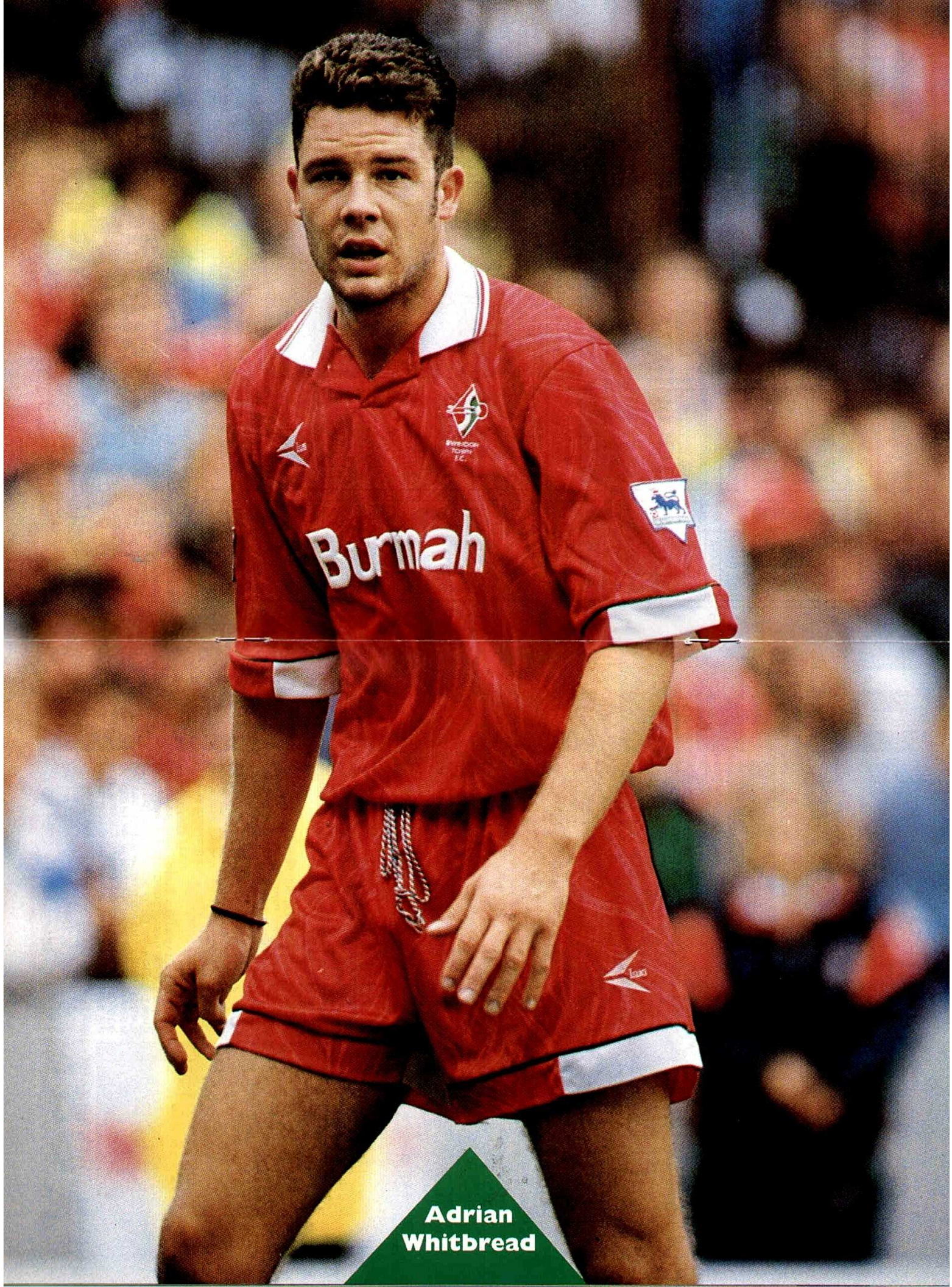
"No," says Adrian. "It is the quality. The quality all round in general. Obviously Swindon like to play and I have had to adapt to that without making too much difference to my game. I feel I have still been defending well. Shaun and I are actually getting it together now though obviously it will take a bit more time before we know each other's game. But the speed in general of the game and the quality we are up against is the main thing. They don't take two chances they take the first chance and the first chance ends up in the back of the net.

I asked Adrian if he felt his partnership with Shaun would work well as they are two very similar players?

"We are but I don't think it will cause any problem. I don't really know what sort of player Colin Calderwood was because I did not take too much interest in Swindon before I came here. But I feel I am doing okay at the moment and that is what it is all about. Just keep on trying to do your best."

"Whether I do or not is down to me. I have got to get things right on the training pitch and then on a match day. Obviously I think I can do it. I believe I have done well in the first seven games. And as a team I still believe that if we can stay injury free we have a great chance of staying at this level."

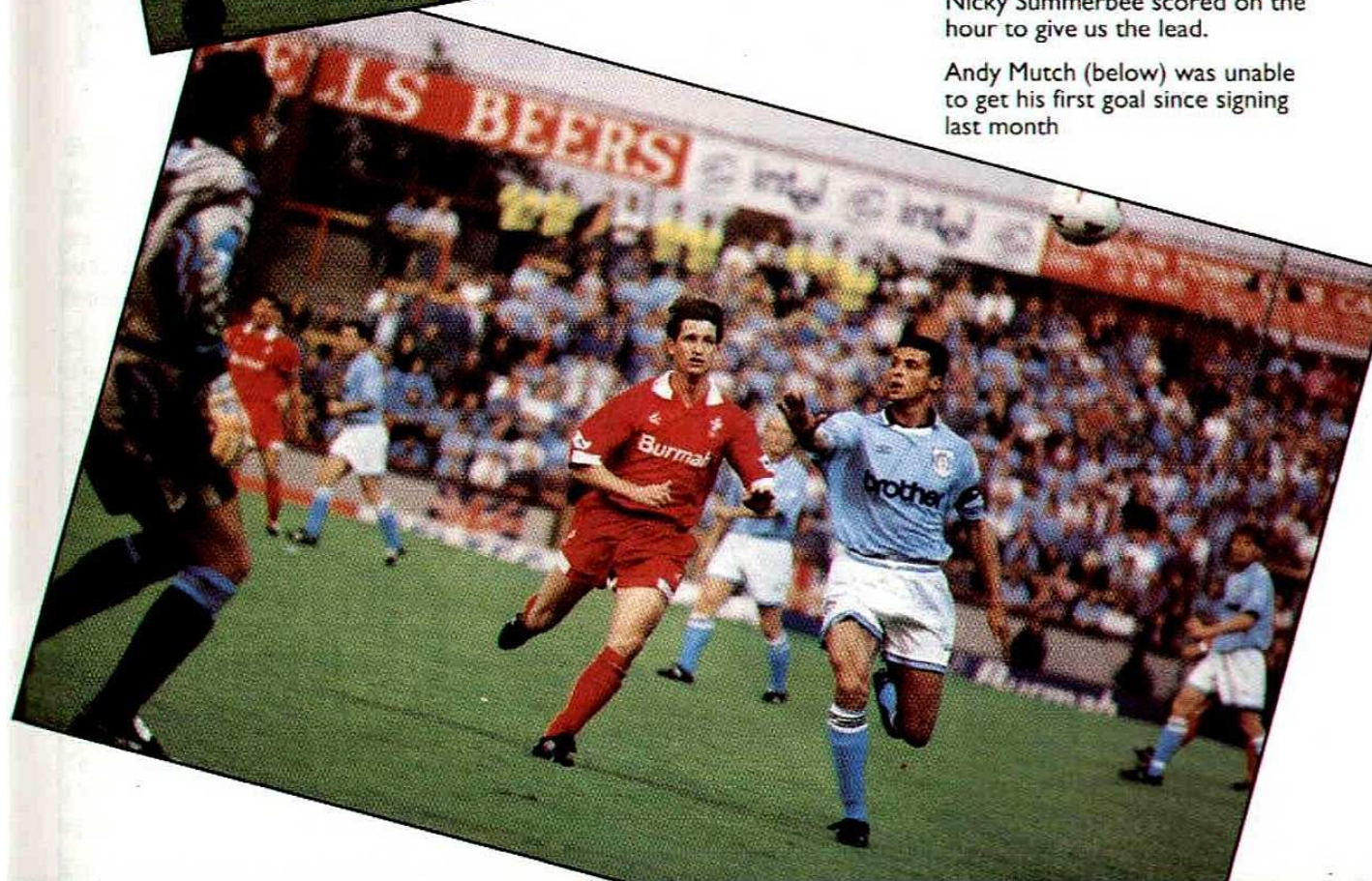


Andy Mutch in aerial battle with John Polston at Carrow Road where we picked up our first point of the season against Norwich City.

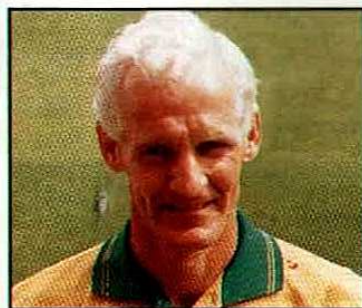
