


This week marks the seventh anniversary of Graham Turner becoming Wolves manager, and how he would love to mark it with a victory over Premiership Swindon Town, and progress into the third round of the Coca-Cola Cup.

We were unlucky not to score at The County Ground in the first leg, especially when Paul Birch hit the post, but an early goal tonight would certainly open up the tie.

Tonight we get our first chance to welcome Andy Mutch back to Molineux. The popular Scouser, who scored for Swindon in the first leg, was one of our scorers the last time we met The Robins at Molineux — a match that ended 2-2 in the league last season.

Wolves have never lost a cup tie against Swindon, and with your support tonight hopefully we can maintain that record.

GOOD OMENS

Both our previous League Cup ties against Swindon have involved two games and in both cases the first game was at Swindon and we finally won through on aggregate.

These previous meetings were in round two in 1976 and the semi-final in 1980. John Richards scored both at Swindon and here in 1976, and netted twice here in 1980.

THE ODDS

If you fancy Wolves chances of progressing through to the third round, without the need for extra time, then perhaps a small investment with Ladbrokes might be in order. They have put odds of 14/1 on Wolves winning 3-0 within the first ninety minutes. For the game to go to extra time it will need a Wolves score of 2-0, which is priced at 6/1.

You can have a bet on tonight's match alone, which Ladbrokes view Wolves as favourites to win — Wolves are 6/5, Swindon 7/4 and the draw is 12/5 (all ninety minute scores).

How about the first scorer then? Kevin Keen, who netted for us on Saturday, is quoted at 10/1, while Shaun Taylor, who got the Robin's goal on Saturday, is 20/1.

David Kelly is priced at 4/1 for the first goal, while the man he replaced in the Wolves number 10 shirt, Andy Mutch, is 9/1.

Please note that these prices are for bets placed inside the ground and are liable to fluctuation.

There have been some unusual goalscorers in recent seasons with Paul McLoughlin netting both goals in 1989/90, Rob Hindmarch netting in 1990/1 and Tim Steele in 1991/2.

The biggest gate at Molineux for a match against Swindon Town was the 41,031 who packed in for the League Cup semi in February 1980. The lowest was the 9,799 who turned up for the league game in April 1991.

ONCE IN THE F.A. CUP


Wolves won their one and only FA Cup tie against Swindon in February 1908 when we beat them 2-0 in round three with goals from Bill Harrison and George Hedley.

We then went on to win the trophy, beating Newcastle in the final at the Crystal Palace just as in 1980 we were to go on, after beating Swindon, to win the League Cup final at Wembley against Nottingham Forest.

Our only League games against Swindon have been in the last four seasons and these read:

UNHAPPY HUNTING GROUND


Wolves have never won at Swindon. Including cup ties we have lost six times and drawn once while at Molineux we have lost only once in six league and cup meetings.

MATCH

After waiting so long to make their debut in the top flight of English football, it has not been an easy baptism for the Robins of Wiltshire. Still looking for their first league win of the season doubtless Coca-Cola Cup action comes as a welcome respite, though Swindon manager John Gorman is anxious that his team don't relax.





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Looking at the sides that have been promoted into the top division in recent seasons, most of them have found it a struggle to come to terms with life in the Premier League.

Teams like Notts County, West Ham and Middlesbrough have come straight back down. The difference is power and pace. People talk about being punished at the back for mistakes, but it's more fundamental than that. The sheer pace at that level can find teams out. Swindon have obviously found the going very tough this season.

It's nice to welcome back Andy Mutch, a player who made a tremendous contribution to the resurgence of this club. Maybe the time was right for a new chal-

lenge, and the move has done Andy the world of good.

On Saturday I felt that we needed to make one or two changes. Having seen the reserves play, and get some good results this season, I thought it was right to bring in some fresh faces. That's not to say that our performances at Swindon or Grimsby were poor. In fact I thought we were unlucky to lose both games 2-0, but sometimes as manager you need to ring the changes to keep things fresh. We were fortunate to have Paul Cook coming back after injury, and Jamie Kelly had done enough in the reserves to justify a place, while Darren Simkin had put in some good performances in his seven games last season and I wanted to have a look at him. Both of them did alright.


At the weekend I became the longest serving manager in Division One with the resignation of Arthur Cox, and this week I will have been at Wolves for seven years. The going is as tough as I've ever

known it since coming into management fifteen years ago. Things have not worked out as well as we would have liked so far this season. But because of that we won't start to lose any confidence in what we've got at the club; or in what we can achieve.

Hopefully tonight history will repeat itself — when we played Swindon in the League Cup in 1979-80 we lost the first leg away from home, but went through after a 3-1 home victory — and then went on to win the cup.

Finally, it looks as though our game on Saturday will be postponed, due to the fact that Forest have two players on international duty. At the time of writing we are awaiting confirmation, but it seems we will have a blank weekend.

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE



Following the major financial investment we have made in the redevelopment of Molineux, the resurgence in support and general interest in the club has been extremely gratifying and heartening. This has been apparent both on matchdays and throughout the week; when the facilities at Molineux are now being used by a wide variety of organisations.

For our first four first team home League games, the average attendance was 20,175, and attendances at Central League games have increased four-five fold. On Wednesday last week we entertained Liverpool reserves, and over 2500 people were at Molineux to watch the game. And our current average attendance for reserve team home fixtures is over 1000, compared to 300-400 last season.

The new Members and Young Wolves clubs launched at the beginning of the season have been very well received and supported. We presently have 2500 Members and 1000 Young Wolves.

I hope that all members are taking full advantage of the benefits available, which include free admission to Central League games here at Molineux.

A recent invitation sent to Young Wolves members to a special open-day, Christmas party and penalty shoot-out competition, resulted in an overwhelming response; far exceeding our expectations.

We had a similar response from full Members to an invitation to an open-evening in September in Waggy's Lounge Bar, followed by a tour of the ground. The demand was so great, we are arranging further open-evenings for Members to give everyone the opportunity to attend.

Old Hands

We wonder whether it crossed the minds of any of our fans what a 'golden oldies' confrontation we had at Molineux for the visit of Portsmouth recently.

For, while we had big Cyrille leading the attack in the absence of the injured Steve Bull, Pompey had Alan Knight in their goal.

Together, the rival duo have compiled something like 1,200 senior appearances. Knight having amassed 500 League appearances for the South Coast club and Cyrille topping even that impressive figure with the 532 League outings he has had to date for his various clubs.



Back Home

How's this for a coincidence? When Wolves did battle with Charlton on Saturday, it was three years to the day since the two clubs had met in what was then a Second Division fixture.

Then, under the Molineux floodlights in the early part of the 1990-91 season, Wolves ran out comfortable 3-0 winners with Steve Bull (2) and Andy Thompson scoring the goals in front of a 14,363 crowd.

This time, the game ended a strange sequence of fixtures, which had seen us playing six away games out of seven. And that was after we had opened the campaign with four home games in the first five.



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

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Reunion

Quite a reunion took place at Grimsby ten days ago when we did battle with Alan Buckley's useful side in the Endsleigh League.

Alan, of course, had our reserve coach Gary Pendrey as his right-hand man in their days together at Walsall in the early and mid-1980s, when their playing staff included none other than a young David Kelly.

At Blundell Park, 'Ned' didn't have to look far to spot several former Fellows Park team-mates, with Craig Shakespeare and goalscorer Gary Childs now on the Mariners playing staff and Richard O'Kelly on their books as a coach.

Finally, one of our back-up goalkeepers, Dave Felgate, didn't need to feel left out when he took his usual place on the bench. He made 24 appearances for Grimsby, 12 of them on loan, earlier in a career that can safely be described as much-travelled.

Seven Up

It was seven years ago this week that Graham Turner took over as manager at Molineux. In that time the Gaffer has led the team to victory at Wembley in the Sherpa Van Trophy, and the Championships of the third and fourth divisions. Only four other managers in the FA Premiership and Football Leagues have seen longer service with one club. Joe Royle at Oldham, Dario Gradi at Crewe, John Rudge at Port Vale and George Graham at Arsenal.

Skipper's Landmark

Central defender Peter Shirriff reached an appearance milestone when he turned out in the Grimsby game. The match was his 400th in the Football League, the first 395 of that sizeable haul having come with his two previous clubs, Sheffield Wednesday and Charlton.

Peter, who skippered both his former clubs, has also recently been given his first taste of captaincy at Wolves. He took over by leading the lads out at both Swindon and Grimsby in the absence of Geoff Thomas, to whom all Wolves fans will send their best wishes as he recovers from injury.

Welcome Return

Two Wolves players are currently celebrating the first anniversary of their time here at Molineux.

Paul Blades was signed from Premiership Norwich a year ago last weekend while, a few days later, Paul Edwards followed him into the club from just down the M6 at Coventry.



'Eddie', incidentally, made his return from a knee injury that had ruled him out for several weeks when he played in the reserves' game against his hometown club Liverpool last Wednesday.




Midfielder Paul Cook is settling into his fifth season as a Wolves player following previous spells at Norwich City and his first club, Wigan Athletic, where he began his professional career in 1984.

After joining us in a £250,000 move from Carrow Road in November 1989, the 26 year old Liverpoolian made 173 appearances in a virtually injury-free first four seasons at Molineux.

Unfortunately, however, Paul has suffered with injuries in the current campaign. After hurting a foot in the pre-season tour to Sweden he sustained a neck injury in the second match of the season at Birmingham, then damaged an ankle in the home game against Portsmouth last month.

Hoping that he is now back in action, Paul reflects here on the club he has supported since childhood — Liverpool — as well as the situation at Molineux.



Q Is it vastly different, playing at Molineux as it is now compared to when two sides were closed?

A It certainly is. There was no real atmosphere when the two sides were closed and sometimes it was difficult to lift yourselves as a team. But that changed last season when the Stan Cullis Stand was opened — that gave us a mass of fans to play towards

right to vent their frustration, but during games it would be more beneficial to the players if they had the supporters fully behind them.

We haven't been getting the best of results, but we've only played badly in one match. That was at Watford, and the players take full responsibility for that performance. In other games — against Middlesbrough and Albion,

He showed great dignity, and I hope the Wolves fans will do the same by giving him a great reception when he runs out for the second leg at Molineux. Mind you, I hope he doesn't score again — and

that we didn't have before. Now it's even better — and hopefully when the last stand is opened, we can get a buzz going around the ground like they have at Newcastle. The fans seem almost able to suck the ball into one end of the ground up there, and I'm sure our supporters can produce the same effect.

Q How do you compare Molineux '93 to Molineux '89?

A There's no comparison! The changes at the club have been fantastic thanks to the Hayward family. A lot of people, when they take over football clubs, shout about what they are going to do and often don't do it. But Sir Jack just came in, went quietly about his business and now we've now got an absolutely fabulous set-up. As far as I'm concerned, Sir Jack should be given the freedom of Wolverhampton.

Q As a Wolves player, how do you view the current situation at Molineux?

A As a stadium — brilliant now and even better once the last stand is finished. On the playing side, not so brilliant — but there's no reason why it can't be. Supporters might not like me saying it, but patience is the word I have to use.

New players have got to be given time to gel, factors like injuries have to be taken into consideration — especially to key players like Steve Bull and Geoff Thomas — and the side needs the full backing of the supporters. The fans have got every

for example — we've played well yet ended up losing. Having said all that, I appreciate the fact that we need to not only start winning games, but also to put a good run of wins together. It's only then that we can begin to match on the field what's happening off it.

Q You mentioned injuries to Bully and Geoff Thomas — what about your own injury situation?

A It's been a nightmare — we are less than two months into the season and I've already missed more games than I did in any of the first four seasons I was here. Hopefully though, the injuries are behind me now and I can play the rest of this season.

Q The supporters have not had a decent Cup run to cheer for some years — how about this season?

A The League has got to be our priority, but I would love to think we could go a long way in one of the Cups. We've got a tough job on our hands to beat Swindon in the Coca-Cola after losing the first leg 2-0, but I think we can turn it round. If we can do that it will be a great confidence booster for us in the League as well as taking us into the next round of the Cup.

Q How galling was it to see your ex-Wolves colleague Andy Mutch get one of those Swindon goals in the first leg?

A I hated him! Seriously, I've been delighted to see Andy getting goals in the Premiership although obviously not so happy to see him score against us. I would like to say though, how much I admired the way he conducted himself after scoring in


TODAY'S SUPPORTER'S QUESTION

Fourteen year old David who lives in Finchfield has supported Wolves for six years and watches games with father Ian in the John Ireland Stand.


Q As a Liverpool supporter, how do you view the way things are going for them at the moment?

A Their biggest problem is trying to compete with Manchester United, who are doing so well at the minute. Maybe Liverpool need to bring in one or two more top quality players, although the sort of players they need don't seem to be available even though Liverpool have got the money to buy. Graeme Souness has made a couple of mistakes in the transfer market but I think his latest signing, Julian Dicks, will be a good buy. The blend still isn't quite right, but Souness will carry on trying till he succeeds. I would love to see them qualify for Europe this season, but I think they will have to win one of the Cups to do that. The League will be decided between Man. United, Arsenal and Aston Villa — those are the best three teams in England at present and I can't see anyone else coming into it.





In the programmes from Wolves' last two League Cup ties here at Molineux, we have looked at our history in the competition since the year we first entered it, in 1966, up to the disappointing 1972/3 season when the team reached both FA Cup and League Cup semi finals only to suffer defeat on both occasions. But glory was waiting just around the corner.

Wembley must have seemed a million miles away as Wolves ran onto the pitch in the sparse surroundings of Halifax Town's Shay Stadium in front of a crowd of 8,222. Goals from Alan Sunderland, John Richards and Derek Dougan gave them an easy path to a third round tie at Tranmere.

Alan Sunderland was again on the mark as the team had to work hard on Merseyside withstanding intense pressure from a Tranmere side who were placed in mid-table of the third division. Wolves were somewhat fortunate to earn a Molineux replay after a one all draw. Our form didn't improve very much in the replay a fortnight later. A 2-1 victory, thanks to goals from Barry Powell and Dougan,

was scarcely deserved and with a partial floodlight failure adding to the gloominess of the evening, it was obvious to the fans that better performances were needed if we were to progress much further.

But the form did return a week later when Exeter City were the visitors to Molineux for a rearranged fourth round tie. The game had to be played on a Tuesday afternoon as the country was subjected to power cuts because of the ongoing miners strike. So, with the floodlights rendered temporarily redundant, a midweek afternoon game was the only solution. Exeter had travelled to, and beaten, Rotherham and West Bromwich to earn their game at Molineux, but they were well beaten by a dominant Wolves side. Kenny Hibbitt and John Richards both got two, and Derek Dougan the other in a 5-1 win which was watched by a crowd of just 7,623.

Wolves then had to face the strongest side left in the competition, a Liverpool team in it's prime, at Molineux. Again the fixture had to be played on a Tuesday afternoon though a few more people managed to get away from work for the visit of the Reds. Just six days before Christmas, 16,242 made it for the big game and it was the Wolves fans who went home happy. John Richards scored the game's only goal two minutes after the interval with a fine individual effort. Meeting a clearance from one of his defenders on the halfway line, Richards completely fooled Tommy Smith and Larry Lloyd and ran on to slot the ball past Ray Clemence as the keeper came out of his goal. Wolves had chances to increase their lead before the end, though there were some nailbiting moments for the Molineux faithful before the final whistle.

Norwich City provided the opposition in the two legged semi-final and, in the first leg at Carrow Road, lanky winger Ian Mellor gave the Canaries the lead with a sweetly struck shot. But the Wanderers stuck to their task and it was no more than they deserved when Richards squared things to set the second leg up nicely.

On a cold, wet, January Saturday our fans were in a buoyant mood. But Norwich were no push-overs as they absorbed tremendous pressure from the home side. It was that man Richards who once again proved to be their undoing. In the 49th minute Dougan headed Phil Parkes' clearance into the path of Richards and the Molineux idol surged past David Stringer and cracked the ball home past Kevin Keelan in the Canaries goal. It was the only goal of the

final seen in years with both sides committed to attack. Kenny Hibbitt's spectacular, though mishit, shot left City goalkeeper Keith McRae clutching at thin air just on half time. Gary Pierce, celebrating his 23rd birthday, and deputizing for the injured and unfortunate Phil Parkes, played the game of his life to deny the likes of Francis Lee, Dennis Law and Rodney Marsh. But he stood no chance when Colin Bell equalised, from close in, on 59 minutes.

The game could have gone either way after that but, after neat work from Alan Sunderland and Mike Bailey, Richards fired home with just six minutes left. The centre forward was in agony with a pelvic injury, and had Wolves not already lost the services of Dave Wagstaffe through injury, he would have been substituted.

The victory was a just reward for a good

game and, after an absence of fourteen years, Wolves were back at Wembley.

Much has been written about that March day when, as underdogs, Wolves took on and beat a star studded Manchester City side. It was regarded by many as the best Wembley

side that were so often were pipped at the post in the early seventies.

There were some lean years to follow in the competition though, as we will see in the next of these articles which will be in the matchday programme of our next Coca Cola League Cup tie.

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



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
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Kee your shirts on!" That's what Albanian team manager Bejkush Birce has had to tell his players.

I see stories are circulating again linking Arsenal's Paul Merson with Rangers. With the 'Gers exit from the European Cup and generally indifferent start to




