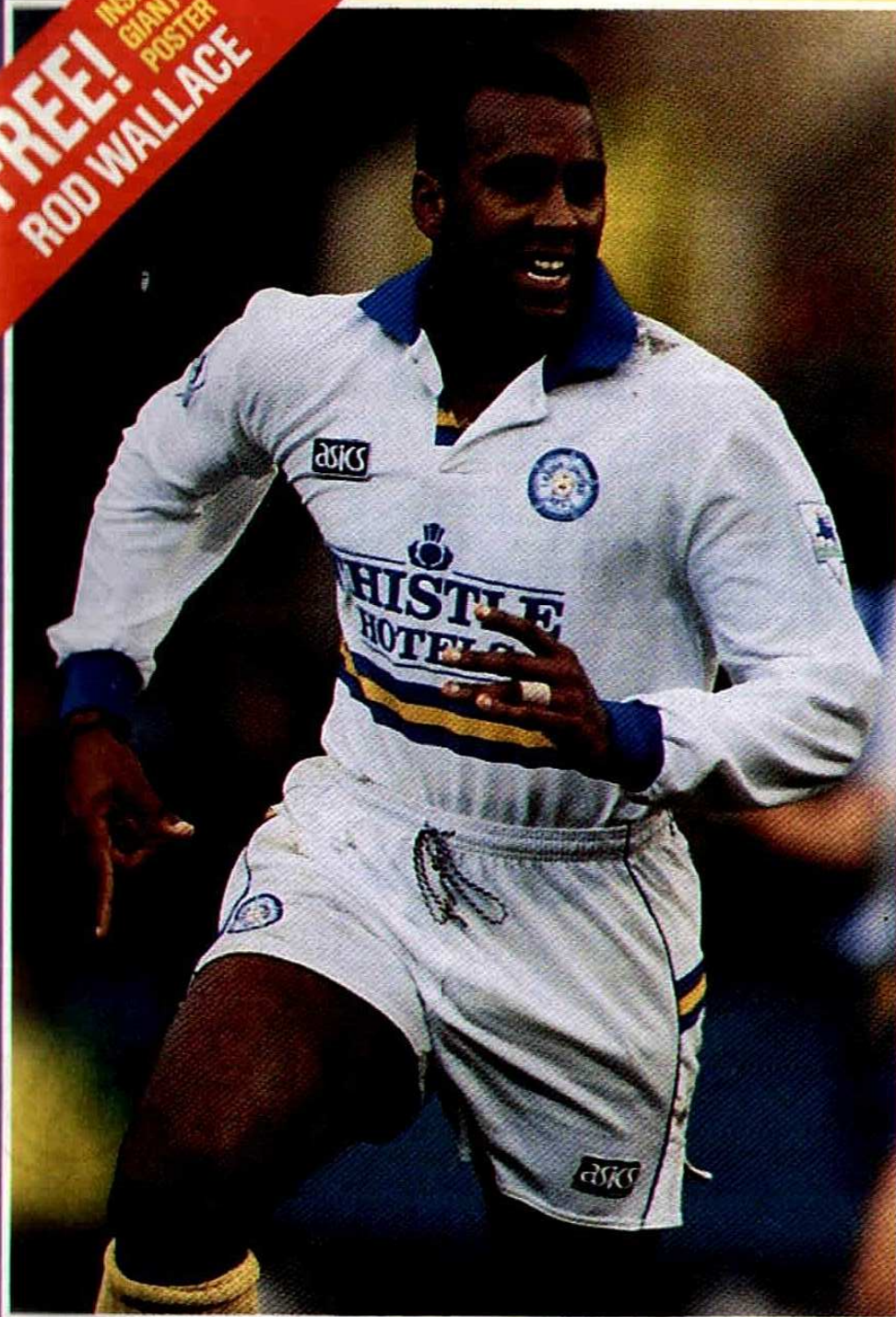

BIG SCREEN FOR HAMMERS GAME

United are to broadcast the away match with West Ham United on Wednesday, December 8 via 'the big screen' in the concourse of the new East Stand.

United have taken the move after re-building work being undertaken at Upton Park meant the club received less than 1,000 tickets for the game.



United managing director Mr Bill Fotherby said: "This is our way of attempting to appease the supporters who wanted to go to the game and were not eligible for a ticket.

"With the best will in the world we can't satisfy the demand of our massive away support in relation to the tickets given to us for the West Ham and the Manchester United game.

"We are also making attempts aimed at relaying the New Year's Day match at Old Trafford back to Elland Road. This would be via a big screen situated on the pitch to satisfy the demand to see the game."

Tickets to see the West Ham game via the big screen are £5 and United have adopted a standing room only policy so they can accommodate as many people as possible.

For the actual tickets available to go to Upton Park, United are again giving priority to supporters who attended the Coca Cola Cup tie at Sunderland in September.

However, because the number of eligible fans who went to Roker Park is greater than the quantity of tickets available, a draw will have to be made to decide who will be able to go to Upton Park.

TICKET OFFICE BOOSTER

THOSE miserable times, of queueing in the rain and the cold for match tickets, often for lengthy periods, are over for Leeds United supporters.

For the club have opened a new Ticket Office - housed in the warmth and comfort of the concourse of the new East Stand.

United managing director Mr Bill Fotherby said: "The board of directors have continued to strive to improve facilities for ALL supporters at Elland Road.

"One of the most embarrassing sights during the past few years for all at the club when driving into work has been to see our loyal fans in the cold and the wet queuing for tickets.

"Unfortunately it has been very difficult through lack of accommodation to do anything about this so we are pleased to have positioned a new Ticket Office in the East Stand to replace the old one.

"Now fans can queue under cover, in the warm and, with more available car parking on hand, this will mean less hassle for local residents.

"Whilst queueing the fans will be able to enjoy the many amenities of the East Stand - shops, eating facilities etc - and even watch videos of past games on the giant video screen in there.

"We hope to eventually eradicate the problem of queueing altogether - but in the interim we hope this will make it a more comfortable exercise for supporters."

Anybody who knows me well will assure you that I am a single-minded person. In fact, I can be annoyingly single-minded in pursuing success for Leeds.

Others may pontificate about what's good for the English game and, in particular, the England International team. There's nothing any of us can do to prevent some of the ill-informed information, that passes as superficial fact, from being aired during the current national debate. I prefer to work with our players trying to improve our game.

During the past couple of months we seem to have entered the 'Draw Syndrome'. There are times when you are quite happy to escape with a draw but, overall, I think we must believe we've been unfortunate on several occasions recently to have taken just one point from a game.

The fact leads me nicely to the subject of referee Joe Worrall's decision to award an indirect free-kick for an alleged back pass by David Wetherall in last Saturday's match at Tottenham. I have yet to meet anybody who has seen a replay of that incident who believes Joe got it right. Young David was at full stretch to make an interception and never attempted to direct the ball anywhere near Mark Beeney.

You might suggest that Mark would have been better advised to kick the ball downfield and not take the risk of picking it up. But that argument is hard to maintain. We complain of teams adopting safety first tactics in open play. It's a bit much when goalies have to take that approach because they cannot rely on the referee's judgement.

The players' responsibility is to play to the rules. I believe Mark Beeney did that at White Hart Lane. That decision became even more galling given when it led to Spurs' equaliser in a game we drew

1-1. We deserved to win and, but for that decision, I believe we would have won.

Test Match Cricket now utilises a third umpire scrutinising play on a monitor in the pavilion. Horse racing utilises judges who have the benefit of hindsight - and a video replay. If the jockey or trainer think justice hasn't been done they can appeal and prove their point. There's no such avenue to put things right in football.

Let's hope there is no similar controversy today with the visit of Swindon. I commend their Manager, John Gorman, for sticking to the footballing principles laid down by Glenn Hoddle during his inspired reign. They made a breakthrough with their first League victory of the season in mid-week. I just hope their second win doesn't come at Elland Road.

EURO THUMBS UP FEATHER IN UNITED'S CAP

LEEDS UNITED have been celebrating after having Elland Road chosen as one of the venues for the 1996 European Championship finals in England.

It is outstanding recognition of the way the football club and stadium have evolved and progressed during the past few years.

Here United chairman Mr Leslie Silver, tells programme editor John Curtis in the first part of a two-part interview the impact the championships - and the stadium - will have on the club and the city.



JOHN CURTIS (JC): *Being chosen as a European Championship venue has to be a big feather in the cap of the club?*

LESLIE SILVER (LS): We feel it is a fair return for the enormous amount of effort that a lot of people have put in at Elland Road. What we've achieved is making the ground one of the best in the country - and it's nice to get recognition in this way.

JC: *When you earmarked the ambitious work to be carried out here, was it with the hope of securing the European Championships?*

LS: One hopes that progressively you get increasing representative games. I think we were looking initially to be a successful recognised venue for FA Cup semi-finals.

Obviously time has moved on and it looks now as if they are going to be permanently played at Wembley Stadium. That is sad to some extent because it means a lot of people in the North Of England have extra costs, motorway congestion etc to endure through travelling down to London.

But we still felt it was important in central Yorkshire to have a major stadium - particularly with the location of Elland Road regarding the various motorway systems.

JC: *When Howard Wilkinson took charge five years ago the immediate aim was to get into the First Division but presumably developing the ground was another big priority?*

LS: I think the first priority was the team. The whole thing turns on

the success of the team. If we don't have a successful team then you can have a wonderful stadium and it doesn't mean a thing.

The key of it is to see that we've got a first rate team and we seem to be moving positively in that direction.

To achieve what Howard Wilkinson has achieved in the last five years is quite a record - First and Second Division titles, the Charity Shield and missing out on the mini league in the European Cup by a fraction.

It's not a bad start! and it's certainly of great credit to the manager - and because of that we've managed to build on the super structure of the stadium - and we are hopefully now seeing the benefits.

Obviously now with our capacity going up from around 30,000 to 43,000 - and possibly settling down to 40,000 after next year - it means for 'big' games we can take in another 10,000 people.

Ten thousand people to a football club means possibly a revenue of something like £100,000 a game - and that's a lot if you can fill the stadium five to ten times a year.

It makes an enormous difference. It helps everything to have a large, attractive and efficient stadium. We budgeted for only five to six games a year at full capacity - but that puts half a million in the club's pocket.

JC: *I think the Taylor Report initially knocked you back in terms of budgeting for the future.*

LS: I think before the Taylor Report we had a capacity of about 36,000 which went down to 34,000, then 31,000 and at one time as low as 29,000.

It was a blow but looking ahead the important thing is that by the commencement of next season we'll have 40,000 seats.

Seats obviously generate more money although we have made a commitment to our fans on The Kop that seats for that area will be the same price as for standing in that area, subject to inflation.

JC: *How will Leeds benefit financially from the European Championships in terms of television revenue etc.*

LS: We don't really know the details yet. We're told we'll get a percentage of the gates - but to finish off the whole exercise we still have to spend quite a bit of money, possibly on such things as media and dressing room facilities.

At the end of it all we really don't know if we will make any money out of the venture or not.

What we do know is that we'll finish up certainly with a better stadium than we've got now so there will be some benefits even if it's not in a financial sense.

The quality of the stadium will have to be upgraded - and more than likely paid for by the extra revenue that's generated.

We hope that we will be able to get two or three attractive matches but - that's all in the lap of the gods.

For example Lithuania versus Albania would not be a big draw! We would like one of the big European teams, someone like Holland or Italy.

JC: *How will the European Championships be of benefit to the City of Leeds?*

LS: It will bring a lot of people and business into the city via filling hotels, restaurants, shops etc -

something that has been happening already with our own success as a football club.

It will also be a very wide public relations exercise and will be featured certainly throughout Europe - and possibly many countries throughout the world.

My job is related simply to the football club but obviously the spin-offs for the city are there in whatever we do. If we are successful the city does benefit and it is an extremely satisfying side issue.

I think it is important that Leeds be seen as a successful city - and the football club is part of that culture.

JC: *On another front some sections of the media were trying to make out there was a rift between you and Howard Wilkinson over the selling of David Batty to Blackburn Rovers.*

LS: Enough has been said about David Batty but there is no rift. We've had a very good relationship from day one and it's continued.

We've obviously had discussions on various issues over the years but our objectives are totally unified as far as he and I are concerned.

There's no division. Howard and I have a very happy working relationship and I hope it continues for a long time.

NOT A HAPPY CHAPPY!

The programme desk received a phone call last week from a rather irate former United striker Lee Chapman after he had learned that two of his goals for last season had been knocked off by a special panel.

The panel made up of Premier League executive Rick Parry, FA chief executive Graham Kelly and representatives of the PFA knocked off Chappy's goals at Ipswich Town and Sheffield Wednesday.

Chapman, now with West Ham United via a short sojourn at Portsmouth, said: "The Hillsborough goal you could arguably say was an own goal - although I still think that decision is a bit harsh.

"But the decision to knock the other one off at Ipswich I am totally baffled by.

I was the only one who touched the ball. It seems crazy to me and I am wondering if there is any right of appeal.

"If you are going to do this why stop at last season? All the goals from the First Division-Premier League games have been filmed for years and there have been dubious ones in the past.

"It seems needless especially six months after the event - but more importantly you would think people would have better things to do. How much money did it cost to get everyone together to shift through all the videos?"

Chapman's United predecessor as our chief marksman, Bobby Davison, has joined Sheffield United on a free transfer for the remainder of the season from Leicester City.

Davison, sold to Leicester by Leeds for £50,000 at the start of last season, scored nine goals in 26 full appearances for the Filbert Street club but has been kept out of the picture by David Speedie this season.

Former United central defender John McClelland as quit as manager of Scottish Premier League outfit St. Johnstone after initially joining the club as player-coach.

STRACHAN AND SCOTLAND

United club skipper Gordon Strachan was flattered by all the plaudits from people including team skipper Gary McAllister urging him to return and play for Scotland.

But the midfield dynamo, now on the way to fitness from knee ligament damage, said: "A few people have been asking if I'd like to go back but I've done my stint for Scotland.

"It's flattering but as everyone knows I'm more than happy just playing for Leeds. If something comes along on the coaching side with Scotland, then fine. It will be a bonus - but my main concern is Leeds United."

STRANDLI'S INCENTIVE



FRANK STRANDLI has the biggest incentive of all to break into United's first team - a ticket to the World Cup finals in the United States next summer.

The big striker has been told a place is up for grabs by the Norwegian manager Egil Olsen if he can establish himself in the starting line-up at Elland Road.

Strandli, who has so far not added to his six full caps since joining Leeds last January, is currently on the fringe of the first team action via several appearances on the substitute's bench.

Howard Wilkinson's £250,000 capture from IK Staart said: "It would be the best moment in my career - or anybody's career - to play in the World Cup finals. You can't get any higher.

"My aim is to get into the full squad and the manager has said I will be there if I'm playing first team football. He's allowed 22 players but he's told me he's taking five strikers.

"Jostein Flo of Sheffield United and Jan Aage Fjortoft of Swindon Town are the men generally in possession of the shirts at the moment - but, with the manager taking five strikers, places are up for grabs.

"It gives me an even bigger incentive to get into the Leeds first team. I've been in the 14 a

few times recently and feel that maybe I'm not too far away from that objective.

"It's what I need because it helps you to become a better player. You get the match training in the reserves and I've scored a few goals - but it's not the same.

"There is a lot of competition here and you don't wish injury or loss of form on anybody - but if that does

happen I have to try and make sure I'm ready to step in, give my best and grab my chance.

"An ankle injury set me back at the start of the season but I've been getting sharper and am used to the English style of play now."

Twenty-one-year-old Strandli, who spent the summer back on loan with IK Staart, was confident almost from the outset of the group matches that Norway would qualify for the World Cup finals.

He said: "Maybe five or six years ago people regarded a game with Norway as easy meat - but that's not the case any more and now we are ranked the second best team in the world and our players play all over Europe.

"Last season we beat a lot of big teams including Italy and have overcome Holland and England in the World Cup qualifying group. We have got a good team which is now getting the credit it deserves.

"We've got a good manager and a lot is down to the system we play. We basically operate 4-5-1, knock the ball into the lone striker, join up in support and do not slow the pace of the game down.

"I think we will give a good account of ourselves in America. If you beat the likes of Italy and Holland then you are capable of beating any team.

"Norway's qualification has caused great excitement back home as we haven't been to a European Championships or World Cup finals for a long time and I think we'll be well supported in the States."

Strandli had also tipped England to join Norway in America and he said: "I'm surprised they didn't make it. They've got a good team but I think the selection of players has been wrong and you can tell the country is down.

"I also feel a lot of sympathy for my United team-mate Gary Speed and had really been hoping he would be coming with us to the United States with Wales."

Strandli pressed his own claims by netting for the Norway Under-21 side against Turkey - as their only full-time professional in the side - although a 3-1 defeat cost his country a place in the UEFA Championship finals.

Strandli said: "That was a big disappointment because I said to the other lads before the game that getting to the finals would be a big chance and short cut for the amateurs in the side in becoming professionals.

"There is a lot of young talent waiting to explode out of Norway once we become members of the EEC in January - and problems anyone might have had with work permits like I had before coming to Leeds will no longer exist.

"The Under-21s have also shown what they are capable of achieving with some good victories - including over England.

"The timing of the Turkey game was unfortunate from their point of view because the Norwegian season had been finished for three weeks. Maybe the players weren't quite as match sharp as normal."

Strandli, who won his first full cap as a 17-year-old against Bermuda, added: "There will also be the chance to buy our players relatively cheaply.

"One of our internationals can be purchased for around £500,000. If he was an English international you would normally be talking about millions of pounds."



DAVID ROCASTLE

DAVID ROCASTLE today spelt out his determination to repay the faith of the club's supporters in him after re-entering the first team spotlight at Elland Road.

The United midfielder admitted that their messages of encouragement had been "a tremendous help" during his lengthy absence from senior action after his £2 million move from Arsenal.

But although pleased to be given an extended run - which included a peach of a goal against Chelsea in our last home game - Rocky admitted: "There's still a lot more to come from me."

Rocastle said: "The way the supporters have been towards me has been fantastic - especially considering they've never really seen me play."

"It could have been the other way around - with them thinking there was something wrong with me - but they've really been behind me 100 per cent all the way."

"I think it's been that brilliant support from the Yorkshire people that has made me even more determined to be a success at Leeds United."

"In my first few games in the senior side I wanted to try and repay them and maybe I was a bit over anxious and not relaxed enough."

"I wanted to do so well here so badly that maybe I was trying too hard. People might say 'how can you try too hard?' but it does happen."

"You try too hard in the sense that you waste up a lot of energy through chasing around and doing things you wouldn't normally contemplate."

"That could also apply because you've got that sense of insecurity after not playing much in the first team. You go into a match and think 'maybe I've got to do this or that to stay in for the next game.'"

"It was like that for the first two games against Ipswich and Blackburn but before the Sheffield Wednesday game the gaffer (Howard Wilkinson) called me over."

"He said 'it's going to be nice and short. I know you can do the business, you're in the team - just go out and perform the way you can.'"

"It was in the next couple of games after that when I relaxed a lot more - and my natural football just came out - but there is still a lot more to come from me."

"It's been a long wait to be playing again in the first team since I came on as substitute at Coventry City but I've said all along that if I get a run of games I will produce the goods."

"It's no good just coming in for maybe three or four games. That's no good to me or anybody because when you've been out as long as I have the Premier League is a lot different to the reserves."

"The pace of the game is completely and utterly different. You do need nine or ten games to get used to the first team pace again. It was pleasing to get through 90 minutes for the first time this season against Chelsea."

"From my point of view that was essential. Everyone says David Rocastle is not fit - and of course I'm not in terms of having 100 per cent match fitness."

"There's a big difference between being fit and match fit. If you're not playing matches there's no way you can get used to the pace of the game. If you ask the best players in the world, they'll say the same thing."

"I've said all along there's no way I'm going to come into the side and be flying straight away. I need the matches. I'm in the middle of a nice run now and hopefully that can continue."

Rocastle has been given his chance by manager Wilkinson in the wide right role filled so

successfully by Gordon Strachan - and comparisons between the two are often made in the media.

However Rocastle admitted: "I'm not really a wide man and I'm sure Gordon would say the same. We're both really sort of right hand side-type midfield players."

"But everyone is going to go on about me being out of the side because it's not as if Leeds bought me for £200,000. They've bought me for a lot of money and people look for excuses to see why I'm not playing."

"Quite simply at the end of the day the mathematics side of it just didn't go. We had David Batty, Gordon Strachan, Gary McAllister and Gary Speed - all quality players. It was just unfortunate that I was the odd one out."

Rocastle added: "You don't lose faith in your own ability because you know you can play - but during the past 12 months I've certainly lost a lot of confidence."

"I lost that because you do feel you're a spare part in a team that doesn't need you but the lads have been fantastic. They've always kept me going and made me know that I can play."

"In the last two or three games the confidence has come flooding back - because it looks like people are looking to me to create and do something."

"Before you'd come into the side and almost shirk the responsibility. You probably wouldn't be doing things that you would have done two or three years ago - and that's all because you lose your confidence."

"Rocky will be giving his thoughts on what the future might hold, the difference between Leeds United 1992-93 and 1993-94 and how everyone is determined to bring the good times back to Elland Road in the next match programme."

SPEED ON BODIN

UNITED midfielder Gary Speed today leapt to the defence of his Welsh colleague Paul Bodin after his penalty miss in last Wednesday's World Cup decider with Romania at Cardiff.

Speed will be hoping to help United chalk up another victory today but it did not stop him from expressing great sympathy for the Swindon Town defender.

Speed said: "The best players in the world miss penalties - and Stuart Pearce and Chris Waddle did it in a World Cup semi-final for England.

"No-one blames Paul - and you have to admire him because he was the one with the bottle and courage to step forward and take it.

"Nobody really said anything to him afterwards because that's the last thing you would want anybody to do. But he's a level-headed guy and will know nobody blames him.

"I'm sure he will bounce back from it and he's a fine player who has great vision and is a great passer of the ball."

Twenty-nine-year-old Bodin actually made his full Welsh debut in the same international as Speed - against Costa Rico in May 1990 and to date has 22 caps.

He experienced a merry-go-round run to the top after being given a free transfer by Newport County without playing a game for them.

Bodin joined Cardiff City and made 90 appearances, winning Wales Under-21 honours, before released on their relegation to the then Second Division.

Bodin then had a lengthy spell with GM Vauxhall Conference side Bath City before he enjoyed a second spell with Newport.

But the club's financial problems - which were to eventually cause their demise as a league club - meant Bodin was transferred to Swindon for £30,000 after just two months in March 1988.

It took him time to secure a regular spot but Phil King's transfer to Sheffield Wednesday gave him his chance at left-back.

Bodin was a member of the side which gained promotion under Ossie Ardiles three years ago only for the club to be demoted back to Division Two through a breach of league regulations.

He joined Crystal Palace in March 1991 for £550,000 but made only a handful of senior appearances and had a spell on loan with Ardiles at Newcastle United before a £225,000 move back to the County Ground in January 1992.

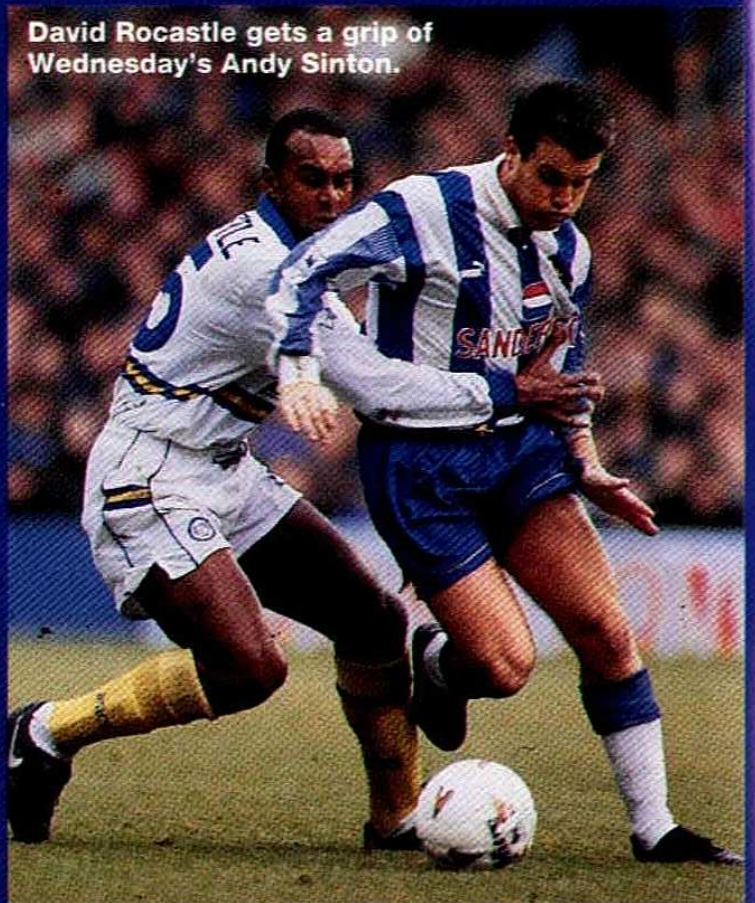

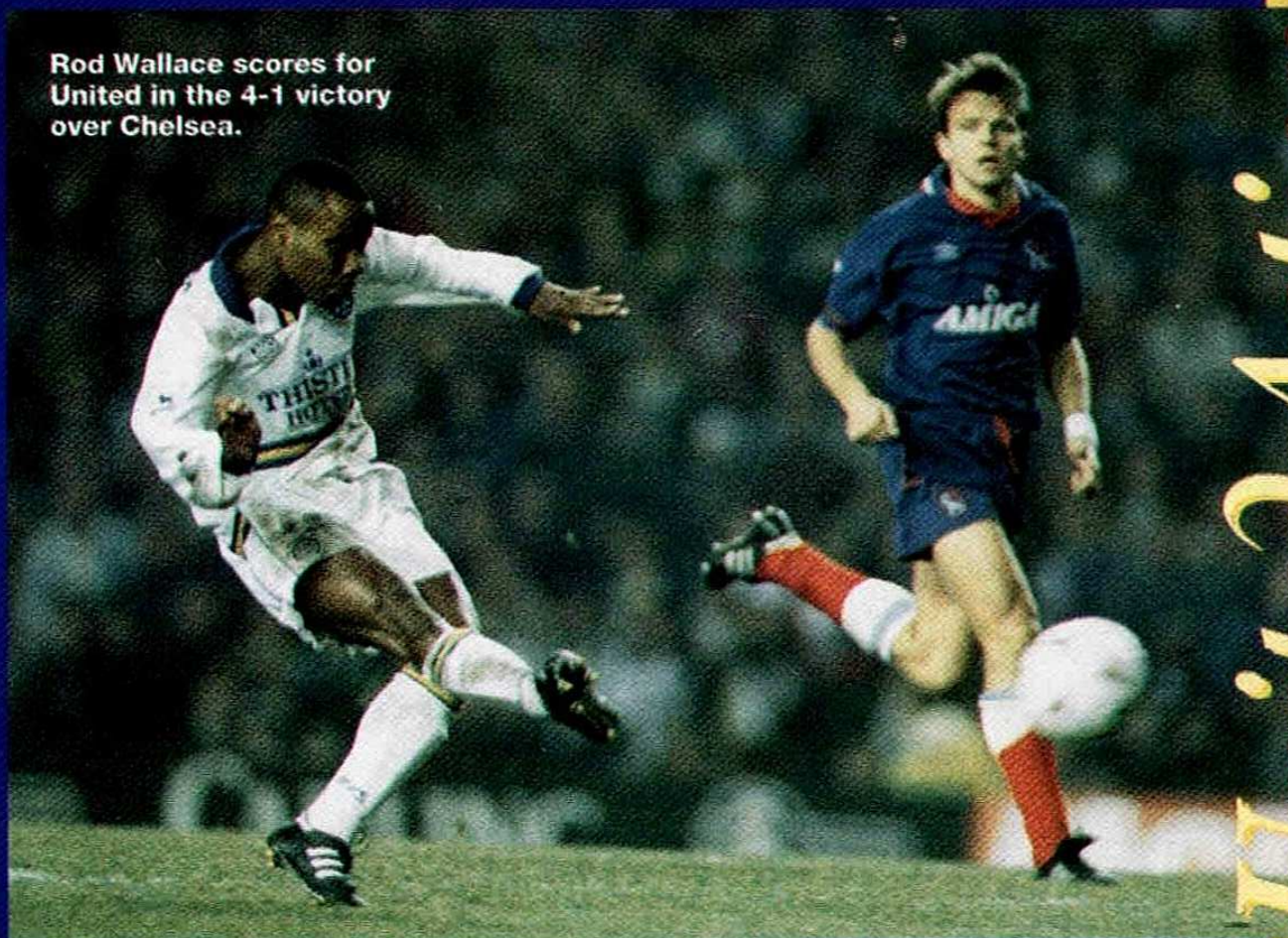

DAVID ROCASTLE'S goal-scoring performance in United's last home game - a 4-1 demolition of Chelsea - captured most attention during the media ranks.

Joe Lovejoy of THE INDEPENDENT claimed: "Chris Fairclough's deployment in midfield.....and the re-emergence of David Rocastle has invigorated the team where it was strongest in their championship year.

"Rocastle has been a £2 million misfit after his transfer from Arsenal, unable to displace Gordon Strachan but, as Howard Wilkinson has had to tell him on more than one occasion, everything comes to he who waits.

"Peter Pan's injury has finally given Mr Impatience his chance, and he could hardly have done more to take it.

"A model of diligence and enterprise on the right, he also scored the goal of the game when he shimmied one way and then the other, bemusing Johnsen, before driving the ball in from the edge of the penalty area."

Lovejoy added: "Midfield is still their strongest area, but Leeds are improving in other areas, with Gary Kelly's emergence at right-back remedying last season's Achilles' heel and Rod Wallace starting to score with an acceptable degree of regularity. Two more here made it six in the last seven games.

"It was all too much for Chelsea, who survived the first

half, courtesy of some top-notch saves from Kevin Hitchcock, but were overrun in the second, when they were passed and penetrated virtually at will."

Peter Fitton of THE SUN said: "Leeds, in general, and David Rocastle, in particular, succeeded with sound tactics and a well-structured side.

"Chelsea keeper Kevin Hitchcock, as Howard Wilkinson observed, scripted a fair amount of suspense and drama before even his scorched palms could do no more.

"He was betrayed by the players meant to be his bodyguard as Brian Deane lifted the curse of Elland Road with his first goal.

"And then Deane left ambushed Eddie Newton swearing in a heap as he set up the first of Rod Wallace's gloriously-taken double."

Russell Kempton of THE TIMES said: "Rocastle completed the full 90 minutes for the first time this season and in the process revived memories of the darting skills that earned him a championship medal and 14 England caps while at Highbury.

"He also scored a fine goal, with a jink inside Johnsen and an elegant shot of placement and power.

"Wilkinson bought Rocastle for the time when Gordon Strachan's legs finally gave out. But the wee man kept on running and forced his heir into reserve team obscurity.

"Now, with David Batty gone and Strachan also side-lined with knee ligament damage, Rocastle has every chance to prove his worth in side mounting a strong revival.

"Chelsea, hustling and bustling yet naive in the extreme, provided ideal opposition for him to display his full repertoire.

"Though operating rather wider and further forward than he might prefer, he skipped past tackles, supplied one-touch passes and provided constant support for Gary McAllister and Gary Speed."

David Alexander of TODAY said: "Rocastle looked like a man who'd just won the pools. After 18 months in which he's been largely ignored, Leeds

United's £2 million man has at last come to terms with what's required at Elland Road.

"Rocastle hit only his second goal in 18 Elland Road months to complete an impressive Leeds performance, and now he's fighting to stake a claim before Gordon Strachan returns next month."

Rhys Probert of THE SUNDAY TIMES reported: "Chelsea have a number of players injured and a couple playing out of position. Leeds proved just the team to expose how delicate the seams and ligaments of this construction are and they performed and efficient enough act of butchery.

"Leeds have been using Fairclough in Batty's role without much apparent loss of effect. The midfield is still Leeds's strength. Always on the ball or not far from it, Gary Speed, Gary McAllister and Gordon Strachan are the rotor blades on which Leeds have risen from 18th place since August.

"Apart from everything else, Leeds were quicker than Chelsea. Johnsen moved stiffly, Hopkins struggled to keep up, and the midfield only occasionally emerged from the swamp."

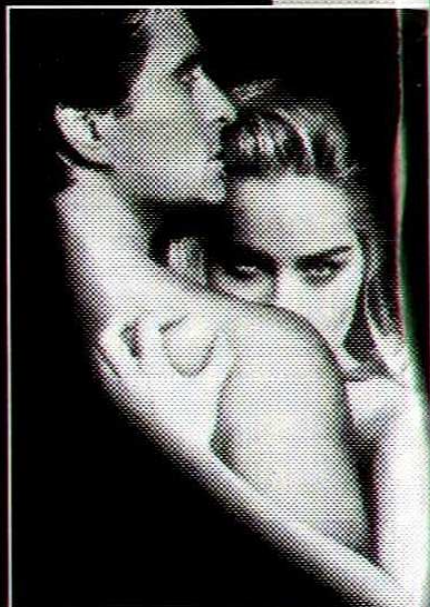

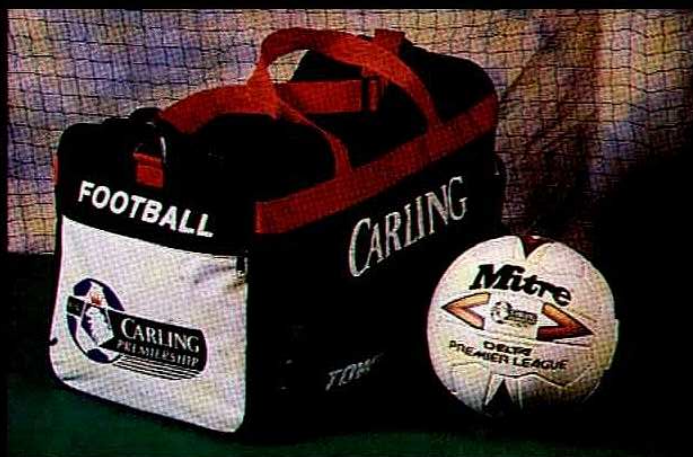

JON NEWSOME today spelt out his frustration at the ruptured kidney which halted his run of good tidings firmly in their tracks.

Life was looking good on and off the pitch for the former Sheffield Wednesday defender after David O'Leary's unfortunate achilles problem initially opened the way for his first team recall.

Newsome had got married in the summer and just moved into a new house, signed a new three year contract with United, scored his first senior goal for 18 months and successfully re-activated his partnership stretching back to junior level at Wednesday - with David Wetherall.

But the accidental kick he received from Chelsea's Erland Johnsen during an aerial battle in our last home game left Newsome laid up on a drip in hospital with the prospect of up to a month out of action.

Newsome said: "I'm absolutely gutted it's happened now. It's really disappointing to be out at the moment. This is more disappointing than the knee injury which kept me out for most of my first season here because I had not then established myself.

"I didn't think that much of it at first. Johnsen jumped for the ball but tried to twist and adjust and as he did he hit me to the right of the belly button.

"I went straight down and felt really sore. It had winded and knocked the stuffing out of me and I didn't feel very well at half-time but I thought it was bruising and that I could run it off in the second half.

"I ended up finishing the game and was checked out by the doctor and then went back to a hotel rather than home because there was a Supporters' Club function on that night.

"But when I got there I started passing blood and vomiting and felt dehydrated. They took me to the hospital for a scan and it was found I had a ruptured kidney.

"You can't mess around with something like that and I was kept in for a week. I had to keep still and was confined to bed. I couldn't even stand up. Because I was dehydrated they also put me on a drip but there was no operation and it was just a matter of resting.

"I had broken the skin which acts as protection around the kidney and blood had got into it and also caused a clot so it meant drinking loads of water to flush it out.

"I was able to go home after a week and could do some walking but it was a matter of resting generally for another week in case the kidney re-bled.

"That would have taken me back to square one but touchwood, if all had gone well, I was hoping to start some training after that period - and not be out for too long."

Newsome was delighted - like Wetherall - to be offered and to sign a new three deal although it did not come entirely out of the blue to the 23-year-old player.

Newsome said: "The gaffer (Howard Wilkinson) said earlier in the year that he would be having words around about now regarding a contract and I was more than happy to sign.

"It's nice to be settled at a great club like Leeds for whom I'm sure more good times are ahead - and it gives me security after getting married and just buying a house."

Newsome, who made 43 senior appearances last season, added: "I was disappointed not to be in at the start of the season and the unfortunate injury to David O'Leary is the last way anybody would want to get in.

"But it's a matter of taking your chance which I feel that I've done. It's the first long run myself and David Wetherall have had in the first team at Leeds in the centre-back positions.

"We started off in the juniors together at Sheffield Wednesday and we seem to do alright together - although in those days the First Division, yet alone the Premier League seemed a million miles away. But then you suddenly get a taste of it and then want a lot more of it.

"We are different players. David is really the more dominant one in the air and I seem to be the one who marks the smaller, quicker lads. We've got different abilities but seem to work well together.

"A lot of hard work was put in on the defence in the summer - and not just the back four but everybody - and so far in general it seems to have paid dividends."

Newsome's goal in the stirring fightback against Blackburn Rovers was his first since the championship decider against Sheffield United at Bramall Lane 19 months ago.

He said: "It was disappointing not to score at all last season but against Blackburn we were 3-1 down and it was a case of all hands to the pump and I managed to sneak one in.

"I'm not up supporting all the time for free-kicks and corners. It depends who we're playing, who's good in the box and how many players the opposing team leave up for a quick counter-attack.

"But it's nice to chip in. The forwards help out defending-wise and it's nice to help the other way with defenders collecting the odd goal. I thought David Wetherall had also got one at Ipswich but it was ruled out for offside."

FRUSTRATION FOR NEWSOME

Six years ago this month Bobby Davison went into action with Leeds United not even having the chance to train with his new team - mates following a £350,000 transfer from Derby County but confident he would settle in without difficulty.

And, as Swindon Town found out to their cost, he did just that, marking his debut for United with a goal in a 4 - 2 Second Division success at Elland Road on November 21, 1987.

United had just lost valuable ground in the promotion hunt and pressure was on the 28-year-old Davison to deliver the goods from the word go.

"The pressure does not bother me. I have always scored my fair share of goals and I would hope to make a quick impact either by scoring goals or making them for someone else," he told me before making his debut for United.

As things turned out Davison had to share centre stage with David Batty, who made a big impression on his league debut. The 18-year-old former Leeds City schoolboy player brought youthful exuberance, aggression, some pace and no little skill to the side as he marked his league debut with a high degree of distinction.

After a defeat at Millwall, Billy Bremner's side badly needed to beat Swindon and they got off to a good start when a Gary Williams corner was flicked on by Jack Ashurst to Bob Taylor, whose shot was turned in by David Rennie.

MEMORY MATCH

In the 25th minute, and from another corner, Davison got into position to lash in his debut day goal for United. Ten minutes' later United went three goals up when Taylor scored with a rising shot at the far post from Glynn Snodin's centre.

United had the game by the scruff of the neck but, as in some of their other recent matches, they allowed the supremacy to be snatched from them and Swindon midfielder man Bobby Barnes scored in the 40th and 77nd minutes.

For a while United looked insecure and with the scoreline at 3-2 there were rumblings among the crowd of 15, 457 and it took a piece of ice-cool brilliance from Peter Haddock to settle the issue.

The former Newcastle United player was given a tremendous ovation when he slotted in his first senior goal. After exchanging passes with John Sheridan he raced on, checked his stride and then dummied two defenders before stylishly beating Swindon goalkeeper Tim Flowers with just six minutes of the match remaining.

United, who received a first round bye, must visit the winners of the Newcastle United-Burnley clash.

United will be hoping for another good run in the competition with their latest crop of young players striving to impress in their efforts to eventually make the grade in the professional ranks.

But, as Mr Hart is always keen to, stress, the most important factor is developing players into the potential Leeds United first teamers of the future.

Fourteen-year-old Fitzgerald had been at Manchester United's Centre of Excellence in the North East and was also being pursued by Newcastle United and Nottingham Forest.


Fitzgerald plays for South Durham Schoolboys and United have been keeping tabs on his progress for the past 12 months.

Leeds boys Daniel Jackson and Mark Smith, who can both play in midfield or at centre-back have also put pen to paper.

Jackson, aged 14, has been at the Leeds Centre of Excellence for the past two years. Smith, 14, has played for Leeds City Boys and also been at the Centre of Excellence for the past 12 months.

FORM LINES

For many neutral fans, justice was seen to have been done for Swindon Town when Paul Bodin converted the late Wembley penalty that clinched victory over Leicester City in last season's promotion play-off final.

It took the Wiltshire club into top-level football for the first time - a prize that every Swindon supporter felt should have been theirs three years earlier.

Following a previous Wembley victory in 1990, Swindon travelled home in celebratory mood, believing they had made it to the old First Division. But it was later decreed that, due to alleged financial irregularities, Swindon would not be promoted. Sunderland went up in their place.

Given that devastating experience, it was a sweet moment for all connected with the club when they took their place in the FA Carling Premiership this season.

So far they have found the going tough, though to their immense credit, they retained faith in the passing style which took them into fifth place in last season's First Division. Three play-off matches then produced

nine goals - and marvellous entertainment as they beat Leicester 4-3 in the decider.

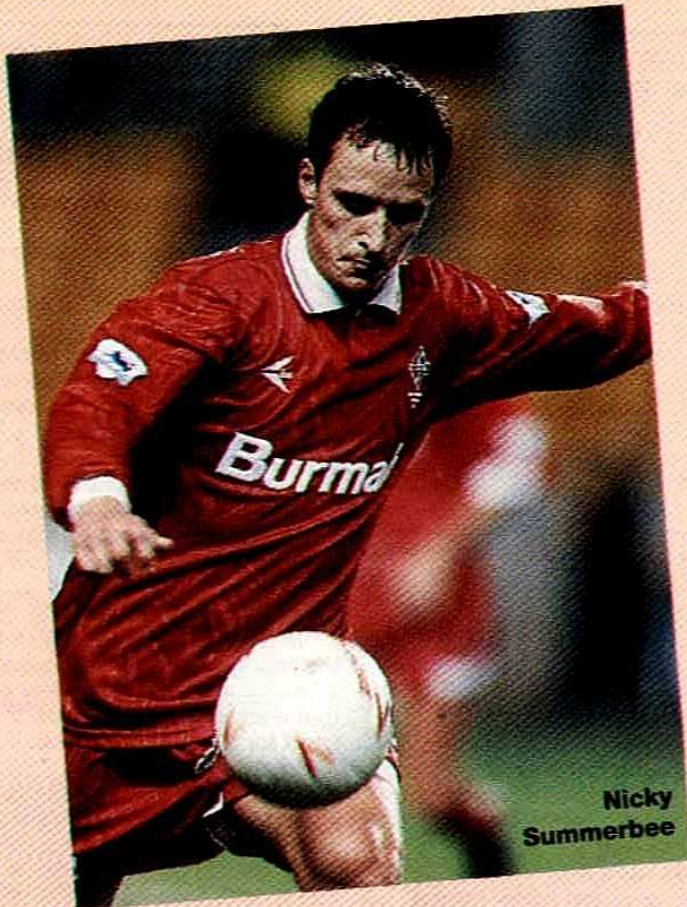
Their introduction to the Premiership was quite traumatic. They lost the first four games

and shipped 14 goals in the process - conceding five each to Liverpool and Southampton in the space of four days.

Their first point arrived in a commendable goalless draw on a visit to high-flying Norwich and further reward came in away games at West Ham and Tottenham.

At home they lost four games out of five - a sequence interrupted by a 2-2 draw with Newcastle - but the first win continued to elude them. Up to last Saturday, they had mustered six draws and were cut off by five points at the bottom.

Manager John Gorman feels that this record did not properly reflect performances. "We have been playing good football - as I think Leeds' fans will see for themselves - but results have just not gone for us."

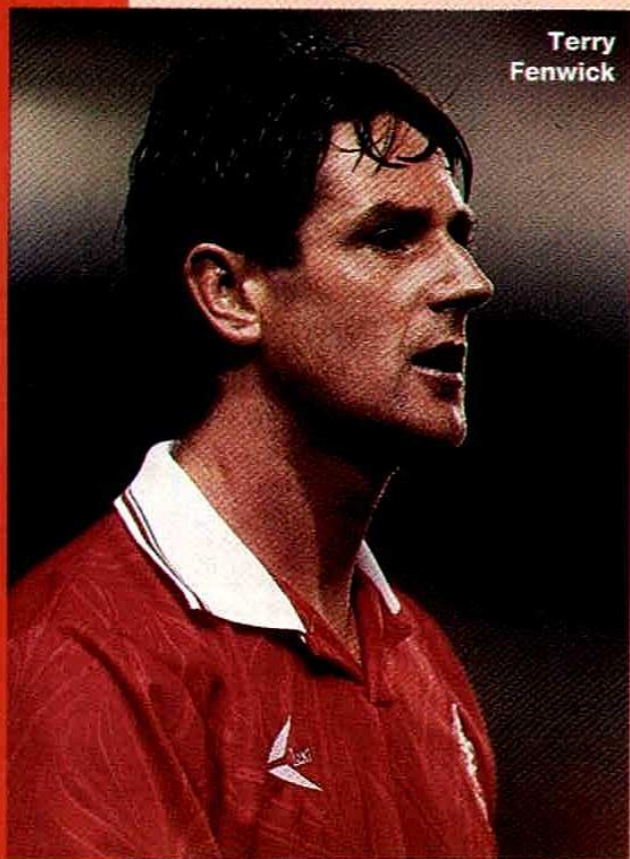
The signing of striker Jan Aage Fjortoft was a throwback to assistant manager David Hay's term of office as coach at the Norwegian club, Lillestrom. It was there that Mr Hay first worked with Fjortoft in the 1980s. The player then spent four years with Rapid Vienna before joining Swindon for £500,000 this summer.

The foreign influence was also evident in another close-season purchase, though Dutch defender Luc Nijholt actually arrived from Scotland. He cost £175,000 after three seasons with Motherwell.

The summer spending moved into seven figures with £500,000 paid to Leyton Orient for Adrian Whitbread, a defender who was a first-team regular with the London club for the past three seasons.

Again, it was a case of the Swindon backroom staff knowing their man. Whitbread was coached by manager John Gorman during his time at Brisbane Road.

A further £250,000 was outlaid in August for the experienced Wolves striker, Andy Mutch. In just over seven years at

Molineux, the former Merseyside non-League players scored more than 100 goals in Wolves' rise from the Fourth Division.

In September, Swindon brought in the know-how of defender Terry Fenwick on a free transfer from Spurs and last week they invested £300,000 in the Wycombe Wanderers' striker, Keith Scott.

The Londoner scored on his debut against Ipswich, adding to his 15 league and cup goals for Wycombe this season. In their non-League days, he netted at Wembley when they won the FA Trophy in 1991 and claimed 20 goals as they landed the Conference title last term.

Two of Swindon's most influential players left the club in the summer. Player-manager Glenn Hoddle took up a similar position with Chelsea and defender Colin Calderwood moved to Tottenham for £1.25m.

Australian World Cup forward David Mitchell joined Turkish club Izmir but is now back in this country with Millwall.

There was another departure last month when midfielder Mick Hazard re-joined his first club, Spurs, for £50,000.

INTERNATIONALS

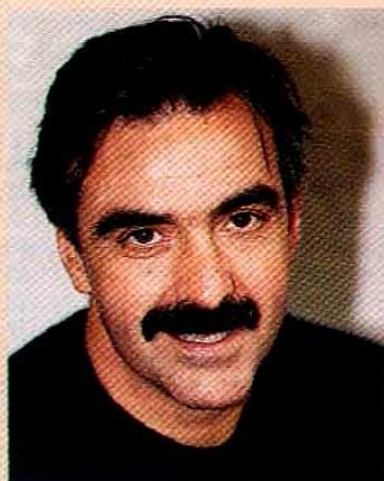
Jan Aage Fjortoft, bound for the World Cup finals with Norway, is Swindon's most experienced international with nearly 50 caps. He laid on one of his country's goals in the summer victory over England and scored this season against Poland as Norway won the qualifying group with only one defeat, and that in their last game against Turkey.

The unlucky Paul Bodin might have been joining Fjortoft in America next summer but for his penalty miss in Wales' defeat by Romania last week.

Terry Fenwick was a World Cup finalist with England in Mexico seven years ago. In all he won 20 full caps and 11 with the Under-21 team.

Nick Summerbee, son of the former England winger, Mike, is the latest international on the staff, having scored the winning goal for England in the semi-final of the Toulon Under-21 Tournament in the summer. He was also in the team which defeated France in the final.

Goalkeeper Fraser Digby was capped five times in the England Under-21 team and Luc Nijolt represented Holland at Under-21 level.



MANAGEMENT

Swindon had a ready-made replacement when Glenn Hoddle joined Chelsea. John Gorman had been his assistant for two years and was named as successor on the day that Mr Hoddle left for Stamford Bridge.

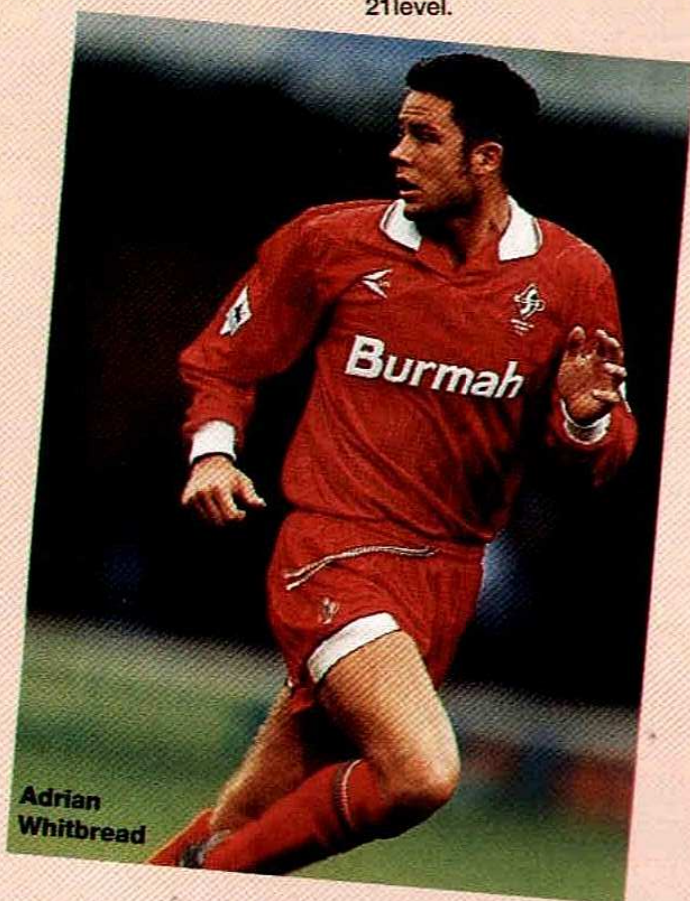
Their association went back to the time they played together at Tottenham. Mr Gorman was transferred from Carlisle for £60,000 in 1976 and spent two-and-a-half years at White Hart Lane before going to the USA.

He started out as a professional with Celtic, moving just over the border to Carlisle in September 1970. He made his debut for the Cumbrians in December of that year and quickly established himself at left back.

They were exciting times at Brunton Park and in 1974 he was a member of the side that won promotion to the First Division for the first time in the club's history. They won their opening three games and, very briefly, held top place in the table.

For Mr Gorman, it was on to Tottenham and finally four-and-a-half years in the States with Tampa Bay Rowdies.

Returning to England in 1985, he was appointed youth coach at Gillingham and later became assistant manager. He moved to Leyton Orient, where he ran the youth and reserve teams, and then joined Swindon in April 1991.

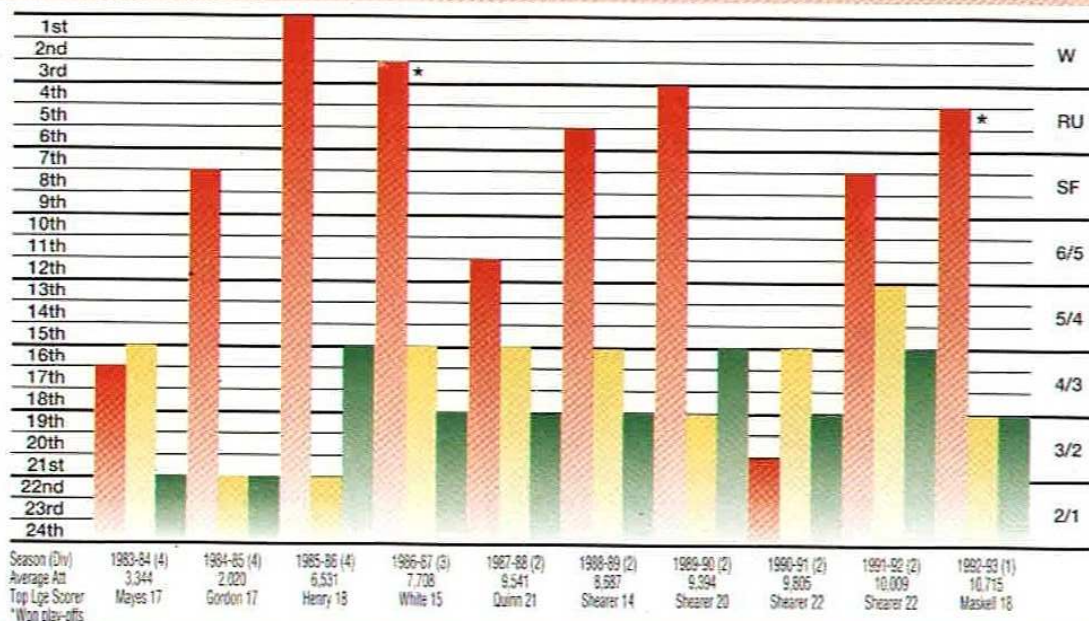

JOHN PEMBERTON

IT'S a warm welcome to Elland Road for defender-midfielder John Pemberton who is one of the conveyor belt of stars to have made their initial name at Crewe Alexandra under Dario Gradi.

John, who was 29 nine days ago, played in the same side at Gresty Road as future England players David Platt and Geoff Thomas during the mid-1980s.

He actually started on the football trail with Chadderton - the town where Platt was born - and then made one appearance while on trial at Rochdale.

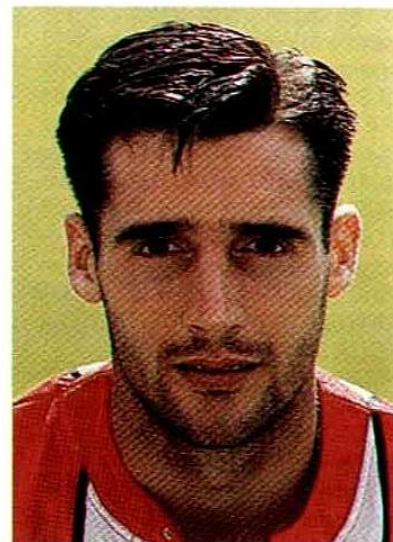
Pemberton then linked up with Crewe at the tail-end of the 1984-85 campaign before being snapped up by Gradi and, alongside Platt, Thomas and Co, he went onto make 138 appearances for the club.

He eventually moved to Crystal Palace, managed by Steve Coppell, in March 1988 for £100,000 and, with Thomas who had moved the previous summer, helped them to promotion the following season to Division One.

The success story continued with Pemberton playing in the 1990 FA Cup final - which saw Palace lose a replay to Manchester United - after a thrilling 4-3 semi-final triumph over Liverpool at Villa Park.

But that summer David Bassett recognised his qualities and brought him from Selhurst Park to Sheffield United for £300,000.

Pemberton was in the United side which lost 3-2 at Bramall Lane to clinch the league title for Leeds 19 months ago - and was a key figure in their seemingly



annual fights against relegation.

He had been out of the first team picture at Bramall Lane in recent weeks but manager Howard Wilkinson recognised his qualities and Pemberton made his debut at White Hart Lane last Saturday.

At £200,000 - plus £1,000 for the first 50 games he plays for Leeds - Sgt Wilko appears to have acquired another bargain buy.

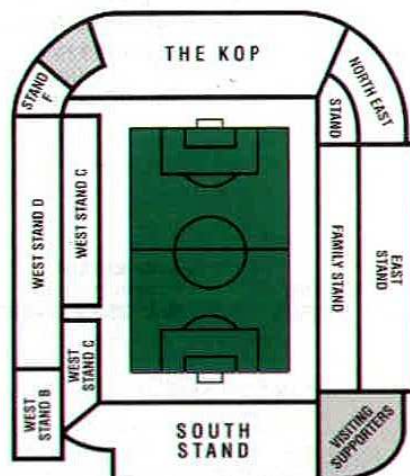

MANCHESTER CITY NEXT ...

THE CURSE of television certainly seemed to be on Manchester City manager Brian Horton during his first dozen games in charge at Maine Road.

Horton, who brings his City side to Elland Road next Saturday, finished as a loser only three times during that spell after his switch from Oxford United.

And all three games were featured live on Sky Sports - 0-1 away to Wimbledon, 1-3 at West Ham United and 2-3 at home to Manchester United.

City's only major summer signing was the capture of Dutch midfielder Alfons Groenendijk from Ajax for £500,000.

But since Horton took charge from Peter Reid he has splashed out £1.6 on Middlesbrough's Alan Kernaghan and £450,000 on Shrewsbury Town hotshot Carl Griffiths.

United fans with long memories may well remember Griffiths who

scored four times for the Shrews in two matches against Leeds during the 1988-89 season.

He netted a brace as a 17-year-old in a 3-2 win at Elland Road in December 1988 and repeated the feat in a 3-3 draw at Gay Meadow in the final match of the campaign when Gordon Strachan netted twice for United.

Last season Griffiths was on target 31 times for The Shrews but City have eased him gradually into the fray and he was on the substitutes bench for his opening two games against West Ham and the men from Old Trafford.

City have also drafted in some of their home grown talent with right-back Richard Edghill and midfielder Steve Lomas both products of the youth team.

Lomas was in the Northern Ireland squad for last week's World Cup showdown with the Republic of Ireland in Belfast.

One player moving out of Maine Road was winger Rick Holden who returned to his previous club Oldham Athletic for £500,000.

City have a creditable away record and their first six trips of the season included victories over Swindon Town and Sheffield United and a draw at Arsenal alongside defeats by Wimbledon, Everton and Tottenham Hotspur.

Last season Leeds triumphed 1-0 at Elland Road in March thanks to a goal from David Rocastle - his only strike of the campaign.

But most critics felt Leeds deserved better than a 1-1 draw at Maine Road on the opening day of this season after the previous two visits to City had produced 4-0 defeats.
