

THE GRAEME SOUNESS VERDICT

THE FA Carling Premiership has been a minefield for promoted Swindon Town, but I have a high regard for the way they have stuck to their beliefs.

They came through the Second Division playing open and attractive football – who can forget their exciting Wembley play-off and 4–3 victory against Leicester City? – and did not dismantle their style.


They picked up from where they left off in terms of style and entertainment, even though the temptations to change the system have been strong.

And there is still a long way to go in the Premiership. Three or four wins with the three-points system can soon turn issues around and they must be thinking that way.

Swindon will not come here in fear and trepidation. They will enjoy the big Anfield stage. It will be a help rather than a hindrance to the men from Wiltshire.

They will want to trigger off a tidy run of results. It looks as though their manager John Gorman has stuck to his principles in the belief that something will change.

And we have to make certain that any turnabout in fortunes does

not begin at Anfield. Despite all our frustrations this season, we are still firing on three major fronts.

We are still in the Coca-Cola Cup, the FA Cup begins next month and the Premiership and European places are not yet decided. Confidence is such an important factor in football. Manchester United proved that in their Coca-Cola Cup success at Everton where everything they attempted seemed to come off.

Individually and collectively, their confidence was sky high.

We were moving in that direction against Aston Villa, yet our performance against Wimbledon in the Coca-Cola Cup did not stand comparison only a few days later. It defied explanation. I was left simply dumfounded. And the players, I assure you, were as deeply concerned as myself.

But all was not lost at the end of a miserable evening against Wimbledon.

We are still in the competition and we are capable of winning at their place on Tuesday night.

We were on top early on at Anfield, but set ourselves up to be killed off later. It could be that Wimbledon have lost their best chance of

a quarter-final home draw against Sheffield Wednesday, who profited from another depressing performance by ourselves last weekend when we managed to give them two goals in a 3–1 defeat.

The more games we play, the more chances we have of putting things right. We need to shake off our recent disappointments and prepare ourselves mentally and physically for a game we can win.

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
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THE MAN WHO WAS BOUGHT FOR GOALS

■ Andy Mutch was one of the reinforcements called up by Swindon for their Premiership campaign. He cost them £250,000 from Wolves, where his partnership with Steve Bull had earned him 97 League goals and England caps at Under-21 and B Team level.

FROM Day One newly-promoted Swindon have found life tough in the Premiership, becoming a fixture at the bottom of the table.

Things began to go wrong while they were still celebrating their arrival in the top flight. Player-manager Glenn Hoddle departed to Chelsea in June, then key defender Colin Calderwood, an ever-present in the promotion campaign, was lured to Spurs in a £1 million deal.

Recently he was followed to White Hart Lane by veteran midfielder Micky Hazard, who is now building a second career with the club which had him at his peak.

The Premiership new boys were still finding their feet when Liverpool hit five against them on their own ground in August to date they have only one win – a shock victory over QPR last month – and a string of draws.

John Gorman, promoted from assistant manager, has remained optimistic and faithful to the club's reputation for neat, attractive football.

The gap between them and the clubs immediately above them is not unassailable, but it will be a remarkable feat if they can bridge it with such limited resources. This is their squad . . .


GOALKEEPERS

FRASER DIGBY, 26. Former apprentice with Manchester United who has now made more than 250 appearances for Swindon. Sheffield-born Fraser has England caps at Youth, Under-19 and Under-21 levels and returned to Old Trafford for a spell last season as cover for the injured Peter Schmeichel.

NICKY HAMMOND, 26. Was an apprentice with Arsenal before his free transfer to Town in

THE MANAGER



■ John Gorman was a ready-made replacement when Glenn Hoddle left to join Chelsea during the summer. For two years he had been Hoddle's assistant and was largely responsible for preparing the side that won promotion last May. The two men first came together at Spurs after Gorman, whose career began with Celtic, was transferred from Carlisle United. He spent three years with Spurs, had a spell in the US with Tampa Bay Rowdies, returning to England in 1985 as youth coach with first Gillingham and then Leyton Orient.

July, 1987. Because of limited opportunities in the senior team he has had loan spells with Bristol Rovers, Peterborough United and Aberdeen.

DEFENDERS

SHAUN TAYLOR, 30. Ever-present in the League last season and, despite his defensive role, scorer of 12 goals, including one in the dramatic 4-3 play-off final against Leicester at Wembley.

TERRY FENWICK, 34. Former England defender who has also scored at Wembley . . . an equaliser for QPR in the 1982 FA Cup Final, which Spurs eventually won in a replay. Despite being a North-Easterner, he has spent most of his career with London clubs joining Swindon last September on, release from

Spurs.

ADRIAN WHITBREAD, 22. Signed for £500,000 at the start of the season from Leyton Orient, where John Gorman once coached him in the youth team.

NICKY SUMMERBEE, 22. Latest in a line of footballers which includes his father, grandfather and an uncle. His Dad, Mike, also played for Swindon before joining Manchester City where he had an outstanding career. Nicky started out as a centre-forward, but has been converted into an adventurous full-back.

PAUL BODIN, 29. Welsh left-back whose missed penalty was one of the talking points when Wales failed to qualify for the World Cup Finals. Left Swindon

HISTORY

Swindon Town was founded in 1881 and they became original members of the Southern League in 1884.


They joined the Football League's new Third Division in 1920 and survived three re-election applications before reaching the Second Division in 1963.

Their Second Division spell did not last long. In 1969, though, they won promotion from Division Three and beat Arsenal in a famous League Cup Final at Wembley.

By 1974 Swindon's fortunes had turned again and they fell in to the bottom grade in 1982.

The appointment of former Scottish international and Manchester United star Lou Macari brought a big upturn - he led them to the Fourth Division title in 1986 and into the Second Division in 1987.

Swindon almost won promotion again in 1989 before Macari left, Ossie Ardiles, now with Spurs, and Glenn Hoddle, now with Chelsea, succeeded Macari before the appointment of current manager John Gorman.

to join Crystal Palace in a £550,000 deal in March, 1991, then returned ten months later after failing to command a place. KEVIN HORLOCK, 21. After joining Town from West Ham in the summer of 1992, he got a first-team chance last season when Paul Bodin was injured.

LUC NIJHOLT, 32. Summer signing at £175,000 from Motherwell, where he had played for three years after leaving Old Boys Basle, of Switzerland. The former Dutch Under-21 player, who is at home in defence or midfield, has also served FC Haarlem, AZ 67 Alkmaar and FC Utrecht.

MIDFIELD

JOHN MONCUR, 27. Had loan spells with six different clubs before Spurs sold him to Town for £80,000 on the 1992 deadline day. Had problems with injuries at first, but has emerged as a highly-skilled performer.

MARTIN LING, 27. Another in his second spell with Swindon. Cost £25,000 in 1986 from Exeter City, then joined Southend United

93 days later, making 138 League appearances. In the summer of 1991 Glenn Hoddle brought him back for a mere £15,000, since when the club has rejected several offers.

ROSS MACLAREN, 31. Appointed captain after Calderwood joined Spurs. Former Derby County and Shrewsbury player who is greatly experienced. Spent most of last season on the injured list.

MARCUS PHILLIPS, 20. Attacking midfielder who made his debut last season.

AUSTIN BERKLEY, 20. John Gorman snapped up another former pupil when Austin was released by Gillingham, where Town's manager has also served as youth team coach. Scored in his Swindon debut against Oxford United in March, 1991.

FORWARDS

ANDY MUTCH, 30. Best known for his seven-year partnership with former England striker Steve Bull at Wolves, where Andy scored 97 goals in 289 League games. He cost £250,000 last August.

KEITH SCOTT 26. Signed from Wycombe Wanderers last month for a fee of £300,000. Previously with Lincoln City. Keith had scored 60 goals in 112 games with Wycombe during their non-League days and 15 goals in 23 games in Wycombe's first season in the Football League. Made an impressive start at The County Ground scoring in his first two games, one against Queen's Park Rangers which gave Town their first Premiership win.

JAN AAGE FJORTOFT, 26. Norwegian striker and one of the men who helped to put them into the World Cup Finals at England's expense. Swindon bought him for £500,000 from Rapid Vienna last July.

CRAIG MASKELL, 25. Top scorer with 20 goals last season after joining the club in a £250,000 deal with Reading, where he had also been leading marksman.


STEVE WHITE, 34. Picked up in a free transfer from Bristol Rovers in 1986 and now in a benefit year. His clubs also include Luton Town and Charlton and he has hit more than 200 League goals.


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The Robins' League progress from August (A) to November (N)..


How Swindon's 14 League goals have been scored



Who is responsible for 19 Bookings




Who has scored 14 League and 3 League Cup Goals




When the Goals have been Scored






Average Shots on target and Corners per Match



Julian hopes for a Cup return in his home city

JULIAN Dicks has described his move to Liverpool as "one of the best decisions of my life." He arrived from West Ham United in September, made his debut against neighbours Everton at Goodison Park and felt confident that his career would blossom on the big stage.

After a mere seven games, though, he suffered a cartilage injury and cannot put a date on his comeback. "I hope to be fit by Christmas time or early in the New Year," he says. "I have had to wait for the swelling to go down before I could start working again."

But his confidence in Liverpool's future has not subsided in the meantime. "We will win things here," he declares. "It is just a matter of time."

His problems began when he took a knock against Oldham Athletic at Anfield on October 16. "There was a clicking in the left knee and it wouldn't go away," he recalls. The subsequent operation, however, brought some relief rather than anxiety. He had injured the same knee at West Ham three years ago and been out of football for 14 months.

"That was a painful period of my life," he says. "I was not the best of patients. But this is little by comparison, I should be in the gymnasium soon and then in training."

He was disappointed to miss the home game against his former club, but realised that further aggravation to the injury could have set him back for a longer spell.

"I have not felt any great pressure in my few games here because I was in there with good players," he reasons. "And I also felt that I was building up a good relationship with the supporters. Now, I'll have to start all over again."

Julian has been able to swim at a local hotel and keep up a general level of fitness, but he cannot wait to resume his normal training programme. "I felt that I had fitted in

well with everybody at the club and I was happy with my form," he says.

"I cannot work to a direct target for my comeback game, but I expect to be fit before the FA Cup game in my home city of Bristol in January."


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

GOALKEEPER Ray Clemence was chasing perfection from the day he arrived at Anfield as an unknown . . . and it was soon noticed.

His performances in the Reserves were top class, his all-round professionalism and his attitude to training were almost flawless.

And first-team coach Ronnie Moran says: "It couldn't possibly have been long before he broke through, he was giving off all the right signals. Tommy Lawrence was first choice at that time, a great keeper, too. But age was in Ray's favour."

Earlier, Liverpool had underlined the seriousness of their interest in Clemence when manager Bill Shankly, first lieutenant Bob Paisley and coach Reuben Bennett all filed into Scunthorpe United's Old Showground for a midweek fixture.

And the story goes that the game was only half an hour old when Shankly announced: "We are going home, I have seen enough." Soon afterwards, Ray Clemence became a Liverpool player.

His achievements were phenomenal. He won 61 England caps in an 11-year span between Liverpool and Spurs and enough silverware to start a private museum.

Ronnie, so often the driving force behind him, says simply: "He had very special talents. He was prepared to work hard and wanted to be a winner. He was unlucky that Peter Shilton was around on the international scene at the same time, otherwise he would have claimed more honours."

Clem, as he was known to his teammates, was the original quiet man in the dressing-room on match days. He had little to say to anybody before the kick-off.

"But he was just the opposite after the final whistle when things had gone well," Ronnie recalls. "He could not hide his elation."

The UEFA Cup Final (first leg) against Bruges at Anfield will live forever in the memories of the supporters who saw and experienced that very special night. Liverpool were 2-0 down and won 3-2 in a sensational finish.

But Ray played for England against Scotland at Hamden Park shortly before



the second leg in Belgium and experienced a blunder in the international which, was well publicised in the Sunday newspapers. Kenny Dalglish had slotted a shot through his legs for a goal!

“Ray had a hatred of mistakes,” explains Ronnie. “To such a degree that he would take them to heart for a while.

And he was still in a bit of a state with himself when we went to Bruges to protect that 3-2 lead.

“I took him for training. We wanted him livening up again and concen-

trating on the immediate job in hand.

“And what happened? Against all the odds he allowed one of my shots to slip through his legs and a couple of supporters gave him some good-natured banter.

“But Ray didn’t like it. He was always seeking perfection. We drew 1-1 over there, Ray was in good form and Bob Paisley came back with his first European prize as a manager.”

Ronnie has lost count of the super saves he saw Clem make and remembers the very special gift he had for stopping penalty kicks.

“He was a very agile keeper, a good athlete and he would study penalty takers on television,” he recalls. “His other strengths were his courage, excellent reading of the game and good handling of crosses.”

Ray played with a superb team of defenders in his Liverpool days and supporters marvelled at his level of concentration. He could be inactive for half an hour then spring acrobatically to save the next shot at his goal. “There’s no doubt that he pulled us out of trouble on a lot of occasions,” says Ronnie.

“He had a good build for a keeper and knew how to prepare himself before games.


“He also had a very good understanding with the men in front of him.

“I once told him that he would play until he was 40 because he never put on an extra ounce of weight.

“The forecast was about right in the end.”

SWINDON Town's Nicky Summerbee has received a first-class report on Liverpool supporters before his expected Anfield debut today.

"Dad tells me that the magical moment is coming up the steps from the tunnel and onto that surface. I'm hoping to find out for myself."


Although Swindon Town have struggled since winning promotion from the play-off last season, he believes that the spirit is good and young players have become better educated with the demands of the Premiership.

"We have made mistakes this season and been severely punished at this level, but we do play good football."

"We have learned since Liverpool gave us that 5-0 sorting out at the County Ground in August. And at Anfield we are the under-dogs who have to win games. We might just have a surprise or two."

Young Summerbee has no fears, either, about his baptism. "The bigger the crowd and the stage, then the better we should perform," he reasons. "They get the adrenalin going. These are the places to do well."

"But Nicky has come through that difficult chapter and survived. I played for Swindon before I moved to Manchester City, but I have never interfered with his career. He makes his own decisions now.

"He should discover for himself today that Liverpool supporters are appreciative of any team – not just their own – which gives 100 per cent effort. I hope Nicky is fit and selected.

"Any player's first game at Liverpool is a fantastic experience."

All change for

LEE Jones was puzzled by the silence when he reported to Crewe Alexandra's Gresty Road ground on the first day of a two-month loan period from Liverpool.

He wasn't late for training and he was looking forward to meeting his new and temporary teammates.

Finally, with no one in sight, he made inquiries at the office and was told that the players had already left for the training ground three miles away.

Manager Dario Gradi always insisted that they use the club's minibus. Travelling by car was simply not allowed.

So Lee ran the three miles before he even began training. Now he is back at Anfield and grateful for the time he spent with the Third Division club.

He played four games for Crewe — against Walsall, Shrewsbury Town, Chesterfield and Rochdale — and substituted in another three. Against Rochdale he scored in a 2-1 win with a 30-yard drive which has since been shown on television.

"I feel a better player for the time I spent there," says the 20-year-old striker, who is a Welsh Under-21 international. "I missed Anfield and its better facilities, but I enjoyed first-team football.

"It did me good. Crewe are a pass-

ing team and that was the reason I agreed to join them on loan."

He has since been allocated the official No 24 shirt at Liverpool and came close to a squad call-up for the game at Newcastle. "It was all very exciting when assistant manager Roy Evans said a new shirt had been made for me, but I was carrying an injury at the time. I might have been on the subs' bench at Newcastle."

Lee suffered a badly bruised hip in the Reserve Derby with Everton at Anfield, having scored the only goal of the game. This was later aggravated by another knock while he played for Wales against Romania in an under-21 international.

"Still, I think that things are beginning to happen for me," he enthuses. We have all been encouraged by the promotions of Robbie Fowler, Dominic Matteo and Steve Harkness. If I am given my chance, I'll grab it with both hands."

It is 18 months since he arrived at Anfield from Wrexham. He has played in the A Team, the Reserves and in the first team for testimonial matches.

"I knew it would take time to reach the first team, but I have played in the Reserves when a lad called Robbie Fowler was still sitting on the bench," he grins.

Lee has an impressive record with Wales Under-21...six goals in six games, including a hat-trick in a 6-2 win over Cyprus.

"I was really depressed when Wales failed to qualify for the World Cup Finals in that last game against Romania," he declares. "I felt disappointment for Ian Rush more than anyone else because he's done enough for his country and for football to earn a place on the world stage."

It was former Welsh international Brian Flynn who signed Lee and launched him at Wrexham, first as an apprentice and then a professional. The youngster had been spotted by a scout who saw him score a hat-trick in a 5-1 win for a college under-18 team.

"I was called in for trials and there were 30 other lads waiting there. I thought my chances were slim, but I scored three goals again and Brian




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AWAY




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How we lost our rhythm and a 3-0 lead
