
the 3rd round of the F.A. Youth Cup. The game is to be played at the County Ground on Monday 10 January 1994 kicking off at 7.30pm.



Gunning for the top - by John Nolan

Arsenal, who went into their game at Leeds in fourth place in the Premiership table - 15 points behind the leaders Manchester United - have somehow not been able to reproduce their Cup form in the League this season.

It all started so badly for them with a 3-1 defeat by Coventry City on the opening day of the season at Highbury. When Ian Wright scored the only goal to beat Spurs it seemed the opening day blues were just an unfortunate hiccup; an assumption further supported when Wright earned three points against Sheffield Wednesday.

Three wins out of the next four games, over Leeds United (2-1); Everton (2-0) and Ipswich (4-0) hoisted the Gunners into second place in the table but a disappointing October in which they failed to register a single League goal rather blunted their ambitions.

Even so England goalkeeper David Seaman still managed to maintain five successive clean sheets in the Premiership, an indication of the strength of the Arsenal defence. Ironically, despite the drought in the League, Arsenal still continued to score freely in Cup competitions, their 7-0 away win over Standard Liege in the ECWC being the performance of the season.

Arsenal were unfortunate not to beat Norwich City and Aston Villa at Highbury but had the luck when Ian Wright's last minute goal secured the points over Sheffield Wednesday. Any ground lost at home seems to have been made up away where their quick counter attacks are so effective.

Lee Dixon and Nigel Winterburn, who has had some ankle ligament problems, are the regular fullbacks; and skipper Tony Adams, who missed England's World Cup tie against San Marino, with a swollen ankle, is back in the side. His partner in the centre of defence will come from Bould, Linighan or Keown.

Merson and Limpar have been playing wide roles in midfield with Jensen just in front of the back four and either Davis or Selley in the middle.

England striker Ian Wright is full of confidence. Alan Smith has been his partner of late with young Paul Campbell on the bench.

Arsenal ABC

TONY ADAMS - Central Defender. Became one of Arsenal's youngest-ever captain's when appointed in 1988. Joined the club from school and was introduced to League football at 17 (November 1983) against Sunderland. Has now made over 370 appearances and led the team to two Championships; the FA Cup and two League Cup successes. Claimed the PFA 'Young Player of The Year' award in 1987. Also won back his England place last season but missed the San Marino game in November because of injury. Born: London 10-10-66.


STEVE BOULD - Central Defender. Has come back into the side for the injured Adams in recent weeks. Joined Arsenal from Stoke in 1988 for £390,000 and won a Championship medal the following season. Strong durable defender. Born: Stoke 16-11-62.

KEVIN CAMPBELL - Striker. At 23 Kevin has already collected Championship (1991); FA Cup and Coca-Cola Cup medals as well as an FA Youth Cup winners medal in

1988. Strong, powerful attacker he joined the Gunners as a trainee in 1986. Made his League debut at Everton in May 1988 and had a loan spell with Leyton Orient and Leicester City before establishing himself in the Arsenal attack. Born: London 4-2-70.

PAUL DAVIS - Midfield. Returned to the side in March 1992 after more than a year on the sidelines and played his part in both Cup successes last season. Won championship medals in 1989 and 1991 and was in the 1987 Littlewoods Cup winning side. Very gifted and creative midfielder he has gained England recognition at Under-21 and 'B' Levels. Born: South London 9-12-61.

LEE DIXON - Right Back. An England International with over 20 caps Lee has claimed two League Championship (1989 and 1991) and FA Cup winners medals. Missed the Coca-Cola Cup Final last season because of suspension. Lee came into football with Burnley who gave him a free transfer after just four appearances in two years. Had a couple of seasons with Chester and one at Bury before signing for Stoke City in 1986. Arsenal recruited him in 1988 for £350,000. Born: Manchester 17-3-64.

JOHN JENSEN - Midfield. Arsenal paid Bronby £1.1million for John after his European Championship winning performance for Denmark in Sweden in 1992. A ball-winning midfielder he struggled at first to come to terms with English football and still has yet to score. Started his career with Bronby but in 1988 signed for Hamburg SV and played two years in the Bundesliga before returning to Bronby. Born: Copenhagen 3-5-65.

MARTIN KEOWN - Defender. Developed through the Youth ranks at Highbury but left after a dispute over money in the summer of 1986 to join Aston Villa. Martin had played 20 League games for The Gunners and 23 for Brighton on loan. After three years with Villa he joined Everton in a £750,000 move and in 1992 became a great success in England's European Championship Finals side in Sweden. George Graham took him back to Highbury in February 1993 at a cost of £2million. Born: Oxford 24-7-66.

ANDERS LIMPAN - Midfield. A most gifted Swedish International whose consistency has not matched his flair. A great crowd pleaser he missed last season's Cup Finals through injury but is now back tantalising defenders with his close control and surging runs. Has played in Sweden with Örgryte; in Switzerland for Young Boys Berne; and in Italy with Cremona where he played one season in Serie A. George Graham forked out £1-million to sign him from Cremonese in the summer of 1990. Has over 40 caps for Sweden. Born: Solna 24-9-65.

ANDY LINIGHAN - Central Defender. Andy's last minute FA Cup Final winner last May inscribed his name forever in the history of Arsenal. Arrived at Highbury in 1990 from Norwich for £1.2million but struggled to make an impression. Came into football with Hartlepool and then had spells with Leeds and Oldham before helping Norwich claim third place in the First Division in 1989. Capped by England at 'B' level. Born: Hartlepool 18-6-62.

PAL LYDERSEN - Right Back. Norwegian International signed from Start Kristiansand for £500,000 in November 1991. Made his Arsenal debut at Wimbledon in March 1992. A versatile player who can operate in both fullback positions, as a sweeper or in midfield. Born: Odense 10-9-65.

EDDIE MCGOLDRICK - Midfield. A £1million import from Crystal Palace in the summer of 1993 Eddie has settled smoothly into The Gunners pattern. Kettering Town was his first club and he then played for Nuneaton Borough before Northampton gave him a crack at League football in 1986. Three years later Palace bought him for £200,000 and he operated in several roles for them in midfield and as a sweeper. It was as a wide right sided player that he scored most goals. Picked up his 9th cap for Eire in the big show-down with Northern Ireland recently. Born: London 30-4-65.

Arsenal

PAUL MERSON - Forward. Had to pull out of England's show-down with San Marino through injury. Strong running athlete with a powerful finish he started off as Alan Smith's striking partner then switched to a wide role. An England regular for the past two years he was 'Man of the Match' in the Coca-Cola Cup Final win over Sheffield Wednesday. Made his League debut against Manchester City in November 1986. Born: Northolt 20-3-68.

ALAN MILLER - Goalkeeper. Made the record books when he became Arsenal's first goalkeeper sub at Leeds United last year and made three more appearances towards the end of the season. Became the first goalkeeper from the FA 'School of Excellence' to win England Under-21 honours. Has had loan spells with Plymouth, WBA and Birmingham City but has played just 6 league games for The Gunners including a recent run while Seaman was suspended. Born: Epping 29-3-70.

RAY PARLOUR - Midfield. Exciting young talent who was introduced to League football at Liverpool in February 1992. Played in both Cup Finals last season and is an England Under-21 International. Well balanced, he loves to take opponents on. Born: Romford 7-3-73.


DAVID SEAMAN - Goalkeeper. Arsenal broke the British transfer record when they paid £1.3million to QPR for David in 1990. Conceded just 18 goals in his first season at Highbury which brought him a League Championship medal. Last season he added League Cup and FA Cup winners medals to his collection. Started his career with Leeds United but didn't make League football until he joined Peterborough United. A £100,000 transfer took him to Birmingham City and England Under-21 honours then in 1986 he moved to Loftus Road. England's current first choice keeper he was on duty against San Marino. Was sent-off for a professional foul at West Ham. Born: Rotherham 19-9-63.

IAN SELLEY - Midfield. Was just 18 when he played in the FA Cup semi-final win over Spurs last season and was on the subs bench for the Coca-Cola Cup Final. Played for England in the Under-18 World Championship Finals in Australia, and looks a great prospect for the future. Born: Weybridge 14-6-74.

ALAN SMITH - Striker. Has scored over 100 goals for Arsenal since his arrival from Leicester City in 1987 for £850,000. Top shot in four of his six seasons he collected the adidas 'Golden Shoe' award as the top scorer in Division One in 1991. Has played an important part in The Gunners' success story. Started out with Alvechurch and played for the England semi-pro team. Capped by England at full International level 13 times. Born: Bromsgrove 21-11-62.

NIGEL WINTERBURN - Left back. One of the most consistent defenders in the game Nigel is unfortunate not to have won more than two caps for England. George Graham snapped him up from Wimbledon in 1987 for just £350,000 and he has now clocked up over 2000 League appearances for The Gunners. Started his career with Birmingham City

then Oxford United signed him on a free before he joined Wimbledon. Was 'Player of the Year' four years running with The Dons. Has collected all the domestic major honours at Highbury. Born: Nuneaton 11-12-63.

Manager

George Graham, appointed manager in May 1986, has already ensured his place in the Arsenal roll of honour.

In his first season Graham won the Littlewoods Cup. A year later Arsenal were beaten finalists. Then in 1989 came the League Championship, a feat in 38 League games.


Last season of course came the Cup 'double' with victories over Sheffield Wednesday in both Finals.

George, known as "Stroller" in his days as an elegant forward started his football career with Aston Villa. He went on to play for Chelsea where he won a League Cup medal and joined Arsenal in 1966.

In 1969 Don Howe switched him to midfield where he was most effective in the Fairs Cup Final side and in the 1972 FA Cup Final.

Joined Manchester United in 1972-73 and finished his playing days with Crystal Palace and Portsmouth. Capped 12 times by Scotland.

Coached at Palace and QPR before managing Millwall.

Ian Wright - by Colin Benson


Striker. Ex-Crystal Palace favourite he has proved a huge success since becoming Arsenal's record import at £2.5million in September 1991.

Ian now ranks with the Club's greatest scorers - only the legendary Ted Drake boasts a better strike rate.

Was playing for Greenwich Borough when Steve Coppell signed him for Crystal Palace and he played in their 1990 FA Cup Final replay.

Won his first FA Cup and League Cup winners' medals last season when starred in both Arsenal's Wembley showpieces.

A bubbly enthusiastic performer Ian collected his 16th England cap in San Marino last month and though he had previously been unable to reproduce his domestic scoring form for his country he rattled in four goals to take his tally to five. Born: Woolwich 3-11-63



I was working on the television gantry at Notts County when the scoreboard flashed "Latest Score." Up came the unbelievable "Liverpool 1 Swindon Town 2".

I nearly swallowed the microphone and had not the rain forced me to sit a little further back from the edge I could well have toppled over onto the Magpies bench.

On reaching the Press Room shortly after the final whistle I enquired, with great enthusiasm in the voice, the final score at Anfield?

I suppose the reply was somewhat anticipated but that did not alleviate the disappointment which was further compounded by the accompanying remarks from a well respected Midland journalist.

He said; "2-2 it's a pity they weren't beaten. The sooner Swindon are out of the Premiership the better. They should never be there in the first place. It just shows what a ludicrous thing the play-off system is.

"I hope they are relegated and go down where they belong in the Third Division."

As this man covers Derby County I suspect there is a touch of sour grapes in his feelings but it does show that not everyone appreciates cultured football.

Of course our friend is a so called expert, whose analysis and views are read and taken in by thousands. "Pussy footing football" is I think how he described the Swindon game though I suspect he hasn't seen us live this season.

Thankfully, some who know a little bit more about the game, have expressed alternative views. None other than Liverpool boss Graeme Souness praised us after that 2-2 draw at Anfield, stating: "Swindon came here to play football and they did it very well."

Note that in the Midlands, "did it very well". You know right from the 1870's when the game really began to take hold there has been nothing that has mirrored the society we live in better than football.


It is still that way today. A report released a fortnight ago condemned the vocational education system in this country as 'a complete shambles'.

The report, published by Prof. Smithers and a team from Manchester University's Centre for Education and Employment Research claimed, 'There is disregard amounting to a disdain for knowledge' and advised; 'Continental pupils are two or three years ahead of their British counterparts.'

The very same observations could be levelled at our football. Manchester United and Aston Villa's experiences in Europe brought to an end; England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland all out of the World Cup!

Yet still the men who formulated the obviously failed blueprint for the development of our national game hold their high offices in the coaching and teaching departments of the FA.

1987




Town added six points in their quest to go from the Fourth to the Second Division in successive seasons. Brentford succumbed 2-0 at the County Ground, Mark Jones netting a 33rd minute penalty with Steve White grabbing the second. Swindon then recorded a rare win at Gillingham on December 27. Peter Coyne set them on the way in the ninth minute, before another Jones spot-kick and a Karl Elsey own goal secured victory.

1980



Despite losing goalkeeper Jimmy Allan through injury after only half an hour, Town pulled off a fine 2-0 win at Newport. Swindon were already a goal up, through Chris Kamařa, when they suffered their set-back and they added another on the hour from Russell Lewis. Man of the Match had to be striker Andy Rowland, who performed heroics after taking over in goal. Town made it a Christmas 'double' with a 3-0 home win over Plymouth Argyle - all three goals coming in a 16 minute spell, from Roy Carter, Roy Greenwood and Rowland. Tom McAlister took over from Allan in goal - his only League appearance for the club.



1977



In a Boxing Day derby clash at the Manor Ground, Town trailed Oxford 0-3 at half-time - but then stormed back to snatch a point. Kamařa struck twice before Chris Guthrie grabbed the equaliser. Again Plymouth provided the opposition for the Town's home fixture and were defeated 3-1, with David Moss, Guthrie and Kamařa supplying the goals.

1966



Town were paired with Peterborough in one of the last traditional home and away Christmas fixtures. Swindon recorded a 'double' with a 2-1 victory at London Road and a 4-1 win in the return. Don Rogers and Mel Nurse secured the points in the first game. Rogers added another two at the County Ground, with the other brace coming in a two-minute burst from Willie Penman.

1952



Town completed another 'double', this time in the Third Division South, with a 5-2 win over Exeter, Willie Millar, Terry Ryder, Mick Betteridge and Jimmy Bain (2) were the scorers. Bain and Ryder, had been on target in a 2-1 win at St James' Park on Boxing Day.

1938



This was surely one of the Christmas 'crackers' of all time, when League leaders Newport County came to the County Ground on Christmas Day - and were demolished 8-0! Ben Morton grabbed a hat-trick, with Arthur Barraclough, Billy Lucas, Eddie Jones and Cliff Francis (2) completing the rout. The fun continued on Boxing Day at Somerton Park in a ten-goal thriller in front of over 20,000! Barraclough claimed another two and Jones and Francis one apiece, but Newport triumphed 6-4 with South African Lance Carr netting three.

He's tall he's lean and supremely athletic but the odds are that Nicky Hammond will be sitting on the bench this afternoon watching Fraser Digby take all the glory.

It's tough being on the fringe and even tougher when the opposition is not only as glamorous as Arsenal but is your former club. What Nicky wouldn't give to be out there facing Ian Wright and company this afternoon.

"I served my apprenticeship at Highbury," says the elegant goalkeeper, "and had two or three years there as a professional. Arsenal are a fantastic club, it is a fantastic place to be."

"You are brought up the right way at Arsenal, there is a great tradition which they live up to. As young players we had it instilled in us to do things correctly."

"I recall being told to always remember 'who you are; what you are and what you represent.' Those words have always stuck in my memory."

"I was in the Youth Team under Pat Rice who was a tremendous manager. We were taught to discipline ourselves off the field as standards off the field are usually adopted on the field. If you do things right off the pitch you should do them right in play as well."

Nicky was at Highbury in the post-Pat Jennings era when John Lukic was the king of the goalmouth and Welsh International Rhys Wilmot - who later went to Plymouth - was his understudy.

There were barely any first team opportunities for Wilmot never mind Nicky who had emerged from the Youth Team. He was farmed out on loan to Bristol Rovers, with whom he made his League debut; Peterborough United and Aberdeen, to gain experience but even so the long term prospects at Highbury looked bleak.

Practicing with Lukic and Wilmot on the training field provided great experience and says Nicky: "Bob Wilson worked us two mornings a week which was absolutely superb training."

"I didn't really want to leave but you need to be playing first team football to get the most out of the job."

"I have the utmost respect for George Graham. You always knew where you stood with him and he looked after me very well."

"It was a wrench to leave such a great club and move down to Wiltshire where Nicky knew he would still have to fight for a senior place against top class 'keeper Fraser Digby.

"I'm very happy here. It is a lovely club, they are a terrific bunch of players," says Nicky but he can't hide the obvious frustration of touring the Premiership on the substitutes bench.

"I'm 26, which in goalkeeping terms is not too old," he says. "The best years are still ahead of me but I have to seriously look at the future and make some decisions."

Nicky is highly thought of in goalkeeping circles and has been appointed by the FA as their goalkeeping coach for the South West. In this connection he will be running three one-day sessions in February, March and April, dealing with all aspects of the craft.

The theme in February will be shot stopping and positional play. In March he will deal with crosses and penalties and in April; improvised and instinctive saves. Anyone can attend.

Today though remains something special as Arsenal take the field at the County Ground for the very first time in League competition.

Yuletide Show Stoppers



Had a good Christmas? Fine, after all that food and plonk there is nothing like a good football match to blow some fresh air through your lungs and stimulate the appetite for tonight's next feast.

With Christmas Day falling on a Saturday this year we have been denied our usual Boxing Day menu but with fixtures over Monday and Tuesday or Wednesday the holiday programme has been kept in tact.

The festive season has always been a busy period for professional footballers and given the added hazards of the weather can prove one of the most gruelling sequences of the season. It is at times like this that you need strength in depth to cover for any possible injury problems.

Mind you, a footballer's lot at Christmas is a piece of cake these days in comparison with times gone by. In the early days after the War the Football League always included fixtures on both Christmas Day and Boxing Day; and quite often the game on the 26th were the return fixtures of the 25th.

It was common practice for two teams to travel together on the train straight after the Christmas morning fixture. Times have changed of course. You try and get a train on Christmas Day now!

The practice of staging games on Christmas Day ended in 1959 because of players protests and dwindling support but former England manager Bobby Robson has fond memories of these Yuletide treats.

He says: "I must say I enjoyed the all-action Christmas when I was a player. But it is better since it has been reorganised.

"It was very hard playing four, or even more, games in eight days. I remember playing Manchester United at Fulham one Christmas Morning in thick clawing mud; a quick shower then jumping on the train to travel to Manchester with the United lads. The next day at Old Trafford it was a rock solid ground."

Football has not often let its customers down in the festive season. Since the first Christmas Day League fixture between Preston North End and Aston Villa - which Preston won 3-2 in 1889 - the festive games have been strewn with rogue results.

The record breaking Christmas of all time was 1963. West Ham United fans will remember it well.

The ten First Division fixtures on Boxing Day

produced no less than 66 goals. Fulham led the spree by thrashing Ipswich Town 10-1 at Craven Cottage - Graham Leggat scoring three in three minutes in the first half to record the fastest First Division hat-trick since the war.

While that was going on the Hammers were crashing to ignominious defeat at Upton Park as Blackburn Rovers ran riot. 8-2 the score to the men from Ewood Park.


Incredible as these scorelines are there was even more surprises to come. Two days later at Ewood Park Johnny Byrne, who had scored both West Ham's goals at Upton Park, netted two more. Geoff Hurst also hit the target as the Hammers won 3-1.

Likewise Ipswich exacted revenge, beating Fulham 4-2 at Portman Road.

The Christmas crackers of all time though are Norwich City. They plundered 18 goals without reply from Brighton at Carrow Road on Christmas Day 1940. Brighton, who hoped to pick up players on route arrived with five men. They took the field supplemented by Norwich City Reserves and a few soldier volunteers from the crowd.

If Christmas is a time for good cheer there wasn't much around at Walsall on 29th December 1894. Visiting Newcastle United were kept waiting 20 minutes for the kick-off while a threatened strike by the Walsall players, who wanted guarantees that their wages would be paid, was averted.

Newcastle led 3-0 but had been pulled back 3-2 when the referee abandoned the game for bad light in the 78th minute. The Football League later ruled the result should stand.

Unfortunately we have had a number of games postponed recently because of the bad weather which has swept across the Country and we have to therefore try and vary the training for the lads to maintain both fitness and interest.

It's good to see Adrian Viveash back at the club now starting on the long road to recovery after his accident in the game against Arsenal Reserves when he collided with The Gunners keeper sustaining a broken leg. He has had the full plaster cast removed and is now wearing a half-cast and is able to do some light work using weights. He is also undertaking circuit training to build up his quadriceps. He is due to see the specialist shortly after Christmas who will X-ray his leg to see if the break has healed sufficiently to allow the cast to be removed completely.

Adrian is fully aware of the fact that there is little chance of him playing again this season due to the severity of the injury but with careful rehabilitation he should be ready for next season pushing for his place again in the first team.

There is no game for the Reserves now until Wednesday week when we travel to play Charlton Athletic at Welling. Our next home game sees Tottenham Hotspur here at The County Ground on Wednesday 15 January.






