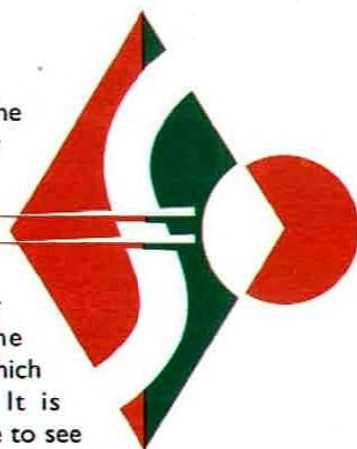
A great start to the festivities although as it was we felt we didn't do ourselves full justice. We certainly had the chances to establish a more convincing scoreline.

A Touch of The Blues - by John Nolan

Two defeats in their opening three games of the season was hardly the ideal start for new Chelsea manager Glenn Hoddle but a subsequent run of seven games unbeaten quickly turned the blues to smiles.

Hoddle, one of the most gifted players of the past two generations, had, it seemed, transformed Chelsea to his own innovative playing style. He said: "I intend to help my team to play to a pattern that will create time and space for us."

It would obviously take time of course for the players to adjust but straight away there is a buzz about Stamford Bridge, a positive air that the good times are not far away.

Hoddle's glorious days as a player were put on the line when he quit Swindon to take charge at the Bridge. Town wanted £1-million for his transfer as a player; as it happens a much more realistic price than the £75,000 a tribunal eventually set.

It was he who inspired Chelsea to victory over Manchester United with a super show of skill and vision that literally no other English player can match. Gavin Peacock, an inspired signing from Newcastle United, scored the all important goal to seal United's first League defeat since March.

Then it was Liverpool's turn to lose at Chelsea. Again the score was 1-0 but this time the scorer was the teenage discovery Neil Shipperley, a name to look out for.

With Russian ace Dmitri Kharaine in sparkling form in goal and Hoddle playing the sweeper role, either in front of or behind the back line of Scottish International Steve Clark, former Northern Ireland star Mal Donaghy, Frank Sinclair, who has been a revelation in defence, and Jakob Kjelbjerg, who looks cheap at £400,000, the Blues seemed to have an impressive foundation.

Dennis Wise, the captain, given a free role behind the two strikers assumed the important link role for the promptings of Glenn Hoddle in his favoured diamond formation, and has been a crucial factor in the team's development.

Then it all went wrong. Results began to go against Chelsea, form suffered and with Hoddle reduced to the side-lines through injury they entered the holiday period with an unenviable record. The 1-1 home draw with Ipswich extending their run without a win to 10 games.

With Robert Fleck out of form and now at Bolton on loan Tony Cascarino and new £1.5million striker Mark Stein assumed the mantle of leading the line; but neither has had much success in terms of goals so far.

Chelsea ABC

TONY CASCARINO - Striker. Scored a magnificent hat-trick in the final of the pre-season Makita International Tournament to destroy Tottenham at White Hart Lane. Injury has spoilt his last few seasons, and his Club form has not rivalled his International success for several years. But this year he has had his first unhindered pre-season for four years, and as a result is fitter and sharper than for some time. His ability on the ball has been a surprising bonus to Glenn Hoddle. Born: 1-9-62. Other clubs: Crockenhill, Gillingham, Millwall, Aston Villa and Celtic. Signed: February 1992, exchange for Tom Boyd valued at £800,000. International honours: 43 Republic of Ireland caps, 11 goals.

STEVE CLARKE - Fullback. Looking to re-assert himself after two hernia operations have interrupted his last two seasons. Chelsea's longest serving first-teamer, his attacking forays at right back helped get him into the Scotland team, but a back injury cost him his World Cup

place in 1990, and also lost him his Chelsea place to Gareth Hall. When he finally got back in the team his excellent form in late 1991 was halted by his first hernia operation, and last season he had to face another after just a handful of games. After an uninterrupted pre-season, his aim has been first to Chelsea and then to Scotland. Born: 29-8-63. Other Clubs: Benith Juniors and St Mirren. Signed: January 1987, £422,000. International honours: 5 Scotland caps, 2 Scotland 'B' caps, Scotland U21 and Youth caps. Represented Football League v Rest of the World August 1987 at Wembley.

MAL DONAGHY - Midfield/Defender. The third most capped Northern Irishman ever, behind Sammy McIlroy and Pat Jennings, and at the start of the season needed just four internationals to catch up with McIlroy. Has won many of his caps at left back, though more recently he has been used as a holding midfielder. At Chelsea he scored two goals in consecutive matches, his first goals in five years. This season he is being shifted forward to the defensive midfield role just in front of the back three where he can use his experience to keep

Chelsea tight and in possession. A League Cup winner at Luton. He is 36. Born 13-9-57. Other clubs: Larne, Luton, Manchester United, Luton (loan). Signed: August 1992, £100,000 + £1,000 per game for 50 games. International honours: 84 Northern Ireland caps, Under 21 cap.

ANDY DOW - Midfield. Summer signing from Dundee on the recommendation of new Youth Team coach Graham Rix, who played alongside him last season. Either a left sided player in front of the back three, or a midfielder, he possesses good first touch and technique, and likes the occasional mazy dribble. Born: 7-2-73. Other clubs: Dundee. Signed: July 1993, £175,000 rising to around £400,000. International honours: 3 Scotland U21 caps.

KEVIN HITCHCOCK - Goalkeeper. In his sixth year at Chelsea. Joined from Mansfield where he starred in a Wembley penalty shoot-out to help win the Leyland DAF Cup. The PFA voted him the Third Division's best goalkeeper. Two bad injuries kept him out for nearly a season, and when he returned Dave Beasant had been signed. Finished last season on loan to West Ham. Started this one by saving two more penalties in a Makita Tournament shoot out with Ajax. Penalty saving expert, superb shot stopper, and in his spare time a mean club cricketer with seven centuries to his name. Born: 5-10-62. Other clubs: Barking, Nottingham Forest, Mansfield (loan), Mansfield, Northampton (loan) and West Ham (loan). Signed: March 1988, £250,000.

ERLAND JOHNSEN - Central Defender. A very successful start with Chelsea was followed by a period of injury which cost his first-team place, and he was consequently left out of the Norway International team just as it was building it's successful side. A good season now could see this central defender making the World Cup Finals in America. He regained his place with Chelsea last season under David Webb. Strong and quick, still looking for his first Chelsea goal, he likes nothing better than to nip back to Norway, go out on a boat and fish for days on end. Born: 5-4-67. Other clubs: Moss FK, Bayern Munich. Signed: December 1989, £306,000. International honours: 18 Norway caps, 2 goals. Under 21, Youth and Olympic qualifying caps.

DMITRI KHARINE - Goalkeeper. International, who due to the political changes in his homeland has had the rare experience of being capped by three countries, the USSR, the CIS and Russia. With the latter he qualified for the 1994 World Cup. He was CIS's 'keeper in the European Championship. Agile, excellent handling, and plenty of experience, he captained CSKA Moscow when they came back from 2-0 down in Barcelona to win 3-2 and knock the holders out of the European Cup. Born: 16-8-68. Other clubs: Torpedo Moscow, Dynamo Moscow, CSKA Moscow. Signed: December 1992, £200,000 + £100,000 after 30 appearances and another £100,000 after 60 appearances. International honours: 18 full caps, 37 Olympic team appearances, Under 21 and Youth caps.

Chelsea

DAVID LEE - Central Defender. One of the best passers of the ball from the back in the Premier League, he is looking to take on the crucial central role at the back when Glenn Hoddle is ready to rest his legs. Although he has played midfield like Hoddle, he is more of a central defender, and played that role alongside Frank Sinclair last season when Chelsea went on their surge up the table for three months before Christmas. He also has a strong shot and is fond of the odd dribble. Having broken into the team at 18, he has struggled with long periods of being overlooked. Known as Rodney Trotter because of his likeness to the TV character! Born: 26-11-69. Other clubs: Reading (loan) and Plymouth (loan). Signed: From juniors, July 1988. International honours: 10 England Under 21 caps, Youth caps.

ANDY MYERS. A member of the England Youth World Cup team that went to the semi-finals in Australia last season, remarkable at centre-back, a position he has never failed before or since. Grew up playing mostly central midfield, but won a regular place in the first-team at left-back while still an 18 year old Youth Team player, and represented Chelsea in their sixth round FA Cup quarter-final against Sunderland. Injury interrupted his progress last season, his first out of the Youth Team, and now he is looking to build on his previous success. Strong, fast and determined. Born: 3-11-73. Signed: From juniors, June 1991. International honours: England Youth and Schoolboy caps.

EDDIE NEWTON - Defender. After scoring on his debut from left back, his first full season in the first team last year saw him collect six goals while playing in a mixture of positions, up front, wide midfield and central midfield. In the Reserves he has been an emergency goalkeeper. Central midfield is his favourite place, and that is where he broke into the England Under 21 team. Born: 13-12-71. Other clubs: Cardiff (loan).

GAVIN PEACOCK - Midfield/Striker. Described by Glenn Hoddle as having 'a wonderful attitude to football and to life', he was the new Manager's first big signing, coming in as Andy Townsend left. At Newcastle last season he scored 18 goals as they got promoted, playing either up front or in midfield. He prefers the midfield role. Coming with good timing into the box where he has good touch, he described his goals as "scrappy". This is his first full season in the top division. Born: 18-11-67. other clubs: QPR, Gillingham, AFC Bournemouth and Newcastle. Signed: July 1993, £1.25 million. International honours: England Youth and Schoolboy caps.

NEIL SHIPPERLEY - Striker. Scored 47 goals for Chelsea last season made up through 32 for the Youth Team (top scorer), 14 for the Reserves (top scorer) and one precious one for the first team on his full debut. As a 15 year old played regularly for Brook House in the Diadora League. Strong and mobile, a good finisher, the son of former Charlton, Gillingham and Reading centre half Dave, he now has to step up a level on a regular basis and keep the goals coming. Born: 30-10-74.

FRANK SINCLAIR- Defender. Chelsea's Player of the Year in his first full season last year. Immense spring, wonderful pace, and good strength make him a central defender of much tenacity despite his lack of inches. He has also played full-back. An early brush with authority which led to a nine match suspension has been overcome, and his recent record shows few cautions for a modern day defender. Has successfully man-marked some of the fastest forwards in the land. A local product, he went to Pimlico School up the road from Stamford Bridge. Born: 3-12-71. Other clubs: West Bromwich Albion (loan).

The man in charge



Glenn Hoddle
Manager

Glenn Hoddle took over as player manager during the summer after leading Swindon Town to the Premiership last May via the Play-Offs.

At 36, Glenn is still one of the most gifted talents in the English game. A player of grace and vision whose precise passing can unlock the tightest of defences.

A former Harlow schoolboy star - who incidentally played fly-half in the Wessex rugby team - he joined Spurs from school and made his League debut, as a substitute, against Norwich City in August 1975.

Scored 88 goals in 377 League appearances for Tottenham and was capped 53 times by England. When Bobby Robson took charge of the national squad he talked in terms of building his team around Hoddle. Alas, a combination of uncertainty about Glenn's commitment to tackling and injuries to the Spurs star prevented him following it through.

Glenn became only the sixth player to score from a penalty in an FA Cup Final when he netted the replay winner against QPR in 1982. Shortly after he signed for French club Monaco where he was acclaimed Player of the Year.

Serious injury curtailed his European career and on his return to the UK Glenn joined Chelsea to help with his rehabilitation...When Swindon offered him his first chance of management he seized it and proved himself one of the best in the country.

Has taken charge of the Football League's representative side to play the Italian Second Division XI in the past two years.

Dennis Wise - by Colin Benson

Midfield. Revelling in his favourite role, of midfield. One of the best crossers of the ball in the country, perhaps his most renowned cross was the Cup Final free kick for Wimbledon that set up their famous win against Liverpool. He has continued to be one of the top 'assisters' of goals at the top level, and is looking this season to curb a tendency to collect bookings like assists, and re-establish himself in the

England squad. A director of Chelsea Pitch Owners, the company formed to buy the pitch at Stamford Bridge and keep Chelsea playing football in their traditional home. Chelsea's penalty taker. Born: 15-12-66. Other clubs: Southampton and Wimbledon. Signed: July 1990, £1.6 million, a club record at the time. International honours: 5 caps, 1 goal. 'B' and Under 21 caps.

The Birth of The Blues

Chelsea are unique in the history of League football. For unlike the majority of clubs which were spawned in the 1800's, or after, from groups of enthusiastic amateurs, the Blues were created specifically for the professional market.

The birth of Chelsea could be said to be more an act of defiance than a progression of enthusiasm for 'Gus' Mears, the owner of the then famous sporting arena Stamford Bridge, which he had designs on making the Mecca of English sport, was determined to stage League football at the venue.

Mears had sunk a fortune into the ground but had no intention at all of forming a football club of his own. He had assumed, almost as a matter of fact, that Fulham FC, then a thriving Southern League club, would jump at the offer to leave their dilapidated home for the new arena which was the talk of London Town.

Gus was absolutely flabbergasted when the Fulham chairman turned him down. He was so disillusioned by this and his failure to drum up financial backing from the City for the development of the Bridge that he contemplated selling the ground to the Great Western Railway.

It was the intervention of close friend Frederick Parker that changed the course of history. He had suggested that they form their own team to play in the arena and the Chelsea Athletic and Football Club was duly born on May 8th 1905.

The original intention was to seek election to the Southern League but Fulham canvassed clubs to vote against them. It was a move which was to rebound on the Craven Cottage men for Parker instead turned his attentions to the Football League and gloriously led the new found club into the Second Division.

Saturday 2nd September 1905, and Chelsea played their very first competitive match at any level in a Second Division game at Stockport County.

Under player-manager John Tait Robertson, and with 22-stone goalkeeper Bill Foulke the star attraction, Chelsea brought in big crowds wherever they went. In their first home game they thrashed Hull City 5-1 in front of 6,000 fans. Some 20,000 turned out for the next home fixture against West Brom.

In that first season the Blues rammed in 90 goals in 38 League games and saw a gate of 67,000 for the home game with Manchester United.

By 1907 Chelsea had earned a place in Division One but they were to stay there for just three years before bouncing back again two seasons later. This saga was to continue over the years as Chelsea's form and fortunes fluctuated as unpredictably as the English climate.

The West London fans had to wait until the Club's Golden Jubilee year before they really had something to shout about. Then Ted Drake's team went on to clinch the League Championship.

That season of 1954-55 still remains the greatest in the Club's history although in the early weeks of the campaign they did little to suggest the triumph to come.

By mid-November the Blues were hovering in mid-table. The most memorable game having been a 5-0 home defeat at the hands of Manchester United. The turning point came with a 2-1 victory over Tottenham - the first victory at Stamford Bridge for eleven weeks.

Five wins in the next seven games and only three defeats suffered after the turn of the year carried them through, top spot first being achieved after a 1-0 win at Cardiff on March 23rd. The title was clinched with a penalty win over Wolves.

Chelsea had to wait until the era of Dave Sexton before they could celebrate again. Those were the days when Peter Osgood, Charlie Cooke, Johnny Hollins and company, thrilled everyone.

The Football League Cup had been won in 1963 and the European Fairs Cup too but the excitement those triumphs created was nothing to the festivities in Fulham Road after Chelsea's one and only FA Cup triumph in 1970.

The game with Leeds United ended in a 2-2 draw at Wembley but at Old Trafford in a frenetic replay, it was the unlikely bulk of David Webb which frightened Harvey into submission for the winning goal.

More success was to follow in the European Cup Winners' Cup the following year. Again the final went to a replay after a 1-1 draw with Real Madrid in Athens, when Johnny Hollins scored. Two days later in the same venue Peter Osgood and John Dempsey netted in a 2-1 victory.

Since those heady days Chelsea's triumphs have been somewhat lower key but they continue to make the headlines as with the fluctuating form which seems to be very much a part of the 'Pensioners' heritage.

Welcome to 1994. A New Year, a fresh start, and hopefully the beginning of a change of fortune for us in terms of results.

It seems quite appropriate that we should kick-off the new year against Chelsea, the team managed by Glenn Hoddle, the man who introduced the playing standards and beliefs that have made us one of the most attractive teams in English football.

Glenn still has a soft spot for us; though no doubt that will not extend to this afternoon's performance. But there is nothing he would love more - apart from three points this afternoon of course - than to see Swindon Town secure their tenure in the Premiership.

There was a little bitterness directed Glenn's way from some fans when he left us last summer to take up the challenge at Stamford Bridge. More borne out of disappointment than deep rooted anger I suspect, for Glenn had taken on the mantle of a Messiah in these parts.

Thankfully, John Gorman stayed on to carry on the good work and apart from missing the unique talents of Glenn on the field - who else these days can deliver those pin-point accurate passes from 60-yards? - he team has continued to develop upon the lines which Glenn, and Ossie before him, had instituted.

You can't really blame someone for wanting to take on a bigger challenge. If you had the opportunity to further your own career you would, in most circumstances, take it. This is what Glenn did.

It wasn't a question of money, Glenn is in the envious position of not having to worry about that side of it. It was down to a hunger to put his theories to the test at the highest level possible.

The recent death of the that great wing-half Danny Blanchflower brought to mind an interview I did with him - in the office now occupied by Ken Bates - after he had come out of retirement in 1978 to become manager at Chelsea.

Now Danny was possibly one of the last links between the modern game and the old days. He told me: "As a player my nature was half amateur - in other words I felt that the amateur spirit in me was slightly stronger than the professional spirit. Although my professional knowledge of the game was deeper than the amateur.

"I played at a time when it was not for money. I think money spoils everything. Money spoilt this country. The materialism spoils things because money becomes more important than the product it is buying. It is crazy."

To Danny, as for Glenn, the game was the most

important factor. The skills, the creativity, the excitement and passion.

On that cold December back in 1978 Danny explained why he had taken the manager's job. He said: "Chelsea have been a great club and not a great team and therefore there is a great temptation, whether it be rational or not, that maybe I could make the team as good as the club.

"Now I have no ambition to be a professional manager. If I can help Chelsea that will do fine. If they want me to stay I will stay. If they don't I will go; and so there is a certain independence in it and I am old enough for it not to matter."

I imagine Glenn identifies with much of what Danny revealed some 16-years ago. And there is a closer link because both have been brilliant creative players and both gave their best years to Tottenham Hotspur. The deepest link surely though is that driving ambition to fill the football canvas with creative brush strokes. To become the supreme artist, the Picasso of the football world.

When you look back over the list of men who have managed Chelsea you will not some great players. John Tait-Robertson, their very first who was player-manager. Ted Drake, Tommy Docherty, Danny of course; Geoff Hurst, Johnny Hollins and now Glenn.

1986

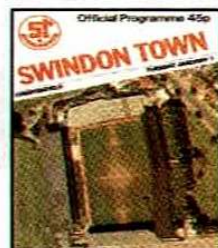

Two goals - from Andy Rowland and Colin Gordon - just before half time set Town on the road to a 4-0 Fourth Division win over Chesterfield. The same two notched a second goal each in the second half.



1974



Twenty years ago today Swindon, struggling at the foot of the Second Division, recorded their first win in seven games with a 3-1 victory against Preston North End. On loan Peter Eastoe notched the first, Joe Butler and David Moss the others. They didn't win again until April 13!

1965



Town recorded their third win in four games with a 2-0 success against Charlton. Both goals came within five minutes, through Mike Summerbee (75) and Don Rogers (80). Sadly, too few victories followed and the club suffered relegation to the Third Division at the end of the season.

1949



In a seven-goal thriller at Southend, Swindon triumphed 4-3. Maurice Owen and Morris Jones got the visitors off to a flying start with two goals in the opening twelve minutes. The Shrimpers hit back with three goals in five minutes midway through the first half but Town were not to be denied. Jimmy Bain and Owen clinched the points with goals either side of the break.

1932



Swindon spoilt Mansfield's first ever trip to the County Ground, with a 5-2 victory. Goal machine Harry Morris grabbed a hat-trick, with the other goals coming from Jack Starsmore and Harry Keeling.

1926



Frank 'Sweeper' Richardson bagged four goals as Bournemouth were swamped 8-2 at the County Ground. Cyril Daniel (2), Jimmy Thompson and Charlie Petrie added to Boscombe's agony.

Ross MacLaren

The dawning of a new year heralds a new role for the popular Ross MacLaren, who started the season sweeping up in Town's defence and now finds himself brushing up the talents of the young players in the Reserve and Youth Teams.



Manager John Gorman's decision to abandon the sweeper role for a different formation left Ross on the substitutes bench; a frustrating experience for a player who has worked so hard to help Swindon achieve their position in the top flight.

He is still of course very much a part of the senior squad and could well be involved over the crowded holiday period; but the manager, hoping to make the most of Ross's personable persona, has found him a new role as Andy Rowland's assistant.

"I'm enjoying working under Andy, he has been a great help to me," says Ross.

"As a player, even in my mid-twenties, I never even thought about this side of the game. When Ossie was here I got a little bit interested, but it was Chick Bates - a very good friend of mine - who really kept pushing me in this direction.

"When Glenn and John came along my interest continued though I still considered myself first and foremost a player and didn't spend much thought on the prospect. Then I got my injury.

"Glenn suggested that if I was going to be out a long time I might as well contribute something positive by going to games and reporting on them. It all took off from there really.

"As you know I got back into the team eventually and was looking forward to this season. But it hasn't gone as well as I had expected. I was looking to be in the team on a regular basis and it hasn't worked out that way.

"But this new involvement has been very rewarding. I enjoy working with Andy, enjoy working with the kids and with the Reserves. The only thing that could make it better would be to be playing this afternoon.

"I am playing in the Reserves to keep up my match fitness and of course train so that if I am needed I will be fit to respond. There is no way I will cheat on my fitness because I am a coach."

Ross will eventually take his full FA Coaching Badge but is in no hurry to commit himself in this direction. I detect a little reaction against the current FA courses which many feel goes against the grain of the purists.

Says Ross: "The failure of the national side means there will be upheaval in the establishment. I am going to learn first then have a go."

I'm not convinced there will be the expected shake-up in the corridors of power. The men behind the teaching programmes in 1974 - when England failed to qualify for the World Cup Finals, were still in power in 1993. When will they ever learn?

In his six-years at the County Ground Ross has certainly come under the influence of some good teachers. He reflects: "Lou always believed you should clear your own areas and play in their half. Ossie came and wanted to play pure football; as did Glenn after him.

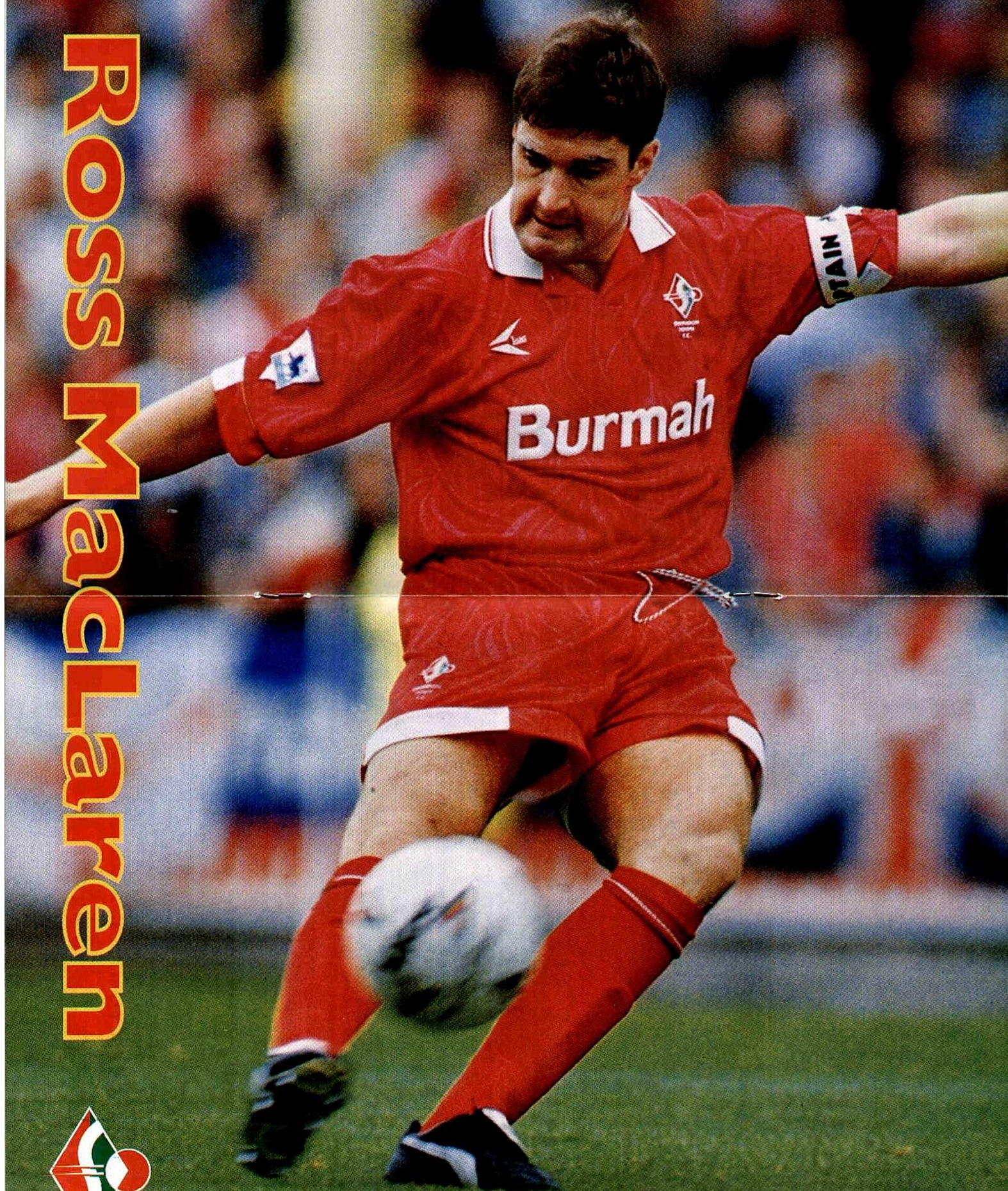
"For John it has been a bit different because it is a higher level of competition in the Premiership. For the first time we are having to fight for survival.

"I think we are gradually coming to terms with it. Teams like Manchester City and Chelsea got off to good starts and have now fallen away. We were in a rut for 14 or 15 games but have slowly improved.

"The confidence is there. A couple of wins and we will be flying. And the lads believe that. Now you have to give John credit for this. He has done a marvellous job in maintaining confidence.

"He has not been afraid to chop and change the side round and change the tactics to accommodate different opponents. This shows he is not afraid to manage. John has upset many players in the process, me included. But it's his head on the block at the end of the day."

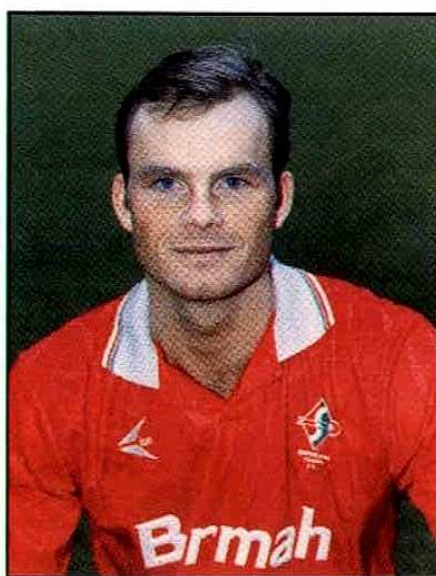

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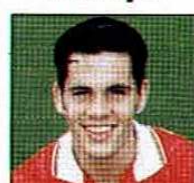

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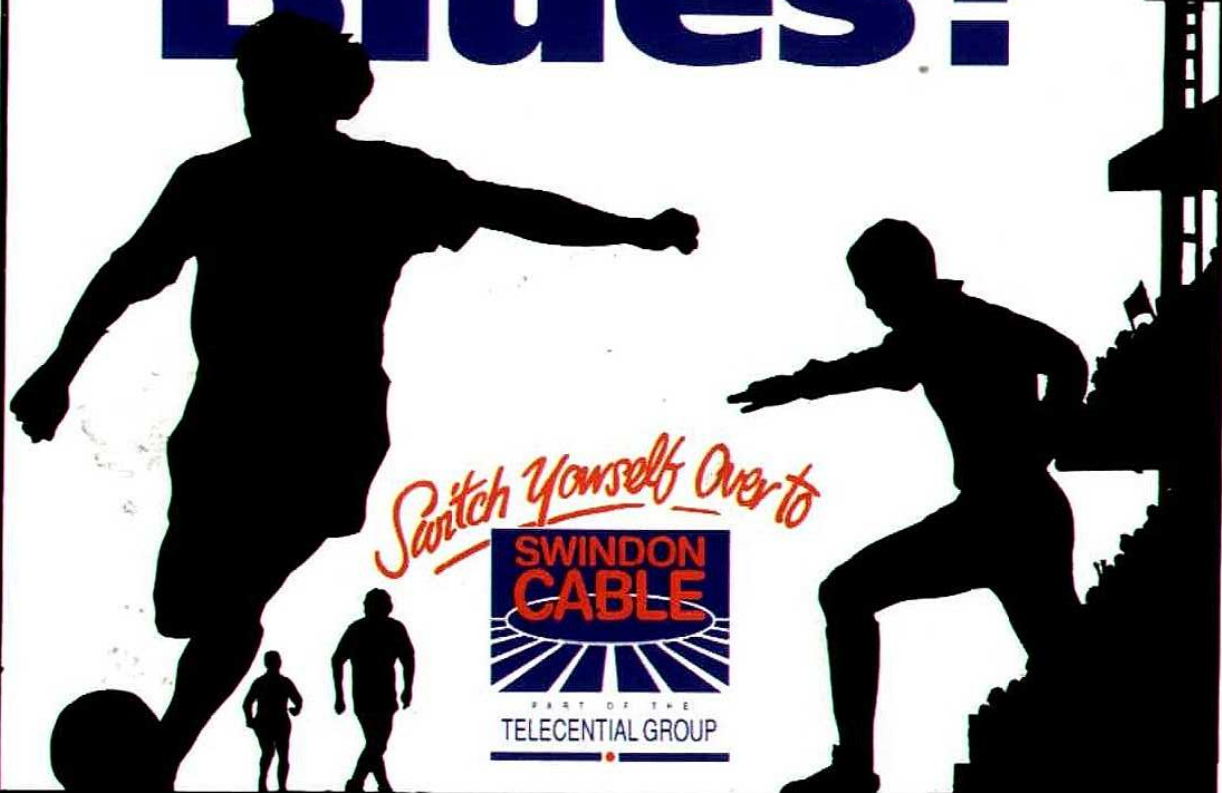
