
The lads all take great credit for the manner in which they simply refused to settle for a draw, kept plugging away and eventually got the reward they deserved with a late winner.

Nicky is a Rover with roots

NICKY MARKER will get a reminder of "home" this afternoon, well near enough, with the visit of Swindon from the West Country. For, while Nicky loves playing his football in the North West, there's no doubt which part of the country remains closest to his heart – the South West.

And, as he told Radio Rovers reporter Wendy Howard, that's where he'll be heading when he finally hangs up his boots.

"There's no two ways about it, I do miss the South West," he told Wendy. "At the end of my football career, wherever I am, I'll always go back there. I've kept my house just outside Plymouth, my roots are there and the way of life is much quieter."

Not that he wants it to be for some time yet, as he is revelling in playing in the big time at last and readily admitted it took him "all of five seconds" to make up his mind to join Rovers when the call came from Kenny Dalglish.

Talking

"The South West isn't really a hotbed of soccer. Up here is what it's all about. Everyone is talking about the game all the time...football, football, football and it doesn't matter which way you go there's another club just 20 or 30 minutes down the road," he said.

"For us in Plymouth, there was Exeter and Torquay and, after that, it was one and a half hours to get to Bristol.

"I had been resigned to playing for Plymouth. I had three years of my contract left to run and I thought I was going to see that out and probably see my career out there. But coming up here has opened my eyes. The football is just great."

Was he apprehensive at all about joining a big club, with star names in the dressing room?



"No, it's very friendly. All the players like a laugh and there are no big-heads in there, everyone is in it together whether they cost £3 million or whatever.

"I don't feel over-awed because they are not that kind of people. When I first came at 27, I didn't know whether I would ever have the chance to be in the same dressing room as players like these. But when you are up here, doing it and playing alongside them, it's great."

In some ways, Nicky's rise to fame has mirrored the club's emergence. It's less than two years since he was on the opposite side of the fence, heading for the then Third Division with relegated Plymouth, while Rovers were claiming what was to be that historic place in the promotion play-offs and, eventually, a top-flight spot.

Rovers played a significant part in his old club's fall, as he well remembers that final match of the 1991-92 season: "We had to win to stay up and it seemed as if Rovers had to win to get into the play-offs. In the end, Rovers didn't need the win so they could have done us a favour. But on the day, they beat us fair and square. Plymouth were a team lacking in confidence and it showed."

Invaluable

Nicky's versatility has made him an invaluable member of the squad and he doesn't mind one little bit if others get most of the attention and the headlines.


"The game is all about scoring goals and winning and the people who win games for you are the ones who score the goals," he said. "I'm just happy to be playing for the team. There's such a big squad here you just want to be involved every week."

And that's the way Nicky hopes it will stay, with a return "home" the last thing on his mind for some time to come.

GRANITE-TOUGH defender Brian Kilcline was signed by Swindon for £90,000 from Newcastle United in January in the hope that he could add some steel and stability to their fight to retain Premier League status.

A former England Under-21 international, the 31-yearold Kilcline began his career with his hometown club Notts County, A £60,000 move took him to Coventry where he led their F.A. Cup winning team before joining Oldham in August 1991 for £400,000.

Just six months later, however, he had made only eight appearances and left for Newcastle.

Manager John Gorman hopes that Kilcline's vast experience can prove a big asset in the survival struggle along, of course, with his nononsense style of defending.

WHATEVER Swindon Town's position at the end of this their firstever season in the top flight of English football, The Robins have shown that you do not need to be top of the table to win friends and influence people.

In what has been a difficult debut season in the F.A. Carling Premiership, Swindon have earned themselves a host of admirers the length and breadth of the country by the way they play their football.

Full marks to manager John Gorman and his players for their attitude. Gorman has repeatedly gone on record to stress that Swindon will do it with style - he knows no other way.

It was fairly early in the season when, despite depressing results. Swindon showed just what they were capable of at Old Trafford, where they gave Manchester United a scare.

Beaten 3-2, Gorman made his principles plain when he said: "We didn't realise until after the game how much people enjoyed the way we a normal performance for us. Most of their League existence has been spent at Third Division level. after being elected to that level in 1920. Swindon's first promotion of any kind. in fact, did not come along until 1963. when they climbed from Division Three to Division Two. They were back down two years later, back up again in four and took the drop once more in 1974.



MANAGER: JOHN GORMAN

JOHN GORMAN has earned himself a lot of respect this season for his admirable attitude in the face of adversity and it has no doubt been a big factor in helping his players to keep battling. Thrown in at the deep end for his first managerial appointment when Glenn Hoddle left for Chelsea, Gorman - now 44 has been a quick learner, through necessity.

promotion. Then came Glenn Hoddle and top-flight football was finally achieved, ironically through the play-offs in a blockbuster of a game against Leicester City.

Even more ironically, Hoddle then upped and went himself, joining Chelsea to leave Gorman with his first managerial position as Swindon made their bow among the big boys. But the style and beliefs built at the club by men like Ardiles and Hoddle were to continue.

Wembley last summer was a marvellous moment for Swindon fans, as it had been for Rovers supporters the previous year. But it's fair to say that Swindon's most memorable moments have been in the knockout competitions.

They were still in the Third Division when they went all the way to Wembley, inspired by the wizardry of Don Rogers, and had the nerve to beat Arsenal in the 1968-69 League Cup competition.

And there were two F.A. Cup semi-final appearances to boast of in 1910 and 1912 before Swindon had even joined the

LEAGUE RECORD AT EWOOD

TODAY'S game is the first-ever top-flight meeting at Ewood between Rovers and Swindon, all the other clashes being in the old Second and Third Divisions.

This is Swindon's 10th League visit to Blackburn and they have yet to win, with the record books showing seven Rovers victories and two draws so far. Co-incidentally, Swindon tend to come out on top in meetings at the County Ground.

Games are usually close and low scoring, like last time they were here in February, 1992, when we won 2-1 with goals from Colin Hendry and David Speedie, with David Mitchell replying for Swindon. League. They haven't managed to improve on that since.

While European football has yet to beckon the County Ground, Swindon also won the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970.

The Robins have been welcome visitors at most grounds this season, because of their attitude to the game. If they manage to retain their Premier League status, it would be a popular achievement.

Robins' Form Guide

DESPITE the summer trauma of losing their manager, along with some of the players who had helped them to win promotion to the top flight for the first time in their history, who would have imagined that Swindon Town would have to wait so long for their first Premiership victory.

It was not until November 24 and their 16th League match of the campaign that the sweet taste of success came Swindon's way. And eyen then it wasn't plain sailing, Luk Nijholt's dismissal reducing them to 10 men against Queens Park Rangers.

But Keith Scott, signed earlier in the month from Wycombe Wanderers, did the trick with the only goal of the game to break a duck that was threatening to become an embarrassment.

The seeds of Swindon's struggle to retain their newly-won status were sown in those opening three months of the season. Nine defeats and just six draws from their first 15 matches condemned The Robins to a winter-long battle for survival.

They must have feared the worst when they opened their programme with four straight defeats, including two fivegoal hammerings at the hands of



Liverpool (home) and Southampton (away).

But when Swindon did start to pick up points, they were respectable ones, draws away at Norwich and at home to Newcastle helping to get John Gorman's side off the mark.

It was victory, however, that was so desperately needed at the County Ground

IT took Norwegian striker Jan Aage Fjortoft a long time to start scoring in the Premiership. But once he did, it seemed he couldn't stop!

Signed for £650,000 last summer, following the departure of Dave Mitchell, Fjortoft had to endure his own personal nightmare as Swindon struggled and he simply couldn't find the back of the net.

Christmas came and went and still no goals from the international striker until he struck gold at last against Spurs at the County Ground on January 22.

Greatly encouraged, Fjortoft then hit a hat-trick against Coventry in his next match, albeit including two penalties, and two more goals followed against Norwich on February 19. There might have been another double to celebrate at Maine Road the following week but only one of his strikes counted, the second being controversially disallowed.

to bring an injection of confidence. When it arrived against QPR, hopes of a major revival were raised, only for Swindon to slip again.

Two points came from the next four matches, though fortune was hardly favouring a brave team, who showed plenty of style but continued to fall for sucker punches such as Mark Wright's late equaliser at Anfield.

Revenge proved sweet against Southampton just before Christmas, when Scott and Paul Bodin were the marksmen in a 2-1 win. Yet the turn of the year arrived and Swindon still had just those two victories to show and more than half their matches played.

A low point for the team must have been the 6-2 thrashing handed out to 10 men by goal-shy Everton at Goodison, or perhaps it simply inspired Gorman's men.

For they went out and won the next two games, both at home. Norwegian Jan Aage Fjortoft finally found his shooting boots at the end of January, as Spurs were beaten 2-1 and Coventry fell to his finishing, 3-1, with the aid of a couple of penalties.

But a useful 3-3 draw with Norwich came in between defeats at Aston Villa (0-5) and Manchester City (1-2).

They certainly didn't have the rub of the green at Maine Road at the end of last month but it's those games, against fellow strugglers, that Swindon must win, if they are to retain any hope of escape from their present plight.

DID YOU KNOW ...

- Swindon were founded in 1881 but did not join the Football League until 1920, becoming members of Division Three, which changed to Division Three South the following year.
- It was 1963 before they climbed as high as the Second Division and they
 were relegated three times, going as low as the Fourth Division in 1982.
- John Trollope holds Swindon's appearances record with almost 900 senior games between 1960-81.
- Duncan Shearer, who had a brief spell at Ewood in promotion season, was Swindon's leading scorer in four successive seasons from 1988-92. The previous season, another ex-Rover Jimmy Quinn topped their scoring charts!
- Ewood's Commercial Manager Ken Beamish was County Ground boss in 1983-84 when they were in the Fourth Division.
- Youngest player ever to turn out for Swindon is Paul Rideout, the current Everton striker. He was aged 16 years and 107 days when he played against Hull in November 1980.
- In 1926-27, Swindon scored 100 League goals and only two players, Morris
 (47) and Eddelston (11) hit double figures! A few years later, in 1932-33,
 they conceded 105 goals in the Third Division South!
- This is Swindon's first season in the top flight and the furthest they have progressed in the F.A. Cup is to the semi-finals – twice. In 1910, they lost to Newcastle and, two years later, they were beaten in a replay by Barnsley.



FOOTBALL FOGUS

THIS month has witnessed the start of a new era for English football at international level and Blackburn Rovers seem to have a major role to play in what all supporters hope will be a brighter future.

New England coach Terry Venables put his faith in Ewood with Rovers providing a quarter of the players for his first-ever national selection – four out of 16 named as team and substitutes for the game against Denmark at Wembley.

And for Graeme Le Saux it was a particularly memorable evening

as Venables got off to a winning start. For Graeme not only won his first full cap, he also became the first player from the Channel Islands to represent England – a magnificent achievement and one that was well deserved.

In less than a year, following his move to Ewood, Graeme has gone from Chelsea Reserves to the England team. He has already paid tribute to his Rovers team-mates as being a significant factor in the form that earned him international recognition and, after making a sparkling national debut, he had words of thanks for the man he deposed. Nottingham Forest's Stuart Pearce.

"Stuart was brilliant for me," said Graeme. "He kept on giving me little tips and advice during training and when he knew I had been picked he just wished me good luck. It must have been hard for him, losing not only his England position but the captaincy as well. It just shows what a great pro he is."

Rave reviews greeted Graeme's debut, along with that of Darren Anderton, but the full back is keeping his feet firmly on the ground.

"I was very pleased with my first game but I'm taking nothing for granted about replacing Stuart long term. Obviously he has got the experience and ability to challenge again and that can only keep me right on my toes," he added.

Graeme was in good company, with Alan Shearer selected in attack and the two Rovers men combined brilliantly to set up England's goal for David Platt.

David Batty went on in the second half to win his 15th England cap as a

substitute, following his recall, and produced the sort of polished performance he gives week in, week out for Rovers.

Tim Flowers, named as substitute keeper, was the only Ewood man not to get a taste of the action, with David Seaman being retained in goal. But it can be only a matter of time before he adds to the cap he won last summer.

Exciting times for England could be ahead and that means exciting times for Rovers, with others in our squad knocking on the international door.

Venables could well be paying regular visits to our matches.

Meanwhile, Henning Berg was also in international action, as he helped Norway to a 3-1 friendly win over Wales in Cardiff, as John Toshack made an unsuccessful start to his reign as new Welsh boss.

Henning played in defence for Norway but advanced at set pieces and almost got his name on the scoresheet. He looks certain to be an important part of Norway's plans for this summer's World Cup finals in the USA.

PREVIJER POINTS

Is this the end of numbers game?

AN end, thank goodness, seems as though it could be in sight to the squad numbering system. And, having campaigned for someone to see sense over it, I can only say – about time too.

At the moment, we are still at the experimental stage, with Arsenal having been granted permission to revert to 1-11 for the rest of the season.

Shirts will still bear a player's name but I've no problem with that. If you actually go to a game instead of watching on TV you can't read them anyway!

Among many rumblings of complaint from all sections of the game, Arsenal approached the Premier League with their proposal and their vice-chairman David Dein said it was an attempt to bring the numbering system down to a manageable level. Mr Dein pointed out that, as names were still involved, extra shirts would be available which could be adjusted at the last minute for late changes.

Premier League Chief Executive Rick Parry stressed that "names" are here to stay but that options on numbers were being examined. "The ideal way, of course, is to have names with traditional numbers and the F.A. Premier League is supporting Arsenal's offer to conduct an experiment to see just how practical it is," he said.

Amen to that. Come in number 26, 33, 37 etc, your time – we hope – is up!

ENGLAND'S CONSOLATION

Mel Sterland, Leeds, Phil King, Sheffield Wednesday, and ex-Rover Mark Grew, Cardiff, also received bans and fines.



ITALY: Englishmen David Platt and Paul Gascoigne, with Sampdoria and Lazio respectively, have excellent chances of playing in the European competitions next season, as the top five in Serie A have broken away.

Milan, of course, are way out in front, with Parma and Juventus making up the pack with Sampdoria and Lazio. Former European campaigners Atlanta look destined for the drop into Serie B.

SPAIN: The revival is under way at Real Madrid but has it come soon enough? HOLLAND: Vitesse Arnhem, knocked out of this season's UEFA Cup by Norwich, are in the running to qualify for next winter's campaign. But Ajax look set for the title, with Feyenoord runners-up.

PSV are battling with the likes of Roda, NAC Breda and Vitesse for the consolation crambs.

Swindon boss John Gorman was delighted and he also banked on more experience by making a pre-transfer deadline move to sign Lawrie Sanchez from Wimbledon on a free transfer.

No doubt there will be a few words of comfort and advice from team-mate Paul Warhurst who has battled back himself from a broken leg sustained at Swindon last October.




THE Ewood Connection paved the way for England's victory over Denmark to give Terry Venables a flying start in his new role as coach of the national side.

SHOOTING STARS

It was certainly not Eddie Crossan's fault that his first season, or rather part-season, as a member of Rovers' senior side should prove to be the campaign in which they lost their First Division status for the second time.

And the mercurial Irishman could also count himself unlucky that he should be a prominent member of the side which then, in the fighting Fifties as they were once termed, knocked continually on the top-flight door. By the time it finally opened Crossan had gone.

While the immensely talented, yet so often frustrating, inside forward had no actual honours to reward his 10 seasons in the blue and white shirt, however, he did have the memories of playing in the wonderful attack-minded team of the mid-Fifties.

Dazzle

It was a side that was perfect for a man who loved to go forward and dazzle opponents and spectators alike with his skills.

If he had been able to add a shade more consistency, or even steadiness in front of goal, Crossan may well have gone on to greater things and his goal tally would certainly have been greater – respectable though it remains.

He was undoubtedly at his peak in that recordbreaking 1954-55 season when every member of the fabulous five-man forward line hit double figures and Rovers finished with their highest-ever seasonal goal tally of 114.

LOOKING BACK


10 YEARS AGO: Rovers bounced back from a lean spell to beat Carlisle 4-1 at Ewood and complete the "double" over the Cumbrians. Garner, Barker, Hamilton and Fazackerley (pen) scored, watched by a crowd of 6,191.

20 YEARS AGO: A rare good run in the second half of the season saw a third successive win, 1-0 at home to Huddersfield. Kenyon got the winner to cheer Rovers fans in the 6,671 crowd.

30 YEARS AGO: We were sliding out of the leading group very quickly and a 2-1 home defeat by Blackpool didn't help matters. England scored but the 23,039 crowd saw the visitors take the points.

40 YEARS AGO: After the first defeat in 10 matches, Rovers bounced back to beat Luton at home 2-0. Briggs and Quigley cheered the 24,331 Ewood crowd with the goals.

50 YEARS AGO: A 2-2 draw away to Burnley in the Northern Section of the League also counted towards the Lancashire Cup and we went through to the next round, with goals from Stephan and Rogers.



FACT FILE

From 1947-48 until 1956-57, Eddie Crossan made 287 League appearances for Rovers, scoring 73 goals.

Tommy Briggs, of course, led the way and Eddic Quigley was not far behind but Crossan gave more than a few reminders that he too didn't always miss the easy ones (!) as he contributed 18 goals to that tremendous total.

They included two in the 9-0 romp against Middlesbrough, more famous for the fact that a certain T. Briggs DIDN'T score than anything else, a hat-trick at home to Rotherham and the "other goal" when Briggs atoned and scored seven of the eight against Bristol Rovers in February, 1955.

Crossan excelled himself in that campaign, his delightful skills a joy to watch. The snag, of course, was – as with all ball players – that when things weren't going right a more direct, positive approach rather than an overelaborate one was needed.

But he had other good years too, reaching double figures in the two seasons prior to 1954-55. That was when he was at his peak. Crossan's last two seasons saw his League appearances limited to 39 and his goals to a dozen.

Yet there is no doubt that he had made his mark, forging a partnership at inside forward with Eddie Quigley that, at times, flourished quite spectacularly. With Briggs in between, no wonder goals were the order of the day.

Talents

A native of Derry, from where he was signed for a small fee, Crossan's talents were also recognised by the Irish selectors. If he had been able to channel them a little more consistently he would surely have picked up more than the three caps which came his way.

He went on to have a season with Tranmere, leaving Ewood just as they were about to realise the dream of regaining their coveted First Division place. On his day, Eddie Crossan would have enjoyed playing in that team too.

But he still made his mark at Ewood during a decade which, despite the misses that are still talked about by older supporters, saw him score goals at an average of one every four matches.

OFF THE PARK

With KEN BEAMISH Commercial Manager

THERE has already been great demand for the new executive and hospitality facilities here at Ewood, with some of them programmed to be ready for the start of next season and others coming into operation partway through.

On the third floor of the Blackburn End, for example, we are developing two x 20-scater executive boxes, 14 x 10-scater "enclosed" executive boxes and six x 10-scater "open-plan" boxes. At the time of writing we had only one "enclosed" and three "open-plan" boxes available.

That is a fair indication of how much interest has already been shown.

As well as the boxes, we have two executive lounges planned for the first floor of the Jack Walker Stand, now under construction. Each lounge can seat 250 people and it is hoped they will be operational from January, 1995. To date, more than 50 per cent of the accommodation has been reserved.

Assuming the lounges are operational on schedule, the package we have available includes a four-course meal for all first team games from January to the end of the season, with seats either inside or outside in the upper tier.
