A strikers tale

Before the start of this season Bontcho Guentchev set himself two targets — to play well for Ipswich Town and to be a part of the Bulgarian squad which plays in the World Cup finals in the USA this summer.

Maybe he has not quite achieved the first until recently, but he has high hopes of making the final Bulgaria squad which will not be announced until the end of May.

Bontcho, who was on international duty today for Bulgaria in a friendly against Oman, said: "I feel I am in good form at the moment, perhaps the best of my professional career.

"At the moment I am in very good shape and am keen to play as many games as I can for Ipswich and hopefully some important goals to help keep the team in the Premiership."

Bontcho's most recent goal came from the penalty spot in the 2-2 draw against Manchester City at Portman Road. He said: "Before I came to Ipswich the coaches at my three previous clubs all had confidence in me taking penalties. I do not remember ever missing one."

The gifted striker has had experience of playing football in Bulgaria, Portugal and now England and is ideally placed to make comparisons.

He says: "Bulgaria and Portugal have a Southern-Latin style of play, but I do not agree with many of the specialists in Europe who say that the difference is only in the physical side of the game.

"The biggest difference is the concept of the game itself. I think that this concept was established many years ago and was formed in a way to satisfy the requirements of the supporters and to increase the competitiveness of English clubs against other European and world

opposition.

"I maintain that all football games in England look very much like a storm raging in the ocean irrespective of the division in which it is played. The show is terrific and unrepeatable."

Bontcho knows full well how tough it is

to play in the FA Carling Premiership and the pressure that there is on strikers to score goals.

He said: "The situation in the Premiership influenced my preparations. The statistics of my play shows a sharp decrease in the percentage of wrongly played balls, but there is a great increase of dispossessing defenders in and around their own penalty area.

"This change in style has impressed the coaches of the Bulgarian national team, but it does not impress me. I see a

He said: "The boots will quickly be put to good use by players who have good shooting skills and who can adapt their contact with the ball in game situations under pressure."

Bontcho, very popular with the Town supporters, will be hoping to maintain his progress with both Ipswich and Bulgaria in the months to come.

F rom the bench

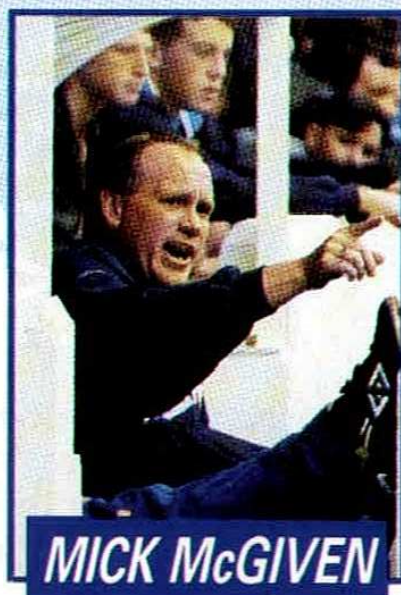
Three consecutive defeats have left us badly in need of points from our last four matches of the season to insure that we preserve our Premiership status. There can be no doubt that we have been sucked into the relegation battle and we now very much need to display resilience to ensure our survival in the top flight.

Each and every game throughout the season has been important but there is now added significance through the last month of the season. The programme is tough especially as our last two matches are against the sides contesting the Championship, so extra efforts are required.

We fully accept that our home supporters have been disappointed by recent performances and results at Portman Road, but now is the time for everyone associated with the club to unite in helping us through.

We also understand the anger and frustrations shown by some supporters after the Coventry game. I can assure all supporters that their feelings were more than matched by my men. In the second half at that match, after Coventry had scored, I am afraid that we went to pieces. The most hurtful thing was that we showed a lack of fighting quality.

For the first half of the game we had looked the better side, but Peter Ndlovu gave us a warning of his danger

when he hit the post. We did not learn from this and Ndlovu was instrumental in both Coventry goals. On each occasion we made needless mistakes and were punished.

We do not wish to make excuses, but we have had a long injury list and as well as being without our regular goalkeeper, our most experienced defender and our leading goalscorer, there have been other key members of our squad missing in recent weeks. This has stretched our resources and limited our options in team selection, but it does not account for our second half collapse.

Craig Forrest and John Wark returned for our visit to Anfield and we were denied a point, which we felt our performance deserved by a bad mistake from a young player. Unfortunately we lost concentration and then committed a foul in the penalty area to present Liverpool with a win.

These things happen in football, but up to that point and throughout the match we had limited Liverpool to shots from long range and almost silenced the Kop. In addition we created the best two chances of the match but could not take them.

However, on the brighter side, our effort and application was much better. Everyone stuck to their task and was prepared to battle. This is the attitude that we must now show, not just today, but in all our remaining fixtures.

Our support, especially away from home has been magnificent, and this afternoon we urge you all to try to forget about our home performances of the past couple of months and get behind your team. We emphasise the need for patience and tolerance to boost the confidence of the side so hopefully giving us the results that we require.

We are meeting Swindon for the fourth time this season and they need the points just as much as we do. Despite being at the foot of the table throughout the season, we know that John Gorman and his players have not given up the fight. We welcome them, but expect no favours and must fully realise that the retention of our place in the Premiership is still in our own hands.

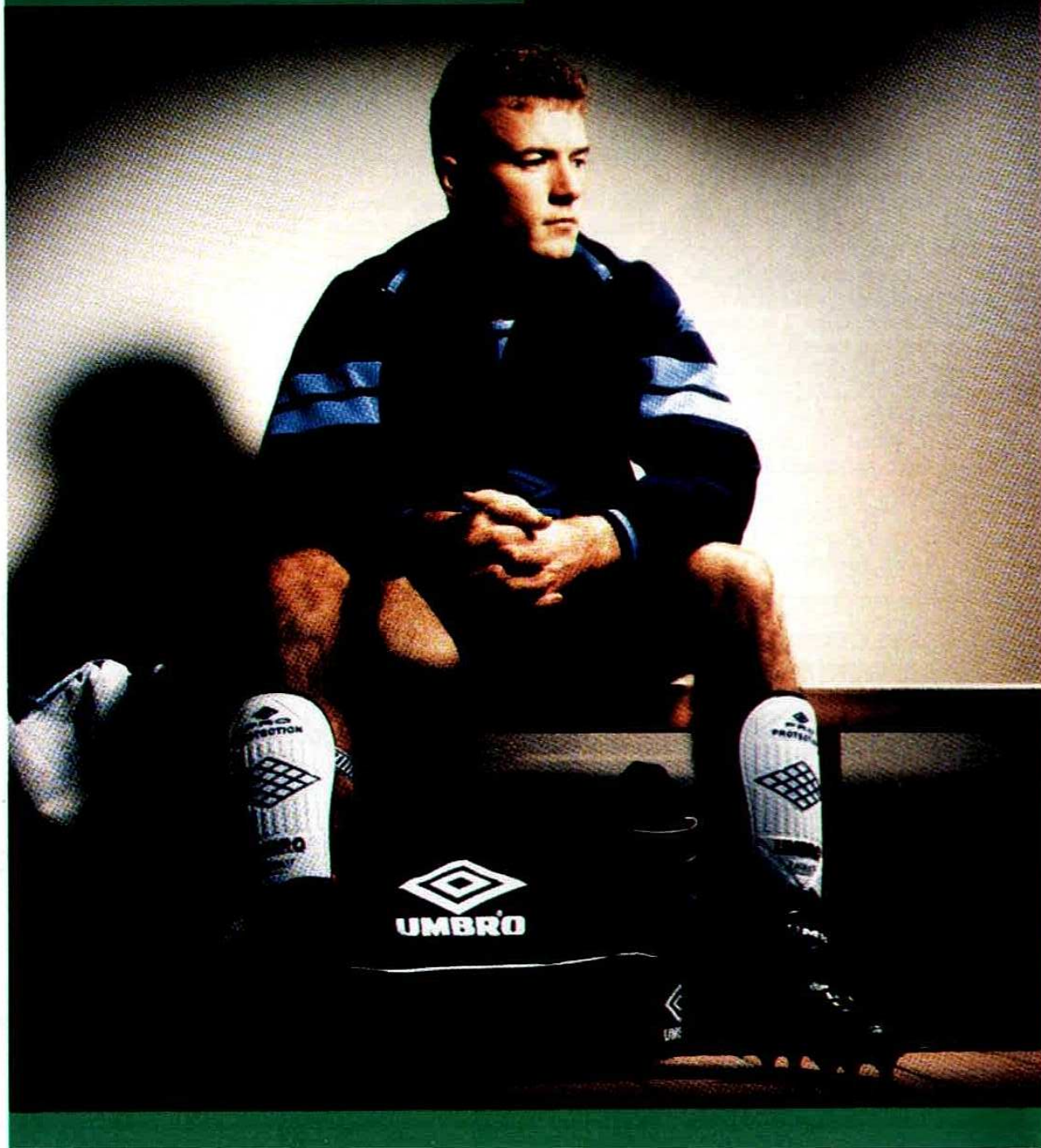

It looks as though one of Town's favourite players will have to wait until the start of next season to fit in his special game.

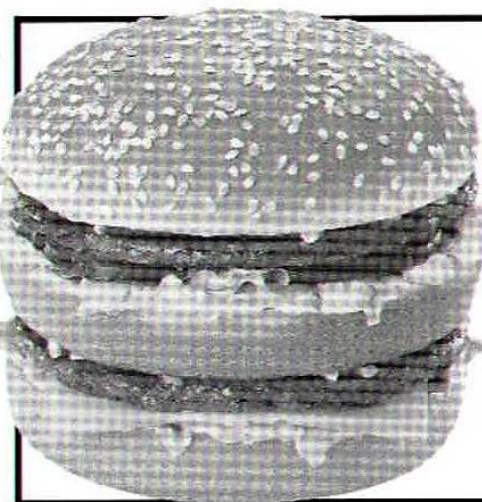
Golf classic

O n the fringe

Ron Wigg's contribution as a first team player at Portman Road in the late 1960's was very much on the fringe, but he did have the habit of scoring goals when given a chance in the team.

The record books show that Dun-

mow-born Wigg made only 39 full senior appearances plus two as substitute, but he scored 14 goals before moving to Watford in the summer of 1970.

Signed from Leyton Orient in May, 1967, Wigg made just five appearances

in his first season at the club which happened to be the one that Town won the Second Division Championship under Bill McGarry.

Ray Crawford was the man in the possession of the number nine shirt and with Town going so well, Wigg's chances were few and far between.

When it came to an eye for goal, the tall, blond Wigg was the man. He marked his debut for Town in place of the injured Gerry Baker with two goals in the 3-1 win over Carlisle United.

More significantly, in only his fourth game, in the top-of-the-table match against Birmingham City at Portman Road, Wigg scored both goals in a 2-1 victory in front of the BBC Match of the Day viewers.

After playing in the next match against Huddersfield, Wigg did not play again in the first team that season and did not have enough appearances under his belt to qualify for the Second Division Championship medal.

Wigg was again left waiting in the wings on Town's return to the First Division. In fact, it was not until March when he got his chance following the departure of Crawford, but in the ten games he played he scored six goals.

He marked his first First Division appearance with a goal in a 2-1 victory over Manchester City and also scored in his next three outings against Spurs, West Ham and Sunderland.

Two more against West Bromwich and Sheffield Wednesday rounded off a very satisfactory spell for Wigg.

At the start of the following season he started in the side, but by mid-October had lost his place to Mick Hill. He did have half a dozen games after the turn of the year before Town signed Jimmy Robertson and Frank Clarke to boost their chances of avoiding relegation.

That season Wigg made a total of 24 appearances and scored four goals, but as it turned out the match at Sheffield Wednesday on January 31st was to be his last in Town colours.

A summer move to Watford in an effort to gain regular first team football was the best option for Wigg who had never been able to establish himself at Portman Road.

A useful centre-forward, both in the air and on the ground, Wigg was just short of making the grade in the First Division. He was sold to Watford for £20,000 as was Charlie Woods to the same club for £10,000.

Woods, of course, was to return to Portman Road a few years later and is now Town's assistant manager.

Gorman was number two to Glenn Hoddle before taking over the hot seat last summer. It was a big job to tackle with the club set for its baptism in the FA Carling Premiership.

He played for Carlisle United and Tottenham Hotspur during his playing career and he will have learnt a great deal from his experiences in 1993/94. Ross MacLaren is player coach.

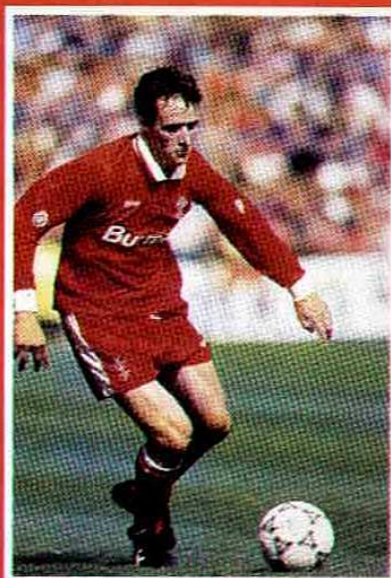

STAR PLAYER

Nicky Summerbee



Nicky Summerbee is the son of former England international Mike, and he has made big strides this season in the FA Carling Premiership.

He joined Swindon straight from school and played at Portman Road a number of times in the Football Combination. Born in August 1971, he has now served his reserve team apprenticeship and progressed into a top player.

Manchester City were reported to have bid £1 million for his services just before the transfer deadline last month, but Summerbee, who has one year of his contract to run, stayed put.

He has become one of the most sought-after players in the game with a string of consistent displays for a Swindon side that has not always enjoyed the best of luck in the highly competitive Premier League.

Summerbee is an England Under-21 international and was Swindon's representative in the special match which was played at West Ham for the late Bobby Moore in March, John Wark was the Ipswich representative.

A great crosser of the ball, Summerbee began his career mainly as a striker and in former manager Glenn Hoddle's side that won promotion from the First Division last season he was employed as an attacking right back.

Hoddle, who has since moved to Chelsea, utilised the sweeper system which gave Summerbee plenty of scope, and the player who wears the number two shirt played 36 times in 1992-93, eight as substitute.

New manager John Gorman has mainly played Summerbee on the right side of midfield this season.

Summerbee's grandfather and uncle also played League football while his father Mike played for Swindon, Manchester City and England.

Up to last weekend, Summerbee had missed just three matches this season and scored three goals, one in the FA Carling Premiership.

He is one footballer who has found himself in the Guinness Book of Records, having clocked 86 miles an hour to have the fastest shot in football. He beat West Ham player David Burrows, who was timed at around three mph slower.

Summerbee has been one of the successes in a Swindon side that has often been found out at the back this campaign. Their forward play has been consistent and the goals have flowed fairly regularly with Summerbee playing a vital role.

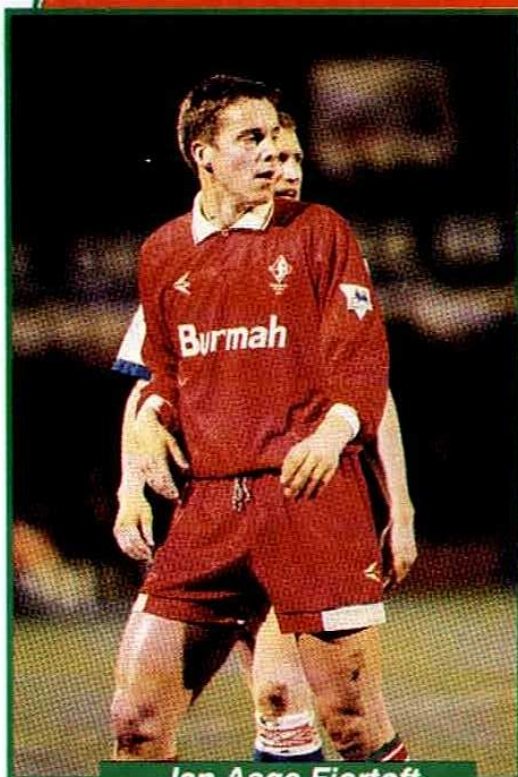

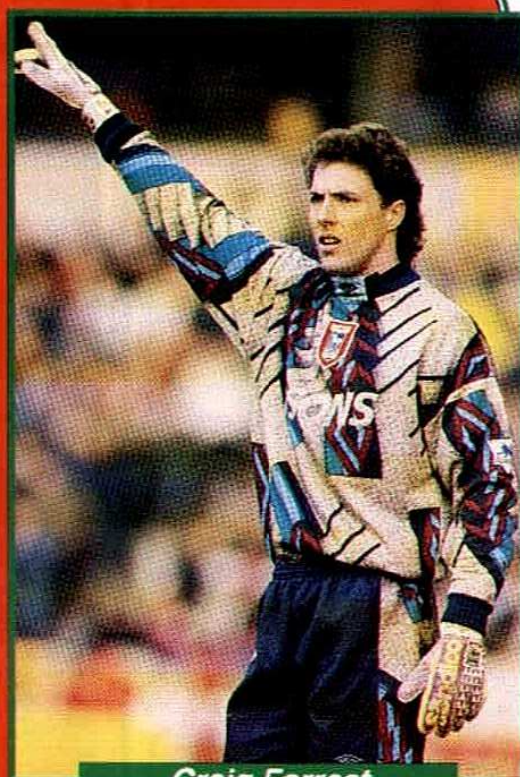

Jan Aage Fjortoft has hardly stopped scoring since netting on Swindons last visit to Portman Road, in the Third Round of the FA Cup. On the point of returning to Norway, his season has really picked up.

Craig Forrest has battled back into the Town team after injury and has had some outstanding games this campaign. The Canadian international may have to be at his best to keep out the Norwegian today.

Luc Nijholt was born in Holland in July 1961 and cost £175,000 when signed from Motherwell last summer. A Dutch Under-21 international, he started his career with FC Haarlem before moving to AZ67 Alkmaar, FC Utrecht and then Old Boys Basle in Switzerland before his move to Motherwell in 1991.

Shaun Taylor was an ever present in the League side last campaign. He cost £200,000 from Exeter City in July 1991 after coming into professional football late

from Bideford Town. He scored 12 times from a defensive position in 1992-93 and was appointed club captain in November. Born in March 1963, Brian Kilcline moved to Swindon for £90,000 from Newcastle, and the experienced central defender has helped to shore up the defence in recent weeks.

John Moncur is a midfield player who was born in September 1966 and cost £80,000 when signed from Tottenham. At Spurs he went on loan to six clubs,

Doncaster, Cambridge United, Portsmouth, Brentford, Ipswich and Nottingham Forest. He was hindered by injury last season but has impressed this term.

Ross MacLaren was born in April 1962 and cost £140,000 from Derby after winning a Second Division championship medal with the Baseball Ground club. Now player coach assisting the reserve team, he is still available as a player when needed.

Adrian Viveash has progressed through the ranks at Swindon and is now playing at the back after starting as a winger. He broke his leg in a reserve game last November. **Kevin Horlock** was signed from West Ham 18 months ago but has had a history of injuries since.

Chris Hamon was born in Jersey in April 1970 and was given a two year contract a year ago. **Edwin Murray** is a

Star player from the past JOHN TROLLOPE

John Trollope played 770 League games for Swindon Town during a distinguished career. This is a record number of appearances for the club.

Trollope is still connected with Swindon, and is youth team manager. His Under-18 team are currently top of the Second Division of the South East Counties League.

He played in the 1969 League Cup final at Wembley Stadium when the Robins beat Arsenal 3-1 and was a consistent defender who managed to steer clear of major injuries.

Son Paul is a professional, and he is currently playing for Torquay in midfield.

Trollope senior never won any international caps, but he was a fine example of a dedicated professional who served one club with his tremendous loyalty.

former apprentice who made his League debut against Oxford in March 1991 and was substitute three times last campaign.

Andrew Thomson is a 20-year-old home town born defender who has impressed in the reserves, while **Wayne O'Sullivan** was born in Cyprus in February 1974 and made his debut in the Anglo Italian Cup last season.

Marcus Phillips is a 20-year-old defender who has little first team experience. **Austin Berkley** was snapped up by John Gorman when released by Gillingham. Gorman was formerly youth team boss at the Priestfield Stadium. He scored on his Swindon debut.

Lee Middleton joined Swindon after being released by Coventry City in July 1992. **Andy Mutch** is a 30-year-old former Wolverhampton striker. He cost £250,000 last August and is best known for his seven year partnership with England international Steve Bull at Wolves. He scored 97 goals in 289 games for the Molineux club

and has played for England at Under-21 and B levels.

Terry Fenwick is an England international who has spent most of his time with London clubs, having made 70 appearances for Crystal Palace, 256 for QPR and 93 for Spurs. He was signed on a free transfer from Tottenham last September.

Lawrie Sanchez scored the winning goal for Wimbledon in the 1988 FA Cup final against Liverpool. He moved to Wiltshire from the London club before the transfer deadline after a long period with the Dons.

Keith Scott was signed from Wycombe Wanderers. Born in London in June 1967 he cost £300,000 last November after scoring frequently for the club which won its way into the Endleigh League. He scored against Town in a League fixture at the County Ground.

Ty Gooden was signed after a trial period. He was released by Wycombe Wanderers at the end of last season.

Frank McAvennie was signed from Glasgow Celtic, and the experienced striker will be hoping to find the net regularly after failing to find consistency in a second period with West Ham.

Adrian Whitbread was born in Epping in October 1971 and cost £500,000 from Leyton Orient at the start of the season. He played under John Gorman in the youth team at Brisbane Road.

P layer history

Neil Gregory

Ask any player at any level of football if bridging the gap between reserve and first team football is a difficult one — and you'll be told yes.

But what if a player has played in the reserves of an FA Carling Premiership club and then for the first team of a club in the Third Division? Is the gap just as difficult to bridge?

Neil was born in Ndola, Zambia on October 7th, 1972. He is 21

Well, the answer according to Ipswich striker Neil Gregory is still yes —

and he should know!

Neil has just returned from a two month spell on loan with Third Division Chesterfield, managed by former Ipswich boss John Duncan.

And the 21 year old, whose goalscoring exploits for Ipswich's second string have been prevalent over the last two seasons, hopes the experience gleaned from his stay at Saltergate will help him in the long run.

"I didn't play many senior games while I was there, but I just wanted to get some first team experience, and I accepted the chance when Chesterfield approached the club," says Neil.

"I was substitute for the first two games, then made my first appearance against Chester City and scored.

"However I wasn't involved all the time, and my last appearance was against Colchester at the end of March. Although I scored only one goal for the first team, I scored a few in the reserves.

"The step up from reserve to first team football is a big one. Mind you, it's always nice to score goals, whatever the level."

Understandably, Neil can remember the goal he scored against Chester as if it happened yesterday, although he did finish up on the losing side.

"There was a challenge won on the edge of the centre circle and the loose ball fell to me. I just headed towards the penalty area and saw the goalkeeper running out," recalls Neil.

Neil has yet to make a first team appearance for Ipswich — however he sat on the subs bench during Ipswich's Premier League home clash with Wimbledon in September last season.

"I tried to place the ball to the goalkeeper's right, but didn't hit the ball too cleanly. However, the ball went under his body and fortunately into the net.

"It was a brilliant feeling when the ball went in, but we ended up losing 2-1. Chester were one or two places below us at the time. Now they are challenging for the Third Division championship."

So a bit of first team experience for Neil, although there were one or two Ipswich fans who felt six months ago that it would be only a matter of time before a first team call up for Town beckoned.

Neil had gone through a spell of scoring eight goals in just nine games for the reserves, at a time when the Ipswich first team was struggling.

But any thoughts Neil may have had of impressing the management further were dashed when he suffered a dislocated shoulder during training.

"I was out of action for three months altogether, because as well as the injury, there were a host of reserve matches postponed," says Neil.

"The injury happened as I tried to break my fall. I put my hand out, but my elbow locked and the shoulder popped out and in again. It was sore for ages, but fortunately I've recovered from it.



"Whether I had a chance of getting in the first team or not I don't know, but that time has passed. All I can do is try and pick up from earlier in the season."

A hamstring injury is keeping Neil out of action for now, so he will be watching today's meeting with Swindon from the sidelines. However, that doesn't change his perception how important the game is for Ipswich.

"I would say this is our Cup Final," admits Neil, who is married to wife Joanna. "We badly need a win and three points are vital for us as we strive to retain our status in the Premiership."

"It should be an entertaining game for the fans. Swindon like to play attractive football, just like us, and they have one or two useful players."

Neil has just returned from a two month loan spell with Third Division Chesterfield, whose manager is former Ipswich boss John Duncan.

"Their full-back Kevin Horlock is a player I used to play with for Essex Schools, and Jan Aage Fjortoft has been on fire recently with a spate of goals. But the one player I rate in the Swindon side is John Moncur."

"To be honest, Swindon have done better than I expected them to. They've entertained a lot of people, and have been a little unlucky with a few results, although they've had a few heavy defeats."

It's a shame that the form of the Ipswich reserves this season hasn't rubbed off onto the senior side in the Premiership. Town's second string have been disputing second place in the Neville Ovenden Football Combination behind Chelsea.

Although Neil, whose older brother David is the reserve team captain, believes they've left their title challenge a little late, he feels Ipswich can push Chelsea harder.

"I have to admit, when I returned from my loan spell with Chesterfield, I thought I wouldn't get back in the side," says Neil.

Married to Joanna, Neil will soon be 'Best Man' at his brother David's wedding — just for the record, David was 'Best Man' at Neil's wedding.

"We've had a tremendous run, and it's good that we are keeping up the challenge. We were in a similar position at the turn of the year last year, but we fell away after suffering injuries and



fielding younger sides.

"This time we've sustained the challenge, and not so long ago we could have closed the gap on Chelsea. However they've pulled away again, but it would be nice if we can finish in second place."

The next few months which lay ahead for Neil are important, both on a personal and professional level.

First of all, he has the duties of 'Best Man' to perform for his brother David, who gets married in the summer — David was best man at Neil's wedding last year.

After that, the new season will be on the horizon, with the target of first team football at Portman Road to aim for.

"Next season will be very important for me," explains Neil. "I'll be moving

towards 22, and hope I can establish myself further in the pecking order."

"I'd like to think that I will be in contention very soon, as have other players such as Adam Tanner and Lee Durrant."

"This season Lee got his chance and took it very well, but that's the way it goes in football."

Last month, Neil marked his first full senior appearance in English League football with a goal — for Chesterfield against Chester City, but Chesterfield lost 2-1.

"More often than not injuries play a big part in the progress you make, but I'll see how things go, and hopefully they will go well."



Look at Europe

The English Premier League is reaching an exciting climax with issues at the top and bottom of the table still to be decided.

With Arsenal reaching the Cup Winners Cup Final against either Benfica or Parma, we turn our attention to the European scene and have a look at the way our foreign neighbours have been progressing in their respective campaigns.

Italy:

At the start of the season, it was predicted that this would be the most open fought championship race in years, in Italy. It was believed that there were at least four or five teams capable of winning the title and therefore lifting 'La Scudetto'. The early indications certainly stated that, with just a single point separating the top five teams, after the first ten games and all of the pre-season favourite's looked to be on course for a thrilling end of season showdown. Sampdoria and Juventus led the way at that time, with Parma, Inter and the current champions, AC Milan, just one point behind.

But as another third of the season passed, the indications started to appear that AC Milan were once again going to steal the show. Almost unnoticeably the champions had crept up on the chasing teams and now held a four point lead over second placed Juventus.

Milan have only lost two games all season, a defeat in Genoa, by Sampdoria and more recently their shock defeat in Naples, by Napoli. Once again their incredible run of results leaves them with very little to do, approaching the final games of the season. Although they have not really produced the magic, they gave us last season. Their consistency and determination, along with their ever present solid defence now sees them seven points ahead of Sampdoria and just three points away from being crowned champions of Italy, for the 14th time.

The biggest shock of the season, in Serie A, has been the dismal form of AC Milan's arch rivals, Inter Milan. Their summer signings of Dutch duo, Dennis Bergkamp and Wim Jonk, was supposed to be one which was to bring them home an overdue league title and while the UEFA Cup may bare their name, they let their chances of a Serie A title slip away, less than half way through the campaign. Bergkamp has not done for Inter, what he achieved during his spell with Ajax Amsterdam and although he is a player capable of producing the magic, when it is needed. For Inter he has

just not produced enough.

The outstanding achiever award in Italy, should once again go to Parma. Only promoted to the first division four years ago, they have built a side capable of living with the very best and during the early stages of the season, constantly proved a great threat to Milan. Themselves and Sampdoria have a very slim chance of stopping Milan this season, but it is a slim one. Despite the league having faded away, Parma and Sampdoria still have honours to play for this season. Sampdoria are soon to play in the Coppa Italia final, against very unlikely opponents, in the shape of second division Ancona. Sampdoria will surely feel confident of picking up another piece of silver wear here and if they do, they could find themselves lining up alongside Parma, in next seasons European Cup Winners Cup competition. But all this depends on Parma and if they can successfully retain, the trophy they so successfully won last season, in only their second European encounter. Last season their triumph brought them the 'World Team Of The Year Award', if they can lift up the trophy this summer in Copenhagen, then surely once again the above award will be theirs.

Spain:

Barcelona and Real Madrid share 38 out of 61 league titles, in the Spanish Primera Division. But until last weekend this seasons honours looked to be going in a different

direction. Deportivo La Coruna had held the top position for the majority of the campaign and were turning out performances that made them look unstoppable. Unbeatable would probably be a better word, considering they have only conceded 15 goals all season. But last weekend saw Barcelona close the gap, to just two points, with Real Madrid another point behind. These two giants still have work to do, if they are to catch the new boys, but with only 8 games remaining, things are once again starting to look all too familiar. At the start of the season Johan Cruyff declared that he believed his team would finish empty handed this season. With two months to go, they look more than capable of winning the Spanish league and to say that they stand no chance of taking the honours away from AC Milan in the European Cup, is a statement that should not yet be made.

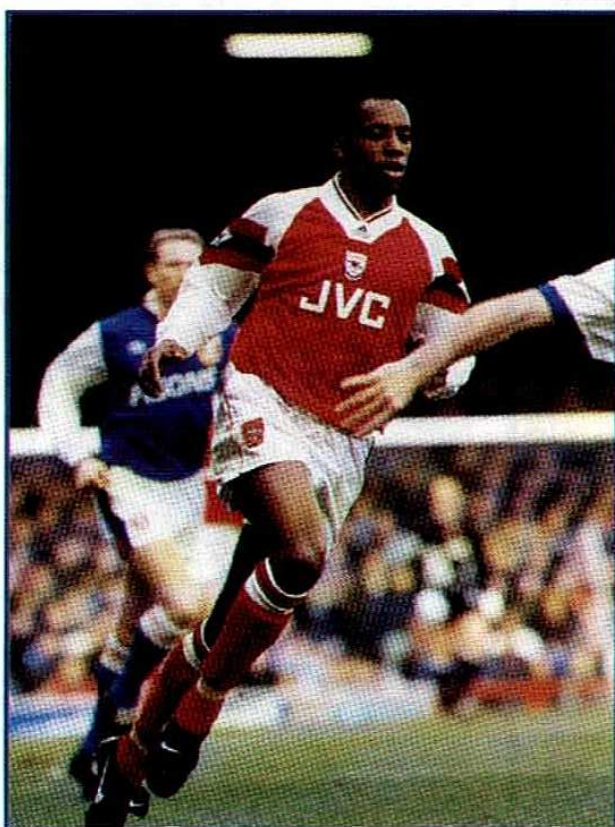
Holland:

The return of Frank Rijkaard to Ajax Amsterdam, has certainly been one of Europe's most successful summer signings. His performances are surely one of the biggest reasons why this most successful of Dutch clubs, look set to collect their 24th league title. They have not really been threatened all season and despite being knocked out of the UEFA Cup, they have looked extremely confident and very impressive. Last seasons champions, Feyenoord are lying in second place in the league, four points behind Ajax, but they have played more games than the Amsterdam giants and will really have to look for a fantastic run of results, if they are to dislodge the leaders from the position they have virtually claimed theirs.

France:

Paris St. Germain have completely dominated the French league this season. Forget Olympic Marseille, we now have new kings of France. They have only been beaten on two occasions this season and have really insured that the French league will be the first to be decided. Despite many peoples feelings towards Marseille, feelings of anger due to their bribery convictions of last season. They sit just behind Paris St. Germain in the French league and although the gap between the two, currently stands at six points, you have to sympathise with Marseille a little this season. Because of their eviction from Europe this campaign, they lost the services of many of their most influential players and therefore this season has been a tremendous battle. A battle that if it does eventually lead to them finishing the season in the runners up position, they should feel very proud.

All in all, it has been a pretty much predictable season on the continent. It did not start that way, but as time has gone by it is certainly ending so.

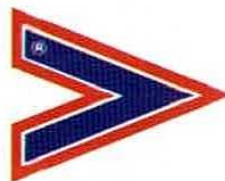

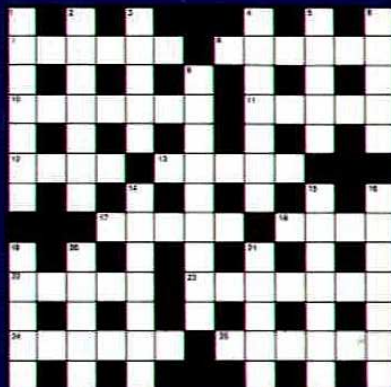



associated schoolboy forms in March 1993.

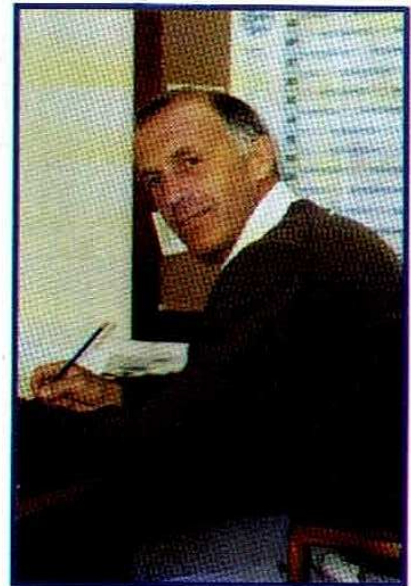
