

The Dons have certainly got what it takes as their continued presence in the top flight shows. They have demonstrated that a club with small gates and meagre resources can compete at this level.



I put on both Andy Mutch and Frank McAvennie to play with four forwards in a last ditch attempt to try and regain the advantage but we just couldn't turn our opportunities into more goals although John Moncur came agonisingly close.

It was a pity, especially for our fans who were once again tremendous. You have been really terrific all season getting behind the team and trying to urge them on. Hopefully we can repay you in some way with a resounding finish to the season.

I am sure we will all be the better for the experience of this season so that when we come back up we will be prepared.

We have had 15 draws this season - eight of them away - and at least five of those games should have been won. That is ten lost points. The difference between being bottom and a win away from safety.

I have also recommended Kevin Horlock to the F.A. of Ireland as his grandparents qualify him and he would be a worthy ambassador.


The deadline for Phase I of Season Ticket Applications for Season 1994/95 is fast approaching.

Wimbledon



A Test of Steel - by John Nolan

Wimbledon revelled in their I-O win over title chasing Manchester United last week. It was a famous victory to rank alongside their recent 4-I conquest of United's only rivals Blackburn Rovers.

The Dons, a club with big ambitions but modest resources, have managed to frustrate, and at times confuse, the establishment with regular ease since they gained League admittance in 1977 after a string of impressive FA Cup results over League opposition. Their biggest sensation - beating Liverpool in the FA Cup Final of 1988.

This season the Dons are comfortably entrenched in 8th place in the Premier League, a big improvement on last season when they seemed on a disaster course until a late rally lifted them into the top dozen.

Just how successful and consistent Wimbledon have been can be gauged from the fact that since gaining promotion to the top flight in 1986 their lowest finish has been 13th - in season 1991-92.

The problem then was a lack of goals and in a bid to improve this facet of their game manager Joe Kinnear invested in Brentford striker Dean Holdsworth. He was seen as the ideal foil for John Fashanu but found life difficult at this level. Add to that the fact that Fashanu himself was plagued by injuries and Wimbledon's goal source was at a low ebb.

The picture has been much happier this season however. Fashanu's winner against Manchester United was the Dons 30th home League goal. Though away from home only one club - Manchester City - has netted less than their 14.

Even so they have managed five wins and five draws in 18 away fixtures and conceded only 46 goals in 37 Premier League games.

Wimbledon

NEAL ARDLEY - Midfield/Wing. Developed through the Wimbledon youth scheme Neal is very effective on the wing or as an Industrious midfielder. A good user of the ball he is looking to establish himself in the side this season. Will be 22 in September.


WARREN BARTON - Midfield. A six footer who has made quite an impression in midfield since being converted from his role as an attacking right back. Played for Leytonstone and Ilford before coming into League football with Maidstone United. His strong running style is well suited to the Dons and he is particularly adept at getting into wide attacking positions. Still only 24.

GREG BERRY - Midfield. Wimbledon splashed out £250,000 to recruit Greg from Leyton Orient in 1992. Orient had picked him up from East Thurrock United in 1989 and he went on to make 80 League

appearances for them. Made his Premier League debut against Ipswich in August 1992 but made just two further appearances last season. Born: Grays 5-3-71.

DEAN BLACKWELL - Central Defender. A determined competitor who has graduated through the Wimbledon junior ranks. Strong in the air he also shows a good turn of speed and has been capped several times by England at Under-21 level. Played on loan for Plymouth before securing a place in the Dons side in 1990.

GARY BLISSETT - Striker. Gained an impressive reputation during his six years at Griffin Park and netted the winner at Peterborough, to clinch the Third Division Championship for the Bees in 1992. Started his career with Altrincham and came into League football with Crewe at Rochdale in August 1993. Moved to Brentford in March 1987 and subsequently signed for the Dons for £350,000 last summer. Born: Manchester 29-6-64.

who has enjoyed two very successful years with the Dons after they paid a Club record £775,000 to Port Vale in 1991... Didn't make the first team with his original club, Stoke City, but netted 77 goals in 294 League appearances for Vale before opting to sign for the Dons instead of Norwich. Born: Newcastle, Staffs 27-1-65.

GARY ELKINS - Utility. Joined the Dons in 1990 for £20,000 from Fulham after a loan spell with

Exeter City and has proved a reliable and versatile performer. A former England Youth cap. Born: Wallingford 4-5-66.

PETER FEAR - Midfield. Graduated through the ranks at Wimbledon after joining them on Schoolboy forms in 1987. Made his Premier League bow last season as a sub in a 1-0 win at Arsenal (February 1993) and played left midfield. Had made just four League appearances prior to this season. Born: Sutton 10-9-73.

Celebrated his 24th birthday at the start of the season and is now in his third season of senior football after playing his way through the junior sides. Reads the game well. Born: Westminster.

Wimbledon

DEAN HOLDSWORTH - Striker. Direct bustling striker who moved to Wimbledon from Brentford in the summer of 1992. A natural goalscorer he thrives on good service from the wings but found it difficult to adjust to the Premier League at first. Began his career with Watford but did not establish himself there and played on loan for Carlisle, Port Vale and Brentford before joining the Bees on a full transfer in 1989. Top shot with 28 goals in his first season there then shattered the club's post-war record with 38 goals in 1991-92. Born: London 8-11-68.

VINNY JONES - Midfield. Rejoined his first League club - Wimbledon in September 1992 when Chelsea released him for £700,000. Was a hod-carrier on a building site before joining the Dons from Wealdstone and played in their victorious F.A. Cup winning side of 1988. Joined Leeds for £600,000 a year later and scored here in a crucial 2nd Division clash. rejoined 'Harry' Bassett at Sheffield United in 1990 and Chelsea paid £575,000 for him in 1991. Born: Watford 5-1-65.


ALAN KIMBLE - Defender. Arrived from Cambridge last summer for £150,000. Had been with the 'U's since 1986, making close on 300 appearances, after making his League debut with Charlton in April 1985 - in a 0-0 draw with Sheffield United. Made only five more appearances for the Valiants, and one on loan with Exeter, before transferring to the Abbey. Born: Poole 6-8-66.

CHRIS PERRY - Defender. Former Youth team skipper and youth team 'Player of the Year' is now beginning to make a claim for a first team shirt. Born: Sutton 26-4-73.

JOHN SCALES - Central Defender. A former rugby player he turned to soccer and was snapped up by Leeds United. Failed to make the first team and joined Bristol Rovers in 1985. Two successful seasons with them led to a £70,000 move to Plough Lane in 1987. A consistent and durable athlete he is equally at home as an anchor man in midfield. Born: Harrogate 4-7-66.

HANS SEGERS - Goalkeeper. Brought to England in 1984 by Brian Clough who signed him for PSV Eindhoven. During his time with Nottingham Forest

he made 58 League appearances and played on loan from Stoke. Sheffield United and Dunfermline. Joined the Dons for £125,000 in 1988 and has been a firm favourite with the fans. Stands 5'11" and is quite spectacular. Has a long kick. Born: Eindhoven 30-10-61.

John Fashanu - by Colin Benson

When Sam Hammam put a valuation of £12-million on John Fashanu he emphasised just how important he is to the Dons cause.

Fash, a strong determined warrior, leads the line with dash and courage. He became Wimbledon's record buy - at £120,000 - when signed from Millwall in March 1986.

It proved a sound investment for last season was the first in six years in which he has not finished as the club's top scorer. Even so he has netted over 100 goals for the club.



The man in charge



Joe Kinnear Manager

Took charge of Wimbledon when Peter Withe parted company with the club at the start of 1992.

The former Tottenham Hotspur fullback had joined the Dons as reserve team manager in 1990 when Bobby Gould shuffled his backroom staff following the departure of Don Howe.

Joe was promoted to assistant manager when Ray Harford took over from Gould a year later and retained that position following Withe's appointment.

A solid and reliable defender in his playing days, Joe made his name at White Hart Lane in the days of Bill Nicholson, winning domestic and European honours.

Born in Kensington he was moved with his elder brother Justin to foster parents in Norfolk. He had a spell with Cambridge United as a youth but served his apprenticeship with Norwich City, making his League debut, as a sub, against Shrewsbury (17-10-81).

Joined Crystal Palace on loan before signing for Lincoln City. In the summer of 1985 he moved to Millwall for £55,000.


Capped by England twice he won an FA Cup Winners' medal in 1988.

His talents stretch beyond the football field. The handsome looks, have been recognised by TV and John is now a star presenter of the popular series Gladiators.

Chapter two of Terry Venables' soccer revolution this week had, alas, to take place without a match following the FA's decision to call off the proposed friendly in Berlin on Hitler's birthday.

Without wishing to enter into the argument as to whether Bert Millichip and his officers were right to cancel the game with Germany, in order to eliminate the risk of riots between fascists and anti-Nazi demonstrators, one is left wondering why it took our football bosses four months to make up their minds.

One can't fault them for not knowing it was the anniversary of Hitler's birth when the fixture was originally agreed but Graham Kelly has admitted that the FA were made aware of the significance of this date towards the end of last year...It seems they then just sat around hoping it would go away!

Anyway, the upshot was that while the rest of the world competed, Terry was left trying to make the most our of a get-together. Even for this there were the inevitable Saturday night Sunday morning withdrawals.

Young forwards like Jamie Redknapp, Andy Cole, Chris Sutton, Jason Wilcox and Chris Bart-Williams give room for optimism and I'm sure Liverpool's Robbie Fowler will eventually be added to this list.

I also applaud the inclusion of Oldham Athletic's centre-half Richard Jobson who, in my opinion, is a much safer bet than either Pallister or Bruce whose names are so frequently pushed forward. But Neil Ruddock as a potential England International? He's currently not my cup of tea.

But it is to midfield where Terry needs to address his priorities. If anything Graham Taylor's demise stemmed from a failure to provide adequate craft and imagination in this department. He relied too much on the genius of Paul Gascoigne and when the Lazio player failed to deliver, mainly due to his lack of fitness, Mr Taylor was unable to fill the bench.

Mr Venables is obviously conscious of this for in his first game, against Denmark, he placed much emphasis on fielding a team that could pass the ball. This when all said and done is a minimum requirement at this level. Mind you one feels some sympathy towards Graham Taylor for there were not a lot of skilled technicians to choose from in the English game. Here at Swindon we have gained some recognition for the quality of our passing over these last two seasons and while we are proud of our reputation it is somewhat of an indict-

ment on the English game that this should be seen as the exception rather than the rule.


There is no doubt that standards have slipped dramatically over the last decade. I covered an FA Youth Cup semi-final last week between Millwall and Middlesbrough. The overall standard was pitiful. You could not criticise the lads on commitment, that was tremendous. But where was the skill?

The erosion of soccer activity of young players coming into League football is beginning to show. The quality is dropping and this does not auger well for the future. When all is said and done the lads at senior school today are the raw material from which the International stars of the next decade will emerge.

This is now a matter of great concern and it needs to be dealt with immediately. If schools are not going to teach our youth the game then the FA must take control with a grand national plan, something that is more embracing than the current network of Schools of Excellence which only cater for the more gifted young-sters - a system that loses many late developers.

What is more it needs to be a concerted plan with the national team at its pinnacle. What I am saying is that it should be under the direction of Terry Venables not Charles Hughes.

It is totally absurd that the jobs of Technical Director and England Manager are not one.

15 Years Ago

April 21 1979: Swindon Town 2 Watford 0

Promotion looked a distinct possibility following this televised encounter. Manager Bob Smith told eight million Match of the Day viewers "I'm confident we'll go up now" following his side's cultured performance. The two points took Swindon to within four of leaders Swansea, with three games in hand. Town had taken the lead in the 15th minute, when an lan Miller corner on the left was flicked on at the near post by Andy Rowland and was ceremoniously headed into his own net by Ross Jenkins. The blond striker was the League's top goalscorer at the time, with 35 goals - at the right end!

Swindon clinched the points with a classic Rowland goal eleven minutes from time. John Trollope swept a cross in from the right, Bryan Hamilton headed it on and the Town number nine smashed home a waist high volley that gave Andy Rankin no chance - promoting an ebullient Smith to declare afterwards "...We're the best footballing side in the Third Division and we showed it."

April 22 1969: Swindon Town I Mansfield Town 0


This was a meeting of the season's Cup giantkillers - Swindon in the League Cup and Mansfield in the FA Cup. It ended in a single goal victory for Town - the tenth 1-0 scoreline at the County Ground that season. But it could have been 3-0 after only ten minutes! A John Smith effort was too high and a Roger Smart header went wide. But Danny Williams' men had already taken a third-minute lead. Peter Noble helped on a Don Rogers corner and Smith's header was diverted past Dave Hollins by Bob Ledger. The big striker has been the hero at Field Mill earlier in the season, having scored against Swindon in a 2-0 win. This time he was the villain.

Hollins kept Swindon on tenderhooks with a string of fine saves and was determined not to be beaten a second time. Town keeper Peter Downsborough was beaten only once, too. But thankfully on that occasion Welsh International Rod Thomas was on hand to clear off the line and send Swindon to within one point of a Second Division place, with two games left.

Fittingly, it came at Williams' old club Rotherham ten days later.








Perhaps John Gorman was hoping he could sorcer up some more wizardry to keep Town in the Premier League when he signed him on to help the cause. The Lambeth born Northern Ireland International would certainly have liked to oblige.

Says Lawrie: "I was a free agent when John asked if I was interested in joining Swindon. I know a lot of people thought it was a contradiction in football philosophy to come from Wimbledon to Swindon but there is a lot of rubbish written and spoken about the Dons



"They play a physical game it is true but they are all good athletes, extremely fit and as time has gone on the side has developed with more skill and ability drafted in.

"Success has also helped the players to express themselves more and this stems from confidence.

"I spent ten great years there and so am associated with their style of play but you know I started my career with Reading where I gained a reputation as a ball player. In fact I was continually criticised for over elaboration.

"When I signed for Wimbledon I had to adjust to their pattern of play. Now I am re-adjusting again and am enjoying the challenge.

"It has been quite thrilling playing alongside John Moncur who has to be one of the most talented midfield players in the Premiership. My job is to add a bit of steel to the midfield."

Wimbledon's phenomenal staying power in the higher sphere obviously makes them an ideal model for smaller clubs to follow. So what lessons does Lawrie think we can learn from their achievements?

"I think the main strength at Wimbledon is their commitment. They play a particular way with a hundred per cent commitment from everyone.

"The year we won the FA Cup we were all tuned into each other and had total belief in ourselves. I think the current Wimbledon side is possibly close to that and has the potential to become the best ever team in Wimbledon's history.

"They need to win something tangible to achieve this and with the Championship probably out of the reach of the less well off clubs their best bet is in one of the Cup competitions."

Now Lawrie knows what it takes to make the grade in the top flight. Wimbledon achieved their status by being direct, highly competitive, and by making it difficult for the opposition to play their normal game. Does he think that sides looking to establish themselves in the Premiership should maybe look to laying foundations on similar lines?

"No, not really. Wimbledon never changed their style when they got into the First Division. They played it that way from Division Four up. At that time we were the only team in the top division that played football that way so it took time for the establishment to come to terms with us.

"The essential to success it to get results early doors. I remember we had a great win at Spurs in one of our opening fixtures and the confidence from that win just flooded through all of us.

"From what I gather Swindon didn't enjoy that sort of luck and it took until Christmas for them to find their feet. That is a pity because it is very difficult when you are so far behind.

"If they had achieved the results they have since then in the period before Christmas then I think we would all be confidentially looking to another season in the Premier League.



The media love to brand them as "The Crazy Gang" and there is no doubt that Wimbledon have produced some fantasy results in recent weeks.

Most fans wending their way home from matches all over the country last Saturday were feeling a tinge of disappointment on hearing that Blackburn Rovers had been turned over 3-1 by Southampton at the Dell. It seemed the Saints had virtually ended the race for the title and handed the Championship to Manchester United.

The pessimists hadn't of course allowed for The Dons. Two hours later they were the toast of the nation having delivered a sickening blow to Alex Ferguson's plans with a 1-0 win over his gifted team at Selhurst Park.

It has kept the Championship alive and posed more question marks about United's credibility. Are they losing their grip on the title?

They still have a game in hand of course but this afternoon they are home to Manchester City (5.00pm) in a match which means everything to both sides. Derby clashes have a tendency to go against form and City, struggling for Premiership survival, will have their season made if they can pull off a win against their neighbours.

Blackburn fans have to wait until tomorrow for their home game with a rather dispirited Queens Park Rangers who look like settling for a mid-table position after once suggesting a top three place.

If the Championship is a two-horse race the fight against relegation is certainly not. It will take more than a miracle to save us from the drop - we not only need to win all four of our remaining games but both Southampton and Spurs must not take a single point; and even then we would need to dramatically improve our goal-difference to survive - but Manchester City, Ipswich, Everton, Spurs, Southampton and Oldham are still very much involved.

The Oldham v Tottenham game in midweek will have been significant and this afternoon Spurs, who have won just three home games, play host to Southampton. The Saints have scored eight goals in their last two games against Norwich and Blackburn and seemingly look the form-team of the struggling pack.

You certainly can't envy Oldham who travel to Newcastle this afternoon. The Latics were just 46

seconds away from the FA Cup Final before Mark Hughes blasted their dreams, and seemingly their spirit. Joe Royle's team came badly unstuck in the replay then crashed 2-I at home in the League to West Ham United last Saturday.


That win has virtually assured the Hammers their immediate Premiership future and there will be little but pride for them to play for against Liverpool today.

Ipswich, who are looking decidedly shaky, are at Sheffield Wednesday this afternoon then take on Manchester United (home) and Blackburn Rovers (away).

Sheffield United seemingly lost their fight when they were beaten 2-1 at home last Saturday by Aston Villa. Dave Bassett has not given it up yet but admits their future is no longer entirely in their hands. Still they could get a boost at Norwich this afternoon.
