

FIFA GUIDELINES

- Understanding the Laws of the Game



Many spectators have observed that this season a number of matches have lasted much longer than in previous years. Journey's home have taken longer too, when the early bus or train has been missed!

The cause of the prolonged periods of play in each half is really down to the new instructions given to referees before the start of season 1994/95, to make sure that a full allowance is always made, beyond the normal time of a match ending, for any time considered to have been lost through time-wasting or for any other valid reasons.

Valid causes of making such an allowance, apart from time-wasting, include the time lost through teams making substitutions and time lost in having injured players removed from the field for treatment, time lost when play is delayed from restarting immediately when sometimes players take minutes to celebrate the scoring of a goal, and so on.

That leaves time-wasting ploys (duly punished as Ungentlemanly Conduct) for which an allowance must be made by the referee stopping his watch, these include players delaying the taking of a free-kick by kicking the ball away, players appearing to prepare for a throw-in, but then suddenly leaving the ball on the touchline to be thrown by another player and players delaying leaving the field when being substituted, etc., etc. There are so many!


The normal duration of a game is, of course, two equal periods of forty five minutes (except when a penalty kick is awarded in the final minute, when the half in question must be extended to beyond forty five minutes to allow the penalty kick to be correctly taken). Measurements of the time when the ball is actually in play, based on many matches, has shown that this rarely exceeded fifty minutes, prior to the World Cup 1994.

With the more stringent measures taken to allow for time lost, in matches in the USA, the time of play rose to beyond sixty minutes. While this is still nowhere near the theoretical ninety minutes duration of a game, it does, at least, give some greater value for money!

Greater attention to time lost, so that due allowance is made, is a further new (or reminder) instruction given to referees this year. Don't forget that the final whistle at the match might, therefore, be six, seven or eight minutes or so, after the normally expected time of finish. Check the new bus or train times in advance or you could be time-wasting, delayed at the station!

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

Two promotions in the past three years have fired the blue touch paper at Turf Moor where Burnley fans have lived too long on the memories of the 1960s when great players such as Blacklaw, Angus, Elder, Adamson, Cummings, Miller, Connelly, Jimmy McIloy, Ray Pointer, Robson and Harris filled the claret and the blue jerseys.


Gates at Turf Moor last season averaged 10,500 and Mr Mullen strengthened his squad in the summer by recruiting four players for a total outlay of £700,000.

The Club transfer record was broken twice when £200.000 was invested on fullback Chris Vinnicombe, who started his career at Exeter but spent the last five years with Rangers; and it took a further £250,000 to prize striker Liam Robinson away from Bristol City.

Also on the shopping list was Bolton Wanderers' Mark Winstanley who along with Vinnicombe and Robinson were seen to have the pace to deal with First Division conditions. The experienced play-maker Alan Harper on the other hand "has pace upstairs under his bonnet," suggests the Burnley boss.

Indeed, there is no lack of experience at hand with little Adrian Heath and the burly Ted McMinn to call upon. "Inchy" Heath was very disappointed at being axed but came back with a five star performance against Shrewsbury Town in the FA Cup - scoring one and making the other for John Deary in a 2-1 First Round victory.

Not such good news for Chris Vinnicombe who fractured his jaw in the 0-0 draw at Reading and will probably miss tonight's game. There is no doubt that Burnley have found it harder going at this level and particularly difficult to score goals. But their away form is better than at home with wins at Millwall (3-2), Luton (1-0) and Charlton (2-1) supplemented by draws at Sunderland (0-0), and Reading (0-0). Their defeats have come at Middlesbrough (2-0) on the opening day of the season; Oldham (3-0) and West Brom (1-0).

MARLON BERESFORD • Goalkeeper. Highly rated young custodian who joined Burnley from Sheffield Wednesday for £100,000 in September 1992 and crowned his first Football League campaign by being named Second Division goalkeeper of the season. Worked his way up through the ranks at Hillsborough but didn't make the first team gaining his introduction to the League while on loan with Bury. Had loan spells with Ipswich, Northampton and Crewe also. Was sent-off at Oldham earlier this season. Is 6' 1" Born:Lincoln 2-9-69.

STEVE DAVIS - Central Defender. A solid competitor who learned his trade with Southampton but played only six games for the Saints before joining Burnley after a loan period with Notts County. Played nine games on loan for the Lancashire club before signing returning to the Dell then transferring on a permanent agreement. Born: Hexham 30-10-68.

JOHN DEARY - Midfield. Former Blackpool apprentice, John went on to make 303 League appearances (43 goals) before moving to Turf Moor in 1989. Made his League debut for Blackpool in a 2-1 win at Fulham in September 1980. Born: Ormskirk 18-10-62.



JOHN GAYLE

WAYNE DOWELL - Midfield. A product of the Burnley youth development programme he has progressed from the Trainee ranks to make his claim for a first team shirt this season.

DAVID EYRES - Striker. Signed from Blackpool for £90,000 at the start of last season and finished the campaign as top scorer with 27 goals, including one at Wembley in the Play-Off Final. Had joined the "Seasiders" from Rhyl. Born: Liverpool 26-2-64.

JOHN FRANCIS - Forward. Scorded six goals in 42 League appearances for Sheffield United before making the switch to Turf Moor. The Blades picked him up from non-League side Emley. Born: Leeds 21-11-63.

JOHN GAYLE - Striker, Signed from Coventry City in August 1994 after a short loan spell. His one goal thus far sealed Burnley's 2-2 draw at York in the Coca-Cola Cup.

ALAN HARPER - Midfield. Pulls the strings in midfield. Joined Liverpool as a schoolboy and served his apprenticeship at Anfield but didn't get a first team chance and made a short journey to Everton in 1983. Made his League bow v Stoke in August 1983 and played in every defensive position, apart from goal, for the Everton team that was so successful in the mid-80's winning a Championship medal and two Cup Final medals. In June 1988 Alan signed for Sheffield Wednesday but made only 35 League appearances before moving on to Manchester City and then back to Everton. From there he arrived at Luton and played for the Hatters in the FA Cup semi-final last season. In the summer of 1994 he transferred to Burnley on a two-year contract. Born: Liverpool 1-11-60.

with Queen of the South. Rangers took him on in '84 and he made 63 Premiership appearances for them before moving to Seville in Spain in 1987. On his return Ted made over 150 League and Cup appearances for Derby County before joining Birmingham City in the 1993 close season. Didn't settle at St Andrews and went on loan to Burnley where he impressed Jimmy Mullen enough for him to fork out £70,000 for "The Tin Man" who is now a firm favourite with fans. Born: Castle Douglas 28-9-62.

GARY PARKINSON = Fullback. A stylish performer who played in the old First Division with Middlesbrough. Was on Everton's books as an amateur but eventually returned to his home- town club in 1986. Made his League debut for 'Boro v Port Vale at Hartlepool when Ayresome Park had been closed by the liquidators. Forever claimed a place in Burnley's history by scoring the winning goal in the 1994 Play-Off Final at Wembley against Stockport County. Born: Middlesbrough 10-1-68.

ADRIAN RANDALL - Midfield. Served his apprenticeship with Bournemouth but had played just three League games (the first v Doncaster Rovers 19-4-86) in three years for the "Cherries" when he joined Aldershot. Won a regular place with the "Shots" clocking up 112 League outings (12 goals) before moving north. Made his Burnley debut v Rotherham on Boxing Day 1991. Born: Amesbury 10-11-68.

LIAM ROBINSON - Striker. A powerfully built athlete he joined Nottingham Forest from school but was allowed to continue his career with Huddersfield Town who loaned him out to Tranmere Rovers. Did not really catch the eye until after he had joined Bury where his record of

89 goals in 262 games was impressive. It earned him a move to First

Division Bristol City during the 1993 summer. Liam made 31 appearances for City but when Burnley came in Russell Osman allowed him to leave for £250,000. Born: 29-12-65.

CHRIS VINNICOMBE = Fullback. Mullen broke Burnley's spending record when he paid Rangers £200.000 for him in the summer. Chris had commenced his career with Exeter City, (39 League games) but was quickly snapped up in November 1989 by Graeme Souness, then in charge of Rangers. Born; 20-10-70.

MARK WINSTANLEY - Central Defender. Signed in the close-season of 1994 from Bolton. Joined the Wanderers on the YTS in 1984 and made his League debut at Bournemouth, in March 1986. Stands six-feet-one, Born: St Helens 22-1-68.



THE MAN IN CHARGE



Manager Jimmy Mullen

Took charge of Burnley in October 1991 when they were competing in the Fourth Division of the Football League. He was at the time the assistant to the then manager, Frank Casper, and few anticipated the dramatic turn-round Mullen would inspire.

Within a couple of months ailing Burnley had established themselves as promotion contenders after a record run of nine consecutive wins. They ended up winning the Fourth Division Championship by six clear points and suddenly this old Lancashire mill town sat up and took notice of what was going on at Turf Moor.

In the reorganisation that took place with the establishment of the Premiership the Third Division became the Second and after finishing a respectable 13th in this division Mullen plotted another promotion last season. He guided Burnley to a Wembley win over Stockport County in the Final of the Play-Offs.

Mullen enjoyed a distinguished career as a player with Sheffield Wednesday, making his debut in defence in season 1970-71; and in ten years with Owls he clocked up 230 League appearances (10 goals).

In the summer of 1980 he was transferred to Rotherham United where he stayed until 1982 when he moved to Cardiff City, having played one game on loan for Preston in 1981-82. In all he made over another 100 appearances in the League.

Jimmy, who was born at Jarrow on November 11, 1952, then cut his managerial teeth as assistant boss at Aberdeen and had a season in charge of Blackpool before arriving at Turf Moor.

Striker Adrian Heath

"Inchy Heath" has been a firm favourite wherever he has played and after a scintillating performance against Shrewsbury Town in the FA Cup recently gave notice that, at the age of 33, he is still very influential on the field.

Grew up with his local club Stoke City, establishing himself in the team in 1979-80, after making his debut at Fulham on October 7, 1978.

Adrian was only in his second full season in the senior side when he won the first of his eight England Under-21 caps, scoring twice on his debut against Rumania, in April 1981.

Everton invested, a then club record payment of £700,000, to sign the five-foot-six striker in January 1982 and in his first full season for the "Toffeemen" he finished top scorer with 12 goals. Had 13 goals to his credit in 25 appearances when he sustained knee ligament damage against Sheffield Wednesday in December '84. An injury which kept him out of the game for nine months.

Had difficulty re-establishing himself but the sale of Gary Lineker to Barcelona in 1986 gave Adrian the opportunity to rejoin the Everton attack again.

Adrian helped Everton to two League titles during the early eighties and also claimed an FA Cup winners' medal in 1984. Scored in a second round ECWC tie against Inter Bratislava in 1984-85 but did not make the Final team.

After a brief spell with Aston Villa, Adrian made 75 appearances for Manchester City before returning to Stoke. Burnley signed him on a match-by-match contract at the start of the 1992-93 season and he hit 23 goals. Made double figures again last season to help Burnley win promotion through the play-offs.





Just one other First Division fixture to preview this week, Wolverhampton Wanderers' home game tonight with Bolton Wanderers.

Wolves, under the guidance of former England manager Graham Taylor, are firm favourites to take the First Division title next May, and it must be argued that there are few in this division who can match their resources.

What strengthens their claim though is that they have been topping the table while not playing well and as we all know it is those sides that manage to pick the points when they are off form who tend collect the silverware at the end of the season.

On home ground the old-gold shirts must be favourites but don't dismiss Bolton, for the Lancashire side have been creeping up almost unnoticed on the leading pack.

Last Saturday's 2-0 win over Notts County hoisted Bolton into third place in the League table, and like Wolves, it was a victory achieved by a side not playing to its full strengths.

Manager Bruce Rioch, who has been in charge since May 1992, has already proved himself as a Championship moulding manager with Middlesbrough, and over the past couple of seasons has rekindled the sleeping giant of Burnden Park.

They gained great publicity and a lot of fans through their Cup giant escapades last season of course and there are none shrewder than Mr Rioch who knows this is the ideal time to build success on the foundations of those Cup triumphs.

That victory over lowly Notts County was not as easy as the scoreline suggests; there were just three minutes left when Bolton wrapped up the points when substitute Coyle pulled a cross back from the byline to set up Paatelainen - a £300,000 signing from Aberdeen last summer - for a simple side-foot shot.

Manager Rioch afterwards admitted: "It was not one of our better performances," none the less it was Bolton's fifth win on the trot in a ten-match unbeaten spell.

That was good enough to lift them within two points of the First Division leadership though Middlesbrough and Wolves still had their top of the table clash at Ayresome Park to complete on Sunday afternoon.

So it could be a real thriller at Molineux tonight where Wolves have lost one and drawn one of their eight home games - that defeat of course inflicted by Luton Town, our visitors on Saturday.

That old Club verses Country issue has been raised again with Tranmere Rovers' Republic of Ireland star John Aldridge pleading for time off to help his International career.

Aldridge is said to be set for a showdown with his boss as he wants a month off. The veteran striker claims: "I am struggling with an ankle injury. It will have to be sorted out."


The former Liverpool star obviously finds himself in a similar situation to Andy Cole at Newcastle but of course Tranmere do not have the same playing resources to call upon as Kevin Keegan and are naturally reluctant to do without the services of such an influential player.




Our soccer coaching Funweeks proved to be as popular as ever in the recent half-term holidays, so therefore we have organised more Funweeks for over the Christmas period.

The thought of squeezing six foot four and fourteen stone into the confines of an English narrow boat conjures up all sorts of comical connotations yet for the giant defender Brian Kilcline it is simply a way of life.

Brian and his wife Lynne just love messing about on the river. With what they call "home" nestling in the Yorkshire moors the Kilclines opted for a temporary abode that they could move around at will in.

Says Brian: "Many of the lads who move to a football club take up rented houses, which they can't call their own, and which they will discard when they leave the club. So they become temporary homes, and those who have bought houses find them difficult to sell, in the present climate, when they need to move on. So this seemed like a good alternative.

"It actually started from a tongue-in cheek suggestion by Lynne's boss. But like many flippant remarks it sowed the seed and became more interesting and exciting the more we thought about it.

"We must have looked at sixty odd boats in three months before we chose this one, which is a six-berth vessel. You would be surprised at the amenities available on some boats. We looked at barges fitted with jacuzzis; some with computers and all mod cons. It is incredible what you can do with a narrow boat.

"It is not the finding of a barge that is the difficulty. The hardest part is obtaining the moorings. We were lucky in this respect and rent ours from some very nice people.

"I love my home, it is situated in a very beautiful part of the world, and while I am at Swindon I needed something to compete with that image. A narrow boat on the River Thames is the answer.

"To start with it was a novelty but this type of life grows on you. As Lynne says, it has a great advantage over a fixed residence because if we don't like the scenery we can just move the boat.

"You know, if it has been a bad day; the manager's been on my back, the lads have been moaning at me during training, and I have had a puncture on the way home; I can just get back on board, until the moorings and sail down the river and forget it all.


"Now you can't do that when you turn your key in the latch of a four-bedroomed detached house in West Swindon.

"I think it is the escapism that Llove so much. We can cruise down the Thames for about three-and-a half hours and have covered the distance that would have taken only half-an-hour in a car. But it is a hell of a way of relaxing and turning off.

"There is a charm and beauty about this life on the river that you can't begin to appreciate unless you have tried it. Once I have got the key in the ignition I could be anywhere. If a zebra crossed over the bridge I wouldn't be surprised. You meet different sorts of people too. Bargees often have barbecues and

get togethers on the river bank. It is all very interesting."

To the uninitiated, space would seem to be the obvious restriction that could weigh heavily on a man of Brian's giant frame?

"Space?" he retorts in a challenging voice. "How much space do you need? I can stand up and walk through the boat and if I require any more there is all that anyone can need out there."

What about shopping then. They can't just pop out to the shop on the corner when they run out of milk?

"We can berth right alongside Sainsbury's," laughs Brian. "I have my trolley on the top, straight down the gangplank, do my Captain Birds Eye routine and back to the boat my hearties for a good meal.

"You have to remember this was a way of life once upon a time and the river is well appointed for services. There are shops at the marinas and at many of the boat-yards."

Has he had to adjust his way of life at all though?

"Well I walk with a sway now," jokes Brian. "I am a very easy going person so I adapt comfortably. But this is a home from home really. We have hot water, central heating, all you could wish. The only change I have had to make is to become more tidy. You have to be organised on a boat."

Lynne, who works on special projects for the NSPCC, got Brian involved on his recent weekend off. He says: "She got me helping them prepare the Manchester Town Hall for the first ever North West Regional Conference. I was building stages; erecting lights and sound equipment. I tell you it took me two hours to put up four posters directing delegates to the refreshment areas. Having put them up with bluetack I was told 'you can't do that it will mark the stone.' Next I tried Sellotape. 'You can't use that it will mark the stone.' It's moments like these that bring you right down to earth. One week you are a footballer, the next you are sticking up cardboard signs.

"The conference went well though. I had an interesting day listening about abused and battered children and what you can do for them."

Then it was back to the tranquillity of the river. He might not be in the 'brace the main sail' league just yet but don't rule that out. For Brian and Lynne are really smitten. Rememberance Sunday allowed us all the opportunity to give thanks to those who gave their lives for our freedom. But I wonder how many of you know how big a part football played in the First World War?

The London Irish Territorial Regiment have a memento of an old football, standing on a silver stand, as one of their treasured possessions. That ball having once been kicked out of a rain-sodden trench at Maroc, heralding the famous charge of the Regiment at the battle of Loos.

It was dribbled to the first objective, then kicked by a young officer far up onto the second objective, the Double Crassier, whose capture mortally thinned the ranks by three-quarters.

The ball was actually recovered when the battalion was ordered to withdraw from the position and since has become one of the army's historic trophies.

We all know now how easily human life was futiley sacrificed by the generals of the time and there is no doubt that commanding officers used the national passion for football as a means of enticing their men over the trenches and into battle.

The history of the gallant East Surrey Regiment records July 1, 1916, when the 8th Battalion charged towards the German trenches at Contalmaison, kicking footballs between them.

A Reuter War correspondent reported:

"The Captain of one of the companies had provided four footballs, one for each platoon, urging them to keep up a dribbling competition all the way over the mile and a quarter of ground they had to traverse. As the company formed on emerging from the trench, the platoon commanders kicked off and the match against Death commenced. The gallant Captain himself fell early in the charge, and men began to drop rapidly under the hail of machine-gun bullets. But still the footballs were booted onwards, with hoarse cries of encouragement or defiance, until they disappeared in the dense smother behind which the Germans were shooting. Then when the bombs and bayonets had done their work, and the enemy has cleared out, the Surrey men looked for their footballs, and recovered two of them in the captured traverses. These will be sent to the Regimental Depot at Kingston as trophies worth preserving."

"Non-man's-land" was the venue of those brave brave men. Barbed-wire, cold, rain, mud and exploding shells and bullets the unequal opposition until hostilities ceased and peace became the real ball of Life at their feet.

The Union of goalkeepers was put under a cloud last week when the Football Association charged Southampton keeper Bruce Grobbelaar on two counts related to alleged match-fixing.

The Zimbabwe International is of course innocent until proved guilty but the mere fact that as conservative an organisation as the FA feels the evidence warrants the charges, suggests that there must be some pretty damaging material available.

It is funny how people react to stories of this nature. None of us wants our beloved game to be soiled by allegations of corruption, yet most of us will admit we are hungry for the facts and some people will even be disappointed should they prove untrue. Such is human nature.




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WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

Colin Gordon

Ten years ago this month, Swindon plucked an unknown striker from Southern League football at Oldbury United and saw him produce one of the best goals per game ratio of recent times. Discovered by former Town manager Bert Head, Colin spent just eighteen months at the County Ground, but in his 72 League appearances, he hit 33 goals.

In 1985/86, Swindon recorded a home and away 'double' over our visitors today and Colin scored in both fixtures. The meeting at the County Ground fell on the 17th anniversary of the club's League Cup Final victory at Wembley and there were further celebrations as the Town chalked up a record 14th consecutive home League win.

Colin was on trial when he was named in the twelve to travel to Rochdale for a Fourth Division fixture on November 3, 1984. He recalls that day well. "The Boss", Lou Macari, went off early in the game and on I went. It was very cold and very wet! I remember Garry Nelson suffering from hypothermia at the end of the game, it was that bad."

The result was better, however. Colin headed the only goal of the game, from a corner on the right. "It was so muddy, the ball only just crept over the line", he added. He was soon given a contract and went on to finish the season as top scorer and player of the season. He was only just pipped as top marksman in the Championship season by Charlie Henry.

Colin left Swindon in July 1986 for the bright lights of London, signing for Dave Bassett at Wimbledon. The Town had made a handsome profit from his brief stay in Wiltshire - almost £ 100,000 - but things were not as rosy for Colin. "In hindsight, it wasn't the right move for me", he admitted. "Alan Cork and John Fashanu were firmly established and opportunities were scarce." After just three First Division games, Colin was on the move again, back down the M4 to Reading.


At Elm Park, Colin soon hit the goal trail again and in October 1987 hit eight in five games. But the club was fighting a losing battle against relegation from the Second Division. He had a disagreement with the manager lan Branfoot and did not play after January, but still finished as top scorer!

In March, Colin went on loan to Bristol City, where Joe Jordan had just taken over from Terry Cooper as caretaker manager. Colin collected four goals in eight appearances, but then Mr Branfoot would not let him play in City's Division Three Play-Off Final and a permanent move was ruled out.

Colin needed to move on once again and in October 1988 went to Fulham. "Again it wasn't a particularly good move for me", said Colin. "London hadn't worked out for me the first time round, so I don't really know why I moved back there".

But his next move was a better one. In June 1989, Colin signed for Birmingham City, allowing him to move his family back to his hometown of Stourbridge. He took his full coaching badge, coincidentally at the same time as Colin Calderwood - who he had shared digs with at Swindon.


Colin made one further move, to Leicester City, before being forced to retire from the professional game with a pelvic injury. After a spell as player-coach at Kidderminster, he is now playmanager of Stourbridge in the Beazer Homes Midland Division turning things round. My assistant and I have made a management buy-out and we want to take Stourbridge as far as Dave Bassett took Wimbledon.

Overall we worked hard passing the ball and I think that we should have had at least a share of the points.


The positive thing to come out of the game was that everybody came through unscathed and Wayne and myself were able to play in the Anglo Italian Cup game in Ascoli.

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England's goalkeeper gives you his view on last week's victory over Nigeria.



Nigeria were quite a good side but I thought we played very well on the night and thoroughly deserved the I-0 win.

We hustled them until we were blue in the face really. Got lots of men around the ball and looked just as dangerous going forward on the break as they did.

It was a good test for us because Nigeria, who of course participated in the World Cup Finals in the USA last summer, are a good bit further up the rankings compared with us at the moment. So to get a win is a fine achievement.

"Platty," our captain, is unbelievable. He has got 24 goals in 50 International appearances now and he was just telling me that puts him into the top ten scorers for England which is fantastic for him.

It is even more phenomenal when you take into consideration that he is a midfield player. He has that uncanny knack of getting in on the end of things just in front of goal. A goalkeeper's nightmare really if you are against him.

It was a good game for me to play in. Of course I am vying with David Seaman for that England jersey. Before this series of Internationals, when Terry Venables took charge, he did say that he would give all of us, as a squad, a chance and a fair crack of the whip.

I guess he saw the Nigerian fixture as a game I could have a go in and I did okay. I had a bit more to do than I did against Greece - which was absolutely nothing. I had one or two shots tonight.

Did okay. I am not going to shout my mouth off about anything. I'm simply thrilled to bits to have earned another cap and I will just keep working hard at Blackburn and try and stay in the national squad.

It was a great boost for the club to have three players in the same England team and I think Alan Shearer and Graeme Le Saux will be there for a long long time to come.

The Nigerians tested me with a few long-range efforts but I saw them all pretty well - very well in fact. At this level you expect anything. I'm pretty new to the International game but in League football as well you expect everything. We have lots of quality players in the Premiership who can do all sorts of things from any distances so you have to expect all things at all times.

The atmosphere was terrific and the first feel of the ball was important. It was a ball knocked over the top. The gaffer had said to me, just as we went out, to be up towards the edge of my box ready for anything over the top because it would skid through, and fortunately it just skidded into the box and I was there waiting for it.

We had a new central defensive partnership who didn't know each other and apart from "Razor". (Ruddock), who I played with at Southampton, and Graeme (Le Saux) my team-mate from Blackburn, we didn't know too much about each other as a unit. So I thought the back-four were fantastic limiting what I had to do to such an extent.



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






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
