

A reporter had the cheek to ask me, at Portsmouth on Saturday, if it is all over for Sheffield United; if defeats at Roker Park and Fratton Park had brought our season to a premature end.

Again I pointed out how last season taught us that nothing can be taken for granted until the final whistle. We are not alone in feeling the pressure. Derby played midweek against Wolves and I admit Derby are one of the sides who have put us in danger of missing the play-offs. But Derby, 3-1 up, were held to a draw. In their previous game they lost at home to Sunderland. Reading went down against Grimsby; Bolton drew at home with Luton. At this time of year you will get results like this but it is human nature to concentrate on the statistics of your own club.

performances in our last two away games have been less than satisfying. We thought we could win them both; we were confident of at least two points with two draws. In fact we got nothing and didn't even score a goal - although how we missed at Portsmouth is a mystery. We should have been home and dry before half-time and I had a suspicion that Portsmouth would come out, play

happened and regrettably we were not able to lift our game to the required standards.

For most of the season we have been the highest scoring team in the First Division; suddenly we have dried up and gone over 180 minutes without a goal. I would be more distressed if we were not making chances; at Sunderland Portsmouth we had golden opportunities and, in missing them, we have simply made life harder for ourselves.

But we come to our 41st league match of the season alive. OK, the supreme prize of the championship is beyond us but my plan has always been to go for first place and if not, get second; if not second then third and so down to fifth.

That was my programme at the start of the season and it remains the same today. We have a difficult programme but no more demanding than the others face; there are no easy games left and, with our record of failure against the bottom sides, maybe we are better playing Middlesbrough, Wolves and Barnsley in our remaining games after today.

Since last we were at home we have lost the services of our skipper, Brian Gayle, for the rest of the season. Brian is more than a skipper. He is leader on the field and his influence is enormous. I always knew that, with his knee problem, Brian would have his worries but to play almost 40 matches for us is more than I ever expected. No one on the inside of the club doubts his contribution.

Mitch Ward has also been told he cannot play again this season. Mitch picked up a bad injury at Notts County but it was planned that he would be back for the final two or three games and hopefully the playoffs. But medical advice says he must not play again.

So we go into the final drama with Gayle, Ward and John Reed all long term casualties. In addition, of course, we have David Tuttle and Carl Veart

suspended today.


I did not question Tuttle's Under the guidelines the referee did his duty. But if there was real consistency then Guy Butters should have gone at Fratton Park, a week ago and that might completely. Consistency is all we ask for but we don't always get it.

Finally, although our three sided ground does not, at the moment, lend itself to the right, big match atmosphere utmost to support the team in its last three matches. Typically Kevin revealed that he felt he had something to prove to himself, and everyone, after "last season's disappointing form when I quite deservedly lost my place to Carl Bradshaw."

Clearly delighted to have won, Kevin this week picked up a similar honour from the Senior Blades in the Executive Suite.

Accepting his awards with dignity and modesty Kevin didn't tell us that he has been similarly honoured before – he was Aston Villa's Player of the Year in a season in which he played mainly in midfield.

UNITED NOT RECOGNISED

The Blades were somewhat surprisingly unrepresented when the awards were made last week to the games outstanding players at the PFA Award Ceremony.

Whilst Alan Shearer was perhaps a logical choice for Player of the Year, the selections for the Endsleigh League Division One team might raise a few eyebrows.

None of United's Internationals were selected, leaving the likes of Alan Kelly and Nathan Blake in the cold, whilst Middlesbrough had three representatives in the team, including the recently acquired Jan Aage Fjørtoft.

MICK HEATON

"One of the most honest men I've known in football, on and off the field" was ex-United player David Bradford's assessment of our former full-back MICK HEATON who was tragically killed in a traffic accident earlier this week. He was 48.



Mick was a bustling, ebullient character who didn't make a regular here (31 league starts in four years), but moved to Blackburn for £7,000 in October 1971 and became a fixture in their team. He played almost 170 times until forced to retire in 1975 and was captain of Rovers' Division Three Championship team.

After starting a Sports Shop, he returned to football and eventually became Rovers First Team Coach under Howard Kendall, a partnership successfully continued at Everton, and then later with less success at Manchester City.

With spells as Manager at Workington, Scout for Newcastle and work on Blackburn's Community Scheme he was lively, busy and popular. We mourn his loss and sympathise with his wife, family and friends.

HELLO - AND GOODBYE

If DAVE TUTTLE'S return to the side against Reading was, as Dave Bassett put it, "like signing a new player" his dismissal at Sunderland has been a cruel blow to United when they need him most.

Brian Gayle had another operation to clean out his knee a week ago and, although he is back at the Lane hobbling about, he will clearly not be

fit to play this season.

The return of "Tutts" was therefore perfectly timed but his suspension for his sending-off at Roker Park rules him out of today's crunch fixture and forces another re-think about our defensive structure.

Fortunately, the trip on Craig Russell has brought only a one match ban and the ex-Spurs defender is therefore available for the big game at

Middlesbrough on Monday.

He enjoyed rave reviews for his resilience and quality in his comeback games against Reading, Sunderland and Portsmouth but the single goal conceded in each of the encounters has resulted in only one point being gained — a clear sign that the problems are more at the other end of the pitch rather than in the regularly re-organised defensive area.

Whilst Carl Veart also forced to sit today out because of his suspension



through the totting up process, Nathan Blake and Paul Rogers return – and Dane Whitehouse, carried off at Sunderland, may be ready to resume if his knee has totally recovered from heavy bruising.

• Mitch Ward will soon be starting to get down to some light work after resting his punctured lung. The pain has largely settled down and he has been to the Lane to see the lads. John Reed is about, too, but still on crutches that support the knee that sustained cruciate ligament damage against Charlton.

BLADES CHASE £10,000 PRIZE

Few would disagree that goals, sending-offs and bookings cause most excitement and controversy amongst players and fans.

All three factors contribute to the FA initiative which is aimed at rewarding attractive play and discouraging misconduct on the field – with a £10,000 cheque awaiting each Divisional winner.

Teams score two points for every home goal, four for every one away, but points are deducted for players either cautioned (one point) or dismissed (two points). The Fair Play awards cover Endsleigh League fixtures only to ensure an equal number of games.

Currently United trail Wolves by three points but the situation can change dramatically because of the points system - the 'minus' points are deducted

from those achieved by goal-scoring.

A glance at the top positions clearly shows where the Blades strengths – and weaknesses – lie. A glut of goals between now and the end of the season, allied to some sensible behaviour, could reap a double reward of promotion and the £10,000 bonus.

■ LEAGUE FIRSTS



he modern play-offs were introduced by the Football League in the 1986-87 season. There had previously been a system of Test Matches to decide promotion and relegation in the Football League between 1892-93 and 1897-98. The Blades achieved their first promotion in the Football League through this system in 1892-93 when they beat Accrington Stanley 1-0.

Opinions of fans and experts alike about the merits or otherwise of the play off system-have been mixed but without doubt they have added extra drama and interest to the league season. Below I have described the play off dramas since 1987 to obtain a place in the Premier Division/old Division One.

For the first two seasons following their introduction the play-offs for a place in the old First Division (now the Premier League) involved the team finishing fourth from bottom of Division One and the teams finishing third, fourth and fifth in the old Division Two.

In 1986-87, the two legged play off final was between Charlton Athletic from Division One and Leeds United from Division Two. Charlton won the first leg 1-0 with a

late Jim Melrose goal but Leeds then won 1-0 at Elland Road with a Brendan Ormsby goal to set up a third game held at Birmingham City's St. Andrews ground. After 90 minutes the score was 0-0 and in the 10th minute of extra time John Sheridan gave Leeds the lead, only for Charlton defender Peter Shirtliff to score twice in the last seven minutes to preserve Charlton's First Division status.

In the following season, the finalists were Chelsea from Division One and Middlesbrough from Division Two. Middlesbrough won the first leg at home 2-0 with goals from Trevor Senior and Bernie Slaven. In the return leg at Stamford Bridge in front of a crowd of over 40,000 an early Gordon Durie goal put the Londoners right back in contention. However, there were no further goals and Middlesbrough were promoted and Chelsea were relegated.

For the 1988-89 season the format changed with no team from Division One being involved. The play-offs were now to settle only the final promotion place from Division Two and involved the teams finishing third, fourth, fifth and sixth. The final remained a two legged affair with Crystal Palace and Blackburn Rovers in opposition. An exciting match at Ewood Park saw Rovers lead 2-0 at halftime with two goals from Howard Gayle. With four minutes to go Eddie McGoldrick pulled one back for Palace only for Rovers' striker Simon Garner to score in the last minute to restore the Lancashire team's two goals advantage.

Although facing an uphill battle the Londoners were level on aggregate two minutes into the second half thanks to an Ian Wright goal and a Dave Madden penalty. No more goals were scored in normal time and it was left to Palace's ace marksman Ian Wright to clinch promotion for his side three minutes from the end of extra time with his second goal to leave the aggregate score 4-3.

A season later, 1989-90 and another important change was introduced, a Wembley final and an end to the two legged final system. The first Wembley finalists were Swindon Town and Sunderland. A goal from midfielder, Alan McLoughlin, gave the Wiltshire team a 1-0 victory and promotion to Division One for the first time in their history. However, following an investigation into the club's financial irregularities by the F.A., Football League and Inland Revenue, Swindon were demoted and losing finalists Sunderland were promoted in their place.

Notts County and Brighton contested the 1990-91 final with County emerging as 3-1 winners to clinch promotion. Their goals came from Tommy Johnson two and Dave Regis with Dean Wilkins netting a consolation for Brighton. This was county's second consecutive promotion through the play off system having beaten Tranmere the season before for a place in Division Two.

A year later and the Jack Walker/Kenny Dalglish combination at Blackburn Rovers resulted in the Lancashire team returning to Division One for the first time since 1966. They beat Leicester City 1-0 in the final with a controversial penalty from Mike Newell after David Speedie had been fouled.

In May 1993, Leicester City returned to Wembley trying to avenge their defeat a year earlier. Their opponents were Glenn Hoddle's Swindon Town who had now recovered from the trauma of 1990. The resulting final was arguably the best game that the play offs has ever produced. Eight minutes after half time Swindon were 3-0 ahead and seemingly coasting to the Premier League. Their inspirational playermanger Hoddle had scored their first with further goals from a Craig Maskell and Shaun Taylor. Sixteen minutes later City were level after an incredible fightback with goals from Joachim, Walsh and Thompson. Swindon finally clinched a 4-3 win and promotion with a penalty winner from Paul Bodin six minutes from time.

At the end of the 1993-94 season, Leicester City made it to the final for the third consecutive season where their opponents were big spending Derby County. Although County took the lead with a Tommy Johnson goal, two goals from Steve Walsh clinched victory and promotion for City.

The Blades have experienced the play offs once in 1987-88. They finished third from bottom of Division Two and in the semi finals played Bristol City who finished fifth in Division Three. The Blades lost 1-0 at Ashton Gate after City's Alan Walsh had scored a 38th minute winner. In the return leg at the Lane, an early Carl' Shutt goal severely dented the Blades' hopes of avoiding relegation. Colin Morris did level the second leg scores but the Blades could not manage a second goal and were relegated.

In the current race for top five positions in the Endsleigh League Division One only Reading and Barnsley have never previously qualified for the play offs in any division. Below is a summary of the top eights' previous play off appearances:

MIDDLESBROUGH:

Twice for places in Division One 1987-88 and 1990-91.

BOLTON:

Three times for places in Division Three 1986-87 and places in Division Two 1989-90 and 1990-91.

WOLVES:

Once for a place in Division Three 1986-87.

TRANMERE ROVERS:

Four times, twice for a place in Division Two 1989-90 and 1990-91 and twice for a place in the Premier League 1992-93 and 1993-94.

READING:

No appearances

BARNSLEY:

No appearances

UNITED:

Once for a place in Division Two 1987-88.

DERBY COUNTY:

Twice for a place in Division One/Premier League in 1991-92 and 1993-94.







windon come to Bramall Lane facing the very real prospect of suffering relegation for the second season in succession. The Robins dropped out of the Premiership, with the Blades, last May and had been hoping to make a quick return to the top.

But, after getting off to a good start this term, they went into a run of 14 league games without a win and that plunged them into a situation from which they have been having great

difficulty in escaping.

It was during this run that the club decided to dispense with the services of manager John Gorman. Steve McMahon, the former England midfielder, was signed from Manchester City to take over as player-manager at the end of November.

Yet, in spite of some new signings, results have not shown a marked improvement and a recent run of four consecutive defeats left Swindon struggling well behind the safety line.

Though they took some heart from last Saturday's 3-1 home win over Oldham, it was unfortunate for them that the two clubs immediately above them – Sunderland and Portsmouth – also collected three points and that left Swindon five points short of fifthfrom-bottom Sunderland, the club they must catch if they are to escape the drop.

Mr. McMahon signed striker Peter Thorne from Blackburn for £200,000 in January and he made a splendid start, scoring eight times in his first 11 full games for the club. That included a hat-trick in their 5-2 win at West

Bromwich.

With Thorn scoring so well, it was decided to sell top scorer Jan Aage Fjortoft to Middlesbrough for £1.3 million shortly before last month's transfer deadline. The Norwegian international had scored 26 times.


Sadly, Thorne has not been the same without Fjortoft alongside him and he has not since added to his goals tally.

Ty Gooden, who had earlier been playing in midfield, has been partnering Thorne in the Swindon attack.

Some of the Fjortoft fee was used to re-invest in left-back Jason Drysdale, signed from Newcastle for £340,000.

The left-back position has posed something of a problem since Paul Bodin was injured. Ed Murray played here for a while, then Kevin Horlock was switched from midfield. Last week, with Drysdale not available, Mark Robinson played here.

In spite of Swindon's struggles, Horlock's form has not suffered and he was included in the N. Ireland squad that met the Republic of Ireland in last month's European Championship qualifier in Dublin. Kevin was among the substitutes and has not yet won his first cap.

Horlock had earlier looked settled in one of the two central midfield positions, the other being occupied for much of the season by Joey Beauchamp.

Martin Ling and player-manager McMahon played on the flanks in midfield last week. Luc Nijholt, who normally plays in midfield, was used at right-back against Oldham with Adrian Viveash and Shaun Taylor filling the centre-back places.

The versatile Wayne O'Sullivan has played both in defence and midfield as Mr. McMahon has been ringing the changes in a bid to find a winning

team.

Nicky Hammond and Fraser Digby remain in fierce competition for the goalkeeper's jersey, Digby having been in favour these past few weeks.

Swindon have won three away games in the league – at Notts. County (1-0), Burnley (2-1) and WBA (5.2). They drew at Port Vale (2-2), Stoke (0-0), Oldham (1-1) and Grimsby (1-1) but were beaten at Tranmere (2-3), Charlton (0-1), Barnsley (1-2), Portsmouth (3-4), Middlesbrough (1-3), Bolton (0-3), Bristol City (2-3), Southend (0-2), Luton (0-3), Millwall (1-3), Watford (0-2), Derby (1-3) and Reading (0-3).

Whilst they have been struggling in the league, Swindon made a bold bid for a place in the Coca-Cola Cup Final at Wembley. After leading Bolton by 2-1 from their home leg in the semi-final, Swindon battled well in the return game but were ultimately beaten on aggregate by a goal two minutes from

the end.

MANAGERSHIP

Steve McMahon, who took over as Swindon's player-manager in November, found himself deeply involved with a double challenge – earlier this month he was hoping to guide his team through to a Wembley Cup Final whilst today he continues the task of trying to preserve Swindon's First Division status.

Sadly, Swindon lost their Coca-Cola Cup semi-final against Bolton but at least the manager is now free to concentrate upon the club's battle for First Division survival.

Mr. McMahon's distinguished playing career embraced both Merseyside clubs and a run of 17 games in the England team.

He joined Everton whilst still at school, turning professional in 1979. Soon after making his senior debut the following year, he was in the England under-21 side,

winning six caps at that level.

Aston Villa signed him for £300,000 in 1983 and he remained with them for just over two years before returning to Mcrseyside with Liverpool. Whilst at Anfield he won three League Championship medals, played in two FA Cup Finals and one League Cup Final and collected all of his full England caps.

He moved on to Manchester City for £895,000 in December 1991, remaining with them until taking up his present post.

Throughout his career, Mr. McMahon has been associated with attack-minded teams so he has naturally encouraged his Swindon men to continue with the pleasing style of play.

Then there's that famous line from Confucius: "When the owls meet the forest their net will bulge seven times." Personally I haven't a clue what that could mean!









BLADES MEN'



Nathan Blake

Nathan joined United from Cardiff City in February last year after his goal for Cardiff against Manchester City in the F.A. Cup had made a lot of Premiership clubs suddenly take an interest. He had scored seventeen goals that season before he joined United and Cardiff obviously believed he would do the same because they managed to get a clause inserted in the transfer agreement that United would pay an extra £200,000 if they remained in the top flight. At the time of his transfer the possibility of United staying up did not look too good but Nathan helped then so nearly make it. Cardiff must have been cursing when they realised they were only a minute away from their additional fee.

Nathan took no time at all to decide upon the move to United: "I was in bed on the Wednesday when I got a call from United offering me a move, and on the following day I travelled to Sheffield and signed. It was just the sort of move I'd been looking for because I was only on a weekly contract, and with my goal scoring record I fancied my chances in the Premiership."

At United everyone thinks of Nathan as a striker, and it's hardly surprising with his record. This season he's managed 15 in 30 league games (including 7 as substitute) last season he got 5 in 12 games (5 as substitute), for United plus 17 for Cardiff, and the season before that he was Cardiff's top scorer with 13. It's surprising, therefore to find that it was United who turned Nathan into a forward.

"Before coming here I'd either played in midfield or defence. I suppose with my scoring record United must have fancied me up front. When I made my league debut for Cardiff at Bristol Rovers in 1990 I was left back. We were winning 1 = 0 with ten minutes left then we let in two goals and lost. I made twelve appearances in all that season, mainly in left midfield but sometimes on the right. It was only as an emergency that I was pushed up front."

Nathan was born in Cardiff and raised in nearby Newport: "Newport were my first club, I went there as a schoolboy, but that didn't last as the club folded. I went to Chelsea on a two year Y.T.S. scheme but left after a year. I had a few problems and went back to Cardiff to finish my apprenticeship there. I started off there as a centre half

before moving to the back"

From Cardiff he jumped into the Premiership with United and found that, at first, he was only played as a substitute. "Dave Bassett was great after my move, he explained that he didn't want me to be under too much pressure. United were in a pretty desperate position and he felt that everybody would be looking to me to get them out of trouble, so I was on the bench for the games against Ipswich, Spurs and Leeds. I scored when I came on at Spurs, and then made my full debut at home to Queen's Park Rangers. I scored in that one as well. It was a pressure position that I was in and, strangely enough, I really enjoyed it. I found that I had more time to play the ball at that level and I know that helped me."


The time he joined United was a memorable time for him. Nathan had previously won Wales Under 21 honours, and after scoring at Tottenham for United he made his full debut for Wales the

following Wednesday.

This season Nathan got off to a rather quiet start for United before that stunning spell after Christmas when he scored nine in four games, including a brace in four consecutive games.

Last Saturday he was forced to sit out the game against Portsmouth due to suspension. Let's hope that it's made him hungry for goals upon his expected return this

afternoon.

A COUNTY CUP TEAM

by Denis Clarebrough

My heartiest congratulations to any of our supporters who can identify all the victorious United eleven seen in our illustration. The occasion was the County Cup Final in May 1960.

I regret the passing of the County Cup competition and even more, the fact that the Sheffield & Hallamshire Football Association no longer play an annual fixture against the Glasgow Football Association. No harm would come if we had at least one reminder each year that we do have a local Football Association.

United won that 1959-1960 County Cup competition by defeating Rotherham United by two goals to one at Bramall Lane. The season was the first with John Harris as manager; United finishing fourth in the Second Division and for the second season in succession, reaching the sixth round of the F A Cup. It took another twelve months to achieve promotion and another cup run that ended at the semi-final stage.

The strength of the team lay in the defence: Alan Hodgkinson in goal and Graham Shaw at left back were English internationals and Joe Shaw at centre half had played for the Football League and was worthy of full international status. Cec Coldwell was strong and reliable at right back; Brian Richardison and Gerry Summers offered contrasting styles at wing half.

Joe Shaw is the only member of that famous defence missing from the team in our illustration; on that occasion, his place was taken by Denis Finnigan who died in December of last year.

It was always said that John Harris when writing out his team selection for the next first team game automatically began:-

Hodgkinson: Coldwell, Shaw G.: Richardson, Shaw J., Summers:. The six players were fortunate in that they had few long term injuries and their record of appearances together which began in September 1957 and lasted until 1964 may constitute a record for the Football League.

Harris had more difficulty in finding a satisfactory forward line. The forward line against Rotherham for that County Cup match was:-

Lewis, Nibloe, Pace, Hamilton and Simpson.

The photograph shows the team after the match in the old John Street dressing room. It looks as if outside left, Ron Simpson was intending to be first in the bath but fortunately, his shirt was long enough to cover his embarrassment, while Derek Pace stands, hands on hips to the right. Pace, like Finnigan, is another of our old players that the passage of time has taken from our midst and there are four in all in that photograph who have died, for 'Joe' Nibloe was killed in a car accident in 1964 and Willie Hamilton died in Canada in 1976.

John Nibloe was the son of a former Wednesday and Scotland international full back and looked to have quite a promising future in the game but he lacked speed and Harris sold him to Stoke City while Hamilton, brilliant but unreliable, was transferred early in 1961 to Middlesbrough.

The final member of that forward line against Rotherham and soon to be sold by Harris was the outside right, Kevin Lewis who is seen standing at the back with Finnigan and Nibloe. Lewis had everything that you could want in a winger; two footed, fast and strong, a hard shot, a good header and the ability to be on hand when the ball came in from the left wing. His record of 62 League goals for United and Liverpool in 133 appearances shows the quality of his finishing but his career was a short one.

Harris strengthened that forward line; Billy Russell returned to the team after breaking his leg and Harris signed Keith Kettleborough to replace Hamilton. The industry and determination of Pace, Kettleborough and Bill Hodgson, the speed of Russell and Simpson and the skills of Len Allchurch took United back to the old Division One.




CEC COLDWELL WITH THE COUNTY CUP, MAY 1960.


Wood's 41st minute goal, taken at the near post from a corner, was scarcely deserved and Darlington levelled on the hour.
