

season on an optimistic note after a very encouraging start to our League programme. The performance at Hull City last Saturday produced a magnificent result, it was a great second half performance and we have got everything to play for now against York City.

The three points of course was the ultimate goal but one of the main things I was looking for was a clean-sheet. Throughout the preseason this was a priority. I wanted a clean-sheet - we didn't get it - so I was delighted that we achieved this when it really counted, in our opening Second Division fixture.

At Hull there were things I was looking for. A clean-sheet and Wayne Allison to score his first goal. As it happened I got one of them and Steve Finney to score his first goal. So I was quite happy with that.

Steve did very well and he was quite brilliant at Cambridge in midweek too. He has good vision, could have scored the first goal, hit the post with a great effort later on and looked a quality player. The lad has got a chance and that is why we signed him.

Playing twice a week so early in the season is difficult because we are still trying to find our feet a bit plus the fact this current heat wave does not help. It is humid, it is sticky, and hot.

I have got to be careful what I say about referees and linesman. It has got to the stage where I am sick and tired talking about them, I really am. But at Cambridge we did suffer badly. It just seems to me that the referee should give me a yellow card before I go out on the pitch. It is just getting so frustrating. I had not done anything yet the yellow

card just came straight out of the pocket before he even thought about it. They have got to judge tackles on their merit not on who it is and what reputation you have. I hardly touched the lad and yet I am shown the yellow card, what two minutes into the game. I couldn't believe it!

There was worse to follow. We lost the game at Cambridge because of a ridiculous penalty decision. Young "Mildy" was outside the area when he made contact with the Cambridge player for a start. There was no intent involved, it was not a malicious contact just a clash between opponents going for the same ball. The poor kid was almost in tears in the dressing room after the game but he has nothing to reproach himself about. He was fantastic and should be proud of himself. He can hold his head up high.

We are disappointed about the defeat but there is still a hell of a lot to play for. If we perform as well as we did at Cambridge with a bit more quality in front of goal then it shouldn't be a problem. If I have to be critical it would be on our quality in the last third of the field.


First though we have to take on York City today and naturally we will be going all out to start our home programme with a convincing win.

For this our first home Endsleigh League game of the new campaign we are pleased to welcome to The County Ground the players, officials and supporters of York City Football Club for this afternoon's fixture.

Coca-Cola Cup

Next Wednesday evening we again meet up with Cambridge United for our Coca-Cola Cup 1st round second leg tie here at The County kicking off at 7.45pm. Season Ticket holders - please present Cup Voucher 'A' at the turnstiles as this season the first round of the Coca-Cola Cup is included in your Season Ticket price. Non Season Ticket holders are well advised to book in advance of the day of the game to save unnecessary queuing on the night.

Unlucky Number

New regulations in force this season mean that all teams in the Endsleigh League will have their kit numbered 1 to 14 including the bedreaded 13. In the past the unlucky number has been avoided like the plague but we are no longer able to do this. Therefore our three substitutes will wear numbers 12, 13 & 14 with fourteen being the goalkeeper sub if nominated-if not it will go to an out-field sub. This year for first time all three substitutes can be used and you do not have to include a goalkeeper as one of them. Another rule change means that goalkeepers can wear different shorts and socks from the rest of the team. Let's see what colours some of them come up with now!

More Changes

It is important to note that the promotion and relegation format in the Endsleigh League for the 1995/96 campaign is different from that of last season. Division 2 this year has three up (two automatically and one from the Play-Offs) and four down while in Division 1 there are three up and three down-which means we would not have been relegated last season! Two clubs are automatically promoted from Division 1 to the Premiership along with one from the Play-Offs.

Bring on the Stretcher

A familiar sight of the World Cup Finals in the USA last year has now spread throughout football with a new FIFA mandatory instruction being re-enforced. When players are injured during the game Club Physio Jonathan Trigg can now only enter the field of play once referee has given him express permission to verify injury-but not to treat it. York City visitors By John Nolan

York City just, missed out on the Play-Offs last season after an encouraging campaign took them to within striking distance of success following a sluggish start.

By the end of August last year City were in the bottom eight with just one point to show for their troubles. A month later they were three wins better off and beginning to roll. October produced just five more points. November nine, as they slowly clawed their way up the table and to within three points of sixth placed Crewe.

A Barnes hat-trick sparked a 4-0 win over Blackpool - their best performance in December, but by the turn of the year York had lost ground again. However, the New Year was very productive and by the end of January they were 12th with 38 points.

After 30 Second Division games the Yorkshireman had collected 47 points and were just seven points adrift of a place in the Play-Off positions. By the end of March the deficit was down to just four points!

Then a 3-0 defeat at Brentford stopped the momentum: a 1-1 draw at Wrexham cost further points and York began to falter.

With just one new signing, Paul Stephenson, a forward who plays wide on the flank from Brentford, this close scason, and two departures - midfielder Jon McCarthy joining Port Vale and defender Paul Wilson moving on to Scunthorpe United - York take up the Challenge of 1995-96 with basically the same squad as last season.

The pre-season build-up was certainly encouraging. York were unbeaten in Ireland where they drew 1-1 with Shelbourne, beat St. Patricks Athletic 3-2, and shared six goals with UCD. A 6-0 thrashing of Whitby Town continued the preparations while a 2-2 draw against Huddersfield Town was impressive enough. Victories were then conceded over Clydebank (2-0), and Scarborough (1-0), leading up to last Saturday's opening 2-2 draw at home to Brentford.

The regular line-up sees Dean Kiely between the posts behind a back four of Andy McMillan, Tony Barras, Steve Tutill and Wayne Hall. The midfield is comprised of Graeme Murty on the right: Scott Jordon and Nigel Pepper in the middle, and Paul Stephenson. Paul Barnes and Paul Baker from the attack.



York City

- CENTRAL DEFENDER. Has been with York since the summer of 1991 when he arrived from Bury. Was an outstanding teenager and as a pupil at The GMFA School of Excellence at Lilleshall was groomed as International potential. Played for England Schoolboys at Under 15, 16 and 17 and is an England Youth International. Notts County gave him his start in professional football but in March 1989 Paul transferred to Bury where he made 21 League appearances. A solid performer he has captained the side on a number of occasions. Started this season with 103 (12) League appearances for York - 3 goals. Born: Nottingham 3-9-69.



Paul Barnes

- STRIKER, York invested £50,000 in Paul when they signed him from Stoke City in the summer of 1992. It made him the club's joint record signing! Top scorer in each of his three seasons at Bootham Crescent - he was "Clubman of the Year" in 1994 - Paul has netted four hattricks in the Football League and came into this season with a record for York of 61 goals in 124 League appearances. Scored 14 goals in 53 League outings with his first club, Notts County, who got £30,000 from Stoke, and had a loan game for Chesterfield. Born: Leicester 16-11-67.

Tonv Barras

- CENTRAL DEFENDER. This is his second season with City having joined them from Stockport County for 25,000 in 1994. Started his career with Hartlepool United, making 12 League appearances, before joining Stockport. Played in 118 senior games for County and made 37 League and Cup appearances for York - 1 goal. Born: Stockton-on-Tees 29-3-71.

MIDFIELD. Is hoping for better things this season for after establishing himself in the side in the second-half of the 1993-94 season he missed most of last season because of a serious injury. Hard working midfielder with plenty of skill he is a graduate of the YTS and after joining the club in 1989 made the first of his 82 League appearances in February 1991. Born: Manchester 28-12-72.

Neil Campbell

· FORWARD. Offered his first professional contract this summer after graduating through YTS. Was top-shot for the Intermediates last season during which he also made a number of appearances in the Reserve team. Born: Middlesbrough 26-1-77


Jason Cutler

- DEFENDER. Another youngster awarded his first professional contract this summer following success as a YTS lad and looking to make his senior debut. Born: Stockton-on-Tees 8-9-76.

Wavne Hall

- DEFENDER, Arrived at Bootham Crescent from Hatfield Mair as a promising left-winger in season 1988-89. Was given a professional contract in the summer of 1989 and made his League debut that August but is wasn't until he was converted to a fullback role in 1990 that he really established himself as a first

team regular. Has virtually been an ever-present since then and is set to make his 243rd League appearance today. Born: Rotherham 25-10-68.



Scott Jordan

- MIDFIELD. Another YTS graduate he hs been with York since 1991. Turned professional in October 1992, making his League debut that same month, when he was introduced as a substitute. Established himself in the senior side last season and though still only 20 is already a composed and mature competitor. Finished the 1994-95 campaign with 38 League appearances (3 goals) to his name. Born: Newcastle 19-7-75

Dean Kiely GOALKEEPER, Former England Schoolboy International he was on West Bromwich Albion's books as a youngster but left them to join Coventry City where he came under the influence of Steve Ogrizovic. Had loan spells with Ipswich (did not play) and York - towards the end of the 1989-90 campaign before signing for the "Minstermen." Dean got his big chance in January 1991 and a year later was installed as the first choice custodian. Has been an ever-present for two seasons and opened the 1995-96 campaign with his 176th League appearance. Born: Manchester 10-10-70.

Andy McMillan

 DEFENDER, A right-sided fullback Andy is now in his ninth season with the club whom he joined as a trialist in 1987. December 1987 saw him make his League bow in a 2-2 draw with Mansfield Town and a month later he was given a professional contract. Has worn the number two shirt for five season's and had clocked up 271 League games by the close of the 1994-95 campaign. Born: South Africa 22-6-68.

Graeme Murty

- MIDFIELD, Arrived at Bootham Crescent as a YTS hopeful in 1989 and after impressing at Youth and Reserve levels signed Professional forms in March 1993. A month later he made his full League debut. Enjoyed his best spell in the second-half of last season when he showed great promise and flexibility operating on both sides of midfield. Born: Saltburn 13-11-74.

Glenn Navior

FORWARD, A local recruit who has passed through the YTS ranks and has now been a professional for five years. Made his first League start in season 1990-91 but has still yet to establish himself as a first-team regular though his 11 goals in 33 outings last season provide statistics worthy of the best. Commenced the 1995-96 season with a record of 23 goals in 58 (27). League appearances. Born: York 11-8-72

Wavne Osborne

- DEFENDER. Another newly signed professional after completing his VTS apprenticeship this summer. Has yet to make his senior bow. Born: Stockton-on-Tees 14-1-77.

Scott Oxlev

- MIDFIELD. Another of York City's

promising youngsters who has just turned pro and is looking for first team opportunities this season. Born: Sheffield 2-11-77.

Niael Penner

- MIDFIELD. Tough tackling ballwinner who has been with York for five years. Signed for Rotherham United in 1990 he joined his hometown club from school and made over 50 first team appearances for them. Has subsequently clocked up 170 League games for York City prior to this season. Born: Rotherham 25-4-68.

Vicky Peverall FORWARD, Arrived at Bootham Crescent as a trialist in January 1995 and impressed so much in the Reserves that he was given nine outings in the League side last season. Scored one goal and won himself a full contract. Nicky had served his apprenticeship with his hometown club Middlesbrough where he gained a reputation as a prolific scorer in Reserve team football before furthering his career with Hartlepool United. Went off to play in Hong Kong for a spell. Born: Middlesbrough 28-4-73.

MIDFIELD. Tall strong player recruited from non-League Whitby Town in March 1995. Made just one League appearance, as a substitute, but this 20-year-old is expected to challenge for a senior berth this season. Had trials with a number of clubs, including Blackburn Rovers, before signing for York. Born: 14-5-75.

Paul Stephenson
- FORWARD. York's latest recruit,

signed for Brentford in August 1995 for a nominal fee. Paul served his apprenticeship with Newcastle United, making his League debut in a 2-1 win over Southampton in

December 1985. Went on to play 61 times in the League for the Geordies (just one goal) before making his scoring debut for Millwall at Liverpool in November 1988. Bought as a line-hugging winger he made just over 100 appearances for the Lions before moving on to Gillingham. A good crosser of the ball. Born: Wallsend 2-1-68.

Steve Tutill

- CENTRAL DEFENDER. Almost part of the furniture, Steve, who started this season on 302 League appearances for the 'Minstermen' is the longest serving player on the club's books. A former England Schoolboy International he joined York's Youth ranks in 1986 and graduated to his League debut in September 1987. Four months later he was given a pro contract and developed into a commanding figure at the heart of the defence winning the "Clubman of the Year" title in 1991. In October 1993 he was appointed Captain. Born: 1-10-69.

Warrington


ALKEEPER. Joined as a trainee in 1992 he has been the regular understudy goalkeeper since March 1994. So far the consistency and durability of Dean Kiely has denied Andy a first team chance but the 19-year-old, who signed professional forms in 1994. is ready and willing should an opportunity occur.

Born: Sheffield 10-6-76.

Darren Williams

- MIDFIELD. Still only 18 yet Darren made a substitute League appearance in December 1994. That is his only venture in the big time so far but he has impressed with his consistency at Youth and Reserve level and will be knocking on the first team door before long. Born: Middlesbrough 28-4-77.

Alan Little was appointed manager in March 1993 following the departure of John Ward to Bristol Rovers. Alan had been at Bootham Crescent since October 1988 serving as assistant manager and coach under Ward and his predecessor John Bird.

A Geordie, he was born in Newcastle-upon Tyne- 5-5-55 and served his apprenticeship as a player with Aston Villa, whom he joined in 1972. Opportunities were few and far between at Villa Park and Alan made just three League appearances in 1974-75 before moving out to join Southend United.

From midfield he scored 12 goals in 104 League games for the Shrimpers before continuing his career with Burnley in 1977. 14 goals in 91 League outings was his contribution before a transfer to Doncaster Rovers in 1979. Another 85 games (11 goals) were chalked up before signing for Torquay United in 1982.

Spells with Halifax Town and Hartlepool United boosted Alan's League career to over 400 appearances before he was forced to retire through injury.


Two months after taking over the managerial reigns at York he headed the team out at Wembley and to promotion Play-Off success.

Under the Spotlight

Thirteen goals in 25

Having joined York City from Gillingham in October 1994 he finished the campaign as York City's second top scorer with 14 League and Cup goals, and besides leading the attack this season the 32 year old forward is also the first team coach.

A native of the North East Paul was first spotted in Bishop Auckland's colours by Southampton and he signed for the Saints in



June 1984. This was the time when Joe Jordan led the line with Danny Wallace. Steve Morgan and Alan Curtis the stars at the Dell. There was little chance of breaking into the side and Paul moved on to Carlisle the following year. He scored a dozen for the Cumbrians in 81 senior appearances.

In July 1987 a transfer to
Hartlepool United proved a good
break. In five seasons at the
Victoria Ground, Paul participated
in 241 League and Cup games
registering 80 goals. Such was
his form that he attracted the
attention of Motherwell who paid
£77,500 for his services in the
summer of 1992.

Paul did not settle in Scotland and after 10 games - one goal - he signed for Gillingham, who paid £50,000, in January 1993. Fifteen goals in 59 appearances was his return with the Gills.

A week into the new season and already the tensions are there with three promotion places beckoning the successful, the two top clubs being promoted automatically along with the winner of the Play-Offs.

It is four down to Division Three however so once again we can anticipate there will be no easy games in this division with competition for promotion and relegation issues raging right through to May. It promises to be some season.

If summer transfer dealings are any indication of commitment and determination to be successful then Bradford City will need watching. The Yorkshire club have signed on four new faces with John Ford recruited from Swansea City, Nicky Mohan, the former Middlesbrough centre half, signed from Leicester City along with lan Ormondroyd the beanstalk striker who was formerly on Aston Villa's pay-roll and Gavin Wand.

Bradford, who kicked off the season with a home game against AFC Bournemouth, are down on the South Coast this afternoon to play Liam Brady's Brighton & Hove Albion.

AFC Bournemouth too should deserve respect. They were nosediving to Division Three when Mel Machin took control and masterminded a remarkable salvage operation. Machin, the former Manchester City manager, is one of the best coaches in the business and the only question mark is whether his youthful squad have the capacity to respond to the challenge over an entire season. Their pre-season form was impressive with a win over West Ham United and an encouraging performance against Norwich City; and in midfielder Scott Mean - the 21 year-old has already been dubbed a £1 million "wonderkid" and former Hammers' hit-man Steve Jones, they certainly have quality.

The Cherries are home to Peterborough United today, another side who finished last season with a flourish that they hope will carry over into this new campaign. The Posh had a goalkeeping problem last term which was solved when they took six-foot five lan Feuer on loan from West Ham. Peterborough wanted to make his transfer a permanent one but the American from Los Angeles saw his future in the Premiership. The void had now been filled by Jon Sheffield, the former Norwich City man being signed from Cambridge United.

Other new recruits in the 'Posh' ranks are striker Lee Power, also once of Carrow Road, who has joined the London Road staff from Bradford City. Power was once hailed as a dazzling new star after blasting a blistering goal for the Canaries on his debut at QPR, but he has struggled to live up to the initial reputation; and Darren Carter from Leyton Orient.

Big David Webb's Brentford are top contenders for promotion having just missed out last May. The Londoners, who opened their season at York, entertain Oxford United this afternoon.

Carlisle United too have great ambitions under the Chairmanship of Michael Knighton. Remember him? Six years ago he tried to buy Manchester United. Now he is the man who has turned Carlisle from a club going nowhere to a successfull outfit with the Premiership their target. Just one close-season signing for them, Warren Aspinall from AFC Bournemouth. They play at Chesterfield today.

Notts County look set to stem the disappointment of the last few years. When they lost midfielder

Mark Draper to Leicester City last year they seemed to lose direction as well even though they made it to Wembley as Finalists in the Anglo Italian Cup for the second successive year. Success over Ascoli was no consolation for relegation however.

With no money to spend their aspirations for this season are invested in the same squad of players - the likes of Tony Agana, Devon White, Peter Butler and Gary Mills - with former Southend United boss Steve Thompson at the head and former Liverpool star Steve Nicol assisting as playercoach.

Notts County entertain Wycombe Wanderers today, who are now experiencing life without Martin O'Neill at the helm. Alan Smith is the new boss. The former Crystal Palace chief certainly impressed at Selhurst Park with his frankness and honesty and having made a fortune in property development he is not beholden to the game for his livelihood and thus is not intimidated by the prospect of failure.

Bristol Rovers will be looking for a positive home start over Swansea City as will Blackpool over the North Wales representatives Wrexham.

Rotherham United, who signed Mike Jeffrey from Newcastle United, play hosts to Hull City: Shrewsbury have home advantage over Walsall and Stockport County with Tom Bennett from Wolves now in their ranks, take on relegated Burnley.

Talks to Colin Benson

CB: Welcome to Swindon Mark it was obviously nice to celebrate your debut at Hull with a victory?

MS: Thanks. It was a good win. especially away from home.

CB: I expect it felt a bit strange playing in a new team?

MS: It is going to be different to playing with Bolton of course. The personnel are not the same for a start. But once I get used to things it will be a lot better. For me anyway. It has gone guite well as it is up to now and we are just getting to know each other.

It is the day to day things that are different mainly. The training is different to what we did at Bolton. The two clubs as such in general are much or less the same, it is just the little things.

I have settled in quite well really considering though I don't yet feel totally comfortable. I need a couple more games to get bedded right in. But the general atmosphere down here is so different. It is a different way of life.

Football is the God up in the North. Public here aren't stooped in that same tradition, they do not have

the same infatuation with the game. But I think the manager has brought a lot of that spirit with him. He wants it to be important. he wants the fans to make it important, he wants the players to feel it is important.

If we get beaten it is important. It is not a case of leaving it to next week to have another crack of the whip. Every game is crucial - you have to believe that. You have to go into every game with the same enthusiasm and determination.

I am sure the manager has brought that dedication with him. He wants to win everything including the cards on the coach! That's what you need in football. If you have eleven people tuned in on that wavelength you are on your way.

CB: Your previous manager Bruce Rioch was a very strict disciplinarian but has Mr McMahon also a tough reputation?

MB: Yes.I think you have to be like that as a manager: you have to be

strict because if you give people half-an-inch they take a mile. So in this respect Bruce was very strict and the manager here is the same.

CB: After your success with Bolton you now have to form an understanding with Shaun Taylor. How do you see this developing?

MS: Hopefully it will go well. I mean. Shaun is a great player isn't he, he is a hundred per cent player all the time, and that is all you can add really, and his performances have been spot on.

A closer look at Mark Seagraves

Bootle born. 22nd October. 1966. it was inevitable this schoolboy star would join Liverpool on leaving school at 16.

Capped by England at Youth level he was a centre-half of great skill and determination and seemed destined for a long and successful career at Anfield. after making his senior bow as an 18 year old against QPR in the Milk Cup.

Unfortunately Liverpool were well endowed with players of the calibre of Thompson. Kennedy. Hansen and Lawrenson at the time and Steve was loaned to Norwich City to gain League experience, making the first of his appearances against Oxford United.

In September 1987 he transferred to Manchester City where Mel Machin played him in 40 odd games as a right-back. A broken bone in his back cost him a year out of the game and his place in the team and when Howard Kendall took over at Maine Road he sold Mark to Bolton for £100.000 in September 1990.

Always a defender Mark made over 200 appearances for the Lancashire club helping them to promotion to the Premiership in 1995 and collecting a runners-up medal in the Coca-Cola Cup Final against Liverpool.

Joined Swindon in July 1995 for £100.000 and made his Town debut at Hull City 12-8-95.

I think we can really get a good understanding going and hopefully we will do. It went quite smoothly last Saturday with Ian Culverhouse playing behind us as a sweeper. That made our job a lot easier as defenders. Ian is certainly a class player.

CB: Mark you were with a very successful side last season. Promoted to the Premiership, and losing Coca-Cola Cup Finalists (you lucky lot), so people are obviously asking the question why did you move and move to the Second Division?

MS: A lot of things really. I did not see eye to eye with the manager at Bolton. My contract was up. They never really offered me what I wanted to stay, and Steve McMahon wanted me to come to Swindon and he persuaded me to join the club. I came and have not regretted a day since I moved.

CB: How did he persuade you?

MS: Obviously he wants success and is determined to achieve this. I think Swindon were unfortunate to be relegated last season and I took the view, maybe I am wrong, but I reasoned that it is better to be in a team that is pushing for promotion than in a team which is going to be languishing in the bottom half of the table as I think Bolton will in the Premiership.

I had a look at it and felt that Bolton are not going to hit the heights they reached last year but Swindon probably will do. So I would rather be in a situation where we are going for honours rather than the other way around.

CB: After your lucky victory over us in the semi-final of the Coca-Cola Cup you got a close-up of what Swindon was all about. Were you impressed?

MS: Yes. On what I saw they should never have dropped out of Division One. We played you four times last year and I think Swindon were the better side in three games of the four but we were just a bit more resolute to keep going as we showed in the second-leg of the semi-final when we pulled three goals back, was it, in twenty minutes.

Hopefully now we can add that sort of resolution and determination to Swindon's game. The manager is always going on about clean sheets and we never kept one in pre-season. Then all of a sudden it is the League and we achieve a shut-out straight away at Hull. It will be all right on the night sort of thing.

But it was brilliant, a great boost for our confidence, because as defenders we get the same thrill and satisfaction from keeping the opposition out as a forward gets from scoring. We were delighted.

CB: You learned you trade with Liverpool, the modern home of good quality and successful football, and no doubt got a sound grounding at Anfield?

MS: Yes. I joined them at 16 and made my debut at 18 against QPR in the semi-final of the Milk Cup. It was great and my best memory of my career up to now anyway. To get in a side like that, at that particular time, was a good achievement. We had players the likes of Hanson. Lawrenson and McMahon around.

I made my debut for Norwich against Oxford though and marked John Aldridge. I went there for a month and that is when I first met Ian Culverhouse.

CB: Of all the centre forwards you have come up against who has given you most trouble?

MS: Mark Hughes without a shadow of a doubt. He is as strong as an ox and a good footballer with it. You can't get the ball off him because he is so strong and then he just brings people into play....I had a good game against him to be honest but he was the most difficult to contain.

CB: There is no one of Hughes' ilk in the Second Division but the major problem for us in the last two seasons has been the number of goals conceded. Obviously you are here to try and improve that situation.

MS: I didn't heip that much in the pre-season, but as I say it takes time to get bedded in. Hopefully we have found a little bit of a system

that will help us keep the enemy at bay. We will get the chance at the other end and have the players to put them away.

We were without "Thorney", who is one of the best centre-forwards in the League, at Hull and Steve Finney came in and did his job really well. So that is a good indication to the depth of the squad.

This club was playing in the Premiership two years ago and I have no doubt we have a better squad than any other team in Division Two. When we all get to know each other you will see us play and if we all perform to our best then I don't think there is any danger of us not going

up.



While the results may not have all gone our way on our pre-season tour in Finland, Steve and I were pleased with the commitment shown by the lads in the games and with the effort they put in training when we were there.


We reported back from the summer's break only ten days before we were due to fly out to Helsinki and although everybody keeps themself reasonbly fit during the summer they had to put in some hard work in readiness for the pre-season games. You could see the team welding together as a group both on and off the field.

After all this was the first time that Wayne Allison and Mark Seagraves had played with their partners Peter Thorne up front and Shaun Taylor in defence and naturally it will take a little time to gel.

The first game against Dundee United may have seen us go down by the only goal of the game but the Scots had played several games prior to meeting us. This was our first game.

We were disappointed at the 3-2 defeat by NoPy the following day but could have no complaints about the result against Seinajoki with Peter Throne netting all five goals. Indeed it could well have been more.

We found ourselves in a quandary last week in the Coca-Cola Cup. Fraser Digby had not recovered in



time from the injury sustained against Norwich City and Blackburn Rovers were not prepared to let Shay Given, signed on loan, to become Cup-tied so young Steve Mildenhall who travelled as cover to last week's game at Hull City and has played just a handful of Reserve Team games was dropped in at the deep end for his First Team debut. I bet he's glad that one's out of the way!


A very busy summer was had working with our long term injuries from last season, all of whom are now fully fit and available for selection.






Three Join Pro Ranks







Swindon Town Ladies were formed during the summer of 1993 because of the ever increasing demand for football.

The players comprised of those with experience at other clubs, a group of four, who came from Coleview Youth Club, where John White had trained them since the age of five, and others signed without having played 11 a side football before. Martin Wheeler was appointed Chairman and a management team of Kerie Garwood, who was to continue as a player, and Roger Reeves was set up. The Town entered the Southern Region League and were admitted to Division 4.

The very first ever game was against Cheltenham Ladies a well established team playing in Division 1. From the Town's point

of view it was a case of learning as the game progressed. The score:well that's best forgotten. Other friendlies followed and in mid September the Town were ready for the League programme. The very first ever game was away to Southampton, which the Town won 4-1. By Christmas the Town had won every game quite comfortably. The trend continued after the Christmas break, although Bracknell did hold out for a no score draw. Basingstoke suffered the most with a 20 to nil defeat the following week in Swindon. Although the Town were too strong for most teams in the league there was one other team enjoying much the same success: Reading Royals. The Town had defeated the Royals 4-2 in October but these were the only points that they had dropped. As luck would have it the Town's final game was to be away to Reading Royals. The Town only needed to draw whereas the

Royals needed to win to clinch the Division 4 title. The Town were trailing 2-1 with four minutes left but Justine Hume found the net to put the Town level and bring the trophy back to Swindon.

In January of 1994 the Town entered the Southern Region 5-a-side competition and surprised many people when they lifted the trophy in their first year. From the Regional, the Town progressed to the National fives at Woking but were pipped by Newcastle United on goal difference at the League stage.

The boys have worked well in training and despite a 0-0 score line put in a good performance in their first friendly game at Cirencester.


We followed this up with a pleasing 4-1 victory over Swindon Supermarine at Wanborough.


Youth Teamfocus

Pre-season went quite well on the fitness side. Although injuries occurred, there was nothing too serious and all the Trainees had games.


Results are not the most important factor. Moulding the lads together as a team and gaining match fitness was the main aim.





As we know only too well it is very difficult to check the slide once you start slipping down the League ladders and the Turf Moor outfit could need this campaign to consolidate their position.

After sliding for the Premiership to Division Two in successive years I

believe Steve McMahon's boys are ready to turn the corner and begin restoring some of that lost pride. My money will be on them chasing the honours with Brentford, Carlisle and Crewe (who are 11/1), in hot contention.

Two interesting odds are those given for South coast rivals AFC Bournemouth and Brighton & Hove Albion. Both Clubs are quoted at 33/1 - good outside bets those, particularly AFC Bournemouth who have a very talented if young squad, ably guided by former Manchester City Manager Mel Machin.... Liam Brady by the way is the boss at Brighton.

If the bookies have got it right both of these Clubs, together with Peterborough United and Shrewsbury Town, will be relegated come next May but thankfully soccer is a most unpredictable game and likely to turn the odds upside down.

This incidentally, is the 97th Football League competition in the world. Nobody can deny that the emergence of the breakaway Premiership has somewhat diluted the quality and prestige of the Endsleigh Football League, yet it still remains the grass roots of top class English football and will for ever be regarded as the fulcrum of our game.

Okay, the current Second Division might truthfully be the Third, we kid ourselves in name only, but there was a lot of good football generated in the Football League last season and ITV's enthusiasm to show it live this season is confirmation of

the high standard shown throughout the divisions.

After a cruel summer in which the headlines smacked of the bung scandals of George Graham: the match fixing allegations involving Bruce Grobbelaar, John Fashanu and Hans Segers: not to mention the Inter Toto Cup farce, the game badly needs a lift from those who play it. Let us hope football will be the winner this year for there is no doubt the pre-season publicity has not been an encouraging omen.

Now we have the opportunity of a fresh start and at Swindon we have players such as Ian Culverhouse. Paul Bodin and so on of real class who can entertain us with their skills. There is still time to put a smile on the face of English football before we stage the European Championships next June.

The pre season was not bad. We didn't achieve the greatest results but that didn't matter until we got


down to the serious business and last Saturday the result was there which is the important thing. But it will take a bit of time for everyone to gel together.

In this respect it is important to establish a solid home record.



The U12's kicked off the tournament for us and were a shining example for the rest of the group and managed to play the ball about though the physical side was greater.






There were a lot of plus points besides these boys culminating in Plate Winners at U12 & U13 age groups and Runners-Up in the U10/11 group.


