It was a group of young furniture workers who formed Wycombe Wanderers Football Club in 1887 and was to become one of the leading amateur clubs in the county who gained national exposure in the early 1970's when it knocked Newport County (1973-74), then a League club, out of the FA Cup. Bournemouth were victims a year later which set up a home tie against Jack Charlton's Middlesbrough, then top of Division One.

It took the Boro' a replay and a last minute goal to knock the stubborn Wycombe resistance out of the competition but they had made their mark and went from strength to strength through the non-League ranks. The Isthmian and Gola Leagues were negotiated to reach the Conference and when Marion O'Neill was installed as manager, in February 1990, the club was on the brink of its most successful period ever.

They clinched the Conference Championship title in 1993, a record 15 points ahead of their nearest rivals - and so became the first club from Buckinghamshire ever to be elected to the Football League.

Brunton Park was the stage of their opening League encounter in August 1993, it ended in a 2-2 draw with Carlisle United. The Cumbrians were to feature prominently again in Wycombe's history at the end of that season for after finishing fourth the lads from Buckinghamshire had to eliminate Carlisle in the semifinal of the Play-Offs. This they did to earn a tilt at Preston in the Final. They were 2-1 down at Wembley but stormed back to win 4-2 with Steve Thompson, Dave Carroll (2) and Simon Gamer the goalscoring heroes.

Last season Wycombe continued to impress and were in a Play-Off position until the final few weeks of the campaign, when they fell away to finish in sixth position - just three points short of the Play-Offs. This disappointment was added to when Martin O'Neill quit to become manager of Norwich City.

The much respected Alan Smith and his assistant from Crystal Palace Dave Kemp, were given charge of the team which opened this season with a 1-1 draw at home to Crewe Alexandra. Leyton Orient were then soundly beaten in the Coca-Cola Cup but Wycombe fans had to wait until late August for their League success, a 2-1 win over Brighton.

Mickey Bell - MIDFIELD Signed in October 1994 from Northampton Town. Mickey netted three goals in 31 League appearances for Wycombe last season. Had joined the Cobblers from school as a trainee and went on to play 153 League games in their colours, contributing ten goals. Born: Newcastle 15-11-71.

#### Steve Brown

 MIDFIELD. Another recruit from Northampton Town. Steve was the Cobblers' skipper when Wycombe enticed him to Adams Park in February 1993. It cost the Buckinghamshire club £70,000 but it proved money well spent, Steve making 39 League appearances in 1994-95 and finishing as the supporters' Player of the Year. A vastly experienced pro. Steve made over 200 appearances for his home-town club which included a spell with non-League Irthlingborough Diamonds. Born: Northampton 6-7-66.



#### Dave Carroll

- MIDFIELD. Was on the books of Fulham as a Youth player but they did not retain his services and he drifted into non-League circles with Wembley Football Club. In the summer of 1988 Wycombe paid a four figure fee for his transfer following a short loan spell in 1987-88 and Dave has since gone to make it into the Wycombe Wanderers top 20 with over 300 appearance for them and was in

Wycombe's FA Trophy winning teams of 1991 and 1993. Dave also scored two goals at Wembley in the 1994 Play-Off Final with Preston. Born: Paisley 20-9-66.

#### Jason Cousins

**DEFENDER**. Was four years at Griffin Park but failed to establish himself making only 28 appearances in the Brentford first team. In the summer of 1991 he joined then non-League Wycombe and scored the first goal in the 4-1 Wembley win over Runcorn in the 1993 FA Trophy Final. A well respected player he was named in the 1992-93 Conference Team of the Year and the following season was acknowledged by his fellow pros as the best in his position in the FA Third Division Team of the Year. Born: Hayes 4-10-70.

#### Viduel Desouza

- STRIKER. Arrived at Adams Park in January 1995 following a £50,000 deal with Birmingham City and scored six goals in seven League outings last season, scoring twice. on his debut at Chester. A Londoner from Newham, Miguel had a tough time breaking into League football. He thought he had cracked it when Charlton took him from Clapton Orient but they let him go to Bristol City, where again he found the first-team dressing room firmly closed. He wandered between Yeovil Town, Dorchester Town, Bashley and Dagenham & **Redbridge before Birmingham City** thought him worth a chance in February 1994. Eventually made 18 appearances for the Blues. Born: Newham 11-2-70.

#### Terry Evans

- DEFENDER. You can't miss him at six foot five. Not surprisingly he is good in the air. Came into football with Hillingdon Borough and was signed by Brentford on 27th July 1985. Made 229 League appearances for the West London outfit but then lost his place and had six weeks on loan with Wycombe. Terry impressed and a £20,000 down payment in October

1993 secured his transfer. By the end of that season Terry had been honoured with selection in the PFA Third Division side alongside Jason Cousins and has gone on to become an influential team captain. Born: London 12-4-65

#### David Farrel

FORWARD. Signed from Aston Villa in September 1995 he made his Wycombe debut in the 1-0 home win over Chesterfield (12-9-95) and netted his first goal for them in a 4-1 win over Oxford United in October '95. Villa took David out of non-League football when they signed him from Redditch United for 45,000 in January 1992. Made his League bow, as a sub, at Oldham in 1992-93 but never really got a foothold in the side and went to Scunthorpe United on loan for experience. Scored in Gordon **Cowans Testimonial against Stoke** and against Everton in Mauritius. Born: Birmingham 11-11-71.

## Paul Hardyman · LEFTBACK. New on the payroll

this season Paul is a class act with a proven record. Began his career with Fareham and was with Waterlooville while working as a carpenter when taken on by Portsmouth. In June 1989 Sunderland bought him for £130,000 and he was a regular choice making 106 appearances. Bristol Rovers paid £160,000 for his services in 1992 and in the summer of 1995 he joined Wycombe on a free. Born: Portsmouth 11-3-64.

GOALKEEPER, Wycombe's regular guardian of the net he was picked up from Hayes in August 1991 for a mere £15,000. Paul had played over 450 times during eight years with Hayes and has now added another 200 plus appearances for Wycombe. Had begun his career with Hillingdon Borough and has won representative honours for the FA and Isthmian League. Included in the Conference Team of the Year in 1993 he holds a Vauxhall Conference championship medal and has been a Wembley winner in the FA Trophy and Third Division Play-Off Final (1994). Born: Hayes 7-4-63.

#### Steve McGavin

- FORWARD. Wanderers invested a club record £140,000 to secure him from Birmingham City in March 1995. He scored twice in 12 League games for them in 1994-95, was a trainee with Ipswich Town but they released him and he joined Sudbury Town. Spent 18 months with Colchester United winning Conference and FA Trophy honours in 1992. In January 1994 Birmingham City paid £150,000 for him but one goal in 15 League airings was all he had to show for his time with Barry Fry. Born: North Walsham 24-1-69.

#### Gary Patterson

- MIDFIELD. Completes a year in Wycombe's colours this month having arrived from Shrewsbury Town in a deal that involved an initial £40,000 payment. His first club was Notts County where he was on the fringe of the Pontins League side and in 1993 he left for Shrewsbury Town to gain first team exposure. Gary played in 57 League games for the Shrews and by the end of the 1994-95 had 70 League games under his belt. Born: Newcastle 27-11-72.

#### Jason Rowbotham

- RIGHTBACK. Signed from Raith Rovers in October 1995, the fee was only decided by a tribunal a fortnight ago. Jason came into football as a trainee with Plymouth Argyle and moved north of the border in 1994. Made 70 appearances in the Scottish First Division in the season 1994-95. Age: 26.

#### **Jason Soloman**

- MIDFIELD. A graduate from the first intake of the FA School of Excellence at Lilleshall (alongside Jason Drysdale), Jason was an England Youth international centre half (6 caps). Learned his trade at Vicarage Road after joining Watford from Lilleshall and was a key figure in Watford's FA Youth Cup winning, side in 1989. Made his League bow in the 1989-90 campaign and went on to play 100 League games for the Hornets, Went on loan to Peterborough United during the 1994-95 season and in March 1995 signed for Wycombe. Born: Welwyn Garden City 6-10-70.

#### John Williams

STRIKER. Signed from Coventry City in September for £125.000. John had only been given one start and six substitute appearances in the Premiership in 1994-95. Made his Wycombe bow in a 1-1 draw at Stockport. A relatively late starter in League football he was 23 when Swansea City paid Cradley Town. of the Boddingtons West Midland League, £5.000 in August 1991, for the West Midlands postman. Made his League debut v Bolton (24-8-91) and scored his first hat-trick at Bradford City. He had scored 1 goals in 39 League outings for the Swans when Coventry paid £250,000 for him in July '92. Born: Birmingham 11-5-68.

#### Alan Smith - Manager

Alan Smith won much sympathy and admiration during Crystal Palace's traumatic relegation campaign of 1994/95 which culminated in his inevitable sacking from Selhurst Park.

If he had never worked again it would not have been surprising for he is financially comfortable from a successful business career and no doubt could well have done without the public rift between himself and his Chairman.

But Alan has football in his blood and possibly an ambition to succeed where he didn't as a player. For his career with Brentford was cut short by injuries sustained in a road accident. He then had a spell as manager of Isthmian League Dulwich Hamlet before turning to coaching with Wimbledon.

Next move was to Crystal Palace and eleven years at Selhurst Park as coach, then assistant manager to Steve Coppell in 1990 and three years later manager, following Palace's relegation from the Premiership.

With little resources and some bigname departures from the playing staff Alan led Palace to the First Division Championship in 1994. His squad though was never going to be strong enough to compete at Premiership level and without funds to strengthen they were inevitably going to struggle. Even so the boss still led them to the semi-finals of both the FA and Coca-Cola Cups.

Alan comes over as a witty, down to earth. honest manager and it was no surprise when Wycombe appointed him in June 1995 following the departure of Martin O'Neill to Norwich City.

At Adams Park he has been given total control of a club that has enjoyed a magic carpet ride to success and has the potential to go much further. Even so Wycombe were lucky to get him for Blackburn Rovers wanted Alan Smith on their coaching staff.

There are no more experienced performers in the Wycombe combination than Simon Garner, a striker who first trod the League stage in September 1978.

Born and bred in Boston, Lincs (Chris Woods the England and Sheffield Wednesday goalkeeper was born there nine days earlier), Simon emerged as an outstanding schoolboy but first club to recognise his potential was Boston, then under the management of Jim Smith - now manager of Derby County. When Smith was installed as manager of Blackburn Rovers he signed young Gamer as an apprentice, that was after he had waited for him to complete his days in the classroom.

Simon was nearly three months short of his 19th birthday when he

made his League debut for Rovers in a Second Division fixture at St James' Park (9-9-78) in a 3-1 defeat by Newcastle United. But such was the impact he made that he went on to play another 24 League games in that 1978/79 season, ending the campaign with eight goals.

He netted six, seven, fourteen then 22 (1982-83) in subsequent seasons en route to inscribing his name indelibly into the Blackburn Rovers history books and is still their all-time record goal scorer with 192 goals in 565 matches.

In March 1987 Simon played at Wembley as Rovers took on Charlton Athletic in the Full Members Cup Final and beat them 1-0 (Colin Hendry, playing up front, the scorer). It was an historic occasion - Blackburn's first Wembley appearance for 27 years!

In August 1992 West Bromwich Albion paid £30,000 for his signature and Simon helped the Baggies win promotion to the old First Division that season. He was to score nine goals in 40 games before moving to Wycombe on a free transfer in February 1994.

There's nothing like a brisk game of football to get that over-fed feeling out of your system and whether you are playing or just supporting you should feel better for the afternoon out.

Holiday time fixtures are just primed to create upsets thus for teams with promotion or relegation at stake this is a particularly vulnerable time. # Peterborough United uniev



Our next visitors to The County Ground, Burnley suffered the same fate as ourselves at the end of last season when they were relegated from Division 1 having spent only one season in the Football League's top flight.

We of course had come down from the Premiership the previous season while Burnley could only manage to stay up for one year after their promotion in 1993/94

When we met last season a 17th minute goal from Keith Scott earned us a share of points here at The County Ground on 23 November while a brace from Peter Thorne saw us return from Lancashire in February with all three points after our 2-1 victory.

Prior to last season. Burnley were last here at The County Ground on 15 March 1986 and our 3-1 win over The Clarets gave us a new club record when we recorded our 14th consecutive home victory. 7212 fans saw Charlie Henry. Dave Bamber and Colin Cordon helped us rewrite the record books.

This win gave us a double over Burnley following their 2-0 defeat at Turf Moor earlier in the season. Colin Gordon and Peter Coyne scoring on this occasion.

Our last League meeting with Peterborough United was when we were en-route to the Premiership in season 1992/93.

At London Road we shared six goals in a thriller watched by 5976 spectators. our goals coming from Shaun Taylor (2) and Craig Maskell. Paul Bodin was to score the only goal of the game which secured us the points in our victory over Peterborough at The County Ground on 3 April 1993. This win kept us in fourth place and one of the vital

Play-Off positions.

#### Talks to Colin Benson

CB: You have a reputation as a hard man of the field Steve. Do you think in hindsight this has been a drawback?

SM: A drawback? No I have never classed myself as being a hard man ever. It is people like yourself and other press men who have done that. I just go out and play the game as I think it should be played. a hundred go out and play the game as I think it should be played. a hundred per cent and that is the way I have always played it.

CB: Everton was your first love but who were your idols as a kid?

SM: Alan Ball was my idol, he always was. It was funny really because I met Alan Ball at Wembley once - I had played against him when he was at Blackpool - with his son and I told him he had been my favourite player. Alan laughed and told me that I was his son's favourite player...a strange co-incidence really.

CB: In those days did you want to play his role?

SM: I did yes. I had his white boots and everything too as a kid. I'll get some stick over that no doubt.

CB: If you hadn't been a footballer what profession would you have chosen?

SM: I never ever thought about anything else. It never once entered my head because I was associated to Everton at 14 and at 16 you are straight into it as an apprentice so there was never time to think about it.

CB: Didn't Everton reject you as an apprentice initially?

SM: Yes, because they thought I was too small. But what happened was I still stayed on and went training every day until I built myself up, did plenty of weights and so on and within a few months they signed me up.

I persevered, kept going and got there in the end. But I wasn't too shattered when they did not sign me at first because they didn't say I was not good enough, they said I wasn't big enough and that I could do something about it. You can't do anything about not being good enough of course.

I just had to build myself up because I was only good for seventy minutes. I know some people say I'm only lasting seventy minutes now but I'm sure I am good enough for 75 maybe!

CB: Born and bred on Merseyside of course what was behind your move to Aston Villa in 1983?

SM: Well my contract was up freedom of contract - and Everton didn't offer me a decent deal to stay on.

CB: I suppose that hurt a bit did it?

SM: Well it did because I had given Everton a good three years in the First team and to decide to move for the first time in my career was a big decision. I was still a young lad. but I don't regret anything. At the time I did speak to Liverpool because my contract was up. spoke to Bob Paisley in fact and to Tony Barton of Aston Villa. But there was a bit of bad press about it and I decided the right thing for me would be to move away.

Going to Liverpool would have been a bit of a problem because of the hassle in the papers and the stick that was being banded about. I was about to sign for Liverpool in fact and if money had been the sole object then I would have done because they offered me a far better package than Villa did.

So money was not my goal really. I just wanted a decent contract because I had played in the Everton first team for three years without being looked after and felt I deserved some reward. Villa and Liverpool were prepared to give me that.

CB: Your stay in the Midlands was short lived - why was this?

SM: Eighteen months. I think that was long enough. It was difficult because I had just got married and Julie had our first baby and it was difficult for her as it was the first time she had left home. She had not settled as well as we would have liked but the move to Liverpool all came about very quickly.

When the chance came to go to Anfield there weren't any angles. Manchester United also wanted me in exchange for Alan Brazil but I didn't fancy Man United. I fancied Liverpool.



They were the tops and Dalglish had just taken over as well. He didn't have to be persuaded. I just had a chat with him and he asked me to go there and I was delighted to be his first signing.

CB: Any misgivings at all because you were taken to



Anfield to fill the boots of Graeme Souness of course?

SM: No.... I was a different type of player and just went out and did my own thing and it worked from the word go.

CB: It was quite a tribute to you because not many players went straight into the Liverpool first team in those days did they?

SM: No. not really. I don't think Kenny would have brought me in unless there was a vacancy. So we knew that was a problem area and fortunately enough I slotted straight into it.

CB: Your first game for Liverpool was just down the road at Oxford | believe?

> SM: That's right 2-2 at Oxford. Ian Rush and Craig Johnston scored.

> > **CB**: That Liverpool side of course clinched the double and must have been a joy to play in?

SM: It was fantastic. it really was. From then onwards for six and a half years or so it was all highs really. It is difficult to pick out great moments, there were so many. I think to play in the side that beat Forest 3-0 was fantastic. And 9-0 against Crystal Palace; then 10-1 against Fulham. Besides the Cup Finals as well... don't know what were my highlights. I really don't know.

I think the FA Cup Final in 1989 was special. It was the Hillsborough Final and was against Everton as well which is special and meant so much to the fans. We actually won the Cup for them really. I think at that time it was important the Cup should finish on Merseyside.

CB: Let's turn to your International career and medals in the 1990 World Cup Finals and of course earlier in the European U-21 tournament. They must be special to you?

SM: Yes, I have been fortunate to play in the two major tournaments with the European Championship Finals in 1988 in Germany, then the World Cup. in Italy where I played in four of our seven games. And we got a medal for finishing fourth after losing to Italy in a Play-Off in Bari. It was a bit of an anti-climax because we were disappointed we had not won through to the Final. But it was entertaining.

CB: Which of your International performances gave you most pleasure?

SM: It is difficult to say. I don't really know. Sweden away was a difficult game for us in the European Championship qualifying rounds. We needed to get a result and did 0-0: and I got a lot of good press for that one. Italy at Wembley was a great game to play in as well. I have Vialli's shirt from that one.

CB: You have played under some legends in your time and have obviously taken on board some of their practices. So how would you describe your style of management?

SM: I wouldn't know to be honest with you ... I wouldn't know how to describe me. I enjoy training, I enjoy playing. I enjoy all aspects of the job. I'm sure there are a few comments the lads would like to make but I don't think they will be printable.

Time was when Boxing Day football meant a ten-minute trip to the match - that is if your team were lucky enough not to be playing away. A meat pie, a cup of Bovril, a programme and a place on the terraces behind the goal and change out of ten bob!

Happy days! when the game was open and goals flooded in. When fans from both sides mingled with each other: when the banter between them was sharp and witty, the atmosphere festive and joyful, when the true Christmas spirit prevailed.

It's funny how time always colours the past, how nostalgia tends to bend reality and the mind conjures up pictures from a different age which often mirror more the idyllic setting than the virtual reality.

You see it never really was like that...Oh yes sometimes we would have fixtures home and away against one of the Bristol sides and fans would not need to spend a whole day travelling to and fro to support their favourite team but even before the days when computers set the fixture list there were some very awkward Christmas trips.

Take the season of 1946-47 for example. The Saturday before Christmas, the 21st December, we were away to Queens Park Rangers. The Paddington bound train on which the team were travelling became fog-bound and in the end the lads alighted at Southall and continued the journey by trolleybus.

Even so they got to the ground late and the kick off was delayed 25 minutes. The lads perhaps wish they had stayed on the train because the Rangers stuffed us out of sight 7-0!

Our Christmas Day, Boxing Day double that year was against Notts County, Tommy Lawton and all. But what a Christmas that was for players and fans. They spent most of it on a train.

London, Newport, Cardiff and Brighton are just some of the exotic locations we have visited in the Yuletide festivities. Christmas 1957 saw us play back to back games with Brighton, the following year it was Brentford.

Veteran supporters will remember Christmas 1938 though. We were home to top of the table Newport County and thrashed them 8-0! A hat-trick from Ben Morton helped demolish the eventual Champions. And there were ten more goals in the reverse fixture 24-hours later. This time Newport took the points with a 6-4 victory.

Ah well, maybe things ain't what they used to be after all.

In recent years the Football authorities have come in for a lot of stick for not taking travelling into consideration. Plymouth Argyle as an obvious case in question with a 610 mile round trip to Cambridge on this festive day a typical example a couple of years back. It is not much better for them today either, they are away to Gillingham, having been at home to Cambridge last Saturday.

Plymouth's geographical situation makes them a difficult case of course, but Exeter, Torquay United and even Cardiff City would surely have been more convenient holiday opponents for the Home Park fans.

In general however The Football League and the Premiership seem to have got it right this year. This Boxing Day the overall fixtures seem to be supporters friendly with the likes of Arsenal home to QPR and Manchester United v Newcastle United. But Ipswich Town fans have quite a trek across country to negotiate to Leicester: Fulham are at far away Lincoln City and Wigan at Cambridge.

Just as a matter of interest do you know where we were last Boxing Day? We were playing out a 0-0 draw at Stoke City. The following day we lost 1-3 at home to Sheffield United. And what of Boxing Day 1993? Give Up? We didn't play. We lost 2-4 at Leicester on December 20th and our next engagement was in January against QPR in the FA Cup.
