

The lads have naturally been frustrated because there is nothing worse than working all week, looking forward to playing then having the rug pulled from under you when the game is called off. But they will survive.

Thankfully the freeze affected everyone so none of our immediate opponents have been able to pull away but we know that it is going to be hard this year. There is another four months of hard work ahead and we have got to make sure we knuckle down and get on with it.

Finally, a note that I have transferred Andy Thomson to Portsmouth. I felt he was getting a bit stale, he was going nowhere here, and we agreed that if a club came in we would think about it. Portsmouth made an approach and the deal was done.

We always have plans to improve our squad but before we act we have to make sure that we get it right. But you can be assured that the search for better players goes on relentlessly.





Please retain your ticket stubs from today's game as they may be required for priority booking for future games.

In the event of today's game ending in a draw, no extra time is played. The tie will be replayed at Woking's Kingmead Ground on Tuesday 16 January 1996 kicking off at 7.30pm.

Ticket details will be announced on ClubCall from 10.00am on Monday morning.

The draw for the fourth round of the F.A. Cup will be made live tomorrow afternoon during the 'Match of the Day-Road to Wembley' programme on BBC 1 Television and on Radio 5 Live at approximately 4:50pm.

Games will be played on Saturday 27 January with two being held over for live television coverage on the following two days.

Woking Football Club's roots trail back to 1887, although the season of 1889-90 is recognised as the Club's inaugural campaign. But it is to the modern era Surrey fans look to win pride for there is no doubt that the last decade has proved the greatest in the Club's long long history.

And it is not over yet for after finishing second to Macolesfield Town in the Vauxhall Conference last season the Cardinals are looking to take their groutest prize yet as they push firmly for the Championship again this year.

Before the New Year programme opened it was almost a case of depayon for Macclesfield again led the Vauxhall Conference with 48 points from 23 games played, with Woking just behind on 41 points from 20 played. Mind you they were a little disappointed at Kingfield after the 2-2 draw with second from the bottom. Dagenham, who equalised in the 90th minute, for those two lost points could have given the man from Surrey a great psychological boost. As it is they recall that last year Macclesfield led them by 22 points at one stage, a deficit that was eventually reduced to five at the final reckoning.

The statistics of 13 wins, 2 draws and 5 defeats with 40 goals scored and 24 conceded suggests Geoff Chapple has a well balanced formation and one we must give the utmost respect to. For though the Conference might well be the ultimate aim Woking's success has

been ignited over the years by great achievements in Cup competitions.

The greatest glories in their history have been enjoyed in Cup football. The Cardinals won the FA Amateur Cup at Wembley in 1958 and returned there in 1994 and 1995 to clinch its successor, the FA Trophy. While in the FA Cup they hit the headlines in 1991 when as an Isthmian League side they beat West Brom 4-2 with Tim Buzalgo netting a hat-trick. Woking lost 1-0 to Everton in the next round.

Then last season Barnet became League scalp number two, losing 1-0 in a First Round replay after an incredible 4-4 draw at Underhill.

This season they met Barnet again winning 2-1 at home after having drawn 2-2 at Underhill and progressed through to the second round for the seventh successive year where they met Enfield.

A late equaliser from Clive Walker earned Woking a second chance against the North London side with the replay being switched to Wycombe. The former Chelsea star was not on duty for the game during which Enfield were reduced to ten men eventually losing 2-1.

- DEFENDER. Was an aspiring hopeful with Wimbledon but failed to make the senior side and did not sample League football until after he had transferred to Barnet in the summer of 1993. Made 37 appearances for the Underhill "Bees" in 1993-94 but found himself only on the fringe of selection the following season when Ray Clemence was in control and added just a handful more games to his tally before joining Woking (who had him on loan for six months in 1992-93) in midseason. Born: Chertsey 29-3-74.

Laurence Batty


- GOALKEEPER. Rated as one of the best custodians outside the League circuit, Laurence was seven years with Fulham before signing for Woking in 1991. Made his Football League debut in Fulham's 2-1 home win over Grimsby Town in August 1985 and made four appearances in four years at Craven Cottage. Joined Crystal Palace on loan in 1987-88 and played for Maidenhead. Brentford and Portuguese club F.C. Farense. Made a big impression with Woking being voted Player of the Year after his first season with the Cards, that saw them promoted to the GM Vauxhall Conference. Gained England semi-professional caps in 1993 and is still a regular in the squad. Has now made over 200 appearances for Woking, Lawrence is also a confident penalty taker and has also scored from open play. Born: London 15-7-64.

Kevan Brown

- DEFENDER. Joined Southampton from school as an apprentice and was four years at the Dell but did not make the first team. In the summer of 1986 he joined Brighton and made his League bow in a goalless draw at Birmingham City in February 1987. It was the first of some 150 League games, he was

to play for Brighton and Aldershot who he joined later. Then moved on to Portsmouth but could not establish himself at Fratton Park and in 1991 signed for Woking. Voted Player of the Year in his first two season with the Cardinals, he was made the team captain and won his first England semi-professional cap in 1994-95.

Born: Andover 2-1-66.



John Crumplin

ENDER Another recruit from the Goldstone Ground, John arrived from Brighton towards the end of the 1994-95 season, having spent eight years with the south coast club. Began his career with Bogner Regis who received £3,500 from Brighton for his transfer. Made his League debut in a 1-2 defeat by Ipswich Town. In the old Second Division, in March 1987 and gained a regular place in the team the following season. John scored the winner for Brighton which knocked the Cards out of the FA Cup in a second round tie in 1992 Born: Bath 26-3-67.

Julian Dowe

- FORWARD. Joined Woking just over a couple of months ago and made his Vauxhall Conference debut for them in November 1995. Julian's former experience has been gained from clubs such as Ayr United and Spanish Second Division side Marbella.

Andy Ellis


- MIDFIELD. A very experienced competitor. Andy joined the Cards in September 1994 after playing for Barry Town in the European Cup Winners' Cup and had previously seen service with Inter Cardiff and Newport AFC. Has also spent a season in Australia and is a Welsh semi-professional International. Made his Woking debut during a Championship Shield victory over Kidderminster Harriers in 1994 and played a key role in the 1995 FA Trophy Final at Wembley.

Stuart Girdler

- MIDFIELD, Was on Fulham's books as a youngster but spent most of last season at Kingfield with the Reserves, making his debut as a substitute, in a Bob Lord Trophy match at Famborough.

Darren Hav

- FORWARD. Signed from
Cambridge United on transfer
deadline day in March 1994,
Darren went on to score eight
goals in 13 appearances for the
Cards that season including one in
the Cards' first FA Trophy Final
against Runcorn. He then re-signed
for Cambridge United on a twoyear contract, but returned to
Kingfield on loan at the start of last
season. Top scorer last season.
Just three seasons ago he was
playing in the South Midlands
League with Biggleswade Town.

Nicky Reid
- MIDFIELD. A player well known to our gaffer, Steve McMahon. Nicky chalked up over 450 League appearances during his career with Manchester City and Blackburn Rovers. On leaving school he joined the apprentice ranks at Maine Road making his League debut at Ipswich in the old First Division in March 1979. In ten years with City Nicky made 217 League appearances (2 goals before switching to Blackburn Rovers in the summer of 1987 on a free transfer. In 1993 he moved on to Wycombe Wanderers for whom he made three League appearances last season. Signed for Woking in the summer of '95 making his debut at Macclesfield on the opening day. Won six England Under-21 caps while with City. A fitness fanatic, Nicky captained the Rovers. Can play anywhere (defence or midfield). Born: Ormston 30-10-60.

- FORWARD. A Scot signed from Scottish League side Airdrionians, where he had been a part-time professional, in the summer of 1992. Was voted Man of the Match in Woking's 1994 FA Trophy Final victory over Runcom at Wembley (he had a hand in both goals); and a year later scored a spectacular first minute goal to help put the skids under Kidderminster in the Cards' second successive Wembley success in that competition. Scott is still only 24.

Uave Ilmoth

- DEFENDER. Can play in either fullback position, Dave made the transition from Reserve to Conference football last autumn and a string of impressive displays saw him honoured with successive "Man of the Match" awards. Has pace, control and the skill to support the attack.

STATA MONUSUL

 MIDFIELD. Joined the Woking ranks in October 1995 from

Wycombe Wanderers, Is only 5'7' but had been a stalwart in Wycombe's all-conquering Conference and FA Trophy winning side of 1992-93 and was in the side when it made its debut in the Football League. Made 34 League appearances for the Adams Park outfit last season. Previously played for Slough Town. Capped by England at semi-professional level. Born: Plymouth 12-1-63.

- RIGHT BACK. This is Mark's third season with Woking for whom he was outstanding during the campaign of 1994-95 when he easily won the "Player of the Year" nomination. It was his goal that knocked League side Barnet out of the FA Cup last season. His career started at Craven Cottage when he joined Fulham from school and was given his debut in a League game when still only 19. Made three further appearances before being released by the Cottagers.


FORWARD. The big name for the big occasion. Clive has been an inspiration since his arrival three seasons ago. A former England Schoolboy International he joined Chelsea from school in March 1974 and made the first of his 198 League appearances (60 goals) for the Blues in April 1977. He had shoulder-length curly hair in those days but it was his flair for scoring spectacular goals that made him a crowd favourite. Speed and strength combined to make him a threat down either flank, or in centre. He was still at his prime when sold to Sunderland for £75,000 in July (50 League games). He then moved to OPR (21 app): Fulham (109) and Brighton (68) before joining Woking in 1993. Finished that first season for the Cards as the ace striker - 22 goals - and "Player of the Year" last season. Despite his 38 years, he was again King of the goals and acclaimed "Vauxhall Conference Player of the Year. Born: Oxford 26-5-57.



Geoff Chapple's association with the Kingfield club stretches way back to the 1970's when he pulled on the Cardinal red and white shirt he wore with pride as a regular in the side.

Chapple had originally been with Aldershot as an apprentice prior to spells with Guildford and eventually Windsor and Eton.

Indeed, it was a broken leg sustained while playing for Windsor that ended his playing career but he stayed on at Stag Meadow as manager and quickly showed a great aptitude for the role.

In September 1984 he rejoined Woking to replace Bill Dodgin, the former Arsenal centre-half, as manager. The Club had suffered a record seven successive defeats but Geoff Chapple quickly set about changing the club's fortunes.


In eleven years he has not only rejuvenated Woking but has led them to the top of the non-League pyramid collecting a glorious array of silverware en route. He has led the Cardinals to three promotions, two Surrey Senior Cup successes, and to what he regards as his greatest achievement - successive victories in the last two FA Trophy Finals at Wembley.

Geoff was also the manager who plotted the Cards FA Cup victory over West Brom but there is no doubt that their priority this year is the Conference Crown they came close to snatching last year.

Under the Spotlight

Colin Fielder was Woking's trump card in last season's FA Umbro Trophy final at Wembley, scoring the winning goal two minutes from the end of extra time! It was, perhaps, the sort of glory he had craved for as a youngster when he joined Aldershot's apprentice ranks as a sixteen-year old.

Certainly the future looked bright as he stepped out for his League debut at 17, in a 2-1 defeat at Torquay United. His brief that day was to mark the former Scotland captain, and now manager of Arsenal, Bruce Rioch and he passed the test well.



But as Aldershot's fortunes dipped so too did Colin's and after eight years with the club (10 goals in 79 League appearances) he joined Famborough on a free transfer.

Helped them to promotion from the Diadora to the Conference and also collected a Beazer Homes League championship trophy too.

Slough paid £18,000 to secure his services in the summer of 1992 but he was left on the bench and ended a frustrating few weeks of his career by moving to Kingfield in an exchange deal for George Friel making his debut for the Cards on August 29th in a 3-0 defeat at Stalybridge Celtic.

Colin has gained representative honours for an FA XI and has been prominent in Woking's back to back FA Trophy triumphs though he has not always been a regular selection. Is not on the scoresheet that frequently either and usually reserves his goals for the big occasion. It is to be hoped that Colin, who is employed in the carpet trade, will not be given the red carpet treatment today.

When the Third Round draw was made the national headlines were all about little Cinderford Town taking on the mighty Aston Villa... many column inches were devoured by quotes from their Manager and Chairman with hardly a mention that they still had to qualify. Yet they are not even involved today. Thrashed convincingly in a replay with Gravesend. Who apart from Woking are the only surviving non-Leaguers in the tie.

It is a classic Cup fairytale for Gravesend, who beat Colchester United 2-0 in the First Round, and no doubt their fans will enjoy it while they can for this is surely the end of the road for them.

Queens Park Rangers fans will not be so confident as Ray Wilkins takes his Premiership side to Tranmere although the First Division side have lost seven successive games. But they boast the class of men like Pat Nevin and John Aldridge who though long in the tooth are likely to be rejuvenated by this challenge.

Another Premiership side probably on a stickier wicket is Manchester City. Alan Ball's side have pulled away from the bottom rung of the Premiership ladder but they will have to be at their best at Filbert Street to avoid an early exit. A lack of finish has been their undoing of late while Leicester, under new boss Martin O'Neill, are anxious to impress... could be a draw.

Nottingham Forest, the only British side left in Europe, are masters of the KO game. Expect a result from them at Lou Macari's Stoke. Tottenham Hotspur are renowned Cup achievers and Hereford well practised giant-killers but the Third Division side - 'Chalkie' White and all - surely do not have the quality to dent the best away record in the Premiership at Edgar Street today.

The Champions Blackburn Rovers have has a terrible time and are notoriously bad travellers. Yet lpswich Town just don't suggest they have the power to capitalise on that this afternoon at Portman Road though they might get a second try.

Sheffield Wednesday have a far from easy task at Charlton but should be too good for the Londoners and although they have home advantage one can't see Notts County causing any upsets against Middlesbrough. The Notts fans though will be thrilled by the foreign invasion of Juninho and Jan Aage Fjortoft.

The only all Premiership tie matches Chelsea against Newcastle United (tomorrow) which has to be the match of the round. Newcastle have not been convincing away from home of late...it just could be a day for the Blues!

Other highlights include the Hampshire derby battle between Southampton and Portsmouth now managed by former Town player Terry Fenwick and the Midlands show-down between Birmingham City and Wolverhampton Wanderers. Derby games are just as likely to go against form as with it but the Saints and the Wolves look likely winners.

Now you would not put money on Manchester United slipping up at home to Sunderland would you but remember York City? Peter Reid, a former colleague of Steve McMahon, has worked wonders at Roker Park. If he pulls this one off he will get the freedom of the town.


Now lets look at the ties involving other Second Division clubs.

choke. This is my tip for the shock of the round.






Let's not forget that only a few years ago they went down by the only goal of the game when they met Everton at Goodison Park.

Shaun Taylor has also been nursing a minor hamstring strain over the Christmas period.


The injury came to light when Shaun was training indoors at Greendown School in the gym and felt pain when sprinting in the back of his leg. His injury was not muscular but the tendon that attaches one of the hamstring muscles to the bone had been strained.

This long tendon of the biceps femoris muscle can easily be felt behind the knee on the outside of the leg and is quite commonly

injured.

Shaun has been on antiinflammatory tablets which reduces swelling and pain and he has gradually increased the workload on the injured left-leg and should be fit for today to continue his ever present tag this season.

Talks to Colin Benson

CB: What is it with you Australians Frank... You flood our TV screens with soap operas and now we can't move for Aussie goalkeepers. Just what is going on?

FT: I don't know. It is not just goalkeepers either. There are a lot of quality players over here as well. There must be a hundred to a hundred and fifty Aussies spread throughout Europe right now I believe. There are quite a high number of goalkeepers in England as well. about a dozen. We breed them quite big and strong out there.

The standard of football in Australia at the lower levels is quite good. The game is flourishing at junior level and in the sixteen to Under-21 age groups we can compete at the highest level and are in the top three or four in the world. It is when you get to the professional stage that we tend to lag behind.

This is why the better players have to come to Europe to places like Italy or England to complete their soccer education. We now have goalkeepers like Mark Bosnich (Aston Villa), Jason Kearton (Everton) and John Filan (Coventry City) with English League clubs.

CB: There was a time, not so long ago. when English goalkeepers were renowned the world over. Every League side in the country could boast a competent custodian. The pendulum seems to have swung.

FT: It certainly has, the rest of the world has caught up and that includes Australia. I remember when everyone looked to English goalkeepers as the ones to study and follow. But you can't be the best all of the time and the rest of the world has caught up and surpassed you now I think. Look at the Premiership and see how many goalkeepers are from foreign lands. People like Miklosko at West Ham; Kharin with Chelsea: Smicek Newcastle United, Schmeichel. Manchester United and Immel at Manchester City.

CB: You played for the colourful sounding Sunshine George Cross side in Melbourne so how did you come here?

FT: It was luck really. I was playing in the Australian Under-21 side and was spotted by an English scout who brought me to England. I had trials with too many clubs to mention before getting settled.

CB: Like who?

FT: Oh. Chelsea, Queens Park Rangers and others. Then I went to Scotland. I went all over the place. In the end Blackburn Rovers made me the best offer and they looked a decent club. I thought I had a chance there so I signed.

CB: Was it a good career move?

FT: I think so. I learned a hell of a lot there and everyone was so nice. But just when I felt I was in with a chance I was injured and everything seemed to slip away.

When they signed Tim Flowers I realised my opportunities were very limited because Bobby Mimms would be the number two. So it was going to be a hard struggle to assert myself.

CB: What is Tim Flowers like as a bloke?


FT: One of the nicest fellows I have met. He is brilliant. He'll do anything for you on or off the field.

He is a very hard trainer, a very dedicated professional.

I learned a lot from Tim just by watching him train, the way he does things, his whole manner towards the game, the way he trains and plays. He has played at the top, won a Championship medal and plays for England yet his appetite for the game is insatiable. It is as if he has just discovered the game and he can't get enough of it.

He is unbelievably talented and though he has had one or two poor games this season I believe he is the best goalkeeper in England now and I'm sure he will be back in the International side before the European Championship next summer.

CB: Why did you decide to leave Ewood Park?



FT: I felt the time was right if I was to progress any further. With Tim and Bobby on the books I could not see any light at the end of the tunnel. It was going to take an extraordinary set of circumstances for me to get a game with Blackburn Rovers.

When I got the chance to come to Swindon on loan it made me realise that there were more opportunities here: If I produce the goods there is

going to be a chance. Without the prospect of first team football there is nothing to motivate you.

CB: How about your International future?

FT: Obviously if I can play first team football my International prospects are going to improve. As to where that future lies I don't know. At the moment I carry an Italian passport. I qualify for Australia and having been here for four-and-a-half years I understand that I could qualify for England in six-months time. That would be nice.

CB: How do you like it at Swindon?

FT: It's completely different to Blackburn but I have thoroughly enjoyed it so far. The lads and the management have made me feel very welcome. They are a grand bunch of guys.

I have got used to the weather now as well. The cold is not so bad, it can get pretty bitter in Melbourne
where I come from
in fact. But the
sooner I can get
playing the better and at
the moment Fraser is not giving
me a chance.

CB: Have you come to terms with the new rules applying to goalkeepers?


FT: Just about. It is a bit hard on us I feel. Goalkeepers are now obviously reticent about coming out of the box and get caught hesitating. I have decided that if the ball is there to be won then I am going to go through and win it.


The ban on picking up back passes has involved us much more in the game. Goalkeepers now have to be able to use their feet much more. I think I have coped with this side well enough though the people down at Clevedon the other week might not think that when I gave a penalty away.

Goalkeepers seem to have been the butt for legislators over the past 20 or 30 years. There have been so many changes to the rules. First you could bounce the ball, then you couldn't and now of course if you handle it outside the area you are off. But that's football.

CB: Finally I can't let you go away Frank without telling us which is your favourite soap drama on TV?

FT: Well Brookside and EastEnders are my two favourites but Neighbours is filmed just about ten minutes away from where I lived in Melbourne so I watch that sometimes just to get a feel of home again!










Almost straight from the kick-off Kerie Garwood ran through to put the result beyond doubt.


We hit back quite soon when from a Ryan Souter flick. Scott Woodman touched the ball goalwards where the Brighton keeper made a mess of saving to put us level.

After the break and with the wind behind them, we expected Brighton to put us under a lot more pressure but we has as much possession and created some promising openings but simply failed to get that final touch.


Brighton ended the scoring when from a long throw-in we again allowed them to get the ball first and score their third goal of the game.

One of the more rewarding elements of my job is when a player, manager, or some other football figure from the past makes contact to recall some glorious events of yesteryear. There is nothing like a good yarn and from the horses mouth it is always so much better.

The other day, as I was pumping out copy for the Wycombe programme, the phone rang. It was Alan Gibbs. Now the name didn't ring any bells until he explained that our FA Cup draw with Woking had prompted him to contact me as he is not only a former Town player but also played for Woking in 1953.

Alan played for us in the 1956-57 season scoring five goals in 18 appearances until he dropped out with a groin injury "which never seemed to mend properly." He points out: "The only treatment in those days was the magic lamp."


Still he appeared in the list of leading goal-scorers on the same day that Govan and Nat Lofthouse led the chart in the First Division; Brian Clough and Roy Dwight in the Second Division, with Bournemouth's Stan Newsham heading Alan in the Third Division South. Says Alan: "I felt rather lucky to be shown with five goals for Swindon amongst some of those names."

We had signed the inside forward from Cardiff City and he later played for Headington United, Cheltenham Town and Trowbridge Town then continued in local football until he was 40.

Alan has been in the insurance trade for the last 33 years, running his business from Old Town in Swindon and hopes to be here this afternoon. We hope he enjoys it.

Published here is a cartoon covering his debut for Woking against the Dons back in 1953 which no doubt will bring back some happy memories for the more senior Cardinals supporters and indeed Alan himself.

There are no two ways about it. We have to get back to our winning ways this afternoon for there are no prizes for drawing in the FA Cup.
