


Oldham Athletic did not sort out their third round encounter with Barnsley until Tuesday night, when they beat the Yorkshire club 2-1 at Boundary Park in a replay. The one thing we knew was that we were playing at home so it did not really matter to us who it was against. Both contestants are from the First Division and either would set us a tough task.

Oldham are a good team. I have not seen them this season but Graeme Sharp has introduced a number of new faces and changed it around a bit. He has brought in Stuart Barlow from Everton and he can be quite dangerous; he is pacey and can get in behind people but I don't think he was the highest quality finisher at Everton and that us why they could afford to let him go. But Graeme Sharp seems to be getting the best out of him now.

The Everton influence is very strong - in fact it is almost like an old Evertonian convention this one - with Colin Harvey as Graeme's assistant. He will have a lot to do with the type of football they play and there are few better. I was brought up by Colin through the Youth team and Reserves and I have the highest respect for him.

In the event of the scores this afternoon being level after ninety minutes, no extra time is played. The tie will be replayed on Tuesday 6 February 1996 kicking off at 7:45pm at Boundary Park.

Full ticket details will be announced on ClubCall on Monday. The game will not be all ticket.

The draw for the 5th round of the F.A. Cup will be made tomorrow afternoon at approximately 5:00pm following the Sheffield United vs Aston Villa game which is being screened live on B.B.C. 1. The draw will also be going out live on B.B.C. Radio 5 LIVE.

The date for 5th round ties is Saturday 17 February 1996 with two games being held over to the following two days for transmission live on B.B.C. 1 and SKY SPORTS.

Reserves

The next game for the Reserves in the Avon Insurance Combination is on Tuesday 30 January when they travel to play Chelsea at Kingstonian Football Club where the kick off is at 7:00pm.

Their next home game is here at The County Ground on Monday 5 February when they meet Millwall kicking off at 2:00pm.

An early date for your diary for next season is our first pre-season fixture which has already been arranged. We will be playing Southampton here at The County Ground on Tuesday 6 August kicking off at 7:45pm

Our other pre-season games will be played again this year in Finland where we will be on an eight day tour.

The Youth Team will again be competing in the International Youth Tournament in Veenendaal in the Netherlands at Easter. Having won the trophy for the past two years, the lads will be going out for a hat-trick of victories but face a tough tournament as the opposition include the likes of Feyenoord Rotterdam, Sparta Rotterdam and NEC Nijmegen.

Oldham Athletic By John Nolan The Visitors

A big sigh of relief emanated from Boundary Park on Tuesday night as Oldham Athletic finally saw off the challenge of fellow First Division rivals Barnsley in their FA Cup Third Round replay.

This had been their third meeting with the Tykes in 17 days, a sequence that commenced on Saturday 6th January when they held Barnsley 0-0 at Oakwell in the original tie. New signing Toddy Orlygsson had been the star of this encounter and could have snatched victory for the Latics. He didn't and that upset the plans of Norwegian Gunnar Halle who hoped to return to Scandinavia for the Christening of his daughter. Alas, the replay clashed with the date and wrecked his plans. The final irony being of course the eventual postponement of the replay because Boundary Park was shrouded in fog!

There was worse to come though for Oldham for the following Saturday they were beaten 1-0 at home in the First Division - their conquerors being Barnsley who cracked their Boundary Park bogey with their first win there in 61 years. Would they be able to make it two in a row in the FA Cup replay?

Optimism was not that high for the Latics, ravaged by a severe injury crisis - skipper Nick Henry will miss the rest of the season after back surgery - have not been faring well in Division One of late. Such has been their predicament that at Crystal Palace last month goalkeeper Jon Hallworth had to go on as an emergency substitute striker. Mind you he nearly headed a late winner in a 2-2 draw.

But it all came good on the night and Oldham come here as favourites to advance through to the Fifth Round of the FA Cup thanks top another sterling display from Icelandic international Toddy Orlgysson.

Latics boss Graeme Sharp believed the Icelandic star could re-launch his side's promotion bid though they have got a lot of catching up to do, Oldham are currently hovering in 17th place on 32 points - 10 short of third placed Huddersfield Town.

Scoring away from home has been one of their major problems with just 13 netted in two wins, six draws and five defeats in Division One. On the other hand defensively they have looked good conceding just 16 goals in this 13 match sequence and only

Sunderland and Tranmere Rovers can boast a better return away from home and they have both played one game less.

Stuart Barlow

- FORWARD. Hard working forager who was picked up by Everton in the summer of 1990 from Sherwood Park of the Liverpool Sunday League. The former butcher's boy made his League debut within twelve minutes, against Wimbledon, on April 10, 1991 and replaced Mo Johnston until Everton signed Paul Rideout Despite living on the fringe of the first team at Goodison, Stuart still returned the highly creditable figures of 13 goals in 24 full appearances. Went on loan to Rotherham in 1991-92 but his one appearance for the Millers was rubbed out when Aldershot resigned from the Football League. Has pace and moved to Oldham for £450,000 in November 1995. Born: Liverpool 14-7-68.


Darren Beckford

STRIKER, Signed from Norwich City for £300,000 in March 1993. he scored within ten minutes of his debut for the Latics - as a sub versus Wimbledon. Finished that season with 3 goals in 7 games. Started his career with Manchester City and it was somewhat of a surprise when they allowed him to go to Port Vale in 1987 for just £15,000. The big man played on loan for Bury and Vale before the transfer and settled well in the Potteries, establishing a growing reputation with 68 goals in 167 League games. Norwich City paid £925,000 to take him to Carrow Road but he failed to impress at the top level and was virtually given away after less than two years in East Anglia. Joe Royle had long admired Darren's power and pace but once again he has not been able to recapture his best form, injuries limiting him to just 27 (14) senior appearances (12 goals) up to the commencement of this season. Born: Manchester 12-5-67.

Mark Brennan

- MIDFIELD. Left sided player recruited from Maine Road in 1992 at a cost of £100,000. Made his Latics bow in November 1992 as a replacement for Nick Holden on

the left wing, against Middlesbrough one of his former clubs. Chalked up his 250th League appearance with his opening game this season, in a career that started with Ipswich Town in 1983 (FL deb v Arsenal Nov 1983). Became a fixture in the Town side for four years before being transferred to Middlesbrough in the summer of 1988 for £375,000. Two years later he joined Manchester City for £500,000 but made only 36 appearances for them. Had a trial with French First Division side Met in March 1992 before signing for Oldham in November of that year. England Under-21 cap. Born: Rossendale 4-10-65




Dishard Craham

MIDFIELD. Brought up through the junior ranks at Boundary Park. Richard made his senior debut in the home game with Manchester United in 1994. Unfortunately collected an injury which resulted in him making only one more appearance that season. Came back however to enjoy a fruitful 1994-95 during which he established himself as a regular in the Latics line-up and also earned himself representative honours for England at Under-21 level: and for the Endsleigh League versus Italy's Series 'B' selection. Born: Drewsbury 28-11-74.

Gunnar Halle

- FULLBACK. Norwegian International with a World-Cup pedigree and over 50 caps. A fitness fanatic, his enthusiasm makes him a great favourite with Latics fans. Can operate virtually anywhere though he prefers to play wide on the right. Oldham signed Gunnar from Norwegian club Lillestroem for £280,000 in 1991 and what a bargain he had proved. Had not scored in three years in English football until he netted against Nottingham Forest in August 1992. A week later he scored again at Manchester City! Just to emphasise it was not a fluke he registered a hat-trick for Norway against San Marino in a World Cup qualifier in September 1992. Had scored 14 times for Oldham by the end of last season. Born: Larvik 11-8-65.



Jon Hallworth

GOALKEEPER. Has made over 250 senior appearances for the Latics. Served his apprenticeship with Ipswich Town, for whom he made 45 League appearances. Jon made his League debut however for Bristol Rovers at Reading in January 1985 on loan. Had loan spells with Swindon and Fulham also that season but did not get a game with either club. In February 1989 Oldham signed him for £125,000 and he was the first choice custodian - ever-present in the Latics' Second Division Championship side - until he sustained an arm injury at Old Trafford three years ago which kept him on the sidelines for a long period Born: Stockport 26-10-65.

Sean McCarthy

- FORWARD. Proved a prolific scorer with his previous clubs and continued the trend following his £415,000 transfer from Bradford City in December 1993, finishing that season with four goals. Completed his first full campaign (1994-95) as the Latics top shot with 18 goals - all in the League. Came into football with Swansea City, making his debut in a 1-0 win over Bury in November 1985, 1986-87 was his best run. Scoring 1goals in 44 Fourth Division appearances, being the Swans top scorer in two of his three seasons. Plymouth Argyle invested £50,000 in the 21 year-old in 1988. Had scored 140 first-class goals prior to the start of his season. Born: Bridgend 12-9-62.

Scott McNiven

- DEFENDER. Young graduate from the Boundary Park nursery. Scott was given his first taste of senior football last season making just one appearance. Born: Blackpool 17-5-73.

Chris Makin

- FULLBACK. Joined Oldham from school as a trainee and graduated through the ranks making a big impression on everyone when he burst into the first team in the 1993-94 season. An England Youth International he has also been capped at Under-21 level - he was awarded a golden medal for his performance in the Toulon tournament in 1994 - and gained further representative honours when selected for the Endsleigh League XI against the Italian Serie "B" side. Had made 55 League appearances for the Latics by the close of 1994-95. Born: Manchester 8-5-73.

- MIDFIELD. The Icelandic star was

 MIDFIELD. The Icelandic star was signed in December after his contract expired with Stoke City.
 Stoke boss Lou Macari was furious as Oldham became the first club to try and cash in on the Bosman ruling Toddy rejected a new deal. Macari wanted £500,000. Oldham offered £100,000 for the free agent. a League tribunal later set the fee at £180,000. Orlygsson made his Latics debut in the 0-0 home draw with Watford on December 23, 1995.

Steve Redmond

- DEFENDER. Signed from Manchester City in August 1992 for £600,000. Was one of the outstanding players to emerge from the Maine Road youth policy in the mid-eighties and played nearly 250 games for City, having made his League debut in February 1986 against QPR and eventually skippered the team. Capped by England at Youth and Under-21 (14) levels and was Oldham's Player of the Year in 1995.

Born: Liverpool 2-11-67.

Paul Rickers

- MIDFIELD. A young man establishing a fine reputation after making his senior bow in season 1994-95. Played three games collecting the Man of the Match award in two and scoring his first senior goal. A Yorkshireman, Paul joined the club from school as a trainee. Born: Leeds 9-5-75.

lan Snodin

- DEFENDER. Picked up from Everton for a nominal fee in January 1995, lan brought the experience of some 400 games to Boundary Park. It all started with Doncaster Rovers in 1979 as an apprentice. Was given his League chance v AFC Bournemouth in March 1980 and in signed for Leeds United in a £200,000 deal. Made 51 League appearances for them in two years and joined Everton in 1987 for £850,000. winning a League Championship medal in his first season. Would have won further honours for club and country but for injury but still gained International recognition with England caps at Youth, Under-21 and "B" levels. Born: Rotherham 15-8-63.

Graeme Sharp - Manager

Graeme Sharp is still registered as Player-Manager though his appearances in the team are all too infrequent. He had signed a new two year playing contract in 1994 after once again topping

the Oldham scoring chart with 13 goals. However, the departure of Joe Royle to Everton in November 1994 changed his status and his horizons when the Board offered him the job... Graeme is only Oldham's third manager in 26 years.

Graeme Marshall Sharp was born in Glasgow on the 16 October 1960. A product of the Scottish junior Eastercraigs he was 19 when

1960. A product of the Scottish junior Eastercraigs he was 19 wher Dumbarton gave him his debut against Airdrie in November 1978. Such was Graeme's progress that just eighteen months later he was on his way to Goodison Park. after scoring 17 goals in 40 matches for the Scottish League Second Division side.

The season of 1983-84 was a glorious one for Everton and Graeme. His goals helped them

reach both the FA and League Cup finals. They lost 1-0 to Liverpool in the League Cup but returned to Wembley in May to clinch-the FA Cup - Graeme scoring the first goal in a 2-0 victory over Watford. His goals the following year helped clinch a League Championship title; a European Cup Winners' medal

Graeme played in a third successive FA Cup Final and collected a second League Championship honour in 1987 and was back at Wembley again to contest the FA Cup Final in 1989.


Joined Oldham Athletic for £400,000 in the summer of 1991 after ten glorious years at Goodison Park and 111 goals 322 League appearances. Has now extended his playing career by 125 (8) senior appearances - 39 goals for Oldham.

Under the Spotlight

Paul Gerrard was one of the most talked about young custodians in the country three years ago when his brave, athletic and consistent performances in the Latics goal courted comment from all levels of the game.

Born in Heywood on the 22nd January 1973, he celebrated his 23rd birthday on Monday. Paul William Gerrard joined Oldham Athletic as a trainee on leaving school in the summer of 1989, and two years later was awarded a professional contract.

But the hoped for future as a star goalie took a big knock when he damaged his knee so badly it needed two operations. On



recovering Paul was loaned out to Crewe Alexandra in order to gain experience. It wasn't to be . The day before his debut he dislocated the same knee.

Paul was devastated and on the brink of quitting until Joe Royle provided some soothing words of encouragement and persuaded him to give it one more go. This was backed by a specialist who gave him the all clear to resume training.

The young 'keeper was just two games into his comeback with the Reserves when Oldham ran into trouble. Goalkeepers Jon Hallsworth and John Keeley were grounded by injury. Paul was selected for his Premiership debut at Loftus Road on 5th December 1992.

Athletic lost 3-2 but Paul showed enough. He made the number one spot his own hitting the headlines with a series of impressive displays which led to his selection for the England Under-21 team. So secure and consistent was he that he played 15 successive games for England at that level in which England remained unbeaten.

There is nothing quite like the F.A. Cup for bringing the high and mighty down to earth and already in this season's competition we have had our fair share of shock results. This is what the Cup is all about, the magic of uncertainty no matter what the status of the contestants.

Just when Blackburn Rovers thought their Championship hangover was behind them, their season took another grisly turn for the worst when Ipswich Town provided a knock-out blow minutes from the end of extra-time. And who would have bet on the Blades cutting Arsenal out after two goes! It was a first win for Sheffield United under Howard Kendall after five draws.

These triumphs were achieved in replays but Charlton Athletic needed only one attempt to see off Sheffield Wednesday - the Premiership's first casualty. So who is next for the Cup chop?

Howard Kendall, who led Everton to three Cup Finals, said of his latest triumph. "This has to rank among my best Cup moments." The Sheffield manager, who made history in 1964 by becoming the youngest player to appear in the final - for Preston against West Ham (a record later broken by our Paul Allen for West Ham against Arsenal in 1980) - looks confidently towards repeating the giant-killing act against Aston Villa tomorrow.

Shrewsbury Town struck a blow for Cup tradition when they overcame police objections to stage their fourth round tie against Liverpool at Gay Meadow. The capacity there these days is about 8,500 and the Shrews could have earned an extra £100.000 if they had agreed to switch the tie to Anfield. But they didn't (full marks to them) and so have the chance to rekindle those glorious Cup-tie Saturdays under Graham Turner when they won national acclaim as giant-killers beating the likes of Manchester City and Ipswich Town - who were then both powerful First Division sides. Reading, like Shrewsbury Town.

have the opportunity to stage a major upset. The Biscuitmen were probably delighted when Manchester United overcame Sunderland in their replay because there is no doubt this will be Reading's Cup Final. But even taking into account United's failure against York City in the Coca-Cola Cup Cantona, Cole and company, should be good enough to exploit a Reading defence that has conceded 36 goals this season.

Grimsby Town are going well in Division One and could have a few shocks in their lockers for West Ham United. This will be a tough one for the Hammers who have been strengthened by the signing of Ilie Dumitrescu from Spurs (£1.5 million). They overcame a potential upset at home to Southend United in the Third Round and should be at least a goal too good for the Mariners.

Likewise the Cup holders Everton should overcome Port Vale. They had a scare, or even three, against Stockport County but Vale's suspect defence points to a Premiership victory here.

It is down at the Dell where glory may be achieved by Crewe Alexandra this afternoon. Dario Gradi's boys beat West Brom 4-3 in the previous round and our closest challengers in the Second Division are certainly prolific scorers. An early strike could upset the Saints (3-0 victors over Portsmouth) who have won only four times at home in the Premiership.

Ipswich Town and Charlton Athletic's heroics could be forgotten come 4:45pm as they both take on the mantle of favourites. But both are currently enjoying good runs in the League and should overcome Walsall and Brentford respectively.

I fancy Nottingham Forest to see off Oxford United: Huddersfield Town to account for Peterborough United and in the all Premiership clashes Leeds United to draw at Bolton; Coventry to beat Manchester City; Middlesbrough to overcome Wimbledon and Chelsea to win at QPR (Monday night).

There is a feeling that Wolverhampton Wanderers, who have reached the quarter-final in the last two seasons, could take Tottenham Hotspur back to Molineux for a replay...But Shrewsbury Town and Crewe are the two tips for giant-killing honours.





Its a great pity that the new F.A. rules prevent Tony from lining up against our First Division opponents this afternoon.




Martin Ling has received treatment this week after suffering a nasty knock to his right hip last Saturday. Martin missed several days training but will be fit enough to be involved this afternoon.





Talks to Colin Benson

CB: Well Paul, as we hopefully get on with this re-arranged Cup tie with Oldham Athletic tonight what are your thoughts on the disruptions to the season. Do you subscribe to the lobby for a

mid-season break?

PB: It is very difficult I think. especially with our weather which is so unpredictable. You could have a shut-down for say the first two weeks in January, come back then two or three weeks later we get the bad weather and we end up having the games off anyway. So it is a catch 22 situation. Obviously we don't want to miss games, we don't want the postponements, we don't want the back log of games, but I think in our climate I don't really see how we can have a set break.

It is just one of these situations where the weather is so unreliable that I don't think it would quite work out as it was really planned literally to have a break during the worst of the weather.

CB: We could be in an even worse predicament with a stop start stop season I suppose.

PB: That's quite right. You could have a nice break of two weeks and think that is the period when generally the worst weather is, but can you be sure? We can end up having snow in late February and that would put paid to the midseason break.

CB: What about the suggestion to move the season to take in the summer months, say from March to November?

PB: Well, traditionally football is a winter sport, but if that's the way things go I would go along with that. But look at the conditions last summer when it was so hot. Could we handle that?

It is one of those situations again isn't it. I mean I wouldn't mind to be honest. Obviously it is the same for every player, but it would be draining as we found in pre-season last year. But I don't think it should be messed around with really. I think it is a winter sport, people love to wrap up and come to the game on a Saturday afternoon, and I think the traditions should be left alone.

CB: I'm with you on this one Paul. What would we do with ourselves in the winter?

PB: That's right. On a frosty cold morning we still go out and train and we actually enjoy it. Naturally when the pitches are bone hard we have to go indoors but generally when you have done a few runs and have warmed up it is great to be out in the fresh air blowing a few cobwebs off.

CB: When a big game like this one is called off it is obviously physiologically deflating having been building up all week. Is it difficult to rekindle the flame of passion again?


PB: Finally of course you feel very flat, particularly when it is a game of special significance like the FA Cup. But we have had time to wind down and build up again and of course had a very important League game on Saturday with

Carlisle United. So yes we will be up for it: considering what is at stake in the next round, another home tie, this is a fantastic opportunity really to progress further.

CB: Dare you think about fifth round and the draw against either Southampton or Crewe or do you have to try and put that out of your mind?

PB: I think the fact it is there is another carrot for us. Obviously normally you would only think about the next round if you are in it. The fact that we are in it, all be it with Oldham at the moment. is definitely something to aim for.

We keep on saying, and of course it is true, that getting out of this division is the most important priority but I think the longer you can progress in the FA Cup the better it is for everyone. It is good from the financial aspect for the Club and for everybody in the town really.



Everybody around the World, knows about the FA Cup and its significance. It is a fantastic tournament and the longer we can go the better it is for everybody. A good run in this competition can lift the whole town - non football followers as well.

CB: A successful Cup run can also rub off you in the League as well Paul.

PB: Yeh, is does. A good Cup run generates enthusiasm all round. Everybody is confident, bubbling and fighting for places and that is good for the Club as well. The only negative side is the amount of games we are going to have to play should we progress. But then most players, like myself, enjoy playing football and the more games the better.

We are footballers, we are paid footballers and we enjoy playing football and I think the more games the merrier. It can get ridiculous when teams are asked to play three games a week but actually twice is no problem for myself. I really enjoy it.

CB: And this from one of the senior members of the squad.

PB: Yes, I think when you do get a bit older and more experienced you do look forward to the games. I actually enjoy the training side as well which is great. But it is all about games as far as I'm concerned and the more games you can get in during your career the more you can look back on with pride.


CB: Oldham Athletic







The first half was one of our better team performances with us playing more as a unit as we restricted Spurs to only a few worthwhile attacks.


Steve Mildenhall had very few shots to save in goal.

The European Championship was the brainchild of Frenchman Henri Delaunay.

As secretary of The French Football Federation, he proposed the tournament in the mid-1950s, but sadly, he passed away before the competition got underway, However, the trophy still bears his name. Then known as the "European Nations Cup," the first tournament almost failed to get off the

ground when as the deadline for entries approached, less than the required number of 16 countries had applied. Seventeen eventually made application and the first game of the new competition took place between the Republic of Ireland and Czechoslavakia on 5 April 1958. France was selected as the venue for the Finals of the series, but attendances were

Seventeen thousand watched the Final between USSR and Yugoslavia in Paris, the Soviets winning in extra time. The second series was organised on the same home-and-away straight knockout basis as

disappointing.

the first series but, with 29 of the 33 European nations agreeing to compete, it was poised to be the all-encompassing tournament of which Henri Delaunay had dreamed. Spain beat USSR in the

Final in Madrid and 120,000 saw them do it. The "European Nations Cup" competition had its name changed by

The UEFA Congress in 1966 to the "European Football Championship" before the third series began and, with an entry of 31 countries,

it had clearly established itself as Europe's premier tournament.

England have entered eight of the nine European Championship tournaments and have qualified for the final stages five times. They did not take part in the initial tournament, won by the

USSR in 1960 and failed to qualify for the finals in 1964. England achieved their best-ever-placing in 1968,

defeating the USSR in the match for third spot. West Germany, the eventual winners, knocked them out in the Quarter-Finals in 1972. An attempt at qualifying foundered four years later as

Czechoslovakia, also

tournament winners, topped the group.

After winning seven out of eight qualifiers. England reached the Italian Finals in 1980, but defeat against the hosts in Turin in the second match led to an early exit. Denmark blocked England's path to the 1984 Finals in France. Four vears later, the team remained unbeaten in the qualifiers with an impressive 19-1 goals record. But three losses in three games in the German Finals brought them back to earth. England scraped through

to the 1992 Finals with a late equalising goal in Poland, but they found goals hard to come by in

Sweden - just one in three matches - and were on their way home after the first phase. Now as hosts. **England automatically** qualify for the Finals.

Already seeded to head up Group A they will take up residence at Wembley for all their group games. If

they keep winning they will play all matches at Wembley through to the Final. If England finished second in their group they will play their Ouarter-Final at Anfield and any Semi-Final at Old Trafford.

One of the favourites to lift the Henri Delaunay Trophy, England will open the Championship at Wembley on 8th June 1996.

The F.A. Cup is the daddy of them all of course; the original knock-out football competition, the brainchild of C.W. Alcock back in 1872. What a visionary that man was.

From those early beginnings when the Wanderers conquered all - they won five of the first seven finals and conceded just one goal in the process - knock-out competitions have captured the imaginations of players and supporters alike. It is the absolute finality about the scoreline that gives a Cup-tie the edge, the realisation that you have to beat the opposition to stay in the competition. Defeat means sudden death.

English domestic football thrived on the back of the interest and publicity the F.A. Cup generated and much later on in history, in the 1930's Association was introduced to International football in the form of the World Cup.

Twenty years on and European football was given an electrifying boost with the conception of the European Cup which was until recently solely a K.O. competition. From these great tournaments have sprung the European Championship, the European Cup Winners' Cup. UEFA Cup; and of course the various domestic competitions such as the League Cup, the Auto Windscreens Shield and all the other smaller competitions with a silver lining. In Africa, South America, Asia, wherever the game is played, Cup football thrives.

Today we are playing for a place in the fifth round of our own domestic dust-up but last week Terry Venables was busy in Warsaw negotiating the fixtures for England's tough qualifying matches in the 1998 World Cup series.

We are drawn in Group Two alongside Italy, Poland, Georgia and Moldova, a qualifying series that is truly going to question England's credentials. Agreeing schedules with other countries is never easy and the FA delegation no doubt did the best they could but it really does look tough for whoever Terry's successor is. We kick-off in Moldova on Sunday September 1st 1996 and the following November travel to Georgia.

Poland provide our only home opposition in 1996, they come to Wembley on Wednesday October 9th, which means we have the advantage of three Wembley games in 1997, against Italy on February 12th, Georgia on April 30th and Moldova on September 10th. The crunch is that we have to play the critical final game away in Italy in October.

We definitely will not want to go to Italy needing a win for we have only ever won twice on Italian soil, the last time being in Rome in May 1961. The late Gerry Hitchens scored twice and Jimmy Greaves netted a third in a 3-2 win... It took England's goal tally to 44 in eight games - and Greavsy had grabbed 12 of them!

There's no Jimmy Greaves. Bobby Charlton or Johnny Haynes in the current England squad alas - they just don't seem to breed them like that anymore - so it is going to take an exceptional effort for us to improve on our current record of just one win in the last six games against Italy.

We did play them in the World Cup qualifying competition 20 years ago, when Don Revie was in charge of the national side. We lost 2-0 in Rome but then, despite a 2-0 win at Wembley on a highly emotional evening in November 1977 (Keegan and Booking were our scorers), failed to qualify for the Finals in Argentina.

Accounting then for the fact that we are likely to get little change out of Italy in Rome (or wherever) England need desperately to cash in on their trips to Moldova and Georgia and this will not be easy, bearing in mind that both recently beat Wales in the current European Championship qualifying series.

Add to this England's traditional poor performances in September and it is clear that we will be at somewhat of a disadvantage in that opening game. For while Moldova's domestic programme will be in full swing - they like the majority of European countries have a midwinter break - our lads will have only had three Premiership matches behind them by September 1st.

This could be crucial as only the winner of the group is guaranteed a ticket to France for the Finals in the summer of 1998, though the best runners-up from the nine European groups will also qualify automatically. The remaining eight runners-up will Play-Off for a place in the Finals.





Goalkeeper David Rice was called upon to make a string of fine saves and he was supported by a solid back three in which Lee Wilson was outstanding.


Daniel Pratt put in a stirling midfield performance which helped the two front runners to get about City in the manner I would like.It is good to see that the whole team are now moving in the right direction.




