

With Manager Steve McMahon

What can I say? Since I took up football as a youngster this has been my best ever season. It has been absolutely fantastic hasn't it?

In my wildest dreams I couldn't have anticipated it would go this way. I thought we had a chance this year but to do it so convincingly and with so much style, I'm very proud, I really am.

I am proud for the players - I'm just a proud man at the moment. And the players should be proud of themselves as well, after what they have achieved.

When I say that I feel a greater sense of satisfaction with this achievement than I did as a player I really do mean it. It is not like some nonsense that I have just come out with. I do feel winning this Championship has given me greater pleasure.

There's nothing better than to do it as a Manager because everybody is in it together - I don't do it on my own. As a player it is an individual thing when you do anything but as a Manager it is down to everyone around you. It is down to the players; the coaching staff; everyone connected with the Club. It is absolutely magnificent for them.

The attitude of the lads at Shrewsbury and Bradford speaks volumes. It is a natural reaction to relax once you have broken the winning tape but they went out and did the business as usual and hopefully we can continue to do it again this afternoon.

We want to go out on a winning note because winning becomes a very, very good habit, they have got to be confident now, even the players we have brought in. They are fresh faces, they are chomping at the bit and want to do particularly well so it is good.

We will need to strengthen the side by two or three players for the First Division and I will be looking

to do this. I have always said if they are better than what we have got I want to get them in.

It doesn't matter what division we participate in, the same standards apply. I believe in playing football. We have got to be strong. Physically we are strong; football wise I think we are the best in the Division and I think we have got a good mixture of both here.

Well done everyone, particularly the fans who have been magnificent. In view of what has happened here over the past two or three years you have got to take a pat on the back. You should be proud of yourselves as well. Without the fans all we have achieved would mean nothing.

Finally, could I ask you to please stay off the pitch after today's game. The trophy will be officially presented after the final whistle and then hopefully we will be doing a lap of honour. Please do not spoil the afternoon and lets enjoy it together.

Enjoy this afternoon and the summer. See you in Division One.

The Children's Society in Wiltshire

Swindon and Trowbridges are the centres of the Society's unique pioneering Infant Support Project working with Failure to Thrive in the very young from 6 months to 3 years old which has proved so successful that their work has now been launched on video and by book to spread the word nationwide. Both projects will soon be amalgamating in Chippenham where The Children's Society will be setting up a nationwide consultancy on Failure to Thrive.

Research shows that up to 1 in 20 under fives - around 185,000 children - suffer from Failure to Thrive where there is no medical cause. If left untreated this can lead to restricted growth and mental retardation. In extreme cases it can be fatal.

Also in Swindon the Family Support Project helps children with disabilities to enjoy leisure facilities not otherwise accessible by offering a network of support and by providing respite care within the home when necessary. It also offers an information service giving quidance to all families with disabled children in the area. Next month some of these children will be able to enjoy a trip on the Kennet & Avon Canal thanks to the generosity of local companies and the Bruce Trust. Your generosity today will be greatly appreciated.

With respect to the Club in its celebration of achievement, we ask that all fans refrain from going on to the pitch at any time before, during and after the game.



Tomorrow (Sunday 5th May) Swindon Town Football Club will be parading the Second Division Championship Trophy through the streets of Swindon (see map for details of the route).

The event will kick off at 11.00am at Castrol UK Headquarters in Pipers Way, Swindon.

Following a tour of the town, the 2 bus parade will reach its climax at the Civic Offices. Euclid Street, where the team will be greeted by the Mayor of Thamesdown and will appear on the balcony with the Trophy.

To keep supporters informed of the tour's progress, BBC Wiltshire Sound's Stuart Mac will be broadcasting direct from the bus both on radio 103 - 105FM and via a live link to those fans awaiting the arrival of the team at the Civic Offices.



GOALS from Alun Armstrong and young Tony Dinning last weekend kept County's hopes of a place in the play-offs simmering at Bristol Rovers' expense, securing a 2-0 victory over the Twerton Park club.

However, Stockport's success in this direction has relied very much on our influence in this final week for they needed us to peg back Bradford City on Tuesday night and then succumb to their challenge here this afternoon in the final show-down of the season to make the top six.

Quoted by the bookies at 20-1 for the Championship last August Stockport have suffered mixed fortunes after an encouraging start during which they kept clean sheets in the opening three games.

By early September Stockport were fifth in Division Two, a position they still held going into October. But though they tipped Ipswich Town out of the Coca-Cola Cup (3-2 on aggregate), and only lost 2-0 at Villa Park in that same competition, they were unable to win a League game from the end of September, when they beat Bournemouth 3-0, until December 19 when they won 1-0 at Peterborough United.

That win lifted County from 13th to 10th but is was mid-February before they were able to make further progress, winning at Swansea 3-0 and at Bradford 1-0; home to Notts

County 2-0 while in a vital game at Crewe Jeff Eckhardt's goal proved the decisive factor.

Stockport were sixth and looking dangerous but though they held Blackpool 1-1 and overwhelmed Oxford United 4-2 slip ups against the likes of Peterborough United (0-1 at home), and Wycombe (1-4 away) cost them dearly.

A 1-0 defeat at Brentford saw the Edgeley Park Side slide to ninth at the beginning of April but although a 2-1 win at Chesterfield boosted hopes these were suddenly dashed by a goalless draw at home to bottom club Hull City.

Skipper Mike Flynn reflecting on the team's inconsistency says: "It really has been the story of our season - following a great win with a poor home result."

Still in with a shout it was a 2-0 defeat at Rotherham last week that really scuppered Stockport's chance and left them relying on us to earn them a tilt at the play-offs. JIM CANNON made a return after injury in a friendly against Bangor - Andy Mutch scored twice - and was at rightback against Bristol Rovers

and TOM BENNETT might well be in line for a run out this afternoon.

NEIL EDWARDS has been an everpresent in goal Gannon has come in for Connelly at rightback with Lee Todd on the left. Mike Flynn and Matthew Bound in the middle. In midfield Chris Marsden. Paul Ware, Chris Beaumont and John Jeffers provide the backing for strikers Andy Mutch and Alun Armstrong.





Chris Beaumont

- MIDFIELD. Began his career with non-League Denaby United and was offered the chance of League soccer by Rochdale who signed him on a free transfer in July 1988. A year later he was persuaded to join Stockport County in an £8,000 deal and his versatility has proved a great asset to the team. Chris has turned out at right back, and up front as well as in his favoured midfield role and has scored 39 goals in just over 253 appearances Born: Sheffield 5-12-65.

Matthew Bound

- CENTRAL DEFENDER, A former trainee at the Dell, Matthew emerged as a commanding figure and captained the Southampton reserve side. He played in five Premiership games for the Saints but with Dutchman Ken Monkou in commanding form his opportunities were severely limited. Joined Hull City on loan but it was former County boss Danny Bergara who persuaded Alan Ball to let him go for £100,000 in October 1994. A strong dependable centre-half Matt made his debut in the 1-0 win at Leyton Orient. Made 17 appearances last season (1 goal against Scarborough in the AWS) and has been an ever-present in the County defence since the 1-0 win at Peterborough on December 19, 1995. Born: Trowbridge 9-11-72



Sean Connelly

- DEFENDER, Joined Stockport on a free transfer from Hallam in August 1992, he made his 120th appearance in the 3-0 win over York a fortnight ago. An effective all round defender - he is comfortable anywhere across the back - who is also a qualified physiotherapist and often provides cover for Rodger Wylde. Ironically, Sean had some injury problems of his own last season but still managed to make 43 appearances. Has played right back this season but has still to score for the club. Born: Sheffield 26-6-70.

Matt Dickins

- GOALKEEPER. Signed after a successful loan spell in March 1995 and featured in a dozen games at the end of last season after making his debut as a sub in a 3-2 home defeat by York but has yet to get a game this season. A trainee with Sheffield United he moved to Lincoln City on a free in February 1991 but his big break happened in March 1992 when Blackburn Rovers paid £250,000 for his registration. In the shadows of Flowers and Mimms he didn't get a chance and after a loan spell with Blackpool he tried his luck at Edgeley Park. Born: Sheffield 3-9-70.


Keiron Durkan

- RIGHT WING, Line-hugging winger signed from Wrexham for £75,000 on transfer deadline day (March '96) he ironically made his debut in a 3-2 win at the Racecourse Ground. Now coming to the end of his fourth season as a professional he played in 28 League games for Wrexham last season following an unfortunate injury to Mark Taylor but was only on the fringe this term. Born: Chester 1-12-73.

Jeff Eckhardt

- MIDFIELD. Coming to the end of his second season with County after a £50,000 move in July 1994. Began his career with Sheffield United in August 1984 and made nearly 90 appearances for the Blades following his debut in a 3-1 win at Crystal Palace (30-3-85). Fulham paid £50,000 for him in 1987 and in seven seasons at Craven Cottage he clocked up 270 games. He scored two against Stockport at Edgeley Park during the 1993-94 season and obviously impressed the home team management who swooped to take him there. Has scored 11 goals this season, Born: Sheffield 7-10-65.

Neil Edwards
- Goalkeeper. A trainee with Leeds United he was allowed to move to Stockport for £10,000 in September 1991. Despite his lack of inches - he is five-foot-eight -Neil's enormous agility and quick reflexes have earned him Welsh Under-21 honours and the firm support of fans. Was troubled by injuries last season but has been an ever-present this term and made his 160th appearance in the 0-0 draw with Hull on April 20, 1996. Born: Aberdare 5-12-70

Michael Flynn

- DEFENDER. Player of the Year last season and skipper of the side big Mike is a very influential figure on the field. A former Oldham Athletic apprentice he made 45 appearances before switching to Norwich City in a £100,000 deal in December 1988. A year later he joined Preston for £125,000 and chalked up over 150 games before joining County in March 1993 for a club record £150,000.

Made his 140th appearance for County at Chesterfield last month. Born: Oldham 23-2-69.J



Jeff Jeffers

- MIDFIELD. Former Liverpool youngster who made his name with Port Vale. Went to Anfield from school in 1987 but had to wait until he joined the Potteries side for regular first team football. Stockport were interested in him last year but were put off by an £80.000 price tag. Their patience was rewarded when they picked him up on a free, A left sided player he made his County debut as a sub in the 1-1 draw with us on November 18, 1995.

Born: Liverpool 5-10-68.

Chris Marsden

- MIDFIELD. Signed in February 1996 from Notts County after a month on loan at Edgeley Park. Notts had paid Wolves £250,000 for his services in November 1994 after Chris had been unable to secure a regular place in the Wolves eleven. Scored on his Notts debut in a 3-3 draw with Venezia in the AIC. Previously served with Sheffield United and Coventry City. Scored his first goal for County in the 4-2 win over Oxford (30-3-96). Born: Sheffield 3-1-69.

Andy Mutch

- STRIKER. Andy was on our books until his contract was ended earlier this year having not played for the first team this season. Andy had been signed by John Gorman from Wolves for £250,000 in August 1993 but was never able to reproduce the prolific marksmanship he displayed at Molineux during a highly successful partnership with Steve Bull that produced 97 goals from him in 289 appearances. Made his debut for County in the 3-2 win at Wrexham (16-3-96) and scored his first goal v Brighton and a hat-trick in the 4-2 victory over Oxford United. Born: Liverpool 28-12-63.

Paul Ware

- MIDFIELD. A trainee with Stoke City he played some 150 (10 goals) games for the Potters and a second Division Championship medal in 1993. Moved to County in September 1994, for £10,000 and made his bow, as a sub, in a Coca Coia defeat by Sheffield United. A competitive midfielder with skill and vision he has recovered from a hernia operation.

Born: Congleton 7-10-70.

<u>Mark Lloyd Williams</u>

- STRIKER. Hit the headlines with a bucketful of goals for Bagnor City in the Konica League and had scored over 30 last season when County beat a trail of League clubs to his signature. It cost them £10,000 and he made his League debut at Rotherham in the final game of the 1994-95 season. This term he has been gradually introduced to Second Division football and he has one goal in 20 appearances. Born: 8-2-73.



Dave Jones took over as team manager on Friday, 31st March 1995. Liverpool born and bred he joined Everton as a 15-year-old and worked his way through the grades to attain professional status as a centre-half.

Soon established himself in the senior side and was a virtual everpresent until 1981, having gained international recognition from England at Youth and Under-21 levels. Coventry City paid £275,000 to take him to Highfield Road in 1981. Unfortunately a serious knee injury ended his time there prematurely.

However, he overcame the problem and went to Hong Kong where he had two good seasons with Seiko but any ambitions of getting back into League soccer were dampened when medical advice suggested he stop playing.

His heart ruled his head and he got in another two seasons with Preston North End before hanging up his boots after more than 300 Football League games.

Cut his managerial teeth in non-League football with Southport, Mossley and Morecombe before being recruited to the Edgeley Park staff as Chief Coach in July 1990.


Established himself as Danny Bergara's right hand man and was the obvious choice to succeed him when he left. John Sainty, the former Spurs striker is his assistant.

Under the Spotlight

Alun Armstrong is being hailed as the find of the year by Stockport County fans who have watched him develop and mature to emerge as this season's star man.

A Geordie, he joined Newcastle
United as a trainee but such is the
quality and quantity available to
Kevin Keegan these days young
Alun found it difficult to oust the
likes of Peter Beardsley, Robert Lee,
Ruel Fox, Andy Cole and Malcolm
Allen from the Magpies first team.

While it can be absolutely stimulating working with such class players it can also be frustrating when you are a young pro trying to make the grade and finding first team opportunities virtually non-



existent so when the opportunity to move to Stockport County arose Alun saw it as a positive step forward on his career ladder.

In July 1994 he moved to Edgeley Park. It proved one of the best ever made. Alun scored on his
League debut on the opening day
of the 1994-95 season and finished
the campaign as the top scorer
with 14 goals in 40 (5) League
appearances and one in the
Coca-Cola Cup.

Already established as a firm favourite with Edgeley Park fans he started this season as he finished the last with 3 goals in the opening six games and with three games to play he had already topped last season's haul with 17 goals to his credit.

An unmistakable figure with his six-foot frame and bleach-blonde thatch Alun, who was 21 on February 22nd, has gained a lot of admirers for his ability at putting the ball in the net.





Away from home opponents feel more obliged to entertain their crowd and that has given us the opportunity to play a little bit more and we have managed to get 13 wins which is a fantastic achievement.

Going back to the support all I want to say is thanks for everything. Home and away you have been inspirational throughout the season. Let's hope we can go out on a nice note and enjoy the day.

Everyone has their own individual highlight from the season. The biggest thing for me is that we have been able to turn around and say we achieved what we set out to do. Last year we asked the supporters to give us a chance; they gave us a chance and we have delivered. We wanted to show that we could get a team together that was going to be worthy of promotion. We have managed to do that.

The biggest relief for me was at Blackpool when we clinched promotion. I was more relieved and delighted that day than anything else because we had actually achieved what we wanted to do. The ultimate objective was to get back to Division One. The Championship



at Chesterfield was just the icing on the cake as far as I was concerned.

Winning titles is not easy. Managers have been saying to us all season that we are the best team, we will definitely go up, but you have still got to go and do it. You have still got to achieve it and overcome the ups and downs and get there. We believed we were the best but it still had to be proved. So the satisfaction of achieving the final goal has been immense.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE A YEAR MAKES.
Those tears of desperation following a second successive demotion in the spring of 1995 have been replaced by tears of joy as Swindon Town bounce straight back to Division One as proud and rightful Champions.

Promotion was clinched aptly in an epic 1-1 draw at Bloomfield Road when second placed Blackpool played hosts to table topping Town and the Championship, that is so rightly ours, was confirmed three days later at Saltergate.

It must be said that in deepest Wiltshire success was never doubted though in the summer of 1995 the bookies tipped us only at 9-1 alongside Brentford and behind 7-1 favourites Carlisle United and Burnley at 8-1.


Steve McMahon had made some inspired signings during his first summer in charge. The arrival of big striker Wayne Allison from Bristol City for £475,000 was a major catch while the

impressive Mark Seagraves was pinched from

Bolton Wanderers for only £100,000 and even better, from a financial angle, striker Steve Finney who was signed on a free transfer from the Gaffer's old club Manchester City.

All three were to play a significant role in Town's success.

Other names were to be added to the 'roll of honour as the season developed and none had more impact than the irresistible Paul Allen alongside



stalwarts such as skipper Shaun Taylor, Paul Bodin and lan Culverhouse; Mark Robinson and Kevin Horlock, not to mention the manager's own contribution on the field of play.

As the season approached the Gaffer couldn't wait to get started on his first full season in charge. He vowed Town could get out of Division Two by playing football. He was as good as his word.

Mind you there were a few worries before the big kickoff at Hull City on August 12. Goalkeeper Fraser Digby was injured, number two Nicky Hammond had been transferred to Plymouth Argyle for £40,000, and the manager had to hurriedly recruit Shay Given on loan from Blackburn Rovers.

Another forced change to plans involved Peter Thorne, the first choice striker. He too was unable to play and so young Steve Finney waltzed out for his League debut. He proved a fair replacement netting the

only goal of the match in the



Shamus Given, six-three tall and still only 19. maintained another clean sheet against

York City while Finney took just a

minute to score on his home debut and 60 minutes to make it two and enhance his reputation. The Gaffer suggested there was still a lot more in his play to come yet. Paul Bodin converted a penalty in between Finney's two goals.

> It was young Edwin Murray who turned up trumps at Carlisle. Thrown in as an emergency striker he crashed in a spectacular 20-yard volley to maintain Town's 100 per cent record.

Swindon were top of Division Two, two points clear of Swansea City, as Oxford United rolled into town. Over 13,000 were here to enjoy the fun that night and cheer Wayne Allison's first goal for the Club. Unfortunately Given was beaten for the first time and we had to settle for a share of the spoils.

RECORD START

The team's response was an emphatic 2-0 win at Brentford, sparked by a brilliant 38th minute solo effort from Wayne O'Sullivan. Another Steve Finney strike in the second-half clinched the points.

The lead at the top was now three points over Blackpool as Frank Talia, also on loan from Ewood Park, took over in goal against Chesterfield. He

was beaten in nine minutes by kevin Davies but Wayne Allison shot in a 46th minute equaliser and we could so easily have clinched the game in the 71st; Steve McMahon's effort coming back out off the underside of the crossbar. It brought back memories of England's World Cup triumph over Germany on 1966, Macca reflecting, "unfortunately this time the Russian

linesman wasn't around to give it." The Bradford City game had all the trimmings of a top of the table clash. It was first v second with just a point in it and Town putting up an unbeaten record against a City side undefeated away from home. No one was disappointed, Allison,

Finney, Horlock and Robinson all on target in a thoroughly convincing 4-1 win, with Steve Finney's goal an absolute peach after a dazzling build-up of some two dozen passes before lan Culverhouse

delivered the ball for the striker to crash home.

If Kevin Horlock put the icing on the cake with our fourth against Bradford then he supplied the main ingredients at Twerton Park with a splendid hat-trick. Shaun Taylor also weighed in with his first of the season for another 4-1 victory over derby rivals Bristol Rovers.

The place was really buzzing when Ty Gooden scored the winner from 30 yards against Rotherham United. Nine games without defeat equalled our best ever start to a League season, though Australian custodian Frank Talia shared the headlines. He made the save of the match in the 54th minute when he came out to foil

top shot Shaun Goater. Ten minutes later sub Gooden smashed in his winner.

> Expectations were high for the trip to Wrexham and we should have been able to set a new unbeaten Club record after going two goals up courtesy of Wayne Allison. But Steve McMahon's warnings against

complacency were not heeded and Wrexham came back 2-2. Peter Thorne then restored out lead only for the Welshmen to strike twice more to win 4-3.

Before the kick-off Steve McMahon was presented with his first Manager of the Month award then in

typical barn-storming way he controlled midfield to help steer us to a 2-0 victory. After Wayne O'Sullivan had given us a 12th minute lead it could have been all over at 2-0 twenty minutes later but Paul Bodin missed

from the penalty spot. No damage done however, Wayne Allison scrambling in a killer goal against his former club two minutes from time.

"We are slowly getting sorted,"

claimed the Gaffer. No one surely doubted his word. But Blackpool, winners at Brentford, and Crewe, winners at Chesterfield, were sticking close.

Two strikes from Steve Finney in the 17th and 37th minutes, and one from Kevin Horlock in the 44th put the skids under Brighton at the Goldstone

Ground. Blackpool, held at home by Chesterfield, had lost ground to Crewe whose next engagement was at The County Ground.

Thus, we had a repeat of the Bradford scenario with the top against second and all the focus such games attract. The game lived up to expectations and it was perhaps fitting that an enthralling match should be decided by a Steve Finney penalty just three minutes from time.

Wayne Allison had put us in front only for Steve Garvey to grab an equaliser in the 78th minute while Paul Allen, making his first League start in our colours, looked impressive.

Notts County had crept into second place virtue of a 3-0 win at Twerton Park and for the third time it was top v second as we breezed into Meadow Lane.

It took just eight minutes for Shaun Taylor to head us in front and though Andy Legg equalised on the quarter

hour the gulf in class was evident throughout and the final result of 3-1 - Paul Bodin and Taylor again - was hardly a true reflection of our supremacy.

October ended with a goalless draw at Bournemouth but it had been a good month with four wins and one draw.

December's League programme kicked off on a positive note with Steve Finney netting twice without reply at Rotherham. This was a gritty professional performance summed up by Mark Robinson like this:

"We may not have played pretty football, but it was effective."

At home two more points went begging following a 1-1 draw with Wrexham; Wayne O'Sullivan grabbing the point when he headed in his third goal of the season from

Paul Allen's deft cross before Wrexham capitalised on a gifted penalty four minutes from time. The decision so incensed the Gaffer he refused to comment on it.

Crewe, 1-0 winners at Notts County, were now two points behind us with the same number of games played. There was little room now for error.

The pre-Christmas trip to Walsall proved goalless and the state of the pitch for the home game with Wycombe Wanderers had Peter Thorne insisting the match should have been frozen off. There was certainly little good cheer in another 0-0 draw.

Crewe had now leap-frogged into poll position above us by virtue of the fact that they had scored more goals. 42 against our 36.

As the home game with Burnley, and the New Year's day trip to peterborough were postponed because of snow Town opened their 1996 League campaign with a 3-0 home win over Swansea City. Wayne O'Sullivan was back in the side as Shaun Taylor was injured, but

2 goals from Peter Thorne and another from Wavne Allison and a fourth successive clean sheet from Fraser Digby emphasised the gulf between the two sides.

This win put is back on top of the League ladder and given he good away form and York City's lowly position optimism was high at Bootham Crescent. The lads put on an exhibition of accurate passing in the first half but after the break folded and the 2-0 defeat prompted Steve McMahon to comment: "I Have no

excuses. Our performance, or rather the lack of it, made me very angry."

The boss continued: "Winning doesn't come easy, you can't just go out on the field and expect success to come your way. You have to earn that right and you need a hunger, a passion to succeed and total commitment to achieve your goal."

Fraser Digby and Paul Allen were the only ones to escape criticism but our league position was not affected as Crewe went down 3-2 at Bristol City.

Steve McMahon was still trouble by a knee injury that had kept him out of team action since the pre-Christmas game at Walsall and straight after the trip to York he went into hospital for a menisectomy to his right knee to remove a piece of torn cartilage.

The lads bounced back with a comfortable 3-0 win over Hull City with Peter Thorne opening the account just after the break; young Tony Thorne, on loan from Everton, making a scoring debut and Kevin Horlock claiming his ninth goal of the season.

Crewe kept within three points by beating Wycombe 2-0 while Blackpool and Notts County were locked together seven points behind but with games in hand.

Despite the cluttered fixture list and an FA Cup replay with Southampton February was negotiated without defeat

in Division Two. Three wins over Carlisle United,

Swansea City (away), and Bristol Rovers supplemented by a home draw with Brentford.

Skipper Shaun Taylor returned to the side for the game against Carlisle after missing three matches because of a tom hamstring. The visitors were never really in the running and goals from Peter Thorne and Wayne Allison were enough to stretch the gap at the top to six points as Crewe's game with York was postponed.

Mind you the Gaffer was not too pleased when Delap was allowed to steal a consolation goal in the 83rd minute to cost Fraser his eighth clean sheet in 10 league and cup games.

Martin Ling, Ty Gooden and Tony Grant were in sparkling form in midfield at the Vetch, never allowing Swansea to get a look in and really the one-nil scoreline did not do us justice. But it was another clean-sheet and a fine winner from Shaun Taylor, who netted in the 28th minute.

Perhaps it was the aftermath of cup euphoria following our 1-1 draw with Premiership Southampton that caught up with us against Brentford though the boss did not see why it should. Disappointed with the 2-2 draw he reflected that "on the night I think we had only three maybe four players who could be satisfied with their contribution."

Our closest rivals in the Championship chase had slipped up both on Saturday and the night before leaving us eight points clear and manager McMahon said "we are making it hard for ourselves. We keep shooting ourselves in the foot."

Thankfully Ty Gooden and Wayne Allison - his 14th goal of the season - had shot the other way to snatch at least a point and extend the unbeaten run in league and cup to six.

Derby clashes being what they are there was a hint of caution in the air prior to the home game with Bristol Rovers, whose new year record was five wins and two draws. It was probably the ideal fixture at this time for there was no room for complacency.

This lesson was quickly rammed home when Rovers took the lead in the 12th minute through Stewart. It

took 67 anxious minutes to reply through Wayne Allison and at that stage a draw seemed all we could expect. But Shaun Taylor seems to make a habit of scoring against our near neighbours, and he did so again this afternoon, leading by example with the winning thrust just ten-minutes from time.

The lead wa now down to three points but it was Blackpool who had emerged as the new challengers - taking advantage of Crewe's and our cup commitments to forge into second place.

Seven games were crowded into a March programme which produced heartaches and joy as the marathon edged towards the final furlongs.

We got off to a great start at Wycombe where Ty Gooden gave us a fourth minute lead with a tremendous 25-yarder against his former club. It looked all over when Peter Thorne squeezed in a second goal fifteen minutes later but then we took the foot off the pedal and allowed Wycombe to drift back into the game.

"We were not clinical enough. We should be killing teams off and be more ruthless." rapped McMahon afterwards but it was a victory that was very much needed as Blackpool won 1-0 at Burnley and Crewe won 3-2 at Wrexham.

The Tangerines had closed the gap to two points but had played three more games than us. Crewe, with one more game than us on the slate, were three points adrift.

The 2-0 victory at Peterborough United was dubbed "a very good professional performance," by the Swindon chief. On a mud heap of a London Road pitch Town, with Paul Allen back in midfield after a thigh strain, completely dominated the Posh and were never ever troubled by the home attack.

Two great goals from Wayne Allison and Steve Finney, who lobbed Posh goalkeeper Jon Sheffield with a shot that would have graced any game, clinched the points. The race between the two strikers was an intriguing contest within a contest. Both now had 16 goals on the score card.

Alas, Finney's challenge for top shot was to end 11 days later at Turf Moor where he suffered a hairline fracture just above the ankle and so Wayne was given the opportunity to edge ahead.

Shaun Taylor looked to have won us the game when he scored with an 84th minute header against Walsall but Scott Houghton equalised in injury time to steal a point for the Saddlers and deny us two.

It was another frustrating afternoon for home fans who have yet to see the best of the Champions. One problem is the negative tactics adopted by most sides visiting the County Ground. We have earned such respect that teams are frightened to extend themselves against us.

Typically Steve McMahon said it was roll your sleeves up time. His rally call asked the players "to pull their socks up, dig deep and prove they want to play First Division football net season."

The goalless draw at Burnley saw more points unjustly taken from our grasp - we should have had a penalty as is mentioned later - and these upsets, plus a pride sapping 3-0 defeat at Oxford United, allowed Blackpool to ease us from poll position, first on the strength of one more goal scored, then by a margin of two points.

With transfer deadline day drawing close and the injury to Steve Finney depleting the attacking ranks the manager was looking to freshen things up with a couple of new faces.

> The Finney incident at Burnley had been particularly galling because the referee was the only man in the

ground who didn't see the challenge on him as a foul. "It should have been a penalty." insisted Andy Rowland who saw it like this:

"Steve Finney had gone into the box, beaten a couple of players, was about to shoot and was fouled. The referee ran over to him and said, get up, he didn't touch you."

Obviously it was more serious than that. Steve knew he had been fouled and if you saw his ankle afterwards it was obvious he did not do it tripping over the ball."

So we had not only been robbed of a possible match winning spot kick but of the services of one of our most potent goal getters too.

The vastly experienced David preece was introduced for the home game with Peterborough. Signed on loan from Derby County he was an instant hit as a midfield dynamo.

After 'big Chief' had given us the lead in the 11th minute and Peter Thorne had added another five minutes later the game was virtually won. Frank Talia, now a £100,000 recruit and in goal since the beginning of the month, comfortably kept a third clean sheet.

A 3-1 win over Carlisle kept Blackpool on top but Crewe, beaten at home by Bradford City, lost valuable ground. They were now seven points below us having played two games more. It was a nice little cushion we hoped to improve.

"I thought we gave a good account of ourselves at

Bristol City, we played quite well and were unlucky, in my opinion, not to have won the game," insisted the Gaffer who pointed out.

"After the Oxford game we had to get back to basics and start again doing the right things. Fortunately in the last two games I think we have."

If March had proved a busy month it was nothing to what was to come. Ten games to complete in April, five of them away from home.

Not many teams would have relished such a challenge but given our tremendous away form nothing looked impossible. It seemed even now inevitable that Town would go up and indeed as Champions. Even so nothing can be taken for granted in this game as Brighton aptly reminded us.

It was second from top against second from bottom, a walk over on paper, and with Blackpool going down 1-0 at Chesterfield the night before - almost as good as a win for us - all was set for the win that would take us to within two points of the leaders.

But after a tentative start we found Brighton's defensive resolve sound enough and all the prompting and probing in midfield couldn't open them up. Then just before the stroke of half-time a lapse of concentration gave Peter Thorne a half-chance. One nil driven in low from close range!

Within 32 seconds of the restart it was 2-0. A quicksilver move down and left, Paul Bodin's perfect cross and Wayne Allison produced the finish that mattered. We expected the lads to take them apart but it was Brighton who responded. Minton made it 2-1 and unbelievably it was 2-2 in the 69th minute.

Were we to suffer a classic upset? Was this a case of promotion wobbles? The lads managed to steady themselves and it was Thorney who came up trumps with an 85th minute winner. Our 21st victory of the season.

It might have been a shaky show but we were now breathing down Blackpool's neck and more significantly had opened up an eight point advantage over Crewe which in real terms was the difference of three wins.

This position looked even firmer after a 1-0 win over rivals Notts County on Easter Saturday; Kevin Horlock firing us back to the top of the table in the 89th minute with a spectacular overhead kick. What a treasure that goal proved as Blackpool tripped up at Oxford and Crewe came tumbling down at Brentford.

But there was even better to come. All season we had been anticipating the Easter Monday trip to Crewe could be a promotion decider. It wasn't quite like that after Crewe lost ground following the sale of three of their players but it was none the less still a crucial challenge.

There were no worries however as the boys put on a super show, Kevin Horlock turning up the power on Town's turbo charged return to Division One. He scored again, this time with a header from Wayne Allison's cross in the 27th minute.

A fiercely contested contest was really put beyond Crewe's reach when David Preece claimed his first goal for us, with a crisp shot from outside the box just after the break.

With Blackpool losing at home to ten-man Rotherham United the path to the title was beginning to look greener. Town now had 81 points from 39 playerd. Blackpool 77 points from 42 starts; and Oxford, now third, 70 points from 41 games.

What an Easter it had been for us with a maximum haul of nine points and Bournemouth and Burnley to play at home.

Kevin Horlock's scoring run continued against Bournemouth but it wasn't the display the Gaffer was hoping for. The spirited Cherries rocked us with goals in the 31st and 68th minutes (both from former Hammer Steve Jones) and could have been three-up at one stage. But two great efforts from another ex-Hammer, Kevin Horlock, salvaged a point.

Steve didn't want to talk about that one the only saving grace being Blackpool drawing 1-1 at Bristol Rovers; Notts County 0-0 at Brentford; and Oxford without a game.

"We should be going out there and burying teams

at this stage of the season. I see no reason why not I really don't." he reflected.

If players weren't affected the fans certainly were. You could almost hear the nerves jangling through the

stand prior to the game with relegation haunted Burnley. Though no one really doubted we would make it the stutter in the advance on the title did nothing to ease the tension.

After two years of failure Town fans were on the brink of euphoria they didn't want to slip the wrong way.

The Championship was there almost in touching distance. If we had beaten Bournemouth we would have been one win away from promotion. If, though is a word so often used in football and it really counts for nothing.

Steve was quite candid about it. He said: "There's nothing I can so to change things - the players have to do that. They know there is such a reward at the end of It. We have to be more committed, more passionate."

The commitment was there against the Clarets but not the spoils of battle. A no-score draw easing us five points clear of Blackpool with two games in hand.

A Town victory at Bloomfield Road would clinch the title and the hype leading up to this all-ticket showdown matched the importance of the event.

Fraser Digby was recalled to goal as Frank Talia suffered an ankle injury in training but Steve McMahon resisted the temptation to make a comeback and fielded the following combination: Digby, Culverhouse, Bodin, Preece, Allen, Taylor, Robinson, Leitch, Thorne, Allison, Horlock...Seagraves, O'Sullivan and Cowe were to be brought on as substitutes for Allen, Leitch and Thorne during the afternoon.

The historical facts showed that Town had won only once at Bloomfield Road, and that was way back in the season of 1979-80, and of course this time they had their own Championship dreams still to play for so were certainly not going to give us an easy passage.

With Town boasting a phenomenal away record, with just 14 goals conceded in 19 journeys, it all added up to a titanic contest and that is what we got.

When Kevin Horlock fired us ahead in the 15th minute you knew this was going to be a momentous afternoon. Wayne Allison headed down and Kevin's right foot did the rest - his 15th goal of the season.

Town looked comfortable until a 25-yard effort from fullback Andy Barlow squeezed inside Fraser's near post for an unexpected equaliser in the 61st minute. This invigorated the Seasiders who might have snatched a victory in the closing stages.

But 1-1 it remained and Town had bounced back to Division One within a year and were now just two points away from the Championship.

It was perhaps apt that promotion should be achieved in the shadow of Britain's biggest roller-coaster for in the past five years we have been up and down to the Premiership and back. Shaun Taylor has experienced it all.

He says: "I have played in all the divisions since I came here, including two promotions and a double relegation. So I know how much this success means to our fans."

The Gaffer emphasised how important it had been to check the slide:

"We needed to bounce back quickly after the last two years otherwise we might have fallen into a rut," he said.

"There has been no stability at the Club for the past five years and we need it now. For me this is the best feeling of all, it is at the top of the tree in my career."

He wasn't quite right for there was another branch to negotiate - the title itself. This was to come three days later at Saltergate, the home of Chesterfield, who themselves were battling for a play-off place.



The Championship was signed, sealed and delivered with a convincing 3-1 victory and the quality of the performance reflects the strength of McMahon's squad. For he had no less than seven first team players unavailable for selection yet the gulf between us and the Spireites was enormous.

In truth, Chesterfield, boasting one of the best home records in the division, hardly threatened us with no less than three changes in midfield we controlled the game from start to finish.

It was a big night for young Steven Cowe who scored the opening goal on his full League debut and although Hewitt pulled Chesterfield level on the half-hour Peter Thorne hit back with number two a minute later.

Town were firmly in charge and the Championship was ours when Wayne Allison scored his 19th goal of the season eleven minutes from time. As the cry Champions, Champions, Champions, filled the air a jubilant McMahon beamed: "This is way out in front of anything I have ever experienced as a player."

Promotion secured with four games to go; the title clinched with three to play this really has been a tremendous achievement. It is the culmination of hard work and dedication from management, coaches and players and to be truthful has always seemed to be our destiny from the day the very first League table was published last August.

Town have led the way, not only in terms of success, but in entertainment value and the quality of our game. Apart from token challenges from Crewe and Blackpool, who both had short spells at the helm, we have led the table for most of the season and the final crowning was nothing short of just reward.

Consistency is the lifeblood of champions and we have certainly had bucketfulls this season, both home and away. In fact looking at our title record our away figures are almost identical to our achievements at home.

This is the breakdown over the 43 games which won the title:

None of the other contenders came anywhere close to our away form. Blackpool won eight games, Crewe nine. Oxford only six. It promises then to be a fantastic finale to our CHAMPIONSHIP year.

The opposition was experienced but I expected more out of our professionals. They have been doing well for the kids so maybe against Ipswich it was one of those games when nothing went right for them. But it is disappointing for once the pro's don't help the kids go into their shells because they are not used to the standard and get dragged all over instead of keeping their shape.

Given Norwich's position in the league and the quality of their team the 3-1 defeat to them was a much better performance. The front two and Pattimore did very well, the one sour note being the injury to Dean Hooper that left him in hospital with cracked ribs and a punctured lung.

Bristol City scored in the first minute - Eddie Murray made it 1-1 in the second minute and that's the way it stayed in our final home game of the season.


The fact that we produced cleansheets in both games is a credit to solid defensive performances but most of all to some excellent goalkeeping from Jonathan Haines,

It has been a tremendously exciting season for all of us and to be able to put our feet up this summer and look forward to First Division football next season is going to be a great stimulant.


