

ABBEYDALE ... you will be aware that our bid for National Lottery funding towards the proposed development of facilities at Abbeydale Grange School was turned down, and also that we re-submitted it.

That has now been withdrawn in the light of recent discussions between Chairman, Mike McDonald, the leaders of the Sheffield City Council, and local MP's such as Richard Caborn.

The reason? Sheffield's plan to bid for the National Academy of Sport which Abbeydale, the Council and the City's professional clubs, including ourselves and Sheffield

It is true that in recent months there has been considerable harmony and good will between United and the City Council, certainly more so than in previous regimes, and each side has tried to appreciate the others efforts in matters pertaining to development.

We, therefore, wish to support the City's bid which will include Abbeydale as one of three centres for soccer excellence in the city (the others being at Sheffield Wednesday's proposed new training ground and at Don Valley itself).

As a result, our bid will be redrafted but will emphasise the link between the two proposals, thus strengthening the case for both.

The first real taste of winter brought a lot of disruption last week and we had a wasted journey and an overnight stay for the Crystal Palace fixture that fell victim to the snow and heavy rain. It all gets very frustrating, especially when such an experience not only leaves the players keyed up for a game that never happens, but then stops us giving them appropriate training during the rest of the week.

On the morning of the scheduled match snow started falling at our Hotel at around eight in the morning. The best we could manage in the shape of exercise was a walk after breakfast whist waiting anxiously for telephone calls about a decision because, at that stage. the match at Selhurst Park, half an hour away, was still on. Snow wasn't settling there but there was a lot of heavy rain and, in the end, that is what caused the postponement when the pitch became waterlogged after the covers were removed.

Naturally, we had a lengthy and slow trip back up north through the bad weather and should record here the thanks and admiration of us all at Sheffield United for the loyalty and fortitude they showed in such an awkward situation. We appreciate that a financial commitment was made in many cases and it's no fun having to travel a long distance whilst wondering all the time, "Is it on or off?" Let's all hope for a mild winter and no more postponements.

training prevented us working on
them for the rest of the week so
again we weren't able to put into
practice the training programme we
would have liked leading up to the
Bolton game.

Although our own pitch was in good condition, owing to the effect of the undersoil heating which was on virtually all week, we had to protect it as much as we could for the game. I am very much aware that we suffered a bit through using the pitch to train on when I first came, and that contributed to the surface being affected not


Premiership football this season with Derby County.

I have commented on Phil Starbuck's unusual career move elsewhere in tonight's programme and hope it works out well for him in Holland.







## ROGER ANSWERS THE CALL TO ARMS

Game off for the Blades - but Roger gets the chance to stake his International claim

ROGER NILSEN has become firmly established in our defence and has made the adjustment to English football with comparative ease. He can consider himself a first-team regular, despite the changes on the playing front that were inevitable when Howard Kendall took over.

There is no question about his pedigree here, but his International appearances have been few and far between since he came to Bramall Lane in November 1993.

A full stint against Switzerland two weeks ago has not convinced him that his return at that level is going to be a permanent one.

"I don't think I'm really in the present manager's plans," he revealed this week, "and I expect to be out of the next squad he names unless there are as many injuries as there were coming up to the Switzerland World Cup qualifier."

Unavailability of players like Liverpool's Stig Bjornebye brought about a last minute call-up for Roger just three days before we were scheduled to play tonight's opponents here. With Alan Kelly and Gareth Taylor already away on International duty that meant the automatic postponement of the League game - and a far from smooth quick exit for the blond full-back.

He was hurriedly given a flight ticket to Berne and then had to travel to Zurich to join up with his team-mates for the match, but there was no-one to meet him off the plane and no instructions as to where to head from there! A heavy telephone session was successfully negotiated to track down the squad and all was eventually well.

To beat such a fancied side as Switzerland 1-0 on their own soil was a very creditable result and Roger is optimistic about his nation's prospects.

"We won comfortably and, having three wins from three games, we have to be confident of making it to France for the Finals in 1998. Our next official game is, I think, in February so we can relax over the New Year without the pressure of worrying about making up lost ground."

When Roger and Jostein Flo first signed for the Blades Norway were building a reputation as a team to be feared, but lost their way a little. Now, after a transitional period, they are becoming strong again and appear to be developing an increasingly

large share of the promising young striker market.

Ole Gunnar
Solskjaer made an immediate impression this season at
Manchester United but was only on the bench against
Switzerland. Now Spurs, Liverpool and Blackburn are competing for the 20

Liverpool and Blackburn are competing for the 20 year old Rosenberg youngster Steffen Iverson who is rated at £2. 3 million. Jostein's younger brother, Torre Andre Flo is presently occupying the wide right role for Norway that older brother, Jostein, used to fill.

But at least Roger felt at home with his fellow back-four members in Zurich, who all play their League football in England - Ronny Johnsen at Manchester United, Alf-Inge Haaland at Forest and Henning Berg at Blackburn, Having current

Assistant Manager NIGEL SPACKMAN hasn't had the best of opportunities to stake a regular claim to a first-team place in recent weeks as he has battled to shake off a leg injury, but he has been kept busy in a variety of roles that all contribute to his position at the Club.

Thursday and Friday, which was matchday, were long and hectic but had a touch of glamour thrown in as he faced the often nervewracking business of being in front of the TV cameras on numerous occasions - and then on Saturday morning it was back to basics at


Bramall Lane.

He's become an experienced campaigner at dealing with the media over the years, acquiring the skills of communication in countless after-match interviews as a player with very high-profile clubs in England and Scotland, and then more recently as a summariser or panel guest on football programmes on radio and television.

He is going to get a whole lot more of the same as he makes the transition to full managership one day, but he already has a relaxed and confident style that will stand him in good stead. And his experiences last week should certainly help him to think on his feet and be prepared for any eventuality.

United's Christmas video - a kind of resume of the first half of this season - is well under way and Nigel was one of a number of Blades' stars, including David Holdsworth, Don Hutchison, Gareth Taylor and Mark Patterson, who were interviewed for it straight after training on Thursday.

Midway through Nigel's interview, which took place in the



Boardroom, the telephone rang, an interruption that lead to much amusement but necessitated the halting of proceedings and a reshoot after he had answered it and the call wasn't even for him!

As soon as that was over he was summoned at short notice to stand in for someone else as Sky TV's profiled personality which was recorded and put out before the match itself. A quick jog to Sky's temporary studio for the day at the Lane put him straight in the hot seat to answer a barrage of questions which, given his late call-up, he had little time to prepare for. The situation was made that bit more bizarre by the fact that Televideo, who produce United's videos, popped in to film Sky filming Nigel - talk about "us, watching you, watching us!"

Nigel says, "It was quite good fun, really, although they did ask me to tell a joke and I said the only clean one I knew was one of John Bailey's - but no-one could understand it anyway!"

Although Howard Kendall did the pre-match interview for Sky, Nigel was pressed into service afterwards to comment on the game and almost immediately was whisked away by Chief Executive, Charles Green, to Pond's Forge Sports Centre in the city for an appearance on the BBC's Children in Need special.

The pair were able to hand over a cheque for over £2,000 as a result of United's £1 pledge for every child who came to the game free of charge as part of an organised school or youth group. The figure was boosted by a collection at the ground and an auction winning £120 pledge from Blades fan Peter Gillott of Castleton who had a VIP evening with the Chairman in the Director's Box as a result of his successful bid on Radio Sheffield.

There was no morning off for Nigel on Saturday. He was back on duty in the Bramall Lane gymnasium working with the Reserves in preparation for last night's re-arranged game against Leicester City at the Don Valley Stadium. At least he had a rest from the cameras.

#### WHEN PORT VALE IS HEAVEN ON EARTH!

There could have been better days and places to make your long awaited return to first-team football but for CHARLIE HARTFIELD a rainy, murky day at Port Vale must have seemed like Wembley on a sunny afternoon.

Fully nineteen months after last pulling on a senior shirt in a 0-1 defeat at Portsmouth, and then facing week after week of worry and doubt, he got the nod from Howard Kendall to replace the injured Mitch Ward at Vale Park.

His cruclate knee ligament injury had resulted in a long, hard slog to convince himself and everyone else, particularly Howard Kendall, that he could fight his way back into League action. Despite being replaced by Andy Walker after 69 minutes, Charlie was clearly relieved to have made it:

"I enjoyed it despite the fact that Vale were a a good side and made us work hard. People tell me that their pitch is one of the biggest in the League but that didn't to be a problem to me, especially as I was asked to play a holding role in the centre of a three man midfield between Mark Patterson and Don Hutchison.

"A draw was a good result for us, and a satisfactory return for me, but I know it is only the beginning and the real task is to get in the side and play well enough to stay in it. At least I have proved that I'm completely over the injury and capable of getting into the squad."

#### PHIL TAKES DUTCH COURAGE

There are no hard feelings from PHIL STARBUCK about the way things seem to be turning out for him at the Lane, and he's brave enough to try his luck in a foreign field to keep his career alive. Clearly behind Gareth Taylor, Andy Walker and Petr Katchouro in the strikers' pecking order at present, he is in Holland for six weeks playing for RKC Waalwijk in the top division over there.

Phil, United's PFA Representative at Bramall Lane, started off with a game against the highly rated PSV Eindhoven and then scored on his home debut against Vitesse Arnhem so a permanent move could be in the offing.


Howard Kendall says; "A fee was agreed between us and RKC before Phil joined them so if he does well and agrees a contract a deal will be done."

Phil is philosophical about his prospects in Sheffield, conceding that, "the boss has brought in a few new strikers since I've been here and they are all doing well and scoring goals. I accept that's the way things happen and he can't play all of us. I'm approaching this new opportunity with a completely open mind."

#### **Next Home Match**

Huddersfield Town's £2m summer investment in three players delivered an immediate return with five wins as they reached seventh place at the beginning of October.

The bright start then tailed off as they lost the services of their newcomers. Former Blackpool defender Andy Morrison dropped out after five league games and the strikers, Marcus Stewart and Andy Payton, were sidelined after sharing 14 goals in 13 appearances together.

Stewart, a record £1.2m purchase from Bristol Rovers, scored nine times and looked well capable of matching his achievement in netting 30 goals to top the Division Two list last season.

The well-travelled Payton, signed from Barnsley for £325,000, struck up a good understanding with Stewart, and Huddersfield were rightly hopeful that they could improve on last season's top eight finish in their first year back at the higher level

But the squad became severely weakened by injuries, not only to the new recruits but to other key players as well. Up to a week ago, they had gone nine matches without a win, dropping down to 17th in the table.


In that time, they suffered a 6-0 defeat at Swindon - the first of seven matches in which they failed to score. The only goals in a six-week period came in one game - a 3-3 draw against Bradford City after they had trailed 3-0 in the first half.

Manager Brian Horton will be hoping that the worst is over now that the injuries are clearing up. Stewart and Payton resumed their partnership at Oxford ten days ago and Morrison returned for a 0-0 draw at Manchester City last week.

The Maine Road fixture brought their sixth away point of the season, adding to draws against Wolves and and West Brom in the Midlands and their only travelling victory so far at Ipswich.

At home, they had beaten Charlton, Oldham, Reading and Birmingham, and drawn with Crystal Palace, Southend and Bradford.

\* Honours were even in last season's meetings with the Blades. Jostein Flo and Glyn Hodges scored in our 2-1 win at the McAlpine Stadium, but Andy Booth - now with the Owls - and Darren Bullock contributed in Town's 2-0 victory at Bramall Lane.

## HEROES OF ITALIA 1990

United's recent signing of former England defender Paul Parker (right) revived memories of England's best ever performance in the World Cup Finals outside this country.

In Italy in 1990 Parker was a member of the team which unluckily lost to West Germany in the semifinals of the competition.

Bobby Robson's England reached the semi-finals after first qualifying from group F which consisted of Eire, Holland and Egypt and then disposing of Belgium and Cameroon in the knock-out stages. Parker played in all the games except the opening one against Eire.

In the Semi-final against West Germany England dominated the first half but failed to capitalise on their superiority. Germany took the lead in the 59th minute when Brehme's freekick took a wicked deflection off Parker and looped agonisingly over goal keeper Peter Shilton. England fought back and equalised in the 80th minute through Gary Lineker.

The match went into extra time and Chris Waddle almost won the game for England when his shot hit the inside of the post. It was at this point in the game that Paul Gascolgne shed his famous tears when he was booked for a foul which would have meant him missing the Final.

The match was decided on penalties after a 1-1 stalemate at the 120 minutes mark. England began the shootout well when Lineker, Beardsley and Platt all scored but unfortunately Brehme. Matthaus and Riedle did the same for the Germans. England's fourth penalty, taken by Stuart Pearce, was saved by German 'keeper Illgner. They then scored to put Germany 4-3 ahead leaving Chris Waddle needing to score to keep England's hopes alive. His shot flew high over the bar and England were out of the 1990 World Cup.

The team played one more match in Italia 90 when they met hosts Italy in the third place play-off and lost 2-1.

Below are brief career details of the England players since their brave Semi-final appearance:

Peter Shilton: That Italy game was his 125th and last International appearance. Has had a spell as manager at Plymouth but is still pursuing the possibility of making 1000 League appearances - at present has over 990 to his credit.

Stuart Pearce: Remains loyal to Nottingham Forest and is still a vital member of Glen Hoddle's England squad.

Des Walker: Moved to Italian club Sampdoria in 1992 before returning to England with Sheffield Wednesday in 1993.

Paul Parker: Moved to Manchester United from Q.P.R. in 1991. Had a brief spell at Derby after his release from Old Trafford before joining the Blades.

Mark Wright: Moved to Liverpool from Derby County in 1991. A recall to England colours in 1996 was thwarted by injury.

Chris Waddle: He was playing for Marseille at the time of Italia 90. He moved to Sheffield Wednesday in 1992 where he remained until this season. Played for Falkirk for a spell but has now signed a contract at Bradford City until the end of this season.

Terry Butcher: After a successful spell as a player with Glasgow Rangers has had unsuccessful spells as manager at Coventry and Sunderland.

David Platt: Left Astoh Villa in 1991 for a lucrative career in Italy. He played for Bari, Juventus and Sampdoria before returning to England with Arsenal in 1995. Paul Gascoigne: After a career threatening injury in 1991 'Gazza' moved to Italian club Lazio and then joined Glasgow Rangers in 1995. Love him or hate him, his presence in the game cannot be ignored.

Peter Beardsley: Moved from Liverpool to Everton in 1991 before returning to hometown club Newcastle United in 1993 where he has played some of the best football of his career.

Gary Lineker: played for Tottenham until 1992 before an unsuccessful move to Japanese club Grampus 8. Scored 48 goals for England, one short of Bobby Charlton's record 49 goals. Now seen regularly on television.

Trevor Steven: Came on as substitute for Butcher in the Semi-final. Had a brief spell at Marseille before returning to Glasgow Rangers. His recent career has been blighted by injuries.

Bryan Robson, John Barnes, Steve Bull, Steve McMahon, Tony Dorigo and Neil Webb also played for England in Italia 90 games.

The Wiltshire club's regeneration was signposted last year with 23 points from the first nine games and then sealed with a 12-match unbeaten run at the end. The title was won with three games to spare in a season of only four league defeats.

This total was exceeded after only ten fixtures this season, but cup victories over Wolves and QPR revealed a potential which emerged in spectacular style during October.

In the space of a week, the Robins climbed ten places, stunning Huddersfield Town with six goals in 19 minutes and inflicting a first home defeat on high-riding Crystal Palace.

Striker Peter Thorne scored a hat-trick against Huddersfield and made his tally five in three games with an equaliser against Manchester United before Swindon slipped off the cup trail with a 2-1 defeat by the champions.

Subsequent form reflected the volatile nature of the division. Swindon lost two in a row, then won two in succession, and retained seventh place despite last week's defeat at Ipswich.

#### **TRANSFERS**

In less than two years, Steve McMahon built virtually a brand-new team for little more than the record fee of £1.3m received from Middlesbrough for striker Jan Aage Fjortoft in March 1995.

The bulk of the spending was done before Swindon won promotion last season, but they have since brought in six players for a total investment of only £115,000.

For that modest sum, they recruited . . .


#### THE SQUAD

Long-serving goalkeeper Fraser Digby, now in his testimonial season after ten years' service, has become the last survivor from the promotion-winning Wembley side in 1993.

The other remaining links were broken this year with the £100,000 sale of Shaun Taylor to Bristol City and free transfers for Martin Ling (Leyton) and Paul Bodin (Reading).

Two other players were on the staff in 1993 but did not feature in the Wembley triumph.
Republic of Ireland Under-21 full back Wayne O'Sullivan was in his first year as a professional, and midfielder Kevin Horlock, now a Northern Ireland international, was in his first season after moving from West

Sheffield-born Digby made 25 league appearances last season - his third promotion campaign with the club - but this term he had to wait until last Saturday to take over from former Blackburn 'keeper Australian Frank Talia.



#### Management

Steve McMahon's first-team playing career has spanned 16 years - and it may not have finished despite a back injury which restricted him to one substitute appearance from last Christmas.

The 35-year-old Merseysider made his league bow for Everton in August 1980, but it was to be on the other side of the city where he would make his reputation as one of the finest midfield players of his generation.

The switch to Liverpool was by way of a £300,000 move to Aston Villa in 1983 and then a £375,000 transfer to Anfield in 1985. He proved to be an inspired signing by Kenny Dalglish, finishing his first season with League and FA Cup medals.

Capped six times at Under-21 while with his first two clubs, he graduated to the full squad with Liverpool, and his 17 England appearances included duty at the 1990 World Cup tournament in Italy.

On Christmas Eve 1991, he made his most expensive move, joining Manchester City for £900,000, and he stayed at Maine Road until becoming player-manager at Swindon in November 1994.

Mr McMahon appointed a new No 2 this season when Mike Walsh joined him as first-team coach in October. He was a Republic of Ireland International during a lengthy career with Bolton, Everton, Manchester City and Blackburn.

In later years, Mr Walsh was manager at Bury, and at the beginning of this season, he was in charge at the Unibond Premier League club, Barrow.

Three centre backs have had top-level experience - a considerable amount in the case of lan Culverhouse, a £250,000 buy from Norwich, but less so for his partners.

Mark Seagraves, a £100,000 capture from Bolton in 1995, started as a reserve player with Liverpool and then went to Manchester City, while Mark Robinson played mainly for Barnsley and had a short spell with Newcastle before joining Swindon for £600,000 in July 1994,

The wing back positions were filled for a time by newcomers Darras and Elkins, and in midfield, Horlock was joined by two of the other summer signings, Walters and Leitch.

At 32, Walters can look back on numerous medals with Rangers and Liverpool in a career of more than 400 league games, but his range of experience is more than matched by another midfielder the former Spurs and West Ham player, Paul Allen, who arrived from Southampton last October.

Swindon have a choice of four strikers, the most travelled being 28-year-old Wayne Allison with a career record of more than 90 league goals. The Huddersfield-born player started with Halifax Town and then ran up a transfer bill of over £1m - £250,000 to Watford in 1989, £300,000 to Bristol City a year later, and £475,000 to Swindon

in 1995. He was top scorer with 20 league and cup goals in his first season at the County Ground.

Peter Thorne played as substitute in the 1994 Charity Shield match at Wembley - his only senior outing for Blackburn Rovers - and moved to Swindon for £200,000 in the following January.


An injury to Thorne last season

created an opening for Steve Finney and the free transfer man from Manchester City was top marksman with 16 goals until breaking an ankle at Burnley in March.

Finney's misfortune prompted a loan deal for Aston Villa's Steve Cowe and this led to a £100.000 transfer before he scored one of the championshipclinching goals at

Chesterfield in April.

The promoted squad also included Jason Drysdale, unlucky with injuries since his £340,000 move from Newcastle in 1995; Ty Gooden, a 1993 arrival after being released by Wycombe; Alex Smith, who came from Everton in January this year; and Scotsman Lee Collins, previously with Albion Rovers.







During his time at Notts County, Chris was sidelined for a year through a stamina sapping illness

This has not been a very happy season so far for Chris Short, our defender who joined us soon after the arrival of Howard Kendall. He's been troubled by injuries, as he explains

"I had an enjoyable time on our pre-season tour of Malaysia but then, right at the very end. I pulled my hamstring when training. I was injured when we went on tour to Northern Ireland and so didn't play, and then wasn't selected for the opening match of the season.

"Then I had a run of games in the first team, but was still troubled by my injury. A poor game against Stockport meant that I lost my place, but even when I regained it again I still found the hamstring was causing me a little trouble. It's as though I've never really got going this season. I would love to get it completely cleared up and get back to playing how I know I can. After all, the squad we have is now so strong I can't afford to lose my place as there are so many other good players who might claim my spot."

The move to United was a good one for Chris, and one that he has thoroughly enjoyed. "I wasn't involved at all at Notts County last season. Some of us, including Nigel Jemson and Chris Marsden, were being completely overlooked so when I heard that Howard Kendall wanted me to come to Bramall Lane and jumped at the chance" he said.

Things had once looked so promising at County and he explained that, "I was in their promotion team when they went up to the old First Division. I played in about half their matches in the First, including a 3-1 early season win here at Bramall Lane, and in the later match when United gained revenge at Meadow Lane.

We were relegated. however, and that was my only opportunity in the highest Division.

"It was mostly downhill after that although, when Howard Kendall arrived

for a short spell as manager, we did get to Wembley in the Anglo-Italian Final and I played in that."

Chris's attitude to football is, to some extent, coloured by an illness that kept him from playing for eighteen months. "I got a stomach infection that eventually entered my blood stream and I felt so tired that I could often only train for five minutes.



Playing became out of the question and I had to face the fact that I thought that I would never be able to play again."

What made it worse, he says, was nobody seemed to be able to find the cause. "Eventually it was diagnosed as a fungal infection, I was put on drugs and a strict diet, and within a month I was back playing. I feel so grateful to be playing again, having been told that I probably never would, and I

There is rather more to it than that, though, as he would like to emulate his

older brother, Craig, who now plays for Everton. "We remain very close friends and our families visit each other regularly. We seem to always be phoning each other, and watch each other play whenever possible," he said, "Now all I want is for us to play against each other in the Premiership." Let's hope this wish can be granted next





#### MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

As all United supporters will be aware, financial assistance from the Football Trust has been of the utmost help to Sheffield United as Bramall Lane has been redeveloped in recent years, culminating in the replacement of the John Street Stand.

However, I suspect that few of you will know that the potential input of this invaluable organisation is under threat.

The future funding of the Football

Trust is a very important matter for us and the whole of football.

The Trust provides essential support for safety and improvement work and for the redevelopment of grounds to meet the requirements of the Taylor Report. The transformation we are seeing at our grounds would be impossible without them.

Our top clubs have largely completed the Taylor task and the trust is now concentrating on clubs in the Second and Third Divisions, whose needs

are considerable but whose resources are extremely limited. Just as this crucial stage of implementing Taylor is reached the national lottery has halved the Trust's income. The crisis will deepen now that the mid-week lottery draw is round the corner.

The Football Trust is urging the Government to:

 extend the Taylor implementation to 2003, thus making it's reduced annual income available over three years to enable the smaller clubs to see through the Taylor task;  reduce pool betting duty to help to consolidate the pools business and thus the income of the trust.



# Touch of the blues

One of the items in my limited collection of football ephemera - normally referred to as "football rubbish" - is the blue and white Swindon Town Supporters Club badge which you see illustrated.

It was manufactured about 60 years ago by the respected Birmingham firm of W.O.Lewis, and the presentation card that came with it is headed "Official Badge".

lasked a keen supporter of today's visitors if he could throw any light on the Cambridge blue colour of the badge, for Swindon, as I'm sure you are all aware, have played in red shirts for many a long day, but the

play in blue and white stripes and United in red? We don't really know. If minutes

were ever taken when the

decisions were made, and they probably were in United's case, then they have been kept a very close secret. Perhaps they remain in some dusty old file in a

Sheffield solicitor's office but, more likely, were thrown away years ago or were destroyed in the Blitz.

United, in any case, appear to have started out with white shirts and blue shorts before adopting red and white stripes. The choice of red was probably because it was the colour used by our local Football Association and United were founded in an attempt to offer Sheffield people a first class local representative side.

Some League clubs have turned out in a multitude of different strips while others have stayed faithful to their original choice. In general, it is fair to say that the bigger the club, the less likely it is to stray from it's original shirt colours, but in only a few cases, are the reason for the colours known.

The best known story is that of Arsenal. Founded by the workers at the Woolwich munitions factory, two of the team had played for Nottingham Forest and had retained their red Forest shirts and it seemed common sense for the other nine - the goalkeeper played in the same strip in those days - to buy or beg similar red shirts!

Swindon in their early years, played in maroon, or red and black striped or quartered shirts, then had a couple of seasons in green shirts with white sleeves before settling on the red shirts that have remained as their standard strip.

Their change strip has often been blue but not Cambridge blue. Perhaps the badge was made in error and intended for Manchester City supporters. I would certainly be glad if one of you could solve the mystery.

Mistakes do occur. of course; one of the pre-war comics - ":The Adventure", as I seem to remember - printed a picture of United's Fred Tunstall in blue and white stripes and, in later years Tony Kenworthy was shown on a picture card in blue and white stripes!







## THE LAST WORD...

#### With Roger Barnard

Students of Sheffield United history will know that when the club was formed in 1889 the playing strength was boosted by the presence of half a dozen Scotsmen. Scotland had a surplus of footballing talent and it made sense to import several experienced players to help the new club.

Over the years the best English sides have often included some of the cream of Scottish talent. The triumphant Liverpool squad of a few years ago included the likes of Dalglish, Gillespie, Hansen, Nicol, MacDonald and Ray Houghton (who was Glasgow-born despite subsequently playing for Ireland). You would be hard pressed to find

many clubs in the Football League that didn't have one or two Scotsmen in their squad. Today, however, the picture looks very different. Where have all the Scottish footballers gone?

I put the question to our 'resident expert' — Andy Walker. He agreed that times have changed. "When I was little I had a Leeds strip for the only reason that they had Lorimer, Bremner, Gray, Gordon McQueen..." He could have added Joe Jordan and goalkeeper David Harvey, too, in that formidable squad in the early seventies.

Andy feels, however, that this was a particularly strong time for the Scots and that their time will

come again. "Certainly just now Scottish football is not as high a standard as it once was," he says, "but having said that, standards have maybe even improved for the top clubs - Celtic and Rangers."

One of the reasons for the lack of Scottish players in English football could be that, with asking prices for British players at inflated levels, better bargains can be found

abroad. However, it can also be argued that the depth of talent simply isn't there north of the border at the moment.

At 31, Andy Walker is hardly a veteran, but the breeding ground for Scottish footballers would appear to have changed drastically just in his lifetime. Memories of his childhood will strike a chord with many readers. "When I was growing up, in the school holidays, I would be up and have my breakfast, go out and play football, get shouted in for my lunch, back out playing football, shouted in for my dinner, back out again, and shouted in when it was bedtime.


"There aren't as many places to to play football these days," he says. For the goals we'd put a couple of jackets down or a couple of bricks — anywhere there was space to play we'd get a game up."

But, as Andy points out, now kids have got other attractions: roller blades, ten-pin bowling, small basketball, short tennis, rugby, and youth clubs competing with football, and the scenario is, of course, just the same in England.


Pity the poor club talent scout, trying to unearth nuggets, when the grass roots are now full of youngsters in designer clothing, participating in the latest fad. Happily, football is still by far the biggest attraction for boys, and will surely remain so for a long time.

That said, forecasting the future is fraught with pitfalls. Pity the unnamed football writer who — when Stanley Matthews made his soccer debut at the age of 17 — penned the words: 'Stanley Matthews lacks the big match temperament. He will never hold down a regular first team place in top class soccer'.

Proof, indeed, that you should never believe what you read in the press!
