

# Surprise, surprise!

Terry Phelan was preparing to see in the New Year against Liverpool - when the call came to join their keenest rivals. The Republic of Ireland international had forced his way back into the Chelsea set-up last weekend, nine months after limping out of an FA Cup semi final with a torn thigh muscle.

He was recalled against Sheffield

Wednesday, was eagerly anticipating the visit of The Reds on New Year's Day then received the surprise news that he was wanted by Joe Royle. "I spoke to Chelsea in detail over the weekend," said manager Joe Royle, "then I spoke to Terry on Monday and he was delighted to come and very enthusiastic about the move." Phelan was nearing his best form again last season, when Chelsea's left back injury jinx struck in the FA Cup semi-flnal against Manchester

United. With Chelsea leading 1-0 early in the second half, Terry was sprinting clear down the flank when he pulled up sharply with a torn thigh muscle. He gamely tried to play on, but was little more than a passenger as United ruthlessly exploited his lack of mobility down that wing. He finally hobbled off after United's second goal - and didn't return until last Saturday, when his


performance against Sheffield Wednesday in a 2-2 draw was rated by some observers as "outstanding." The 29-year-old started his professional career at Leeds United, signing professional forms in August 1984. Following two unproductive seasons at Elland Road he was allowed to Join Swansea City on a free transfer. The promise which was later to lead to 35 Republic of Ireland caps began to flourish in South Wales, and bargain

hunters Wimbledon swooped In July 1987 for £100,000. It was in South London that Phelan developed into an exciting and Influential left-back. He was a member of the Wimbledon side which upset Liverpool's double charge in 1988 by snatching the FA Cup, and when the Crazy Gang finally sold him after four seasons and 198 appearances his value had soared to £2.5m. Everton old boy Peter Reid splashed out that fee for him, but Phelan's

return to his home town wasn't the success he had hoped. In a side often struggling against relegation his form suffered. He missed the ignominy of City's drop into the First Division but when he moved to Chelsea in November last year his value had fallen to £900,000. Joe Royle paid £850,000 to bring him to Goodison earlier this week.



■ I would qualify that with our immense problems with injuries and illness, although the supporters don't want to hear that. They just want to see results.

The Middlesbrough result on Boxing Day was desperately disappointing because I thought we played well in patches, but crucial decisions - and lots of them - went against us. I've watched the game again on video since, and I still can't understand why we weren't awarded a penalty when Nick Barmby was fouled and again when Graham Stuart was fouled. Added to that, Boro's third and fourth goals both stemmed from moves where our players were fouled.

Having said that, I can't hide the fact that we conceded four goals - and I'm sure a lot of that was down to the absence of Dave Watson. I didn't think we had any problems defensively while he was on the pitch. One of our promising youngsters, Graham Allen, came on and did well enough, but I thought the loss of Dave Watson was crucial.

The game against Wimbledon was slightly different in that we managed to put out a side which was experienced, but totally imbalanced by the loss of defenders. The absences of Craig Short and Dave Watson were probably the most decisive - against a team which is traditionally strong in the air. That showed in the way we

conceded the equaliser, Wimbledon won two headers in our penalty area after we had done well to go into the lead. We should have had more goals to show at half-time, but didn't take our chances.

A number of the newspapers made a point on Monday morning about the atmosphere inside Goodison Park and it is true that for some reason it has been very quiet this season. It's a fine line between whether the players get the fans fired up, or whether the players respond to the fans. There are no whys, wherefores or criticisms - the fact is it has been quiet. When we were fighting relegation two seasons ago it was a hot-bed every week. Last Saturday we were outshouted by Wimbledon. Today's Cup tie should guarantee a better atmosphere.

This is a massive week for us and we have to hang on to the coat tails of a European place, while ensuring we are in the next round of the FA Cup. Swindon Town won't need any winding up for today - being managed by an ex-Evertonian, and an ex-Liverpudlian to boot! Our record against sides from lower divisions in the last couple of seasons hasn't been good and we have to change that around.

We are hoping to have a new face in the squad for this afternoon's match. At the time of writing we have agreed a fee of £850,000 with Chelsea for their left-back Terry Phelan - and the transfer was set to go through subject to a medical.

Obviously the seriousness of the injury sustained by

Obviously the seriousness of the injury sustained by Andy Hinchcliffe meant that we needed to bring in a specialist left sided defender. I spoke to Chelsea officials several times last weekend and we agreed on the fee Monday afternoon.

We have two outstanding prospects for left-back at the club in John Hills and Michael Ball, but they

aren't ready for the senior side just yet and I don't want to spoil the youngsters by putting them in too soon.





# David Prentice of The Liverpool Echo recalls Swindon's last two visits to Goodison Park...

Joe Royle could be forgiven for feeling a little fidgety this week. You see, a Robins visit to Goodison usually means the arrival of a new Everton manager. That was the case on the only other two occasions the Wiltshire side have played here.

In 1977 Gordon Lee unveiled his oversized sheepskin coat to the Goodison crowd for the first time.

Some 17 years later Mike Walker preferred the training ground manager's uniform of a tracksuit, topped by a white hairdo with just a hint of a tint.

Both matches were memorable.

The 1977 tie was a "nearly match" for me.

I nearly made it over the Gwladys Street wall to mob dramatic match-winner David Jones.

Nearly two decades later I had managed to cross a divide where I was in contact with the players - this time as a journalist - but sadly soccer stars no longer held that heroic aura for me. A post match interview with debutant Brett Angell wasn't anywhere near as exciting as patting Andy King's sweaty back as he left a football field. That happened at Hillsborough in a League Cup Final replay, but that was a month down the line from Mr Lee's Goodison bow against Swindon.

The trouble-shooter from Newcastle United was introduced to the crowd before the match, then settled down to witness what sort of a mess he had inherited. Town were a Third Division team with a full-back called Trollope. That apart, all I can remember is that Trevor Anderson put them ahead seven minutes from time.

On the brink of an appalling upset, that most elegant of midfielders, Martin Dobson, retained his composure to glide a Mick Lyons' head-on from McNaught's free-kick into the Gwladys Street goal.

With a minute remaining, left-back David Jones embarked on the kind of adventurous over-lapping run not witnessed at Goodison since Keith Newton's day.

He raced into the penalty area, looped a shot over the goalkeeper and was almost carried home by an exuberant Gwladys Street End.

Post match speculation surrounded whether Lee deserved the credit for the victory, or whether Steve Burtenshaw had selected the side and thus secured his first win as caretaker boss. There was no doubt that Mike Walker had selected the team which met Swindon in January 1994. His first signing as Blues' boss, Brett Angell, made his debut - and while he failed to score in a 6-2 victory, the centre-forward hinted there was more to come from him. Sadly he had already reached his peak, as had

Walker's reign.
Everton led 2-0, were pegged back to 2-2 and had the sending-off of John Moncur to thank for their victory as much as Tony Cottee's hat-trick.
Gary Ablett and John Ebbrell also scored, while Peter Beagrie completed a rout with a close range header and a traditional somersault. Of course, I was mature and worldly wise now - so I didn't race onto the pitch. I simply got drunk at the prospect of a glorious new chapter in Everton's history.

I said mature and worldly wise, remember, not perceptive and visionary.



Three years ago this month, Swindon Town played at Goodison Park in a Premiership fixture but then suffered relegation for two seasons in a row before a former Evertonian sparked off a revival.

# Form Guide

Nearly 16 years after making his First Division debut for the Blues, Steve McMahon achieved his first success as a manager when Swindon regained some of the lost ground last season.

In winning the Second Division title with only four defeats - and as many as

13 away wins the Wiltshire club achieved promotion for the fourth time in an eventful 11-year cycle.

They went from the old Fourth Division to the Second in successive campaigns under Lou Macari, then paused for six seasons before Glenn Hoddle, now the England coach, got them into the top flight for the first time.

The return journey was far too quick for comfort - and resulted in a change of management. Mr McMahon was unable to prevent further demotion, but a Coca-Cola Cup semi-final appearance in 1995

brightened a bleak scene before the slide was arrested. The side is now unrecognisable from the one which left the Premiership after a 5-0 home defeat by Leeds United in May 1994. Nicky Summerbee and John Moncur left that summer and the major sales account topped £3m when Jan Aage Fjortoft went to Middlesbrough in March 1995. The squad has become very much the creation of the present manager, and up to a couple of months ago, Swindon were well-placed to launch another promotion challenge.

A 6-0 trouncing of Huddersfield Town and an impressive away win at Crystal Palace contributed to a spell of 15 points from seven games, culminating in a 3-0 victory over Barnsley to break that last unbeaten away record in England this season.

That lifted the Robins into seventh place, but the momentum drained away with five defeats in six games up to the Christmas period. A 1-0 victory at

Portsmouth ended a losing streak away from home and they were in front when last Saturday's game against Grimsby was abandoned.



Do you recognise the following football fan?
He's a single, white male, hasn't celebrated his
30th birthday yet and was born in Liverpool. He
didn't go to university, cricket and horse racing are
his second favourite sports, and the result he most
looks out for after Everton's is Glasgow Celtic. He is
concerned about safety when visiting Anfield and
Middlesbrough, but is more optimistic about
Everton's progress than he was five years ago.
Sounds familiar?

According to the Sir Norman Chester Centre for Football Research, at the University of Leicester, he is the photofit of the average Everton season ticket holder.

Obviously the above findings are not absolutely representative of Evertonians.

We do boast female fans and plenty who look out for Glasgow Rangers' results, but the Sir Norman Chester Centre Research was the most exhaustive of its kind so far - and it does throw up some intriguing findings.

Like...

Evertonians are more likely then any other fans in the Premiership to have supported only one club - once a Blue, always a Blue!

Only Newcastle have more fans in the Premiership who describe their club as the most important thing in their lives. And less Evertonians drive to matches in their own cars than any other group of supporters.

The FA funded research saw 39,310 season ticket holders mailed with questionnaires, producing replies from 17,208 - a reply rate of 43.8 per cent.

"We have concentrated this year on club season ticket holders," explained the survey. "This is not because more 'casual' fans are less important for research purposes, but mainly because season ticket holders constitute the most reliable data base at all clubs for the purposes of direct comparison, club by club.

"Also, more and more top clubs are, in fact, moving towards extending their season ticket base and at many top clubs season ticket holders now constitute a large majority of their regular home support."

Here at Everton we have 22,000 season ticket holders - 62.1 per cent of our average home gate.

We complied with the requests of the Sir Norman Chester Centre, who added: "17 out of the 20 Premier League clubs provided us directly with a randomly selected list of 2,000 names and addresses drawn from their current season ticket holder data base.

"Only two clubs, Liverpool and Manchester United, insisted on mailing supporters themselves, in the case of Liverpool because no usable computerised list of season ticket names and addresses exists.

"Middlesbrough inadvertently provided a list of season ticket holders and previously non-season ticket holding fans."

# ■ The findings from the survey, and specifically what it revealed about Evertonian season ticket holders, were:

- The Everton survey produced responses from 911 supporters, a response rate of 30.4 per cent, a little below the national average of 35.2 per cent.
- 2. The Everton sample had a much younger average age than

the national sample, with 45 per cent of Everton respondents being under 30 years of age.

- A much smaller proportion of Everton fans were married than in the national sample, and there were also fewer female fans than is nationally the case.
- 4. The Everton sample contains fewer University educated fans and more fans on lower salaries than the national sample.

5. The Everton sample is strongly localised in terms of place of birth and distance lived from Goodison Park.

In the Premier League table of season ticket holders born in the town or city where their own club plays, we lie fifth with 85 per cent.

Top were Bolton Wanderers with 89.6 per cent of their fans born within 20 miles of the ground, then Blackburn Rovers with 88.6 per cent, Middlesbrough with 87.4 per cent and Newcastle with 86 per cent.

Bottom of the table was Southampton with 60.4 per cent. We also lie high up the table for season ticket holders who live within a five mile radius of the ground - sixth with 37.7 per cent.

Again, Bolton led the way here with 62.7 per cent, with Tottenham bottom with 20.3 per cent.

84.3 per cent of our supporters surveyed were born in Merseyside, compared to the national sample of 73.9 per cent.

For those supporters who argue that Everton have more Merseyside based fans, Liverpool were top of the table for fans who live more than 50 miles from their club's home ground, with 14.3 per cent.

West Ham were next with 11.6 per cent - with Manchester United third from bottom with just 3.5 per cent. (Sceptics have pointed out that United were one of only two clubs who insisted on mailing supporters themselves!)

Everton fans in the sample watch more football now compared to five years ago.

7. Reported ticket prices at Everton are some way below the national average. Everton fans are also much less likely than the average national fan to have supported another club before The Toffees.

Most expensive season tickets nationally were at Chelsea (average price £383).

Cheapest was Wimbledon (£126), followed by Sheffield Wednesday (£181), Bolton Wanderers (£190), then Everton (£197).


8. Horse racing and Rugby League and Union are popular additional live sports for Everton fans, compared to the national sample. However, cricket remains the most popular alternative sport, though some way behind the rest of the sample.

9. Everton fans are less likely to use their own car to travel to home matches.

The survey showed only 52.2 per cent of Everton season ticket holders who travelled to matches in their own car, the lowest in the Premiership.

This was possibly a result of the high number of season ticket holders who lived within five miles of the ground.

10. Everton fans are very strong followers of Celtic in Scotland and Ajax abroad when compared with the national sample. Of the survey respondents, 56.3 per cent named Celtic as their favourite Scottish club, with Rangers polling 29.8 per cent, Hearts 3 per cent and Aberdeen 2.5 per cent.



The national sample had Celtic 38.8 per cent, Rangers 36.1, Hearts 3.5 and Aberdeen 3.4

Evertonians' continental favourites were Ajax, with 36.4 per cent, followed by AC Milan (11.9), Barcelona (11.6) and other Italian (15.6).

The national sample listed Ajax (32.5), AC Milan (13.5), Juventus (12.5), other Italian (13.7).

**11.** More Everton fans believe that value for money at football compares positively with other sports these days.

12. Family influences are easily the most important factors in explaining initial club allegiance at Everton. A much higher

proportion of Everton supporters felt that their club is "more important" than five years ago, and "one of the most important things in my life" than is nationally the case.

Less Everton season ticket holders than any others in the Premiership (5.8 per cent) began attending matches when aged 20 or over, compared to Wimbledon who topped the table of "new" fans with 45.6 per cent.

Everton also had less fans than any other club when it came to season ticket holders whose club was not the first they had supported.

Wimbledon were top here with 50.7 per cent - more than half having followed other clubs before The Dons

Evertonians were easily the top of the table for fans who supported the club because of family influences with 69.4 per cent.

Wimbledon were at the other end of the table with 22.9 per cent.


- 13. Stadium atmosphere is more positively rated at Goodison Park than it is nationally. Anfield and the Riverside Stadium are noted by some Everton fans as venues where they have concerns about safety.
- 14. Lack of space, the gradient of seating and the behaviour of supporters are all safety concerns of Everton fans who commented on this issue.
- Racist comments are reportedly heard more often at Goodison Park compared to the national case.
- Recent improvements in club administration are generally recognised by Everton supporters.
- Club playing prospects are registered much more positively than is nationally the case.
- 18. Everton supporters are strongly in favour of unlimited foreign players. However, they are strongly opposed to the opening up of the Champions League to non-champion clubs.

19. Everton fans are highly critical of the current use of red and

yellow cards. The increased use of red and yellow cards is felt by Everton supporters to be both unnecessary and ineffective in protecting flair players.

20. Everton fans are

strong in their subscription to Sky Sports and show a strong interest in a new channel showing 'away' matches live.






Steve McMahon was a born Evertonian - and a born winner. But it was that burning ambition which eventually caused a rift between Steve and the club he supported as a boy.

A former Goodison ball boy, McMahon signed apprentice forms at Everton in December 1977.

He made his first team debut at Sunderland in August 1980 and the following season was voted Player of the Year by supporters who appreciated his snappy tackling, powerful running and burning will to win.

He was also a regular goals contributor from midfield. He scored twice against lpswich Town in a League Cup fourth round tie in 1981 - the second of which was a spectacular curling efort from the edge of the penalty area following a typically driving run.

Everton lost that match 3-2 - and it was McMahon's desire to win trophies, coupled with Everton's inconsistency in the early 80s, which eventually drove a wedge between him and the club.



A bright future seemed assured when he was picked to play for England under-21s against the Republic of Ireland.

His club form was also consistently good, despite indifferent results, and eventually he came to the conclusion that the only way to further his career would be to move away from the club he had always supported.

His contract expired at the end of the 1982-83 season, and even though Howard Kendall was in the process of reshaping his great Goodison side of the mid-80s, McMahon refused to sign another.

Mr Kendall wanted him to stay, but McMahon wasn't short of offers from elsewhere - including firm interest from across the park at Anfield.

After discussions with his family Steve eventually

opted to join Aston Villa in a £250,000 deal.

Ironically, the following season saw Everton make it to Wembley twice, lift their first piece of silverware in 14 years - and on the way to the Milk Cup Final, beat in the semi-final ... yes, you've guessed it, Aston Villa!

After a 2-0 first leg victory at

After a 2-0 first leg victory at Goodison Park, the Blues went

to Villa Park and lost 1-0, with Swindon old boy Paul Rideout scoring a goal which wasn't enough to pull back the aggregate deficit.

In exactly 100 League matches with Everton, Steve struck 11 goals from midfield.

He made 75 League appearances with Villa and maintained his goals record with a further seven strikes. When Liverpool finally persuaded him to move to Anfield - ensuring a rough ride every time he returned to Goodison! - he cost £375,000.

It was at Anfield that McMahon finally blossomed into a full international, winning 17 full caps to add to two B international appearances and six under-21 caps.

In his first season at Anfield he won League and Cup winners medals - a fact which never needs noting by Evertonians.

An outstanding career with Liverpool ended when Steve signed for Manchester City for £900,000 on Christmas Eve 1991.


He played more than 100 games in all competitions for City before moving to Swindon Town in December 1994 - the season which saw Swindon's slide into Division Two.

As player-manager, Steve enjoyed an outstanding first full season - 1995-96 - inspiring Swindon to promotion back into Division One.

Injury forced him to direct operations from the bench during the second half of the campaign, but his side responded magnificently and in the end won the title with something to spare.

That progress has been built on this season - and while Steve may once again be directing operations from the dug-out rather than on the pitch this afternoon, he will be sure to have instilled that burning will to win into whatever side he sends out at Goodison.

We have been warned!



■ Paul Rideout will go down in Everton folklore as the man whose goal brought the FA Cup to Goodison in 1995. Almost 15 years earlier he had signed professional forms at Swindon Town. He made more than 100 appearances for the Wiltshire club, before joining Aston Villa and then Southampton, where he was loaned back to Swindon for a further 10 matches.

The current Swindon squad boasts a number of Everton connections. Manager Steve McMahon started his oustanding playing career here, as did youngsters Peter Holcroft and Alex Smith who both moved to the County Ground in the last 12 months. McMahon's assistant. Mike Walsh, was one of Howard Kendall's first signings as Everton manager and made 22 appearances before moving to Fort



Lauderdale in the USA.

Current Swindon youth coach, Terry Wheeldon, was a junior at Everton in the 1970s, while a decade earlier, striker Ernie Hunt kicked off his career at The County Ground before he sprang to fame, literally, with the famous donkey kick goal for Coventry against Everton! Possibly the most accomplished footballer to play for both clubs was Scottish left-back, John MacConachie. He made 270 appearances for Everton from 1907 through to 1919, before joining Swindon Town. MacConachie was a player who combined cool authority with an unusually adventurous approach to the art of defending for his era.

During the 1912-13 season he actually socred four goals from full-back, at a time when a defender's function was usually to punt the ball as far downfield away from danger as possible.

Tony Grant, of course, enjoyed a successful spell onloan at Swindon last season, while M. W. Lindley made 54 appearances for Everton from 1946 through to 1951 before joining Swindon.

Last, but not least, is Mark Walters, of course.

We know he turned down a move to the Blues when he went from Aston Villa to Glasgow Rangers - but his middle name is... Everton!















# GOOTSON GALLY

In Buchan was manager of Everton for only two seasons. His brief reign coincided with a spell when the Blues hovered in the lower region of the First Division with remarkable consistency, finishing 11th, 15th, 15th, 16th and 16th. The season 1956-57, when we finished 15th, was Buchan's first, but the Scot never enjoyed the full loyalty of his players and it was an immensely frustrating campaign.

The writing was on the wall after the first match, when Mr Buchan decided to put some of his revolutionary physical training ideas into practice.

Tommy Eglington, a popular striker throughout the 50s, recalled: "Mr Buchan stopped the team coach two miles from Leeds ground and made us walk to keep fit. We were passing our own supporters.

"Leeds riddled us with goals in the first half, and at halftime one of our players cracked: 'It's a good job we're fitter than they are!"

Leeds went on to win 5-1, and after further heavy defeats by Blackpool (2-5) and Aston Villa (0-4), it was our eighth league match before T.E. Jones scored to earn our first victory over Burnley.

T.E. Jones was just one of many great characters in that side

Peter Farrell and Tommy Eglington epitomised Everton in the 1950s.

Two decades later, when interviewed for the club's official centenary history, their memories were as fresh as ever. Farrell said: "My one regret is that I was unable to help Everton win a major trophy during my years as captain. "We didn't have a good side when I was at Everton, but we enjoyed our football and the supporters were marvellous. Whenever it was time to sign a new contract I would put my name to the various copies of the form without even bothering to read them. I knew the club would look after me."

Eglington recalled: "I loved playing for Everton. There were no big heads. You would do your stuff on the pitch and then keep quiet about it. You just had your lemonade and went home.

"I'll never forget Harry Cooke, the trainer, who used to keep bits of Dixie Dean in jars... pieces of cartilage, pieces of bone. Whenever we went on a long train journey, Harry would talk about Billy all the way there and all the way back again."

The FA Cup provided a brief, but welcome distraction - as we edged past first Blackburn and then West Ham in tight Goodison ties.

Unfortunately the fifth round yielded a tie at Old Trafford, home of the revered Busby Babes and there was no repeat of the famous 1953 FA Cup

defeat of Manchester United and we lost 1-0. It was seven years and another two managers before the glory days returned to Goodison Park, but the 50s are fondly recalled by Evertonians.

It was still an age when footballers could be seen travelling by public transport, and lacked the affluence of professional sports people today.


It was an age when there was a strong will to win, but not at any cost, and when spectators concentrated on the match and their team's performance.

It was not a golden age for results, but the supporters enjoyed their football nonetheless.







Here's hoping we can both give each other something to shout about this afternoon. The FA Cup always has a special edge for players and supporters.

Everton, but I don't think I can ever remember a spell when we've had so many, what you would call first team players all missing at the same time. half hour and Wimbledon took advantage. There was some talk after the Wimbledon match about the lack of atmosphere inside

the stadium. It's true that footballers don't usually take that much notice of what's happening on the terraces, because you are concentrating so much on your game. But equally, when there is a

noisy, encouraging atmosphere some players can

be inspired by it.

The fact that today's match is a Cup tie will ensure a

good atmosphere inside Goodison.

Clubs from lower divisions always bring a large and noisy following with them, and the cut and thrust nature of cup ties means our supporters get that bit more excited. A noisy home crowd can help a team to get results. I know we have a responsibility, too, to excite the fans first - but sometimes you can do it together. Here's hoping we can both give each other something to shout about this afternoon. The FA Cup always has a special edge for players and supporters.

I've been fortunate enough to walk up those steps at Wembley and lift up the famous old trophy. It's a feeling you can't put into words and one I would dearly love to repeat. On the other hand I've also experienced what it's like to go out of the FA Cup to a team from the division below.

Port Vale last season was one of the lowest points of my career. That's not something anyone at Goodison wants to experience again and that, as much as the prospect of taking a step along the path to Wembley, will be driving us on today against Swindon.

We know it's going to be a tough tie. But we also know that if we perform to our true potential we should be in the hat for round four.



# Everton Girls' Half-Year Review

When we launched our junior girls football teams in the summer we did not realise the depth of talent we had at our disposal. In little over six months

all three age groups have picked up trophies and are handily placed to pick up more silverware at the end of the season.

The under 12s, coached by John Williams and Neil Currie, have attracted most of the headlines with their exploits in the Reebok Fives but the under 14s, who are coached by Judith Hughes, have matched them all the way. Goodison Park has boasted bigger attendances this season than we've seen for years. At the same time here has also been a more subdued atmosphere, something a number of observers have picked up on in recent weeks. The question of crowd atmosphere is something our first team coach, Willie Donachie, has strong feelings about.

"The fans have been great the whole time I have been here," he says "but I believe there have been two occasions when they have actually won the

"The last match of last season against Aston Villa I felt the crowd actually won the game.

"It was a tight match and they really lifted the team. "The other was the semi-final against Spurs. The crowd gave the players such a boost that day. "I would like to emphasise how important the fans can be to footballers - more important than they probably realise.

The fans can go a long way towards helping us achieve success here at Everton.

"When I was playing, if the crowd got behind you personally it made you feel 10 feet tall. It can make a player do wondrous things. It makes them jump higher, run faster and run through brick walls. "The players here are all honest and always give one hundred percent. The fans have been great, but

I would like to see it more often."

A profound football thinker, Willie is also a student of the European game - and believes we still have plenty to do in this country to resurrect the glory years of the 1970s for English clubs in Europe. "I don't think the ban affected English clubs all that much. I think it is used as an excuse for our failings now," he explained.
"The demise has been coming for

a long time. In the 1950s, when England lost to Hungary, people said we had to get more skilful



because England had been given a footballing lesson. "But nothing has changed.

"The FA has been saying for 25 to 30 years that we should be bringing kids up on small sided games, which is one way forward. But the British public, Sunday League and school teams haven't been prepared to change.

"The British are always arrogant and think they don't

need to learn from anyone else.

"When I was at Oldham I went to all the schools in the area and they were keen on changing from 11-aside games. But the four main schools in the town called an extraordinary general meeting and overturned the decision.

"Because they had been winning all the cups they said they wanted to keep the 11-a-side games.

"That shows how hard it is to change things.

"The first country I went to, to study football was Denmark. It's a small country, yet they were winning the European Championship and getting to the World Cup Finals.

"I wondered how they were always doing this and producing so many good players. Basically they always work with the ball and from an early age they work on keeping possession. It is so simple it's untrue.

"The Scandinavian countries took the best things from the British game and moved on to look at other countries like Spain, Italy and France to see what they could learn.

"You have got to want to get better, or you just go backwards.

"It has got to be from the kids and that will take a while. It is already starting now because a lot of clubs have a school of excellence where the standard of coaching and training is better.

"But there is still massive room for improvement. Once they get that right, I think British teams will beat continental teams again.

"British teams are braver and stronger, but they don't have the understanding or technique at the moment. "Combine that with the qualities we do have and we could be successful in Europe again."

Willie is a student of the European game and believes we still have plenty to do in this country to resurrect the glory years of the 1970s for English clubs in Europe.

# JOE ROVLE

■ The journey from youngest firstteam player to the manager's office at Bellefield took almost 29 years and spanned over 1,000 matches in league

football.

Along the way Joe Royle won six England caps and a Championship medal, and savoured the magic of Wembley in major cup finals as player and manager, winning the League Cup with Manchester City in 1976. In all, he was away from Goodison Park for

20 years, but the memory of one of the club's finest centre forwards burned brightly until his return as manager. No-one was likely to forget a man who scored 119 goals in his 275 first-team appearances.

"Big Joe" was "Boy Joe", three months short of his 17th birthday, when he made his debut at Blackpool in January 1966. The first goals arrived in his third match, but that was more than a year later in a 3-1 win against Chelsea at Goodison. In 1967-68 he took over the No 9 jersey, previously worn by the likes of Alex Young and Fred Pickering, and scored 20 goals in his first full season. Three of these came in the FA Cup run to Wembley, but the Final against West Bromwich Albion was a massive disappointment for all

Evertonians.

The championship season in 1969-70 was his best for the Blues, with 23 league goals, and in 1971

he won the first of his England caps against Malta. He had also represented his country at Youth level and in ten Under-23 internationals.

In later years he was troubled by a back

injury, and though he completed a century of league goals in August 1974, he was on his way to Manchester by Christmas Eve that year.

After three years at Maine Road, he moved to Bristol City, scoring four goals on his debut, and finally closed a league career of 152 goals with an injury-shortened spell at Norwich.

At the age of 33, he began looking for a new job, and in July 1992, he was appointed manager of Oldham Athletic. Over the next 12 years he would guide the club to their highest standing in more than half-acentury.

A League Cup Final appearance in 1990 was followed by the Division Two title a year later. He was linked with Everton on several occasions and eventually returned in November 1994, sealing the re-union with the FA Cup triumph at the end of that season.

# **BOB LATCHFORD**

■ To secure the services of Bob Latchford, Everton had to fork out a record fee of £350,000 and ultimately part with two of the club's outstanding servants. Howard Kendall went to Birmingham City as part of the Latchford deal in February 1974, and Joe Royle was sold later in the year after a brief partnership with the newcomer from the Midlands.

Birmingham-born Latchford was one of three footballing brothers, but whereas Dave and Peter were goalkeepers for Birmingham and Celtic, respectively, Bob chose to make life unpleasant for members of their profession.

And he did that with spectacular results, scoring 263 goals in his 613 league and cup appearances for Birmingham, Everton, Swansea, Coventry, Lincoln and Newport.

ast Masters

In a 25-year period - from the successful Sixties to the next golden era in the 1980s - three centre forwards contributed a remarkable total of more than 400 goals for the club...

He also had a short spell in Holland with NAC Breda. As a youngster, he represented South Birmingham Boys and Warwickshire County Schools before signing for Birmingham in May 1967. He made his league debut two years later and went into the England Youth team. At St Andrew's he linked up with a brilliant teenager by the name of Trevor Francis. They were destined to play for England, and today they are working together at Birmingham. On becoming manager last summer, Mr Francis put his former teammate in charge of youth development. In the Everton years, Bob was closest to club success when playing in the 1977 League Cup Final, and on an individual basis, his greatest triumph was to score 30 league goals in 1977-78. He was the first player to achieve this distinction in the top division for six years.

He completed a century of league goals for the Blues in six years and scored five times in his 12 appearances for England. Yet, for a man with such a prolific record, Bob . was unlucky in terms of major honours. His highest award was in helping Birmingham City to win promotion in 1971-72, a season in which he registered 30 goals in all competitions. After closing his league career on loan at

# **GRAEME SHARP**

■ In the way that Bob Latchford stepped into Joe Royle's boots, Graeme Sharp was waiting in the line of succession when Latchford went to Swansea City for £125,000 in 1981. The Scotsman had then been at the club for 15 months since his £120,000 move from Dumbarton but had started only three league games before Howard Kendall made him the regular No 9 from November 1981.

He finished that season as top scorer with 15 league goals, won his only Under-21 cap against England at Maine Road, and was voted Player of the Year by the Supporters' Club.

Thereafter his place was only threatened by the signing of Andy Gray in 1983, but after a sticky period in the middle of that season, Graeme linked up with his fellow-Scot, and they were to score the goals which brought the FA Cup to Goodison.

The following season proved to be the finest in Everton's history, and yet Graeme ▶ could have missed out on the glory. Dropped after scoring

against Coventry, he was on the point of asking for a transfer, but that was forgotten after an immediate recall when Gray was injured. A month later he scored one of the most stunning goals ever seen in a derby

match. The victory at
Anfield was one of six in
succession in the First
Division, and in that period,
the Blues reached the last
eight in the Cup-winners'
Cup.

When the season was over, Sharp had scored 31 goals and was the proud possessor of championship and European medals. To cap it all, he made his full international debut for Scotland in Iceland, only 48 hours after a league outing at Coventry.

In the next season, he formed a new partnership with Gary Lineker, and in the summer of 1986, they represented their countries in the World Cup in Mexico. Another championship followed in 1987, and as the years rolled by, Graeme became Everton's highest goal-scorer of the post-war period.

He played in four FA Cup Finals, though only the first brought a winners' medal, and also appeared at Wembley in finals of the League Cup and Simod Cup.

The parting, after 11 years, came in 1991 with a transfer to Oldham Athletic, and once more, one Everton centre forward was to replace another when he became the Latics' manager in succession to Joe Royle.


















Dear Editor I am a season ticket holder in the family enclosure, where I sit with my two friends and their sons.

I am very disappointed that every home game we seem to get outshouted by the away fans. We sing for about half-aminute and that seems to be it.


If we want our side to get anywhere they need support from us from start to finish.

Let each game be like a Cup Final, so that our younger players get used to the atmosphere which we have when we play big matches against sides like Newcastle and Liverpool.







If driving, follow the usual M62, M6 south, M1 routes and leave the M1 at Junction 2.


Follow signs for The City A1 for 1.7 miles until you reach the junction with the North Circular Road.
