

We have had a good long chat in the last few days about the games at Forest and QPR. The lads feel they know where we have been going wrong and we've been working


hard on the training pitch to turn it round.



I feel maybe that the run of games last month caught up with us at Forest. There was a bit of tiredness. At QPR, we could have had four or five goals ourselves but we conceded bad goals as a defensive unit and it cost us.

Swindon can't be high on confidence coming into this game. They started the season strongly and were highly placed when we played there. We got a good win and since then they've hardly won a game.

If we can put in a good performance then we can bounce back from those two defeats.





Marlon Beresford will make his debut in goal for us tonight after joining from Burnley.

I feel we've been living on a knife-edge for about a year-and-a-half with our goalkeeping situation. Last season we had a problem with Gary Walsh and Mark Schwarzer being injured and Ben Roberts had to play with an injury.

This season Ben has had a back injury and that looks like it could be long-term. We also don't know how long Mark will be out for.

We've got Andy Dibble here and I did look at bringing in players on loan but we need permanent cover. All top clubs have fierce competition for the goalkeeper's jersey so it can only help us to have another good 'keeper here.

I've always rated Marlon very highly and people have been talking about him as a 'keeper with great potential for quite a few years.

Clubs had always been put off by Burnley's high asking price but he was out of contract in the summer and Burnley were willing to come down.

He's a big lad and I expect him to do well. He's ready for the challenge of competing with Mark and Ben for a first team place.

Hamilton Ricard should also be with us later this week. I'm delighted that the work permit has come through and his arrival should give us a lift for the end-of-season run-in.

He's a top player with experience at the highest level. He's tall, strong and quick and will add a bit of extra quality to the squad.

We have a free week next week so we will have a good chance to get him settled in and hopefully, after tonight and the game at Portsmouth on Saturday, we will have two good results under our belts to turn things round.

Beresford, 28, started his career at Sheffield Wednesday but never made a first team appearance at Hillsborough. He had loan spells at Bury, Ipswich, Northampton and Crewe before joining Burnley for £95,000 in 1992.

MARK HOPING FOR CUP FINAL COMEBACK

Injured Boro number one Mark Schwarzer is hoping a swift recovery could still give him the chance to play in the Coca-Cola Cup Final.

Schwarzer believes three weeks could be sufficient recovery time and that would give him a good chance of playing at Wembley and then figuring in the promotion run-in.

"This sort of injury can take three to six weeks but I'm hoping, as it's a partial tear of the muscle, it will be only three or three and a half weeks," said the Australian.

"I'm in seven days a week at the training ground getting treatment and it's coming along in leaps and bounds so I'm hopeful."

Contrary to reports it is not the thigh muscle that has kept Schwarzer out.

He explained:"I had had problems for a couple of weeks with a tendon in my groin and something had to give. I was turning to run back to goal in the Crewe game when I tore the muscle in my groin."

Ben Roberts has suffered a further injury setback, breaking down in training when he was hoping to return to action for Boro.

The young goalkeeper has been out for more than three months with a mystery back complaint and now looks set to be missing for some time yet.

Ben explained: "I've had problems for several months with pains in my lower back. I've been to see quite a few specialists and had lots of scans but we're not sure what it is.

"It seemed to have calmed down and I went back into training last week but after four days I broke down again. It's really frustrating because I don't know how long it will be and especially when I might have been playing again with Mark getting injured.

"I really want to get back to fitness but it's not looking too good at the moment."



The Willie Maddren Centre was opened by MP Tom Pendry (below), the chairman designate of the Football Trust, who had sponsored the scheme with a £350,000 grant.

Based in the stadium's
Comcast East Stand, the
centre offers a two-day
course of education
through football to
every 10 and 11year-old on

Teesside. The popular course is already heavily booked for the remainder of the academic year by which time over 2,500 children from 50 of the region's schools will have attended.

The first scheme of its size in the country, the course promotes healthy eating, good behaviour and discipline whilst teaching National Curriculum subjects

like maths, geography and science.

Former Boro star Willie, who is now suffering from Motor Neurone Disease, said: "I'm honoured that my name will be linked with such a novel scheme which will benefit future generations. I am staggered by the

quality of the centre which is indicative of just how far the club has progressed. Middlesbrough are truly ready for the 21st Century both on and off the pitch."

MFC community initiatives consultant Jack Ord

explaines the project to invited guests.

The launch event also included the official opening of the stadium's George Hardwick Suite, the club's latest hospitality facility in the East Stand. George joined Willie among the special guests, while the event was also attended by Bryan Robson, Viv Anderson and representatives of key sponsors Comcast Teesside, Teesside Training and Enterprise Council, Tees Health Authority and South Tees Acute Hospitals NHS Trust.

The club's community initiatives consultant Jack Ord said: "The first course was held in January and we have had a fantastic response from all who have been on the scheme since. This is an ideal way of the football club putting something back into the community."

Sunderland's loss was definitely Boro's gain when a young Mark Summerbell decided to team up with Boro.

Summerbell, then an eager 11-year-old schoolboy, attended the Boro's School of Excellence in Durham during the Bruce Rioch era.

And even though he had the chance to sign for his beloved Sunderland, Boro's reputation for nurturing young talent won the day.

He signed schoolboy forms at 14,YTS forms at 16 and turned professional at 18.

And now, after a clutch of dynamic midfield performances, the 21-year-old has recently put pen to paper on a contract

which ties him to Boro for three and a half years.

Not bad for a one-time Roker Park season ticket holder who used to name Gary Rowell among his favourite players!

Mark, who hails from and still lives in Durham, said: "All my family used to go and watch Sunderland. A lot still do and so do all my mates, but I'm Boro through and through now.

"I got offers to go to Sunderland before I signed schoolboy forms with Middlesbrough, but the main thing was Boro's record with young lads. Everyone got their chance.

"I never had a doubt in my mind about signing. As much as I was a Sunderland supporter in those days, I knew I wanted to play for Middlesbrough.

"My friends give me a bit of stick, but it's all in fun. They're all behind me, as much as they want Sunderland to do well."

Certainly, Mark's displays this season make Boro fans glad he's gracing the Cellnet Riverside Stadium rather than the Stadium of Light.

"I never had a doubt in my mind about signing. As much as I was a Sunderland supporter in those days, I knew I wanted to play for Middlesbrough...

His all-action style won rave reviews and earned him an extended run in the first-team before Christmas, only ended by an ankle ligament injury picked up at Maine Road.

You'd think one of his most memorable moments would have been the Coca-Cola Cup Fourth round tie with Bolton Wanderers when he scored his first Boro goal.

But thanks to a Boro old boy, the memory of the ball hitting the back of the net is a bit of a blur.

He explained: "I can't remember too much about it, to be honest. Jamie Pollock tried to challenge me at the same time as I kicked the ball.

"I remember the ball being pulled back but, as he tackled me, I knocked my knee against his. It really hurt. I can remember hobbling away as everyone was congratulating me."



For the record, the ball was knocked back by Craig Hignett and Mark looped it into the net.

But it was
Mark's overall
performance
which
delighted
Robbo, who
described it as
"excellent",
and impressed
the Evening
Gazette, who
dubbed him
"tireless and
tidy".

His impressive work-rate is one of the most noticeable features of his play, a trait doubtless enhanced by learning his trade alongside the likes of Robbie Mustoe.

Mark says: "Players like Robbie, Emerson and Andy
Townsend have been different class with me. Even when Robbie wasn't playing himself, he'd help me and give me advice. I suppose I like to get stuck in, in the same way as players like Robbie do."

Mark's debut was in April 1996, when he came on as substitute at Tottenham ahead of a Brazilian World Cup winner.

He explained: "I was just chuffed to be travelling -I didn't really think I'd be

involved. Even when Robbie Mustoe got injured and had to come off, my first reaction was that Branco would come on. I was a bit shocked to be told to get ready, but it all happened so fast, I didn't have a chance to think about it."

And as for the boss who gave him that first chance, Mark has an obvious respect.

"There's nothing you can say other than that he's the best in the business. You can only learn from him."

And like many fans, he can't believe the transformation in Boro as a club in just a few years.

He said: "When I first came, we were getting gates of around 6,000 at Ayresome Park. The change since then has been unbelievable - it's great to be part of such a big club."

Mark also doesn't feel morale was as bad last year as was sometimes suggested.

"Obviously it's brilliant this season, but morale is always good when you're doing well. It seemed fine last year, too, although it obviously helps when you're at the top of the league rather than the bottom."

And with Boro and Sunderland both flying high in Division One, it's certainly going to make life interesting in the Summerbell household.

MANAGER INTERVIEW

STEVE MCMAHON by Marcus Lee

Steve McMahon is currently experiencing one of those nightmare runs that all managers dread. In just four short months the Swindon boss has seen his team pick up a mere 12 points from a possible 54 and exit the FA Cup to non-league Stevenage Borough. Oh, and not forgetting an FA misconduct

charge for himself.



A 1-0 home victory against Bradford City in mid-November enabled Swindon to move to the top of Division One, but their dismal run of form has had dire consequences with the top spot now seeming a million miles away.

The Robins are instead sliding towards the relegation zone, much to the anger of the club's fans, who have displayed banners calling for the manager's head. But McMahon is adamant that he is the right man to turn the club's fortunes around.

"I won't let a small minority of supporters drive me out," insists McMahon. "Of course I'm not happy about our form at the moment but what can I do?

"If there's a manager out there who can do a better job on the same

resources, I'd happily walk away. But I'm no quitter and I can sleep at night knowing that I'm doing my best."

Indeed, McMahon knows that while the top clubs in the division can go out and spend millions on new players, he is in the unenviable position of having to scrimp and save to balance the books.

Giant striker Wayne Allison's £800,000 move to Huddersfield Town is a case in point, as his departure coincided with the club's nose-dive down the table. Injuries and suspensions to key players such as Mark Walters and Chris Hay have also hindered Swindon's cause.

"If the fans knew of the problems we have got they would understand the difficulties," said McMahon. "I'm a proud person and it hurts me to see the banners. I want to strengthen the squad but the players we can get must be better than what we've already got."

One man that understands the difficult position that McMahon

is in is Swindon chairman Rikki Hunt. He backs his man to the hilt

"Steve McMahon is going to be at the club for a long time, and as long as I'm here, so will he," admitted Hunt. "If he left it would be because he wanted to."

The pressure is definitely on, but after a glittering 18-year playing career where he won a hatful of medals and gained the reputation of being a footballing "hard-man", McMahon is used to high-pressure situations.

The Liverpool-born 36-year-old began his playing career at Everton, before moving across Merseyside, via Aston Villa, to Anfield. Here he emerged as the driving force in a Liverpool midfield that was to sweep all before them, winning three league championships and two FA Cup winners' medals.

He then moved to Manchester City in 1991, before ending up at Swindon Town in December 1994.

His tough-tackling approach won him 17 England caps, but the footballing principles he experienced as a player at Anfield have not been lost on him in management. His Swindon team have gained many plaudits for their slick and inventive passing approach to the game.

In his first full season as player-manager at the County Ground, McMahon inspired his team to the 1996 Division Two championship - this after the Robins had suffered two successive relegations.

Progress was made again last season, as Swindon consolidated their position in Division One by finishing 19th and, despite the chants made by a minority of supporters, the Robins have continued their progress this term, while also maintaining their entertaining style of play.

However, McMahon knows that if he fails to reach the play-offs, the club will have to pay back £35,000 to supporters under an agreement made with season ticket holders.

McMahon is under no illusions as to the size of the task facing him as the season moves into a crucial phase.

"I've said it before, but we're over-achieving at the moment considering the limited resources we have," he said. "We were in first place after 17 games and now we've come down to earth a bit.

"If it had been the other way around. If we had started slowly and then come good fans would now be praising us. It's hard to accept the banners because it is pre-meditated."

McMahon finishes:
"I still believe we have the ability and we ve got enough games to go to make the playoffs, but it s going to be a hard task ahead."

Swindon Connections

Club historian Harry Glasper trawls through the archives to bring back memories of some of those players that have played their part in the history of Boro and Swindon.

Jon Gittens

Stylish defender Jonathan Antoni Gittens (left) was born in Birmingham on January 22, 1964 and initially played for non-League side Paget Rovers. At the comparatively late age of 21, he became a professional with Chris Nicholl's Southampton in October 1985 but he made only four League appearances for the Saints in his first season. Another 14 appearances followed before his move out of the Dell to Lou Macari's Swindon Town in July 1987. Jon became a regular with the Robins for the next four seasons averaging over 30 games each



his Boro debut at home to Blackburn Rovers in a goal-less draw four days later.

As most of you will know, Jon scored only one goal for Boro but, arguably, it was one of the most important in the club's recent history. He scored the vital winner at Molineux which clinched Boro's promotion to the Premier League in May 1992. In the summer of that year he turned down the chance to join Wimbledon and Newcastle United to come to Ayresome Park in a £250,000 permanent move but lasted only one season at Middlesbrough. He was on his way to Portsmouth in the summer of 1993 and spent three seasons at Fratton Park before a transfer to his current club Torquay United.

spend seven seasons at Boothferry Park registering a total of 60 appearances before a move to Swindon Town in July 1957. After 91 games he was allowed to leave the County Ground and ended up working on the production line at Ford's Dagenham plant playing non-League football with King's Lynn.

In July 1959 his League career was resuscitated by a £6,000 transfer to Joe Mercer's Aston Villa and, whilst at Villa Park, John won a League Cup winner's medal against Rotherham United in the first ever final of the competition, which was then played on a home and away basis, as well as the Second Division championship. John left the Midlands giant to sign for Alvin Williams' Southend United in November 1962, finally retiring from playing in June 1967 at the age of 35.

John joined Wrexham as coach, then followed a fruitful 10 years' association with the Racecourse Ground club. As manager John guided Wrexham to promotion from Division Four and also took the Welsh club into the quarter-finals of the European Cup-Winners' Cup.

When Jack Charlton resigned as Boro manager the club turned to Third Division Wrexham for Jack's successor and John became Boro's 16th manager on May 19, 1977. John was responsible for bringing John Mahoney, Billy Ashcroft. Terry Cochrane and Irving Nattrass (all record buys) to the club. The purchases of Micky Burns and Bosco Jankovic added some flair to Boro's forward line but David Armstrong, Terry Cooper, John Hickton, Craig Johnston, David Hodgson, David Mills, Mark Proctor and Graeme Souness were all allowed to leave the club whilst he was manager.

Indeed, it was the sale of Craig Johnston to Liverpool that caused John to leave the club to manage Chelsea in May 1981. At Stamford Bridge, Neal led Chelsea's charge to the Second Division championship in 1984 but heart surgery in 1985 saw him replaced by Dave Hollins with Neal being shuffled "upstairs" in the capacity of consultant but he and Chelsea parted company in late October 1986.

John Walker

Scottish international full-back John Walker was born in Beith, playing his early football as a part-time outside-left for his home town club. Whilst taking part in a dinner-time kick-about at the factory where he worked he was coerced into playing as a full-back. Scottish Second Division side Raith Rovers spotted him playing for Burnbank Athletic and signed him up. Glasgow giants Rangers picked him up for a meagre £60 and he moved to Ibrox in 1905 but within two years was taken on by Southern League side Swindon Town. At Town he won the first of his nine full Scotland caps and



helped the Robins win the Southern League championship, winning the plaudits of all and sundry and was, in many fans' opinion, the best full back in the Southern League.

Boro manager Tom McIntosh forked out a hefty £1,000 to prise Walker away from Town and John played for Boro in 109 games either side of the Great War before a move to Reading in 1921. He returned to Swindon at the end of his career and ran a fish shop in the town for many years.

"It's a game of two halves" is a bit of a football cliché but in Swindon Town's case it's been more a case of a season of two halves.

The first part was a very successful one. It started efficiently with a 2-0 victory over newly-promoted Crewe. The goalscorers were Wayne Allison and Steve Finney, the duo who had scored the goals in the Second Division Championship season of 1995-96. It was a victory which gave some heart to supporters who, after a dismal end to the 1996-97 season, feared the side might not be good enough to stay up.

One of the reasons for this optimism was the performance of Philippe Cuervo obtained from Paris St Germain for free. The

skills of the tall, elegant midflelder were one of the reasons for the early season successes of the Town.

Early history: As with many clubs, Swindon began life as an off-shoot of a cricket club, going under the name of the Spartans. It is widely accepted that 1881 is the year that the club became Swindon Town. But there is no evidence to confirm that this occurred before 1883 when the club amalgamated with St Mark's Young Men's Friendly Society. The club took over the County Ground in 1896 and was an original member of Division Three in 1920.

Even if there was the disappointment of an early exit from the Coca-Cola Cup at the hands of Watford, Swindon continued to prosper in the League.

A factor in their success was the goalscoring exploits of Chris Hay. Hay, signed from Celtic in the close season, seemed to be a perfect foil for Wayne Allison.

Allison was the workhorse of the team, happy to hold the ball up and be kicked from behind without complaint but unable to finish in "one on ones" with the keeper.

On the other hand, Hay was the invisible man, like the great Swindon icon. Don Rogers, he might contribute nothing for 85 minutes and then destroy a team with a clinical strike when he finally got a chance.

He began a real purple patch with a hat-trick against Port Vale which was to see him notch 10 goals in

nine games before he lost his place due to suspension and then injury.

Also prominent in this period, which saw Swindon Town rise to top of the First Division table, was Alan McDonald. A free transfer from Queens Park Rangers, McDonald, a Northern Ireland international, might have lost some pace but had lost none of the positional sense and strength in the air which had won him international honours.

The turning point was almost certainly the sale of Wayne Allison - "the Chief" - as he was known to Swindon fans. Financially this made good sense. Allison would have been able to move for nothing at the end of the season and Swindon's directors did not

feel able to turn down the £800,000 on offer from Huddersfield. That Huddersfield were willing to pay this much for his services indicated they

were more prepared to gamble on keeping First Division status than Town were on reaching for the Premiership.

All seemed to be well at first as Steve Cowe, a £100,000 signing from Aston Villa, who had been unable to hold down a first team place, scored the first time he replaced Allison. Time was to show, however, that Allison's departure was to effect Swindon's performances most notably in defence where his strength in the air was sadly missed at corners.

It was against Boro that Swindon unveiled Allison's replacement. George Ndah had been signed from Crystal Palace for £500,000. A record of around a dozen goals in over a hundred matches did not seem that impressive but when he scored the opening goal against Boro his lightning pace certainly impressed the Swindon faithful. Sadly, he has not scored since and has spent a long time side-lined with injury. Fraser Digby has been

doing splendid work as Swindon's keeper since he joined from Manchester United 10 years ago. The affection in which he is held by the Swindon faithful is shown by the

fact that more turned up for his testimonial, against


what was a Manchester United reserve team, than for many League fixtures at the County Ground.

Unfortunately, it was Digby's error that gave Boro their equaliser and if he was unfortunate that a poor kick went straight to an opponent, he was even more unfortunate that the player the kick went to was the skilful Paul Merson and that Boro went on to win.

Since then Swindon have been in virtual free fall. A major problem has been a lack of a regular defence. Brian Borrows, signed from Coventry City where he played in the 1985 Cup final team, has given some impressive performances but often the defence has lacked stability both in terms of personality and shape.

A notable performance in this respect came in the home match with Oxford United. Playing a flat back four. Town had looked in trouble and were lucky not to be more than one goal down. Switching to three central defenders and with two wing-backs they turned the game round and won 4-1.

Swindon's disciplinary record has not been the best in the League and the loss of players through suspension hits a club with Swindon's limited

Bulgarian international Hristo Stoichkov (below right) has done little this season to change his reputation as one of football's most eccentric and temperamental players.

Well known for falling out with managers and team-mates in the past, Stoichkov's latest target is Louis Van Gaal (left), the Dutchman who is his manager at Barcelona.

The striker has found himself frozen out of the first team at Barcelona and has made no secret of his distaste for the man in charge.

The writing was on the wall fairly early on when Van Gaal took exception to Stoichkov training while wearing a pair of glasses identical to those worn by the manager.

His next step was to criticise the manager's

tactics in the press joking to press men that soon Van Gaal would be playing with seven strikers.

But the final straw was when Stoichkov was asked for his response to a newspaper poll which found that 73 per cent of Barca's fans blamed Van Gaal for the team's disappointing season.

The Bulgarian said: "Perfect. The people know who is to blame"

Football is a passionate game but in the Central American country of Guatemala passions ran over more than usual when a minor scuffle between two players led to a full-scale riot that stopped just short of civil war.

The incident occurred after a local derby between two bitter

rivals in Guatemala City. Communicaciones had just thrashed Municipal 3-0 when two players became involved in a scuffle.

It is unclear who started the fight but in any case within seconds all 22 players as well as substitutes and coaches had become involved.

Needless to say, the supporters soon joined the fray and pitched battles broke out around the stadium. The fighting then spilled out into the car park and onto the streets where people who were not even at the game became involved.

The city's police were stretched to the limit to quell the fighting and tear gas canisters and batons were needed to calm down the situation. The incident was so serious that 72 people were hospitalised overnight.

A police spokesman, in brilliantly understated style, said: "In Guatemala we take our football too seriously."

Britain's football task force could be taking on its own kind of hooligans - mad fathers.

David Mellor's team has been asked to look into the problem of partisan parents by the London Federation of Clubs for Young People.

They are calling for a crackdown on dads who "applaud cheating and resort to violence, swearing and abuse when attending football matches being played by boys and girls as young as 10"

Many Boro fans might disagree but, apparently, going out to watch football is good for your health.



They found that people who went to watch exciting outdoor sports events tend to live longer than people that don't.

One of the researchers explained: "Men and women who go out to watch football matches have stronger immune systems than

those who watch it from the comfy sofa. A stronger immune system protects the body from disease."

ark Proctor's story sums up everything that was wrong with the Boro of old.

Midway through the 1980-81 season, Proctor was a star of the side which looked set to finally put Boro on the map.

Glory beckoned for John Neal and his men as Johnston, Hodgson, Armstrong and Proctor himself took Boro to within two steps of an FA Cup Final.

The failure to beat Wolves in the sixth round was disappointing enough, but it was to prove far more significant than most fans realised.

Those young stars came to realise their only chance of big-time success was away from Ayresome Park and one by one the side of '81 was decimated.

Proctor says he would have loved to stay with Boro but the players sensed it was time to abandon ship.

He says: "That side WAS probably a player or two Short from competing with the big boys but all were sold.

"We reached the the FA Cup quarter final and finished midtable but a lot of the older players were talking about the team being broken up and it was decimated.

"In actual fact, the older lads were advising me not to re-sign and in the summer I went to Forest under freedom of contract.

"I would've loved to stay if things had been right but it was going the opposite way."

As Boro began their infamous slide to near-extinction, Proctor was turning out for Brian Clough in Nottingham, while Johnston and Hodgson were competing for top honours at Liverpool and Armstrong was with Lawrie McMenemy at Southampton.

Proctor never fully settled by the Trent, though he says playing for Clough was an "experience" even if he was terrified of the legendary boss.

A couple of years later, he was back in Middlesbrough. Unfortunately for Boro, he was a Sunderland player but chose to live in his home town and commute up the A19 every day.

Proctor enjoyed his days at Sunderland, then a top flight club, and became a mainstay of the Roker midfield.

But fortunes on Wearside took a dive similar to those of

Boro, with relegation to the old division three in 1987 marking the end of Proctor's time at the club.

Offered a return to the top flight at Sheffield Wednesday, "Proc" teamed up with Howard Wilkinson and spent two years at Hillsborough before a shock call from Boro coach Colin Todd brought a move back to Ayresome in March, 1989.

Proctor says: "It came right out of the blue. Colin Todd rang me and it was sorted out in 24 hours.

"It was a funny situation to come back to because both Wednesday and Boro were in the bottom eight and were due to play each other in the last game.

"I remember looking at the fixture list and thinking it couldn't end up being a crucial game but we ended up going there needing to win.

Boro failed to get that victory, losing to a Steve Whitton goal and dropping out of the top flight at the death.

"That was the worst day of my career, a massive disappointment," admits Proctor.

"The next season I was certain we would go straight back up but we ended up needing to win the last game of the season again to stay up. We beat Newcastle."

That bleak season of 1989-90 did have a highlight, as Proctor skippered Boro in the club's first ever game at Wembley in the ZDS Cup.

Proctor stayed on the Boro roller-coaster for three more

years - appearing in the play-offs, winning promotion to the Premier League and then tasting relegation once more in 1993.

He is still disappointed at his lack of first team opportunities in that final year in the Premier.


He says: "To be fair to Lennie Lawrence he has said in print that I did not get a fair chance, but I don't know why I was not given that chance. In the end, I was pushed out of the club which was a shame because I had wanted to finish my career at Boro."


A spell at Tranmere followed - and last season Proctor's battle-weary legs were turning out for Hartlepool after an SOS from their boss, Mick Tait.


Now 37, he is back where he started, this time on the other side of the fence coaching Boro's juniors and working at the School of Excellence.


Proctor can only hope the generation of stars he is trying to bring through will not also be forced to turn their
