

This afternoon we welcome the players, supporters and staff of Wolverhampton Wanderers Football Club to the County Ground for today's Nationwide League Division One match.

We hope you all enjoy your trip to Wiltshire and that you have a safe journey home after the match.

Wanderers perennial flirtation with the upper reaches of the First Division table is once more underway, with the club lying in 8th spot at the time of writing and the Molineux faithful praying that it is not going to be yet another case of so near and yet so far.

A strong FA Cup run has been a pleasing distraction this season, but for everyone involved with Wolves it is promotion to the Premiership which remains far and away the top priority.

Last season saw the Wolves go

their closest yet to regaining the top flight position they last held in 1983/84. An awful lot of water has passed under the bridge since those days, with the Molineux club crashing down the tables to the old Fourth Division, before bouncing back up to the First on the back of a massive cash injection from lifelong fan Sir Jack Hayward who has rebuilt the club, stadium and self-belief of the famous Black Country outfit.


Last season they reached the *Play-Offs* and looked in a comfortable position at *Crystal Palace* in the first leg of the Semi-Final before Scottish U21 international *Dougie*Freedman - now, ironically, a *Wolves* player - scored twice in the final minute to give Palace a 3-1 cushion to take to Molineux.

And how they needed it as Mark McGhee's side tore into the South Londoners in the return match. It finished 2-1 to Wolves, condemning the club to at least another year in Division One. This season has seen a steady if unspectacular start, with new signings like *Freedman*, his ex-Palace colleague *Kevin Muscat*, former England U21 star *Steve Sedgley* and Finnish international *Mixu Paatelainen* blending well with the established players at Molineux.

A spate of injuries haven't helped Mark McGhee's cause, but the emergence of former YTS players such as *Carl Robinson* and the electric *Robbie Keane* has helped to balance that disappointment somewhat.

Among the division's leading scorers this term, *Wolves* have served notice of their power with some impressive wins this season, none more so than the 5-0 battering they handed to *Norwich City* in January.

They defeated *Swindon* 3-1 at *Molineux* back in October, courtesy of goals from Freedman, Keith Curle and Paul Simpson. *Steve McMahon's* men will be looking to avenge that result tonight.



He may not have won many friends in the environs of Reading and Leicester, but Mark McGhee can lay claim to being one of the brightest young managers in the British game.

A quality player in his days with Newcastle, Aberdeen, Hamburg, Celtic and Scotland, McGhee has obviously learned well from the leading coaches he played under and - at Reading in particular - he has shown a great ability for producing results whilst still playing some quality football on a shoestring budget. It was as a striker with Aberdeen that McGhee first hit the headlines as he played his part in the Dons' hugely successful sides of the mid-1980s. A clever and thoughtful frontman, with plenty of ball skills, McGhee netted a total of 63 goals in 164 League appearances for the Dons and helped them to an historic 1983 European Cup-Winners' Cup victory over Real Madrid, as well as three Scottish Cup triumphs.

He took over as player-

manager at Reading in the summer of 1991, and the Royals only narrowly avoided relegation in his first season in charge. The 1992/93 term saw an improvement, and in 1993/94 his bright young side took the Second Division by storm to lift the title. With the following campaign beginning in much the same style, Reading were riding high in Division One when McGhee suddenly packed his bags and moved on to Filbert Street, taking his assistant Colin Lee with him to the Midlands.

> > hotseat he was tempted to Molineux as successor to ex-England boss Graham Taylor.

With Wolves struggling for form, McGhee was quick to steady the ship and after a substantial rebuilding period he feels that the 1997/98 campaign could finally be the one where the massive potential at Molineux is finally realised - and millionaire President Sir Jack



Former Scottish Schoolboy international Billy Kellock gets the Wolves goal in their 1-1 draw with Derby at the Baseball Ground. The end of the season sees them win promotion to the old first Division.

FLASH-BACK

Former England international
Neil Webb made his Swindon
debut on Saturday October 8th
1994 when a near capacity
crowd of 15,036 flocked to the
County Ground to see Swindon
take on First Division leaders
Wolverhampton Wanderers. The
13th minute proved unlucky for
Town when Dave Kelly fired
Wolves in front. The luck turned
two minutes later when a lob by

Paul Bodin beat Mike Stowell in the Wolves goal. It was sufficiently over the line to be judged a goal by the linesman in a Wembley 1966 type controversy. In the 28th minute, Fjortoft set up Keith Scott who fired in from 10 yards. Mark Walters, on loan from Liverpool, tested Digby in the Town goal but it was Kelly who equalised for Wolves in the 41st minute. The decider came when Joey

Beauchamp scored his first goal for Town with a shot from 30 yards in the 60th minute. It was perhaps the high point of John Gorman's managership at Swindon with Town in 5th place just 3 points behind leaders Wolves. 13th March


Light session including running and some team games then it was back to the County Ground for the chicken and pasta.




14th March



Nevertheless, as the score line suggests, we were beaten by a better team that we couldn't contain. All three goals were due to defensive mistakes. Players need to defend much better.


On a more positive note, Carl Robinson and Paul McAreavey,



With so much talk about continental styles of play I thought we, at Swindon could benefit by learning a bit more about different training techniques to improve our youngsters.

I attended a Youth Coaches Seminar put on by the FA where we were shown SAQ speed training. SAQ (Speed, Agility, Quickness) emphasises the importance of rapid acceleration and how to increase a players ability to move away quickly.

Any top athlete will tell you that the first five yards when sprinting, is the most important. Football is no exception to this. In addition, increased agility can reduce the chance of suffering a nasty injury when playing.

In addition to this we've also

been looking at ways of utilising the afternoons so they are not just taken up with trainee duties. One idea we have tried is aerobics at the Railway Fitness Centre. Here our instructor Laura, takes the lads through a hard work out. In addition to increasing fitness this type of work is good for keeping your feet quick and aiding awareness and co-ordination.





This group of lads have been together for a few years now and fully understand what is required of them.


This was shown in the way they played the match. The boys were committed, worked hard and showed some good skills.

Those of you who came to the Man City game may remember the exhibition game played by kids from the School of Excellence and the Soccer



Cup - FIFA chief backs us
for 2006" That was the
front-page headline and
lead story in one national
newspaper last Thursday.

It claimed: "England looks set to stage the 2006 World Cup after football's most powerful boss dramatically backed our bid last night."

It really is amazing how a meaningless comment, and one certainly that truly has little substance with regards to the coming event, can be blown up into a major issue like this. To say that the way it was presented is somewhat misleading is an understatement.

The crux of the tale was FIFA president Joao Havelange's meeting with Premier Tony Blair at number 10 Downing Street and his subsequent statement to the world at the press conference afterwards.

The excitement hinged on these words from Dr Havelange: "It's my personal wish that it will be decided that the World Cup 2006 will indeed take place here in England."

Sounds fine if you can believe him, Joao Havelange, a crusty Brazilian media tycoon, has never shown any love for the British in the past and most of his words are politically motivated rather than sincere.

He actually expressed the same "sincere" backing for the South African cause when he visited them and has also given support to Germany. Let's hope he doesn't land up in Liechtenstein and give them the

same message.

This rather austere man, who is in his eighties and should have relinquished his high office donkeys years ago, was reelected on the vote of soccer's third world countries. He promised the Africans, Arabs and other minor footballing nations he would win them greater representation in the World Cup if they gave him their vote. They did do and to be fair he has delivered as the World Cup Finals this year amplify.

The top two promotion spots are not as clear cut as it has seemed for most of the season. Nottingham Forest, who returned to the top rung of the









Despite these results, we were still playing reasonably well and creating chances. If there is such a thing as luck then we didn't have it.


The above makes grim reading, but it only highlights why it was so vital that we got a result against QPR.

After being injured for much of this season, Frank Talia surprised everybody by returning to the first team against Bury.

If this wasn't enough, despite being beat 1-0 the "Aussie" was voted Man of the Match, pulling off a string of great saves.

"It was a surprise when the Gaffa told me to put the shirt on" said Frank. "But I was just glad to be back, and after 90 minutes I was encouraged by what I did."

Division One is a far cry from Talia's schoolboy years. Being brought up in Australia, children are more likely to take up "Aussie Rules" football or rugby. But he always wanted to be a goalkeeper.

"I started playing for my local team, then I went to a city side while also being picked for state teams.

After this I was lucky enough to get a scholarship for the Institute of Sport, which is the Australian equivalent of Lilleshall."

Frank got his first break when he was selectedfor the under 21 national team. It was here that he was spotted by an agent who suggested a move to Britain.

Once in England Talia had a quick succession of trials with Chelsea, QPR and finally Blackburn Rovers, where he eventually signed in 1992.

Within the space of a month

Talia had moved from Australian football to training with the likes of Alan Shearer.

"There was a real difference in the standard of football" he said. "The players were slightly sharper and more aggressive. But I managed to settle down quite fast.

"Playing with Shearer and Sutton while learning from Tim Flowers, the first choice keeper, was a great grounding for me."

Although he was on the bench a few times, Frank Talia never really challenged Mimms or Flowers.

"I wanted first team football, and the time was right for a move to another club. Luckily at this time, Swindon took me on loan."


Talia was taken on loan as a second goalkeeper in November 1995 and was eventually part of the squad that won the Division Two Championship.

Talia has proven himself a worthy challenger to Swindon stalwart Fraser Digby, but injury after injury has halted his progress.

It was the recurrence of a knee injury that has sidelined Talia.

"It is very frustrating, I'm a pro and I want to do what I get paid for.

"But if I keep working hard with my rehab I'm sure I can


