Peter Jackson's Matchday Thoughts

WAS very down after our last home game against Norwich because I was so disappointed with our performance. We got off to a bad start by conceding an early goal but when their goalkeeper was sent off moments later we had 81 minutes left to win the game against 10 men and a stand-in goalkeeper. But we just never got our act together and failed to put the 'keeper under any sort of sustained pressure.

Going into those successive home matches against Birmingham and Norwich I would have said we needed a minimum of four points to maintain our challenge. We could and should have won both games, but ended up with just two points. Realistically that made our hopes of a top six finish very unlikely, but I'm always of the belief that you have to remain positive and until it is a mathematical impossibility we'll give it everything to pull it off.

I want to finish the season as strongly as possible. Compared to last season we've made a big improvement, but expectations here are now much higher and we're determined to turn those hopes into reality.

Since my last programme notes we've said goodbye to Dave Phillips and Marcus Browning. Neither was likely to feature next season and I'm pleased they've both been fixed up with new opportunities elsewhere.

We've brought in Jamie Vincent from Bournemouth after keeping a close watch on him for some time. He will be a big asset and having also brought in Craig Armstrong a few weeks ago we have two players who will be in our plans for next season. There will be other major signings during the summer. I've let some players go to make room for new faces coming in and next season will be a big one for this club.

ALL THE NEWS FROM BEHIND THE SCENES

MARCH

19th – Peter Jackson reveals that Des Hamilton, back from suspension, and Delroy Facey will be in the starting line-up tomorrow against Birmingham City.

20th – Michael Johnson heads the Blues into a 47th minute lead at the McAlpine, but Delroy Facey equalises 7 minutes later with a spectacular volley. He later leaves the field injured after Gary Rowett is sent off 10 minutes from time for a foul on him – his second bookable offence in three minutes. But Town are unable to go on and win the game and Peter Jackson announces after the match that he's hopeful of making a major signing before the transfer deadline in five days time.



22nd – Town announce they've signed two teenagers from Hong Kong and get international clearance for them to play for the juniors for the rest of the season. 18-year-old Kim Hung Man and 17-yearold Wai Chiu Ng were introduced to the club by P.R. Manager Dale Tempest who played in Hong Kong for nine years.

23rd – Delroy Facey (calf) and Steve Jenkins (ankle) are ruled out of tomorrow's match against Norwich, but Des Hamilton and his club Newcastle agree he can stay on loan at the McAlpine for the rest of the season.

24th - In a remarkable match Town draw 1-1 with the Canaries.

After going behind to a fourth minute goal from Daryl Russell Town are boosted by the sending off five minutes later of Norwich goalkeeper Andy Marshall for a foul on Marcus Stewart. But despite being down to 10 men, and with full back Daryl Sutch in goal, Bruce Rioch's side hold out until the 84th minute when Ben Thornley's corner is deflected past Sutch by Paul Hughes for an own goal. The match attracts the lowest McAlpine league crowd of the season – 9,717. David Phillips leaves Town to join Lincoln City on a free transfer.

25th – On transfer deadline day it's exclusively revealed on Huddersfield Town Clubcall at 9am that the Terriers have signed Bournemouth's highly-rated left back Jamie Vincent for £550,000. Later in the day midfielder Marcus Browning leaves to join Gillingham for £200,000.

26th – Peter Jackson vows there will be more major signings in the summer as the squad fly out for a 5-day training camp in Spain. Steve Jenkins pulls out of the Wales squad because of his ankle injury.

HATEVER the rest of the season holds for Town, it's a vital time for Paul Dalton. The gifted wingman is nearing the end of a long comeback trail following another season decimated by injury.

> It's been a frustrating spell, not only for Dalton - who will be 32 later this month -but for manager Peter

Jackson and for the fans. Former Manchester United, Hartlepool and Plymouth player Dalton is undoubtedly one of the most talented players on the books and, just over 12 months ago, he was the key figure igniting Town's famous Great Escape.

Fans thrilled to his performances and, had he been able to recapture that form this season, Dalton might easily have won a few more games for Town and made the difference between them being play-off certainties rather than top-six outsiders.

Dalton, in fact, hasn't pulled on a blue and white striped shirt for senior action since way back on November 7. He has been ruled out of the last 27 straight League and Cup matches by a troublesome foot tendon injury which required an operation and is continuing to build up his fitness in the Pontin's Central League.

"I still need a few more full games in the Reserves to sharpen up my match fitness," said Dalton, who has four goals to his credit this season despite starting just 10 matches.

Mel Booth Examiner Chief Football Correspondent talks with Paul Dalton

"The first three Reserve games I figured in I was unable to complete the game, especially the first one when I just didn't feel right at all.

"Since then, though, I've managed to get a couple of full games under my belt and it's a matter of building from there."

So what do the closing weeks of the season mean to a man whose contract runs to the end of next season?

"Ideally, I'd like to play another couple of Reserve games and then get a chance in the first team again -but it's up to me to earn it," said Dalton.

"I know I'm not getting any younger and I've had that many injuries and operations that they are starting to take their toll.

"But I'm hoping that if I can finish this season well and then get a good pre-season under my belt, I can start next time with a clean bill of health and look to reproduce my best form."

Dalton did not have a trouble-free run last summer and he believes that's at the root of the problems which have dogged him this time and robbed Jackson of a true match-winner.

"I was struggling with the ankle problem during last pre-season," he said.

"Obviously I would have liked to have done every bit as well as I did in that spell the previous season when everything was going so well for me.

"I set myself high standards and it would have been nice to have achieved those again, but I don't think I did too badly in the matches I played.

"I still got a few goals and I still did my bit, but I was playing more on the right hand side, which is not my preferred position and not the one which suits me best.

"When I was playing well, I was tucking in behind Marcus Stewart and Wayne Allison and finding the space and time to cause people problems. Ben Thornley's arrival meant that role wasn't available and, slotting in on the right, I wasn't as effective.

"I still know, though, that it's up to me to earn a place and to keep it. When I'm playing well, the manager can't leave me out, it's as simple as that.

"It would be nice to get back to that level this season, but I'm just looking at the moment to finish the season well, put my feet up for a couple of weeks once the matches are over and then get down

"I don't really want to use that as an excuse because I know I didn't play as well as I could have done at the start of this season, but I did have the problem and everything snowballed from there.

OFFICIALLY last weekend's Challenge Cup semi-final between the Leeds Rhinos and the Bradford Bulls was my last big match and Town's reserve game on Wednesday was the very last fixture that I had responsibility for.

It'll seem very strange not being in charge of the pitch here at the McAlpine on match days, but I can honestly say I've really enjoyed my job – it's been a real pleasure

It all began back in the seventies when I looked after Emley's ground. Town went up to the Welfare Ground and Tom Johnston said to me that the pitch was far better than Leeds Road and why didn't I come to work for Huddersfield Town. I agreed, but the club was having problems. We were near the bottom of Division Four and the crowd for my first match was little over 2,000. There was no money to spend and I couldn't believe the state of the pitch – it was full of weeds. I aimed to make it better, bit by bit, every season and I think I managed to achieve that, though being a perfectionist I was never perfectly happy with it.

It was a real challenge for me when we made the switch to the McAlpine. As well as keeping Leeds Road going I had to sort out the new pitch across the road. Anyone who came to the McAlpine a week before the first match here would never have thought it possible that we'd be able to play. It was like a bomb site, but we made it and I was quite happy with the way things went in the first 12 months in our new home.

But in the second year the pitch suffered badly. We played 96 games on it – first team, reserves, rugby league, rugby union, concerts and other functions and it was bound to take its toll. We pioneered new technology to put matters right and although I'm still not perfectly happy with it, I'm proud that it

looks and plays so well compared to the surfaces at Old Trafford and Stamford Bridge where they play just 20 games a season – no reserves, no rugby team etcl

We're regularly consulted by other clubs when they are planning to lay new pitches and that proves we must be getting it right. The All Blacks thought the pitch was fantastic when they played here and we've had compliments from many more clubs.

One of my abiding memories though will be from the Leeds Road days – the season we won the Fourth Division Championships and scored 101 goals. That gave a real buzz to the club. We got promoted again shortly afterwards and that was the start of the new era.

Although I'm now officially retired, I'm not going away. My son-in-law Robert Ellis has been a superb assistant and he'll now be in charge. However, I'm continuing as a consultant and will help out here and with the pitches we're having for the training ground and the academy set up.

Having started my association with the club when it was right at the bottom it would be great if we can complete the climb and get into the Premiership. We've got the stadium, the pitch is improving all the time and I'm sure the team will get there. If

I've played a small part in that success it has made my job, which started as my hobby, even more of a pleasure.

A 29-year-old defender who was signed from Sunderland. Best known as a full-back, he's versatile enough to play anywhere across the back line or in midfield. He started his career at Chelsea where he flourished under ex-Swindon boss Glenn Hoddle. He moved to Sunderland in 1995 and was a regular in the Premiership for the Wearsiders. Capped nine times for Wales. He has scored one goal this season, against West Brom.

Alan quit Wimbledon's "Crazy Gang" in search of first team football with Swindon. A tall central defender, who cost the Dons £300,000 from Rochdale four years ago when he was signed as a replacement for John Scales. An excellent header of the ball, who can be an asset in attack on set pieces. He has scored three goals this season, including two in the 3–2 defeat at home to Tranmere last month.

ADAM WILLIS

Snapped up on a free transfer from Coventry after impressive in a couple of trial matches towards the end of last season. Recommended to Swindon by veteran centre-back Brian Borrows who had watched him close-up with the Sky-Blues.

He started his career at West Brom, joined Barnsley on a free in 1986 and such was his form there that Newcastle snapped him up for £450,000 in 1993. After losing his place in the first team through injury, Swindon paid a club record £600,000 for his services in 1994 and he has been a regular and consistent performer since then. He can play at fullback, central defence and was also a success as a sweeper.

CRAIG TAYLOR

Younger brother of former Town favourite Shaun, he signed a three year deal in 1997 after impressing during a trial period. Town payed non-league Dorchester £25,000 to bring him in and despite a pre-season injury set back, he made a dream debut against Port Vale, scoring a wonder goal from fully 35 yards. Strong in the air and determined in the tackle.

BRIAN BORROWS

Former Everton, Bolton and Coventry defender signed in 1997 following a highly successful two month loan spell from Highfield Road where he made well over 400 appearances. Comfortable anywhere along the back line, but particularly effective as sweeper.

ALAN McDONALD

Having spent his entire career at Queens Park Rangers, he made his first move – to the County Ground during the summer of 1997 in a two year deal. A highly committed defender with 53 Northern Ireland international caps to his name, many of them as skipper.

DAVID KERSLAKE

Now enjoying his third stint at the County Ground having joined on a free transfer from Ipswich. He made 165 appearances for Swindon in his first spell before leaving to join Leeds United in a £500,000 deal. Later he also played in the Premier League for Tottenham. He is most effective in the right wing-back role.

SOL DAVIS

A left-sided wing-back who was offered his first pro contract in the summer of 1998 after a

series of impressive performances in the reserves. He made his league debut as a substitute at home to QPR, shortly after his 18th birthday. His first start in a Swindon shirt came six months later in the heat of a local derby clash, away at Oxford.

TY GOODEN

Ty signed in 1993 after being released by Wycombe Wanderers. He made over 30 appearances in Swindon's Second Division Championship season but was hindered by injuries in 1996/97. Having regained full fitness he has proved a real asset either as a wing-back or attacking midfielder.

SCOTT LEITCH

A former Motherwell, Dunfermline and Hearts midfielder, signed in 1996 for a bargain price of £15,000. He enjoyed a successful loan spell at the County Ground during their Second Division Championship season.

MARK WALTERS

A former England international signed in 1996 after being released by Southampton and immediately showed the silky skills which had made him such a hit at Aston Villa, Glasgow Rangers and Liverpool. A serious knee injury ruled him out of the last few months of last season. He has 11 goals to his credit this season.

KEVIN WATSON

Kevin came through Tottenham's junior ranks and made 12 first team appearances for Spurs under Terry Venables before being loaned out to Bristol City and Barnet. He joined Swindon on a free in 1996, made 18 starts

last season and has produced some superb displays in midfield.

ROBIN HULBERT

A gifted young midfielder, he made his first team bow as a substitute in the Coca Cola Cup in 1996. Towards the end of last season he went on loan to Newcastle to gain experience by training alongside some of the Premiership's top names – staying with the Geordie club right up to the FA Cup Final. He is to be included in the England Under 18 squad for the European Championships in the summer.

LEE COLLINS

Lee signed an extension to his contract during the summer. This ball winning midfielder has been used several times this season and is keen to get a regular place in the first team. He joined from Scottish Club Albion Rovers for £15,000 in 1995.

PHILIPPE CUERVO

This gifted Frenchman impressed during a trial period and was guickly signed on a three year contract from Sochaux (free transfer) just before the start of the current campaign. He was a revelation during the first two months of the season but then spent several months out with a hip problem.



BOBBY HOWE An attacking midfielder who signed for Swindon in January 1998 from Nottingham Forest where his first team opportunities had dried up. He made 17

appearances for Forest and had loan spells at Kettering and Ipswich.

A pacey young striker drafted in from Celtic for £330.000. Swindon spent a year tracking this goalscoring ace who was finding it hard to break into Celtic's first team on a regular basis. He has five goals to his credit this season.

STEVE COWE

What he lacks in height, he makes up for with his pace and skill on the ball. The live wire front man scored seven goals in 32 starts last season but has failed to find a regular slot this term. He was brought in from Aston Viila in 1996 for £100,000.

CHARLIE GRIFFEN

Like manager Jimmy Quinn, he started his career in non-league football. He was signed for £10,000 from Chippenham Town where he was top scorer in the Screwfix League with 30 goals. At nineteen years old he is a prospect for the future and the coaching staff believe that with a handful of reserve games under his belt he will be ready to step into first team football.

HEROES Where are they now?

OALSCORING midfielders are worth their weight in gold and Town may well soon boast two players from different generations, but the same family, who fit into that category. Republic of Ireland international Robert Wilson joined the Terriers from Fulham towards the end of his professional career in the 1989/90 season. Huddersfield has become his adopted home and now his 10 year old son is following in his footsteps – newly signed for Town's Academy Under 12 side.

Robert was born and bred in Fulham, of Irish parents, and the middle son of three footballing brothers. Elder brother Pat played for Watford and younger brother Anthony was an apprentice with Arsenal.

Originally a right back, Robert played for Inner London Schools alongside the likes of Clive Allen and Mark Falco. He signed schoolboy forms at Craven Cottage when he was 14, became an apprentice at 16 and made his debut as an 18 year old in midfield in a cup tie against Blackburn Rovers. His job that day was to mark Rovers' player-manager Howard Kendall. Fulham drew 1-1 but lost the replay 1-0.

He went on to play 18 consecutive games for the Londoners and soon became a regular. He was a member of the Division Three promotion winning team of 1982/83 managed by Malcolm McDonald and the following season the Cottagers missed promotion to the top flight by just one point.

"The campaign ended in tremendous controversy with the final game at Derby County", recalls Robert. "Derby had to win to stay up and we had to win to get promoted. The ground was packed and unfortunately there was crowd trouble throughout the game. We were losing 1-0 with just a couple of minutes to go when I set off down the right wing and a spectator came on to the field and kicked me. There was mayhem. The referee stopped the game,



10,000 people invaded the pitch and the game was finished two minutes short of full time. Despite our protest and appeals for a replay the result was allowed to stand."

Fulham had a talented side which featured Ray Houghton, Ray Lewington, Dean Coney, Paul Parker and Gordon Davies. But the following year the side was split up and Robert was signed by Millwall, managed at the time by George Graham for £75,000.

He scored 12 goals in 36 games before Graham left to join Arsenal and unfortunately for Wilson he

never saw eye to eye with his successor John Doherty. He moved on to Luton for £65,000 and got his first taste of soccer in the top flight, scoring on his debut against Southampton. Luton finished 8th that season but Wilson fell out with manager Ray Harford after being substituted in the first two matches of the following campaign.

"I was a silly lad really. I was so frustrated when I came off after just 20 minutes of the second game that I made a stupid gesture to the bench. The Chairman told the manager not to pick me again and I was allowed to leave for a second spell at Fulham," he said.

Two years later he moved to Leeds Road for £40,000 and Town just missed out on the play-offs. "There was a great set of lads at the club and I settled in really quickly. My mates included Craig Marshall, Chris Hutchings, Andy May and Dudley Lewis. I suffered a knee injury and the season just petered out. The same thing happened the following year and I was then out of contract," he said.

"To my surprise I was offered a free transfer at the start of the next season and I went to Rotherham with Chris Hutchings."

Robert scored on his debut for the Millers in a Friday night game against Halifax at The Shay and went on to clinch promotion from Division Four at the end of the season. But despite their success Rotherham had serious financial problems and had to cut their wage bill. Wilson was on the move again, but this time into non-league football, first with Farnborough Town in the Conference and then Altrincham and finally Ossett Albion.

He continued to live in Huddersfield and after he stopped getting picked to play football he became manager of local side Kirkburton in the District League. He still plays for them today. He earns his living these days as a Sales Manager, looking after some key national accounts, for a locally based work clothes supplier – Snickers Original Workwear.

He and his wife Lesley-Ann, who met at school when they were 14, have two children – 10 year old Adam and 13 year old Natalie – and live at Highburton. Although most of the extended family still live in London the Wilsons now regard Huddersfield as their home and they're regulars at the McAlpine, hopeful that Town will soon be in the Premiership.

DURING season 1912-13 Town played their first home match in the FA. Cup proper rounds. On January 15th 1913 First Division side Sheffield United were the victims at Leeds Road with the 3-1 scoreline in Town's favour, a very accurate reflection of the play. So Town progressed to Round Two (the equivalent of today's fourth round) for the very first time and set up a home meeting with Southern Leaguers Swindon Town.

February 1st, 1913 TOWN 1 SWINDON 2 (17,000)

UNFORTUNATELY the roles were reversed and this time the Leeds Roaders were the giants to be 'toppled' by lower league opposition. They found their less illustrious opponents had no difficulty in dealing with anything Town could offer after an early Macaulay goal and proved comfortable winners in the end. A new attendance record of 17,000 was set and the match proved to be a water-shed of a remarkable kind. It would not be until the 27th February 1932, almost twenty years later that Town would next suffer defeat in a cup tie played at Leeds Road

After Swindon's election to the Football League in 1920 they languished in Division Three for forty-three years until at last they were promoted to the (old) Second Division in 1963.

So it was that just over fifty-years later Swindon visited Leeds Road once again and this time the Yorkshire 'Town' exacted revenge by 2-0 with Len White and Les Massie being the scorers. The following April, Town visited the County Ground for the first time and completed the double with a 2-1 victory thanks to goals by Lewis and Stokes.

The following season Swindon were relegated but not before they had inflicted a painful defeat upon the Terriers.

September 26 1964 SWINDON 4 TOWN 1 (12,764)

PERHAPS there is nothing apparent which would mark out a 1-4 defeat as a match to remember, but again this match was something of a watershed. Huddersfield Town were a club in deep crisis and this was their ninth game without a win from the start of the season and one which entrenched them firmly at the bottom of the pile.

Managerless after Eddie Boot had walked out on them some week earlier, players, supporters and directors were at loggerheads.

After this debacle in Wiltshire, Town bounced back and by the end of the season had risen to a respectable eighth, whereas Swindon themselves were one of the relegation victims.

In this match Swindon scored through Summerbee on 25 mins and Smart three minutes later.

A minute into the second half Alan Gilliver shook Swindon when he netted from close range but it was to be a false dawn for the visitors.

Hunt restored the two goal advantage on 59 minutes and outside left Rogers rounded off the scoring after a clever dribble four minutes from time.

From the outside the ground is impressive enough, but inside? It's magnificent. And the old Roker Roar has moved the half-mile down the road to the Stadium of Light, and if anything has intensified. Sunderland's new ground is on the site of the old Weamouth Colliery, overlooking the river and the bridge to town. Parking at the stadium is limited, but the club has set up an efficient park-and-ride. Finding an away-friendly pub is not as easy as at Roker, and the pie shops are not as good. So make the most of the excellent "Joan's Cafe" right by the ground.

HOW TO GET THERE

By Car: M62 East to M1 Junction. Follow M1 north, continue to A1 (North). Exit A1 (M) at signpost Thirsk A168, Teeside A19 dual carriageway. Exit A19 after about 51 miles, after crossing River Wear (s/p Gateshead, Newcastle West, Sunderland North A1231). At roundabout turn right (s/p Sunderland A1231) onto the A1231 Wessington Way. Go straight on at Ferryboat Lane Roundabout after 0.2 miles (s/p City Centre A1231, Sunderland Enterprise 1, 2 and 3), there are signposts to the matchday park-and-ride. To the ground, continue straight on at all three roundabouts (s/p City Centre A1231) to fourth roundabout/junction. Here, go straight on (s/p Roker B1289) into Queens Road. Turn right at next roundabout, after 0.9 miles, to ground.



FROM RAILWAY STATION (Sunderland, 10-15 minute walk)

By Taxi: Not always available. By Bus: "Stagecoach Busways" buses leave from Fawcett Street, in front of Wilson's, The nos. 27, 28 and 29 run across Weamouth Bridge, stopping at the Wheatsheaf pub, from where it's a short walk to the ground. "Go Ahead Northern" bus nos. 131 and 538 run to the ground from the Park Lane Bus Station next to the Civic Centre. By Foot: Come out of station towards William Hill and the Alliance and Leicester Building Society. Turn left towards Wilkinsons, and left again at crossroads by Regency Windows (s/p Tourist Information) into Fawcett Street. Keep straight on, passing the AA and Woolworths to crossroads by "Tucci". Here head straight on towards and over Weamouth Bridge. Take 2nd left turn after the bridge, just before the museum, into Sheepfolds North, and first right into Hay Street to ground.

Last Midweek Trains: Trains to Newcastle run up to 22.30. However, there are no connecting trains, after an evening match, to Doncaster, Sheffield, Liverpool or London.

PARKING

The majority of the 1,200 parking spaces at the ground are allocated to season-ticket holders, but some are available if booked in advance through the Ticket Office. Many fans use the park-and-ride scheme, which is well signposted off the A1231. Leave plenty of time as the buses get caught in matchday traffic before and after the game.

There is also some street parking. Many Sunderland fans park around the site of the old Roker Park, or on the streets off Newcastle Road. For away fans, however, this means wading through the pre-match traffic on the A1231 past the ground. There are multi-storey car parks in Sunderland city centre. One of the best, and the most secure, is the one on St. Mary's Way, though it's not open on Sundays. To get there, see road directions above. The ccr park has 475 spaces, and costs 70p per hour (or a one-off payment of £1 after 6pm). If this car park is full, others are well signposted.
