

COPPELES COMMENT

May I start by extending a warm welcome to all the players, officials and supporters of Swindon Town. They were one of only two teams to beat us twice last season so we are fully aware of what they are capable of. Jimmy Quinn has done a very good job since taking over from Steve McMahon and, despite a poor start to the season, will provide a stern test of our credentials today. In a way, their heavy defeat at Ipswich recently might work against us because they will be fighting tooth and nail to prove to everybody that the 4-1 reverse they suffered was just a blip.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Our first three matches have provided much food for thought. We are unbeaten, which is always a nice position to be in, but there has been very little to choose between ourselves and the teams we have played. Our first game, against Crewe, was a match which could have gone either way. I felt that we were in the ascendancy after taking the lead through Simon Rodger but, in the end, Crewe would have felt harshly treated if they had not got a point. Obviously people can point to the fact that we missed the penalty as proof that we should have won, but I am not sure I agree. As regards the penalty miss, I never criticise players who miss spot kicks. I know from personal experience what it feels like to miss from twelve vards and it is the loneliest feeling in the world. Lee felt good about taking the kick and I am a firm believer in always allowing the person who feels the most confident to take them. On this occasion, he missed but you also have to give credit to the goalkeeper who made a good save. I was disappointed in the way that we conceded the equaliser which came about through sloppy defending and we are well aware that we have to tighten up in our performances in order to obtain good results.

PLEASING

Our next league game came at Barnsley, where, although we claimed all three points, the match was another very tight affair. There was very little to choose between the two teams but, on the day, we shaded it. On another occasion, it could quite easily have gone to the home team. We had a good cutting edge and to score three goals away from home is always pleasing, but I would not want anybody to get too carried away after the start we have made. We might be fourth in the table, but to even have league tables at this stage seems utterly ridiculous to me.

In those sorts of matches, it could well just be a little bit of good fortune or a refereeing decision that decides the game. Against Barnsley, TV evidence showed that we were very unfortunate with at least two decisions that led to goals and also had a bit of luck ourselves with our second strike. Again, these are decisions that you just have to accept because, as the old adage goes, the luck usually evens out over the season.

DEPARTURE

Last week saw the departure of central defender David Tuttle to Barnsley for £125,000. Of course, you never want to lose players, but in some ways selling David was a necessity. 'Tutts' was an excellent club man but, as one of the players who had taken a pay cut and was owed money, there was always a little bit of commitment missing. This is understandable, as I was asking all my players for 110% commitment and yet we were not

paying his wages in full. That type of relationship is always doomed to failure and so his departure was somehwat inevitable. We also had to consider the fact that David would have been on a Bosman ruling at the end of the season, when we would not have received any money at all for him. In that sense, £125,000 is a reasonable return. It also looks like more sales can not be ruled out of the equation, which is a desperate disappointment. Our squad is already threadbare and, when a spate of injuries hits us-(as it inevitably will), we could find ourselves in real problems.

NEW CONSORTIUM


I was slightly concerned that the

new owners did not intervene in the sale of David - perhaps by subsidising the situation until a better solution could have been found? Everyone knows that in our current position we are not able to bring in a replacement for David and it has left our staff dangerously short-numbered. If we do not add to our playing staff soon, we will be in for a very difficult campaign and you, the fans, deserve more than that.

WRIGHT DECISION

Finally, may I say a word about lan Wright, who recently announced his retirement at the end of the season. When I was with Ian earlier in his career, he always insisted that he would play till he dropped, but now I think he has made a very wise decision to leave while we still cherish the memories. It would have been tragic for lan to have played lower league football as a shadow of his former self and the finances in football, as well as his TV career, has meant he can leave the game with no financial concerns. Everyone at Palace, where he played for six very happy years, wishes him every success in the future.

SADLER'S PROBLEMS EASE



Palace's physio has had an uncharacteristically quiet start to the season, a welcome change from last campaign when half the first team squad seemed to be crocked at some point. Gary Sadler does, however, have a few concerns; Craig Foster and Leon McKenzie are both long-term casualties but he has better news regarding England under-21 player Hayden Mullins. "Hayden has had a few problems with his ankle over the past few weeks," he commented. "He picked up an injury to the ankle on the club's tour of China and injured the same

ankle but in a different place against Colchester in the League Cup. However, he came through well against Barnsley and has trained well in preparation for the game against Swindon." Mullins himself was surprised to be back as quickly as he was, given the nature of the original injury sustained in the Far East: "Initially we thought it was just a gash," he confessed, "but when I went to have a scan the specialist said that the bone was bruised and I was lucky not to have had the ankle broken. In that respect it was great to be back so early." And what of Foster, who was stretchered off against QPR in the final game of last season with a knee injury? "Craig has come back very pleasingly," said Sadler. "He was given a deadline of three months after the operation, after which he can resume light training. He is already doing light jogging and is recovering very well. I would have thought he would be back in contention in a couple of months." Only Lee Bradbury (dead leg) and Simon Rodger have given Sadler cause for concern in preparation for this afternoon's game against the Robins, but both are expected to be available.





TUTTLE **COMPLETES MOVE**

Central defender **David Tuttle** has completed his £125,000 move to Barnsley to link up again with former Palace manager Dave Bassett. The Reading born defender made ninety-



six appearances for Palace since his transfer in 1996 and scored five goals. We wish Dave all the best with his new club following his three year spell at Selhurst Park.

OUR 'REV' COMPLETES 25

Crystal Palace were among the first football clubs to appoint an honorary chaplain back in 1974 when Club historian Rev Nigel Sands was invited to serve in that capacity as well, and we want to mark the significant silver anniversary of that appointment this afternoon.

As a regular contributor to Palace's matchday progra mme, indeed he was its editor for several years and has also been the author of ten books about the Eagles, Nigel is well known to many of our supporters. 21ST AUGUST

For many years, if 21st August was a Saturday, it would be the first day of the new Football League season and was therefore a focus of considerable interest to football fans all over the country. Here's a few special opening day matches from our nostalgia department.

1949

REVERSE AT READING

Palace's first ever opening day match on 21st August fell in 1949 when we travelled to Reading and



suffered a heavy 1-5 reverse. Fred Kurz hit our consolation goal and went on to become our top scorer of the season. However, this first game was a fair preview of what turned out to be a thoroughly depressing campaign in which we finished bottom of the league and had to seek re-election.

1965

PALACE BLOWN UP AT ST ANDREWS!

Palace's first game of 1965-66 was a Second Division fixture at St Andrews, home of relegated Birmingham City. Although the Blues took a 13th minute lead, Palace debutant Ian Lawson, the former Burnley and Leeds striker, volleyed an equaliser just before the break. It took Birmingham until the 84th

while the ball was still in flight and before it crossed the goal-line, the referee began to blow his whistle for the end of the game and, although the ball hit the back of the net while he was still doing so, the 'goal' could not stand because it is the first note of the final whistle that signals the end of the match.

PETER TAYLOR'S LAST EAGLES GOAL WINS PALACE'S FIRST GAME

Third Division Palace were under new management for the opening of



the 1976-77 league season. Malcolm Allison had departed from Selhurst Park in the summer and had been replaced by Terry Venables, but the Eagles' star performer at this time was Allison's terrific signing for Palace, left footed, right-winger Peter Taylor, Our opponents for the first fixture were relegated York City. but Palace made home advantage count and won with the only goal of the game, netted by their England international during the first half. In fact this proved to be Peter's last goal (his 39th in league and cup)

but it ended as it had begun with a victory and that proved sufficient for us to gain promotion and a return to Division Two after an absence of three years.

1993

BOWRY DEPARTS AT BRISTOL CITY

This was actually Palace's second First Division fixture of 1993-94 but, whilst it proved a bitter



disappointment to us all, it seemed only to spur the Eagles to better, stronger performances which would, ultimately, lead to promotion, the championship and a return to the Premier League. Palace lost o-2 at Bristol City on this warm afternoon and suffered the indignity of having midfielder Bobby Bowry sent off early in the game in controversial circumstances. However, the Eagles avenged this defeat in some style, winning the Selhurst Park return the following January 4-1.

finally recovered from having been rendered temporarily speechless by our win at Barnsley, I ought to offer an apology. I may have given the impression in the Crewe programme that I was in a downbeat pessimistic mood and sliding into a deep depression at the thought of a long hard season of struggle ahead. I was obviously feeling a bit under the weather that day and have now seen the error of my ways. It is now apparent to me that we are heading for another glorious promotion superbly led by our skipper, Mr. 'goal-machine' Rodger! Seriously though, only three matches in and we've already seen the typical Palace that we all know and love - one good, one bad and one indifferent performance - none of them, naturally, in the games that you would predict; a missed penalty and, depending on whether the journalist from your Sunday paper had left for his free half-time biscuits or not, a howler of a miss from the

rebound or a disputed disallowed goal; draws snatched from the jaws of defeat; draws snatched from the jaws of victory and a thoroughly welcome away win just in time to confound all the people who were climbing into their harbinger of doom and gloom costumes. Quite how anybody could get sufficient value for money out of supporting anybody else is beyond me!

I'd actually cheered up long before the win at Oakwell (only to be come crashing down to earth again after the game at Colchester!). Anybody reading the article before the Crewe game could quite reasonably have been worried whether I would decide to end it all before making it to the match! In fact, having written the piece some days earlier, by the eve of the big kick-off I had undergone a strange transformation. My mind appeared to have been completely (and utterly irrationally) taken over


by optimistic thoughts for the new season! Despite the worryingly early signs of dementia, my sub-conscious refused to harbour thoughts which did not include challenging Man United for world domination, purely on the basis that the sun would be shining, the grass would be green and everything begins o-o. I also knew that come the next morning that would all have changed again (which it did!). I have never yet left the house on matchday without some nagging fear that I am on my way to watch a 9-o defeat. The day it finally came true was actually a blessed relief as I was

able to say 'I told

you so' to all the people who accuse me of being an eternal pessimist on the way to matches. I still feel that this matchday morning feeling is the reason Palace fans were placed on Earth. It is our duty to suffer it on behalf of everybody else. I was talking to friend last week who confirmed my opinion that supporting Palace is more of a vocation than something to take pleasure in! His exact words were "I will NOT enjoy the game, unless we are 7-0 up by half time. Even then I will harbour some concern about the team's ability to hang on. If Palace go 1-0 up after 5 minutes, I will want the game to end. Watching Palace is, for me. agony from beginning

to end. It isn't really

about football - I can't be objective enough to appreciate the skills on display. It is only the result that matters. I do appreciate good football, but only when I am watching a game not involving Palace." Now hands up everybody who recognises these sentiments and I bet we have a Mexican wave going in no time! I'm actually rather worried about the rampant optimism that seems to grip the fans who have started following the club in the Nineties. These youngsters really don't seem to have grasped what it means to follow Palace. I don't believe you can truly class yourself as a Palace fan from the top drawer whilst expressing positive emotions. It just isn't what we're about. I think perhaps the best thing would be if



the club DID go into liquidation just so that the true red 'n' blues amongst us could say 'I told you so' and die happy!



Just to compound the problems we are facing this season, I was shocked this week to read of the departure of Graham Tuffel. Graham apparently



has been a whole-hearted player for Palace so will obviously be a big loss - although at least we're getting a six-figure sum for him. Confused? So was !! You might also have been a bit confused (I'm sure Jolly was) by my earlier referral to his new nickname. Surely a goal every two

games does not make a goal machine especially when we could all probably make a list of the previous occasions when Jolly has troubled the scorers. All will no doubt become clear if you follow the match reports in The Sun over the next few weeks. Now if I was the editor at The Sun I would be asking for a copy of the train ticket when the expense claim comes in, just to make sure it was Oakwell that the hack turned up to. Not only was Jolly

awarded the 'Star Man' accolade for his two (?) lightning strikes, but our man from the currant bun was also the only one to acquire the scoop of the day about Graham Tuffel. At least the poor guy isn't alone in his myopia. According to the rest of Wapping Craig Foster had made a remarkable recovery to take a place on the bench - looking remarkably like Richard Harris it has to be said. Add to that the nerve they had to castigate the referee who didn't see Mark Hughes' shot rebound out of the net last week when they, to a man, all saw Lee Bradbury's follow up to his penalty miss crash into the net when it did nothing of the sort, and you're left with the best reason of all to go to the match - it's the only way you'll find out what really happened (maybe United's treble was just down to inaccurate reports - you never know your luck!)!

EDGY EAGLES MAKE NERVOUS START

New season, same Palace. That was the overriding feeling amongst the crowd who trooped out of Selhurst Park two Saturdays ago as the Eagles, keen to carry on the traditions started last season, threw away a one-goal lead late on to Dario Gradi's Crewe Alexandra. The start of the season is usually treated with eager anticipation by all football followers, but

all football followers, but
Palace supporters could have been
forgiven a touch of trepidation as the
new campaign approached this year
the financial situation which had
glowered over the club for most of the
summer (and, indeed, was only
resolved two days before the start of
the season), a steady stream of
departures away from Selhurst Park
and uncertainty as to whether or not
Palace would even be given permission
to start their league programme all
contributed to a slightly subdued
atmosphere around the ground two
weeks ago.

NERVOUS

The Selhurst faithful's mood was hardly lightened by a nervous performance from the side in the first half. Chances were few and far between, with Simon Rodger having Palace's only meaningful effort at goal - a scuffed shot that bobbled harmlessly wide of the left-hand post. Crewe looked the more composed team and Rodney Jack, in particular, was causing havoc on the Eagles' right flank. However, the home side were given a great chance to calm their nerves when Clinton Morrison, who held the ball up superbly throughout the game, was dragged to the floor by Alexandra defender Lee Unsworth, Lee Bradbury stepped up to take the resultant spot kick only to see it saved by Crewe custodian Jason Kearton. The crowd's cries of frustration, however, were tempered when the rebound fell kindly to the ex-Manchester City man who drew back his leg and blasted the ball against the bar. Cue heads in hands for the vast majority of the spectators and, of course, for poor Bradbury. "The keeper made a good save from the



penalty," commented Palace coach Steve Kember, "but Lee really should have scored with the rebound. He knows that and obviously he was very disappointed. But he's come back from setbacks before and won't let it get him down."

FITTING

The second half was better, both for Palace and general entertainment

value. The Eagles finally broke Alexandra's resistance in the 67th minute and it was fitting that Simon Rodger, who recently signed a new two-year contract, should grab the goal. The club's longest-serving player fired into the roof of the net after a mad scramble in the Crewe penalty area and gleefully celebrated in front of the adoring Holmesdale End. "Everyone was delighted for him," confided Kember, "and he deserved his goal. He always gives one hundred per cent when he plays for Palace, but he also has a lot of ball skills, as well as good delivery from set-pieces. It's great that he signed a new deal because the fans

The goal seemed to spur Palace on and Hayden Mullins, who looked strangely out of sorts (doubtless owing to his lack of match practice due to the injury he sustained on Palace's tour of China), sneaked a shot past the outside of the post soon afterwards.

INEVITABLE

However, in keeping with the pattern established in the middle of last season, one goal proved not to be enough. A steady build-up of Crewe pressure was finally rewarded as substitute Mark Rivers gratefully made use of the yards of free space afforded him by the Palace defence to smack home an equaliser. For a second time, palms were clasped to foreheads in frustration and the Railwaymen's away following celebrated wildly. Kember, for one, was not happy with the manner in which the goal was conceded: "We were very slow in marking up and closing down the cross. They got a lucky rebound and the lad finished well. But, really he shouldn't have been given the chance in the first place." Yet there was still time for the Eagles to carve out more chances: Clinton Morrison shot powerfully against the legs of Kearton and Bradbury, who had no luck all afternoon, was denied the chance to knock home the rebound by a desperate covering challenge. Even David Tuttle, amazingly, got in on the act as he propelled a fearsome freekick goalwards only for Kearton to save once again. Was that something Tutts had planned? "David has always reckoned himself from set-pieces," confirmed Kember, with tongue rather firmly planted in his cheek, "but he did hit it very well. A yard either side of the goalkeeper and it would have been one of the goals of the season but, unfortunately, it's gone right down his throat."







A LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN Dear Friends

By the time you read this I will have been Chairman of Crystal Palace for eight days. Short enough to wonder at the thrill of being at the head of the Football Club which been my passion and entertainment for nearly half a long life-time, and long enough to wonder what I've let myself in for.

During the last thirty years I've met a lot of very friendly, committed people with whom I've been able to share the ups and downs of supporting a football club through all its traumas, from relegation from First to Third Division in two seasons, to the thrill of playing at Wembley in the play-offs, and in the FA Cup Final (we should have beaten Manchester United), and bringing home the Zenith Data Systems (formerly the Full Members) trophy.

I got involved with football by chance - one of the disadvantages of being a retailer is that you have to work on Saturdays and for many years I never had the opportunity to watch a football match until I switched to a desk in Head Office.

When I could take an active interest in sport, if only as a spectator, a long term friend whose father had been a Director of the Club suggested that I would enjoy watching Crystal Palace and invited me to Selhurst Park.

IMMEDIATELY CAPTIVATED

After one match I was captivated by the individual skills of the players and the fact that you could see everything that was happening on the pitch, the opposite of rugby football

which I had played and refereed.

Next season I bought my first season ticket, and my family and I have been supporting the Club ever since.

I confess that I have never stood on the terraces, never yelled abuse at visiting supporters, but I have sung the Palace songs, especially at away cup matches. For thirty years I've sat in the main stand, as a season ticket holder, then as a member of the Vice Presidents' Club in the posh area of the Directors' Box and finally as a Director.

If you ask me what being Chairman involves, at the moment it is not easy to say. I have a lot of people to thank, not least my colleagues, the Board of Directors.

"I'd like to see the Club back where it belongs - a friendly, family, football club successful on and off the pitch, where kids of all ages are proud to wear the Palace colours."

They've had a difficult time, putting money into the Club and watching it drain away through no fault of their own. Without exception they are Palace supporters who have all stood by the Club through a very difficult and stressful time.

My predecessors, as far back as I can remember, owned the Club, or at least had a majority shareholding. This meant that they made all the management decisions, sometimes good, sometimes not so good, and their Boards of Directors tended to be advisory rather than executive, although many of them have been able to bring specialist knowledge and expertise as well as investment to the Boardroom table.

My situation is very different - I'm appointed by the Administrators on the recommendation of my colleagues, to act as the focus of opinion from all sections, and represent the Club in the best possible light.

The Club is in Administration, which means that all the executive decisions and all the finances are handled by the Administrators, Simon Paterson and David Rolph. They have the tricky job of keeping Palace going on the proverbial shoestring, having to make disagreeable but necessary decisions to keep the Club going, finding new investors who will take over from them and recommence normal trading, while satisfying the people to whom we owe money that they are acting in their best interests.

NEW LEASE OF LIFE

We are still in business, still playing football and have satisfied the Football League that we can complete the season's fixtures. The

Administrators have found investors to give the Club a new lease of life and enable them to withdraw and move on to other jobs. All this takes time, so please be patient.

We've had a rotten press, every snippet of bad news has been seized upon, built up and written about. That's in the past, so from now on let's be positive about Palace, and talk about the good news.

This year we are celebrating seventy five years at our present ground. We don't own the freehold, but I'm sure that if the incoming owners can satisfy Ron Noades that they have the interests of the Club at heart, that they are not out to make a quick buck and that they want to continue to play football at Selhurst in the foreseeable future, he would help to develop the stadium, build a new stand that is overdue for replacement and increase the capacity to international requirements.

TALENTED SQUAD

Then there is the team - when you are wrestling with income and expenditure and trying to balance the books it's easy to forget that the Club is only as good as its performance on the pitch. As well as a nucleus of seasoned professionals, we have a very talented squad of youngsters who are happy to have the chance of showing what they can do, and I don't think we'll be disappointed. I had the opportunity of spending time with them on the pre-season tour of China, and you couldn't find

a more dedicated, hard-working bunch of lads. They astonished the Chinese with their discipline and work-rate on the field, in unfamiliar conditions, and as the British Ambassador said: "you couldn't find a better set of representatives for English football and for Britons abroad."



On Monday of this week, one of the national daily papers suggested that we should consider erecting a statue of Steve Coppell at Selhurst Park. Throughout an uncertain future, pay restraint, and player sales to reduce our debt, Steve has coached the team and turned them out each Saturday with results that must have surprised even the most hardened cynic. A consummate professional who is a role model for any aspiring footballer, Steve has earned our respect and gratitude

and having previously
enjoyed our most
successful season ever his
leadership, we hope that he will
again work his own brand of magic
and restore the glory days to
Palace. But, it takes time, so again
please be patient.

THE FUTURE OF THE CLUB

The Football Academy under the direction of John Cartwright is just starting its second year of existence. This is where the future of our Club lies, and with the help of youth team coach Peter Nicholas, moving up to reserve team coach Steve Kember, and the general support of the back room staff headed by physiotherapist Gary Sadler, fitness trainer George Dick and all the support staff, not forgetting Vic Bettinelli who in China was the life and soul of the party, the prospects for future success look good.

I wouldn't like anyone to forget our non-footballing staff, led by Managing Director Phil Alexander. The management, accounting, administrative, box office, lottery, mail order, maintenance, marketing, membership, public relations, publications, retail shop and warehousing departments, have continued to run the business with the minimum of staff, and the fact that we have 8,900 season ticket holders is a testament to their skills and your loyalty.

As supporters you have been wonderfully loyal and I am grateful to all of you. If you want to give an extra boost to the Club then tell all your friends with local businesses

that we need corporate sponsorship. This is one of the areas where we still need more help.

Finally I'd like to see the Club back where it belongs - a friendly, family, football club successful on and off the pitch, where kids of all ages are proud to wear the Palace colours. Whatever I can do to help, I'll be there

My best wishes for a successful season to all of us, and let's be positive about Palace.



Sunday 1st August

Thousands of Palace fans flock to Selhurst for the club's annual Open Day. In hot and sunny weather, the crowds are treated to a succession of interviews with players and management (including Steve Coppell and Joint Administrator, Simon Paterson) on the main stage as well as a whole host of other events and attractions. Elsewhere, the Charity Shield goes to Arsenal as they defeat Manchester United 2-1 at Wembley. United take the lead through David Beckham's free-kick, but are pegged back by goals from Kanu and Parlour. It is the first time United have lost after leading since 1993.

Tuesday 3rd August

Palace bounce back from their 4-o hammering at Southend with a



comprehensive 3-0 win at Crawley - the goals being scored by Howell, Dsane (pictured) and a 30-yard cracker from Chinese international Fan Zhiyi.

Thursday 5th August

Good news at last for Eagles fans, as Administrator Simon Paterson announces that he has accepted a bid for Palace from a consortium of City financiers. Mark Goldberg has no part in the new consortium, but Paterson says that the club are still open to bids that are 25% over the offer from the City businessmen. Palace will stay in Administration for at least another two months and the Football League-enforced transfer embargo remains - thus ruling out any immediate transfer activity for the Eagles.

Saturday 7th August

The season kicks off for real as Palace entertain Dario Gradi's Crewe



Alexandra at Selhurst Park. A slightly disappointing crowd of 13,664 see Palace take the lead against the Railwaymen (Simon Rodger celebrating the signing of

his new contract with a piledriver into the roof of the net from fifteen yards)

only to throw it all away five minutes from time. Mark Rivers proved to be the Eagles' tormentor, slamming home after being left totally unmarked by the Palace defence. In other games, the Premiership starts in predictable fashion: Chelsea hammer Sunderland 4-0 at Stamford Bridge, Arsenal scrape a fortunate home win against Leicester and new-boys Watford go down 2-3 at home to Wimbledon. The other newly-promoted team, Bradford, fare better and pull off an impressive 1-0 win at Middlesbrough. Shades of Palace's opening day success at Goodison Park in 1997, perhaps? In the other leagues, the biggest win of the day is recorded by our South Coast rivals Brighton, who trounce Mansfield 6-o, while Blackburn Rovers make an inauspicious debut in the First Division - drawing o-o against Port Vale at Ewood Park.

Sunday 8th August

Manchester United make a characteristically shaky start to their league campaign as Sir Alex Ferguson sees his charges frustrated by Everton. United take an early lead through Dwight Yorke, but an own goal from Japp Stam (believed to be the first mistake in the whole career of the big Dutchman) hands the Toffees a point. Meanwhile, United's neighbours, City, also suffer disappointment - losing 1-0 at home to Wolves on their return to the First Division.

Monday 9th August

Tottenham register their first win of the season, beating Newcastle 3-1 at White Hart Lane. Away from football, England are spared an embarrassing second successive Test Match defeat by the weather. It rains all day at Old Trafford to ensure England can go into the final game at The Oval with a chance of winning the series.

Tuesday 10th August

Palace's nervy start continues as the Eagles can only draw 2-2 with Colchester in the first round of the Worthington Cup. The Second Division side are reduced to ten men after just three minutes (goalkeeper Simon Brown sent off for handling outside the area) but despite their numerical advantage, Palace struggle and have to come from behind twice to salvage a draw: Jamie Smith (with his first goal in a Palace shirt) and Nicky Rizzo score the goals, the latter coming from 20 yards out in the very last minute. Our opponents this afternoon are humiliated as they lose 1-0 to Third Division Leyton Orient and Port



Vale are beaten at Chester. In the Premiership, Sunderland beat Watford 2-o, Arsenal are victorious at Derby and Manchester United hammer

Sheffield Wednesday. West Ham give themselves an uphill struggle by losing the first leg of their Intertoto Cup Final against Metz 1-0 at Upton Park.

Wednesday 19th August

Chelsea leave it late but eventually overcome a determined Skonta Riga side in the Champions' League qualifying round. The Blues run out 3-0 winners at Stamford Bridge and are almost certain of progressing to the next stage.

Thursday 12th August

Darren Huckerby completes his £4.5m move to Leeds United from Coventry City as David O'Leary starts to spend some of the money reaped from the sale of Jimmy Floyd Hasselbaink.

Friday 13th August

Palace defender David Tuttle opens talks with Barnsley with a view to arranging a £150,000 move to Oakwell. Tuttle, who joined Palace in 1996 from Sheffield United, is expected to move next week. Blackburn's rocky start back in Division One continues unabated, as they lose 3-2 at Huddersfield Town who score their winner in the last minute.

Saturday 14th August

Tuttle may have had second thoughts about joining the Tykes, however, as Palace beat the Yorkshire team 3-2 at Oakwell. Simon Rodger, with his second of the season, Dean Austin and Lee Bradbury are the goalscorers while Barnsley manage two strikes of their own: a debatable penalty scored by Darren Bernard and an even more controversial goal from Mike Sheron, whose shot from a quickly-taken free kick did not, from television replays, appear to cross the line. Elsewhere, Man Utd march on with a hard-fought 2-0 home win over arch-rivals Leeds, Arsenal can only draw at Sunderland, Chelsea equalise in the last minute at Filbert Street and Watford become the latest newly-promoted side to win at 'Fortress Anfield', beating Liverpool 1-0.







BIZARRE INCIDENT

Only last weekend, Stan Collymore was at the centre of a bizarre incident which resulted in the sending-off of Manchester City defender Andy Morrison. One thing's for sure, life's never dull when Stan's around.

Fulham's Worthington Cup first leg clash at Third Division Northampton Town was a case in point, when Collymore treated the fans to his trademark electrifying runs and awesome power before setting up youngster Sean Davis for the opener in a 2-1 win. After that performance, partner Horsfield revealed himself to be another fan.

"I'd love Stan to stay on a permanent basis and he has said that he wants to. He's big and strong and likes to run at defenders and gives us something extra."

flourished under their leadership - a fact that is sometimes forgotten amid all the stories that adorn the Sunday morning tabloids.

In a division which pundits believe is the toughest on record. Collymore may yet prove all his doubters wrong and provide the Cottagers with the spark that could lead them to a fairytale berth in the Premiership next season. If this becomes reality. Bracewell's 'gamble' will prove to be the signing of the summer.

TYKES TAMED AT OAKWELL

The legacy of last season's scrappy away form lingered in the mind in the build up to Palace's trip to Oakwell last Saturday. The bookies made the game a home-banker, with ex-Eagles Dyer, Shipperley and Thomas all to score. A drubbing of his former club to welcome Dave Bassett to the Tykes' hot seat. No problem.

Unfortunately, that hot seat must be steaming by now. The ex-Palace manager was dumped unceremoniously by a resilient and inspiring Eagles display in south Yorkshire. Dyer didn't even play, while Shipperley's efforts were rewarded with a late substitution as the Tykes' strike-force came up against a brick wall. Who would have predicted an away win? When the home side threatened incessantly in the dying minutes, not many.

"In the end I suppose we were holding on," said a relieved Steve Coppell after the game. "The players in the dressing room felt in the end that the fates had conspired against us after what we considered to be a dubious penalty. I'm sure the Barnsley public might disagree. and then a goal which may or may not have crossed the line."

HARSHLY PENALISED

Indeed, the win came against all the odds. Leading through a close-range overhead kick, scored by the skipper, Simon Rodger had been harshly penalised on the stroke of half-time after running shoulder to shoulder with Craig Hignett into the area. Darren Barnard duly slotted home the penalty.

But the Tykes' second equaliser was equally controversial. A quick free-kick was thumped against the bar by Mike Sheron and rebounded off the line back against the woodwork. Once they had cleared the ball, the Palace defence turned round amazed to see the referee signalling a goal.

"There was a certain element of doubt amongst the assistant referee and my players," admitted the Eagles manager, "but to have conceded two goals like that it wouldn't have surprised me if they had grabbed a third. But we hung in there and



claimed the three points which is vitally important for us this year."

NO WHISTLE

Centre-half Andy Linighan was more surprised by the speed at which the home side had been allowed to take the free-kick. "I don't know what the rules are, but I thought the referee was supposed to get the wall back ten yards and at least give the players a

chance to get organised," he said.
"There was no whistle, so we were
disappointed. Whether it went over
the line is another point."

The uproar surrounding the goal threatened to ruin the afternoon for the vocal travelling support, but the goal-fest was not over quite yet. That the Eagles came back to claim a deserved win is testament to the spirit instilled in the squad by the Palace management. Lee Bradbury's perfectly executed side-footed finish settled the five-goal thriller and left Bassett fuming into his Bovril.

The win was founded on good oldfashioned hard work. The performance heartened the manager: "In midweek when we were 2-1 down we didn't work as hard as we should and as we did today. We should have been working harder. It's just that mentality - when you've got something to play for, something obvious which is right in front of your nose, then you do work hard. We just have to try and maintain that standard on a game by game basis."

HARD WORK


And no one typified the effort than the match-winner, Lee Bradbury. "Bradbury had 80 minutes of hard work," added Coppell. "We had Matt Svensson on the bench who is just coming back from a long-term injury and he was raring to go. With ten minutes to go it was nice to be able to put someone on who would chase things put over the top - a fresh pair of legs. Lee worked very hard for the team and he thoroughly deserved his goal."

The three points left Palace fourth in the fledgling Division One table. It left Barnsley bottom of the lot. "I think we expected a sterner test from Barnsley," said Linighan, who had returned to the starting line-up in place of Oakwell-bound David Tuttle. "But the boys worked extremely hard to not give them time on the ball and disrupt their game plan. It's credit to us for getting the crowd, on their backs.

"We have a youngish team - there are not that many experienced players apart from myself. That's all credit to the young lads who have come in and worked really hard for us."

For the veteran defender, the final whistle was greeted with a certain relief. "You need a little breather at 37 you know," admitted the former FA Cup winner. "It's just nice to get all three points."

alace strikers are a strange breed. The last ten years has seen Selhurst Park develop into a veritable pantheon of forward ability, starting with Ian Wright and Mark Bright's golden partnership during the latter years of the Eighties and progressing steadily through such names as Stan Collymore (albeit briefly), Chris Armstrong, Dougie Freedman and Matt Jansen in the Nineties. However, with the exception of Wright (who is, with probably some justification, more remembered for his goalscoring feats with Arsenal rather than Palace), those same strikers all seem to have fallen on hard times after leaving South London: Bright was unable to recapture the form that brought him so many goals at Selhurst and did not last very long at Sheffield Wednesday, Armstrong has been injured for much of his career with Tottenham, Freedman was a flop at Wolves and has only done well in fits and starts for Forest and Jansen. who has the potential to be one of the best strikers in the country, was relegated with Blackburn and has been blighted by fitness problems.

IMMEDIATE IMPRESSION

Now, the mantle has been passed onto the still exceedingly young shoulders of Clinton Morrison, a 20year old striker who has all the potential to be the next 'great' to emerge from SE25. Morrison made an immediate impression when he scored with virtually his first

kick in a Palace first team jersey, against Sheffield Wednesday in the last game of the doomed 1997/98 campaign. Perhaps a little surprisingly, given Morrison's effervescent personality, he admits to having had a few butterflies on the day of his Palace bow: "I was a bit nervous," he confessed. "I only knew I was going to be a substitute the day before the match so I didn't have much time to prepare for the game. When I came on, the score was o-o and there wasn't very long to go. I just wanted to get my first touch and settle sown a bit, but with my second I managed to score so that was just perfect." There was something touchingly

It's important to get a good education and I had a great time at school." He pauses before inevitably adding, "But the best part of the day was always football at lunchtimes!" Having been rejected by Tottenham, Morrison was asked to play a trial match by Palace's youth supremo Peter Nicholas and, in keeping with his record of making strong first impressions, registered a hat-trick. A YTS contract soon followed and it was not long before Morrison began scoring goals for fun in the youth teams. "Peter Nicholas has

Nicholas obviously did a good job. Morrison was Palace's leading goalscorer last season, a record in keeping with the forwards listed earlier (Wright, Bright, Armstrong and Freedman were all leading Palace's scoring charts in their first full seasons at Selhurst). Indeed, Morrison has been hailed in some quarters as the 'new lan Wright', a view seemingly endorsed by manager Steve Coppell, who brought Wright to Palace from Greenwich Borough in 1985. "He reckons I have some of lan's qualities," Morrison commented, "and obviously it's nice to be compared to such a great player, but I would like to be recognised on my own merit. Besides, lan Wright is such a unique striker I'm not sure anyone can be compared to him." And what on having such a remarkable first season in Palace colours? "It was unbelievable. At the start of the season there were loads of other strikers at the club and I thought that I'd just be used as a squad member. But the financial problems meant that quite a few players left so I got my chance a lot earlier than expected."

FUTURE PROSPECTS

Now, it seems, Clinton Morrison has the world at his feet. It will surely not be long before he joins his good friend Hayden Mullins in the England under-21 side and, from there, almost anything is possible. He has been linked with a host of top clubs during the summer but, refreshingly, seems committed to the Palace cause: "I love the club," he said, "and if it were possible I'd like to stay here for the rest of my career." Palace fans have heard this before from many other players who insisted their loyalty to the Eagles was unquestionable before promptly vanishing from South London. But, with Morrison, the commitment seems genuine - as it often is with players who have risen through the youth ranks at a club. The youngster is also mature enough to realise that the time will come when he want to sample new pastures but, for now at least, Palace fans can rest assured that their red-booted hero is going nowhere.



rystal Palace extend a warm welcome to this afternoon's wisitors from the West Country, Swindon Town, for this our third league game of the 1999/2000 season.

RETURN TO GLORY

Aside from their famous League Cup Final win in the mud at Wembley against Arsenal in 1969, the most notable achievement in Swindon's history was their promotion to the Premiership in 1993 - the first time that the club had graced the top flight.

In the years leading up to that success the Robins had slowly established a side that had the potential to grace our greatest stage. Their revival began in the mid-8o's under Lou Macari and was taken on by Ossie Ardiles before Glenn Hoddle led Town to promotion courtesy of a thrilling playoff final win over Leicester City.

However, the seeds of doubt were sown when Hoddle departed for Chelsea during the close season and his assistant, John Gorman, took over. Despite Gorman's greatest efforts Swindon found themselves rooted to the bottom of the division throughout the season and suffered a seemingly inevitable relegation. Swindon, though, had won many friends with their particularly attractive style of football and many pundits tipped them for an immediate return to the Premier League only for the Robins to suffer a subsequent relegation to the and Division.

A new manager came in, Steve McMahon, who relighted the fire at the County Ground. The title was secured at the first attempt and Swindon, buoyant after this success, seemed set to take on all-comers in the 1st.

STANDING STILL

The anticipated revival did not occur and having overseen two seasons of mediocrity in this division the club's board brought in crowd favourite, Jimmy Quinn, to take over as boss in October of last year. Although this change sparked an inevitable shortterm revival with consecutive wins over QPR and Crewe, the side continued to be blighted by inconsistency. Too often Swindon would follow up impressive wins

which highlighted their potential such as a 3-1 triumph over Barnsley and a 1-0 win against Wolves with dismal defeats at Bristol City and Oxford United.

Having fought so hard to become established as one of the brightest clubs in the league, Swindon appeared to be standing still.

RELEGATION SCRAP

Ultimately the threat of relegation

loomed large over the County Ground. With talented players of the likes of George Ndah, Iffy Onoura and Chris Hay in

the side it seemed inconceivable that the Robins could be demoted once again, but fortunately these

SWINDON players pulled out all the stops in the

final few weeks of the season to ensure another year in the 1st Division. Indeed, Swindon won here at Selhurst Park in April of last season far more comfortably than the 1-0 scoreline suggests with a performance that seemed to promise better times in the future.

EMBARRASSING DEFEATS

What has followed in the fortnight since that draw has been far less pleasing for the Swindon faithful, A home game in the 1st round of the Worthington Cup against lowly Leyton Orient seemed to provide the perfect opportunity for their much-heralded strike force to cash in

with a number of easy goals. However, the East London outfit provided much stiffer opposition than had been expected and surprised everyone by coming away with a 1-0 win. What had previously appeared to be a

comfortable passage into the more lucrative stages of the competition now threatens to become the upset of the round.

A televised game against Ipswich on Sunday gave Town an ideal chance to bounce back from their humiliation and after Grazioli. who was finding space well in the Ipswich defence, gave them a deserved early lead it looked as though they may well triumph over the team that holds something of a recent hoodoo over them. It was not to be. Johnson and Naylor, who are already forming an impressive partnership for the Portman Road side, tore the previously assured Robins defence to shreds and the final score of 4-1 to Ipswich was more than justified. A win is needed. and Swindon come to Palace today with the knowledge that they did the double over the Eagles last season. What is imperative is that Swindon do not concede as their forward line of Ndah and Onoura has not struck gold yet this season.

GARETH HALL

"It could be better. We had a good result against Walsall and then we were terrible against Leyton Orient, while against Ipswich we were beaten by the better side," Quinn admits.

"However, I'd rather struggle at the start of the season than at the

end and there's plenty of time to put it right."



BATTLING QUALITIES

Swindon finished just three points above the relegation zone last year and Quinn concedes that without having the spending power of megarich clubs like Blackburn and Fulham, his side have to rely on their battling qualities and team spirit. "You look at the league and it's going to be a lot tougher this year, with the teams coming down and also the teams coming up. Like Palace, we have to make do with what we've got and make sure that the players have belief in themselves. That's the nature of my job. I knew that when I took it on and it's a question of being positive. Like a lot of other teams I'm looking to the 50 points we need to stay up. We've got to be realistic and it's going to be tough. Four or five players left during the summer and we can't replace them at the moment. I've got to try and wheel and deal and get a couple out to get a couple in." So, how does Quinn intend to get the Robins moving in the right direction? "We've got to tighten up a bit in defence because we haven't been at our best in the last couple of games. The sooner we can do that, the sooner we can strive for better things.

GREAT AWAY RESULTS

"I hope we can improve on last year's position. We had some great away results last year, and tended to play better away from home, because the players are more relaxed. At the County Ground, for some reason, the

nerves set in. It's very frustrating because as a manager you want money to spend, but I've got a good bunch of lads and where we lack quality we can make up for in effort."

> Although he hasn't totally written off his own chances of surprising a few of the division's 'wealthy brigade', Quinn believes that money will talk in what he describes as the 'toughest First Division ever'. "Ipswich are very strong and have money to sign new players, so I fully expect them to gain automatic promotion this year. Although Blackburn have got off to a shaky start I think they'll

definitely be up there, but you can't rule out Birmingham and Nottingham Forest, It's like a second Premiership!" Without the luxury of financial backing to pick up future stars, Quinn admits that the club are heavily focused on

developing their youth system, so that the Wiltshire club are able to hold their own and compete with their rivals in future years.

LONG TERM PLAN

"We have got a long-term plan here concerning our youth policy. We want to get an Academy up and running, but it's going to take time. We're looking to the future with ambition and we want to produce kids who can come through and succeed at a higher level."

After finally hanging up his boots a year ago after a glorious goal-filled finale to his career at Peterborough United, Quinn insists that he still itches to add to his impressive goalscoring career tally. However, he also admits that the game has changed dramatically in recent years.

"When you play for 19 years you certainly miss it, but it's different these days. It's disappointing to see the joy of playing taking second place in priorities to money. I just hope that people running the game can turn that around."

Quinn is hoping that today's game will provide the spark which will fire Swindon in the right direction, although he concedes that the game is destined to be a hard-fought affair. "It's going to be a tough game. Palace got off to a good start and there seems to be a good team spirit at the club. Steve's a good manager, but we've got to give a good account of ourselves and hope we can get a result."

Manager Jimmy Quinn has not been granted the luxury of his predecessors in the County Ground hot seat. Glenn Hoddle, John Gorman and even Steve McMahon all had a bit of money to spend, but Quinn's pre-season featured a swoop for a Third Division striker available for nothing and a scouring of the non-league scene. It's more than Steve Coppell was able to do, but it may not be enough to alter the Robins' ultimate ambitions.

Those ambitions must be to stay in Division One. The pundits were justified in predicting a relegation dog-fight given Town's ability to nose-dive in the blink of an eye. A few years ago they were challenging at the other end before plummeting without trace; last year they appeared set to be embroiled in the nerve-jangling last day skirmishes before Palace and West Brom duly rolled over. This year, Quinn's squad will be tested to the full.

It is not a squad without class. In goal, Frank Talia is sure to continue the recent tradition of Australians between the visitors' sticks here at Selhurst Park. Standing at 6' 1", he joined Blackburn Rovers seven years ago and initially arrived on loan at the County Ground in November 1995. As back-up to Fraser Digby, he quietly learned his trade before taking his chance with some terrific displays. It was Talia who shut the Eagles out last term. He will be keen to do so again today. Contrary to press speculation linking him with practically every club in land, Jimmy Glass remains a Robin with little

team. His remarkable heroics at Carlisle at the end of last season have earned him a place in the history books, not least at Scarborough, but his chances remain limited in Wiltshire. Ex-Eagle Glass has been desperate to leave, but for the moment is having to make do with reserve team outings. It must all seem something of a come-down.

Indeed, youth team product Steve Mildenhall may even keep Glass off the bench this afternoon. The 6' 5" stopper made two first team appearances in 1995/96 and played as an outfield player the following year, but is once again waiting for his chance to impress. At the back, Gareth Hall remains a strong performer at this level. The veteran former Chelsea and Sunderland man joined on a Bosman deal and impressed at times last season. The Croydon born full-back boasts nine Welsh caps and is more than capable of filling any position across the back-line.

Alan Reeves quit Wimbledon's Crazy Gang in search of first team football having failed to follow in the footsteps of John Scales at Selhurst Park. The tall central defender has been frustrated by injuries, but notched up two goals in 24 appearances last season and added his vast experience to the Robins' rearguard. Mark Robinson, meanwhile, started his career at West Bromwich Albion before loining Barnsley on a free transfer back in 1986. A move to Kevin Keegan's Newcastle followed in 1993, for a fee of £450,000, and this increased to £600,000 when Swindon snapped him up in a club record deal a year later. Robinson can play at full-back, in the middle or as a sweeper and continues to perform whole-heartedly at the heart of the defence.

Craig Taylor is the younger brother of former Town favourite Shaun and signed from non-league Dorchester Town for £25,000. Having scored a superb 35-yard goal on his Town debut against Port Vale, the 25-year-old has maintained the family's links with the Robins and has become an integral figure at the club. Another ex-Eagle, Gareth Davies, hobbled out of the Robins' visit to Selhurst last April having signed on a free transfer from Thames Valley rivals Reading a month earlier. Well-known for his commitment and aggressive style, the fiery-haired Welshman should revel in the atmosphere back in south London today.

Cheltenham born Sol Davis was offered a professional contract in the summer of 1998 having stared in the Robins' junior sides as a left-sided full-back. He made his debut as a substitute at home to QPR at the age of 18 and was thrown in for his full debut in the local



Big George needs little introduction here at Selhurst Park. Manager Steve Coppell readily admitted that he would not have sold the 6' 1" striker if he had his time game; Ndah's aerial ability and pace was sorely missing when Palace slipped out of the Premiership two years ago.

In midfield, Town have tended to rely more on the physical than the creative In recent times. Since the days of Gorman, the engine room has reflected the industrious Steve McMahon more than the sublime passing of a Hoddle, but that is not to do the Robins an injustice. Mark Walters has enjoyed a new lease of life since joining on a free transfer from Southampton and has proved a thorn in Palace's side more than once since moving to Wiltshire.



Robin Hulbert, meanwhile, will be looking to add to the six starts he made last year as he continues to develop into a fine player. Bobby Howe is an attacking midfielder signed from Nottingham Forest who has popped up with some vital goals since moving to the County Ground. image established by his predecessor with the signing of the tricky yet diminutive Guiliano Grazioli from Peterborough. - · Palace and Swindon do share a link, in that Bert Head moved to Selhurst Park after a nine-year stint as boss at the County Ground from 1956 to 1965. Head went on to manage Palace until 1972 when he became General Manager for another year.
- . The Robins have been managed by some illustrious names in their long history. Dave Mackay, the former Tottenham defender, was boss in Wiltshire from 1971-72, Lou Macari

took the reins for five years during the eighties. former Argentinian international Ossie Ardiles was in charge in the early nineties and Glenn Hoddle cut his managerial teeth at Swindon before moving onto bigger things (and controversy) at Chelsea

and England. · Swindon set a points record for the Football League when they romped away with the Division Four championship in 1985/86. recording 102 points along the way.

uiliano Grazioli has had his fair share of fame in recent years, but the 24year-old striker, who is playing in Division One for the first time in his career, is now happy to just take a back seat. Grazioli hit the headlines in the 1997/98 season when nonleague Stevenage Borough enjoyed a memorable cup run. Having already scored against his present club Swindon Town to knock them out in the previous round, Grazioli hit the equaliser to take Newcastle United to a third round replay.

TOUGH GAMES

FREE TRANSFER

Grazioli began his career with nonleague Wembley, where he regularly made his mark in his own unique way. On three occasions he scored four goals in a game during a great season for the London club.

He entered league football when he arrived at Peterborough United in October 1995 on a free transfer. After loan spells at Yeovil, Enfield and Woking he went to Stevenage Borough and found fame, before returning to Peterborough last season.

After enjoying a great start to last season alongside current boss Jimmy Quinn he became increasingly



disillusioned at not getting a regular first team place and in the summer jumped at the chance to join Swindon and old pal Quinn. "I was in and out of the side at Peterborough. Even though I was scoring the goals Barry Fry would leave me out," added Grazioli.

"So far I'm very pleased with the move. I've settled in really well and Jimmy has helped me in training as he did at Peterborough."



OAKWELL STUNNED BY LEE'S CLINICAL FINISH

A rare away win and a classy goal to settle the result. Palace returned from Barnsley with pride well and truly intact and three excellent points in the bag. The pundits were looking slightly confused -3-2 to Palace? Most had Shipperley and Dyer down to score a couple each with Geoff Thomas coming off the bench to notch a late fifth. Forget it. The Eagles were well worth

the win. "It was a really pleasing afternoon's work," said striker and match-winner Lee Bradbury. "For us to go to Barnsley and claim all three points was really good. I was obviously pleased to get on the scoresheet myself - it was an excellent win."

The result smacked of a Steve
Coppell away-day success; hard work
and effort bringing ultimate reward.
No one personified this approach
more than inspirational skipper and
goalscorer Simon Rodger. "Simon is a
good player and, now that he has got
the armband, he is playing with the
added responsibility of the captaincy,"
admitted Bradbury. "He has
responded well and has scored a
couple of goals. He deserves it."

CONTROVERSY

But the win was not without an element of controversy. Ignoring the Tykes' claims of off-side against Clinton Morrison when Dean Austin thumped home the second, both home goals could easily - should easily - not have stood. The first, a penalty, was generous. The second, off the cross bar and out, bordered on the scandalous.

"I was behind the penalty incident, but it looked as if Jolly and Craig Hignett were shoulder to shoulder," admitted the former Portsmouth and Manchester City man. "He got into the box and fell over. The referee fell for it as well and gave a penalty. Then their second goal didn't cross the line. It bounced down off the line, back on to the crossbar and back out again. Fraser Digby did well to get a



touch on the shot and kept it out. They were two goals we did not deserve to concede. But we played well as a team and showed plenty of spirit to keep coming back. Clinton did well, noticed my run and put it into my path. I thanked him after the game."

JUST REWARD

The decisive third was just reward for Bradbury's hard work. He has had his problems since moving to Selhurst Park for £1.5 million just under a year ago - most of them have been well and unfairly publicised - but the goal may have put him back on

course. It will have helped to obliterate the painful memory of the season's opener here in south London. "I was absolutely gutted," he said, recalling the penalty miss against Crewe, "I've been practising my penalties all pre-season, training hard to get them right and then, when it came to the actual game I went and missed it. Obviously the rebound came down off the bar as well. You just have to put it behind you and try and forget what happened."

The miss was untypical of the striker's pre-season form. He had netted consistently both in China and in the Eagles' friendlies, most notably against Premiership Leicester City here at Selhurst. That calm, controlled finish past goalkeeper Pegguy Arphexad suggested the goals would flow once the season was underway. Bradbury still hopes they will.

"I've been telling myself to be greedier out on the pitch to try and get some more goals," he said. "It worked in pre-season and hopefully it will continue now that I'm off the mark. I just want to get more goals than last year. I ended up with twelve goals over all which is not enough by the standards I set myself. I want at

least fifteen this time around.

LOAN SPELL

"It has been difficult to settle. Last year I went off to Birmingham on transfer deadline day after things were beginning to click. The loan spell went well. I spoke to Trevor Francis at the end of the season and he said he would be taking me on this year - he'd come in and make an offer for me. For some reason he didn't do that. That was his decision. But really I just want to settle down here. I've moved around too much in my short career - I did well when I was at Portsmouth and was reasonably settled. I want to get a house down here and stay at Palace." For the moment, the striker is hoping the early season form can bring another three points this afternoon. With spirit bolstered by the win at Oakwell, he is chomping at the bit to get at Swindon Town. "The lads have tried to put the financial side of things in the background and get on with the matter in hand," he said. "The problems will blow over some time, it's just a matter of when. At the end of the day, we are professionals and have to get on with our jobs.

"Realistically we are looking at the play-offs if we can. If we can reach fifth or sixth it will be brilliant. But it's a long season. I know we are fourth at moment, but theres still 43 games to go! It's a bit early to be making predictions, I think." By Dominic Fifield

THOSE WERE THE DAYS

PALACE FIZZ WITH SEVEN UP AGAINST THE ROBINS

n Good Friday 19th April 1935, Palace entertained Swindon Town at Selhurst Park. Following a six goal victory against Newport six days earlier, the Palace supporters found themselves cheering on their favourites to another comprehensive win, this time going one goal better as they won 7-0.

Crystal Palace, chasing that elusive promotion place at the top of Division Three South, began the game in the way they had finished the previous week. Almost from the first kick. centre forward Albert Dawes raced away leaving the Town defenders in his wake and promptly scored. He then repeated the same feat nine minutes later. After a quarter of an hour it was 3-0 as Frank Manders found the net with the best shot of the game and before the break James Purdon and Manders again gave Palace an insurmountable advantage. One Palace fan enjoying this impressive victory was Charles Hussey who was celebrating his ninety-first birthday from his accustomed seat in the stand.

TOP FORM

The Palace defence was also in top form with good work coming from the full-backs Ted Owens and Ossie Parry which ensured that most Swindon attacks broke down before their



forwards got within shooting distance. With centre-half Jimmy Wilde keeping Fowler at bay, goalkeeper Ronnie Dunn had little to do, and any shots that came his way were straight at him.

Swindon reshuffled their forward line for the second half and fought gamely. However, they had the misfortune to lose a man through injury and they could not prevent Palace taking their tally to seven with a couple of goals from our leftwinger Bob Bigg. His first came from a header, while his second saw him putting the finishing touches to a goalmouth scramble after the ball had hit the post.

The spectators at the game had, as usual, been entertained by the Crystal Palace Band, who had played a selection of popular tunes. Season ticket holders had paid £3 3 shillings (£3 15p today) for a seat in the main stand with ladies and boys (what about the girls!) being charged £2 2 shillings (£2 10p). It cost 6d (2 1/2p) to park your car at the ground and even in those days it was managed by National Car Parks Ltd! For those thinking of buying a house, a semi-detached property at Gladeside, between Addiscombe and Shirley, would cost £650 and to furnish it a three-piece suite started at £15 with a bed priced from £3.

SIMPSON'S RETURN

Any pressure Palace had put on the teams above them in the table with this emphatic scoreline was removed by losing at home to Exeter the following day. However, for the return game at the County Ground on the following Bank Holiday Monday afternoon, Peter Simpson returned to the Palace forward line, having missed the previous two home matches. He partnered Albert Dawes, who moved to inside left, and after twenty-five minutes he opened the scoring from Purdon's pass his first goal for two months. Again it was the Palace team



that was the most impressive and midway through the second half, Briggs, the Robins goalkeeper, pulled off a magnificent save to deny Dawes. Unfortunately, though, a moment's lapse of concentration allowed the Wiltshire side to equalise through Tom Armstrong and the faint flicker of promotion that had existed three days earlier was now snuffed out with this 1-1 draw.

The match also transpired to be Simpson's last game for Crystal Palace as he did not feature in the remaining two fixtures and was transferred to West Ham in the summer. The Scotsman had joined us from Kettering in 1929 and scored 165 goals in 195 first team appearances, which included a hat-trick on his debut. He is still the Eagles' leading goalscorer and his 54 league and cup goals in one season will surely never be beaten.

THE 1934-35 SEASON

Manager Jack Tresadern was beginning his fourth full season in charge and, as with the others, the Palace fans held hopes that this might be the one for gaining promotion from Division Three South. Favourite Albert Harry had now hung up his boots after thirteen years, which was mostly spent on the right wing, and eyes were on his replacement in Scotsman Jimmy Carson from Bradford. Other new faces were full-back



Ted Owens who joined in a rare Palace deal with Preston North End and went on to remain with the club until after the War, while the outside left berth was filled by Bob Bigg, a local man from Thornton Heath who joined the club from Redhill. Forward Albert Dawes had netted sixteen times from the twenty-two games he played the previous season and it was his partnership with the prolific Peter Simpson, who had been absent since February through injury, that held most expectations. In recognition of his services to the club, Simpson was awarded a benefit match at Selhurst Park on the afternoon of Wednesday 31st October. It is of interest to note here that in these days before floodlights, matches were played on Wednesday afternoons in an era when shops had a half-day each week.

DEBUT GOAL

Bigg started off in perfect fashion, scoring on his debut in the first game at Aldershot



which ended in a 2-2 draw, while in our first home game of the campaign against Cardiff on 1st September Albert Dawes scored five of the goals in the 6-1 victory. It was evident that, due to injury, Simpson was not as sharp as he used to be and Tresadern began to use him in a more withdrawn role as a decoy. This fact was borne out by the results for the first sixteen games in which he scored only seven goals, while twelve came from Albert Dawes and another dozen came from the wings. For a number of weeks the manager was unable to observe the results of this strategy as he broke his leg while taking part in a training match in late October, Tresadern had to remain at home well into the New Year as reports were brought to him of the players and matches.

FRUSTRATING CAMPAIGN

In the league it looked as if Crystal Palace might make an issue of the championship. However, a cup humiliation at Yeovil, where we lost 3-0 on November 28th, coupled with heavy defeats at Reading (1-6) and Torquay (1-7) in December, seemed to knock some of the stuffing out of the side. Charlton finished champions and were promoted having proved their superiority to Palace in mid-February by defeating us 2-1 at Selhurst Park in front of our biggest crowd of the season. It must have been yet another frustrating campaign for the fans as the club, who had shown on its day that it was capable of playing exhilarating football and producing some emphatic victories, ended in fifth place. With Simpson's scoring prowess on the wane, it was left to another player to stake his claim here. Twenty-year-old Frank Manders, who came into the side in September, took up this role and was ever present from then on, scoring fourteen goals. Manders had made his debut when he was just seventeen, but this was his first extended run in the side. Such were his performances that he soon came under the scrutiny of other clubs, and in fact left the following October for Norwich who paid a then club record fee for his services. Another player

who made his mark during the season was Nick Collins, who played in his first match in September. He went on to rank amongst the finest wing-halves the club has ever had.

At the end of the season, besides Simpson leaving, manager Jack Tresadern moved across London to take charge at Tottenham. In retrospect, it could be considered that his time at Palace should have been more successful, given the quality of players available at his disposal. P42 W19 D10 L13 F86 A64 Points 48 Position 5th



walked out and jeopardised any chance he may have had of playing for Palace again.

ROLLER-COASTER RIDE

Looking back at his time at Swindon, Digby can be forgiven for sounding nostalgic. "I had quite an eventful time really," he mused. "I spent twelve years there and we had a real roller-coaster ride; we had some great years and some dire

years. Lou Macari brought me to the club first of all and we got promoted. We'd been promoted with a record number of points the year before and, after he bought me, we went up again."

"Fraser Digby will be received with great affection on Saturday as he is regarded very highly in Swindon," said Graham Reeves, a die-hard Robin and creator of the club's unofficial web-site. "The fans did not want Fraser to go, but there were contractual disagreements with Town's then manager Steve McMahon. At shot stopping he is one of the best in the country."

But the talented young goalkeeper was no product of the County Ground youth system. His formative years were spent at Old Trafford under the eyes of Big Ron Atkinson: "Lou brought me in on loan initially from Manchester United, but one of the reasons I signed for the Town was because Ron Atkinson got the sack at Old Trafford. Alex Ferguson came in and said he'd give me the same opportunity as everyone else, but I was enjoying my football down at Swindon. I was in the first team and we were near the top of the old Third Division. We ended up getting promoted in the play-offs."

Turning his back on the Ferguson revolution, which would take some years to bear fruit, a permanent move to Swindon was sealed. Digby's decision should be put in perspective - the Robins were enjoying a new lease of life under Macari, while the intense, desperate pressure to mount a realistic league challenge at Old Trafford was building up.

TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE

At the County Ground, success followed success. "We had a few more good years with Lou - we played Palace a couple of times in the playoffs along the way," he said. "Then he went to West Ham and Ossie Ardiles came in. We went up into the old First Division, but because of financial irregularities we were actually relegated immediately back into the Third Division. We were reinstated into Division Two, but that was a terrible experience. We had played some bril liant football that year and it was all



wasted."

To have won at Wembley, celebrated promotion, but suddenly find yourself a division worse off must have been devastating. "It proved too much for Ardiles. Ossie moved on a year later after the disappointment of not being promoted," he recollected. An adequate replacement was waiting in the wings. "Then Glenn Hoddle came along

from Monaco. He was still playing then, but tactically he was very aware. A couple of years with him and we were promoted to the Premiership. That was superb."

The demotion aside, these were the golden years for Swindon Town. Once they had stopped chuckling into their pints, even Oxford fans must have acknowledged the outstanding quality of some of the Robins football. They passed teams off the pitch. On their day they were untouchable. With Kevin Keegan's Magpies running riot at the top of Division Two, Swindon went to St James' Park and outplayed the Geordies, emerging with a nil-nil draw when they deserved more. This was champagne stuff.

ATTRACTIVE FOOTBALL

"When Ossie came in he brought his own players in to play his style of football - on the ground. That's the way he liked it. Glenn came in and adapted it to what he wanted and we did play some attractive football.

"I actually went back to Man United on loan over Christmas during Glenn's spell at the club," said Digby. "I worked with Schmeichel - that was amazing - before going back to the County Ground in January. We got to the play-offs again and beat Leicester 4-3 in the final. It was probably the best game of football I've seen. The two play-off finals were both special - we beat Sunderland 1-0 in 1990 and then Leicester. That was a memorable game. They were both incredible experiences. That was the best time, really."

Of course, the Premiership experience under John Gorman was somewhat chastening. The return trip to Tyneside, a year on, produced a 7-1 mauling and, when Leeds scored five at the County Ground on the last day, Swindon had conceded 100 league goals. At least Digby had the consolation of missing most of the campaign: "I missed a third of the season when we were in the Premier League. We conceded a record amount of goals, but it was a good experience and one that you want to resurrect really."

Presumably the Premiership experience was more appealing than picking the

ball out of the back of the net every five minutes. Amid the debris of the next few years - successive relegations began to take their toll - Digby remained loyal, even when he might have looked for a move back to the big-time. After all, he was an England under-21 international who had threatened to make it at a higher level.

GOOD CAREER

"When I left United for Swindon I had four under-21 caps and I was due to play for England B to play Italy at Brighton," he said. "Unfortunately, we had an ongoing cup game against Bolton so I couldn't join up with the squad. If I'd moved from Swindon to another club a bit earlier then who knows what might have happened? Look at Nigel Martyn. He was at Bristol Rovers but got a move to Palace and now he's a full international playing for Leeds. He went that way while I stayed at Swindon - you just don't know with football. I've had a good career and hopefully I've got some good times to come here."


No longer a first choice stopper, Digby moved on at the end of the 1997/98 season. He was given a memorable send-off. "The fans at Swindon were different class with me," he smiled. "I was there for so long and did my best and the supporters were marvellous. They turned out for my testimonial and virtually filled the County Ground, which doesn't happen too often these days. They were really good and I enjoyed my time down there. Hopefully I can develop the same rapport down here and we can have similar success."

This afternoon, Digby will be reunited with old friends from the County Ground. "One of my best friends at Swindon is the manager this afternoon - Jimmy Quinn," he said. "I played with him when he was at Swindon first time around, but there were also the likes of Duncan Shearer, Colin Calderwood. Glenn and Ossie were obviously special, but we had some good players down there."

As for the game itself, there's revenge to be exacted. Last season Digby was welcomed as a returning hero to Wiltshire, even if his new team's display was desperately disappointing. The Robins hardly broke into a sweat before running out 2-0 winners, so the Eagles have a point to prove today.

"We were disappointed with that game really," added Digby. "We had a couple of decisions which went against us early on - Lee Bradbury scored a goal that was disallowed for off-side. I didn't really want to go back there and lose - I'd have settled for a draw - but they were something of a bogey team for us last year. They did the double over us, so I think we've got a little bit of a score to settle this afternoon.



SIMON'S JOLLY GOOD SHOW DELIGHTS FANS

The dictionary definition of hero is as follows: someone of superhuman strength, courage or ability, favoured by the gods and distinguished by the performance of extraordinarily brave or noble deeds; an illustrious warrior. It may be going too far to state that Simon Rodger fits into all these categories (even the most ardent fan would be pushed to describe the spiky-haired

midfielder as a brave warrior and the number of injury problems the former Bognor Regis player has suffered during his career pretty much rules out any blessings from the heavens). However, the 27 year old has certainly transcended the ordinary during his time at Selhurst Park.



It is not entirely obvious why Rodger is adored the way he is. There have undeniably been more flamboyant, crowd-pleasing and, to be brutally honest, better players during the nine years he has spent at Selhurst Park, but the fact remains that he is loved by the Palace faithful. There are a plethora of plausible reasons for his popularity: his tenacity in the tackle. the fact that he, along with manager Steve Coppell, represents a link back to glory years of the early nineties when Palace swept aside all that came before them to finish third in the old First Division and, perhaps most likely, his loyalty to the club despite the turmoil that has enveloped Palace in the past few seasons. Leaving aside the brief loan spells at Stoke and Manchester City, Rodger has become a fixture in the Selhurst dressing room, notching up over 200 appearances for the club since turning professional in 1990. Two weeks ago, Jolly endeared himself still further to the fans with a typically pugnacious display in the heart of the Palace midfield - crowning his performance with a thundering shot that whistled into the top of the net before Crewe goalkeeper Jason Kearton could get a hand near it. The ecstatic celebrations, carried out in



front of the Holmesdale End that loves him the most, told their own story.

DELIGHT

"It's great to get on the scoresheet as I don't get too many," said Rodger, speaking after the game with Alexandra. Indeed he doesn't - that strike was only the ninth of his Palace career. A strike rate of one per year does not, Simon admits,

look too good in the record-books: "I probably should get a few more, but not scoring many means that they are all the more special when they do go in. It was nice to score on the first day and, in particular, in front of the home fans. Hopefully, I can grab myself a few more before the end of the season." The goal was, maybe, a way of saying thank-you to the fans who had cheered him from the start

of the league's opener. After all these years, does the supporters' adulation still have a big effect on the likeable Rodger? "It's always great to hear your name being chanted," he confirmed. "It gives you a great lift on the pitch and enables you to play with that extra 10% which can make all the difference."

DISAPPOINTMENT

Rodger's performance apart, however, Palace were disappointing against Dario Gradi's side. A frustratingly soft goal was conceded with just five minutes remaining and the dream start was rudely snatched away - something that annoyed Rodger as much as anybody else. "It was

commented. "We didn't pick the Crewe men up well enough and that gave their striker a relatively easy chance. It happened quite a lot last season and we need to sort it out on the training pitch before it becomes a habit this term." Perhaps not surprisingly, given the problems that have cast a shadow over Selhurst Park in the past few months, the bookies have predicted a season of struggle for the Eagles. However, it is a view not shared by either the Palace squad and especially Rodger: "We've got some very good players. We have a nice mixture of youth and experience in the team and, provided we get the team spirit we had at the end of last season and work hard in training, we shouldn't have too many problems."

LOYAL SERVANT

Simon's signing of his new contract was made all the more pleasing because it guarantees him a testimonial season next year - a just reward for nine years of faithful service to Crystal Palace. "It's a nice bonus," he admitted. "The fans have supported me all the way throughout my career and hopefully they can come out and support me again next season for the testimonial." Rodger shouldn't worry unduly - there can be few more certain things in football.

1. Setting the Scene

The very fact that you are reading this programme puts you into one of the four categories of programme collector potential, latent, casual or confirmed. The purpose of this series of articles is to convert those programme buyers from the first two categories into casual or confirmed collectors by describing the different types (sets) of programmes, and by highlighting the pleasures that can come from collecting football programmes.

A collection can be of any size, however

A collection can be of any size, however modest or impressive, and can cost as much or as little as you want to spend on it. There are no barriers to entering the programme buying market, therefore, where you will find avid collectors from all walks of life.

Subscribers to "Programme Monthly", for instance, include solicitors, accountants, actors, schoolboys and girls, students, housewives, farm labourers, factory workers, teachers, business executives and an MP from Mauritius. So it's not simply a case of "You've bought the programme - now wear the anorak!"

"What do I collect" is not

usually a question which

formed by the accumulation of programmes from various sources, mostly from the first few years of attending football matches. If the collecting "bug" bites, then anything and everything will be voraciously added to a collection, and it is only when ambitions are limited by the availability of funds, that thought will have to be given to specialisation. The composition of each collection is unique to its collector, so there are endless variations of collecting themes, but there are accepted basic building blocks, and these will be described over the course of the season in this series of articles. As well as describing the "sets", and the pitfalls and pleasures to be encountered en route, we will try to point out what to look for in terms of value and collectability and perhaps give existing collectors - and those who accumulate programmes but don't consider themselves to be collectors some ideas towards widening their horizons and deriving more pleasure from the hobby. Most casual collectors will have a

Most casual collectors will have a handful of "landmark" programmes in their possession - cup finals and semi

finals (if their team has been fortunate enough to aspire to these heights), internationals, testimonials, special fixtures, major cup ties - each of which provides an interesting and achievable set to collect. The regular supporter may make the point of buying a home match programme; those who follow the team away from home will take this a stage further, and the more committed fans could extend this to friendly fixtures. foreign tours - all without leaving the confines of your favourite club. To expand horizons, you could go back in years, setting an earliest date (1950, 1960, 1970, 1980 for example) and collecting programmes back to that starting point.

Someone with a wider interest in football could collect other clubs, other leagues (perhaps venturing into non-league), other countries - the possibilities are endless, and each will be covered over the course of the coming season.



HE PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS

espite enjoying a successful career at both club and

both club and international level, Paul Bodin has had to suffer the indignity of being remembered as the man whose missed penalty denied Wales a place in the 1994 World Cup finals. For too long the Welsh had been considered the bridesmaids of international football, but

considered the bridesmaids of international football, but with a forward line that boasted the likes of Giggs, Hughes, Rush and Saunders, they had come within one win of qualifying for the tournament. Their vital game against Romania was

poised at 1-1 when they were awarded a spot-kick which Bodin stepped up to take only for the Swindon left-back to smash the ball against the crossbar. "It's often said that I cost Wales their place because I missed the penalty that would have put us 2-1 up, but we had to win that game and there

to win that game and there were still 34 minutes left after my kick. I did miss a penalty - there's no disguising that - but I'll never admit that I cost Wales the game, although that moment is obviously one of the biggest disappointments of my career. It's football and it's hard to take at the time, but Talso scored the penalty in the play-off final for Swindon that won us promotion against Leicester so I know both sides of the coin. I just consider myself lucky to have played in the Welsh side that got so close to qualifying for the World Cup because we are always ranked so low that to qualify we have to beat two recognised countries in our group. A lot of people ask why we never go further with players of the calibre of Giggs and Hughes, but to be honest apart from the attackers who were world-class the rest of the lads were just good, honest pro's."

GOOD, HONEST PRO

That description is a fitting one for Paul who enjoyed a fine start to his career with Cardiff City before joining Swindon in 1987 via Newport County. At the time it would have been impossible to predict that Swindon would go on to reach the heights that they did.

"Swindon was quite similar to my two previous clubs, although the facilities were a little better. At the time it was quite a small town itself

now it's absolutely booming and I wasn't really that aware of them. Your interest in a club is only aroused when they show an interest in signing you and it wasn't until I looked around the changing

room that I realised that there
were a lot of good players at
the club like Jimmy Quinn,
Steve White - who's now
my assistant at Bath Colin Calderwood, Alan
McLoughlin and Fraser
Digby. Lou Macari had
assembled a very good side
on limited finances,"

Swindon spent the next couple of years forging a reputation as one of the best young sides in the division before mounting a serious challenge for promotion in 1988/89. In April they confirmed their status as the danger side of the division by

beating Palace 1-0 in a tense encounter at the County Ground. Fate decreed that the two sides would meet again in the play-off semi-finals.

"Palace were a very strong side and were unlucky not to get automatic promotion, but we won the home leg 1-0 and quite fancied ourselves to win the tie. However, at the end of the day, they deserved to go through. We had a few injuries that night and Steve Foley and Tom Jones played despite needing operations. From that moment on Palace just went from

strength to strength."

While Paul had to sit out much of that season due to the form of Phil King, he was a permanent fixture in the side the following year when Swindon won through to the play-offs again. This time they were successful and beat Sunderland 3-0 in the final, but a number of financial irregularities behind the scenes led to the Football Association taking the unprecedented step of refusing them entry to the top flight.

"It was devastating. There were one or two things going on, but they weren't major financial things. We were only a little club so we were only talking about small amounts of money and bonuses, but the Inland Revenue found out about them. Lou Macari left the club and Ossie Ardiles came in, but it was still going on. The players put it to the back of their minds and won promotion through the play-offs and during the course of that time our chairman, Gary Herbert, spoke to the FA and they assured us that we'd be allowed to go up. When we beat Sunderland we hired an open top bus and had a great reception in Swindon only to find out three weeks later, when I was on my

holidays, that it had all been taken away. It took a long time for us to recover and we were nearly relegated the following season. Everybody's chins were on the ground - not only the players, but the supporters too."

PALACE MOVE

The wait to play in the top flight would not prove to be a long one for Paul as Crystal Palace came in for him with a £550,000 bid. Personally the move looked to be a very good one as in his own words, "Palace were a very progressive club and had assembled a very good team", but his time at the club was to turn sour as Steve Coppell left him out of the side time and time again.

"I did think that if they had shelled out that amount of money for me then I'd obviously be in their plans, but I signed while I was injured and when I was fit again I couldn't really force my way back into the team."

Paul eventually made his Palace debut in an evening game against Spurs and excelled in a 1-0 win. The fans had become accustomed to the side's direct style of play but yearned for better quality football so Paul was welcomed with open arms. Although he went on to play in the remaining games of the 1990/91 season, he found himself on the sidelines at the start of the following campaign much to everyone's surprise.

"I've got a picture at home of me marking Paul Gascoigne on my debut and the caption underneath the photo said that, aithough I'd had an excellent game, Steve Coppell felt that I played too much football. I tend to agree with that and think that sometimes that was the case. I'd always played football on the floor and perhaps, in terms of being a fullback, I did overplay. Steve must have thought that I'd change but I didn't."

QUICK RETURN

While the Palace fans had clearly taken Paul to their hearts it was clear that the manager felt that Richard Shaw was better suited to the team's style of play. Having played just one more game for the club he made his final bow alongside Ian Wright and Perry Suckling in a 3-2 win at Oldham before returning to Swindon.

"Personally it was a great experience living up in London and playing for a big club, but it never really worked out. I've no regrets. I think that football careers are too short to be worrying about the negatives. It was a great move and boosted my international career and, although it was a different style of play, I would have hoped that I could have

adapted to it. Unfortunately I don't feel that I was ever given that opportunity. I never fell out with the management. Steve Coppell is a very quiet man, but Alan Smith was probably my biggest ally and would take time out to talk to me. He was very helpful and often invited the players round to his house for a few drinks while Eddle McGoldrick was also a good lad. I lived in Coulsdon and he lived near me and he was the one that invited me round to his place and helped me to settle in. It's a different world in London so he was very good."

BOYHOOD HERO

Having avoided relegation, Swindon had slowly begun to re-establish themselves after their recent troubles. Ossie Ardiles had left the club and Glenn Hoddle had taken his place for his first managerial role in the game.

"Glenn really turned us around and playing in the same side as him was a fantastic experience. I've always been a Spurs fan so that was something I'll never forget. His ability was unbelievable. He was as fit as a fiddle and the sweeper system that we played was perfectly suited to him. He found the time on the ball he wanted at the back and his pinpoint passing was a pleasure to watch. In the end we all felt that he might leave because he was such a success. To get Swindon up was a great achievement and. although I'm sure he saw us as a stepping stone, we felt that he might give it a go after winning promotion."

What followed in the Premier League was nothing short of horrible. While Swindon won a load of friends with their free-flowing football, they won few points and suffered a predictable relegation.

"I wouldn't say that we were outplayed in a lot of those games although we lost most of them, but we possibly overplayed at times. In the Premier League the strikers are so clinical that we'd make a mistake, go one down, and end up chasing the game. We enjoyed it though and got some good results, although most of those came away from home. We drew with Tottenham, Arsenal, Sheffield Wednesday and Liverpool, but we probably weren't strong enough. That's what happens when you take the spine out of a team. Colin Calderwood went to Tottenham, Glenn Hoddle left for Chelsea and Dave Mitchell went abroad and that really cost us."

BATH MANAGER

A subsequent relegation followed for the Robins before Steve McMahon led them back up to Division One. However, having played his part in this success, Paul ended his association with the club by joining Reading. He spent two seasons there before embarking on a managerial career of his own.

"I'd been at Reading for a couple of years and my first season there was very good, but a new manager came in and he made it clear that I didn't figure in his plans. Bath came in for me towards the end of the 1997/98 season and they had to get somebody in quickly because contracts were up. I'd

been coaching youngsters for three or four years so I felt that it was a natural progression and that I couldn't really turn the job down. It's totally different to playing and there are no half measures. You have to put your mind and body into it and that's what I've done, it's what I want to do and if you're not totally committed then you won't succeed."





Walters, a key figure in Swindon's o-o draw with promoted Walsall on the opening day of the season, was surprisingly left out of the starting line-up for the 4-1 televised hammering by Ipswich Town. Even

though he has only played 120

minutes so far, he has given opposing goalkeepers plenty to think about.

But his real strength has been his composure on the ball, achieving an outstanding 90 per cent pass completion rate. Palace's passing has been somewhat below par so far this term and Rodger's 61 per cent figure is actually above the average for the Eagles' squad, but some way below the sort of ratio you would expect for a midfielder.

On the other hand, the captain's crossing has been exemplary, with an above-average 33 per cent of all centres finding a red and blue shirt.

There was no better example than at Barnsley, when Rodger's inswinging corner was met by Dean Austin's bullet header. The goal was even more remarkable given that it was Palace's only corner of the game!

Both men have a reputation for being feisty in the tackle, but neither has yet been booked and, indeed, the only foul Rodger has

committed was the challenge on Craig Hignett at Oakwell which led to Barnsley's dubious penalty at the end of the first half.

It may be the likes of Clinton
Morrison and Iffy Onuora that grab
the headlines this afternoon, but you
can be sure that Rodger and Walters
will be in the thick of the action. A
Palace win over Swindon is long
overdue, of course; Town completed
the 'double' over Steve Coppell's men
last season.


